## RESOLUTIONS

Most of us are familiar with the saying that good resolutions serve as paving stones on the road to hell. A New Year is sometimes more than an adjustment of the calendar. To many it is symbolic of a fresh start, and it is in the planning of this new beginning that the old adage becomes operative. Don't believe the satanic reference. Even the striving after checking a particular weakness has merit. We ringers have our own weaknesses; we are a peculiar people in the eyes of the world. Exercise or entertainment with a ball is understandable by the public at large, but with a rope and a bell ten thousand times no.

The first resolution on my list is walking circumspectly in the eyes of the public. In the midst of our enthusiasm for ringing is there not a danger of over keennsss? The Church and the world do not revolve around ringing. Ringing has to be dovetailed into the scheme of things. Each tower situated in a centre of population should be examined as to the effectiveness of its louvres and whether the bells are likely to give offence to the non-bigot. (There is a section of the public who will attack bells and anything connected with the Church, whatever the circumstances, and it is impossible to cater for these people.)

When ringing a peal where the bells are heard by a large number of people there should be some purpose for the peal, and it is useful propaganda if this reason, provided it is a grood one, could be published, even after the event. It should not be difficult to compile an appropriate list on a sufficiently broad basis to be understandable by the non-ringing public. With a purpose, ringing then becomes to them an understandable thing.

Another difficulty is over practices. These should be held on a regular evening each week with a limitation of time. People living around would know when to expect the bells and arrange their own recreations accordingly. We heard recently of a musical appreciation class which met to listen to gramophone records at the same time as the bells of the Parish Church were being practised on. The class could not be held. A meeting between representatives of the ringers and the class has resulted in an understanding being reached.

The fact that a practice is being held is no excuse for an absence of disregard for those who might hear the bells. The conductor should not hesitate to call 'stand ' if the ringing degenerates into a type that is
likely to give offence to the outside public, rather than give a display of his own consummate skill in unravelling ringing tangles. Two things are invariable at the bottom of such ringing-lack of knowledge of the method, or as someone remarked, 'absence of pencil and paper,' and lack of confidence as displayed in the inability of the individual to master his bell. There is a quotation of John Selden that runs, 'Never tell your resolutions beforehand,' but then it is the exception that proves the rule!

## OBITUARY

# THE BEDFORDSHIRE ASSOCIATION 

Bodifordshine is a county with a loug tradition of change ringing. The first recald of change ringing dates back to 1655 as testified by a manuscript preserved in the Bodleian Library at Oxford and writhen about that date. The enthusiasm of John Bunyan as a ringer at Elstow is additional evidence of the popularity of ringing in those eariy days. In his book, 'Grace Abounding, Bunyan's conscience pricked him on the matter of riuging, for he wrote:-

- I thought that such practice was but rain, and therefore forced myself to leave it; yet my mind hankered; wherefore I wouid go to the stoeple-house, and look on, though I durst not ring.'
The association was formed at a meeting in Bedford on March 13th, 1882, when the following officers were elected:
Patron: The Lord Bishop of Ely
President: The Ven. Archdeacon of Bedford. Vice-presidents: The Rev. R. E R. Watts (Vicar of St. Paul's, Bedford), Mr. C. L. Higgins, of Turvey Abbey, and Mr. T. Bagnall, of Miiton-Ernest.
Hon. Treasurer : Mr. L. G. Elger, of Bedford.
Hon. Secretary : Mr. C. Herbert, of Woburn.
The committee consisted of eight members
of whom four shall be performing members.'
The first ruie reads: That the society be called the Bedfordshire Association of Change Ringers. That it have for its objects the promotion of be'fry reform, and the , ultivation of scientific change ringing, and shall consist of honorary and performing members.'
In the first year there were 19 honorary and 29 performing members. The highest membership was achieved in 1931 with a total of 241 , namely, 18 honorary and 223 performing. Subsequent presidents were :Rev. Canon W. W. C. Baker Rev. Canon Albert Rust Miss Evelyn Steel

PEAL RECORDS
The number of peals rung by the association totals 1,050 . The longest is a peal of 10,176 Kent Treble Bob Major in 1894. A 10,080 of Minor was rung in 1923. There is no twelvebell tower in the county, but a twelve-bell peal was rung by the association on handbe'ls in 1903, consisting of 5,016 of Bob Maximus.
The first peal by the association was a 5,040 of Bob Minor in 1884. Other 'firsts' were Grandsire Tripies 1885, Bob Triples 1886, Bob Major and Kent Treble Bob Major 1887, Stedman Triples 1894, Double Norwich 1895, Oxford Trebie Bob Major 1890, Grandsire Caters 1896. Kent Trebie Bob Royal 1897, Superlative Surprise Major 1897, Stedman Caters 1902. Cambridge Major 1913, Bristol 1925. London Major 1927, Little Bob Major 1929, Litt'e Bob Royal on handbells 1931.
The first recorded peal in the county was a 5,040 of Bob Maior at Dunstable in 1776 by the College Youths. The Coilege Youths alsu rang a peal of Grandsire Triples at Leighton Buzzard in 1801. The greatest number of peals rung in any one year was in 1937, name: y, 45 In 1882 thene were eight rings of eight bell: in the county, 13 of six, 47 of five, 18 of four, 18 of three and eight of two, total 112. at the present time there are two rings of ten, 12 of eight, 32 of six, 26 of five, 14 of four, 18 of three, and 8 of two, total 112 . It will thus be seen that considerable augmentaticus

have taken place during the 64 years of the association's existence. The most anciont bell in the county is the sanctus bell at Dunstable, traditiona'ly reputed to have been cast about the end of the eleventh century.

When the Ely Diocesan Association was formed in 1882 the committee of the Bedfordshire Association placed before their annual ineeting 'certain reso.utions providing that for the future the society shall exist as the Bedford Archidiaconal Branch of the Ely Diocesan Society.' There apparently the matter ended as there is no further reference to the subject in subsequent minutes. The Bedfordshire Association is now in the St. Albans Diocese, of which there is no Diocesan Association, although tentative suggestions have been made from time to time to this end. In 1932 the association celebrated its jubi'ee by a luncheon in Bedford and an officers' peal at Biddenham, where the first peal was rung.

## OUTSTANDING PERSONALITIES.

Of outstanding personalities, Mr. Charles Herbert naturally takes pride of place. He may truthfully be described as the 'father' of change ringing in Bedfordshire, and with the help of Canon (then Mr.) W. W. C. Baker, Mr. Edwin Ranson and Mr. Isaac Hills, started the association on its successful career, from which it has never looked back. In the preface of North's 'Church Bells of Bedfordshire' he receives an acknow'edement of his help towards the completion of that work, and amongst other of his activities in his $\in$ ndeavour to further the science of change ringing and belfry reform to the fore, he wrote out the full peal of 40.320 of Rob Major in order to convince a sceptic. This manuscript is now in the possession of the Central Council Lihrary. Mr. Herbert died in 1923 in his 80th year.
In another sphere the name of Mr. Charles W. C.arke stands out as pasily that of the leading peal ringer and conductor. He ioined the association in 1883 and soon came to the front as a conductor and appicied all his energy and spare time to teaching young bands, starting from scretch in ever case. He rang altogether more than 700 neals, of which he conducted over 430 . His death took place in January, 1942, at the age of 77 years.

The Bedfordshire Association enjoys the unique distinction, for the first time in its history, of having a lady as its president in the person of Miss Steel, who was ciected at the anuual meeting on Easter Monday in the place of Canon Rust, who resigned on account of fai ing health. Miss Steel, as is well known, is aiso president of the Ladies' Guild, an honour of which the Bedfordshire Association feels justifably proud. Miss Steel scored many peais during the years between the wars, especially in a great variety of Minor methods, and probably holds a record in this respect.
The association suffered a severe blow by the untiniely death in the 1914-1918 war of John Wiliam Barker, of Redford, who would undoubtediy have made a great name for himse.f had he lived, both as a couductor and composer. He had already a number of meritorious compositions to his credit.
Of other leading conductors during various periods the following deserve honorable mention: Mr. Alfred King, senior vice-p"esident, Mr. L. A. Goodenough, both of the Luton tower; Mir. A. E. Sharnan, vice-president, Dunstable; the late Mr. C. Herbert, of Woburn, both hand and tower; and Mr. E. J. Hobbs, of Husband Crawley.
The other vice-presidents are Mr. J. Nicho'ls, of Leighton Buzzard, Mr. E. Herbert, of Woburn Mr. W. Stapieton, of Bedford, and Mr. G. W. He:ey, of Dunstable. The completion of 25 years service by Mr. C. J. Ba'l as local secretary of the Biggleswade 1)istrict is noteworthy.
The association, which is divided into three districts, suffered a slump during the war years, but is now almost back to its pre-war strength, thanks to an influx of young recruits. A local secretary is appointed for each district, who undertakes to arrange a meeting once a month. The annual meeting takes piace on Easter Mondar in Bedford, and a summer festival is held annuaily, usually on the first Saturday in July, in various suitables oentres in the county.

The tower was re-visited, all classes were catered for from rounds to Cambridge with varying degrees of success, but the 'yawning chasm ' gradua'ly lost its terrors for those unused to these pecuizar conditions, and ringing concluded at $8.30 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. with two well-struck touches, one of Stedman and one of Grandsire Triples

I really do think that the matter of moisy bells will have to be looked into or, as $\mathbf{M r}$. Birmingham remarks, the bells will nnly be rung subject to by-laws.

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## CARICATURE

In more than three million homes in this country the Exercise was associated with the incoming of 1947. On New Year's Eve the ' Daily Express' published a belfry scene as the subject matter of Giles' cartoon on current events and by permission of that newspaper we reproduce it in this issue. We were not flattered, but the privilege of caricature is such that to be featured in 'Punch ' is a stepping stone to fame, and to be noticed by the most popular daily newspaper in this country is undoubtedly some recognition. The question ringers will be asking is where does caricature end and ridicule begin?

Now it is a maxim of art for the cartoonist to use exaggeration to emphasise points of personality. The creatures of fantasy that Giles pictured in his ringing chamber as the companions of bats are devoid of personality and in true keeping with the words of the caption. Ringers are all too familiar with the gnomelike mockery. Incongruous situations cause many a smile, hence the Exercise will take the jole against themselves in good part. Caricature is no modern thing: King Rameses V. of Egypt, as early as 1100 B.C., was caricatured, and in the introduction of printing this art quickly Hourished. The first printed caricature of 1460 depicts a group of richly-clothed ladies scrambling for the possession of a pair of trunk hose held aloft in a garland of two winged genii. To-day's caption would undoubtedly be ' Nylons '-so history repeats itself!

Virginia Woolf, in one of her essays, wrote: 'If you say to the public with sufficient conviction, "All women have tails and all men humps," it will actually learn to see women with tails and men with humps, and will think it very revolutionary and probably improper if you say, "Nonsense." The same observation might equally apply to 'Bats in the Belfry,' as, unfortunately for us, there is a substantial section of the community who invariably associate the decrepit and the half-wits with bellringing. 'Bats in the Belfry' is a phrase most ringers have had hurled at them by the uninitiated, and it is popularly held that the intelligence ratio of bellringers is subnormal. It is only when the critic starts to explore the hidden intricacies of bellringing that an appreciation is gained of the concentration and high mental faculties required, and mathematical, $(0)$, if the art of composition and proof is registered.

There are, however, hidden joys to ringers in Giles' cartoon as revealing heights of absurdity unbeknown to the ordinary individual. Perhaps this humour was unconscious. 'The Ringing World' refrains from offering a prize for the maximum number of absurdities or impossibilities spotted by readers. Six ropes in a straight line, for example, make one wonder how Giles' phantoms mastered the principle of rope-sight. The length of rope below the sallies of elephantine proportions conjures up a series of problems as to what sort of a contraption was at the other end of the rope. 'Caricature, to be an art at all, must always be allowed its own way,' wrote an authority. The sore of ridicule is healed by the balm of absurdity, and our readers will laugh with the millions of others who look to the 'Daily Express' for their news and views.

## HARLLNGTON BELLS AUGMENTED.

 History hes repeated itself at Harlington, Middlewes. On December 21st, 1904, the Bishop f loudon, scourding to a brass tablet on the Fest wail, rodedicated the six bells at Es, iog prevented him from attending). on Church had had address, said that Harling In Henry VIII.'s reign a be'l weighing over roin. wes sent to John Fford, belfounder, of London, to be recast and tuned with the other bells numbering four. But the churchwardens omitted to take a receipt from Fford, whe imnied:ately pruceeded to melt the bell down, but died a few weeks after. His widow denied all responsibility, consequent!y the bell was never returned. The case was taken to the High Court of Chancery, from which our record is taken, but the outcome and verdict has been lost, as wes the be!l.

In 1779 Thomas Mears, now Moare and Stainbank, Whitechapel Bell Foundry, recast five bells and added one more, making six in all. In 1893 the tenor bell, weighing 7 cwt., which had hecome cracked, was recast.
The Harlington bellringers desired to add a chiming apparatus, and collected the necessary inger and to erect a tablet to two of their Beale and Cyril Arthur Winter. The chiming apparatus would not be heard that evening as come adjustments had to be made. Nor must that tablet recording the two names be taken as a parish memorial to those who fell in the late war: that would come after.
The Rector then dedicated the hells, after which he requested the captain of the bellrhich the Rector then to unveil the tablet, which the Rector then dedicated.

## DEDICATION AT THRYBERGH.

On December 14th, the ring of sir bells was dedicated at St. Leonard's Church, Thrybergh, near Rotherbam. There were five be is preriously. Of these the fourth is inscribed with the date 1586 and the tenor is beiieved to be much older, probabiy at least 500 yeass old. These two were retuned only and the original canons retaiued.

The remaining three of the old five, also very old, dated 1609,1638 and 1687 , have been recast. Their dates and inscriptions have been reproduced in facsimi'e and the year of recasting is recorded on each of them.

A new treb:e, given by an anonymous donor, has been added and the whole rehung on ball bearings in an iron frame, making a very handy and tuneful peal of six, tenor 8 cwt . 26 lb . in B flat. The work hes been carried out by Messrs. John Taylor and Co. with the assistance of Messrs. Belden, Ltd., of Thrybergh.

The new treble was dedicated by the Lord Bishop of Sheffield (the Rt. Rev. L. S. Hunter) and the old five by Canon G. H. C. Bowen Rector of Thrybergh from 1901 to 1944.

The opening touch was rung by the following members of the Yorkshire Association: Coin Harrison treble, W. Eric Critchiey 2, Arthur Firth 3, John J. L. Gilbert 4, Sidney F Palmer 5, Norman Chaddock tenor. Mr. Har rison, who was representing the belfounders, kindly stood in at the last minute owing to the unexpected illness of ane of the original band.

About 25 ringers were present from the surrounding district to test the 'go' and the twine of the bells. Criticisms were very favourable and this ring has made a fine addition to the towers of South Yorkshire.

Ringing continued during the afternoon and evening. The Rector very kindly provided a free tea, which was very much appreciated To end the day a 720 of Bob Minor was rung by John H. Brothwell 1, Gordon Briggs 2, T. Colin Ryde 3, George Tuke 4, Tom Cutts 5, John J. L. Gilbert tenor, this being the first 720 of Minor on the bells.

## TWU SYDNEY TOWERS REOPENED

Dear Sir, - During Christmas two of the Sydney towers have been put in order and opened again.
On Sunday, December 22nd, the bel.s of St. Jude's; Randwick, were opened, after being out of order since before the war. The bel's are a ring of eight by Vickers, Ltd., and are cast steei with a tenor of 21 cwt . The tenor has been put on röiers and a price bas beou accepted to put the 5 th, 6 th and 7 th on rollers also. I was taugint to ring in St. Jude's tower and it wes good to hear the old bells going again.
The other tower is Cluist Church St. Laurence, George Street, City. These bells, a ring of six with a tenor of $13 \mathrm{cw} . \mathrm{t}$. by Taylors, have not been rung for 25 years. The same old story, the tower was not safe. A little pushing by the N.S.W. Association pand great enthusiasm from a newly-formed Christ Chureh Society eventually persuaded the authorities io get an architect to inspect the tower, which he passed as safe for ringing! In fouct, there was no reason for them ever to have stopped.
The Christ Church ringers then got to work and dismantled the existing clavier, and after 12 months' hard work have the belis swinging again. They were apened on Christmas Fve for the midnight sorvice. The ringers taking part were as follows: J. Campigli (capt.), K. Miller, R. Jones, P. Davis and W. M. Rowe from Christ Church, J. B. Watts and D. McGrainger (Tarramurre), H. Short (St. Mary's), L. Orme from St. Paut's, Melbourne. With the addition of these two towers we now have six towers with swinging bells in Sydney, three 8's and three 6's.- Yours, etc. Sydney.

## OBITUARY

MR. JAMES BURGE
With regret we anuounce the loss to the Taunton Deanery Branch of the Bath and Wel.s Diocesan Association of its oldest member, Mr. James Burge, who died on December $20 t h$ in his $90 t h$ year. He was one of the foundation members of the association and had been for many years an hon. life member. He was conductor of St. Mary Magdaiene's ringers for 40 years (1896-1936) and during that time did a good deal of instruction in rope handing and the first stages of change ringing. 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## RUPERT RICHARDSON

This week the Exercise remembers with gratitude the life of Rupert Richardson, of Surfleet, who completed his work on this earth on Sunday morning. There are hundreds of ringers, apart from his kith and kin and those living in the daffodil village of Surfleet, who will thank God for the example of his life. His friends knew that the call could be expected any day, and Rupert also knew. A big man with a big heart is how Rupert will be remembered. His friendship was as firm as a rock and was extended with that open-hearted sincerity and generosity to all who would grasp it. He loved his fellow-men for the good in them; he apprised goodness as some people might cattle, and that was what made him one of nature's gentlemen.

The little Lincolnshire village of Surfleet has for 50 years or more been a name known throughout the Exercise. Its Vicar was the Rev. H. Law James, and during his incumbency Surfleet bells were augmented to 12, the village having the lightest ring of 12 in the country. His churchwarden for many years was Rupert Richardson, who upon his death succeeded him in the Mastership of the Lincoln Diocesan Guild. Rupert regarded his Mastership as a sacred trust; he travelled the county and was familiar with every tower and every band of ringers. For his association he rang 514 peals, the last being at Spalding on September 26th. The only eight-bell tower in the county in which he had not rung a peal was Burgh-leMarsh, and he had hopes of selecting a band to ring there.

Rupert did not confine his work for the Exercise to his own Guild. He was a familiar figure at meetings of the Central Council, where it frequently fell to his lot to smooth out difficulties. Ringers invariably turned to him when faced with perplexities, and he brought to bear that shrewdness of worldly affairs coupled with a comprehension of ringing problems. He and his wife and daughter were members of the party that toured Australia. British ringing could have had no better representative, not only as a ringer, but in matters of bell hanging he had that knowledge capable of improvising in unexpected emergencies.

The Ringing World ' had in Rupert Richardson a very sincere friend. He realised the importance of the journal to the Exercise, and was ever ready with practical advice to help forward its great work in cementing together ringers into one great brotherhood. The founder-editor,

Mr. J. S. Goldsmith, was held by Rupert with very great affection, and upon his death he was one of the small body who negotiated for this journal to pass out of private ownership into the hands of the Central Council. On Thursday afternoon his friends from far and wide gathered at Surfleet to pay homage to one who gave so freely of his time and energies for the advancement of change ringing. To his widow and daughter, on behalf of the Exercise, we extend our deepest sympathy.

# UNIVERSITIES' ASSOCIATION RE-UNION 

Bishop of London and the Church's Task.....Young Ringers and Holy Orders.. ...Dr. Spice Resigns Secretaryship ...... Thirty-six New Members

The third anmual dinner of the Universities Association was he'd in London on January 1st. During the day there was ringing at $\mathbf{S t}$ Mary's, Battersea, St. Mary Abbot's, and St. Gabriel's, Pimlico; one novelty was a course of spliced Dauble Norwich and Bristol (a production of the fertile brain of Mr. B. D. Price) at St. Stephen's, Westminster.
The service was held at St. Gabriel's, Pimlico, when the preacher was the Bishop of London (Dr. J. W. C. Wand).
The Bishop, in his address, said: In these daya of trials and anxieties a great opportunity lies before the Church of God, and sIgns are not wanting that the mass of the people may be readier than is sometimes thought for a return to Christianity. It is, therefore, your duty, as church workers, to look forward to the Church's lask, and to see how best to forward it. I am going to suggest three ways by which such an approach can be made.
The firat of these is by way of conduct and morals. It is widely recognised that society as we know it is in danger of a break-up, and that we are perilousiy near to sliding into a state of neo-paganism. But men and women are beginning to see that whereas man cannot work out his own salvation God can and will help him, and that the way back to stable homes and a stable society can only come through Christianity.
Thus, during my recent visit to Germany, members of the Forces frequently asked me just what demands are made on the individual by Christianity. In the past it has often been said that doctrine and dogma were unneoessary adjuncts to the Gospel message; but whenever doctrine and dogma have been dispensed with, then has Christianity tended to degenerate into a rather vague ethical system, and its force has been greatly weakened. So it is necessary for aill professing Christians to be able to show just what the acceptance of Christian doctrine implies in our daily life-and this tack oan be best approached by
of moral standards.
Christianity must secondly be approached through faith. The truths of Christianity are unchanging, but these doctrines need to be explained afresh to each generation, that their significance may always be apprehended. There are thousands upon thousands of people in stand country to-day who simply do not understand the language of religious truth or the inatince, when I was the Dean of an Oxford college, I was rather proud of a simplified the lienutiful sarrice which we used to hold in Was pleased to sue at the service an American Rhodes Scholar. Once again we must be practical, and here I would urge the general acceptance of a bedrock rule such as the Archbishop of York has recently recommended-that aill members of the Church should join in public worship at least once every Sunday. Such a rule should appeal especially to you, as you must feel particularly hurt when your invitation to come and worship is ignored.

Some 70 menbers and guests sat down to dinner at the Shakespeare Hotel. The visitors included the Lord Bishop, the Rev. H. E. Farrington (Vicar of sit. Gabriel's) and Messrs. A. A. Huglies, G. H. Cross, C. W. Roberts, loyal toast, a course of Double Narwich on handbells was rung in fine style by two members of the Oxford University Society and two
members of the Cambridge University Guild. nembers of the Cambridge University Guild.
The President (Mr. E. H. Lewis), in welcoming the visitors, spoke of the functions of the Universities' Association. It had proved, he said, and wes proving, most useful in the training of missionaries for ringing who would go out from the universities and carry with them to all parts of the country the love of change ringing, and who from their university training could be expected to be well qualified in the teaching of the Exercise.
The secretary, Dr. J. E. Spice, proposed the toast of 'The Universities' Association,' first reading an a pology for absence from Rev. A.C. $G$. Thurlow and a letter from Rev. M. Melvilhe. $\mathrm{He}_{\mathrm{e}}$ reviewed the year's activities and then the progress of the association since its formatiou. Last year's ringing week had seen twu innovations which he hoped would become institutions-namely, the holding during the week of a corponate Communion and of en informal concert. The time had now come for him to resign the secretaryship, but he had no doubt that the association would go on from strength to strength.
Miss Cross proposed a toast to 'The Ringing Visitors.' She stressed the fact that the main work of the Universities' Association was in teaching and, more important, in teaching how to teach, and she thanked the visitors and the various ringing organisations they represented for all they had done and were doing to help the association in various ways.
Mr. A. A. Hughes responded. He said that it was a pleasure for those ringers in London to do all they could to help. The Universities' Association was doing some very good work and the Exercise would reap the benefit in the jears to come.
Mr. F. E. Haynes, in proposing the toast to 'The Clergy,' spoke of the happy memories he had of his early associations with the clergy of the Cambridge Univarsity Guild. He was sorry so few young ringers were now entering the Church-only 20 per cent. of the C.U.G. were now in orders. The great thing was to increase the numbers of ringing clergy. He congratulated the secretary on his engagement and announced the engagement of two wellknown members of the U.A.C.R
Woolley and Miss M. D. Telford.

Dr. Wand replied. He thouglit it was hard luck to have to work overtime hike this. but he had greatly enjoyed the dinner end appreciated the pains Mr. Haynes had taken to draw the moral from his sermon. He now saw that his life had been largely wasted, for
when he was at Oxford he did not take up ringing. Had he known that there were lady ringers (was that why the association seemed so flourishing?) he might have done so. But it was a great pleasure to him now to meet so many ringers.

## THIRTY SIX NEW MEMBERS

During the general meeting which followed, the secretary reported on the favourable financial position-there was a balance in hand of $£ 122 \mathrm{~s}$. 9d.-and the election of 36 new members was confirmed. Tho secretary then explained that for various reasons he had decided that it was time for him to resign office. The committee recomnended that Dr. E. S. J. Hatcher be appointed as the new secretary, and this was unanimously agreed.
The President paid tribute to the late secretary's work. He had been doubtful at first about the wisdom of forming the U.A.C.R., but now he knew that it hed been a good thing, and the fine work done had been largely due to Dr. Spice's efforts. The Rev. C. E. Wigg said that the late secretary's organising powers seemed to him incredible and that his amazement was always growing. He was especially grateful for the work he had done at Oxford. Dr. Spice, in expressing his thanks for these tributes. said that he had enjoved the work and that he wished Dr. Hetcher every success.

## A BOXING DAY TOUR IN THE NORTH-EAST

Ringers from Newcastle-on-Tyne and Thornaby-on-Tbes joined forces for a busman's holidey on Teeside during Bozing Day. The rendezvous was the Church of Si. Thomas, Stockton, and the bells were raised soon after $10.30 \mathrm{a} \cdot \mathrm{m}$. Stockton bells, a ring of ten with tenor $27 \frac{1}{2}$ cwt., have not been rung regularly for many years, and with the inevitable result of neglect have failen into poor state of repair. Several adjustments, inoluding the freeing of two ropes from the clock works, had to be made before the bells could be raised, but after some valiant efforts touches of Grandsire Triples, Plain Bob and Kent Treble Bob Major were rung.

The next call was Thornaby Parish Church, about one mile from Stackton on the south side of the River Tees. Here is a pretty little eight, tenor 11 cwt ., by Llewellyn and James, and several good touches were brought round before adjourning to headquarters for the day -chez Addison. A truly sumptuous Christmas repast awaited the party here, but instead of being allowed to sit back and 'sleep it off,' the energetic host paraded the perty for the journey to Middlesbrough.
St. Hilda's, Middlesbrough, was for many years one of the mainstays of the Cleveland and North Yorkshire Association, hut like many other towers it is undergoing a period of lean years. 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## THE CHURCH'S PENNY

Last year the Church paid the writer one penny for every occasion he rang for a service, and in consequence in the eyes of those who regard ringing as a sport he lost his amateur status. Probably most Sunday service ringers come within the same category. 'Don't ring like an amateur' is a saying frequently addressed to young ringers who have temporarily fallen from grace. The inference behind the observation is that professionalism denotes a certain grade of efficiency, a pride of craftsmanship or ability. Payment denotes a contract, and by the acceptance of the penny the individual becomes the servant of the Church.

Now there are types of professionalism in ringing which are viewed with disfavour by a number of guilds. Ringing for prize money has been condemned. In the areas of the Devon and Salisbury Guilds the opposition is definite, and in Cornwall competitions among call change ringers have been regarded with displeasure. The Salisbury Guild intervened in the matter of an Australian legacy which had as its objective the offering of prizes at ringing competitions in a Dorset town. It has been replaced by a ringers' festival, the legacy being devoted to providing a tea.

In the realm of sport the Amateur Athletic Association have laid down this definition of an amateur: 'An ama. teur is one who has never competed for a money prize or monetary consideration in any athletic sport or game . . . who has never engaged in assisting in or has taught any athletic exercise for pecuniary consideration or in any way exploited his athletic ability for profit.' Between the amateur and professional they establish a great gulf. In the history of change ringing there are probably not more than a dozen men whose livelihood has been gained from change ringing, but there are thousands who, like the writer, might be classified as being within the ranks of semi-professionals and have received some remuneration for their ringing.
This semi-professionalism in ringing fortunately causes no heartburns and raises no question of status. The fee or reward is infinitesimal when compared with what an enthusiastic ringer spends in furthering his art and in securing his maximum mcasure of enjoyment from the fellowship of ringing. There can be no qualms of censcience in taking the Church's penny. In a sense it should be regarded in the same light as the parable of the hiring in
the market place, where the reward was in accordance with a definite contract. The primary object of all guilds in affiliation with the Central Council is to ensure that Sunday by Sunday the church bells of our land shall be rung faithfully and well. By the acceptance of the humble penny a contract has been entered into, and what finer or nobler service than that of His Church!

# THE PASSING OF MR. RUPERT RICHARDSON 

Ringers in a.l parts of the country received last week with deep regret the news of the death of Mr. Rupert Richardson, at Glyn Garth, Surfleet, Linconshire. His death followed an iliness of nearly three montlis' duration. He was 64 years of age.
Rupert Richardson was born at Meanwood, Leeds, on August 21st, 1883. He came to surfleet with his parents when nine vears old, and later learnt his ringing under the Rev. H. Law James, Vicar of Surfleet. A farmer and bulb grower, his business frequently took him to Covent Garden, and he made many ringing friends in London. He took part in ringing tours throughout the country, and he was, a member of 39 assoc:ations in the British Is.es and six in Australia; these last he joined when, taking part in the famous 'Great Adventure.' On this tour he rang what he always considered to be his most important peal, one of Grandsire Cinques at Melbourne Cathedral, in which six English and six Austra.ian ringers took part.
His great work for the Lincoln Guild will long be remembered, and he was a familiar figure at meetings all over the diocese. On the death of the Rev. H. Law James he was appointed Master, which position he held until his passing. He represented the Guiid on the Central Counci: far 44 years, and had attended 34 meetings, being ab=ent on thrse nccasions only (meetings of the Council were abandoned during part of the two wars). He had served on the Standing Committee since 1936.
In 1923 he married Miss Annie Parkin, a ringer of Woodston. Peterborough, and his only child, Mrs. Enid Waymen, has also followed in her father's footsteps.

## JOHN R. SHARMAN AND CHARLIS R.

 LILLEY.Dear Sir,-As an oid Bedford ringer I was much interested to read the article about this association in 'The Itinging World' of Jall. 3 rd .

In the reference to the leading ringers I missed the names of John R. Sharman and Chas R. Liliey. J. R. Sharman, who was born oll June 9th, $18 i 6$, had learned to manage a hell before going to Bedford in 1893. He rang his first peal, 5,088 Kent Treble Bob Major, at Irthlingborough on March 31st, 1894. By the time he left Bedford in Apri', 1895, he had learned to ring Stedman, Duffie'd, Double Norwich and Superiative Surprise besides the easier methods.

When Mr. Sharman moved to Crawley, Aussex, he was fortunately able to join James Parker and his band there. On May 25th, 1895, he rang his first peal of Superiative at Cuckfield, and on Sept. 30th the same year his first of London Surprise Major at Crawiey. In 1897 he moved to London, and, joining Wiiliam, Frnest and George Pye the next year, le rang with them meny peais of Stedman, Double Norwich, Superiative, Cambridre and London Surprise. Mr. Sharman has rung about 350 peals and conducted a good number on 8,10 and 12 be..s. In 1 c22 Mr. Slarman left London, returning to his nold hume at Cogenhoe, a vilage some four miles from Northampton. Since then he has liad litt.e opportunity to ring peals.

