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CONCISE DICTIONARY OF CAMPANOLOGY

THE compiler feels that the following short list of words and phrases used by pursuers of the Exercise may fill a few long-felt wants.

After Bell.—The bell that strikes simultaneously with you when neither of you have learnt your front work in Stedman properly. (See *Course Bell*.)

Band.—A collection of people with determined expressions. Those readers who have come expecting brass instruments, not handbells, are in the wrong pub.

Bell.—If you don't know this one already, don't bother to go on reading.

Bob.—Mystic word, used for throwing a band of ringers into a state of inextricable confusion.

Composer.—Natural enemy of the Conductor.

Conductor.—A hunted creature, with every man's hand against him.

Course Bell.—The bell which is going wrong in 5-6 up, when you are hopelessly lost in 3-4.

Down.—A course of procedure that rapidly causes a bell to become unmanageable.

Erin.—Don't have anything to do with this method. If anyone asks you to loc it up, say with quiet dignity that you prefer Stedman.

Foreman.—Nominally in charge of the belfry. Actually the scapegoat for every sin committed by local ringers, from practising after 9 o'clock to ringing the Vicar's doorbell and running away.

Grandsire.—A method generally regarded as easy for beginners and difficult for advanced ringers. Also known as 'The Conductor's Downfall.'

Home.—(a) A hotel for other ringers. (b) The lead where all the sorting out is done.

In.—See *Out*. When spelt with two 'n's this denotes a place of refreshment.

Lady Ringer.—(See earlier articles for information on this much-debated subject: The Lady Ringer—does she really exist?)

Lead.—If you don't know what this is, you are probably still ringing call-changes.

Lie.—The Conductor's excuse that two bells must have swapped, when he has called a Wrong by mistake for a Home.

Look To (Treble's going).—A warning phrase, denoting that the treble ringer has lost patience with those who are still discussing what method they shall ring. *Stand To* is a variant, indicating that it's about time Jim stopped fiddling about with the double tuck in his rope and put both hands to the sally. (See *Sally*.)

Middle.—Something every front-rank tenor man needs plenty of. (See *Tenor Man*.)

Out.—Opposite of *In*.

Peal.—Ringing that goes on far too long for comfort.

Queen's.—Don't bother about this one. No complete band ever hears the command 'Catch them in Queen's,' anyway.

Sally.—(a) A fluffy thing with stripes. (b) The tower captain's daughter, often little more than a disembodied voice calling outside the local: 'Dad, Mum says come home, the boiler's bust again.'

Single.—A command that brings a touch round half a course before the conductor expected it.

Slider.—The thing that gets broken when the stay doesn't.

Stay.—An object of almost irresistible attraction to the learner.

Stedman.—A method of ethereal beauty, sent upon earth as a consolation for the shortcomings of Grandsire.

Tenor.—The bell that follows the others with a gap of approximately two blows length in between.

Tenor Man.—Nature's noblest creation.

Treble.—The bell with the shrillest voice. Also the chief choirboy, who has been persuaded by the Vicar to take up ringing and doesn't look as if he is liking it much.

Wrong.—This speaks for itself.

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LEADING PEAL RINGERS OF 1957

Mr. J. R. Acres Scores a Century

MR. JOHN R. ACRES, of Leicester, heads our list of peal ringers for 1957 with a total of 100 peals. This brings his grand total of peals to 436, of which 371 have been rung in the last 44 years since he moved to Leicester from Newmarket, Suffolk.

Second on the list is Mr. Derek P. Jones with 91 peals, produced by a fine Christmas spurt of 12 peals, mainly in Hertfordshire.

Mr. Ernest J. Jelley, of St. Thomas', South Wigston, Leicestershire, claims third place with 81, closely followed by Mr. Ernest Morris, who has more peals to his credit than any other ringer, with 79.

The leading lady ringer is Mrs. Phyllis Poole, of Leicester, who rang in 75 peals, followed by Miss Joan M. Wilcockson with 45.

The honour of being the most successful conductor of the year goes to the Leicester Guild secretary, Mr. Brian G. Warwick, he conducting 66 out of his 73 peals. Mr. John R. Mayne, of Harrow, conducted 60 and had the highest number for tower-bell peals.

