EXPO BELFRY IN SUFFOLK

GLORIOUS SUNSHINE AT LONG MELFORD.—OVER 62,000 PEOPLE—ONE BROKEN STAY AND A LOT OF FUN

FOR nearly two years the Sudbury and District Olde Tyme Rallye Committee had been planning a mammoth exhibition in the beautiful grounds of Long Melford Hall, the home of Sir Richard Hyde-Parker, for the week-end of June 28th-29th. Its prime object was to raise a substantial sum of money towards the £50.000 restoration of one of England's greater parish churches. Holy Trinity, Long Melford, Perpendicular gem of the East Anglian wool country. In addition it would be an opportunity for Suffolk and surrounding counties to view and enjoy on one acreage some of the finest (and numerically largest) exhibits of Veteran cars (including "Chitty Chitty Bang Bang"), steam engines, Vintage commercial vehicles, aeroplanes, tractors and farm implements. There would be exhibits by preservation societies, trade stands, Morris dancing, rural arts and crafts (but not, unfortunately, as the distressed son of one of our District secretaries observed, any mammoths at all!).

Leslie Mills, that energetic personality in the S.W. District and living near Sudbury, started to get keen about all this and said: "Why not a ringing exhibition as an ancient craft?" He said it again a little louder, then louder still, and the committee started to bite. And so it was that last summer the seeds were sown and plans made to show the Whitechapel Expo Belfry at the Sudbury Olde Tyme Rallye. And to quote our good friend from Norwich Cathedral, sometime President of the Central Council: "What a splendid idea and so convenient to Norfolk!"

PLANNING

The amount of preparation in an exhibition of this dimension is enormous, and it's fair to sav that not until the actual day did we in the Suffolk Guild fully realise just what a task Leslie and his wife, Emily, had undertaken. But it was carried out in a most efficient manner and there is no doubt that the belfry provided a really impressive shop window for the Art.

After the engineering side had been settled the small working committee were then faced with the task of deciding how the ringing should be undertaken and by whom. Not an easy one! But uppermost in our minds was the fact that this was primarily a demonstration of the Art—completely open—to a very large and interested and perhaps (?) critical public. Thus a compromise was reached to provide the fairest and most comprehensive programme possible.

Twenty-four ringers were asked from our own Guild (three eights), representing the

five Districts and including ladies, youth and clergy. In addition each of our surrounding Guilds, the Peterborough, Bedford, Kent, Ely, Norwich, Essex and University Associations were invited to send one band each for a programmed ring during the week-end.

Doubtless of the many ringers who came to Long Melford one or two may have been disappointed and we naturally regret this, but we are convinced that the best possible exhibition was given by this arrangement. However, to minimise disappointment "open" ringing was organised from 8-9 p.m. on each of the two evenings,

TREVOR BAILEY ON SITE

A mixed band from Henley and Bures spent the whole of the previous Saturday on the show ground erecting the campanile. T. N. J. B., after fortifying himself with suitable refreshment, was soon supervising the hanging of the bells. There is a saying in Suffolk that "Yew carn't work on water." How true and how well proven! This provides an opportunity to thank Trevor and his "guv'nors" for their first-rate co-operation during this exhibition.

On Friday evening, June 27th, the job was completed and those that could manage it motored over to Melford and spent a 1½-hour practice at the belfry. One solitary stay was broken and this proved to be the only one during 15 Expo-hours of the week-end. "And that," as one Norfolk worthy from you-know-where observed, "must ha' bin a bit o' forren ash!"

GILBERT THURLOW "RINGS IN" THE ACTIVITIES

We must be an honest-to-God people in East Anglia—a 95% outdoor exhibition and glorious sunshine the whole time. Bright and early on the Saturday for the 10 a.m. start stood a well-known (not too vintage) Canon. and what a delight for us to have A. G. G. T. ringing in the opening touch of Stedman Triples.

The programme then took the form of ringing a touch approximately every half-hour or more frequently if the occasion demanded, interspersed with tune ringing by the Henley Handbell Ringers. A microphone was provided for short explanations to the crowd—often eight or ten deep—and some of our attractive young lady ringers with red and gold Guild sashes mingled with the onlookers whilst the ringers themselves answered questions whenever possible.