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\section*{BOURNEMOUTH}

There are a number of notable events in the bellringers' calendar. Such reunions that take place at the Central Council meeting, the Henry Johnson commemoration dinner and the annual assembly of the Ancient Society of College Youths play a significant part in promoting that fellowship which is a characteristic of the ringing fraternity. Bournemouth ringers have ambitions; they plan to introduce as an annual event the Bournemouth Rally. The first gathering last Saturday was very enjoyable and attracted a company of 126, visitors coming from as far afield as the Midlands and South Wales. The date was not happily chosen; the Basingstoke District was holding its annual meeting the same day, and there were other annual events which drew many of the would-be patrons elsewhere.

In their initial effort Mr. Arthur V. Davis and those associated with him secured a full measure of co-operation from the Church and the civic authority. The Archdeacon of Winchester, who is shortly to be installed as Dean of Hereford, is a great friend of ringers. Before receiving archidiaconal dignity he was Vicar of St. Peter's, Bournemouth, and proved to be a stout champion of the right of the Church to use its bells. He brought to the Bournemouth rally that friendly intimacy that spelt success for the gathering and proved an ideal chairman. Other clergy were present and were equally co-operative, and there is no question that such a gathering will receive the blessing of the Church.

An ex-Mayor and Rotary president gave the civic welcome. The cultivation of an understanding between ringers and those entrusted with local government is an avenue which should not be neglected. In many of our ancient boroughs on Mayor's Sunday there is special ringing, and it is well that those in charge of civic arrangements should be informed of the fact; so much is taken for granted, that civic officials at times need to be educated is to the true place bells occupy in expressing the sentiments of the people. At Bournemouth the ringers have friends in high places-public men who are prepared to speak in defence of bells and ringing, and with such friendship a festival, particularly if its date does not clash with the main season, is welcomed.s

A dinner is not the only attraction to spell syccess for such a festival. Ringing facilities must be adequate to cope with the influx of visitors. Apart from the 12 bells at Christchurch Priory, where Mr. G. Preston has nearly
completed sixty years as a ringer, there is a ten and two eights in Bournemouth, while the surrounding countryside offers other opportunities. The stage seems admirably set for including Bournemouth in the ringers' calendar, and if the organising committee choose their dates carefully the 126 who supported the first gathering will increase materially. Bournemouth has, in addition to its ringing, other charms which have placed it in the forefront of English watering places. The visitor is always welcome, whether in town or belfry, and with such a friendly atmosphere ringers from all over the country will be associating Bournemouth in their holiday plans. 'The Ringing World' has no desire to praise one holiday resort in preference to another, but naturally commends those towns which find a special niche in their plans of welcome for the Church bellringer.

BOURNEMOUTH RALLY AND DINNER
}

\section*{Church and Civic Authority's Defence of Ringing...... Veteran Master Tells of Progress A Permanent Fixture in the Ringers' Calendar}

Bournemouth ringers and their frienda arted last Saturday what they hope will be a permanent feature in the calendar of the Exercise the Bournemouth rally and dinner. Both the Church and the civic authorities combined in their welcome, and despite the wintry aspect, so exceptionai for Bournemouth, the festival proved most elljoyable.
The Archdeacon of Winchester the Ven. Hedley R. Burrows) presided at the dinner, held in St. Peters Ha:J, which was attended by a company of 126 . Supporting him were Ald. Harry C. Brown, former Mayor of Bournemouth; Mr. George Wi.liams, Master
of the Winchester Guild; Mr. F. W. Rogers, of the Winchester Guild; Mr. F. W. Rogers, Martin Stewart, past master, Salisbury Guild; the Rev. IR. 1 . Price, Vicar of Chirist Church; and Mr. Arthur V. Davis, who was hon. secretary to the organising committee, Mrs. Davis and Mrs. Marsnailsay.
Informality was a keynote in the proceedings. After the chairman liad proposed the loyal toast, in which he referred to the great adventure of the Rnyal lamily in their journey to South Africa, he expressed the sincere remret of the Bishop of Winchester at his inability to be pracent owing to uressure of other duties. He had a word of special greeting to Mr. George Wiliams, who he said hed made a life study of their art and had given wonderful and devoted service to the craft of bellringing.
The Arolideacon commented upon the frequency with which he heard the words 'surused, and he admilted that he had heard all these expressions used in connection with bellringers.
During the war years the Archdeacon was at St. Peter's. Bournemouth, and he recalled When war broke out ringing continued for a time. Some people wrote to him and said they were 'surprised, that the bells were still being rung. Quite a number of people said a little later they were smazed' ss they thought the beils minht attract the bombs, and then from time to time he used to have anonymous rings on the telephone and voices wou'd deciare that they were 'horrified, aud occasionally the expression went so far as being 'disgusted.'
He a:ways thought that the members of the hellringers' guilds had two objects in view. One was not to disappoint the Rector and the other was not to amnoy the ne:ghbours. Those two principles they must keep firmiy in mind the whole time. As he looked back on his past oxpericonees he could honestly say that some of his happiest times had been with bellringers when as a curate learning to ring rounds at Petersfield and his friendahips aftermards. Be'lringers had never disapmointed him, and as far as annoying their neighbours -well, he had always been prepared to deal with theml (laughter).

\section*{THRETE PONNTS FOR RINGTRS.}

There were three things which he thought ringers should hear in mind and which he Whenght exnressed the truth ahout their craft. When he visited Hereford recentiy the verger He knew what he meant; one did not see it all at first g!anre. The craft of ringing was very reticent: there was a mystery about it; no one had reaily mastered it without observing the princip'e of restraint. The second was that it was a great fellowchin. and lastly it was the nnte-chamber to the throne room of worshin. The belle summoned the reople to ohurch-how hard a task it was in these days!

This rally was intended to sustain and stimu-
late the mysteries of their art to strengthen the fellowship among ringers and to make them aware and determiacd that as they prepared the people for worship they took part in that worship themscives. From the chair he thanked Arthur Davis for his courage, vision and entliusiasm in arranging the rally. He expressed his belief that the ringing guilas in this country were going under God to play great part in the conversion of England.
Ald. Harry C. Brown, past Mayor and president of the Rotary Ciub, spoke with eratitude of how he heard St. Peter's bei's in September, 1917, after being bombed on the East Coast. For 20 years he lived almost opposite the church and he loved the beils. On many occasions people had said to him, 'I do wish those beils would not ring. He had polite? quarrelled with the compiainants and rejoined,
- If you are so neurotic that you can't stick a beautiful peal of bel's for one week, I don't think I want you as a visitor and I don't think Bournemuuth wants you.' These bells signitied something they could not give, and he paid that tribute to the bellringers of St. Peter's,

STARTED CHANGE RINGING IN 1880.
Next to greet the assembly was Mr. George Wil:iams, who in to reminiscent vein recalled that he had been ringing since 12 years of age, but he did not start change ringing until 1880. When he started ringing in earnest one had to scarify the diocese to get a band for Grandsire Triples; now they could get a band
from any one tower. That was 60 years ago from any one tower. That was 60 years ago
and before the Guild was foumded in 1879. and before the Guild was founded in 1879

Mr. T. W. White brourht to the rally the good wishes of the Central Council. In a reference to "The Ringing World." he mentioned that they had had 700 new sub-cribers since the allozation of additionel paper, and they could take another 600 under present arrangements. The vigour of the Fxercise was most encouraging, particu'arly the influx of youth. The large number of voung ringers was not to be found merelv at Bnurnemouth, hut practically every guild could report similar progress.
Mr. A. F. Martin Stewart referred to the continunus support to beliringing which had been forthooming from the chairman, particularly when he was Vicar of St. Peter's. Fe thanked the incumbents for the use of bells for the ra:ly.

In a word of welcome to the risitors, Mr. Martin Stewart mentioned that the following Guilds were represented. St. Martin's Bristol. the Worcestershire and Districte, the Llandaff and Monmouth, the Bath and We'ls, Sussez County, Salishury, Fireford, Middiesex, Ozford, and Guildford. He voiced the comgratulations of the asaembly to Mr. Preston, of Christ Church Priory, who in March will celebrate 60 years as a service ringer.

The Rev. R. T. Price rssured the comprny that no thanks were due to the incumbents; it was the incumbents who should thank the ringers for carrying the voice of the Church over the trees and fields of England. At Christchurch he did not find that the people were amazed, horrified or disgusted by the bel's.

Mr. Bell (churchwarden of St. Peter's) expresced appreciation of the aplendid band at St. Peter's, ably led by Mr. Dasis. It was encouraging to ace no many young people carrying on the tradition.

\section*{FUTURE: PLANS.}

The Chairman calied on Mr. Arthur Davis for a speech. and he modestly declared that he was not the only one who had been working for the aucress of the ralif. In regard to the training of ringers, theirs was not the only tower in Bournemouth; much herd work
was done at St. John's and other local towers. Bournemouth was well provided with rimgs of bells, with a tweive, a tan, two eights, and a ten at Wimborne. As to future rallies, they hoped to arrange for them in April and looked forward to wecoming those plesollt in 1948.

Handbel ringing by Mary Davis 1-2, Bruce Rogers 3-4, Percy Braysliaw 5-6, Andrew Pearmain \(7-8\) (conductor) and Jolin Davis 9-10, all members of the St. Peter's band, was commended. This company, conducted by Mr. Arthur Davis and with the addition of Kathleen Brayshaw, piayed a number of tunes. A short entertainment by 'The Merrymakers' followed. The organising committee onnsisted of the Rev. C. A. Phillips, Mr. A. F. Martin Stewart. Mr. Arthur Davis and Mrs. F. J. Marshallsay.

The 13th Bell at St. Martin's
Dear Sir,-Doubtless you will have been inundated with letters from correspondents all claiming know'edge of the 'mysterious' 13 th bell at St. Martin's-in-the-Fie ds, an articie about which appeared in the 'Daily Mail' on January 17th. I think I should explain in advance how the article came to be printed and also how so many inaccuracies appeared.
Firsti'y. The fault, i believe, lies with the ciergy for failing to demand that ringers, the same as any other church workers, should be regular worshippers. The amswer, of course, is, : Very few bells would be rung ' if this cond:tion was imposed. Who would be the losers? Then one told us that even if he could find someone to take us up, we wouid have to wa:t a long time, as it was nearly lunch time. We were very disappointed and gave it up as a bad job.
Sir, we spent over an hour wasting our time with the Abbey officials, a:l of whom were quite offended, it seemed, at our wishing to see the belfry. After all, we only wanted to see the belfry, and uot to ring a peal.
Is it right that these officia:s should show thousands round their own part of the Abbeythe part that is interesting to ordinary people -and yet be so siow to piease two innocent fads who wished to see something that interested them? Why is it that this beifry is so guarded? Have they no peal boards to display?
I need hardly add that, after lunch, when we went to St. Paul's Cathedral, we made, after very careful consultation and reflection, one tentative remark es to whether we might see the be'fry. Wlien to'd by a simiar olucial that he did not think so, we very quickly told him that it did not matter and left him, intending that our previous experience at the Abbey should not be repeated.- Yours, etc,

\section*{THREE PEALS NOT COUNTED}

On the assumption that the peal published in this issue is the last to be recorded for 1946, there were 1,797 peals rung during the year, which includes 240 on handbells. This is a substantial advance on 1945, when the number was 1,304 , with 173 in hand. Peal ringing has now reached a state almost equal to that in pre-war yearsin rosy years the number exceeded 2,000 . The expanding number of peals creates a problem for the Editor; arrears so far have been dealt with by the occasional 16 page issue we are allowed, but if the same ratio of progress is forthcoming in 1947, then editorial ingenuity will have to be employed to provide accommodation. This peal ringing is a healthy sign, and denotes a pleasing vigour among a number of associations.

Three of the peals published in 'The Ringing World' have not been counted by the Peals Analysis Committee in their total for 1946. The committee's recommendation in this case requires the ratification of the Central Council, and it is probable that this will be challenged. The first exception relates to a peal rung at Norton, Stoke-on-Trent, on September 28th, for the North Staffordshire Association. This peal of Minor in seven methods was rung with a non-ringing conductor, and in the opinion of the committee it is not in accordance with the following decision of the Council: "That no other person than those ringing in the peal shall take part in the calling or in rectifying an error.'

The second exception of the committee was respecting a peal of Minor in three methods (Oxford, Kent and Plain Bob) rung at Sefton, Liverpool, for the Lancashire Association with the tenor covering. The wording of the decision reads: 'The Council has declared its mind as follows: On six bells. That peals of Minor consist of at least seven true and complete 720's, the bells striking round only once at the end of each and immediately going into the next.' No mention is made in this decision of a covering bell, and as covering bells are specifically mentioned in regard to peals of seven, nine and eleven bells, the committee are not recommending this peal.

The final exception is in regard to a peal of Kent Treble Bob Major at Basingstoke, on October 12th. Here, again, rejection has been argued on omission and not on a definite negative. The decision states: 'On eight, ten or twelve bells. That there be no less than 5,000 true changes rung without interval.' This is unquestionably a matter for argument. The Peals Analysis Committee
recognise that the law of England is built up on precedent, and when applied to bellringing the traditional procedure does give a lead. No rule or law exists on which some clever person might not devise some means of circumventing what is in view. In order that the Exercise at large can take a considered opinion of the points at issue, the Peals Analysis Committee have wisely lost no time in making known their recommendations.

Linton, Kent, is the seventh tower in which Mr. Thomas F. Sone has 'completed the circle' as a conductor, the peal being called on Jan. 18th. Now then, 'circie specialists,' who has more towers to his credit?

To the Editor's collection of ringing cartoons has been added that which appeared in 'The Bu:letin and Scots Pictorial on December 30th. It depicts the haggard steeplekeeper oiling his bells and muttering, 'Crazy, that s what they are, plain crazy. Nae whisky, nae meat, nae coal, nae nothing. And yet they want the bells rung.'

tower and is of exquisite craftsmanship by Mr. M. Wilson, an artist of repute. The let toring is based on 10 th century. MSS, re garded as the finest period of Eng ish writing. The dedication of this record of peals took plane last Saturday in the presence of some 100 members of the Association. The service
was of a three-fold purpose, other features being an act of conmemoration to those ringers of the Middlesex Association who gave their lives during the war and to the children of Acton who lost their lives during air raids. The seven peais recorded are as follows Oct. 28th, 1944, Bob Major rung half-muffed in memory of Arclibishop Temple; on Dec. 30th, 1944, Kent Treble Bob Major, an act of thanksyiving for seven centuries of Christian worship at \({ }^{\text {St. Mary's. Acton; March 17th, }}\) 1945, Spliced Surprise Major, an act of praise, April 21st, 1945, Grandsire Triples for the enthronement of Geof rey Fisher as Archbishop of Canterbury; May 8th, 1945, Grandsire Tripies, to commemorate the conclusion of the war with Germany; Aug. 29th, 1945, Stedman Triples, canclusion of the war in the Far East Oct. 24 th, 1945, Stedman Triples in memory of the chi.dren of Acton who lost their lives in air raids.
Of special interest to the ringers was the message read during the service by the Rector from the Bishop of London. It stated

I hear that you are shortly to unveil a necord of the changes rung by the Diocesan and Middlesex ringers. I should be grateful if you would kindly let them know how much I appreciate the work they have done. I understand that the record included peals rung on the occasion of the death of the late Aruhbishop and on the enthronement of the present Archbishop. I am sure that
we are all glad of the honour done to the presiding Prelate of our Church in this province. I should like to thank the ringers for their keenness, not only in my own name, but in that of the diocese
The lesson was read by Mr. E. C. S. Turner, general secretary of the association. Two carols appropriate to ringing, 'Ding Dong'
and ' Bell Cerol,' were sung by the choir, and touch of Bob' Major was rung on handbells by W. G. Wilson 1-2, E. C. S. Turner 34, \({ }_{78}\) Eric E. Dench \(5-6\), Frederick W. Gondfellow 78.

Preb. W. P. Cole Sheane, president of the ascociation, following the unveiling of the record of peals, read the names of those members of the Middlesex Association who lost their lives in the war. THE MINISTRY of bELLRINGING.
The dedication of the record was by Canon Lennard Hodgson. D.D., Regius Professor of Dlvinity, Christ Church, Oxford who also gave the address. Belringing, he said, was the one
form of music that directly and clearly sonke to them of God above everything else. There were so many kinds of music- military musse
that made them think of war, dance music and
that of other different associations-but the one thing that the ringing of bells spoke to them of was the truth of God, invoiving theur in loyalty to Him. The beils reminded them of God's love and care.
Whether they were in the country and heard bells coming across the fields or in the cities where above the clangour of traffic they still heard the belis, their message reminded them of the underiying truth of the wowing care of God, who was constant.y seeking to inspire them. Let them thank God for the ministry of bellringing and as they dedicated this re cord of their work dedicate themseives in two ways - to remember Him with gratitude, thanksgiving and hope and with the certain knowledge that those they were commemorating were in His keeping, and, secondly, to dedicate themselves with devotion to Him and His Kingdom.
Tea was served in the vestry to visiting ringers by ladies of the congregation. At the canclusion there was an unexpected tribute paid to Mr. J. E. Lewis Cockey, hon. secretary of S. and W. District, Middlesez Association who had assisted in arranging for the serrice. The Rector presented him with the original cartoon of Mr. Cockey, which appeared in the current issue of 'The Acton Gazette,' silbouetted against a background formed by a drawing of St. Mary's tower.
Expressions of thanks were to Dr. Hodgson, yoiced by Mr. E. C. S. Turner, and to the Rector and iadies of the congregation by Mr . A. W. Coles.

Some time back I remember two ten-year-ald boys taking part in peals, to wit, A. R. Price's youngest boy and Cecil Pipe's son, both wellknown ringers. Natura!!y I am proud of the young ones that I heve hed the pleasure of teaching, and with my youngest yet, Mary \(\mathbf{R}\). Jaycock, Burnham, becoming the youngest girl to ring a peal of Major, I am more than satisfied (particularly as one member in the peal said she rang like a seasoned veteran).
The youngest girl (a pupil of mine) to ring a peal was Nancy Denyer, who on December 14th, 1923 , rang a peal of Bob Major at the age of 13 at Aldershot. This as a peal of Major stood until October 31st, 1946, when within seven deys of her 13th birthday Mavis Whitchead rang a peal of Bob Major at Kibworth. 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The Popularity of Bells
Evidence of the affection with which Church bells are held by the public reached us from an unexpected source last week. The B.B.C. have a Listeners' Research Department which makes exhaustive enquiries as to the tastes and desires of the public in regard to their wireless programme. Subject of a special enquiry was the Christmas Day broadcast, and the following, ascertained from that cross-section of the public so frequently referred to as the 'Man in the Street,' is indeed a high compliment to bells.

Of the listening community who replied to the questionnaire, the King's speech was placed first with 58 per cent.; second was the Christmas bells, with 30 per cent.; and then followed 1 p.m. News, 21 ; Kentucky Minstrels, 15 ; Carols, 11 ; 8 a.m. News, 10 ; B.B.C. Symphony at 11 a.m., 3 per cent. It might well be argued that circumstances are special on Christmas Day, but the high percentage of listeners who enjoyed the ringing broadcasts denotes that the music of the bells still commands the attention of the public.

In the light of these figures it might be assumed that the recording of bells will be more frequent. The time has arrived when a closer understanding should be reached between the officials of the different Regions of the B.B.C. and the Central Council of Church Bellringers. A statement was made at the Norwich Council meeting of preliminary negotiations and discussions in one Region. At the present time selection seems rather an haphazard affair, although the B.B.C. on their part have precautionary tests of the recordings. According to information which reached this office two towers were selected last Christmas: East Hagbourne, North Berks, for the overseas listeners, and Allesley Parish Church, Warwickshire, which was heard on the Midland Regional on Christmas Eve and Christmas Day. Both these towers contributed to the programme what might be called typical village bells and did well.

Ringers take a legitimate pride when their own bells are broadcast; in the case of the writer's own tower meticulous care was observed to ensure good striking. What the Exercise is anxious about is that the standard of ringing is good and that the towers selected are musical rings. The vast network of information available to the Central Council would readily be placed at the disposal of the B.B.C. if an appropriate liaison was established. The Exercise is proud of the bells of these isles; the people of this land have been accustomed to

Church bells and, as the B.B.C. questionnaire shows, they are still listened to with affection.

In the ranks of radio listeners are to be found hundreds of ringers, as letters to the Editor have indicated. We would specially ask conductors when they have given a recording or are to appear in a programme to let the Editor know as early as possible. We are only too anxious to give publicity to such occasions; they should be recorded in 'The Ringing World,' and readers should be given an opportunity of listening-in to these broadcasts, which are almost of 100 per cent. interest to the Exercise. To the technical ear of the ringer there are a number of finer points about such broadcasts which would be missed by the average listener. There is not a broadcast of bells which does not bring back memories to some ringer, and among many peal ringers the knowledge of bells is unique. If discussions take place between the Council and the B.B.C. on ringing generally, we trust that this question of advanced publicity of bells will be raised. Some of the best broadcasts of bells have been incorporated in the overseas programme, and to our knowledge there are many of our readers who desire information as to wavelengths of such events.

Lastly, ringers as a body are grateful to the B.B.C. for the outstanding honour conferred on the Exercise when Bow bells were selected for the interval signal. While perhaps to the Cockney these bells have a special appeal, nevertheless the country has grown accustomed to the rhythmic beauty of this recording. It is the sincere hope that such a sound signal which is traditionally English will be maintained. Many have found courage and inspiration in the hallowed message of Bow bells apart from the legendary association with Dick Whittington.

Although this Guild in its present form oniy dates back to 1924, it is a continuation of the Raunds. Wellingborough and District Society, which was formed at Raunds on July 5th, 1883, by the Vicar of Raunds, the Rev. Hugh Bryen, who became the first secretary. By the end of that year 63 members were on the books. The society grew steadily and change ringing and some peal ringing became well established.
On his retirement in 1892, the Rev. Hugh Bryan was presented with an inscribed copy of North's "Bells of Northamptomshire.' About ten years ago the Guild secretary recovered this book from a firm of dealers in secondhand books and presented it to the Guild to be in the hands of the Guild secretary and loaned to members.

In 1895 the title of the society was changed to "The Central Northamptonshire Association,' and that year at the annuel meeting a discussion took place on the advisabiiity of forming a Diocesan Association, but it was thought that matters were not ripe for this at the time. This society was spit into three districts in 1905.

GOLD MEDALS FOR 100 PEALS.
One rule of he early days was that 'all members who ring 100 pea's for the essociation shall receive a gold medal.' From the reports, those who received these medals were Messes. J. B. Houghton, J. Garrett, W. Perkins, A. Y. Tyier W. V. Newman, T. R. Hensher, W. Hensher, J. B. Martin, A. H. Martin, F. Wilford, F. W. Sawfoot, D. J. Nichols and E. J. Chapman. In 1914 this was discontinued and a new ruie passed that a certificate, which bore a photograph of Peterborough Cathedral, be awarded to all members ringing their first peal on a working bell. This is still in force.
By 1923 there were five districts. and as the outcome of a meeting at Wellingborough,


ST. MARY'S CHURCH, RAUNDS
Where the old Association was formed on July 5th, 1883
addressed by the Bishop of Peterborough, it was decided to form a Diocesan Guid for the whoce of the diocese which covers the countres of Northamptonshire and Rutiand. This was formed at Wellingborough on January 5th, 1924, with the addition of Oundle and District Society and also the Peterborough and District Society.

The chief officers elected were the uresident, the Dean of Peterborough, Master, Mr. F. Wifford, and general secretary, Mr. D. J. Nichols. Mr. Nichols had doue most of the routine work and the organising which made the formation of the Guild possible. There were now 81 towers in union, seven uranches and over 600 members. In 1925 Daventry Branch was formed, and in 1930 the Towcester and District Society joined as the Towcester Branch of the Guid.

Eariy in 1926, Mr. Nichols, who had been in poor health for some time, had to resig? his office. Mr. R. G. Biack, the Kettering Branch secretary, was elected to succeed him. He still holds the office, combined with that of gui'd treasurer, and is the only official of the Guild to have held office contimuous.y since its formation. Mr. Nichols died in 1928 at the early age of 48 . He had rung about 130 peals, ail of them for tho local association or guild He was the leader of Kettering band for several years and conducted pea's by the local band in all the standard methods, and Cambridge, Superlative and London Surprise Major.

Rutland Branch was formed in 1933, the mpmbership of the Guild in that year being 98 honorary and 843 ringing members. Mr. Wilford resigned the Mastership in 1935 and the Rev. E. S. Powell was e.ected to the office. Mr. Wilford died in 1936. He had been a representative on the Central Council for over 30 years and attended every meeting until prevented by his illneas, from which he did not recover.

The Guild weathered the war years well, and were ably guided during this difficult time by the Rev. E. S. Powe.l, the Master. The latter recently resigned the living of Staverton and on retirement has left the diocese In 1944 there were 145 members in H.M. Forces, which is a high percentage. In 1945, 112 new members were elected, mostly young peonle of both sexes.
The late Mr. A. H. Martin, of Higham Ferrers who died in 1941, was believed to be the last ringing member who had attended the 1883 meeting and had a continuous membership. In 1043 the Von. C. J. Grimes, Archdeacon of Northampton, was electad irecident. The general secretaries since 1883 were the Rev. F. Brvan to 1892 . Mr. F.. T. The Relfry Repairs Fund was formed in 1017 from collections at services, and in 1933. Whem the Guild was ten vears o!d. the sum of 1 PP9 had heen collected and grants had been made of \(£ 126\) to various towers for rectorations and augmentations. The Belfry Restoration Fund is still flurishing and at the end of last year was worth over £2n9.

\section*{PEALS IN NORTHANTS}

The eariest known peals in Northants are the two peals of Grandsire Triples rung at Kettering in 1729 and 1731 and which are recorded on the ancient peal boards still in that tower. The first peal of Major was a peal of Bob Major at St. Peter's, Northampton, by the College Youths in 1739, and was conducted by Benjamin Annable, who rang the seventh. This peal is No. 45 in the College Youths records.

Pea's rung from 1883 to 1893 were Minor, Grandsire and Plain Bob Triples and Bob

Major; Treb:e Bob in 1894 ; Double Norwich in 1896; Stedman Triples in 1897; Superlative 1897; Real Double Norwich 1898: Grandsire Caters 1898. In 1900 Mr . A Y. Tyler conducted 9,312 of Superlative at Irthlingborough; Stedman Caters in 1901 and Treble Ten 1903, at St. Giles', Northempton, Lundon in 1903, Cambridge in 1905, Bristo: 1912, Cambridge Royal 1922, and a peal of Minor, 1922, by six ladies, this being the first time a band of ladies had rung a peal with the tenor 'turned in.' Erin Triples were rung in 1922, and Surprise Minor 1922. The total of peals up to the and of 1923 was 986.

The peals rung from 1924 to 1945 totalled 722, and Mr. H. M. Day conducted several of Surprise Minur up to 32 methods. The Irthlingborough band, who rang the first of Surprise Major, Superiative. Cambridge, London and Bristol, have a'so rung Irthlingborough and Irchester Surprise (the first in the methods) and Yorkshire Surprise Major.

\section*{HANDBELL RINGING.}

One peal in hand was rung at Irth'ing borough in 1905, being 5,056 Bob Major, cooducted by A. Y. Tyler. In 1910 the Kettering band, assisted by Mr. E. M. Atkins, rang Grandsire Triples and Bob Major. Bob Royal was rung in 1911, Grandsire Caters in 1912, also Kent Treble Bob and Little Bob Major. In 1914 Kent Treble Bob Royal and in 1921 a pea: of Double Norwich Court Boh Major This band in the period 1910 to 3921 rang about 40 peais in hand.

According to North, 1878, there were them nine rings of eight bel's, 43 of six bells and 105 of five bells in Northants. In 1938 the numbers were two rings of tem. 26 of elght, 74 of six and 97 rings of five. The uldest dated bell is the second at Cold Ashby and is dated 1317.

\section*{75th ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATED.}

The 75th anniversary of the foundation of the Oxford University Society of Change Ringers was celebrated in Oxford during the first week-end of February. The ringing programme was a full one, though there were no tower-boll peals. A proposed attempt for Stedman Cinques by the society at Christ Church had to be cancelled owing to several lastminute withdrawa.s. Handbell peal attempts began on the afternoon of Friday, January 31st, but unfortunately met with no success. On Sunday afternoon, however, the society rang the first peal of Winchester Bob Major on handbells.
Official procedings commenced on the morning of Saturday, February 19t. with ringing at st. Ebbe's (8) from 9.45 to 10.45. The society's festivel service, conducted by the president of the society (the Rev. C. F. Wigg), then followed at the University Church of St. Mary the Virgin. The preacher was the Lord Bishop of Oxford. His useful and inspiring address was based on the text, 1 have a message from God unto thee ' (Judges iii. 20), and unce again the reminder was given that absence from divine service was a negation of the message ringers were called to deliver.
Ringing in the afternoon took place at the (Rathedra! (12). St. Giles' (8) and at Magdalen (10), and following an informal tea in the New Room, Magdai:en, this part of the day's procoedings ended with an enjoyable hour's ring on the magnificent heavy eight at Merton.

\section*{THE DINNER}

Sixty-six persons sat down to dinner at the Handolph Hotel, where the soriety was pleased to wolcome as the guest of honour Mr. E. H. Lewis, president of the Central Council. The other guests were Miss M. R. Cross and Messrs. W. F. Judge, V. J. Bennett and W. C. Porter, of the Oxford Society, and the visitors were Messrs. R F. B. Speed, P. K. Williamson, O. W. Woolley and Dr. F. S. Poole, 1 epresenting the Cambridge University Guild Miss B. Podger and Mr. G. T. Beynon from the Bristol Unversity Society, Messrs. P. M. J. Gray and D. Layton from the London University Society, Mrs. C. E. Wigg and Mr. P. A. Corby. Before the dinner a photograph of all present was taken, and immediately afterwards three leads of Oxford Treble Bob Maximus were rung by resident members of the society.
After the loyal toast, the toast of the society was proposed br Dr. J. E. Spice, who noted with pleasure the presence of two other Dast masters, Messrs. H. Miles and A. E. F. Trotman. In sketching the history of the society since ito foundation in 1872, Dr. Spice naturally had most to say of the period 1939-45 when he had been in residence, a period chiefly remarkabie for the achievements of the society on handbells, and for the growth of the society to its present scale-a growth pncouraged by the enthusiasm of lady members.
In replying to the toast, the present Master, Miss B. Spice, briefly reviewed the events of She past year. Notable inceptions had been the short tour heid at Rochester in August, 1946, and the farming-cum-ringing fortnight emjoyed by present members at Honeybourne. Worcs., in the late summer. The present academic year had brought an unprecedented fow of recruits-as witnessed by the fact that th of those present at the dinner were resाdent members of the societr-and, in addition to the hard work spent in teaching them, time and heen found in the Michaelmas term for The ringing of nine poals, a record number for one term.

THE GUFSTS.
The President then welcomed the puests and visitors. He regretted the absence of several old members, notabis of Canon Coieridme, from whom a telegram of good wishes was read, and of the Rev. F. Layton expressed the sincere gratitude of the new University Societies to the O.U.S.C.R. for its hospitality on these oocasions, and for the help and encouragement it had given, not only in providing new opportunities for ringing, but a.so in enlarging the friendship among ringers, ENGAGED COUPLES.

\section*{CELERRATIONS}

The main feature at the amual meeting of the Society of Royal Cumberiand Youtlis, held on February 1st in accordance with tradition at St. Martin-in-the-Fields, was plans for the appropriate celebration of the bicentenary of the society. There is to be a dinner on July 12th and it is aiso hoped to hold a commemorative service.