Youngest ringer in our list is Frank Osbaldiston, aged 13, with 32 peals; but 14-year-old Bernard Groves had the big total of 54.

THREE PEALS IN 60 YEARS

The bells of St. Michael's, Teignmouth, in South Devon, well known to many summer holidaymakers, were installed for Queen Victoria's jubilee in 1897, but the third peal on them has only just been rung.

The first peal—Superlative Surprise—was rung on September 4th, 1912, during a tour by the Cambridge University Guild. It was conducted by the Rev. H. Law James, and in addition to the present tower captain the only other survivor is the former president of the Central Council, Mr. Edwin H. Lewis. Both the other peal towers of this tour, viz.: Charles Church, Plymouth, and St. Sidwell's, Exeter, were blitzed during the war.

The second peal—Yorkshire Surprise, on August 20th, 1934—was one of ten rung during a week's holiday tour in Devon. It was conducted by Frank Bennett, and the party included such names as George and Alfred Pye, Gabriel Lindoff, G. R. Newton, Harry Wingrove and William Henley.

Now that change-ringing is practised in the tower, it was thought that the Vicar's jubilee of 25 years as a priest was a fitting occasion for another attempt to be made.

Six officers of the Devon Guild met the Vicar's wife and son, who have learned to ring here, and a peal of Bob Major was rung on January 4th. After the peal the band were very kindly entertained to tea at the Vicarage by the Vicar and Mrs. Hood.

Previously on December 22nd, the actual day of the anniversary, the bells were rung before the 8 a.m. service, at which a chalice and paten, presented to the Vicar by the congregation, were used for the first time.

SHEFFIELD & DISTRICT SOCIETY

The prospect of ringing at a tower rarely seen in the Society's fixture list did not seem to provide as big a 'draw' as anticipated, and the attendance at All Saints', Sheffield, for the January meeting was below average. However, ringing to suit most tastes took place on this pleasant ring of eight, which unfortunately had to be rung muffled due to the proximity of the dense local population.

In the evening, headquarters were transferred down town to the cathedral, where further ringing, including rounds on 12, Cambridge Royal and Little Bob Maximus, was enjoyed.

RESTORATION

Exhall, Coventry

There are two parishes in Warwickshire named Exhall. Both have a church dedicated to St. Giles. Exhall, near Alcester, has only one bell hung in an open turret, but the history of the bells of the scattered parish adjoining Coventry might be worth recording.

The tower originally contained three bells, cast by Joseph Smith, of Edgbaston, in 1706. These were recast by Messrs. Barwells in 1900 and hung in a frame for six with wood beams top and bottom, joined together by cast steel cross-sections.

In 1920 two trebles and a tenor were added as a memorial to the men of the parish who fell in the first world war. Owing to the awkward conditions of handling—21 feet of rope without guides—very little regular ringing was done on them until 1951, when a set of rope guides was installed and a band of service ringers recruited from members of the choir and congregation. The bearings of the three old bells have since given trouble and it was only the regular attention by the captain and tower keeper, David Harrison, that kept them going over the years.

In October, 1957, the six bells were removed from the frame and the fittings taken to White-chapel Foundry for restoration and adaptation for roller bearings. While the bells were out the local ringers painted the frame and also bricked up the louvres to the turn of the window arches, to reduce the noise in the immediate vicinity and throw the sound further into the distance.

On Thursday, December 19th, the bells were tried out after rehanging by the local ringers, together with a few invited friends from the neighbouring tower of Keresley, who expressed their admiration for both the excellent 'go' of the bells and the effect outside achieved by bricking-up the louvre windows.

The bells were rededicated at Evensong on December 22nd by the Vicar (Rev. Leonard Bruce) in time for Christmas ringing. Messrs. Mears and Stainbank are to be congratulated on a first-class rehanging job.

A CHRISTMAS PEAL TOUR IN HERTFORDSHIRE

IT was not quite like the ordinary peal tours. In the first place it was in the dead of winter. Then again, it was a kind of non-resident affair, people joining for odd days here and there, the organiser himself combining Christmas at home with a little bit of ringing (only 12 peals in just over a week, for a start). Moreover it was exceptional in that all eleven attempts were successful.