Four visiting bands rang "on the hour" during the afternoon, those from Essex University, Bedford, Peterborough and

Kent, the Bedfordshire people ringing a commendable half course of Cambridge. The Suffolk ringers finished the day with a quite fair course of London at 8 p.m. and then approximately 50-60 ringers took advantage of the open hour to ring a variety of methods and call-changes,

A pretty exhausting day and, of course, plenty to see on the show ground as well. Visitors were also able to ring at various towers en route to Long Melford and at the Parish Church itself.

Another side attraction was George Elphick's excellent model bell foundry, looking very well alongside models of every description—trains, silk-weaving looms, boats, etc.—and manned by the expert, Ranald Clouston.

SUNDAY CROWDS

The 20.000 gate of Saturday was more than doubled on the Sunday, June 29th, and an even fuller day's ringing undertaken. It was hot and the organisers are to be congratulated in planning the refreshment tent next to the belfry.

The Parish Church bells were again open for Matins and for the Expo we had the pleasure of bands from Ely, Norwich and Essex. It was almost continuous hand- and tower bells for most of the day, with tremendous interest from the public. The Norfolk and Essex bands each rang good half courses of Yorkshire, and there's no doubt about it the whole octave handled and sounded very well indeed, and with a little practice some really top class ringing could be achieved.

Again there was an hour's open ringing in the evening, the key to its success being control, coupled with trying to provide something for everyone.

A SUCCESSFUL VENTURE

Thus Expo had done its stuff once again and we were rather sorry to think that it would be dismantled so soon and sent north to foreign parts. Would've been nice to have rung Heywood's Double Norwich on them!

The Suffolk Guild owes its thanks to the Mills family, to Howard Egglestone, the Ringing Master, and to Rev. Lawrence Pizzey for secretarial work; certainly to the tireless and well-nigh faultless Henley handbell ringers, the Whitechapel Foundry and the pretty Guild mascots, and to everyone who co-operated in any way.

The financial result is not yet known but it is believed to be in excess of a clear £5,000 for Long Melford Church.

A red-letter day for Suffolk indeed!

PARKER'S TWELVE-PART

A LOOK AT THE MASTERPIECE FOR THE BENEFIT OF YOUNG CONDUCTORS AND OTHERS

WHEN J. J. Parker's 12-part peal of Grandsire Triples appeared in "The Bell News" in 1892 it was rung twice in that year, but it was some time before this masterpiece of construction received the recognition due to it. As first published it had the 6th as observation bell and partends alternately 765 and 567. As first composed (we are told) it had the 7th as observation bell and partends alternately 655 and 567. It is in this form that it is perhaps better known to conductors today.

The object of the present essay is to look at the peal 234567 and to draw attention to one 752634 or two points that may have been overlooked but which may be useful to the young bob-caller. For this purpose we shall examine one of the parts; and seeing that all the 765423 746352 237546 S 562437 546723 parts are called exactly alike. 375246 any observations we may make 327654 on one part will probably, with intelligence, be able to be applied to all the other sec-362475 346527 753246 We will ask the Editor to be 627453

We will ask the Editor to be good enough to print one part in full, for although the conductor will doubtless have the part somewhere, the setting out alongside the text may make reference easier.

The figures show the 30 leads of the first part. If this

leads of the first part. If this part is five times repeated it will come round at the half peal. If a single is called for the last bob of the sixth part, 324567 will be produced. The calling of six more parts with a single at the end will give the whole peal. It should be noted that in the first half the front bells run 423, 342, 234, 423, 342, 324, and in the second part 432, 243, 324, 432, 243, 234. The bells in 56 at the part-ends are alternately 65 and 56.

First of all the single at the fifth lead should be carefully observed. It is this that turns 5 and 6 in each part. If a bob were called instead of a single the tirst part-end would be 423567 and we should automatically be transferred from Part 1 to Part 4 and (an important point) to precisely the same lead in Part 4. This observation is not of merely theoretical interest, it has a practical application when we look at possible variations of this peal and its use for making quarter peals.

The conductor should note, too, that the half-way single could be called at the end of any one of the first six parts, provided that it was also called at the corresponding part-end in the second half.

Now let us look at one or two helps to the safe conducting of this splendid peal.

1. The Opening.—We have to call 7 in and out at 3. Do not be tempted to rely on memory for these three leads. Note that

you call 7 out of the hunt when 23, which were hunt bell and 3rds place bell at the part-head, come down before the treble again. Where you start from 423 it will be 42, and where you start from 342 it will be 34, and so on.