\section*{NEW MEMBERS RECORD.}

Mr. G. W. Steere (hon. secretery) presented the balance sheet, which showed a balance of 848 8s. 4 d . against \(£ 36\) 11s. 9d. at the beginning of the year
The annual report stated that the year could be considered a period of steady progress. Thirty-six new members had been elected, a number not approgched during the last halfcentury, as on only two occasions had the figure reached 30. Mr. Frank C. W. Knight was in no small measure responsible for the large increase.

In this respect thanks were due to Mr . C. J. Mathews, who secured the services of a capable artist to do the work.

The report and accounts were adopted and Mr. C. J. Matthews was thanked for his kind office in alranging for printing the report.

\section*{Vancouver Ringer's Distinction}

Dear Sir,-I am writing this thanking you for giving us in Vancouver, B.C., so wuch space and notice in the front page, etc., of 'The Ringing Worid.' But in the issue of December 20 th, 1946, there is a mistake about my ringing a peal at Macciesifield and other paces in England. Those peals shou'd be credited to Mr. Andy 13. Lomas, who is now ringing at Christ Church Cathedr'al in Victoria, V.T., B.C. I, of course, rang at the Coronation of King George \(V\). here at Vancouver, being the first peal ever rung in Canada.

I have never rung a peal in England. I learned on the bel's I installed here; perhaps I have the distinction of instaling a peal in a tower, learning to ring on them and ringing on them the first peal in the country. Whilst visiting in England in 1912 I raug at Old Windsor, some of the ringers \(I\) remember being J. L. McDona:d, the late J. H. B. Hesse A. H. Pulling and other weli-known peal ringers. But I cou'd not call it a peal, as there was an awful mix up about half-wav; in fact, there were several rounds of good firing and I was astonished later to see it recorded as a peal in 'The Ringing World' on my arrival back here.

Our peal we rang here on July 1st, 1911, was, I can honestly say, perfect as to being a true peal, not a bell being out of pace and the striking good throughout. Some 85 or 90 years ago a peal was rung in the tower of Christ Church, Philadelphia, Penn., U.S.A., and recorded in that tower as rung by nine men, the tenor man having to give up and was relieved by another. Thereiore, I think we in Vancouver can say we have rung the first peal of Grandsire Triples rung by eight men on the American continent.-Yours very trulv,

\section*{London Vergers}

A WILTSHIRE RINGER'S EXPERIENCE.
Sir,-I feel I would like to express my views concerning the above as referred to by \(\mathbf{M r}\). Appleton in the last issue of "The Ringing Wor.d.' Doubtless, he and his friend were disappointed for not being permitted to visit the belfry at their first verbal request to a verger.

But why blame the verger?
To avoid a simiar disappointment in future, Mr. Appleton wouid do better if lie followed the procedure I have during the past few years in which I have raised and taught a new baud of ringers at our church, either tor ringing or inspecting some notable peal.

I make my plans beforehand, then write to the incumbents requesting permission for the visit. I a.ways evelose a stamped and addressed envelope for a repiy. I do the latter because some of us ringers are better off financialiy than some clergy whose stipends have not been increased with the cost of living. I do not approve of them paying even the cost of a postage stamp to provide us with the pleasures of an outing. During last year I sent out 14 such applications and received favourable replies from them all.

During May I took the band to London after having requested permission to visit Messrs. Mears and Stainbank's foundry. I received a favourable rep!s from Mr. Hughes, who provided us with a most interesting hour. This was on a Saturday, and he was the only member of the staff we saw there. We were very much impressed, as it did appear to us that he had turned up specifically to oblige us. This is only one instance of the fruits of making the arrangements beforehand.

Regarding the places we visited on the same trip where we had no intentions of tirst visiting and did not make the arrangements. We went on to St. Paul's and enjoyed a good look mund. Suddenly I met a verger, and after some conversation I asked him if we cou'd see the bells. He was very polite and told me that we could not. He added that I should have written to the Dean beforchand. accepted this and informed the band, but this verger was not satisfied, probably because I had mentioned to him previousiy that we had travelied a hundred miles that day to London. He took me to the Dean's verger, who again told me that such visits were at the discretion of the Dean only, but under the circumstances he took it upon himself to grant the request.
The first verger we met trook us up the famous Wren's sturway to the ringing chamber, then on to the bell champer, from uhich place we had a good view of the famous dnme, also an interesting talk on its structure. Then one to the clock, Great Peter and the clock beils. Returning again to the nave, the verger expressed his regrets that he enuld not show us the crypt. Another hour well spent. Could anvone wish for more courtesy than this?

Next we visited St. Martin's-in-the-Fie'ds, where a congregation had assembled for a service which was about to commence. I asked the verger there about seeing the hells, but he informed me that during the service he was to remain present, but would gladly take us up the tower afterwards, but being as we were strangers to him, he would not allow us to ascend without him. I commend him for such a decision. Time did not permit us to accent his kind offer.

I have no desire to auestion what is renuired of these vergers at their work. As a ringer, it is not my business. I look upon them as paid servants, and as such thev have a duty to perform. Providing they satisfy their emplovers. I see no reason why ringers should rebuke them for not doing certain favours.

I have always found them obiging and courteous, but our chief interest, or that of a (Continued in next column.)

\section*{The 'Houseling' and the Passing Bells' \\ BY ERNEST MORRLS}

In the Middle Ages, when a man feil grievously sick, the priest with bell, book and candle proceeded to the sick bed, lest he shouid die
unhouseli'd, disappointed, unanneal'd.' The 'houseling ' bell, which is sometimes mentioned in the Edwardian Inventories, was a handbell carried in procession and rung when the Euoharist was borne io the sick person, that all might be werned of its approach and pay reverence, and might pray for the sick and dying person. In 1305 Archbishop Winchelsey issued a statute which, broadly speaking, remained in force until the Reformation, ordering parishes to provide certain vestments, ohbices, etc., and emong various items we find a bell to ring when the Body of Christ is carried to the sick.' In an Inventory of 1488 at St. Christopher-leStock, London, there is mentioned a ' oloth of gold . . . that serveth to bere over the Sacrament, with iiij bellis longyng thereto:' The parish of St. Michael, Cornhill, in 1469 purchased a little beil that ryngeth afore the secrament.' Among the jewels belonging to 'owre Lady Churche' at Sandwich in 1483 was a bell of sylver to be boryn with the Sacrement of IX ounces \(j\) quarter.' This bell was sometimes called the 'Housel.ing-be.' ' as at Great Gonerby, Lines, in 1506, or a 'hossellbell ' as at Ilkeston.
Its use is referred to and condemned by Cranmer in his Visitation Articles (1549):'Item. That going to the sick with the Sacrament the minister have not with him either Light or Bells.' These handbells were also used in processions on the Rogation days, and notices of them as used for that purpose and similar are occasionally met with: at Addington, Surrey, in 1552 they possessed 'a Procession bell' and at Wattenbury were 'ij procession bells.' The Injunctions of Archbishop Grindal in 1571, whilst directing ' perambulation to be used by the people for viewing the bounds of their parish in the days of Rogation commonly called cross-week or Gangdays,' prohibit the wearing of the surplice by the minister, or the carrying of banners or handbells.

Naogeorgus in his ' Popigh Kingdome ' \({ }^{1570}\) refers to the custom thus :-

Saint John before the bread doth go, and poynting towards him
Doth shew the same to the Lambe that takes away our sinne.
On whome two ciad in Angels shape, do sundrie flowers fling,
A number great of Sacring belled with pleasant sounde doe ringe.'
An inscription sometimes found on bells, as in Dorset and Somerset:-

1 sound to bid the sick repent
In hope and life when breath is spent." may be regerded as having reference to this period of man's career. Then comes the next stage in the sick man's pi.grimage on earth, the tolling of one of the churoh bells called the ' Passing Bell,' or sometimes the 'Soul Bell.'
'Toll the bell a solemn toll; Slow and solemn let it be;
Cry for the departing soul,
The ringing of the passing-bell, whioh is peculiar to England, is one of the earliest recorded uses to which the church bell was put in this country. The Venerab.e Bede, in reating the circumstances of the death of St. Hilda of Stranaeshalch (Whithy) in the yeer 680 says:-

This nun on a sudden heard the wellknown sound of a bell in the air, which used to awake and call them to orayera when any one of them was taken out of this world.
Among the many objections of the Brownists, it is land to the charge of the Church of England that though we deny the doctrine of Purgatory and teach the contrary, yet how well our practice suits with it may be corsidered in our ringing of hailowed bells for the soul. 'We call them,' says Bishop Hall, 'soul-bells, for that they signify the departure of the sou!, not for that they help the nassage of the soul.' The word 'passing' as here used signifies clearly the same as 'departing,' i.e., passing from life to death. So that even from the name we may gather that it was the intention in tolling a passing-bell to pray for the person dying, and who was not dead. The following clause in the 'Advertisemente for due Order' in the 7th year of Queen Elizabeth is much to our purvose:-

Item. that when anve Christian bodie is in passing, that the bell be tollen, and that the Curate be speciallie called for to comforte the sicke person: and after the time of his passinge to ringe no more but one shorte peale and one before the buriall, and another short peall before the burialle.

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\section*{THE BLIZZARD}

For 36 years 'The Ringing World' has maintained a continuous publication. The break that occurred after our last issue was unexpected. For the first time in history a nation-wide stoppage of an important section of the Press was ordered. The Trade and Periodical Press was one of the sacrifices insisted upon by the Government in its endeavours to conserve fuel. Testimony is not lacking as to the severity of the blizzard that has swept the country and disrupted communications by land and sea. We trust that the electricity not required for the production of this journal was used to bring warmth and comfort to some families and that the surrender has not been in vain. The first Sunday after the imposition of the ban had that famous epistle of St. Paul's in which he defines charity or, as the word was intended to be used, love. It was not the reference to 'tinkling cymbals, that appealed to the writer, but rather 'though I bestow all my goods to feed the poor and have not charity, it profiteth me nothing.' And so we trust that the sacrifice the Exercise has made has been acrompanied by the greatest of those three virtues-charity.
In this issue is compressed three weeks' news. The most striking thing the pages of this journal show is the undimmed enthusiasm of ringers in almost every part of the country to carry on. Climatic conditions were not interpreted as cancellations; meetings were held and programmes carried through. Perhaps the most outstanding example of this 'Excelsior' spirit overcoming snow and ice comes from Pocklington, Yorkshire. All the roads into the village in the Beverley district were blocked with snow; the only approach was by train; nevertheless 30 members attended and were greeted with the sight of rescue teams of the R.A.F. going out on their errands of mercy to bring relief to snow-bound villages.
Naturally the veterans who remember the severity of the winter of \(188_{4-5}\) were unimpressed by conditions that have prevailed during February. One member of 80 in the Oxford Diocesan Guild area walked two miles on the slippery roads from the nearest bus halt to attend a meeting at Chieveley. Kent will play second fiddle to no other part of England. Accordingly, Mr. F. J. Lambert, sen., for his 8oth birthday on February 21 st, left his own village of Horsmonden to go to Benenden and successfully. rang his 250 th peal! There is nothing anamic about such forbears who show the pertinacity of the English ringers.

Another county apt to suffer from being snowbound is Derbyshire, especially in the Peak District. Three lady members were among those who made the journey to Newhall-Arctic Newhall. Our suffering correspondent described the occasion. On the journey home the drifting snow dislocated the bus service, and the three membens experienced the greatest difficulty in trudging through the deep snow for the last two miles. The great thing, however, behind these past three weeks is that the bells of the British Isles have been rung proclaiming the message of the Church to her people.

\section*{Continued Prosperity of St. Martin's Guild ...... Mr. Albert Walker's Fifty Years' Membership ...... Bishor of Birmingham Foresees Deeper Religious Understanding}

The 'Henry Johnson' Commemonation Duwer still holds its unique position among the ringing festivals. There was a full attendance for the 59th commenoration dinner at Birmingham on Saturday to do honour not only to the memory of that great ringer of the last century, but to congratulate the present chairman, Mr. Albert Welker, who this year has completed 50 years of conspicuous service to St. Martin's Guild. 'He has all the characteristics that mark a reanly good citizen and a good Christian,' was the happy phase Canon T. Guy Rogers paid to the genal chairman.
supporting him were the Bishop of Birmingham, Canon Blofeld (Vicar of Edgbaston), the Rev. J. S. Bilings (Vicar of Shrley), Canon Rogers, the Rev. F. G. G. Warman (Vicar of A-ton), Cclr. A. Paddon Smith (Master of the St. Martin's Society), Mr. G. E. Fearn (Ringing Master) and Mr. T. H. Reeves (hon. secretary and treasurer).
Among the many visitors were Messrs. H. Kinght (secretary, Society for the Archdeaconry of Stafford), F. Pervin (Master, Coventry Diecesan Guild), F. Skidmore (Bristol), W. H. Viggers and C. W. Denyer (Aldershot), A. V. Davis and Mrs. Marshallsay (Rournemouth), Capt. E. F. M. Samson (Leicester Guild), C. H. Kippin (Southampton), F. E. Collins (Croydon), W. F. Judge, W. C. Porter and Miss M. R. Cross (Oxford), D. C. Mears (Hitchin), H. Middleton and J. Hemming (Evesham), J. F. Smaliwood (Lon don), J. Freeman, R. S. B. Croft, J. L. Millhouse, Miss M. Lyon, Mrs Richardson, Mrs. Fiavman, C. Mcfuuinness (Lincoln Diocesan Guild), J. E. Cawser (Rotherham) and Stafford Green.
Apologies were received from the Lord Yayor the Provost, Canon Maskell, the Rex. A. E. Fraser, Messrs. S. F. Palmer, C. Dean, K. C. Dowding. (ill with gastritis and first diuner he had missed for 25 years), J. George, J. H. Shepherd, J. W. Jones (Newport), J. P. Fidler and R. Bragg.
Proposing the toast of 'Church and State,' Mr. E. O. Shepherd said to-day the State profesced a great interest in the religious education of the children and no one could dispute it importance as they had a generation of children growing up who accepted the materialistic state of things as the natural course of life. As headmaster of a school of 400 children, the State required of him to produce a syllabus of religious eduration, but anless the individual teachers taught that Frlabus as an inspired subject, there would no religious instruction. He submitted a special plea that their teachers in tireir training colleges be given the help and encouragement to teach that subject, and it was a matter in which the Church could help the State.
The Lord Bishop of Birmingham, in reply, aif it was difficu't to imagine an occasion in which Church and State was not nore osturally linked tomether than that. They carried the name of St. Martin's Church in their title, and that church, he supposed, stood ior more than anv other huilding in Birmingham. The first reference to their city wa= emont 1520 or 1530 . but St. Martin's Church rent hack to the 13 th century and it also had distinet trares of Norman wortr.
CHVRCHPS NOT MONUMFNTS OF THE PAST.
There were nessimists whe suggested that religion was decaving and the State was becoming increasingly secular and thev must losk forward to the time when their churches Ti io far as they existed were interesting samuments of a past that was slipping away.

50 Happy Years With St. Martin's.
- I personally do not accept that prophecy of the future,' said the Bishop. 'At times there will be friction between Church and State when one seems in importance to outweigh the other, but during the centuries there has been a singular continuity, and I can quite imagine a century hence when the present turmoil and rapid intelligent advance has ceased that man will turn once again to reformulate Christian belief and nealise how profoundly important it is for the well-being of this land.

We are iikely to have many difficult times ahead, but as I see the situation a deeper religious understanding will arise. In the first half of the 18 th century did not Wesley and his followers try to overcome social disorder by the message they carried through England, and did not they succeed marvellously in raising their own religions standard as they sought to raise man to understand the Gospel of Christ ? Iret us, therefore, look confidently to the future of Church and State continuing in happy essociation as in the past.

The memory of the late Henry Johnson was submitted by the Chairman, who said that he had not the advantage of many who hed presided at those gatherings of knowing Honry Johnson in the flesh. Henry Johnson was barin 138 vears ago at Lichfie!d and moved to Birmingham when he was about four or five vears of age. At the age of 17 he started his ringing career. There was a man named Roberts, a change ringer at Astom, who taught Johnson to hendle a bell. He progressed rapidly and conducted his first peal when he was 21.

\section*{ASSOCIATINN WTTH FAMOUS \\ COMPOSERS}

In 1833 Henry Johnsen joined the \(\mathbb{K}\) t. Martin's Societs and remained a member until his death in 1890 . A point about Henry Johmson was his early association with some of
those great conductors and composers-Henry Cooper, Charles and Thomas Thurstans, Lates and Day. Some of these mon took part in those famous peais recorded at St. Martin'sthe 7,200 Kent Trebie Bob Maximus, conducted by Henry Cooper, and the Stedman Cinque conducted by Thomas Thurstans. It was Thomas Thurstans who composed the famous four-part peal of Stedman Triples, and that was rung on the front eight of St. Martin's on May 18 th , 1846. Eight members of their society on the centenary-May 18th, 1946-rang the same peal on the front eight. Johnson was famous not on'y as a ringer and conductor, but also as a composer, and it warecorded that he was a tremendous help to Lates and Thurstans in producing their peals.

In 1881, on his 72nd hirthday, Johnson took part in a peal recorded on a tablet at St. Martin's of 9,238 Stedman Cinques, which he composed. He rang the sixth in 6 hours and 42 minutes. In 1886, when he was 77, he was presented on his birthday with his portrait and an illuminated address. On his 80th birthday in 1889 there was a three days' celebration at Birmingham at the invitation and expense of Sir Arthur Heywood. Johnson diecl in 1890 and was buried at Aston.
At the request of the chairman, those who knew Henry Johnson in the flesh stood up. They were Messis. W. A. Clark, Charles Williams and G. T. Mitchieson.

The toast of 'Continued Prosperity to \(\mathbb{E t}\). Martin's Guild ' was proposed by Celr. A. Paddon Smith, who said during the tast year death liad dealt very lightly with them end they had lost only turo members-Mr. Rupert Richardion, Master of the Lincoln Diocesan Guild, who was a great ringer and a great man in every sense, and Widiam Davis, who wes for some years towerkeeper at Aston, a staunch member of the Guild and a regular Sunday ringer. The aim and object of their ringing was to provide the best ringing possibie on a Sunday, and it was in that respect that the St. Martin's Gui'd took a just pride. Ther had members in almost every tower 111 the Diocese of Birmingham.

\section*{A LIVE ORGANISATION}

As evidence of their continued prosperity the following rings were recast between the two wars: St. Martin's: the Cathedral; Aston, which was augmented from 10 to 12 ; King's Norton, from 8 to 10 ; Edgbaston, from 6 to 8 ; Selly Oak; Bishop Ryder's; St. Chad's Roman Cetholic Cathedral; Solihull: Shirley, from 5 to 6 (and now to be augmented to 8 , the order having been placed with Messrs. Taylor) ; Knowle, from 6 to 8. Adjoining them were Welsail. which had heen recast and augmented from 10 to 12: West Bromwich; Wednesbury: and Willenhall, from 8 to 10 . He quoted those figures to show what a live organisation existed hecause aupmentations and recastings only took place where they had good and enthusiastic ringers.
In extending the conaratulations of the nomnany to Mr. Harrv Midi'etonn, whe would be 81 next birthday, Celr. Paddon Smith recalled that he was one of the few remaining who rang in the 11.111 Stedman Cinnues on Boxing Dav. 1901. That had now heen heaten at Orford; he did not knnw if St. Mantin's liad anv roungsters wha wonld take un the cudgels. Their success was तre in recent veass in no small measure to Mr. Reevec. whn had dome 18 vears as hon. serpetary and tressurer, while he (the speaker) was secretary for 20 years.
Mr. T. H. Rapres, rasmmina. said the prosnerits was due to the snirit that permeated the Guild. the snirit of Henry Tolmson, a real gemtleman who was ever readv to help (Continued first column next page.)

Dear Sir,-Many bellringers who have read the Lord Peter Wimsey series of detective stories will recall the ingenious use of Kent Treble Bob Major made so cleverly by the authoress Dorothy Sayers in one of her crime mysteries-" The Nine Tayiors.
1 was, however, intrigued by the words Treble Bob Major appearing as the titie of an article in a recent issue of a hairdressing periodical thnough which I happened to be glancing. The article, which was fully illustrated, dealt with a particular style of ladies' hairdressing which the author had named Treble Bob Major.
He likened, in effect, three curls at the back of the head to three downward peals of bells and 'the centre sweep,' to quote the author's words, "to the harmony of the second bell in a full peal of Kent Treble Bob Majors.' Doubtless due to my ignorance of the art of hairdressing, I failed to see any similarity, and my hairdresser friend, an ignoramus of change ringing, could not help me.

Many other styles of ladies' hairdressing could, no doubt, be invented in which our standard methods of bellringing play a part. However, this example opens up but another field of application in which 'the hidden intricacies ' of change ringing can be utilised, and I shall be interested to hear the observations of any of your readers who may have read also the article appearing in the hair dressing journal.-Yours truly,

the younger man. As secretary he must pay tribute to the assistance he got from his officers; the table plan, for instance, was the work of George Fearn, their Ringing Master.
One of the features of St. Martin's Guild was their good striking which had been with them for generations. That tradition, he felt sure, would continue with their younger men. As evidence of good ringing Mr. Reeves called attention to the record that had been made of the broadcast of their Gathedral bell's, of which a few still remained and were for sale

Canom T. Guy Rogers proposed the health of 'The Cliairman' and spoke of his services to the Guild and to St. Martin's. In reminiscent vein, the Canon recalled his induction to St. Martian's and the cansternation that arose when the rope broke when he pulled it to toll the beil. Mr. Waiker was not then Master of the tower. but he still remembered Mr. Walker's concern on that occasion and how he repaired the rope.
The Chairman acknowledged the compliment rendered with musical honours, and said Canon Rogers was the seventh Rector he had been connected with at St. Martin's. He had had 50 happy vears with the Guild and it had been a mrost pleasurable service.

Kindred Ringing Societies' was the toast submitted by Mr. W. B. Dear Sir, - At two adjoining parishes at Gravesend, Kent., ringers' names appear on a bell at each tower.
At Gravesend, the old peal of eight were recast and rehung in 1923, and on the 6th bell is inscribed, "Edward Hadlow, a. ringer of this town, collected the greater part of the subscription money.' The amount the late Mr. Hadlow collected was over \(£ 500\).
At the adjoining parish of Milton-nextGravesend the ring of six was rehung and two trebles added to complete the nctave in 1930, and on the 2nd bell is inscribed, 'F. M. Mitchell, 21 years leader.' In this instance also the ringer mentioned was mainly responsible for raising the necessary funds.

\section*{MR. W. H. FUSSELL}

Dear Sir, - In 1913 Slough Parish Chureh received a new octave, the tenor bell of which was inscribed. The gift of William H. Fussell, Fsq.' Mr. Fussell, who died in 1944, became famous as organising secretary of the party of English beliringers who journeyed to Australia in 1934, as the only ringer to romplete a peal in every county of England and Wales. and as one of that select company whose peal total exceeded a thousand.

\section*{RANG HIS 250th PEAL FOR HIS 80th BIRTHDAY}

On February 22nd, a grand old 'Man o Kent 'brared the elements to go to Benenden for his 250 th peal. Mr. F. J. Lambert, sen.. of Horsmonden, who oelebrated his 80 th birth. day on February 21st, rang his first peal 58 years and 9 months ago, and for a man who has lived all his life in a country village his list of peals is a very creditable one.
Mr. Lambert comes of a ringing family and has taught several of his sons to ring, not to mention his nephews the Bromleys. The Lamberts have managed to ring at least ane family' eight-bell peal and hope to repest the performance. The Lamberts and Bromleys form the nucleus of the band at Horsmonden, where a great tradition of striking on the glorious ring of six has be
up and worthily maintained.
In these days Mr. Lambert generally prefers the treble, but just before his 79th birthday he rang ' inside' to a peal of Cambridge Major. and on his present form could easily repeat the performance! Long may he live to ring many amother peal! His peals are as follows:-

\section*{The Rev. E. Bankes James} By the passing of the Rev. Edward Bankes Janies on February 20th, the Cambridge University Guild has lost its last link with the little group who were weli-known memben of the Exercise before the end of the last century, and the whole ringing fraternity has lost one who brought a powerful and ariginal mind to bear on problems of composition. Together with his brother, the late Rev. H. Law James, he was a member of the wellknown band at St. Michael's, Gloucester, before coming into residence af Cambridge in 1889. He took part in the Guild's first peal, Boh Triples on handbells in 1890, and from that time figured in many of the Guild peals, often as conductor or composer.
At the time when much attention was being paid to the composition of Grandsire Triples he produced several ten-part peals of great merit. As is well known, he produced Bristol Surprise, and Little Bob, conducling the first peal ever rung of the latter in 1911. He also produced Silchester, and was discussing it with the writer only a month before his death. These are by no means all the contributions he made to the theory of composition.
He was one of the party who toured Australia in 1934, and a peal of Bob Major (the Barrabool peal), composed by him in the Mediterranean, was rung on handbells in the Arabian Sea. It was rung half-muffled in his memory by the Cambridge University Guild on February 22 ud at St. Andrew the Great, Cambridge.
In addition to his activities as a ringer he was a very fine chess player, representing
Cambridge University against Oxford during his residence. He was very interested in printing and possessed a printing press with which he produced some very beautiful examples of printing.
It was aiways a pleasure to be in his company, for one could be sure of interesting conversation full of original ideas, and he was help any who brought problems to him. Most of his life was spent in teaching. among his
pupils being C . W. Woolley, of Bushey.

\section*{ALD. W. S. B. NORTHOVER}

It was entirely due to his efforts that the eight bells at St. Mary's, Bridport, were recast and completely reliung in 1924. He was also a very active Freemason in Dorset and also a member of Grand Ladge. The funeral was on February 26th.

\section*{Mr. E. A. Pitstow}

Mr. Ernest Alfred Pitstow, whose death at the age of 86 was reported in our last issue, was the youngest of the three brothers who did so much for ringing in the 80 's and \({ }^{\circ} 90\) 's. It was their enthusiasm for the art which
brought Saffron Walden to the forefront as brought Saffron Walden to the forefront as
a centre for good ringing and made their name known throughout the Exercise.

Ernest Pitstow never took up composing and conducting-he left that to his brothers
Nathan and Frederick-but he was a very safe ringer in all methods and a first-class striker. Of a very modest and kindly disposition. he ras beloved by all who knew him.
His list of peals is not a long one-he rang about 120-but it contains many that are landmarks in the progress made in his time, and some are historic
His first peal-Kent Treble Bob Major at Sawbridgeworth on Boxing Day, 1883-was followed by a trip to London in January, 1884, when he rang four pea's in four days for the Cumberlands - Kent Major, Kent Royal, Double Norwich and Grandsire Triples. His nest was the first peal of Treble Bob in the City of Ely, and the next the first performance of T. Lockwood's 6,016 of Kent Majorrung at Lavenham in four hours.
In 1885 he went to Long Melford to ring in the late W. J. Nevard's first peal, and so started a lifelong friendship. In 1887 he rang in the first peal of Oxford Treble Bobb br the Eisex Association and followed this with a peal of Kent Royal at Chemsford, the first on the bells and the first peal on ten by the Escez Association.
The next year saw him in Berkshire, where with the Rev. F. E. Robinson and J. W. Weshbrook he rang four peals in four dars.
In 1890 he toured the Fastern Counties with the Rev. F. F. Robinson, Canon G. F. Coleridge and J. W. Washbrook. when they rang nine peals in six days, including Kent Royal at Aylsham and Kent Maximus at St. Peter Man-
croft. Norwich, both on the one day, a considerable achevement in those days. This tour was rounded off with a peal of Stedman Cater: at Great St. Mary, Cambridge, the first in Stedman's home town.
Foilowing a peal of Stedman Cinques at St. Martin's-in-the-Fields in Apri!, 1892, the first by the Essex Association, he toured Devon and Cornwall with the Rev. F. E. Robinson and Canon Coleridge, where they rang \(s i x\) peals. It was during this tour that the party rang the first course (Grandsice Caters) ever to be rung on Exeter Cathedral bells. There were four men on the tenor, the other bells being rung singlehanded.

In December of that year he went to Chri-t Church, Southgate, to ring J. W. Washbrook's 7,072 of Superlative, the longest length jet attempted in this method. The peal was successfulif accomplished in 4 hours 58 minutes, but he had the mortification of being told a week or so later by his brother Nathan that the figures were false.
He next rang at Saffron Walden in the first peal of Superlative in Essex and followed this with the 8,800 Superlative at Loughborough, rung in 6 hours 16 minutes, composed and con ducted by Nathan Pitstow. Canon Coleridge rang in this peal and is believed to be now the only survivor of the band. This peal stood as the record for the method for many years.
Within a month of this achievement he rang at Saffron Walden in the first peal of Cambridge in the Eastern Counties. In 1895 he was in Devon again with the Rev. F. E: Robinson and rang four peals. The next pea of note was the first peal of Londnn Surprice Major in Essex, rung at Saffron Walden on January 10th, 1899. Another notable peal was one of Stedman Triples on the bells of the Roman Catholic Church, Cambridge, in January, 1904 (tenor 32 cwt ), the only peal to be rung on this grand ring until last year.

His last peal was at Saffrom Walden on October 6th, 1936, when at the age of 76 he rang the 8th to the first peal iStednan Cinques) on the twelve bells.
In addition to his ringing activities, Ernest Pitstow had taken a leading part in the musical life of Saffron Walden. His exceptional qualities as a musician enabled him to teach and inspire others, and for 40 years he was conductor of the Saffron Wa!den Excelsior Band.
The funeral service was held at Saffron Walden Parish Church on February 12th and was attended by a large congregation. It was conducted by the Vicar (the Rev. M. R. Sinker), assisted by the Rev. Humphries, and the music was beautifully rendered by the organist and choir. As the cortege left the church for the Borough Cemetery the bells were rung muffled
He leaves two sons-Haroid and Leonardto carry on the work which was nearest his heart, for both are ringers and conductors of music. His three grandchildren also are Fingers.

\section*{MR. ANDREW SHUFFLEBOTHAM}

A dife member of the North Staffordshire Association and for many years a member of the Escex Association. Mr. Andrew Shufflebotham died on February 14 th , aged 72.
A native of North Staffs, he learned to ring at Hanler and later jowed the Stoke-on-Trent hand until his work took him to Braintree, Fssex, where he joined the local band and rang most of his peals in that society. He always visited Stoke for his holidays and made straight for the tower, always readv to lend a hand either for call changea or Cambridge, and was a sure and safe ringer. After a lapse of 25 vears he rang his 140 th peal of Kent Treble Bob Major at Stoke on September 16th, 1944.

He was taken ill whilst on his annual holiday in August. last year and died six months later in the City General Hospital. Four of the ringens of St. Peter's, Stoke. acted as bearers. A course of Grandsire Triples was rung at the grareside by F. Wilshew 1-2. N. Holland 3-4. C. H. Page 56. A. D. Steel \(7-8\).

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\section*{LANCASHIRE TO-DAY}

For generations the country has been reminded of those singular traits of Lancashire character of presenting a line of thought and action which is ultimately nationally accepted. We trust this is correct in matters of bellringing. The annual report of the Lancashire Association to hand last month starts with this stimulating preamble : - The first post-war year has brought many signs of encouragement. It is reported that branch meetings have been well attended; peal ringing is increasing, both in the number of peals rung and also in the variety of methods attempted.'
The strength of the association is significant with a total of 1,609 , of whom 1,202 are resident ringing members. During the year the association has gained 69 new ringing members, 27 new non-resident members and two hon. life members, while 21 members have rejoined. Other associations have had a greater accession of members; Lancashire, quite rightly, has a qualification for membership in having rung 120 changes on tower or handbells, or covered 500 changes on tower bells and, while proof of ability is desirable, there are guilds which are not insistent upon such a regulation.