The visitors came from far afield—a young lady from Rye, another from Duffield, a little lad from Derby, a well-known tenor man from Dorking and a friend from Kent and, not least, several from Miss Stella Hughes' cycle tour reunion the same week-end at nearby Whitwell Youth Hostel. Local ringers from Hitchin, Baldock, Stotfold, Barkway, Benington, Clifton and Hertford completed the party. Three of these on Boxing Day nearly rendered themselves incapable of completing the week by scoring Cambridge Royal at Cambridge and ringing the three heaviest bells.

The needle-spiked tower at Braughing, with a nice old Miles Graye octave, famous in earlier days, was first. A well-struck peal of Double Norwich was rung, the notoriously odd-struck seventh not proving as difficult as anticipated. One moment of the customary A. P. C. hilarity, however, nearly jeopardised his chance of scoring Sir A. P. Heywood's well-tried composition for the 50th time. It transpired it was 71 years since the last peal of Double Norwich was rung on the bells.

On the way to Hertford our transport gave up the ghost. Moreover the towers were exchanged at the last minute owing to a funeral, but despite the difficulties, the first peal of Cambridge Major on the bells in St. Andrew's Church was well and truly rung.

Some reached the imposing sandstone tower of All Saints', Hertford, next morning in the luxury of a beautiful ivory Consul car, and the sonorous Mears ten were soon tapping along to the music of Bob Royal in the titurns, the best peal of the tour being scored.

Three bus journeys made us a little late at Baldock. These heavy bells, with Hertfordshire's largest tenor (dated 1711) sound grand outside but are very exacting to the ringer within. Everybody tried hard, however, and the first peal of Yorkshire in the tower was scored with a good beat, and again pleasure was given to several critical listeners. Farewells were said to Pat and Ian and the fresher ones hastened to join Stella's reunion social at Whitwell.

The visitors assisted with the service ringing on the lovely old eight at Hitchin next morning before embarking by train and taxi into the wilds of the East Anglian heights to ring the pleasant Bryant eight at distant Barkway, where Mr. Charles Bysouth had everything in readiness. A fast peal of Bob Major was brought round in ample time for service.

Even more lonely Great Munden caused some trepidation next morning about transport and about the 'go' of the bells, which had not been pealed since December, 1934. The first fear was removed by bus and taxi, and Mr. Jack Welch, of Holmes Farm, Walkern, and his daughter, Frances, had done all they could to alleviate the latter fear.

They are both very capable ringers and all thanks are due to them for not only standing in several peals to the detriment of the farm welfare, but in taking great trouble to make all the arrangements for the three days of the tour in their district. As a result the notorious Great Munden tenor went very well. Some of the small bells proved difficult, however, owing to frame movement, and it was with some relief that the first peal of Surprise on the bells (Cambridge) was completed at a very steady pace.

A three-mile walk to Puckeridge in the fresh breeze and bright winter sunshine (just like the peal excursions the veterans describe!) made us ready for a late lunch, then a taxi was hired to take us into Benington by a roundabout route, visiting the seldom-heard and very ancient ring of five (once a ring of eight) in the picture-book village of Westmill, where the fourth is one of Hertfordshire's oldest bells (14th century) and to the good-going, pleasant six at Little Munden, where Mr. Philipps patiently waited in readiness in the tidy ringing chamber.

SQUIRE PROCTOR'S CHURCH

At Benington Mrs. Robinson was justifiably recommended as a source of tea, and she 'did us proud,' so that the peal on the famous little eight at St. Peter's, where Squire Leonard Proctor and his men rang the first true peal of Cambridge Major in 1873, was entered upon with zest. Jack Welch had rung the tenor here to the Bob Major record (over 18,000!) 25 years ago, so we could do no other than press him to ring it again. I am sure it goes far better now than then, thanks to Messrs. Mears' recent overhaul. Ilkerton Variation of Kent and Oxford Treble Bob was tapped out, and it proved a most musical peal, the two youngsters certainly earning their 'stars,' and Stella scoring her 100th.