2. The middle of the part.—If you look at lead 18 you will see that it is 234576. This means that the 18th lead of each part will give a lead-end the same as the parthead except that the two back bells are reversed. This gives an easy and important check on the ringing.

And it means more than this. An examination of leads 10 to 21 of Part 1 will show that for these 11 leads 3 and 4 are coursing in their plain course coursing order. Thus, in any part, the bells in 34 at the part-head will be coursing thus from leads 10 to 21. In Part 2 it will be 23, in Part 3 it will be 42, and so on. It is found in some bands that the long courses are more likely to be afflicted with a change-course than the ones broken by bobs; the checking of this coursing order, while not very difficult, is therefore valuable.

3. The bob block.—This is merely the insertion of three leads by the well-known device SBBS. Note that if instead of calling a single at the 23rd lead the conductor called a bob the 26th lead would be produced immediately and the part would be three leads shorter. The important thing in the peal is to make sure that you call the right number of bobs between the singles: and here again it is unwise to rely on memory. Note, instead, the two bells down in front of the treble at the first single, and call bobs until these two bells again come down (albeit in a different order) before the treble once more. One of these two bells will always be 6 or 5.

One last reminder. For the half-way single 32 will have to be on the front and 567 coursing 6-7-5. This should not give much trouble. But in the second half take care to ensure that the final single comes when 23 are again on the front and 567 once more coursing 6-7-5. I hope we are not labouring this point too much. It has, however, been not unknown for a young conductor to anticipate the last single, to his own discomfiture and the non-amusement of all those present!

We may perhaps conclude this thesis by remarking one or two features of this masterpiece, and we do so, we hope, without being thought to tamper with a great classic or to mutilate a fine work of art.

Part 1 of this peal makes a very attractive touch of 409 if the last call is omitted. By omitting the bob block (see above) the touch may be shortened by three leads.

The 11th lead of Part 1 will be seen to be 753246. If a single is called at the next lead the bells are immediately in the plain course and will run round two leads later, giving a touch of 196.

If a bob is called at the 17th lead (the lead after 276453) the row 342576 will appear. This comes round in four leads by bob at 1 and single at 3.

It is well known that if Parts 1 and 2 are rung and Part 3 is rung with a bob for single at lead 5 an attractive quarter peal is obtained.

It may also be noted that by calling the three parts with bob for single at 5 in each part another 1,260 may be rung—not perhaps so good as the first one given.

Part 1 of the peal may well be said to share with Part 7 the best music of the 5.040, but all the parts have their attractions. For those who would like their quarter peal to have the best music at the end we venture to suggest a trial of the following 1,259. It is quite easy.

- 1. Call Part 1 with a bob at 5 and a single at the end of the part. This will give 243567.
- 2. Call the next part with a single at 5 and a single at the end of the part. This will give 234657.
- 3. Call the third part with a bob at 5. There will be no call at the end of this part because the bells will run round at handstroke the lead after 357264. The choicest music will be enjoyed in the third part, which is, in the main, Part 1 of the peal.

The importance of the single at lead 5 has been emphasised above. By a judicious substitution of bobs for these singles in certain parts the peal may be rung in a number of variations. One of these has part-ends 423657, 342657, 234657, 423567, 342567, 324567, 324567 (repeated), and other modifications could be improvised. Some of them might possibly get so far from the original plan as to make it unrecognisable, and for this there could be little justification. We may probably say with confidence that there are no better manifestations of this peal than the form in which the great master of composition published it and the popular variation with the 7th as observation.

EXPO BELFRY AT SALTBURN

FIVE PEALS AND TWO QUARTERS
Five peals and two quarters were scored on the Expo bells at Saltburn, such was the ringing success of the week. The first peal of the week, one of Yorkshire, was almost lost when a flock of geese made a determined effort to break into the rope circle. This peal was followed on successive days by another of Yorkshire and peals of Kent, Plain Bob and Double Norwich. One of the two peals which were lost was due to midge seeking refuge in a ringer's ear. The first of the quarter peals was rung by the local band, including several first pealers, and was timed to coincide with the Apollo 11 splashdown, it having been dedicated to the intrepid lunarnauts.