As to peal ringing, during the year reviewed 85 peals were rung, a substantial increase on the 50 rung during the previous year. Twenty members rang their first peal, 75 their first in another method, two their first on an inside bell, three their first as conductor and four their first in another method. Two peals received a special mention-that of Oxford Royal at Worsley, which contained nine members who rang their first peal in the method, and the peal of Double Norwich at Woolton, which was the 250 th for Mr. Lester L. Gray. Of individual performers, the name of Mr. G. R. Newton, hon. secretary of the Liverpool Branch, is pre-eminent. On August 2nd he rang his 37 oth peal for the association, thus beating the record of Mr. Harry Chapman.
Lancashire believes in continuity in office. The last annual meeting was the 50th that Mr. W. H. Shuker, a joint hon. secretary, had attended, and he has held the secretarial pen since 1911. The outstanding figure in moulding the Lancashire Association together was Canon Elsee, of Bolton, who was president from 1890 until his death in 1936. The area of the association embraces the dioceses of Blackburn, Liverpool and Manchester and parts of Carlisle and Wakefield, and operates through eleven branches. Doubtless Lancashire ringers are watch-
ing closely the effect of the division into three of the old Midland Counties Association. No complaints have reached us that the association is unwieldy, but certainly on a population basis the area centrally administered by the joint secretaries and their committee seems formidable. The test of efficiency, after all, is progress.

The belfry is the freelold of the incumbent; le has the custody of the keys and control of the bells (Phillmore's Ecclesiastical Law, vol. 1, p. 1,385 and Canon 88).
To enter the church and ring the bells without his consent is trespass and heavy penaities are incurred if against his wish.
As an incumbent, permission has always beeu asked for from me from outsiders to ring the bells, and I have invariably consulted the foreman ringer before giving that consent

If these peal sntachers got this permission they could not be said to 'sneak in,' but as a matter of courtesy the incumbent usually notifies the foreman of the application and this gives the foreman e chanoe to explain why the band of outsiders should not ring just at that time, but should postpone their peal.

\section*{SOME NOTES ON CONDUCTING}

\section*{COURSE-ENDS AND COURSING ORDER}

In the two preceding articies we have studied the effect that bobs and singles have on the coursing order of the bel's. In theory, therefore, a student who has successfully mastored the art of transposing as he is ringing shouid be able to know the effect on the coursing order of each call as soon as it has been made and should be immediately aware of any 'shift' that may occur. It is at this point, however, that theory and practice can sometimes be no longer reconciled. A dozen and one things may, and frequently do, happen in actual ringing to divert the conductor's attention. It may be that he has had to correct a trip, or that a fire elngine has just cianged by and he is wondering if the church is on fire, or it may be that he is lost in contemplatiou, or, more likely he is just "listening to to be able to pull one's self together quickly if a trip occurs. Trips have a nasty habit of cropping up unexpectedly and it is in such a arisis that a conductor may have forgotten entirely what the coursing arder ought to be. Fortumately, there are several means by which 'to save one's bacon' in such an emergencs. The chief of these is in being aprere of the essential difference between 'even' and 'odd' as briefly referred to in the first four paragraphs of the lest artiole.

We have seen that onoe a single has beell cai'led an entirely new series of possible coursing orders is introduced. It may equally be said that once a single has been calied an entirely now series of possible course ends is introduced. Now the first (even) series of coursing orders and the first (even) series of course-ends are in mutual relationship, and likewise the second (odd) series of coursing orders and the second (odd) series of courseends. There are 60 possible course-ends, and therefore 60 possible coursing arders, with the tenors together and the belis in-course, and a different 60 course-ends and coursing orders with the bells out-of-course.

It might be as well at this point to remind the reader that a course-end as normally written down is an abbreviation. For inetance, 35264 as a course-end is intended to represent 13526478 . 1 and 78 are not normally written down as they fall into their home positions at every course-end. In the same way we may also omit any reference to 7 and 8 when thinking of coursing order.

If the bells are in-course the natural courseend (i.e. the change that will occur at the end of the next course unless a further call is made) and the coursing ordar will both be found in the foregoing list. This is a most significant statement and the reader is advised to check it carefully with several examples. To illustrate the point we will take three examples at random.
If the natural course-end is 12345678 the ooursing order is 7532468 . If the natural course end is 16543278 the coursing order is 7356428 . If the netural course-end is 15642378 the coursing order is 7265438 .
It will be seen that if the course-end belonme to the even group then, as night follows dar. the coursing order belonging to that courseend is also to be found in the even group
There is no need for us to write down the
orders. The reader would, however, be well advised to write them out for himself It may be said quite simply that any possibie arrangement of the numbers \(2,3,4,5\) and 6 which is not given in the list above must belong to the odd group.

The next stage along the road is to be abic to recognise at sight whether a particuler row belongs to the even group or whether it belongs to the odd roup. It is hoped to give some hints about this next time.

The three articies now contributed have as their background Plain Bob Major. Much, indeed most, of what has been written can be equally applied to any even-beil method. One fcels a great tendency in the Exercise to regard individual methods as watertight compartments, ignoring, in practical ringing, the close and very helpful reationship they have to each other. When methods are seen in this close relationship the words 'first in the method as conductor' frequently become rather meaningless.

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\section*{ETIQUETTE}

Comparatively few ringers, except those who are members of the Hereford Diocesan Guild, have heard of the little town of Kington. Hitherto the name has conveyed nothing save a place name, but in future it is likely to have a permanent niche in the vocabulary of the Exercise. An incident in this quiet Hereford township has brought to a head the unwritten rule-the etiquette which governs the general practice of peal ringing.

What are the facts that have up to the present transpired as narrated in our correspondence columns? The ringers of Kington raised \(£ 186\) towards the provision of two new bells, and under their veteran captain were planning the first peal on the rehung ring of six. A telephone call is put through to the incumbent by a responsible ringer holding office in the Guild, and the Vicar, not knowing the general etiquette governing peals, gives permission without consulting the captain of his ringers. The peal is rung on January 13 th, within a few hours after receiving permission, but it is not until the issue of March 7 th that the Exercise learns the names of the ringers.

The legal position was explained last week by the Rev. J. M. Turner, president of the East Devon Guild. The belfry is the freehold of the incumbent, and he has control of his bells. The Vicar of Kington was perfectly within his rights in giving permission; what he did not realise was the affront he innocently cast on his own ringers by not consulting with the captain. A peal, and especially a first peal after the bells have been rehung, is an occasion, and the local team, if they are peal ringers, naturally should have the privilege of ringing the first peal.

As to the ringers of the peal, it was not a case of ringing without permission. Technically they acted correctly in securing permission from the incumbent. It has been, hawever, the accepted practice in the Exercise, when asking permission to ring to approach the captain and head ringer, and he acts as an intermediary with the incumbent. This etiquette has prevailed for many years. What was peculiar about the conduct of these ringers was that the day before permission was sought they were in company with certain members of the Kington band and not a word was said about the proposed peal. Ringers will also note the method selected. Hereward Bob Minor has never been rung before for this Guild, and an attempt
of that character would be planned and with many companies practised beforehand.

The sympathy of the Exercise is extended to the Kington band, after raising such a substantial sum, being debarred from ringing the first peal. Some ringers might even regard the martyrdom of the captain in resigning after holding office for such a long period as justifiable. We do not believe that we are creating a ' mountain out of a molehill ' in calling attention to this unfortunate incident. It might have been due to over-keenness or even an attempt to play a practical joke on the Kington ringers. This must be understood by peal ringers : that when enjoying the privilege of ringing in a strange tower a courtesy is due to the regular band, who Sunday by Sunday ring the bells. Peal ringers are not, or should not be, in a class unto themselves. They are all part of the ringing fraternity who have their common bond of service in their regular Sunday ringing.

UMERICALLY one of the lurgest Associations in affiliation with the Central Council, the Lancashire came into being as the result of the following ircular:-

Sir, - It has been proposed to form an Association of Change Ringers for Lancahire. We would like to hear your opinion on the above proposition. The objects of the above are: (1) To promote the art and science of ohange ringing; (2) helfry reform; (3) to induce the clergy and churchwardens to take more interest in the ringers and the ringing.-Yours respectfully.

A meeting was duly held in the National Schools, Chorley, on Jume 10th, 1876, when officers and committoo were appointed and sub scriptions became due on July 1st. The entrance fee was fixed, at 2s. 6d. and subscriptionk \({ }^{\text {at }}\) Is. per year. Thus started our Association.
'The Church Bells' of the day did not give the Association much encouragement because it did not make more use of the clergy and also because it was open to all denomination: which had bells.
At the first meeting 30 members were elected, and this number was increased to 60 during the first year. In 1879 when the annual moeting was held at Bolton the Association was reconstituted and the block of a bell which has graced the front page of the Association's annual reports was purchased; it is still going strong!
The first balance sheet showed an income of 51095 ., against an expenditure of \(£ 712 \mathrm{~s} .10 \mathrm{~d}\)., which left \(£ 216\) 2d. to start the second year.

\section*{THE PRESIDENTS}

At first, Presidents held office for a lery short period, the founder presidant being Mr. W. G. Wray, of Kirkham. Ho was succeeded in 1879, when the Association was reconstituted, by Mr. John Mason, of Southport, whe ras followed by Mr. W. Albinson (Stockport) in 1880, Mr. Joseph Scott (Manchester) 1881, the Rev. T. A. Turner (Bury) 1883 , the Rev. C. Lowe (Bolton) 1896. In 1890 Canon Elsoe, of Rolton, was elected, and he held office until be died in 1936. He was, indeed, one of the great leaders of the Exercise, and during his period of nffice the number of ringing members rose from 506 to 1,434 . Membership of the Lancashire Association was a privilege: there was a keenness among
the young men to qualify by having rung 120 changes on tower or handbells, or covered 500 on tower bells.
There were frequent clanges in the post of general secretary in the early jears. The principle of continuity in office was establisled by the appointment of Mr. J. Redford es assistant in 1882, later to become general secretary. In 1898 he was succeeded by Mr. A. E. Wreaks, who beld office until 1911, when Mr. W. H. Shuker, the present holder, took office. He has now a co-secretary in Mr. T. Wilson, of Blackburn.
Long and faithful service is also to be found among the treasurers, of which the Association has had five in 70 years. A noteworthy holder of this office was Mr. H. W. Jackson, who was olected in 1882 and was stiv in office
when he died in 1928. The present treasurer (Mr. F. R. Williams) was elected in 1942.
When Sir A. P. Heywood was considering the formation of the Central Council be inviter Canon Elsee to meet him at the Jolmson Dinner at Birnuingham in 1899. The Canon reported back to the committeo, who asked him to represent the Association at any other meetings and also on the Council when it was formed. This he did faithfully until his death It is thought that he only missed olle meeting when he was in South Africa.
The membership certificate was designed in 1891 with etchings of four churches (three illustrated with this article), the bell and a bunch of handbells.
In 1893 a leaflet was printed with the fout standard methods. From this small beginning has grown the present volume con taining 20 minor, six Triples and 14 Major methods, with a chapter on Grandsire and Stedman Caters and Giaques.

In 1887 the Association decided to form branches. To-day there are 11 . some of which were the outcome of smaller associations in the county joining the central association and then forming branches. The area of the Association embraces the Dioceses of Biackburn, Liverpool and Manchester and parts of Carlisle and Wakefield, and the existing branches snd their secretaries are: Blackburn, Mr. C. W. \section*{Chorley Bells}

\section*{GOLDEN ANNIVERSARY OF PRESENT} RLNG
To commemorate the 50 th anniversary of the presont ring of Clorley (Lancs) bells, a peal of Treble Bob Major was rung on March 8th. The ringers of the peal, the Rector (Canon Wyatt) and other ringers and friends were atierwards entertained to tea, after which the Rector congratulated the team, making special reference to Mr . Gartside on his first peal as conductor, and Arthur Rigby on ringing his first peal on the treble.
Canon Wyatt recalied that his first curacy wasewith the late Canon Elsee. Later he went to Ashton-under-Lyne, where several long peals were rung. On going to Burnley as Vicar he was visited by Canon Elsee, who on hearing the bells being ehimed sajd in slocked tones, Wyatt, tubular bells!'
Mr. T. Lofthouse, one of the wardens and a ringer for over 50 years, added to the reminiscences. He related how in his early days the Chorley ringers were asked to ring the bells at Blacknod whilst an architect tested the tower for stability, as the local squire had forbidden the bells to be rung on the grounds that the tower was unsafe. After the squire's death the bells were rung regularly!
The writer mentioned that some 10 or 15 years ago Chorley bells became more or less unringable, so much so thet Mr. Gartside, the towerkeeper, had to oil them before every service. The writer decided to try out some of his own ideas and gadgets and these made the bells pealable, as shown by ringing the peal on March 8th under Arctic conditions, there being no heat in the tower through fuel shortage.

Chorley bells have a history. When the Commissioners of Edward VI. visited the church in 1552 there were 'three great bells and two nittle bells called sacring bells.' The remister records that the great bell weighing 770 lb . was increased to 8631 lb . in 1646 when it was recast by Geoffrey Scott, of Wigan, bellfounder. The six bells in the tower in 1883 were rehung by G. Mears, of London. Three were dated 1763, another 1800, another 1832 .
These six were recast in 1896 and two added, making the present ring of eight hy Jolun Warner and Sons. Three bear ald inscriptions; the others have the maker's name and date. The three inseriptions are:-
I bear my part in concorts pleasing sound, But when alone I summon to the ground.
The day is over; cease from labour, I call to rest.
Our voices do with cheerful sound,
The hills and valleys echo round.
A faculty for a ringers' gallery was granted in 1897; before that time the bells were rung from the ground floor.

Appleton, in common with many other villages, was a!most completely isolated, and a good deal of effort was needed to be present. Stedman and Grandsire Caters, the methods lowards which this well-known ring seems to lean, predominated, and the standard in striking demanded by the local band was fully maintained.

With the return of the younger members from the Forces, the ringing at Appleton has reached a new high standard, and this augur well for the future as well as for the continuity of this ancient celebration.

With Andrew on the third and Frank Claydon on the fourth we were set up and had a good band. I noved out of the district after the 1914 war and lost sight of him. I should liko the Stoke-on-Trent men to know how much we appreciated Andrew's ringing.

Following a. fill. the death took place on March 2nd of Mr. Alfred Hinds, aged 76. He had lived at Trenterden all his Jife, was a member of St. Mildred's Church ringers for 40 vears and had rung 41 peals in different metlonds.

MR. O. F. FOWLER.
With deep regret we report the death of Charles Frederick Fowler, of Anston, near Sheffield, which took place on February 12th. \(\mathrm{He}_{0}\) was buried in Anston Churchyard on February 17th, and a muffled peal was rung after the funeral.
Mr. Fowler, who was 86 years of age, was - ringer of renown on six bells, in fact he with his team of ringers at Anston Church in their heyday were known as the Kings of Six Bell Ringers. The team, of which Mr . Fowler was the conductor and captain. could ring well over 300 methods on six bells, many of which Mr. Fowler compased. One method he composed and called ' King George V.,' by kind permission of His Majesty
Mr. Fowler had been ringing for 70 yeărs and rang regularly up to his death. His great friend, Mr. Henry Stenton, who is \(8 \overline{\overline{8}}\), much to his disappointment had to give up last year after 74 years as a ringer.
There are two other ringers of the old band each over 70 and one almost 60 . One died just before the war-Mr. S. Smith, aged 85, after ringing for 58 years, and one died last year, aged 76. Thus has this famous band been broken up.

He had no temper for to slip,
A harsh word ne'er escaped his lip.
But ring from morn till night would he

When new names appear in the reports of University Guild peals it is of great interest to older members who have 'gone down' to see in which Colleges the interest in ringing is centring

Uniform may be essential in the Forces. Utility furniture and olothing may be desirable in time of war. But please let not the craze for standardisation enter into the realms of art. Are the clergyman and the medical practitioner to be stripped of their rightful descriptions? When the Freemasons ring a peal, may they mot include the names of their lodges for the information of their brothers in the craft? May the Police Guild no longer issue details of rank or force? Is the married woman now forbidden the honourable title of Mrs.' ?
One could continue this list to great lengths. I will not do so; enough is here to liack my plea for freedom of expression in matters relating to our art.-Yours truly,

No doubt it was a great joke for them to score one off on the local band, but was it worth it? On one hand. a peal of Hereward Minor, on the other a smashed local band. 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\section*{A FIRST YEAR REVIEWED}

Closely watched by the whole Exercise has been the division of the Midland Counties Association into four separate associations, viz.: Burton, Derby, Leicester and Nottingham. The Derby Association has completed its first year, issued its first printed annual report (a comprehensive volume giving details of its 30 towers and a complete list of its membership), and forwarded to "The Ringring World ' a comprehensive survey of the year's work.

We were entirely opposed to the idea of dissolution of the M.C.A.,' writes Mr. W. Lancaster, the first secretary of the new association, 'as we at Derby were having very grood meetings and ringing was, generally speaking, in a healthy condition. After a year's hard work and splendid co-operation from all sides, we can say it was worth while, as it gives those in the districts more scope to go out and organise those in the more remote towers, which have to be neglected by a larger organisation. As all district officers are on the General Committee, it ensures all districts being conversant with each other's activities and generally good attendances at all meetings. Peals are easily arranged and a very good atmosphere maintained.'

Another benefit arising from the new Association is that the clergy are showing a much greater interest in meetings and their co-operation is appreciated. At the last meeting held at Ilkeston, the Vicar and the Rural Dean both became honorary members, and were very interested to know where recruits could best be obtained. It was suggested that choirboys and scouts were often induced to take up bellringing with every success, and the Rural Dean promised to assist the Association in this matter during his travels around the Deanery.
A new association is able to build upon the experience of the past. In planning the Derby Association it was felt that it would be an advantage to have several districts so that each tower could be visited annually, thereby maintaining interest and, from a secretary's point of view, collecting subscriptions and contacting members. Accordingly, three separate districts were formed - Derby, embracing the city and its environs; Peak, the towers in the district, including such well known names as Bakewell, Matlock and Darley Dale, and Ilkeston, consisting of the towers ceded by Nottingham outside the Southwell Diocese and a few others adjacent. Membership for the first year was 114 ring-
ing and 22 honorary members, but a substantial increase is expected during 1947.

While the number of peals rung during the year was confined to eight, the standard of ringing can be regarded as good. At meetings, which were very well attended, methods rung included Cambridge and Superlative, Double Norwich, Duffield, Little Bob and the standard methods. The programme planned for this year includes the scoring of first peals for the Association of Cambridge and Superlative. In a new Association there is such a wide field open for making ringing history that keen peal ringers have every inducement. The Derly Association can truly look back with pride on their inaugural year.

\section*{MACCLESFIELD BELLS REHUNG And Augmented to Ten}

Chester Diocesan Guild has been enriched by the dedication of two new bells and the rehanging of the original eight bells some 30 ft . lower at Christ Church, Macclesfield, in an effart to combat the great oscillation caused when the bells were rung in their old position it the top of the tower. The dedication was performed by the Lord Bishop of Chester (Dr. Douglas Crick) on March 15th.
Macclesfield bells were originally installed in 1777. At that time there were eleven bellsa sanctus beli and a peal of 10 . In 9815 the uinth bell cracked whilst being tolled for a funeral service. This bell was recast by William Dobson, of Downham, Norfolk, at the expense of Mr. William Roe, but only eight of the original peol were replaced, possibly in the hope that a decrease in the weight of bell inetal would combat the swaying of the tower. The original treble and second bell were piaced in Poover Church and Sankey Street Chapel, Narrington, respectively. possibly to help defray expenses.

\section*{SILENT FOR 60 YEARS}

Notwithstanding the relianging and de. creased weight, the trouble was just as bad as ever, and in 1834 the bells at Christ Church oeased to be rung and remained sileut until 1902, when during the vicariato of the Rel St. Clare Hick and chiefly owing to the energies of the then curate, the Rev. Sandford Woods, the bells were rehung, the money being raised by public subscription. An extract from The Bell News ' dated January, 1903, states
- The bells of Christ Church, Macclesfield, were rung for the first time after a long sleep of over sixty years at the midnight service on December 31st, 1902. The bells: eight in number, have just been retuned and rehung by Messrs. J. Taylor and Co., of Loughborough. The tenor, weighing some 23 cwt., having been jreast. The tower is being restored and a new clock put in.
Unfortunately the bells were put back in the original unsatisfactory position in the tower as before, but despite the greatest difficulty experienced in ringing the bells, they were rung for service the whole time up to last year, when the work of lowering the bells commenced, ercept far the period during the war years when a ban was placed on such activities.
From time to time various experts liave been called upon to give their views on how best to cure the trouble. During the Vicariate of the Rev. S. J. F. Charples, Mr. E. H. Lewis, reputed to be the cleverest expert of that time on 'rocking towers,' made an inspection, and recommended that the bells be lowered at least 25 ft ., which would reduce the ciscillation considerably.

This recommendation, however, could not be undertaken, and it was not until 1938 that a subscription list was opened by the ringers themselves, who agreed to forgo the fees due to them, providing the moner was utilised towards the Bell Fund.

\section*{TWO GIFT BELLS}

In 1943, during the vioariate of the present Vicar, the Rev. A. Garke, the Bell Fund was officilly opened. The licence was obtained in 1946 for the work to be carried out, and was entrusted to Messrs. Taylor and Co., of Loughborough. After the work of lowering the bells had commenced, the Christ Church Old Boys' Association generously offered to provide two new bells to servo as a memorial to their comrades who had served in the Great Wars of 1914-18 and 1939-45, and these are the treblo and second betls of the present peal of ten, cast by Messrs. Teylor and Co.

The inscriptions on the bells are as follows :
Treble and second. - "The gift of Christ Church Lay School Association.'
Third.-'Thos. Rudhall, Gloucester. 1777.'

Ninth.- This bell was recast at the expense of Wm. Rue, Eisq, by Wm. Dobson, of Downham, Norfolk, 1815. Rejoice in the Lord.
Tenor.-' I to the church the living call, and to the grave do summon all. Recast 1902.'
For the dedication ceremony the ringing chamber had been decorated by a nember of the local company. The service was attended by the Mayor and members of Macclesfield Town Council, and many visiting ringers from as far afield as Yorkshire and Staffordshire. The Lancashire Association was represented by the Rev. F. F. Rigby (president) and Mr. Shuker (secretary), and the Chester Diocesan Guild by Mr. J. W. Clarke (Master) and the Rev. J. D. Pearson (secretary), and the North Staffordshire Association by Mr. R. S. Anderson (Master). After the service the Bishop visited the ringing chamber and had a few words with the ringers.
Tea was eirved in Clurist Church School, after which short speeches were made by the Mayor, the Bishop and the Vicar (the Rev. A. Clarke). The tower was open to all in the evening. and methods rung included Grandsire and Stedman Caters, Treble Bob Royal and Surprise Royal.
Messrs. Taylor and Co. are to be congratulated on a splendid job, the blending of the new bells to the old eight being perfect, and there is a great improvement in the 'go' of the whole pesl as a result of the lowering of the bells.
The bells being lower than the louvres has had the effect of mellowing the sound, which although softened to the immediate sicinity, is diffused to a greater area, and the musical qualities can be muck more appreciated.
Of the estimeted cost of \(£ 1,500\), the sum of £1,350 has now been raised, and there is thus still a deficit of \(£ 150\). Further subscriptions will be gratefully received by the Vicar or will be

Mr. and Mrs. W. Wolstencroft
FAREWELL TO ASHTON-UNDER-LYNE.
As briefly recorded in our last issue, Mr. and Mrs. Walter W. Wolstencroft are severing their long connection with St. Peter's Church, Ashton-under-Lywe and are going to live in Buckinghamshire.
In their honour a farewell peal was rung at St. Peter's Church, where Mr. Wolstencroft lad been a ringer and conductor for 55 years and Mrs. Wolstencroft for 21 years. This is the second tower Mr. Wolstencroft has circled to eight different methods.
The peal, Superlative Surprise Major, was the first in the method to be rung by the Chester Diocesan Guild and was the 60th peal together for Stephen Lloyd Parry and Fred Dunkerley.
Only two peals of Superlative have heen rung at Ashton. A previous attempt was made on the 40 th anniversary of the first peal, which was lost owing to the electric light, being switched off accidentally after \(2 \frac{1}{\alpha}\) hours' ringing, and was to have been a memorial peal to Charles Jackson 1, Rev. A. T. Beeston 2, Bertram Prewett 3, George Dent 4, Isaac Shade 5. Gabriel Lindoff 6, William Pye 7, Ernest Pye 8, which was rung on September 12th, 1905. CHESTER GUILD'S REGRET.
The Chester Guild said farewell to Mr. and Mrs. Woistencroft at a practice meeting at Bowdon on March 8th, which was attended by some 60 members and friends.
Mr. A. R. Elkins, branch chairman, expressed the regret of the Guild that two of their friends and staunch supporters of the branch, Mr. and Mis. W. W. Wolstencroft, were leaving Ashton for Buckinghamshire. His remarks were endorsed by a number of mem. bers. and suggestions were made that this was hardly the time to move South in view of the infinitely worse weather which they were experiencing than the North!
Mr. Wolstencroft thanked the meeting for their good wishes and for the many happy years he had had amongst them. It was not easy to move after so many years, but he had finally brought himself to do it.
Mrs. Wolstencroft. who has been connected with St. Peter's, Ashton, for over 70 years as scholar, Sunday School teacher and superintendent, in a witty speech urged all young people present to take an active part in the coroorate life of their church.

The branch and the Church of st. Peter, Ashton, will be the poorer by their removal, but what is their loss will, it is hoped, be Buckinghamshire's gain. It is expected that another county will enter into the sphere of multi-method Minor ringing.

A new feature introduced at the Bowdon meeting was a short talk on some of the difficulties encountered by learners and how to overcome them in order that newcomers to change ringing might be spared some of the drudgery which the older members were compelled to go through to acquire their knowledme.

The service wes conducted by the Vicar the Rev. D. P. Lowe), there was a bountiful tea and the ringing was mainly in methods of the elementary type with plenty of rounds for the learners. To those who suggest that change ringing is a dying art the ages at this meeting ranged from 12 to 75 with the accent on the younger generation. Verb sap.

\section*{OBITUARIES OF THE WEEK}

MR, JAMES HOULDSWORTH.
For many years the conductor of the ta.ented band of ringers at Oswaidtwistle, who were pioneers of Surprise ringing in the Blackburn Branch, Mr. James Houldsworth, of Acerington, Lancs (late of Oswaldtwistle), died on March 9th. He was cremated at Carletou ou March 13 th.

His Surprise peals included Palatine Surprise, Lancashire Surprise and Northampton Surprise, which were the first peals in these methods for the Lancashire Association. He was elso a member of the band which rang a peal in seven Surprise Minor methods nonconducted which was also the first for the association. He will, however, be best remembered for the assistance and instruction he so readily gave to beginners.

He possesced that great asset of being eble to impart his knowledge to others, end many ringers in the surrounding districts (including the writer) are very grateful and appreciative of the help and instruction he so willingly gave.

Mr. Houldsworth rang in a! about 70 peals. a good:y proportion belng Surprise, for most
of which he acted as conductor. A.T.

\section*{MR. J. N. OXBORROW'}

The death of Mr. Jolin Nixon Oxborrow on February 14th marks the passing of another notable Colicge Youth. He was the secretary of the St. Stephen's, Westminster, band from its formation, and when the band at Westminster Abbey was inaugurated he was elected secretary, and held this position until the ban was placed on ringing during tle war.

Mr. Oxborrow was a native of Helmingham, Suffolk, and before coming to London rang at least one peal, Grandsire Triples, at Coddenham, which he conducted, on December 26 th, 1879.

Although he was not a prolifie peal ringer, ho was an excellent striker and very safe on all numbers of bells. As far as can be ascertained, he rang about 170 peals, among these three Surprise peals in une day-London, Cambridge and Superlative - nou-conducted London and Cambridge Major and Stedman Cinques, and a 'John' peal of Stedman Cinques at Cripplegate. He was 86 years of age and had been a member of the College Youths for 60 years.
At the funcral at Streatham Park Cemetery on February 24th, the society was represented by Mr. W. H. Pasmore.

\section*{MR. EDWARD PAUL.}

Mr. Edward Paul, of Stroud, Glos., who died on March 8 th, aged 83 , was a regular Sunday ringer for over 60 years. He was not a peal ringer, having rung only two peals, but he was always found in his place for service ringing and was always on time. Mr. Paul was instrumental in introduciug several young men to the tower, of whom the writer was one.

MR. A. E. W. SMITH, SWINDON.
After a short illuess, Mr. A. E. W. Smith, of Swindon, has died, aged 78. A native of Longcot, Berks, he learned to ring at Christ Church. Swindon, about 1900 and lad been a member of that band since that date. He never mastered an 'inside' bell. but hed rung the tenior to peals of Doubles, Triples, Caters and Cinques, and was an expert at tune ringing with handbe'ls. Many a meeting or outing furishied in a merry nood with William and partner performing with the handbeils.
The funeral touk place at Cinnist Church on March 14th, and wes attended by members of the local and Rodbourne Oheney towers. A half-muffled touch of Grandsire Triplee wac rung.

MR. W. H. JOHNSON, WORCESTER.
Mr. William H. Johnson (Bill Jolmson to his many ringing friends in Worcestershire) died on March 13 th in his 83 rd year. He was a very active member of Worcester Cathedral band until a few years ago, when his doctor forbade him making the arduous climb to the linging chamber.
He was not e prolific ringer-probably having not more than 50 peals to his credit, and several of these were rung on the Cathedral bells upon occasions of national rejoicings and sorrow-but he was a regular atiendant for Sunday service ringing.
Mr. Johnson first entered into the !ife of the Cathedral 60 years ago, when he joined the voluntary choir, and lie was for 50 years secretary of the Cathedral Guild and treasurer of the Worcestershire Association of Ringers for 40 years-a fine example of continuity and devotion to his fellow ringers.
In June, 1943, recognition was paid to his services when at e social gathering in the Coilege Hall he was presented with a handsome gift of War Saring Certificates by Guild members aud friends of tho Worcestershiro Association.
He was a well-known business man in Warcester, being a partuer in the building firm of Messrs. Phe'ps and Johnson. He leaves two sons, who are members of the firm. His wife died in 1939
The funeral service, held in the Cathedral on Mareh 15th, was attended by many of his ringing friends. The Dean (the Very Rev. Arthur Davies) officiated. A course of Grundsire Triples was rung at the gravesje by 5-6, J. J. Jeffries 78.

\section*{MR. WALTER CHIBNALL.}

A stalwart of the Bedfordshire Association died on March 9th in the person of Mr. Walter Chibnall, of Aspley Guise, aged 82 . His funeral took place on March 12th.
By trade, Mr. Chibnall was a bookbinder and for 50 years he was employed by the Powage Press, Ltd. His ringing career extended over 63 years, he having joined the Bedfordshire Association at the end of 1883, the second year after its formation. Througliout the whole of that period he rang regularly for services on the handy ring of six at the Parish Church of St. Botolph, where he was foreman of the company. He instructed rearuits and kept the band et full strength.
It was his boast that from tine time the Aspley bells were rehung over 40 rears ago to the present time their upkeep had not cost the church authorities a penny piece. An accomplished amateur carpenter, he lined the walls of the ringing chamber with hoarding at his own expense and saw to it that it was kept clean and in good condition at all times. He was capable of relanging a bell and fitting new bearings, etc., when required.