Through a mistake, we met short at Datchworth the next morning, the last day of the year, but fortunately Philip and Jack were able to shelve work and so we postponed till the afternoon the first attempt for a quarter of a century on these bells cast by Chandler, Mr. Milton, though not enjoying the best of health, has managed to keep the old six at Watton ringable, though it is over a century since they saw the bellhanger, and they take quite a bit of ringing. Datchworth, in an unusual (for the county) shingled spire, are also hung in the old style, but are a pleasant six to ring, especially since rope guides were fitted recently. A good peal in seven methods was scored, the Rev. H. Tross, the Vicar, meeting us at the end to compliment the team. The six at Aston, rung on a flight of steps in a gallery, were visited for a short while, but the good tenor does not blend well with a very odd-struck front end, and ringing seemed to suffer as a result. The remnants joined the keen youngsters at Offley later that evening as the year drew to a close, and young Kenneth went so far as to ring for midnight at Hitchin.

The year 1958 began well, with two peals of Minor on nice bells in unusual methods. Ardeley was the morning tower, a very pretty six with a fine pre-Reformation tenor, another mediæval and an Elizabethan (John Dier) bell,

set in a needle-spike flint tower in a picture-book thatched village in the chalky upland wilds.

The rain descended in torrents as the now much-diminished party proceeded to Walkern, but the Welch family turned out in force, transport, too, to make it possible to ring on the very light six at Walkern and the even lighter five at Rushden (six with the second missing).

Poor Kenneth's hands were by now in ribbons, as six peals in five days on old-style bells is a tall order for a lad of 13, and he seemed very disconsolate about his chances of making a good job of the evening attempt. But a little act of thoughtful kindness now seemed to give him new heart. The intricacies of Conway Delight were quickly mastered and a first-rate 'first in the method' was brought round, the flickering light casting strange shadows as the ropes danced. Kenneth, far from giving up, rang his 'inside bell like a veteran, and has done well to ring 19 peals in his first year of ringing.

There still remained one attempt, almost as an afterthought but by no means the least task—Morpeth Surprise Minor at Ashwell—a hard method on Hertfordshire's heaviest six. With distant visitors from Watford and Dunstable a good peal was scored, Philip making a good job of the tenor, and another elusive 'first in the method' achieved, a very satisfactory conclusion. There can be few tours, faced with such difficulties of organisation, to achieve 100 per cent. success in such a variety of towers and methods. D. P. J.

6-5 AT BACKSTROKE

Dear Sir,—I read with great interest the article by Mr. H. Chant on 6-5's at backstroke and as a closed lead ringer I find it difficult to discover any objection.

During the many years I spent ringing the 5th with a fastidious tenor ringer beside me, I found it was a distinct advantage to give the tenor 'plenty of room' at both hand- and backstrokes, a point which is well known to all 5th ringers in successful contest tenors.

When ringing the tenor at meetings I find it easy to identify an open lead ringer on the 5th as he tends to ring too close to the tenor. It therefore is feasible that a backstroke change being completed with the 5th too close to the tenor followed by a pause must be objectionable, but if the two bells concerned were separated by a proper interval some sense of music would be produced and, we trust, appreciated.

Many ringers are today anxious to complete their peal or touch in some fantastic time, an instance being quoted in the 'R.W.' of a peal at Merstham on December 11th with a tenor of 14 cwt. being rung in 2 hours and 33 minutes! At 33 changes per minute, allowing for 16 open leads per minute, it would appear that seven bells struck every two seconds!

At this speed, with a 14 cwt. tenor, the effect of a backstroke change ending with the 5th coming down on the tenor would be indescribable and suggests a reason why 6-5 backstrokes are shunned.

I apologise to Mr. Cannon for selecting his peal as an example, but it happened to be the first which caught my eye. However, it would be interesting to know what is the pendulous swing of the Merstham tenor and how far it rose above frame height during the peal.—Yours faithfully,

PEALS WITHOUT OUTSIDE NOISE

Dear Sir,—When our Vicar came to our village, over three years ago, it soon became obvious that, as ringers, we should no longer have all our own way!