The overall standard of ringing was quite high, with steady and confident striking by nearly all bands. With a mixture of pride and relief the full stock of stays was returned to Whitechapel without breakage.

About 150 ringers visited Saltburn and almost without exception they were able to ring as long as they wished. In addition to the visiting bands we were pleased to welcome lone ringers from all over England and Wales.

Due to a break in the line of communication the organiser. Peter Sotheran, with a press-ganged non-ringer as co-driver, had to make a 570-mile overnight trip to Sudbury to collect the bells. On their return early on Friday afternoon work was commenced on erecting the tower and completed in about eight hours. Saturday morning saw Trevor Bailey on the site early, and within eight working hours the bells were hung and ringing—dead on schedule.

POOR PUBLIC SUPPORT

Despite tremendous support from the local press and both regional TV channels, public support — essential to finance the venture—was disastrously poor, After five days only 75 people had paid to enter the site although many more came out of curiosity and used a nearby hill to gain a free grandstand view. By the end of the week it was estimated that 1,200 people saw the display and about half of these supported the venture financially. A gross loss in the region of £70 was almost halved, thanks to the generosity of local traders, but Saltburn and Marske ringers are naturally very disappointed as several repairs and renewals must now go by the board.

We would like to express our thanks to all those people who did support our Expo venture, particularly to those ringers and non ringers whose practical and financial help made the week a ringing success.

A PPROXIMATELY £80 towards the cost of providing shutters for the belfry of Ossett Parish Church is expected to accrue from a sponsored walk on July 19th in which five ringers covered 22 miles and rang for roughly 15 minutes at each of nine towers, totting up over 1,000 changes. Four of the five—David S. Lockwood, Michael Johnson, Eric Robinson and Margaret White—completed the course in a total walking time of six hours. Thirteen-year-old Pamela A. Lockwood stuck it until the last two miles when she had to retire through fatigue after ringing at Earlsheaton.

The walk was started off from Ossett Parish Church at 9,10 a.m. by Ald. Arnold B. Glover (Vicar's warden), who donated £5 towards the cost of refreshments for the walkers en route. Walking started off at a good pace and soon St. Peter's, Horbury (8), were hearing the bells peal out.

By 10 a.m. the walkers pushed on along Healey marshalling yards to St. Michael and All Angels'. Thornhill (6), where they were just in time to ring a 240 Oxford Treble Bob Minor before a wedding which was taking place at 11 a.m. Here a photographer who was busy taking the wedding groups snapped the ringers as well.

The walkers could now take things easier as time did not matter. The subsequent churches visited were St. Mary's, Mirfield (10); Christ Church, Liversedge

(8); St. Peter's, Birstall (8); All Saints', Batley (8); All Saints', Dewsbury (8); St. Peter's, Earlsheaton (8); and finally the home tower. Holy Trinity, Ossett (10), which was reached by 7.45 p.m.

A total of 313 steps were climbed to the nine ringing chambers. Gratitude is expressed to the band of helpers who raised and lowered the bells at each tower visited. A well-known ringer in the Barnsley area, Chris Moxon, spliced two ropes at St. Mary's, Mirfield, in record time so that ringing could be had on all the ten bells. Two members of the local St. John Ambulance Brigade were available throughout the day but were not required even to give the magic sponge.

CENTRAL BELL RESTORATION FUND

Dear Sir,-Three cheers for "Counsellor" (page 599) and especially for his remarks about a central bell restoration fund. A number of Associations are waking up to the fact that their funds could be earning far better interest, with tax advantages as well, and are changing their investments: but there must still be a lot of mouldering money around.

To my mind, though, a much more important consideration is the amount of money that does not find its way into any bell restoration fund. How many towers do not bother with a permanent restoration fund because the value of money is going down so quickly, and they don't know how (or can't be bothered) to invest it properly. with the tax relief to which a charity is entitled? How many individuals do not make regular donations (or give legacies) to a bell restoration fund because it is not publicised enough or because their own church does not have one?

A central fund could overcome all these disadvantages. It could easily register as a charity. It could arrange its investments either through the Central Board of Finance of the Church of England or through certain unit trusts which have been created especially for charities, and would automatically get all the appropriate tax concessions. It could easily get regular publicity (e.g., a weekly small ad. in the "R.W."). It could arrange for money (and the income from it) to be earmarked for a particular tower or Association, if requested by the donor. (One of the special funds

GRAHAMSTOWN BELL FRAME

Dear Sir,—I paid a visit to Grahamstown recently with the intention of doing some work on the bell frame, preliminary work with the ultimate object of making those bells ringable. The project was first mooted by Geoffrey Armitage when he was in S. Africa 18 months ago, and the Dean is most interested in getting the bells put in order.