\section*{GLOUCESTER AND BRISTOL ASSN.}

Despite the inclement weather, 19 ringers met et Rodbourne Cheney on March 8th for the quarterly meeting of the Swindon Branch, and methods up to Kent Minor were rung.
The service whs conducted by the Vicar (the Rev. J. R. Hassett), and tea wes served in the Sunday School by wives of the local ringere. The secretary announced that a tour of outlving towers was being arranged in place of the May meeting, and it was decided to visit Blunedon and Bishopstone in April and June respectively. Threo juvenile lady members of Rodbourno Cheney tower were elected members of the assuciation.
Ringers were present from Swindon, Blunsdon, Lydiard Millicent, Rodbourne Cheney, Faringdon and Stratton'st. Margaret.

\section*{CONDUCTOR'S EXPLANATION}

Dear Sir,-As the ringer responsible for the Kington peal, I had not thought it necessary to answer your carrespondents' letters, but your leading article of March 21st forces me
to say:- (1) Much has been made of the idea that Incal sentiment wes hurt hecause the first peal on rehung belks was rung hy outsiders. The bells of Kington were not rehung by tho date of our peal, and, as far as I know, are stil! untouched.
(2) There was not the slightest intention of ignoring the ringing captain. I am sorry that he has felt annovauce, hut I fail to see why any annoyance with outsiders should make him sever his connection with the local band. The facts are simply these: We attempted the peal on Friday, January 10th, but failed. We then intended to try again at Eardisland on the following Monday, only to discover on the Sunday that these bells were not available. The possibility of Kington was thought of, and the Vicar gave permission by telephone for the peal to be attempted.
Such are the simple facts which need not have created a "mountain out of a molehill.' On my many visits to churches it has been my invariable custon to ask permission from the incumbent, unless I personally know a loca! ringer, in which case I should assume that he himself would contact the incumbent. This is the first occasion when difficulties have arisen.
In conclusion, I may say that the peal was first reported less than a week after it was pung.-Yours faithfully,

\section*{EASTER}

Out from the snowdrifts chilly, Roused from drowsy hours, Bluebell wakes and lily; God calls up the flowers.
These lines from a traditional Easter carol seem particularly appropriate this year with a winter of amazing severity-weeks of snow being followed by floods which have inundated thousands of acres, with much death and destruction. Behind this desolation will come the miracle of the resurrection; it is presented each succeeding spring and is commemorated by the Church with the Festival of Easter.

For the past week the bells of our churches have been silent. It is a generally accepted rule that no practices are held during Holy Week. For those whose ears are attuned to sounds that matter it has been a still week. And it is well that ringers should ask themselves each succeeding year what is the message of the silent bells? No resurrection can come without death pains and decay; similarly no Easter, with all its joy of a new life, arrives without its travail which this year has been one of physical anguish for thousands of people.

Charles Morgan, in one of his essays, takes infinite pains to condemn those who desire to regimentise the human family into what they describe as the Common Man. 'I believe that the coming age will be that of the Uncommon rather than the Common Man,' he writes with conviction. And later he adds, 'Woe betide the priest who looks for the Common Parishioner and not for the child of God.' Thus, in the appeal of the message of Easter reactions are different. 'The world itself keeps Easter Day' is the glad message of another carol. Nature has a common denominator and graduallv reveals its new life, but with mankind it is individualistic and uncommon. The promise of the resurrection is there to all, but it has to be sought individually.

The Easter morning bells are an expression to the world of the Church's alleluias. It is the ringer's privilege to be the chosen messenger-an uncommon responsibility which is not merely confined to ringing a touch perfectly. This ringing is a spiritual act; an act of worship which is entered upon with a fuller significance if the true meaning behind the silence in Holy Week is understood and observed.

To many Guilds and Associations Easter is the start of a new year and a new life. More than a dozen of
such gatherings will take place on Easter Monday-nccasions which are largely attended. It is indeed a happy thought to start anew with Easter and leave behind the dross of the passing year in the search for something far nobler and on a higher plane in our ringing. All the discouragements of the past are gone and buried; new hopes and aspirations will enable the coming year to give a better impetus to our work.

\section*{Founders of the new ring of twelve for Liverpool Cathedral \\ Tenor 82 cwt .}

ALTHOUGH the beginning of change ringing in Sussex camot be determined with any accuracy, it is certain that there were cautres of the art of Horsham, Bolney, Brighton and Eastbourne in the early par't of the 18 th century. Bolney is believed to be the first tower in the county with a peal of eight, but there are no bevards in the tower recording early performances. By the courtesy of Mr. A. Gillings, the following extracts were made from the minute book of the local society, in which some attempl was made to record the old peals :-

April 2and, 1799. 5,040 Grandsire Triples, conducted by Philip Tulley.
- April 23 rd, \(1813,5,040\) Grandsire Triples, conducted by James Potter, Brighton.
April 6th, 1822, 11,216 Bob Major, conducted by Richard Cook, Bolney.
In the middle of the 18 th century the heavy peal of six at Horsham, with its 36 :wt. tenor, was recast into eight, and between 1766 and 1821 twenty-four peals were rung. The band ahio scored the first peals at St. Nicholas' Brighton, 1777, and Uckfield 1785, besides travelling as far abroad as Dorking and Guild. ford. Unfortunately the ancient peal book of the Horsham Society, together with the peal book and cortificate block of the Sussex County Association, disappeared in 1908 after an upleaval in the Association's affairs, and has never been traced.
At St. Nicholas', Brighton, the old parish church, ringing was kept vigorous by the constant visits of the Court to the town, and by its comparatively easy access from London. There is a board recording a peal of liob Major, 11,088 changes, in 1779 , rung by a
mixed band, which included Sussex ringers mixed band, which included Sussex ringers
from Horsham, Chiddingly and Cuckfield. The bells were originally eight, augmented to ten, reduced to eight again when the two trebles were transferred to the new Parish Church of St. Peler, and again augmented to ten, finally to bo recast into a modern peal of ten. Very many peals have been rung here, and there is a record compiled in this century which is reputed to be a complete list. At one time there is said to have been two rival companies ringing on the bells, the Silver Spurs and the Straw Boots, the former having their headquarters at the Windmill Taven in Upper North Street. Within living memory the insignia of the silver spur wa- attached to a notice board at the Windmill, but on the closing of the inn this, and possibly other records, was lost.
On these auspicious foundations, the Sussex County Association was formed from a meeting called in December, 1884, by George \(\mathbf{F}\). Attree at St. Peter's, Brighton. In the eerly part of the next vear the Association was formally launelned, with George Attree as its first secretary. Twenty-five bands of ringers became affiliated, and the Association at once became the third largest in the country.
In 1885 the peal at Wernham was augmented to eight, and there was found a public which loved to hear its church bells rung all day and every day. In consequence Warnham soon came to the front as a centre of change ringing, and many of its peals have the footnote, 'Regun at 4.30 a.m.' It was no unknown occurrence to have two or even more peal: rulg in one dar. Naturally, it was an idea! place for тесord breaking!

\section*{'FANTASTIC FXXRAVAGANCES}

The Assomation was inaugurated with an impressive list of honorary members containing the names of many of the Sussex clergy and a heavy sprinkling of the higher nobility, and it was from these that it obtained a large percentage of ite income. For the first vear or so it flourished exoeedingly, then the subscriptions from the honorary members began

to fell away, fantastic extravagances on dirners and teas and the erection of marb.'. tablets began to tell their tale on the balance sleets, which went from bad to worse. Every year showed a deficit until in 1891, when the accounts were more than \(£ 60\) on the wrong side, Gearge Attree, on his elevation to the Mastership, wiped out the debt. Under the secretaryship of the Rev. Lother Coder the Association was enabled to start afresh without encumbrance.
The unique pasition of George Attree, as an influential business man in Brighton, and a churchwarden of St. Peter's, enabled him to attract to the town many good ringers, and to provide unlimited facilities for practioe. Amongst his band figure such well-known names as George Baker, composer and method inventor. George Williams, Edward Merritt, Harry Weston, Frank Beinett, Keitli Hart, George Smart some employed by the Attree firm, others attracted to the tower by ita growing reputation or the opportunities effered for practice in advanced methods.
The 1890's found the St. Peter's band at the top of its form : the first peals for the Association of Cambridge, Superlative and London were rung at their own tower, and the first of Grandsire and Stedmav Caters at St. Nicholas'. These latter were not the first rung by the Sussex Association, as affiliated towen were listed as far away as St. Albans Cathedral, Herte, and Inl Saints'. Fulham, claims the first peals of Caters credited to the Assomation. It is doubtful, however, if these peals can be rerkoned truly Sussex ones. During this period the St. Peter's band travelled to London, and at St. Steplen's, Coleman Street. rang the first peal of London Surprise in the City. The attitude of the London ringers to this performance is not recorded.
The same decade found a new oentre of ringing at Crawley, under James Parker, peals of New Oumberland Surprise, Superlative and

Alliance Major being accompished. At Henfield, too, Charles Tyler's band scored the first peal of Duffield for the Association and the lirst of Stedman Caters and Cinques on handbells.
The swift rise of the Association's reputation may be gauged by the fact that the first peal for the new Association was Grandsire Triples at Cuckfield, conducted by J. Jay, sen., and there were seven rung in the first year. In 1895 the total had risen to 98 for the twelve months, being at that time a record for any society. No less than 33 of these were rung at Warnham, and metlods had included 10,080 Treble Bob Minor in 14 methods at Capel, conducted by D. Jordan, the first peal ever rung of Canterbury Pleasure, conducted by H. Clandler at Warnham, and the first peals of Stedman Triples and Treble Bob Major.
In 1908 George Attree emigrated to Canada, and it might well have been that the removal of his undoubled personality and powers of leadership would spell disaster both to st. Peter's and the Association. That difficulties and troubles attendant on his sudden departure should occur is only to be expected, hut the foundations he had laid were sound and there were capablo men to carry on his work. In the election of the new Master, F. B. Tompkins, and secretary, G. Watson, with Keith Hart, succeeding to the leadership of St. Peter's, affain settled down in due course.

\section*{DIVISION OF THE COUNTY}

By 1893 iE Had been found necessary, owing to the peculiar shape of the county with its Cathedral at the extreme west end, to form three divisions of the Association. This arrangement lasted until 1932. when under the secretaryship of Albert Stone the central disision was divided into a northern and southern. Although various ettempts have been made to give the Cathedral City more prominence, it is generally agreed that Brighton is geographically and conveniently the natural centre. General meetings held at Chichester or Fastbourne lave always proved unrepresentative and unsatisfactory.
Tlie first World War broke on the Association at the height of its reputation. A record of 112 peals liad been rung during 1913; the finances were in a fourishing state; the new Benevolent Fund was proving its worth. It was owing to these facts that the organisation came through the war rears on a firm footing to face the problems of peace. Despite sonie opposition, meetings were regularly held and there seems to liave been very littie dislocation in any direction. By 1924 it was found possible to offor rail fares to members attending meetings, in addition to the benefits derived from the Renevolent Fund.
Between the wars Crawley had risen again under the conductorship of Oliver Sinpetts. where peals of Surprise in new methods and in the latest discovery, Spliced Surprise, were becoming: almost everyday affairs. St. Peter's. Brighton, were making good use of the heary peal of ten which had been presented by the Master, J. Thornton Rickman, and the first poal ever rung of Iondon Surprise Royal in George Baker's Brighton version liad been rung k,y the local band with Keith Hart as conductor. The jubilee meeting was held in Brighton in 1935, three foundation member being present.

Again war interfered with nrogress, this time mone severely then before, but again, despite the total ban on ringing, activities continued. The landhell band gathered round Frank and Mrs. Hairs at Burgess Hill scored peals with regularity. It is largely owing to these activities, carried on under the stress of difficulties attendant on war duties, that the Assomation was enabled to start again so (Continned on next page.)

\section*{The Kington Peal}
- a parochial affalr.

Dear Sir, - 'One cannot pronounce judgment until the whole of the facto is known.' This sound advice given by the president of the East Devon Guild does not appear to us of the Hereford Diocesan Guild to have heen taken by you, sir, before writing your editorial of March 21st.
You have not published any letter from the peal ringers explaining their action, to enable your readers to hear both sides of the question; and if you have reoeived no such letter we submit that it was premature for you to write a deader on the subject. You have certainly read into Mr. Jones' letter more than he intended to imply and made the matter look far worse than it really is; for there was no question of a first peal-the two new bells are still only a future prospect.
You raise the question of the etiquette of peal ringing in a strange tower. The most usual practice is surely for the incumbent (not the captain) to be approached first. He will naturally consuit his responsible officer (usually the steeplekeeper) before giving permission.
In the case of the Kington peal, therefore, it would appear to us that the fault lay in the decision of the peal ringers (when the tower originally arranged for was not available) to try to get another one by telephoning to the Vicar at such short notioe that he had no time to consult his steeplekecper or captain.
Such a thing has undoubtedly been done by others many times before; but it is an act of discourtesy to the incumbent. Let this he a warning! Unless, however, an incumbent has a clear understanding with his own band he should very properly refuse to be rushed into giving consent in this way. But if he doe give his consent, eny trouble caused thereby is his own responsibility and not that of the visitors. It has become a parochial affair, and not one that can be usefully aired in the pages of 'The Ringing World.'-Yours, etc.,

\section*{TOWER SNATCHING}

Dear Sir,-In reply to the letter of Mr. Eric Nobles. In 1938 I rang in 163 new towers in 19 counties, and in 1939, during the first eight months of the jear. I rang in 153 new towers in 21 counties. But for the war, I was hoping to reach the 200 mark! In addition to these new towers. I visited from 30 to 40 'old' towers during both these years, so my total for both years was over 350 towers altogether.
While on this subject, I should be interested to know how many ringers here rung in 1,000 or more? I know of only five, Messrs. J. H. Shepherd, A. A. Hughes, W. A. Stnte. J. T. Drke and myself. My total is now 1.041 in 45 counties, in England, Wales and Ireland.
Since the war, owing to pressure of work and other factors. I am unable to do very much 'tower snatching.' but I am pleased to hear of others carrying on their widening of experience. Good luck, Mr. Nobles, end may rou one day join the ' 1.000 ' up hand.- Yours faithfully, A. PATRICK CANNON.

\section*{What's In a Name?}

Dear Sir,-I have thought for some time that the naming of some of our methods is somewhat misleading, and I wonder if other ringers are of the same opinion. As the following will show, it presents something of an anomaly.
If we take a course of the Plain Bob method on any number of bells and insert a secomd hunt bell we call it Grandsire, i.e., Boh Minimus beoomes Grandsire Doubles, Boh Doubles equals Grandsire Minor, Bob Minor equals Grandsire Triples and so on. We will ecoept Grandsire as a distinct method as the calls ane not Plain Bob calls, and, further, the method can be rung on all numbers by straightforward extension.
Now if we take the Oxford Bob method and 'Grandsirise ' it as we do Plain Bob, we still call it Oxford Bob, and in consequence Oxford Bob on an even number of bells is an entirely different method to that on an odd number of bells. Ask any six-bell ringer. Would it not bo more correct to call the method we know as Oxford Bob Triples, Grandsire: Triples in the Oxford Bob variation'? The nuethod is far more akin to Grandsire than Oxford Bob.
I moticed in a recent report of a peal of Doubles that Oxford Bob wes among the methods rung. How do we iuggie with the Oxford Bob method on five bells without ringing either Plain Bob or Grandsire?
Again, if we take the Plain Bob metlod and extend it as we do it still remains Bob Doubles, Bob Minor, Boh Triples, etc., but if we take the variation of Plain Bob Doubles known as St. Siman's, when it is extended to Minor it becomes St. Olement's Minor. What accounts for this?
I have not rung St. Clement's Triples, but I presume that here again we introduce a second hunt bell and use Grandsire calls thus making it far more akin to Grandsire than a variation of Plain Bob. There are no douht dozens of other methods which are or could be treated as these two methods are. Perhaps our Methods Committee of the Central Council can enlighten us. I say 'us' as I imagine there are others besides myself who are equally fogged.

\section*{CONTINUITY}

And who will carry on the torch? This question has to be faced by all organisations and indeed by all forms of human life where continuity is an essential factor. In bell ringing it is constantly to the fore; it is a major question for each tower. The need for an Elisha to wear the mantle applies not only to conductors and steeplekeepers (not all conductors are well acquainted with the care of bells), but also to the ranks of Sunday service ringers.

At Leeds Parish Church this continuity has been broken, as was pathetically told to the Exercise in the notice that appeared in 'The Ringing World ' last week in the following terms: 'Until further notice Sunday ringing will be by arrangement only. Monthly Saturday practices discontinued.' We trust that the lesson of Leeds will be taken to heart by all towers and more particularly by those towers which are in key positions in Church and State. No tower can afford to be complacent as to the future; it must have its training school.

Leeds holds an honoured position among the famous rings of England. The bells are second only to St. Mary's, Redcliffe, in weight for a ring of twelve hung in a parish church, and are the ninth heaviest ring of twelve in the world, being, recast in 1932 and increased from a tenor of 36 cwt . to one of \(42 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{cwt}\)., with the addition of a semitone bell to provide a middle eight in F. Towers that take precedence over Leeds for weight are Exeter, St. Paul's, York, Southwark, Bristol, Worcester, Dublin and Manchester Town Hall.

Ecclesiastically Leeds Parish Church is equally renowned -it was considered for cathedral status at the time the See of Bradford was created, and was second favourite to Bradford Parish Church. From its clergy in the past hundred years have been chosen 13 Bishops and an Archbishop (Lord Lang had his first curacy after ordination at Leeds some 60 years ago). Famous musicians have been numbered among its organists, who included Samuel Sebastian Wesley, and the daily choral service is a regular feature of its church life.

Unfortunately, the unhappy state of ringing in Leeds Parish Church to-day is attributable largely to taking no thought for to-morrow. Within the last 13 years, we are informed, and possibly 20 years, no beginner has been taught in this belfry, reliance being placed on recruiting from ready made ringers drifting in from other belfries. Losses by death, retirement and advancing
years have reduced the company to a mere half dozen, and those left had not the heart to break in recruits. To such a low ebb had ringing been reduced that the bells have been rung only four times for services this year. An attempt to remedy this state of affairs is being undertaken by Mr. R. H. Dove, and when he volunteered to take on the task he met with an overwhelming response in the way of recruits from ex-choirboys, youth club members and sidesmen.

We trust that the lesson of Leeds will receive serious consideration throughout the Exercise. There are other towers where the flight of years is not being observed. A Surprise band, with all its members in the veteran stage, will find that its accomplishments cannot stay in the hands of time. There must be no delay in finding men and women to carry on the torch for the good of bell ringing generally and their own tower in particular.

\section*{THE IRISH ASSOCIATION}

\(I^{N}\)1896 a young man took up an appointment in Dublin and at the same time was appointed instructor to the ringers and keeper of the belfry at St. Patrick's Cathedral, Dublin. By 1898 he had aroused the enthusiasm of the local ringers, who were now making progress in change ringing, and on Saturday, October 22nd, 1898, twenty-five ringers met to form a change ringers guild: thus the Trish Association of Change Ringers was born. The young man-Gabriel Lindoff-became its first secretary. Richard R. Cherry, K.C., became first president, and a William McCullough first treasurer. Of those twenty-five ringers, only three survive to this day, viz., Rev. Canon G. D. Scott, M.A., and Harold and Rawdon Greene, who were elected first life members of the Association two years ago. At that meeting five towers were represented: St P'atrick's Cathedral (10), Christ Church Cathe dral (10), St. John-the-Baptist (10) and St. George's (8), all Dublin, also Christ Church, Bray (8) ; thus there were three rings of ten bells.
The Association adopled as its object 'That the fociety shall be a bond of unity between all ringers in Ireland for the promotion and study of scientific change ringing.' By 1900 change ringing certainly lad been promoted, for Plain Bob, Grandsire and Stedman were well established in Dublin, Bray and Arklow and already peals of Grandsire Triples and Caters and Bob Triples had been rung by the local ringers.

The first report was printed in 1901. It gave a synopsis of the inaugural meeting and included an article on change ringing leading up to Doubles (Grandsire and Plain Bob).
By 1902 the memberahip had risen to one hundred members, embracing new towers from Belfact, Holywood, Drogheda and Kil kenny. Peals were on the increaso, 17. having already been rung. This year the Association became affiliated to the Central Council of Church Bellringers, and Richard Cherry was elected the first representative.
The membership continued to increase-to 150 members-more towers joined up from Cork, Limerick, Waterford and Rostrevor. In 1905 the only peal outside Ireland was rung, at St. Stephen's, Coleman Street, London, on St. Patrick's Day. It was one of Bob Major, 5,024 changes, rung by Herbert P. Harman treble, John S. Goldsmith (conductor) 2, John W. Taylor 3, Isaac G. Shade 4, William H. Fussell 5, Ferris J. Shepherd 6, John H. B. Hesse 7, Ernest Pye tenor.

\section*{FIRST 12 OUT OF ENGLAND.}

A red-letter day for the Association was Whit Monday, 1909, when through the munificence of the Attorney General (the Right Hon. R. R. Cherry, K.C.) two trebles were presented and the \(B\) flat bell hung for ringing at St. Patrick's Cathedral, Dublin. Thus Ireland became possessed of the first ring of twelve bells out of England. The trebles were rung for the first time in peal on the previous day. The annual meeting on Whit Monday was attended by 150 out of a possible 185 members, and they were entertained by the donor of the new bells and the Dean of Sit. Patrick's.
The St. Patrick's Cathedral Society wer. not long in making full use of their twelve hells, for on January 14th, 1911, the first peal on twelve bells ever lung out of England was rung to Grandsire Cinques, 5,037 changes, in 3 hours 50 minutes; tenor 45 cwt . This team included the donor of the new bells ringing the 11th.
A challenge shiald for competition amonest the sfflisted towers was introduced in 1913

the shield to be awarded to the society having the greatest pcrcentage of bells rung for at least fifteen miuutes before each service throughout the year.

During the Great IWar, 1914-1918, no mectings were held. This was also a troubled period for Ireland and was a serious set-back to progress, as so many ringers joined the Services and left bands depleted. The Civil War in Ireland and its consequences prevented the Association from meeting between 1920 and 1925.

Owing to the interest in ringing in the newly-formed State of Northern Ireland, the Northern Branch was founded in 1927. It elected its 0 wn officers and carried on as an independent unit.

\section*{FIRST BROADCAST}

Progress in change ringing is reported for 1929, when six bands are mentioned as overcoming the difficulties and ringing touches in various methods. This year the first changeringing broadcast in Ireland was made at St. Columb's Cathedral, Londonderry, prior to the dedication ceremony of the new ring of ten bells there.

Another trophy was introduced in 1933. Mr. R. S. F. Murphy, P.C., offered a silver cup for competition between the various towers before the annual meeting each year, the team whose striking showed the least number of faults to be declared the winners. Also in 1933, a fund known as the "Bell Restoration Fund' was established as a result of a stop-watch competition, which realised \(£ 72\).

After many years of effurt, Gabriel Lindoff was elected president in 1934, and at the same time acted as secretary in order to maintain his continuity in that office. This was a most popular election; for three other nominees withdrew their namen when Gay's name way proposed, thus leaving him unopponed.

In 1937, the first broadcast of change ringing from the Irish Free State took place on St. Patrick's Day, when Stedman Triples was relayed by Radio Eireann and by many stations throughout the world. St. Patrick's Cathedral, Dublin, took the honours.
The ban on ringing during the recent war put a stop to ringing activities in Northern Ireland, while their brothers and sisters in Eire were enjoying the use of their bells but most of the teams suffered as a result of their members volunteering to join the British and Eire Defence Forces or leaving the country for war work.

Gabriel Lindoff's death on November 7th, 1941, was a sad day for the Association in particular and the Exercise in general. He had been its hon. secretary since its foundation 43 years previously. A brass memorial tablet to his memory was dedicated in St. Patrick's Cathedral, Dublin, on the 76th anniversury of his birthday, November 19th, 1944.

During the recent world war, the Association met each year. Although the numbers were small, the standard of ringing and change ringing was well maintained in Eire. With the cessation of hostilities, the Northern Branch reorganised, und members of depleted bands returned in a number of cases, while new recruits were learning the art.

At present there are ten bands of the twenty-one affiliated societies practising change ringing in Plain Bob, Grandsire, Stedman and Treble Bob methods. The present membership is 285, including non-resident life members, and is the greatest number of members for any of the Association's forty-eight years.

\section*{THE FOUNDERS.}

Richard R. Cherry, K.C.. first president, was horn at Waterford in 1859. He attached himself to the Waterford Cathedral Ringers' Guild and took part in the second peal ever rung in Ireland-Grandsire Triples in 1873 for the Ancient Society of College Youths. He went to Dublin to study law and remained out of ringing for about 20 years. He was largely responsible for reorganising ringing at St. Patrick's Cathedral, Dublin, and for the introduction of Gabriel Lindoff to Ireland. In 1913 he hecame Lord Chief Justice of Ireland and, although a very busy man, found time to ring at St. Patrick's on practice nights. He died in 1923.

Gabriel Lindoff was born at Leiston, Suffolk, in 1868. From Lincoln in 1896 Lindoff came to Treland and at once introduced change ringing. In 1898 he became the first hon. secretry of the Trish Association, a position he held until his death in 1941. Gabriel Lindofi's greatest contribution to the Exercise was perhaps as a composer. His peals of London ran into five figures. He also composed new methods-Erin, Dublin Court, Rochester, Princess Marina are but a few. His health hegan to fail after hombs were dropped on Dublin near his lome in December, 1940, and he died on November 7th, 1941
Secretary--Frederick E. Dukes, who 428 elected the first assistant secretary in 1938, has carried on the secretarial work since Gabriel Lindoff's death. He learnt to ring at St. George's Church, Dublin, and af 18 hecame conductor of the local band. In 1933 he was transferred to Cork, where he formed a team to ring the hells of St. Finbarre's Cathedral, which had been idle for 22 vears. Returning to Dublin in 1937, he again attached himself to St. George's, and in 1944 was appointed electrical engineer to the Great Northern Railway with hemdquarters at Dundall. Carroll (1930.1), M. Hogan, P.C. (193132), W. H. Wilson (1932-3), R. Lynch and W. E. Lynch (1933-34), Richard died in office, G. Lindoff (1934-5), Dean of Waterford (19356), D. McNeice (1936-7), J. C. Cherry, M.B. (1938-9, son of the firsi president), T. B. Tough (1939-40), J. S. Gibb (1940-1), Dean of Waterford (1941-2), Dean of Christ Church (1942-3), Canon E. H. F. Campbell (1943-5). James Cunningham, J.P. (1946- ), who is 89 and still takes his place each Sunday in his tower at Rostrevor, Co. Down. He was one of the original members of Rostrevor when the bells were installed there 67 years ago.

\section*{A PEAL RECORD.}

In all, 154 peals have been rung by members for the Association. Each peal is illuminated in the peal book. This number would not be so great but for the visits of 'expert English ringers ' who toured Ircland on various occasions. To these bands go the credit for ringing the first peals in Ireland of Double Norwich, Superlative, London, Kent Treble Bob (Royal and Maximus) Stedman Cinques, Cambridge (Major, Royal and Maximus), Bristol and Yorkshire. These 'expert' ringers included Revs. F. E. Robinson and C. W. O. Jenkyn, James George, George, Ernest and William Pye, J. H. Cheesman, Ben Knights, W Keeble, Bertram Prewett, William Fussell, G. W. Fletcher, J. H. Shepherd, J. Simpson, J. H. Riding, Frank Bennett, James Bennett, C. T. Coles, E. Duffield, Mr. and Mrs. R. Richardson, and Miss Edith Parker, who was the first lady to ring a peal in Ireland and also to conduct one-Stedman Caters at Christ Church Cathedral, Dublin, on August 1st, 1927.
Peals were rung for the passing of monarchs, ringers and well-known personages, weddings and birthdays. Two notable birthdays were Mrs. Murphy, aged 94, mother of R. S. F. Murphy, and the Hon. Katherine Plunkett, aged 110, who died in her 113th year

A roll of honour, in memory of those ringers who served in the Great War, 1914-1918, is illuminated on one page of the peal book. Forty-seven ringers served their country, of whom nine made the supreme sacrifice.

\section*{MR. THOMAS AR'THUR BOND}

After a brief illness, Mr. Thomas A. Bond. of Burford, Ozfordshire, died at his home oll March 13th, aged 67. \section*{MR. JOHN HUGH WILKINS.}

Secretary of the St. Mary's, Walthamstow, Society of Change Ringers, Mr. John Hugh Wilkins died on March 26th, aged 86. He had leen connected with the belfry for a very long period, probably 70 years, having joined the ringers at an early age. He is the last of the original hand which was formed in 1896.
Although not an outstanding peal ringer, his total of peals would be in the neighbourhood of 200 , and were mostly Grandsire and Stedman Caters. He was seldom absent from Sunday ringing and practice nights, and was very safe and reliable. His most outstanding peal was one of Plain Boh Royal, in which he rang the ninth in his stiff white collar and very short. rope. Throughout the peal he had to stand on iop-toes. However, a good peal was rung, the first of Bob Royal on tower bells for the Essex Association.
In his younger days be regularly attended the College Youth meetings. He followed his father and th late Mr. F. Dear Sir,-Would you be so kind as to publish a complete apology from me to Mr. Alfred H Pulling for inadvertently mentioning his name in the ringing at Old Windsor on January 20 th, 1912 , which was so kindly arranged in honour of my visit through Mr. Macdonald, who was with us in Vancouver some six months and now, I understand, is with Messrs. Mears and Stainbank
May I explaiu to the besi of my knowledge just what did happen whilst ringing. About half-way some bells clashed and ropes seemed to ascend and descend together. I, ringing the treble, was confused but not willing to give up as the conductor was getting the muddle straightened out. I kept on ringing- The bells seemed to be going O.K. again except my own, and I found I was at the wrong stroke. It was Mr. Mactonald himself shouted to me to set my bell for one stroke, and after doing so ringing settled down to its original compass. I am pretty ceriain Mr. Macdonald would remember this fact.
To my mind a peal of 5,040 is not a true peal unless all changes are rung. The mere fact of my setting my bell one stroke, to me at least, robs me of claiming a peal ; in fact, if I should so happen to enter the church at Old Windsor and see a peal board commemorating that event \(I\) would not feel as though it vas deserved. Dear Sir,-I have in my possession a copy of the record of Sledman and Grandsire Caters rung by the St. Margaret's band. In my opinion the statements made by Mr. A. R. Burgess are wholly unjustified.

The actunl recording is a bad one, made many years ago. The microphone must have been very badly placed, or else it is a pre-electrical recording. The actual striking of the bells is not in the least as Mr. Burgess would have us think. He should remember that bells, as organ music, do not record well. To the layman unacquainted with the intricacies of change ringing, I very much doubt that he would notice anything wrong with the recording at all.

I might add that this record is now unabainable, and the only other record of bells issued is of the Victory peals rung at Westminster Abbey, York Minster, Coventry Cathedral, Bath Abbey and St. Marv's, Puddletown. This shows up the various qualities of bells excellently, but is spoiled, to my mind, hy having a commentary.-Yours faithfuly,

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\section*{YOUR PAPERS}

Most peal ringers and, in particular, conductors keep records. Some are systematic affairs, with peals tabulated and indexed with professional efficiency; with others they consist of exercise books pasted up with ringing data or perhaps a card index file. Such records are to a degree personal secrets; to the individual concerned they are an unfailing source of joy and memories of past achievement, and they constitute a life record. In addition, most conductors have their scrap book of peals and touches, cherished possessions which are constantly being added to, invaluable to the Exercise at large. With the limitations on printing to-day, these must of necessity be mainly in manuscript form or of cuttings.