He had never had a church before where there was more than one bell and to come and live within 30 yards of six of John Warner's rough'uns—well, it made him sit up, to say the least.

He allowed us to have a peal fairly early in his ministry here, not quite knowing what he was letting himself in for. After that, things became more difficult; he had complaints from two or three people who came to live near the church; one man threatened to shoot the ringers—I believe he would have done if there had been an 'R' in the month!

I tried various methods of quietening the bells. I fitted shutters to the bell openings, gunmetal tips to the clappers, boxwood clapper ends—but all to no avail. One man suggested cutting the ropes but I thought that was rather drastic!

I made friends with a local instrument maker and with his brains and my brawn we devised a system whereby when we ring the tower bells (with clapper stays on) this rings six handbells in the ringing chamber. There used to be a similar system at Great St. Mary's, Cambridge, and I believe there still is one in use at St. Mary's, Ely, and I dare say lots of other towers, but they differ from ours inasmuch that one is mechanical and one is electrical. Ours will operate either from the mains or by batteries. We can now have as many peal attempts as we like without disturbing anyone except our loving wives when we creep into bed!—Yours sincerely,

TWO PEALS QUESTIONED

Dear Sir,—I have been looking through recent 'R.W.'s during the holiday, and must draw attention to two peals which, I feel, do not conform to the requirements for a peal.

Erin Doubles rung at Shepperton on November 23rd. The 360's of which this peal is made up do not conform to the second paragraph of the Council's decision of 1951, i.e., that a peal may consist of 'Round blocks consisting of two or more six-scores, provided that each of the six-scores which comprise the round block shall be itself a true and complete round block.'

This means that each of the six-scores in a 360 must contain all the 120 rows but need not start from nor end with rounds. Thus in a 360 you have three six-scores, each one complete in itself, joined together to make the block. (In the same way as in the Bankes-James arrangement for Cambridge Minor, in which each extent is complete in itself but does not end in rounds.)

In the 360's used in the peal (I am assuming they are those published in 1951) each row appears three times but each six-score does not contain the 120 rows.

Saturn Treble Bob Doubles rung at Ockham on November 30th. The method is false. The rows with the treble in third's place of the first lead of the plain course repeat with those of the third lead and similarly with the second and fourth leads.

I feel that there is a connection between the two peals due to a misunderstanding of what the Council's decision was. It may stem from the fact that in 1951 a leading article publicised as being the Council's decision a proposition that 'A peal of Doubles shall consist of either 42 extents of 120 changes rung without interval or any arrangement of changes in which each change occurs as many times at 120 is divisible into the total length, or any combination of these.' This proposition was rejected by the Council and the present decision (made originally in 1937) was adopted. Although the mistake was corrected immediately, I fear the correction has never really caught up with the original misstatement.—Yours faithfully,

OBITUARY

MR. JAMES ARTHUR MILNER

We regret to record the passing of Mr. James A. Milner, of Disley, Cheshire, at the age of 60 years. He was buried in the churchyard of his village church on January 11th, when ringers from many churches in the Stockport Branch of the Chester Guild were present. Many of those present had been taught the elements of change ringing by him and had taken part in peals with him.

He joined the Chester Guild in 1912 as a boy and he used to relate how, on his first visit to Norbury, he had to stand on a chair to ring the treble. In 1914 his family moved from Disley to Hyde, and he attached himself to the tower there until he joined the Forces. During the 1914-18 war he served with the Sherwood Foresters and had many harrowing experiences. On demobilisation he returned to Disley to settle down, and resided there for the rest of his life, being a tower of strength to the local band.

He rang his first peal in 1921 (the treble to a seven-method peal) at Disley and his second peal later the same year was in 17 methods 'inside.' This was the precursor of many peals of Spliced in which he took part in up to 84 methods. In all he rang 333 peals for the Chester Guild and several for neighbouring Associations, such as Lancashire and North Staffordshire, but as he kept no detailed record, his peal total is not known. He took part in the first peal of Spliced Surprise Major for the Chester Guild and in many others 'firsts' for the Guild in the years immediately prior to the Second World War.