I went equipped with a 1" drill and tungsten bit, and hoped to secure the frame to the walls by means of trawlbolts and lengths of ½" reinforcing iron with suitable fitments welded on each end. I had inspected the tower in 1962 and should have remembered, but didn't, that it is built of stone, and this proved too hard for my bits to penetrate. I intend to go to Grahamstown again in January next year with equipment which will deal with the situation and meantime I have taken some useful measurements.

I found an entry in the visitors' book which will be of interest. It records the visit in April this year by some members of the Warner family who had come to have a look at the bells "installed by our ancestors."—Yours sincerely.

True, a problem, but the manager(s) would be entitled to reasonable ad-ministration expenses, and I should think arrangements could be made for the Central Board of Finance of the C. of E. (or the unit trust managers) to do much of the routine of deposits and withdrawals.

At the very least perhaps we could have an article written by a financial or legal expert, explaining in simple terms exactly how to register a bell restoration fund as a charity and assessing the investment pos-sibilities for charitable funds,—Yours sin-

The scrap value of bell metal at the moment is such that the church in question probably realised more by the sale than the cost of the original installation, and one can only hope that they received a fair price and the church funds benefited accordingly. The only way to ensure this is to sell the material into the trade "proper" and obtain a genuine market valuation.

REFLECTIONS ON A TUNE RINGERS' RALLY

The sun was shining strongly. Bells were being placed on the tables. Organisers rushed hither and thither. "Hello, which team? Oh yes, we've put you in the first half. Hope you had a pleasant journey. The occasion was the fourth annual rally of Handbell Ringers of Great Britain, being held on May 3rd at Nunnery Wood School in Worcester. Half-an-hour or so beforehand the committee in session was trying to evaluate the success of this new group of handbell ringers—33 teams present and only 14 at the first rally. They talked about dividing the country into regions but this was turned down; but it will come, won't it, Mr. Sharpe?

At last the rally started. The Mayor of Worcester said a few words, his wife smiled on us all and the Vicar of Randwick was soon announcing the first team, Ashton and District, who began with "The Dambusters' March". So the afternoon carried on with So the afternoon carried on with each of the first 17 teams ringing in turn. Some, I felt, cheated a bit by ringing more than one tune: but then the teams were than one tune: but then the teams were all eager to show that they could ring. Ashton-under-Lyne Grammar School had two teams present. Ealing played as beautifully as usual. Ecclesfield's bass players showed their skills in "Melody in F" by Rubenstein. Norbury's team rang a piece by Mozart with much skill. Hunshelf dug out some laughs in their version of "In the hall of the mountain king" by Grieg. It out some laughs in their version of "In the hall of the mountain king", by Grieg. It was pleasing to see Silverdale (Lancashire) in action again. Thurlstone (Yorkshire) were missing and so also were Hebden Bridge, another big, "round-the-table, pick-them-up" team. The larger Northern teams dominated the first half with their larger sets, on the whole. Finally, Wentworth and District concluded the afternoon with "Jesu, joy of man's desiring" and a buffet tea (did anyone count the sandwiches eaten by the anyone count the sandwiches eaten by the 500 or so people present?) was enjoyed.

Another batch of teams took over in the second half. Higher Walton, so vastly improved since their first appearance at Ashton-under-Lyne (second rally), started us off with Schubert's "Marche Militaire". Fred Sharpe (playing large bass bells, three- and later four-in-hand) and his Launton team rang in a style utterly foreign to the Northern ringers, as did also the Leigh Sinton ringers of Worcester. Not just content with four-in-hand ringing, they also had to swing their arms and bodies as well. It left us from the North somewhat wondering as to whether they were quite right-minded, but the noise created was, in its way, most effective. The Beltonians, of Leicester, created a stir by using a harmonium, but this allowed them to come up to date with "Monsieur Dupont". "Lily the Pink" and "Boom, bang-a-bang", at that time tunes in the "Top 20". Young ringers from North Worcestershire tried really hard and con-trasted well with the noisy, brassy four-in-hand team from Sileby, Leicestershire. Many teams had to leave early to get home at a respectable time. Furthest to travel were the teams from Silverdale and Morecambe. Finally, a team from Winterbourne

May we long continue to expand.