Recently we have had one or two private letters from well-known leaders in their associations who, while compiling Guild histories and biographies, have regretted that in the case of certain ringers who have passed over their papers relating to ringing have been treated as salvage and destroyed. Their executors had regarded these manuscripts and records as of no intrinsic value, and they had been consigned to the waste-paper basket. One naturally can understand the point of view of the tidy housewife when confronted with an accumulation of papers (one noted ringer left a garage full of documents, some of which were valuable, but they required hours of time spent in sorting.) Too frequently when death occurs premises have to be vacated at an early date, and it is when confronted with a time limit that the uninitiated unceremoniously hands over the mass of papers to the salvage collector.

The point we are asked to emphasise is that all ringers should leave instructions as to the disposal of their papers. So many noted personalities regard their records of little value to ringing in general-probably a characteristic of a modest make-up-that they take no thought as to the eventual disposal of their papers. What every noted ringer really requires is a ringing executor who will sift and sort the papers and make sure that nothing of value to the Guild or Association is destroyed.
In ventilating this subject we trust that ringers, both individually and collectively, will consider the creation of the appropriate machinery for dealing with such masses of documentary data. Each Guild or Association should have a ringing executor to whom relatives of a deceased ringer could send such papers. We note that the Irish Association have this week appointed a librarian to deal
not only with the establishment of a library for the Association, but also the manuscripts left behind by that famous ringer and composer, Gabriel Lindoff. There are in most Guilds retired ringers with the necessary knowledge and aptitude for this work, and we feel certain, if general instructions and guidance could be issued from the Central Council, those inexperienced in this work would know what to look for and retain.

\section*{Bob Royal Record \\ PRITTLEWELL'S SUCCESS.}

In ringing a peal of 9,000 changes of Plain Bob Royal at Prittlewell, Essex, on Easter Monday, a new longest lengtli record has been established. The last longest length of Bob Royal, 8,100 , was rung at Leeds. Kent, on Nov. 30th, 1751, in 5 hours and 26 minutes.

\section*{Tower Snatching}

MORE FOUR FIGURE MEMBERS.
Dear Sir, My old friend Pat Cannon seens to misunderstand the letter from Mr. Eric Nobies. Mr. Nobles asks how his record for the year 1946 compares with that of other ringers for the same year. I consider it would be hard to leat for 1946 , both as regards the number of new towers rung in and Sunday service ringing. Congratulations, Mr. Nobles, on a very fine achievement!
Several names can be added to the five mentioned by Mr. Cannon. Mr. Alfred W. Brighton was the first ever to accomplish four figures in the number of towers. He gave up round the 1,700 mark. The lead was then taken by Mr: J. H. Shepherd, who has, of cour'se, held it ever since. This information was given to me bv Mr. J. S. Goldsmith at, Bristol in January, 1938.

I believe Mr. John Thomas during lis career as a bellhanger has rum well into four figures. This number includes every ringable ring of bells in Somerset. Although he is of a modest, retiring nature, perhaps he would like to confirm this! The late Mr. Francis E. Dawe claimed to have rung in 1,100 towers, but it was always doubtful if he could produce a written record to substantiate this!

On looking a.t my own record I find the, following : 1937,164 new towers, 10 'old' towers; 1938, 201 new towers, 32 ' oid' towers; giving an average of 'new' towers for the two years of one every other day! I rang in my 1,0001h tower, Southwell Cathedral. Notts, on March 12th, 1939, at the age of 31 years \(7 \frac{1}{2}\) months. I should be interested to know if 1.000 has been accomplished at an earlier age than tlis.

My total is now 1,165 . I have rung in all English counties excepting six, also four counties in Wales. Owing to pressure of work and family resnonsibilities, which are my first consideration, I only get an occasional chance of ringing in a now tower these days. Tower snatching although laughed at hy some ringers, jas its values. Besides riving its devotees the opportunities of ringing under all sorts of conditions, it creates friendships of life-long duration. My best wishes to all who have an interest in this side of ringing.

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\section*{SIXTY YEARS ON}

Last Saturday, the 6oth anniversary of the first ringing of Holt's Original peal of Grandsire Triples on handbells silent, was commemorated by a supper party given by one of the ringers, Mr. John C. Mitchell, J.P., and attended by another of the survivors, Mr. W. H. L. Buckingham. This silent peal was rung at the Goose and Gridiron, London, on March 11th, 1887, and it was originally planned for the commemoration supper to be held on March 8th, but owing to the very severe weather conditions it was postponed. Guests of Mr. and Mrs. Mitchell on this happy occasion were Mr. E. H. Lewis (president of the Central Council), Mr. E. G. Fenn (past-master of the Ancient Society of College Youths), Mr. A. A. Hughes, J.P. (treasurer of the society), and Mrs. Hughes, and Mr. A. B. Peck (secretary of the society).

The story of this peal, in which the order of ringing was J. C. Mitchell \(1-2\), W. H. L. Buckingham 3-4, C. F. Winney \(5^{-6}\), G. F. McLaughlin \(7-8\), was told in reminiscent vein by the survivors. The idea of attempting such a performance dawned upon Mr. C. F. Winney, the wellknown ringer, after a peal of Holt's Original on January 25 th, in which Messrs. Mitchell and Buckingham took part. These two ringers, whose ages were then 19 and 20 respectively, came from St. Albans daily to London for business. The first practice took place on February \(9^{\text {th, }}\), the condition being no calls, but mistakes corrected Nithout stopping. On February 25th, this being the eighth time of meeting, the band met at the residence of Mr. Winney, and upon the arrival of Mr. Mitchell, who had been detained at business until to p.m., it was decided to commence the peal, which was successfully brought round at \(1.20 \mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m}\).

The public performance at the headquarters of the Ancient Society of College Youths was a different proposition. A demonstration that the band was equal to the task was given on March 2nd, when two-thirds of the peal was rung. Another start was made on March 8th, when 4,600 changes were rung, and the clock of St. Paul's struck eleven so hard that one of the band thought he counted 13 and in consequence came to grief! The peal was finally accomplished on the irth, the day being the 33 rd anniversary of the silent peal of Stedman Triples, which was rung at the Whittington and Cat, Bethnal Green, by Messrs. Cox, Cooter, Haley and Wood. The peal was umpired by Mr. W. Barron, of the Rayal Cumberland Society, and Mr. J. W. Rowbotham, of the

Ancient Society of College Youths, who took down each lead as rung.

Of the survivors, Mr. Buckingham celebrated his 8ist birthday last Tuesday. He joined the Abbey Guild at St. Albans Cathedral in 1884, was elected a member of the College Youths in 1885, and has some 400 peals to his credit. A prominent Freemason, he is a Past Grand Standard Bearer of the Grand Lodge of England and a Past Grand Registrar of the Province of Hertfordshire. Mr. Mitchell joined the St. Albans Society in 1885 and was elected a College Youth in the same year. He had the distinction of being elected the first honorary member of the Central Council. His business life was spent in London Transport. Upon retirement in 1933 on the construction of the London Passenger Transport Board, he was secretary and treasurer to the London General Omnibus Company, Ltd., and allied companies. Since 1923 he has been a J.P. for the City of London. He is a Past Master of the Worshipful Company of Coachmakers and Coach Harnessmakers, and in Masonic circles is a Past Grand Deacon of the Grand Lodge of England and a Past Senior Grand Warden of the Province of Hertfordshire. Of the other two who have passed over, Mr. Winney died in 1940, having been elected a College Youth in 1879, and Mr. Geo. F. McLaughlin was elected a College Youth in 1881, Master in 1886 and died in 1929. The anniversary is one which we can recall with just pride, and the coincidence is that it has been celebrated in a vintage year of handbell ringing with the first peal of Cambridge Surprise Royal in hand-a happy omen for the future of this side of the Exercise.

\section*{FIRST ANNUAL MEETING.}

For their first annual general meeting the Southwell Guild visited their newly-formed Newark District on April 12th and were rewarded with an attendance in the region of 60 . Ringing was indulged in on Newark's heavy ten from 2.30 to 5 , when the entire company assembled at the Barnbygate Restaurant for tea, where they were joined by the Guild president, the Bishop of Southwell.
The Bishop expressed his pleasure at meeting the members of the Guild in force for the first time and emphasised the need for spade work in isolated districts where instructors are hard to find.

After an exhaustive discussion it was decided that a report must be printed of this first yeer's operations, during which the menbership had grown to 230,31 peals had boen rung ranging from Grandsire Doubles to Kent Treble Bob Royal and much fresh ground broken. The secretary was instructed to proceed with the compilation of a report which shoula be as concise a record as possible and bo as nearly as possible a direclory of the towers in the area.
It was further decided to make a charge of 6 d. for this report when available with a recommendation to tower secretaries to ask those who could to pay 1s., and to increase the annual subscription to 2. 6d. in 1948 to include a free report. No charge was made in the general officers, the Bishop. Canon Wilkinson, Miss Thompson and T. Groombridge, jun., being re-elected en bloc as president, chairman, hon. treasurer and hon. secretary respectively. Canon Wilkinson and Miss Thompson were elected trustees, and Messrs. F. W. Brown and P. E. Ball auditors. The sum of three gumeas was voted from the Bell Restoration Fund to Rampton, where an augmentation is in land.

Mention was made of the Leicester Guild's outstanding success in scoring the first of Surprise Royal 'in hand,' and the secretary was asked to convey to the band the congratulations of the meeting on such a meritorious performance.
In conclusion, the chairman noted the progress of 1946, not measured in any spectacular achievement, but in the opening up of new ground and getting the far ends of the area together, in short, the benefits of organising on a diocesan basis, which could never have been hoped for on the far flung basis of pre1946 days, and looked forward to the day when the Bishop's exhortation to cultivate the village towera had borne fruit and every tower was an active umit of the Guild.

\section*{GOLDSMITH MEMORIAL BELL.}

An announcement was made at the annual meeting of Guildford Diocesan Guild on April 19th that the sacring bell for the new Guildford Cathedral, which is to be the ringers' memorial to Mr. J. ©. Goldsmith, the first secretery of the Guild, will be handed over on the anniversary of Mr. Goldsmith's death in June.
Mr G. L. Grover (secretary) explained that the diocesan authorities had received a licance to complete the crypt into a chapel and had notified the Guild that the be!! would he required. An order for the bell had boen given to Messrs. Mears and Stainbank and delivery had been promised about the anniversary of Mr. Goldsnith's death. So far \(£ 56\) had been raised towards the oost of £70, and contributions were invited. About the anniversary, in the first week in June, the Guild hoped to stage some ceremony for the handing over of the bell.
The Rev. K. C. Davis, who presided, said the Bishop felt that while there were so many people homeless, the work of completing the Cathedral should not be put in hand. It might be possible to start again in two years' time.
The report of the Executive Conmittee gave the strength of the Guild as 430 ringing members ( 70 life and unattached, 41 Service members) and 95 honorary. As to restorations, Chertsey (8) and Merrow (6) lad been rehung: Dunsfold (6) and Hascombe (5) recast and rehung; Walton-on-Thames (8) rehanging in progress. Restoration work at Shere, Wonersh, Ash and Bagshot was contemplated, and at Send the church authorities intended to provide a peal of six as their war memorial.

Losses by death included Major J. H. B. Hesse (first Master), the Rev. A. C. Tranter (Egham), Mr. H. Baldock (Cobham), hon. members; Mr. A. E. King (Farnham) and Mr. H. Harris (Guildford), ringing members.

During 1946, 46 peals were rung against 52 in 1945. This slight falling off was more than counterbalanced by the fact that there were 20 first pealers compared with 12 in the previous year. Five of the peals were \(1 u n g\) outside the diocese and 16 diocesan towers claimed one or more of the remsining 41. Although there were 10 conductors once again, untortunately there were no claims to ifirst as conductor.'
The balance slueet, presented by Mr. J. Corbett, showed that the balance in hand had increased from \(£ 472 \mathrm{~s}\). 5 d . to \(£ 58\). The Benevolent Fund stood at \(583 \mathrm{13s}\). 5 d .
The report and acoounts were adopted. The Master (Mr. A. Harmam) reported the death of Mr James, of Cobham. In his memory a new Surprise peal had been dedicated Cobham Surprise. The Master also made acknowledgment of the services of Mr. W. H. Viggens in connection with the Guild's new peal book, and Mr. A. C. Hazelden mentioned that the Guild was indebted to Mr. Harman for making a fiue box for the custody of the book.
Mr. A. C. Hazelden announced a veluable addition to the Guild library by Supt. Hilton (Surrey Police) of a copy of Campanologia Improved,' by C. A. Bettesworth, dated 1733. It was a thind edition and the book had been restored by Mr. Viggers. A welcome addition wes from Mr. Shuker (secretary of the Lancashire Association) of instructional books issued by his Association.
There was only one change in the elections. Mr. R. Hasted being succeeded by Mr. Lestio Hunter as hon. auditor. In appreciation of his services in the Fernham District the Guild conferred on Mr. Hasted a vice-presidency
The Guild service was held in St. Nicolas Church, the Rev. K. C. Daris giving the address and Mr. W. A. Dollimore (Aldershot) read the lesson. Ter was served in St. Nicolas' Ha11, and ringing took place at the Guild churches and Mernow and Shalford. Those who contributed to the succes of the meeting were thanked.

Mr. WILLIAM C. JAMES.
Captain of the Cobham (Surrey) band for orer 40 rears, Mr. William C. James died on April 8th, aged 69. He started ringing aq Cobham in 1903, was elected captain in 1906 and continued in office until last year

Cobliam ringers earned the title of 'the haply family. With Mr. Jemes they were always prominent at Guild meetings, and thes same friendliness prevailed in the vilage where thene were over 30 honorary members of the Guild recruited mainly by Mr. James.

Mr. James was very methodical. He kept records of practice and service ringing and was a good instructor.

The funeral service was on April 11th, the Guildford Guild being represented by Mr. A. Harman (Master) and Mr. Arthur Smith (secretary, Leatherhead district). The bells of the Parish Church were rung half-muffled. Cremation was at Woking.

\section*{MR. J. J. PRATMT}

Just before the war parishioners and ringing friends preseuted Mr. Pratt with an armehair, and his old friend William Honor a clock, as mark of appreciation of the 50 years service of each in St. John's belfry. Mr. Pratt did a good deal of ringing locally and in neigh bouring districts.
No accurate record of his peals is known at the moment, but it was round about a hundred Stens have been taken to see that Mr. Iratt's ringing papers and his handbells are not last to the Frercise.

Jack Pratt endeared limself to all who knew him. His kindly disposition, dry humour, patience and understanding made him we.l. fitted to lead the ringers. He was parficularly popular with the voungsters, who held him in great esfeem and regarded him with undisguised affection.

\section*{AN OLD EVESHAM BELL FOUNDRY}

As far back as 1690 Malthew Bagley, a member of the noted founders of Chacombe, Northants, set up a foundry in Evesham. He was followed by Clark and IBushell, whe married on business as be? founders in Evesham at Merstor Gircen. It was ahout 1705 that rings of hells cast hy this firm became apparent, and two noted rings in the district, viz. Hinton-on-the-Green and Badsey, were cast by them. The IInton bells were a ring of five, now augmented to eight by Taylors in 1931

There are several individual bells bearing Clark's name or the founder's trade mark in Worcestershire and Wiarwickshire. This consisted of a square or oblong surmounted by the svmbors IHS with a cross rising out of the H.

On a bell at Hinton enclosed in the square is a Latin inscription: "Me RenoVaVit. Q.V. Clark I.V.V. Vs DaVi VVarnenI et pro VotIs; (William Clark necast me at the crders of David Warren and in fulfilment of vows).

Arranging the capitals as Roman numerals, we arrive at the date of casting, 1705. This clever and ingenious chronogram, as trade mark and inseription, is both unu-ual and interesting, and is peculiar to these old craftsmen. whose on'r memorial now is the tuneful ring of bells still in uze in certain of our chureh towers. \section*{' GRANDISON \({ }^{\prime}\)}

Every young ringer, if the word 'Grandison' is mentioned to him, would unhesitatingly reply, 'That's the name of the tenor of Exeter Cathedral.' Few, however, have heard of John Grandison, the Bishop of Exeter from \({ }^{1} 327-1369\), who is commemorated by this famous tenor of \(7^{2}\) cwt. 2 qr .2 lb ., which was recast by Messrs. Taylors in 1902 from the original bell of 1729 . Grandison was a great builder. Under his enthusiastic leadership the nave of the Cathedral was completed and vaulted, and the bell is a worthy homage to the great Bishop.

The thoughts of the Exercise reverted to Exeter in our last issue, and congratulations are extended to the St . Martin's Guild on their fine achievement. In particular, mention should be made of Wilfred Williams and John S. Mason, who rang the massive tenor, and George E. Fearn who turned in the eleventh bell, which is named 'Stafford.' This is the first peal of Stedman Cinques at Exeter since the war. Peals here are no light achievement, and occupy a place of honour in any ringer's peal book.

Only on one occasion has 'Grandison' been rung HEAVIEST BELLS

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An interesting sidelight on the old bells is contained in 'The Bells News' of 1892 of a ringing tour in Devon by the Rev. F. E. Robinson and the Rev. (i. F. Coleridge. This states: 'The bells were raised, the front six in peal, ten or a dozen men being required for the job, and a few rounds rung on the ten, when someone suggested a course of Caters, no such thing ever having been rung by any men, the bad go of the bells and weight of metal, tenor 67 cwt., being supposed to militate against them. Though 16 men are accustomed to ring the ten, the visitors stuck to the nine changing bells single-handed, allowing only four to the tenor. Marvellous to relate, the course was rung, and well rung too, as testified by those outside. On this historic occasion, the first touch ever brought round on the ten bells, we may be permitted to append the names of the gallant band: H. G. Fruin 1, J. W. Taylor 2, E. A. Pitstow 3, N. J. Pitstow 4, Rev. F. E. Robinson 5, W. W. Gifford 6, F. Shepherd 7, Rev. G. I. Coleridge 8, J. W. Washbrook 9, Rev. W. S. Willett, E. Shepherd, B. Mundy and J. W. Carnell 10. While cooling down after their exertions, the six minutes' ringing being far harder than the nine hours occupied by the other peals, the local men kindly rang the minor eight with the noble gth covering, that the visitors might listen to the wondrous and plaintive melody.' To use a colloquialism of this day and generation, 'Those were the days!'

'The Ringing World ' was founded in the year 1911 by John Sporkes Goldsmith, who remained its proprietor and editor until his death in 1942.

That noted Lincolnshire trio of haudbell ringers, Mr. and Mrs. J. Bray and Mr. G. E. Feirn, have advenced still further by ringing a peal of spliced Minor in 69 methods to 176 changes of method. They liad the good fortune to ring this peal at the first attempt. Their nest hurdle is one of 91 methoods.
Next week's issue will be e Princess Eilizabeth number. All peals and quarter-peals rung in hontour of her coming-of-age received will be published.
This week's golden wodding is from Norton Subcourse, Norfolk, the happy couple being Mr. D. Fenn, a local ringer, and lis wife. A quarter-peal of Minor ( 240 London. Cambridge, Norwich, Kent and 360 Oxford) was rung on April 21st by A. I. Walpole 1, A. E. Long 2, S. Goodswen 3. S. Fenn 4, G. G. Walpole (conductor) 5, D. A. Long 6 .
We are informed that the peal of Norfolk Surprise Major rung at Oxford on April 11th and claimed as the first in the method for the Oxford Diocesan Guild was 13 years late. The first peal in this method was rung by members of the East Berks and South Bucks Branch on June 16 th , 1934, at Hughenden, conducted by George Martin. Another peal in the same method was also rung on October 19th, 1935, at Hughenden, conducted by Harry Wingrove.
Christ Ohurch, Swindon, ringers were called upon revently to perform an unusual task. A lady parishioner had left instructions that for her funeral the bells were to be rung as at, a wedding! As there was no traditional procodure to give a guide it was decided to ring before the service and after the interment. Thus the cortege arrived to the music of rounds, queens and fring, and as the mourners left the churchyard the hells were again lung in wedding style.

THE CHESTER DIOCESAN GUILD OF CHURCH BELLRINGERS
}

A
T the Chester Diocesan Conferellce held in the autumn of 1887 a topic somewhat new to this august body was introduced by the Archdeacon of Chester. He spole at some length on the position of ringers in relation to the Church and of the advantages to be gained from the formation of an Association of ringers within the Diocese. A lively discussion followed, and the resolution, "That it is desirable to form a Diocesan Guild or Association of Church Bellringers,' was carried unanimiously. It was to give effect to this resolution that a meeting of clergy and ringers was held in the refectory of the ancient Abbey of St. Werburgh on Saturday, November 12 th , when representatives of some 30 parishes attended.
The project was reccived with great ellthusiasm. Archdeacon Barber was elected to the chair and the meeting set to work with energy and determination upon the task before it. The title of Guild, was adopted in favour of 'Assoclatiou' '; its objects were
clearly defined and clearly defined and
rules drawn up. It is a significant fact that these rules, in the main, have stood the test of 60 years. A selected comnittee be gan the work of organisation, and ly the following Marcll four branches had bcen formed with some 170 members.
Of this very able cominittee, two members are especially remembered, though ueither ever liandled a bell. As founder of the Guild, Archideacon Barber took an active and unbounded interest in it we'fare for over a
quarter of a century. quarter of a century.
His was the guiding hand in tho guiding
days and with pride he saw it grow to maturity and prosperity. He was elected the first 3 laster in 1891, and though he repeatedly tried to resign in favour of one who should have practical knowledge, he was never allowed to do so and remained the undoubted leader to the last. His death in 1914 robbed the Guild of its greatest benefactor, and to keep green his memory a tablet was erected in the Cathedral and unveiled on May 27th, 1916.
Mr. H. A. Heywood (cousin of Sir Arthur) served the Guild faithfully throughout a long life, which closed but a short time ago. The fint annual meeting elected him secretary and treasurer, an office which he maintained with characteristic vigour until a breakdown in health compelled him to resign in 1894 . His interest, however, never wavered. He was Master in 1921-2 and held office in the Chester Branch until shortly before his death. He represented the Guild at the first meeting of the Central Council in 1890 .
From a promising beginning the Guild rapidly devoloped. Seven branches had been formed by the siminer of \(\quad 88\), end the secretary's report at the second annual festival recorded a meniberslip of 437. The same Year the Duke of Westminster becanie patron. The anmual festival was an increasingly popular event with eddresses given by outstanding clerics. The Bishop preached the festival sermon at Birkenhead in 1890 to a gathering of over 200. while the Rev. F. E. Robinson came
up from Drayton to address an equally large congregation at Crewe a year or two later There were signs of activity everywhere and the Guild grew from strength to strength. Tlue position of the ringer as an officer of the Church was established and his craft recognised as an integral part of worship. The restoration and augmentation of rings in the diocese went on apace and the Guild gave of its increasing funds to help in all directions. It is perhaps a matter for regret that in the zeal for restoration many ancient bells of considerable interest were destroyed.
The Rev. Richard Greenall, Rector of Grappenhall, followed Mr. Heywood as secretary and held the office with distinction for 11 years. He had been a staunch supporter from the beginning and had quickly founded the Grappenhall Branch, which had the honour of ringing the first peal of Surprise Minor for

Exercise generally. He was for many years a member of the Central Council, where he did invaluable work on the Analysis and Records Committees. His peals numbered over 400 , among them being the first peals of Yorkshire and Peterborough Surprise, and he was also one of the band which rang the first clerical Surprise peal in 1912 . Mr. Beeston was also a pioneer in spliced Minor ringing, in which he saw great opportunities and new interests for six-bell towers. Failing health compelled him to resign office in 1922, but he remained as treasurer for some time before he finally retired. He died at Knutsford in 1933, and a tablet in his church at New Mills commemorates his life and work.
From small beginnings the Crewe Branch maintained steady progress and is to-day one of the most active in the Guild. The energy of its officials and the enthusiasm of its members makes 14 meetings
a year the normal pracat year the normal prac-

Olements, who was Master from 1925 to 1934 . Stockport, in the north-east of the diocese, has been an active ringing centre for well over a century. As long ago as 1819 it is recorded that an accomplished band from this town visited Ashton-under-Lyne on the occasion of the opening of the new bells, while a band from nearby Mottram rang a peal of Caters at the Ohesterfield opening in the following year. As might be expected, the Guild has no keener members than those of the Bowdon end Stockport Branch and many 'first in the method by the Guild ' peals have been rung by them. It was a great achievement when, in 1906, the then record length of Kent, 16,800 changes, was rung at Mottram, and the peak of Minor ringing was reached when 84 methods were spliced in a peal at Disley in 1938. Handbel ringing, too, has long been envong the activities of this branch. Stockport possesses two rings of ten, and the Guild Library. founded by the late Rov. A. T. Beenton, is housed in by the late Rov. A. T. Beeston, is'
the ringing chamber of \(\mathbf{S t}\). George's.
Tho Rer. A. T. Beeston berame sceretary of the branch in 1904 and guild secretery three years later. He was a ringer and organiser of exceptionel ability, and among the many able men who served the Guild during the presant century his name stande out above all others. His counsel was much sought after not only in the Chester diocese, but by the
in 1919 when he was Mayor of Crewe. The Guild was very much the poorer by his death the following rear.
The Wirral district of Cheshire, between Dee and Mersey, has many bells, and some 70 of its ringers had enrolled as members when the Guild was buta few months old. With a preponderance of six-bell towers a keen interest Hras naturally been taken in Minor ringing

spring. Here, until the church was bad!y damaged during the war, Surprise Minor was a feature of service ringing, and many multimethod peals were also rung. Mr. J. W. Milner, of Wallasey, became Master in 1935 and although not a ringer, his sound judgment and genial manner made lim a popular figure. His resignation last year was accepted with sincere regret.
The Eastern Branch is centred lound the silk town of Macclesfield, and the Guild is justly proud of its only ring of twelve in the tower of St. Michael's. These fine bells were installed in 1923, and the first peal, Kent Treble Bob Maximus, was rung a few months later. The diocose gained another ring of ten bv the augmentation of the eight at Christ Ohurch. The opening ceremony took place on March 15th, following ani ambitious restoration scheure whicl also provided for the lowering of the frame by some 30 ft. This lofty tower, with bells hung high within, had. by its excessive oscillation, presented a rery consider-

ablo problem to ringers since the late 18 th century. The fact that these beils had been
kept going and peals rung gives some indication of the enthusiasm of the members of this branch.

The Northwich Brancll was inaugurated largey by the efforts of Mr. H. Hatt-Cook, another instance of a non-ringer who interested himself in Guild affairs and who was for a considerable time a member of the committee. In one way or another, Mr. Hatt-Cook was actively associated with the Guild and brancl for 35 years. Until recently peal ringing was not a feature of the activities of this branch, a!though there are a number of first-ciass rings within the area where servicu ringing has always been well done. Of late years, however, peals have cansiderably increased, and it is gratifying to note the large number of "first pealers' during the last year or two, a certain pointer to future activity. The Rev. W. R. Ingham, Vicar of Middlewich, was Guild secretary 1931-5.
Ringing in the Chester Branch naturally sentres round the Cathedral, and in its massive tower the first Guild peal, Grandsire Triples,
was rung in June, 1889. The note of the tenor was rung in June, 1889. The note of the tenor
is as well known to the citizens as that of Big Ben itself, for the bell has been rumg as the curfew every evening beyond living memary; Last summer, on the occasion of the royal visit to the city, the ringers were presented to their Majesties by the Dean, a happy incident which gave pleasure and satisfaction to the whole Exercise. The Central Council met in Choster in 1925 and its members had an opportunity of ringing on some of the fine bells in the neighbourhood. The eight at Eccieston are of outstanding merit, and the name of the lute Mr. H. W. Wilde, eminent compuser and conductor, was long associated with them. The Chester Branch is proud, too, of Mr. Robert Sperring, who at Over in 1923 oonducted the record length of Kent Treble Bob Major, 17,280 changes, in ten hours, and who is the only member to ring over 500 peals for the Guild.
The year 1937 was a memorable one. The Guild celebrated its jubilee in a manner fitting to the occesion when it sponsored a project for the augmentalion of the Cathedral bells and to which it gave very substantial help. At the annual festival, ropes attached to the new balls hung down to the crossing below and were handed by the Master to the Dean, who accepted them on behalf of the Cathedral. The Mother Church now possessed a fine ring of ten, and the B.B.C. broadeast a course of Caters, with a running commentary on the ringing, a few days later. A jubilee dinner was also held in the city and was attended by many Church dignitaries and ringers from all parts of the diocese, five of whom had been present at the inaugural meeting 50 years previously.
The Guild was now in its lheyday. In 1938 no less than 124 peals were recorded in the annual report with 198 members taking part, a record of activity, progress and prosperity. There was no cloud in the sky save the cloud of war, which was so soon to stamp ringing temporarily out of existence. When the ban was finally lifted and a new. start made, the Guild, like every other, found its ranks depleted and the old order changed. Its enthusiosm, however, wes undaunted and it set upon the work of rebuilding with vigour. And what of the future? The Chester Diocesall Guild can look back with satisfaction over 60 fears of achievement, and remember with pride the many stalwarts, ringers and non-ringers alike, who have given faithful service; signs are not wanting that it can look formard to the future with confidence.

FROM THE EDITOR'S POSTBAG

\section*{BATH AND WELLS MEMBERSHIP}

Dear Sir,-It is not my usual practice to reply to enonymous letters, but in plain justice to those loyal and hard-working local secretaries of the Batlu and Wells Diocesan Associa tion of Change Ringers, I feel that I must ask you to publish this reply. The strength of an association of ringers iles in the number of its men and women who Sunday by Sunday ring its bells for service, so that the figures I give are those of resident ringing members, and ignore honorary and life members.
In 1920, a year mentioned by your cor respondent, there were 845 members ; in 1931, 1,350; in 1932, 1,291; in 1933, 1,274; in 1938, 1,417. My figure of over 1,200 given at Laster, 1947, could not be definite, as returns from one branch had not como in, but here is the figure now. In 1946, 1,387. Indeed food for thought, and little sign of decadence. One item escaped, unaccountably, our critic's vigilance. More food for thought. Towers aftiated: In 1922, 106 ; in 1946, 158.

I regret that so far we have made only one ringer for overy 310 of our Somerset population. But since our critic is so fond of tigures, let him with Whitaker's Almanac and pencil and paper retire to a corner, and, using 310 as a divisor, work out some little sums. The results may surpise him. They may even leach him something.

I cannot prophesy the 1947 figures. We lure raised our subscription from 1 s , to \(1 \mathrm{~s} .6 \mathrm{~d} .\), and that may make a reduction in uumbers, bul there are few signs of it yet. On the other hand there are signs of increasing activity in nearly ell our branches.
To my Somerset friends I would say I miss William Cave, and you are going to miss him. For some years ho printed your repurt at a price which left him little or 110 profit. From the time be got the copy no more tian 10 days or so elapsed before he delivered the reports. How different it is to-day. Your report will cost you threo times as much per page, and although tho printer has had the copy for ton weeks, he wrote this morning regretting that he lias not yet been able to send me more than half of the proofs.

Your association managed to live on its shilling subsaription, and to give away some not inconsiderable sums. It did this only because of its comparatively large numbers, and if it is to remain solvent on 1 s . 6 ., either some of its expenses must be cut down, or it must increase its membership. You will no doubt think that the latter is preferable, so will you please lend your best efforts to that end.-

Dear Sir,-In the details you give of the e hells the 3rd is recorded as W. Evans 1729. but I would point out that this bell was recest by Messis. Taylor in 1915 after being cracked. The carrect weight of the 6 th is 10 cwt .1 qr . 2 lb . The 7th is given as W. Evans 1902, but although the original bell was by Evans in 1729, it was recast at Loughborough in 1902 .