But it is not for his ability as a peal ringer that he is best remembered. It is for his uncanny knack of teaching beginners the art of change ringing. In the 1930's many young ringers used to meet for practice at Disley and no matter how large the crowd he would see to it that each was enabled to make some progress, and it is to his unbounded patience and skill that the writer learnt how to ring. When his learners advanced further he was ever ready to guide them with good advice proffered in such a way that it seemed like the learner's own idea. His work was not confined to his own tower and when Fairfield (Buxton) appealed to him for help in raising the standard of ringing about the year 1930 he willingly went once a week for several years and had the pleasure of conducting the first peal on the bells there, in which three of the band rang their first peal and the other two had had their peal conducted by him earlier that year (1933).

His quiet, unassuming disposition endeared him to all and his unruffled manner in the most trying circumstances often had a tranquillising effect on the band. In all the years the writer rang with him he can only remember him once appearing to be angry, and then he had more than ample cause. He did not regard himself as a conductor but there is no doubt he was very able in the field of Spliced Minor and he called the first peals of many in the district.

From 1950 to 1952 he was Ringing Master of the Stockport Branch of the Chester Guild and only retired because his health was beginning to fail. He got steadily worse and for the last two years had been unable to ring. At its last annual meeting, in January, 1957, the Branch decided to bestow upon him the highest honour in its power, and made him a vice-president.

The Exercise is poorer for his passing, and to his widow and daughter and son-in-law heartfelt sympathy is extended. C. K. L.

James Arthur Miller passed to his rest on January 8th. So ends an era in the bellringing life of the Cheshire village of Disley.

When I was still a schoolboy I joined the band of ringers at Taxal Church, where change ringing was little in excess of a plain course of Bob Minor. The then leader of Taxal band took me to Disley one Friday evening and introduced me to Jim Milner, and thus began a period of instruction and friendship which continued for many years.

Amongst the towers of the Cheshire-Derbyshire borders, Jim was regarded as the instructor, and apart from his own practice night he spent many evenings and Saturday afternoons visiting surrounding towers to give of his time and instructional ability to struggling bands who looked to this humble, genial plumber to impart to them his knowledge and ability to ring Spliced Minor.

Such was Jim's ability to attract enthusiastic learners to his nursery that I, and many others through the years, accepted his summons 'You are in a peal at such and such a place' with the feeling that our presence was absolutely essential to ensure our continued progress in the world of change ringing.

Never was he ruffled and never did he point a finger at anyone when things went wrong or a peal was lost and it was this characteristic which endeared him to all who came to him for advice and instruction.

As was said in his funeral address, there is no doubt that the sound of bells, which he loved, would welcome him on his passing over. A. H.

MR. ARTHUR YOUNG

With deep regret we record the sudden passing of Mr. Arthur Young, of Frampton, Lincs. Going home on the night of December 26th he collapsed on the roadside and was later found to be dead.

A ringer at Frampton for about 40 years, he will be sadly missed. He held the office of sexton, a duty he carried out faithfully despite the fact that he had an artificial leg, having lost a leg during the first world war.

Mr. Young was a regular Sunday service ringer and a sound peal ringer, having taken part in 110 peals, which included several of Surprise Minor.

The funeral was at Frampton on December 30th. The service was fully choral, and was attended by ringers from Algarkirk, Boston, Sutterton, Sibsey, Swineshead, Wigtoft, Kirtton and Tattershall. Four of his fellow ringers acted as bearers.

MR. DAVID McINROY

On January 6th a half-muffled quarter peal was rung at Farnborough Parish Church in memory of David J. McInroy, whose tragic death was reported in 'The Ringing World' on December 6th.

David rang at Farnborough during his National Service and also took part in other church activities. We are sure he enjoyed his time in Farnborough, during which he made much progress with his ringing and gained many friends. M. A. F.

MR. JOHN H. MASTERS

Mr. John H. Masters, who died on December 6th at the age of 67, had been a ringer at Houghton-le-Spring for over 30 years. He joined the Durham and Newcastle Association in 1918 and was a very regular service ringer until illness compelled him to give up ringing in 1949. He had acted as secretary of the belfry for many years. His father and three of his brothers had also been ringers at Houghton-le-Spring.