OBITUARY

MR. GEORGE LEWIS GROVER

During the discussions on the prospective constitution of the Guildford Diocesan Guild shortly before its formation at the end of 1927, John S. He was Guildford District secretary from 1929 to 1938, general secretary from 1930 to 1958, reasurer from 1951 to 1958 and a Central Council representative from 1930 to 1953.

George, who was born on September 14th, 1897, learned to handle a bell at West Clandon shortly before the First World War, under the instruction of Frederick Bennett, but it was not until some years later that he became very active. Details of his first peal, believed to have been in 1922, are not to hand, but a beautifully-illuminated peal book gives details of the next 99. His second peal, one of Seven Surprise Minor in his own tower, was not until 1928, and his last was in 1957, bringing his total to about 150. The majority were Stedman Triples and Surprise Major.

George, who served the same firm of Guildford solicitors for 53 years, was involved in almost every parish activity and in particular he was Clerk to the Parish Councils of both East and West Clandon for 30 years: a member of East Clandon P.C.C., a school governor and secretary of a housing society.

A large figure, both metaphorically and physically, he was greatly missed in recent years at Guild meetings and will now be sadly missed in his own tower, of which he was captain for the 20 years to 1966. His presence twice a week since then, even though he had not been able to ring through ill-health, was a constant encouragement. George's definition of an ideal ringer was a quotation from the Book of Psalms: "He that sweareth unto his neighbour and disappointeth him not". Reliability, sound judgment and wise counsel, combined with resolution, wit and kindness, were the marks of this thoroughly Christian gentleman. The power of his voice when conducting or teaching was well known, but so equally were his generosity, understanding and perception.

Our deepest sympathies are extended to his wife and grandchildren, so soon after the death of his only son.

The funeral service was at East Clandon on July 29th, attended by a full church of relatives, friends and representatives of many organisations. The Guildford Diocesan Guild was represented by D. A. R. May (Master, a pupil of George). C. W. Denyer (vice-president and past Master), A. H. Smith (vice-president), T. Page (Ringing Master, Farnham District) and Miss Y. Eloie (secretary, Guildford District), Others present included Major E. J. Bragg (Aldershot), W. Savill (Stoke-next-Guildford, a former Guildford District Ringing Master), R. I. Vaughan (Brighton, formerly of Merrow), R. Walker (West Clandon) and Miss A. P. Warren (Merrow). During the service a course of Grandsire Triples was rung by D. A. R. May 1-2, T. Page 3-4, C. W. Denyer 5-6, E. J. Bragg 7-8.

MR. WILLIAM GREEN

By the passing of "Willie" Green, of Wath-on-Dearne, the last link with the old Minor method band has been severed. Willie was a quiet man with a placid temperament, a slow, drawling speech and a merry, twinkling eye. He was also an excellent ringer. He learnt to ring at Crofton, did a little in the Leeds area, and after moving to Wath became a member of that band. He proved to be a first-class method ringer and was a member of the band Albert Nash gathered around him in the 20s and 30s to try and advance ringing standards in Minor and, later, Major ringing.

This band rang peals of Surprise Minor, culminating in a peal at Rotherham Parish Church in 1931, at which Willie rang the 2nd, of 10,800 in 15 different 720s of Surprise Minor. He was also in Dan Smith's team which rang Spliced Minor in 35 methods in 1934. He also rang a great deal of Major, including Surprise, and was also very fond of Double Norwich. He seldom went wrong and was a very good striker.

The last years of his life were devoted to keeping the bells at Wath supplied with ringers, and quite a few owe their start to him. His exact peal total is not known but he rang 113 for the Yorkshire Association. of which he was a life member. The funeral service, at which the bells were rung, was held at Wath-on-Dearne Church on July 29th and was followed by cremation at Ardsley. A quarter peal of Wath Delight in his memory was rung on the Wath bells on July 31st. Willie was 82 and leaves a daughter and two grand-children.

Merseyside ringers have suffered a severe loss by the sudden death of Mr. Terence Michael FitzGerald on July 20th after an operation at Liverpool Royal Infirmary. An obituary will appear next week.