The founder of the half-tone 6th is T. Pennington 1630. The tenor 'Grandison' was named as a bell as far back as 1396, but it has beell recast sereral times, by Pennington 1629, Evans 1729 and at Loughborough in 1902. - Yours faithfully,

It must be admitted that, despite the fact that there was no indication of whether one was going up or down, or dodging (the ringers of thai time didn't know what those terms meant anyway) they rang their 120 's tolerably well

Woe betide the ringer, however, who lost his place on his card, for none could put him right and the ringing must inevitably etop. Mr. Groom, at the time of which I am writing, was but a lad and made a creditable effort to broak away from tradition and learnt to ring without the cards. If anything weni wrong with tho ringing he was invariably blamed, but has evidently persevered and outlived the criticism levelled at him.
Mention of the cards reminds me that whocver printed them had no lettens by whicls he could indicate that the ringer was royuired to lead, so ho used the \(£\) sign. Thus the card for tho second read \(£ £ 34513451\) ff. etc., and the other cards corresponded. This was always a source of amusement to visitors. - Yours faithfully,

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\section*{A ROYAL COMING-OF-AGE}

Collected in this issue of 'The Ringing World' are the peals and quarter-peals rung in honour of the coming-ofage of Princess Elizabeth. Bells perhaps more than any other method express the felicitations of the people, and ringing on April 21st was widespread-far more extensive than indicated by the peals and quarter-peals recorded. Of the 25 peals, these were distributed over 18 counties, extending from Devonshire to Lancashire and from Cardiganshire to Norfolk.

Naturally the civic authorities took an interest in the ringing. At Norwich the Lord Mayor ascended to the ringing chamber of St. Giles-on-the-Hill, accompanied by the Vicar (the Rev. D. E. Rae), to greet the ringers, and they remained in the ringing chamber during the opening courses of the peal-Superlative Surprise Major.

Another peal of Superlative was rung in the adjoining county, at Spalding, and this was the first peal in the method by all except the conductor. The spirit of venturing on something new was also displayed at Southport, where a peal of Spliced Kent and Oxford Treble Bob was rung, which was the first peal in the method by all the band.

The finest achievement of the day was in the Cardiganshire village of Llanbadarn Fawr, near Aberystwyth, where four of the band were ringing their first peal. One hour from the end the oil lamp in the ringing chamber went out-not from a lack of oil but from a short wick, Towards the end each ringer saw of the rest of the band as little more than shadows. Many a company would have abandoned the peal under such conditions. Llanhadarn Fawr were worthy representatives of the Principality.

An event of this character is an occasion for veterans. The oldest was Mr. A. H. Snow, who at Littleham, Devon, rang the tenor to a peal of Grandsire Triples on his 81st birthday. The stamina of many of our elderly ringers is amazing. To ring for 2 hours and 50 minutes continuously at the age of 81 , while in no sense a record, is a feat in which any individual can take a just pride. Of all the bells that were rung, those most familiar to Her Royal Highness were at Windsor Parish Church. Here the peal was on the following Saturday, and was earmarked for a dual purpose-the 24th anniversary of the King and Queen's wedding day and the 21st birthday of Princess Elizabeth.

At Newport, I. of W., at the completion of the quarterpeal, the bells were fired 21 times. Good wishes and every happiness are extended to Her Royal Highness from the many belfries' of the land.

Some year or so later rumours began to be current in London that he called the peal from manuscript. About this time I met Jack Austin for the first time at a meeting at Woodclester, Glos. and told him of the rumour. He told me that after trying the tenor to a few rounds Mr. Pye said, You had better call this peal, Jack. I shall have as much as I want here.' Giving a hurried glance at a composition, he started to call the peal.
About a course before the tuming course he became uncertain of the calling of that particular course and asked the spare man, who was in the tower, to give Mr. Pye some esaist ance if it were needed, to get the neal from his pocket so that he could reassure himself, which he did. After glancing at the figures they were put away again. Mr. Austin told me that had he not seen the figures at all it would have been all right, but there was just that little uncertainty in his mind and he wanted to make quite certain.

Dear Sir,-Your leading article of April 18th dealing with composers' manuscripts prompts wo to question whether the machinery sug gested for their preservation should be considered adequate.
The establishment of repositories for manuscripts might prevent their wanton deitruction, but would hardly preserve them from oblivion, since they would be geographically inaccessible to most people and not readily available to anyone but the custodian. A wider dissemination of technical literature would seem essential if the present generation of somposers is to be relieved from the vecessity of repeating for themselves the work done by their predecessors.

In your leader you cite existing restrictions as a bar to publication of such information, though even when rationing ends, it is doubt ful whether prospective readers will be sufficiently numerous to support printed editions of advanced text books. There are, however, eeveral methods of reproduction, employing stencils or lithographic piates, which are cheaper than letterpress printing and eminently suitable for runs of a few fundred copies.
I suggest that data at present lying dormant could usefully be duplicated by one of these processes for distribution to subscribers, and I wil!, if interest is shown in the idea, undertake a detailed investigation into the practical and financial aspects.

To this end I would be obliged if everyone interested would communicate wits me, indi-cating:-
(1) The kind of information they would like to see published.
'2) Whether they would prefer separate booklets on specific subjects, or a periodical containing in each issue elementary and ad vanced articles of interest to theorists, composers and conductors
(3) The amount they would be preparea to subscribe annually.
Since authors as well as readers are needed for success, corresnomdents should also stafe whether they would be willing to contribute articles and data for publication.- Yours sincerely,

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\section*{THE BELLS OF DEVON}

In view of the visit of the Central Council to Exeter at Whitsuntide, a few notes on some of the rings of bells in the county may be of interest. Ringers have their favourite towers. The relative qualities of the Heavitree, Tiverton, and Tavistock eights are often debated, while the magnificent tones of Pilton.(Barnstaple), South Molton and Crediton are acknowledged. Even so, amongst the 82 octaves in Devon there are many other fine examples of the bellfounders' craftsmanship, and we must not omit the fine ten at St. Andrew's, Plymouth ( 35 cwt .) and the splendid twelve at Buckfast Abbey ( 44 cwt.) The Cathedral twelve are famous.
Exeter is the natural centre of the county, and rail and bus routes radiate from it. To the east there are eights at Sowton (tenor 9 cwt.), Honiton Clyst ( 19 cwt .), Broadclyst ( 21 cwt.), Bradninch ( 20 cwt .) and Uffculme ( 24 cwt.), with a ten at Cullompton ( 19 cwt .). All these, except Bradninch, are good; the Cullompton ten, in a fine tower of the Somerset type, is of the highest repute. The fine old ring at Ottery St. Mary ( 20 cwt.) is out of action. In the Exmouth area there are eights at Withycombe Raleigh ( 15 cwt .) and Littleham (8). Both rings go well, though the ringing chamber at Littleham is rather cramped. Withycombe is one of the few Warner peals in the county.

On the bus routes from Exeter to Newton Abbot there are eights at Alphington ( 18 cwt .), Dawlish ( 14 cwt .), East Teignmouth ( 22 cwt .), West Teignmouth ( 14 cwt .), Kingsteignton ( 17 cwt .) and Chudleigh ( 15 cwt .). All these, except West Teignmouth and Dawlish, go well. East Teignmouth are difficult to hear inside the tower. At Newton Abbot are the eights at Highweek (14 cwt.), Wolborough ( 16 cwt .) and St. Leonard's ( 8 cwt .), a tower standing by itself in the main street. St. Leonard's bells do not go too well. A few miles west of Newton are the fine octaves of Ashburton ( 22 cwt .), Totnes ( 29 cwt .), Plympton St. Maurice ( 16 cwt .) and Plympton St. Mary ( 27 cwt.). Other eights on the borders of Dartnooor are Tavistock ( 24 cwt.), Bovey Tracey ( 4 cwt.), Moreton Hampstead ( 15 cwt .), Chagford ( 18 cwt .) and Okehampton ( \(16 \frac{1}{2}\) cwt.), and within the moor the eight at Buck-land-in-the-Moor ( 8 cwt .). All these go well, but to reach Buckland involves a drive through romantic country with precipitous inclines.

North of Exeter, along the Exe Valley, are eights at Silverton ( 17 cwt .), Thorverton ( 14 cwt .) and Tiverton
( 25 cwt.) The back bells at Thorverton go badly, but Tiverton is of real grandeur. To hear is to be impressed; to ring is to be convinced. A matter of eight miles north of Tiverton is Huntsham ( \(15 \frac{1}{2}\) cwt.), made famous by Col. Charles A. W. Troyte, the first president of the Guild. Crediton has a fine eight (tenor 27 cwt .), but the circle is not too good. Further north, along the ridges of the Taw and Torridge valleys, are many octaves of high repute and quality. Of these, perhaps Pilton ( 25 cwt.), with tenor reputed to be one of the finest bells in the country, and South Molton ( 24 cwt .) are outstanding. Even so, the eights at Torrington ( 15 cwt .), Bideford ( 16 cwt .) and Northam ( 15 cwt. ), are perfect in tone and go, and the dozen other eights will bear comparison with the best. Pilton are to be rehung. There are 224 six bell rings in the county, few of which can be classed as poor. Truly a ringer's paradise.-F.C.S.

\section*{Reorganises Finances to Meet New Situation}

The Middlesex Association marked its jubilee meeting by an overhaul of its financial position to meet the increased charges of to-day. The meeting was held at Ealing on Saturday with the president (Preb. W. P. Cole Sheane) in the chair, supported by the Rev. H.
Greatbatch (Vicar of St. Mary's, Ealing) and Mr. E. C. S. Turner (hon. secretary)
The annual report, presented by the hou. secretary, recorded the losses by death of Mr. C. T. Coles, general secretary and one of the loading men in the Exercise; Messrs. W. Fletcher (Beaconsfield), G. H. Gutteridge (Iver), J. H. B. Hesse (Wrington), H. Hoskins (Greenwich), G. P. Mitchell (Hilingdon) and W. Watson (Romford).

The year had seen a great revival of activity and a full programme of meetings was held with an average attendance of 32 . New members elected totalled 94, consisting of one honorary, 22 non-resident life members and 71 ringing members. Mr. W. C. Parker cole-
brated his 80 th birthday in August by taking part in a peal of Grandsire Triples. Mr. A. Harding completed his 50 th year of service as a. ringar at St. Mary's, Ealing.

Peals rung during 1946 totalled 76 , of which 39 wene on handbells; there were 18 conductors. Methods rung for the first time by the Associa tion were Hinton Surprise Major and Spliced Grandsire and Oxford Bob Triples. Seven members rang their first peals. Quarter-peals totaliled 51.
The Association was pleased to welcome the entire Hillingdon band as members and congratulated them on successfully augmenting their ring of six bells to eight.
In December, Mr. J. Thomas moved to Hinton-on-the-Green, near Evesham. During his many years in Middlesex he proved himself without equal in his success at teaching beginners. The handbell performances of the Edmonton and Enfield bands during the war were the admiration of the whole Exercise. They wished him many thappy years of retirement. The report concluded with a list of the valuable ringing books left the Association by the late Mr. C. T. Coles. The report was adopted.
In the absence of Mr. W. H. Oram (treasurer), Mr. Turner presented the accounts, which showed a deficit on the year's working of \(£ 195 \mathrm{~s} .9 \mathrm{~d}\). The accounts were adopted. Officers elected were as follows: President, Preb. W. P. Cole Sheane; vice-presidents, Mesars. W. H. and A. W. Coles; Master, Mr. Oharles Roberts; hon. treasurer, Mr. W. H assistant secretary, Mr. Leonard Bowler; auditor, Mr. E. M. Atkins; trustees, Messrs.
T. J. Lock, W. H. Oram and E. C. S. Turner. SUBSCRIPTION RAISED.
A series of resolutions to meet the increased sosts and keep the Association solvent was submitted by Mr. Turner. These included raising the subscription from January 1st, 1948 , from 1s. 6 d . to 2 s . 6 d .; charging life members and honorary members 1s. for the annual report: that the sum of 6 d . per ringer of a peal be charged for printing peals in the annual report. He explained that the last quotation he received for printing the report was 18s. a page, on which there were four peals. This worked out at 4 s .6 d . a peal. In 1897 a charge of 3 d . per ringer was made for printing peals.
These were seconded by Mr. C. Roberts
To the question of how much the extra 1 s . subscription would produco. Mr. Turner neplied £15, and to another question the stated that the assets of the Association were £192.
Opposition to the increased subscription was voiced by Mr. C. C. Mayne. 'We have eccumulated £192 and have been putting money in the bank for a rainy day,' he said. 'Now it had come we should spend it.'
The Secretary : I shall refuse to do so. If the resolution is not passed I shall print the the resolution is not pas
report every other year.

Mr. W. H. Coles commented that the subscription of 2 s .6 d . was about what most members paid to go to the pictures, and Mr. J. I. Lewis Cockey reminded the members that 2s. 6 d . was not the price of a 'packet of fags.
Mr. Jones suggested as an alternative a charge of 3 d . be made for attendance at meetings.
The resolution to increase the subscription was carried by a substantial majority, as was that of charging life nembers and hon. members for the annual report.
Mr. Mayne was in opposition again over the charge of 6 d . per ringer for printing peals. Peals will not be rung for the Association, he said.
Mr. Turner replied that he was not frightened by that suggestion. They would find that other associations would adopt the same rule.
The new rule was passed and it was decided make it operative as from July 1st next. Mr. Turner: People will not be able to say in 10 'years' time that they had a secretary who whittied away what had been seved up hy his predecessor.
New members elected were Miss F. H. Friswell and Miss H. V. Hare (Upper Clapton), Mr. David Charnlev (Isleworth), Messrs. N. G. Hollingworth, E. Prior and H. W. Barnard (Holloway), and Mr. F. Oakshott (non-resident life member)

\section*{ORIGINAL MEMBERS HONOURED}

Mr. Turner reminded the meeting that that was their 50 th anniversaxy and they had still with them some original members of the Association. He proposed and Mr. A. W. Coles seconded that honorary life membership be conferred on these members. Those to bo so honoured are Messrs. W. Baldwin (Barnet), H. Ohandler (Heston), W. Honor (Hillingdon), C. H. Martin (Hendon), W. Pickworth (Richmond). The meeting expresced its approval by a hearty round of applause.
Returning thanks, Mr. Chandler said the spadework for the formation of the Association was done in the Churoh Room, Heston. Most of them had now passed over-Mr. Pratt was one of them. He hoped the Middlesex would continue to flourish.

MR. W. F. MORETON THE NEW MASTER.
The annual meeting of the Society was held on April 29th at New College, the president, the Rev. C. E. Wigg, being in the chair. The treasurer's report, showing a balance of \(£ 12\) 8s. 8d., was approved.
The Master's report stated that last term had seen steady progress, there now being a resident band capable of Double Norwich. Surprise ringing by this band should be attained in the near future. Week-end outings had also been very succossful. No tower-bell peals had been rung, although there had been two attempts, including one made without the aid of the Society's usual conductors. Four peals had, however, been scored 'in hand,' including the first peal of Winchester Bob Major to be rung on handbells.
An encouraging feature of the term had been the appearance of several potential conductors in the ranks of the Society.
During the vacation three peals were scured during a long week-end at Hereford, including the Society's first peal of Surprise, Bristol Surprise Major," at Ross-on-Wye. Two membors were to be congratulated on xinging Gheir first peals, and a third on calling her first, during the vacation.

The hon. secretary reparted that the committee formed to deal with the 50 th anniversary proposed to lold a dinuer at Slaters, The Strand, on October 25th, tickets 12 s . Attendance would be limited to 120 , and the first 120 who sent a remittance would be allotted tickets.
Another function in counection with the anniversary is the meeting at Acton on June 7th, at the invitation of the Rector, to be held in the Rectory or Rectory grounds.
Regarding the memorial fund to the late Mr. C. T. Coles, Mr. Turner said it was proposed to provide one or two beils in one of the blitzed London cluurches. It was undikely, however, that they would be able to spend the money for a long time as bell founders were booked up. They had been waiting at Christ Church 18 months for the bells to be relung. He asked members to contribute towards the fund as generously as passibio.
Clerkenwell was selected for the next annual meeting, alternatives voted upon being Fulham, Southgate and Holloway.
The best wishes and Godspeed of the meeting were extended by Mr. Lewis Cockey to Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Botham, of Willesden, who are shortly proceeding to South Africa.
A message was received from Mr. W. G. Wilson conveying his best wishes and stating he would be pleased to see any visitors in an evening. The meeting sent to him its good wishes for a speed recovery
The work of Mr. Turner as hon. secretary was recognised by a vote of thanks moved by Mr. C. C. Mayne.
From the chair, Mr. W. H. Coles, who presided at the latter part of the meeting, thanked the Vicar of St. Mary's for permitting the Guild service to be held in his church and also for the use of the bells, the Vicar of St Stephen's for the use of the bells, Mr. Harding for splicing the ropes, and Mr. Clarke and Mrs. Miller for providing teas.
Preb. W. P. Cole Sheane conducted the Guild service, which was attended by about 120 members and friends.

MR. JOHN A. FREEMAN THE NEW MASTER.
Tive annual meeting was held at Lincoln on April 26th. Ringing rook piace at the Cathedral and at St. Peter-at-Gowts in the afternoon, and the ringers attended evensong at the Cathedral. Viasketgate, was followed by the business meeting, wluch was presided over by Canou Marsden, Vicar of Grimsby, in the una voidable absenoe of the Dean of Lincoln (president).
Befare the commencement of business, the chairnan paid a tribute to the fate Master, Mr. Rupert Richardson, who died in January last, and who had occupied the office since the death of the Rev. H. Law James in 1932. He said that besides being a great bellringer, Mr. Richardson was a great man in all respects.
Canon Carnegie, president of the Flloe Deaneries Branch, also spoke of the esteem in which tho late Master was held, both as a ringer and as a good man and churohman. At the request of the chairman, the meeting stood in silence as a tribute of respect.
The Dean of Lincoln was re-elected president, and Mr. F. W. Stokes hon. secretary and tneasurer. Mr. John A. Freeman, the wellknown Master of the Cathedral company, was unanimously elected Master of the Guild. Mr. Freeman brings knowledge and experience to his affice, and it is felt that he will prove a worthy successar to the two previous Guild Masters. Mr. Richardson was also one of the Guild's representatives on the Central Council, and Mr. Stanley Bennett, of Spalding, wis elected to fill his pilace.

\section*{MEMORIAL TO MR. RUPERT RICHARDSON.}

The question of a memorial to the late Master was brought before the meeting by Mr. J. A. Freeman, who said that at the committee meeting it had been suggested that a flat 6 th bell should be added to the peal of twelve at the Cathedral, so as to afford a lighter eight for practice. This had been mentioned to the Cathedral euthorities, who had signified their approval of the project. An estimate had been obtained for the wark, whici would cast £296, and in addition there would be the cost of a tablet in the Ringers' Chapel at the Cathedral and aiso one at Surfleet Church. It was unanimously resolved to proceed with the schome, and the Guild Committee was authorised to deal with the whole matter. It was decided to invite subseriptions from the Fxercise generally, as well as from the Guild, so that the many friends of the late Master would have an opportunity of contributing. Fuller details of the scheme will be issued later.
Since the close of the year 1946, two 'record, pealls have been rung for the Guild, one at Harmston consisting of 16 Spliced Surprise Major methods, and one on handbells in 29 Minor methods, and the congratulations of the Guild were extendied to the members taking part in these two peals.

\section*{FROM THE EDITOR'S POST-BAG}

\section*{The Three Rejects}

RIEASONS NOT LAMENTATIONS WANTED. Dear Sir,-At its forthcoming meeting the Dentral Council will, no doubt, give serious consideration to the three peals which have been rejected by the Peals Analysis Committee in its total for 1946, viz., one each of Minor and Kent Major with the tenor covering and one with a non-ringing conductor.

There are, I know, many ringers who regard as harsh and unjust the somewhat odd rule which debars a keen conductor, who, by reason of infirmity, deformity or advanced years, cannot actually ring, from the pleasure of call. ing a peal. There are, also, others who, like myself, have at some time or other been confronted with the fallowing three courses: (1) Calling a peal on an odd number of bells (above five) which would have performed a very definite service and amount of good to a struggling country band; (2) leaving cut ane of the members which would have done an equal amount of harm and created a local dissension; and (3) relinquishing the opportunity of a peal altogether for at least several years.

It is, therefore, highly desirable that the Council should approach these vexed problems with strict impartiality and, if it decides against a revision of the rules, give boldly the reason for its decision and not indulge in idle lamentations regarding Mr. Kippin's alleged 'stunts,' etc., or take refuge in worn-out dogma re not cutting across the well-established principles of the Exercise, etc.

In connection with the three peals under dispute it would be interesting to know whether the committoe has actualiy acted according to precedent or whether any of the few similar peals rung in the past from time to time were recognised by the Council. If any such peal has been conceded previously members of the Exercise are of course, justified in asking why the Peals Analysis Committee has suddenly gone 'all fussy' and become so particularly stringent in this matter and why 'fish' is made of some and 'fry' of others. Furthermore, is there a rule relating to 14 -bell peals or did the famous and meritorious Birmingham handbell peal of Stedman Sextuples go unrecognised?

\section*{EXETER IN 1902 RECALLED}

Dear Sir.-I have been most interested in your two last leading articles, as one living in those times to which you refer.
The first on the silent peal of Grandsive Triples (Holt's Original) by Messrs. J. C. Mitchell, W. H. L. Buckingham, C. F. Winney and G. T. Mclaughlin, brings to my mind my first peal on handbells, in which my late wife took part, in 1892, and the complimentary letter from Mr. J. C. Mitchell in the following week's issue of 'Bell News.' I also received many congratulations from members of the Central Council at the anmual meeting held at Birmingham that year.

Re the peals mentioned on Fxeter Cathedral bells, the records are not quite accurate, as Mr. J. Austen has passed on. He conducted the first peal of Stedman Caters, not W. Pye, who rang 'Grandison' single-handed. W. Pye, I am afraid, felt its effects ever afterwards; one day when we were out on a ringing tour me remarked, "I never felt exactly the same after any other peal I had rung.'

In addition to myself and Canon Coleridge, Mr. A: W. Brighton is a survivar of the first peal on the bells in 1902. Mr. Brighton also took part in the Stedman Caters with Mr. J. Thomas, and they are the only survivors of that peal. The late W. W. Gifford, of Salisbury, aiso rang in both these peals and was very fond of telling the tale why we rang Grandsire instead of Stedman for the first peal and the late Rev. F. E. Robinson's re-mark.-Yours sincerelv.

Dear Sir, -In 'The Ringing World,' March 28th, I read, 'Information wanted from Canada, \({ }^{\text {a }}\) per E. Barnett. Mr. G. W. Foster arrived in Vancouver about the year 1907 or 1908. He rang with our band of round ringers for six months and then went to San Francisco. Some six months laier he returned and rang again as round ringer. We gradua!!ly changed our band with the addition of other change ringers to a very good band of change ringers. For a few weeks his half-brother, Jack Tassell, was with us; he went to California and has not been heard of since.
As to the peal rung and conducted by him, he first had us ring each quarter-peal. When sure of his band the whole 5,040 Grandsire, Holt's Original, was rung on Ju'y 1st, 1911. He left Vancouver and resided at Port Haney some 36 miles up the Fraser River from Vancouver and was very regular in driving in for Sunday ringing until about two years ago when he entered the Royal Coiumbia Hospital at New Westminster, B.C., and died a few months later. We rang handbells over his grave at Port Haney, probably for the first time in Canada.
It was not Mr. Foster who came several hundred miles to conduct the peal at the dedication at Christ Church Cathedral, Vic toria, but Mr. E. Weatherby, from Los Angeles, California. - Yours truly,

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\section*{ADJUSTMENTS}

There are periods when life has to be adjusted to a new set of circumstances. Such a condition confronts us today with prevailing inflation and loss of purchasing power of the \(£\) sterling. Many are able to meet the new situation with an adjustment in their pay packets; others whose income is static find themselves at a disadvantage. This loss of purchasing power of the shilling or halfcrown has repercussions in every walk of life. The Guild subscription, if it is not adjusted, will mean a lowering of the standard of service to members. Recently four Guilds or Associations-Southwell, Bath and Wells, Middlesex and Salisbury-have increased their subscriptions to enable members to enjoy a range of service on lines similar to those prevailing before the war. Other Guilds will have to adopt the same procedure unless they elect to eat rapidly into their reserves.

We would appeal to Guild committees, in considering their finances, not to limit their service to members in ratio to the decreased purchasing power of the subscription. A cheeseparing policy will not attract members; Guilds must offer as comprehensive a service as possible. In the forefront should be the oft-repeated urge from the Central Council that all who ring church bells shall be united in one body and fellowship. The programme of meetings and visits must be continued if the Exercise is to make progress, and there should be a printed report available for each member. Southwell Guild estimated that the cost of printing their report worked out at 2 s . per copy, and at the Middlesex Association the cost of printing a peal was estimated at 4s. 6d. Knowing the charges to-day brought about by the changed circumstances, such figures cause no surprise. Costs in printing can only be effectively reduced by increased numbers, and that is why we welcome, and are anxious to procure, new readers for 'The Ringing World.' Printed Guild reports are of great value; some are really comprehensive documents, giving full particulars of practice nights, touches for conductors, peals rung and membership records. As is right and proper, just pride in continuous membership is frequently recorded in our pages. This long and faithful service to the Church is stimulated by the Guilds or Associations, who in their turn propagate that fellowship which is a remarkable thing about ringing.
No tower should be unable to adjust its finances to meet the new subscription rate. The secret is belfry organisation. Many towers work on the principle of a
weekly subscription of twopence or threepence, which meets all Guild subscriptions and incidental expenditure. Others employ such means as steepleage for raising funds. One Association at least collects a steepleage fee from all members and visitors at meetings. Many ringers, we know, do not like imposing a steepleage charge on visitors, feeling that the injunction in the Epistle for last Sunday, 'Use hospitality one to another without grudging,' should be the guiding principle in their fellowship within the Exercise. On the other hand visitors themselves would willingly pay for their enjoyment, as in other walks of life. For the good of the Exercise it is essential that our Guilds should be in strong positions financially, and if the greater part of the revenue comes from the practising members then is developed that sturdy independence, a characteristic of the present age. Cap-in-hand begging to meet the new costs should be discouraged.

\section*{CENTRAL COUNCIL AT EXETER}

\section*{A Battered but Busy City}

THF boldness of the Devonshire Guild Committee in inviting the Central Council to hold its Whitsun conference this year at Exeter and the confidence of the C.C. Executive in accepting it have every prospect of being justified. There were some qualms among the Guild Committee about adequacy of accommodation because bombings by German aircraft had taken heavy toll of halls, thotels and cafes, or because requisitioning for public emergency purposes had absorbed so much of what was left undamaged. However, through co-operation by eoclesiastical and ciric authorities, difficulties have been overcome, and local arrangements entrusted to Preb. E. V. Cox (Guild president), Mr. F. C. Smale (Guild secretary), Mr. E. W. Biffen (Ringing Master for the district), Mr. T. Laver (Guild treasurer) and an anonymous coadjutor are now completed.
Exeter itself needs no adulation. It is the gateway to the South-West and for strategic and geographical reasons must have been always of outstanding importance. There is a tradition that it has greater antiquity than London, but Fiketer can be content with evidence of Celfic, Roman, Saxou and Norman occupation. It always has been a local capital; it is the capital of Devon to-day, and a separate Parliamentary constituency; it is also county borough, and has regular Assizes and Sessions. The line of Reeves, Provosts and Mayors can be traced for 1,020 years. History shows that the city has endured many sieges, more, probably, than any other comparable place; it las received several marks of royal approval for its loyalty, and Queen Filizabeth conferred the motto, Semper Fidelis, 'Ever Faithful.'

ANCIENT WAIIS.
Exeter must have had earthworks around it in very early times; the Romans are supposed to thave erected walls, but there is no doubt that the Saxons and Normans completely encircled the old city. There is to this day Athelstan's tower betwixt Narthernhay and Rougemont public grounds in the heart of the city, and the shell of the Norman castle on Rougemont crest. Nothing remains of the Castle itsolf beyond the gateway; the buildings now within the Castle yard are used for Devon County Council, Assize and Quarter Sessions and other purposes. There are considerable portions of the walls still in position on Northernhay, along Bartholomew Street, Westgate and on Southernhay; some bastions also remain.

AIR RAID DAMAGE.
The present century brought along a policy of conservation of the city's remaining antiquities, which were considerable, but air aids during the war years \(1939-45\) caused great havoc. There were 19 of consequence, resulting in 265 fatalities, 788 other casualties, destruction of 1,400 to 1,500 houses. 400 other buildings and nine churches or chapels; damage to between 16,000 and 17,000 bouses, 800 other buildings and 22 churches or chapels.
More then half the heart of the shopping oentre of the city was wrecked and great gaps were torn in districts composed mainly of working class dwellings. No other place

suffered more severely in proportion to size, and delegates may be surprised by the extent of the devastation that will canfront tlient. Tons of high exp.osive bombs were dropped, but the most terrifying things were incendiary oil bombs. Thousands of these fell in the early hours of May 4 th, 1942, and fires, fanned by a strong wind, swept through the city.
So it came about that Exeter lost several fine premises with ornamental timber fronts four centuries old, a Norman house, some notable Elizabethan or earlier buildings in stone, its general post office (one of the best equipped in the provinces), its modern arcade of shops, blocks of Georgian houses that had no. rivals in the south-west region, and a

mediaval treasure known as as the hall of the College of Vicars Choral which had irreplaceable panelling and furnishings.

But it sfill has the Cathedral of SS. Peter and Mary, portions of which date from the 19 th century with unique towers belonging to the Norman period, though the main portions of the existing building are in the Decorated style, or varly 14 tl century. Special features are the vaulting (the longest unbroken length in England), the choir screen carrying the argan, minstrels' gallery. bishop's throne 50ft. high and beautifully carved, and a 14tly century astronomical clock.

The choir aisle on the south side received a direct hit during the war and great damage was done by the explosion and blast. A good deal has been repaired, but much remains to be done. The Bishop's Padace almost adjoining the ohoir was also damaged; it is almost entirely 19th century; the charming grounds are open to the public; the Bishop lives elsewhere

The Guildhall is in the High Street and cannot be missed, for its portico constructed in 1594 is carried on granite pillars over the footpath. There is nothing else in the city to carrespond with it. The hall itself dates from 1330; it was completely restared in 1888. The armorial bearings on the sides are those of mayors, incorporated trades and city benefactors.
The Mayor's Parlour over the portico has a fine collection of portraits of civic worthies and there is a remarkable treasure in civic regalia

A BATTERED BUT BUSY CITY (cont.) and plate. Other places of interest are the Albert Memorial Museum and Art Gallery in Queen Street, St. Nicholas' Priory in the Mint (the Priory and an earlier foumdation have been traced back to the time of King Ethelred; the Mint is a survival of the period when money was coined in the city), the 'Tuckers' and Weavers' Hall in Fare Street; St. Mary Steps Ohuroh with an antique clock having figures that strike the hours or quarters and are popularly known as Matthew the Miller and his two sons, but the centrai figure iepresents Henry VIII.; and Mol's Coffee House in the Cathedral yard, dating from 1596. Parliament Street is facetiously dubbed the narrowest in existence, but it is merely an elley way to afford side entrances to business premises fronting the High Street; there is no noadway. The city had a remarkably fine series of subterranean passages, but only a small portion can now be viewed, usually by special arrangement.