The bells of Houghton-le-Spring were rung half-muffled for the funeral and the Sunday Evensong the night before.

MR. LEWIS NEWMAN

A member of the Kent County Association for the past 40 years, Mr. Lewis Newman died in Pembury Hospital after a short illness, and his funeral service was held at St. Michael's Church, East Peckham, on January 11th.

Among the ringers attending were Messrs. T. Saunders, L. J. Honess (East Peckham), W. R. Manser (Barming), T. E. Sone (Paddock Wood), Mr. and Mrs. W. Dobbie and Messrs. J. T. Medhurst and G. Fry (Tonbridge) and P. Carter (West Malling).

At the graveside a course of Grandsire Triples was rung on handbells by Mrs. W. Dobbie 1-2, T. E. Sone 3-4, W. Dobbie 5-6, G. Fry 7-8. Afterwards 720 Plain Bob Minor, with the bells half muffled, was rung in the tower by J. T. Medhurst 1, T. Saunders 2, T. E. Sone (conductor) 3, W. R. Manser 4, L. J. Honess 5, G. Fry 6.

Mr. Newman started ringing at the early age of 11, and at the age of 20 went to America. Returning to England in 1918, he restarted ringing the day after he arrived back. Lewis was very keen and made many friends. He was always willing to help the learner and also to fill a gap for a peal at the last minute.

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OBITUARY (continued)

MR. J. H. BROTHWELL

A last tribute to the memory of John Harry Brothwell was paid by members of the Yorkshire Association and Sheffield District Society on December 28th with a peal of Yorkshire Surprise Major, his favourite method, at Handsworth, his last tower as a regular Sunday service ringer and where he enjoyed some of his best peals. The bells were not muffled for the peal as muffled ringing was one of his pet aversions. Mr. Brothwell was one of the oldest members of the Yorkshire Association, both in age and his continuous membership of 64 years.

Born in the little village of Silk Willoughby, Lincolnshire, in 1874, after leaving school at an early age, he worked for a few years as farm hand, and at the age of 18 ventured to the colliery village of Treeton, near Rotherham, and lived there for the remaining 65 years of his life. He became head horseman to the Rotherham Collieries, and a few years later, when motoring was in its infancy, taught himself to drive, on the quiet, whilst supposedly washing the chief's Rolls-Royce. His chief, Sir Walter Benton Jones, heard of this and appointed him his personal chauffeur. He was with the same firm until he retired in 1939, and ended his career as transport manager to the collieries. He held a driving licence from the year 1904, and was driving regularly until the week before he died at the age of 83.

He learned to ring at Treeton a year after his arrival there and it was on this ring of six that he rang his first peal in 1893. He rang 11 peals of Minor up to 1910, when he scored his first peal of Major, Plain Bob at Eastwood, and joined this company about the same time. A little later he joined the Rotherham Parish Church company. All his peals from 1910 to 1920 were conducted by the late Clement Glenn, and from then until the second world war he rang most of his peals, including many Surprise methods, with the late John Flint, of Bolsover. He never kept any peal records and always said he indulged in peal ringing for the pure enjoyment of it rather than for statistical purposes. There are, however, 229 peals to his credit in the Yorkshire Association's records, and he rang many for the old Midland Counties Association in the Chesterfield area, besides many others in all parts of the country. He was an excellent striker and right up to the last rarely made a trip, even in the most difficult Surprise method. He once rang two peals of London in a day with the late William Pye, and the latter afterwards congratulated him on not making a single trip. He rang his last peal, one of Cambridge Major at Handsworth in 1953, at the age of 79.

Being mechanically minded he was always a useful man to have around a bellfry. Not only was he willing and able but the job had to be done right, and his new stays and rope-splices were works of art.

Probably his greatest assets were his punctuality and regularity at Sunday service ringing. Except for holidays and his very rare illnesses, he never missed, except once, it is recalled, when he apologetically announced one Sunday morning that he wouldn't be at the tower in the evening because his family insisted he stay at home for his golden wedding celebrations.

Mrs. Brothwell predeceased him by two years and he leaves two sons and three daughters, the two sons also being accomplished ringers.