> GREAT LOSS.

There are rings in the south iower of the Cathedral (12), St. David's, St. Thomas', St. Edmund's and Heavitree (8) and Si. Petrock's (6). Neither St. Edmund's nor St. Petrock's can be used at present; the others are in good order. There is a fine set of six awaiting installation at St. Mark's; these bells formerly hung in St. John's tower, Fore Street, and were given to St. Mark's when St. John's was dismantled.
The north tower of the Cathedral contains Great Peter, on which the clock hours are struck. It was reputed to be six tons, but is actually four tons. There was talk of using it as the tenor of the ring in the couth tower whon the latter was restored, but instead the old tenor ('Grandison ') was recast and increased in weight from about 60 to 72 cwt.

A great campanological loss was caused by the destruction of St. Sidwell's Church during the war. A high explosive bomb struck the tower and then fell on the church. Nearly the whate of the latter was destroyed. The tower was badly shaken, but the bells remained in position. Examination revealed rery dangenous conditions, and the structure was blown down by explosives. The bells- 10 with tenor of 24 cwt -fell with it; some were ictrieved in sound condition; some were broken. Rehanging will take place in due course by Messrs. Taydor, but several years must elapse before rebuilding of church and tower can be effected. St. Sidwell's was for many years the hub of change ringing in Devon with the brothers Shepherd-Ferris, Edwin, Alfred and Frank-as foremost exponents. All have now passed on; Edwin, the last survivor, died a year or so ago.

\section*{CALL CHANGE RINGERS.}

There are only two other tens in Devonone at Cullompton and the other at St. Andrew's, Plymouth. Charles, Plymouth, another ten, was lost during enemy blitzes. There are many good eights in various parts of the county. It should be understood that round and call change ringers are very strong in Devon and that the raising and falling of bells in peal and accurate striking a.re of prime importance. Scientific bands who have toured the county know that methods with the tenor turned in are not appreciated by round and call change men and are a drawback rather than a help towards the progress of the Guild, which comprises about 50 towers. But if there is good ringing, with the tenor beating the big drum, they can be interested and sometimes tempted to embark on Grandsine and Stedman

\section*{Midland Counties Guild}

FIRST ANNUAL MEETING AT BURTON
Burton-an-Trent, famed throughout the country for producing that stimulating and refreshing beverage 'beer,' was also moted by the Exencise during the latter part of the last century for its famous band of ringers at the Churcli of St. Paul.

The Rev. J. H. Fish, Messrs. J. Jagger, J. Austin, J. Griffen, A. Wakley and W. Wakley, to mention only a few, were indeed the pioneers of Surprise ringing. On November 20th, 1880 , the first ' silent' peal of Stedman Tripies was rung in memoriam to the Rev. J. H. Fish, Vicar of St. Paul's.

Following upon the first world war this tower was again to the fore when Mr. J. H. Swinfield, Ringing Master, organised that equally famous
Wednesday' band, which rang so many peals of Stedman Triples, conducted by Mr. M. Swinfield, who in a remarkably long period of successes conducted over 230 different compositions of Stedman Triples.

This church, so enriched in ringing history, was chosen as the tower for the first annual meeting of the abore Guild, which took place on May 10th, when upwards of 70 ringers and friends assembled from Melton Mowbray, Somerby, Derby, Stake-on-Trent, Norton-1m-the-Moors, Cheadle, Lullington, Hoar Cross, Ashby, Repton, Ticknall, Netlierseale, Overseale, Meashain, Winshili and the two Burton towers.

A short service was conducted by the Rev. Father Davis, followed by tea in St. Margaret's Schoolroom, which was kindly provided by the local company.

At the business meeting, Mr. B. G. Key, chairman, welcomed the members to St. Paul's in the absence of the Vicar, the Rev. W. Willis-Price. One non-resident dife, three ringing and ten honorary members were elected members of the Guild.

After the presentation of the balance sheet by the treasurer, Mr. J. H. Brittan, the secretary, Mr. J. W. Cotton, presented his review of the first year's activities covering the ten meetings held with an average attendance of 33 and the 16 peals rung.

'FOUR SCORE YEARS AND TEN'
Dear Sir, - Your interesting artiole on 'Grandison', has revived many memories of those who took part in the peal of Grandsire and Stedman Caters in 1902 and 1903. As a young ringer in those days and one who has been a regular subscriber to 'The Ringing World ' over a very long period, I looked upon some of those ringers as heroes ' in the same way as the younger generation to-day visualise their 'soccer,' cricket and pieture favourites. Memories of the 'Old Reverend,' the gigantic Camon Coleridge, the burly W. W. Gifford, the 'dapper' A. W. Brighton, the exploits of the brothers Pye and particularly the prodigious feats of strength of "Bill,' the travels of 'Ike" Shade and last, but not least, George Williams, crowd upon the writer, and even aiter 45 years their names stand out like beacon lights on a dark night. How could it be otherwise when one reflects that at least four of them have created ringing history by having over a thousand peals each to their credit.

I was but a lad in those days. They were grown men and how, alas, I hoped to follow in their footsteps. My profession, however, never gave me the time to devote to the Exercise and those early aspirations never reached fruition. A modest 504 of Grandsire Triples on handbells was the extent of my achievements, but I had the satisfaction of ringing it with the first lady ever to ring a peal.
Of all those who took part in those Exeter peals only three are now with us. Strange to say. within a very short space of time I have had the pleasure of seeing the two senior of them. Canon Caleridge att 89 I 'spotted. getting into a train at Reading Station. He looked well and his great frame stood out conspicuously. A year his senior, I had the opportunity of spending the day with my uncle, Gearge Williams, on the occasion of his 90th birthday. It was a memorable occasion and one I shall always cherish.
It was astonishing to walk with him in the afternoon around the new housing estates at Eastleigh and listen to many of his wellreasoned ideas of things in general of the present day. He was delighted that many of the younger generation should have remembered him on his birthday, and congratuiatory telegrams came from as far as Eas \({ }^{\text {dobourne and }}\) Folkestone. Many local towers also sent greetings, and emong these were Portsea, Wickham, Winchester, etc. There were many letters conveying greetings from ringers and friends all over the country. There were some wonderful messages of affection for the 'Old Master,' who to-day is so hale and hearty and still plays such an important part in the administration of ringing as Master of the Winchester and Portsmouth Diocesan Guild.- Yours faithfully, VICTOR P. 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\section*{YORKSHIRE}

News from Yorkshire predominates in this issue. Outstanding is the decision of Canon C. C. Marshall to resign the presidency of the Yorkshire Association, an office he has held with distinction since 1910. Next year Canon Marshall will have completed 50 years in the ministry, of which 40 years were spent as Vicar of St. Chad's, Far Headingley, Leeds. His resignation from both offices has been prematurely advanced by an unfortunate car accident last January. The Exercise re-echoes the sentiments of the general secretary, Mr. L. W. G. Morris, that a 'restful retirement will restore him to good health in the shortest possible time.' Since its foundation in 1875, the Yorkshire Association has had only three presidents. The first holder of the office was the late Jasper W. Snowden, whose great contributions to the art of ringing were, until the war intervened, commemorated by an annual dinner. So far it has not been possible to revive this function which brought ringers from all over the country to Yorkshire to pay homage to the memory of one of the giants of the Exercise. The next president was his brother William.

Ringing to-day in Yorkshire, as in most parts of the country, is progressive. The Association made last year 156 new members, and has now a record total of 1,357 . The annual report indicates that in most towers there is no dearth of ringers, some having sufficient for two companies. Mentioned in the report is the young band at Whiston, near Rotherham, and it is a pleasure to feature in this issue as our illustration a photograph of these boys. We trust that, encouraged by their good start, the company will keep together and advance. Peal ringing in Yorkshire during 1946 was again satisfactory, with 96 on tower bells and one in hand. There were 36 members who rang their first peal and 167 instances of members who rang their first peal in one particular method. That nearly one-fifth of the members have taken part in the peals spread over 65 churches indicates that peal ringing still has a wide appeal, which the report suggests is a healthy sign.

The variety of Surprise methods is a feature of the peal analysis, and Aldenham Surprise Major appears for the first time. In other parts of the country ringers will be surprised to note that the peal of Oxford Bob Triples is recorded as the first by the Association. This, comments the report, is a very old method and one which is widely practised in some parts of the county, but Triples have never been as popular as Major in Yorkshire, which is,
perhaps, the explanation why Oxford Triples has not appeared in the Association's records before. The year has seen first peals having been scored on the bells at Middleham, Bedale and Sprotborough, and on the present bells at Doncaster and Bawtry. Three towers appeared again after long absences-Kildwick after 18 years, Wetherby after 24 years, and Fishlake, where the only other peal on the bells was rung in 1910. Thus from the broad acres of Yorkshire is told the story of vigorous and enthusiastic ringing in many centres. The zenith of Yorkshire ringing has not yet been reached, and if proper attention to attracting young people to the belfry is fully encouraged, the present membership could be substantially enlarged.

Mr. P. Birkett moved and Mr. W. Gritchley seconded the adoption of the report, which was carried with applause

A vote of thanks to the treasurer and hon. auditors, who gave a brief tepart, was carried on the motion of Mr. S. Briggs, seconded by Mr. J. W. Moxan.

Acknowledging his re-election as peal secretary, Mr. W. Barton pointed out the importance of conductors seeing that the subscription of members elected in the tower were paid at the time, as much extra work was inevitably caused in tracing such members at the end of the year.

\section*{A New Yorkshire Six}

CARLTON BELLS DEDICATED.
An interesting and historical event was celebrated on May 10th, when a new ring of six bells was opened at Carlton, near Snaith, Yorkshire.

When the war-time ban on beilringing was lifted it was discovered that three centuries of use had left the three bells, then hanging in the tower, badly worn and damaged and hanging so dangerousiy that even chiming lad to be stopped. The three ancient bells Dave been recast in facsimile and rehung as an act of thanksgiving, as expressed in the service of rededication.
Three new bells, at the treble end, have been added to complete the ring of six bells. These bells have been given by Dr. J. B. and Mrs. MeGranahan, in memory of their two sons and all other men of the parish who geve their lives in the last war.
The tonor bell (weighing 6 cwt .), upon which the hours are struck, bears the date 1623 and the prayer, ' Fili dei miserere mei ' (Son of God, have mercy upon me). The fifth beli, also dated 1623, bears the inscription of 'Glory to God: Soli deo Gloria.' The fourth boll is inscribed, Jesus bee our speed, 1652.
The new bells ane inscribed: Bell No. 3, upon the collar 'Doria eis requiem.' Upon the waist, 'Ad glor, die et in mem. Charles Cromack, Albert Dunn, Henry Brian Hague, Robert Pierson, Roy Richardson.' Bell No. 2, upon the collar 'Quis Separabit." Upon the waist, "Ad glor, die ot in mem James Michael collar, 'In morte non divisi.' Upon the waist. 'Ad glor, die et in mem Hugh Benson McGranahan.' The regimental crest of the London Irish Rifles is embossed on the secoud bell and that of the Northants Yeomanry on the treble. Above the soundbow of each bell is inscribed, 'The gift of J. B. and L. O. McG. 1946.'
The work of recasting and providing the bells has been excellently carried out by Messrs. John Taylor and Co., Loughborough.

Carlton Parish Church was filled to capacity for the service of dedication of the three new bells and rededication of the three old bells, together with a memorial tablet, the Archdeacon of Doncaster officiating.
Following the dedication, ringers from Carlton, H. Longbottom, Margaret Graves, R. Coggan, W. Longbottom, E. Smith and Joyce Hubv (tenor), rang call changes. At the end of the service two teams from Carliton, consisting of Marganet Graves, Jean Turton, W. Graves, Joyce Huby, S. Wateon and F. Sykes (tenor), and H. Longbottom, Jean Turton, W. Graves, W. Longbottom, G. Graves and E. Smith (tenor), also rang call changes, following which the first 720 changes of Kent Treble Bob Minor were rung by G. Waud (Goole), C. Hill (Goole), J. Waud (Goole), W. A. Hudson (Hemingbrough), J. Taylor (Eastrington) and L. M. Woodhead (conductor) (Goole). Ringers were also present from the Abbey Ohurch, Selby, Hull, Thorne, Fishiake, and Mr. J. P. Fidler and Mr. Fidler (Loughborough), representing Messrs. Taylor and Co.
The Carlton teams only commenced to learn the handling of a bell in October last, under the tuition of Goole ringers. There is no doubt that an excellent light peal of six bells has been added to the Yorkshire Association (Selby District), and great credit is due to the Rev. E. H. Lawsan-Brewis. EXETER Guildhall, which is one of the oldest civic halls in the country, made a fitting setting for the 50 th annual meeting of the Central Council on Whit Tuesday. The welcome accorded the record number of members came from Church and State, greetings being delivered by the Mayor and the Lord Bishop of Exeter.
Formal introductions to the president (Mr. E. H. Lewis) were made by Preb. C. C. Cox (president of the Guild of Devonshire Ringers). On the aldermanic dais with Mr. Lewis were Mr. George W. Fletcher (hom. secretary of the Council), Mrs. Fletcher and Mr. W. H. J. Hooton (hon. librarian).
The Mayor, in his welcome to the Council, said they were all, no doubt, aware that the Guild of Devonshire Ringers, which was formed in 1874, was a very strong branch of the ringing world. He had been interested in reading of the development of ringing during the past 75 years and few people outside the ringers realised that it was really a great art.

We were blessed in Exeter that during the enemy raids that three of their best peals of bells were saved, but one very fine peal, that of St. Sidwell's, was lost. has done a great wor . . I feel the Church Work by calling people to bells as the Salvation trmy has also done a great work by calling poople to God by their bands.

\section*{EXETER DIOCESE'S CLATM}

The Bishop of Exeter, in his welcome, said the conference came to a city which bore the marks of great sacrifice and to a city which contained in its Cathedral what he believed was elaimed to be the largest ringing combination in the world. They also came to a diocese which had the largest number of bells and therefore the largest number of bellringers, and, adtued the Bishop, amid the kanghter of the conference-' the best bells and the best bellringers.'
It was an old custom that whenever the Bishop visited a parish the bells rung him in with a welcome, and he had no doubt that with equal joy they rang him out (laughter) He remembered in the anxious days of 1939 suggesting that a bell should be rung daily in each parish and that everybody who heard that bell should offer up a short prayer: - Open, O Lord, the minds of all men forthwith to the Spirit of Jesus Christ that we may again find the way of peace.' That prayer would not have reached so many people if it had not been for the ringing of the bells.
' I would like to express g.ratitude to the bellringers-those loyal servants of the Church -and I am glad to think that the bad old customs (which he believed were exaggerated) of men coming to ring at the church and then adjourning to the public-house and not answering the call to worship-that those days were gone.

GOOD FOR THE FIGURE
- I notice in regard to bellringers that once a bellinger always a bellringer and that yoū can produce records of men who have rung for 60 or 70 years-old veterans of the belfry. It does suggest to me something that will need care-that if you have six or eight veterans how are we to train the vounger generation?
'I hare also noticed that women have invaded the belfry. It is a grand exercise and I think it is good for the figure (laughter). We have one ring of bells rung by the girls from an adjoining school. I ask Tou to be careful to see that the rounger generation get a chance to become skilled craftsmen in their art. which, I am informed, is mathematical.

The Bishop added that his education liad been on the arts side and he always understood mathematics required low cunning (laughter and applause).
The President, in thanking the Mayor and Bishop for their welcome, said he must say he felt a little shy in their Council Chamber because of the fact that Devon and Cornwall until comparatively reoent times knew nothing about their peculiar art of change ringing, but the local style of ringing led to the most splendid striking, and if only throughout the country they could marry that excellent Devonshire and Cornish striking with their own more beautiful method of ringing, the result would be very gratifying indeed. He felt rather shy in coming into Devonshire that in their efforts to ring changes they had paid too much attention to the method and not quite enough attention to the accuracy of striking which was so much valued by the Devonshire ringers.
In a word of thanks to the Bishop and the Church authorities, Mr. Lewis said they had a great wealth of bells and Exeter and district was a perfect ringers' paradise. He felt that one of the strokes of genius of Mr . Churchill was that after the battle of Alamein he gave them permission to ring the bells. That act took a great hold on the country and since then there had been a general interest in ringing, and it had resulted in a very great increase in the number of young people anxiaus to ring. One of their oldest ringers, who recently celebrated his 90th birthday, did as much as anybody to teach the younger generation.
The President then presented copies of College Youtlis ' to the Mayor and the Bishop, in which the early development of change ringing was told in detall.

REPRESENTATION OF SOCTETIES.
The Secretary reported that there was very little change in the constitution of the Council except that the North Notts had merged with the Southwell Diocesan Guild and the St. David's Diocesan Guild had affiliated and was entitled to orie member. There were 23 associations entitled to four members, 4 to three members, 10 to two and 15 to one, making a total of 52 associations with 139 representatives. With their 17 honorary members the grand total was 156 . He also reported that all subscriptions had been paid.

\section*{LIRRARIAN'S REPORT.}

The Jibrarian (Mr. W. H. J. Hooton) presented his report, which showed that sales during 1946-7 numbered 873 and totalled \(£ 29\) 17s. 7d. During the year the stock of the Doubles and Minor Methods book liad been exhausted. The sheets of Stedman and Grandsire had also gone and 500 of these had been reprinted. There had been a steady demand for the Triples book and again some enquiries far the book of Major and Cater Methods.
The report expressed gratitude to Mr. and Mrs. Fletcher for their help in housing the library and in dealing with sales of publications during part of the vear.
Gifts to the library included 'The Ringing World,' vols. \(3240 . \mathrm{Mr}\). and Mrs. Fletcher; ' Berkshire Bells,' Part 9, 'Radnorshire Bells,' Parts 14, Mr. F. Sharpe; set of reports, York-

shire Association, Canon C. C. Marshall; books and papers of the late T. B. Worsley, sent by Mr. P. Crook.
A limited number of reprints of articles in 'The Ringing World ' on the subject of composition of Stedman Triples would be available before long. Requests have been received for advice about an article on bells for Chambers' 'Encyclopædia' and about the compilation of a biography of bell literature.

The report was adopted on the proposition of Mr. W. H. J. Hooton, seconded by Mr. W. Ayre.

\section*{STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTS.}
'I'he accounts of the Central Council showed that income during the year was: Affiliation fees, \(£ 34\) 5s.; hon. members' subscriptions, £2 10s.; sale of publications balance f26 1Us, 1d., which, with \(£ 303\) 9s. 11d. carried forward, made a total of \(£ 36615 \mathrm{~s}\). The year concluded with a balance of \(£ 324\) 9s. Id., of which the main items were: Libmary and publications, \(£ 105 \mathrm{~s} .4 \mathrm{~d}\). ; wreaths, \(£ 8 \mathrm{12s}\). 6 d .; stationery and printing, \(\mathrm{f}^{6} 5 \mathrm{~s}\). 6 d .

The Hon. Secretary said the subscriptions of the Barnsley and District Association and the Truro Diocesan Guild were received too late for inclusion in the accounts. The balance of \(£ 324\) would be wanted with the reprinting programme which was coming along. Mr. Fletcher moved and Mr. Hairs seconded the adoption of the accounts.-Agreed.

\section*{CARTER RINGING MACHINE.}

Mr. Alex. Young presented a report on the Carter Ringing Machine, which was now housed at the Science Museum. The demonstrator, Mr. Sharman, was satisfied that the machine was now working. He was able to make it do some 12 -bell work-some Grandsire Cinques.

The machine had been deposited there since 1925 and was invented by a master eraftsman, Joln Carter. It was placed there at his wish to be on public loan with the Council as its trustees. Mr. A. A. Hughes and himself were the trustees and he asked the Council to aecept his resignation as a trustee. He was also anxious to find another demonstrator to serve with Mr. Sharman. He mored that the fees due to Mr. Sharman be paid and that Dr. Follet (the principal) be reimbursed for exnenditure involved in repairs.

Mr. A. A Hughes seconded and the report was adopted.

PEAL COLLECTION COMMTTTEE.
The committee reported the co-aption of Mr. E. A. Barnett. It was hoped that the collection of Triples and Major compositions in hand would be ready for presentation to the Council in 1948.

Mr. G. R. Newton moved and Mr. E. A. Barnett seconded the adoption of the report, which was carried.

\section*{METHODS COMMITTEE.}

This amended report stated: During the past year we have contented ourselves with answering the many enquiries we continue to receive concerning methods, compositions, etc. The one enquiry to which we did not reply was received without the address of the enquirer.
Mr. E. C. S. Turner, in moving the adoption, said the report was discussed at some length at the meeting of the Standing Committee. He noted in the report of the librarian that the stock of Doubles and Minor methods had been sold out. There had always been a steady sale for these, and as he was not aware of any new discoveries he suggested that it be reprinted. The Plain Major Methods book would require completo revision. The Council would note that Mr. Trollope was seriously ill. He saw Mr. Trollope last Friday and he was very sorry not to be present as he was elected a member 50 years ago
Mr. A. Walker seconded and the report was adopted.

PEALS ANALYSIS REPORT.
The Peals Analysis Committee appointed by the Council have to report that 1,796 peals (Including 240 on handbells) were rung during the year ended December 31st, 1946.
There have been excluded the following:-
(a) Superlative Major rung at Bocking on

May 11 th, since withdrawn by the conductor.
(b) Minor in seven methods: at Norton on

September 28 th, the conductor of which did
not take a physical part in the ringing.
(c) Minor in three methods rung at Sefton
on November 24 th with a covering tenor.
(d) Kent Treble Bob Major at Basingstoke
on October 11th, also with a covering tenor.
The three performances (b), (c) and (d) obviously do not conform to the usual ringing practice of the Exercise, and the committee feel that as no objections have been raised to the suggestions intimated in 'The Ringing World, leading article of February 7th last, the Exercise generally is in agreement, and the committee recommend snch peals shall continue to be excluded from the analysis now and in the future.

Mr. C. Dean moved the adoption of the report and Mr. W. Ayre seconded.

Mr. C. H. Kippin said he was proposing an amendment that seren and nine bell peals be added to the report. He thought they would agree that if they recognised one they would recognise both. "I do not wish to popularise seven-bell ringing or nine-bell ringing; I am merely pleading for justice for both these
neals. I think up to the present neither peall peals. I think up to the present neither peall
has had justice.
" First of all, the seven-bell peal mould have been accepted without any question if the ninebell peal had not been ring. As for the ninehell peal, it was sent in and published in the Belfry Gossip and caused some surprise. Then it was passed from one committee to another. In the meantime I had sent a complaint and instructions were then issued that the peal should be published in its original form. I still feel that the peal was prejudiced from the start.
' I know a lot of people will say it is only a stunt (hear, hear). Well, a good many peals were rung as stunts. I remember a handbell neal rung in bed-and there is the conductor here. I remember when the nine-bell peal was rung the conductor of that handbell peal was filled with righteous indignation at that peal.
- What we are concerned with is do these
als comply with the rules or not, and my peals comply with the rules or not, and my the renort appeared in "The Ringing World" that these two peals were going to be omitted
from the Peal Analysis report, a friend came to me and said, "The Council are getting
busy. I conducted a peal of Bob Minor at Falfield in Gloucestershire in 1923 with two covers, and they accepted that one all right."

In my opinion, the Peal Analysis Committee have acted wrongly if they should regard these two peals as cuckon's eggs in the nest. They should recommend to the Council that they do not like them, but they had no alternative but to accept them and to recommend the Council to take action in getting the rules amended. I do not think it is fair that the Peal Analysis Committee should have acted as they did. What they have done is to try and make black white.

During the debate I should like to hear the answers of these two questions: First of all, I should like to know the chairman's unbiased opinion as to whether these peals comply with the rules or not. I should also like to know if one cover infringes the rules, What about a peal with two covers? Does a peal with a wide backstroke infringe the rule "without interval"? How can a peal be rejected this year and accepted in the past? Can the Cauncil preserve its dignity by its inoonsistency? I submit it is a case of impartiality and justice against prejudice and popular sentiment. I therefore propose that these two peals be added to the record.

Mr. G. H. Cross seconded the amendment.

\section*{THE DEFINITION}

Mr. A. D. Barker: Can we have the Council's definition of whar constitutes a peal?

The President: 'On nine and eleven bellsthat there be not less than 5,000 true changes rung without interval in each case with the addition of a covering bell.

On seven bells-that the number of changes be not less than 5,040 , rung with or without a covering bell, and without interval, being the extent of changes in the method or methods chosen: nevertheless, a performance on seven bells without the addition of a covering bell is to be discountenanced.
The Rev. K. W. H. Felstead said it seemed to him that there were no rules. The rules are silent on this point, not because they dissent, but because the condition had not been contemplated. The proper course was for the Council to accent the pea!, but decide to rule out any others in the future.

If they were to argue on matters on which the rules were silent the peal on 14 bells should be ruled out, but he gathered that the peal in question had been accepted. He would also point out that they seemed to be getting mixed up between two important items in connection with peal ringing. The first conthe music connected with the bells.

I submit that the most important thing is the ringing of the 5.000 odd changes, and then there comes the auestion of the music of those changes. If 5,000 odd different changes have been rung that is a peal. Naturall we want to get the most musical peal and in normal circumstance we shonld not like a peal of Treble Boh Major with the tenor covering as we would like Stedman Triples with the tenor covering.
"Lastly we do hear that Grandsire is Plain Bob with a bell in the hunt. Look at it from another war. Plain Bob with two bells in the hunt. Logically if we allow covering to that number of Grandsire. why not allow that to Plain Bob, which is the same number. I wish to support the amendment.'

\section*{NFXT BUSINESS.}

Mr. A. H. Pulling : Mav I remind Mr. Kipnin that the conductor of the handbell peal in hed has unfortunately nassed away. Another thing, that stunt in bed was a peal of Major. If vou go for a peal of Major vou go for the music of Maior. I hanpened to hear of this peal before it came off and \(I\) said to one of the ringers: ' You can go and ring what you like, but the Council holds the right to sar through the Analrsis Committee if they will have it as a peal or not."

Some years ago a gentleman said they could not make rules: they could make definitions. Once you have rung a peal and rou come out of the tower it is only your satisfaction that counts. If you go for a peal of Major with the tenor behind you have not had the enjoyment of Major. What did the tenor man do in that peal? Did he have the enjorment of Major? Could the tenor say, I rang a peal of Treble Bob Major with the tenor belhind? I think it would be more to the dignity of the Council that we ignore it. He moved that the Council pass on to the next business.

Mr. P. J. Johnson said the reason the definition of seven bells was allowed to stand was because of the fact that prior to the making of that rule there had been a peal of Trip'es without a covering bell, and it was because of that that the Council amended the rule 'that a performance on seven bells without the addition of a covering bell is to be discountenanced.' Are we going to permit anybody to come along and present the same horror on different bells and acknowledge this abortion of our art?

I want to say we have heard some curious points put forward during this discussion. One is that if you ring 5,000 changes that constitutes a peal. I am going to point out that the tradition of the Exercise and the reason for the rules is to get as musical a combination nn the bells as possible. It was for that object that the rules were put in.

In a condemnation of nine-bell pea's Mr. Johnson reminded the Council it was not merely a question of what the ringers cou'd stand, but what the public could stand, and they should never forget that fact. He maintained that if they accented these peals they would turn the Council into ridicule. He seconded Mr. Pulling's amendment to pass oll to the next meeting.

The Rev. Ll. Edwards: Is this in order?
The President: Yes.
The amendment to pass on to the next business was then put to the meeting and carried by a very large majority

A member: I certainly think it is a guilotine!

Mrs. Fletcher, in moving the adoption of the report, asked members ringing new methods or progressive lengths to send particulars to her. On no occasion did she receire notice.
Mr. Ernest Turner added a comolaint on behalf of the Methods Committee that they had not seen the figures.

\section*{The renort was adopted.}

\section*{TOWERS AND BFLFRIES.}

The President said that since the last Counril meeting the committee had suffered a great loss in the death of Maior Hesse. who did a great dea? of useful work for the committee. His sound engineering experience. coupled witls his great love of bells, was of outstanding ralue to the Exercise. In the control of sound his patient work at Haslemere was an outstanding example of what ran be done in 1 m prove conditions both inside and outside the orowe conditions both inside and outside the tower.

During the year the remaining members of the committee had dealt with or were dealing with 16 enquiries. It would be an advantage if the committee could be strengthened, particularly if a suitable member could be found in the north.

Work had started on the revision of the ' Preservation of bells, etc.,' and it was hoped to be able to publish a new edition before the mext, Council meeting.

As to the enquiries, the President said first of all he was asked to lay a ghost as part of the duties of the Towers and Belfries Commititee. It appeared that in a tower in Hertfordshire there were noises in the belfry when the bells were rung and the ringers were frightened. He was asked to go and investigate. While the bells were ringing he went and investigated and found that the clock weight swung to within a quarter-inch of an iron ladder. He imagined that what caused the ghost was the pendulum striking against the ladder.
He had been asked what were the horizontal and vertical forces in ringing a bell. He had checked Sir Arthur Heywood's figures and found that the maximum horizontal force was equal to the weight of bell metal and the maximum vertical force was \(2 \frac{1}{2}\) iimes the weight of bell metal.
There was a case he was called into 21 and 22 years ago, the oscillation on the bells of Christ Church, Macclesfield, and he recommended that the height of the bells be reduced from 80 ft . to 50 ft . He was pleased to note that this had been done and was satisfactory.
Last year it was reported that the bells of Liverpool Cathedral were ready for hanging if only a roof could be placed on the Cathedral. Shortly after the Council passed their resolution permission was received to proceed with the roof, but it was now found that they could not get the material. The Dean was unable to suggest any date.

Mr. F. Sharpe reported that he had dealt with six cases. In seconding the report, he said he thought the Council would be interested in ono particular case he had to deal with. It was a case of extremely bad bell hanging and bad design. The ring of bells was heary with a tenor weighing 28 cwt . The bells were lung in a very tall spire-the highest in Oxfordshire at Bloxham. Some 25 years ago the architect condemned them for ringing. It was obvious that it was a case of bad design that was the cause of oscillation on the tower. Upon investigation he foumd that the oscillation ceased when the trebles were rung at backstroke and the others at handstroke. The bell frame was an extremely bad one; there was no foundation for the frame and no means of talking the horizontal, forces along the walls. The four largest bells were hung from north to south instead of east to west.

The President said that in 1911 he started and finished in 1914 his calculations on the horizontal and vertical forces which had become the standard theory on the subject. There was only one copy in existence and he had tried during the last six months, without success, to get it reprinted. It mas suggested that a duplicate be taken photographically. The Standing Committee recommended that Mr. W. Osborne be, added to the Towers and Belfries Committee.
Mr. A. Young suggested that the Council reissue a very useful book-'Bell Towers and Bellhangtng, by Sir Arthur Heywood.
The renort was adopted, it being decided to take a photographic copy of Mr . Lewis' book.

 Bishop of Bath and Wells, in his inspiring address at the dedication of the augmented and recast ring of eight bells of the Parish Church of SS. Peter and Paul, Wincanton, Somerset, which took place before a large congregation of townsfolk and ringers on May 10 th.
The service was conducted by the Rector, Preb. W. E. Hodgson, and nearly 20 robed clergy took part. After the singing of the ringers' hymn, 'Unchanging God,' a small pnocession, consisting of crossbearer, churchwardens, the Bishop, his acting chaplain and the Rector, proceeded to the ground floor ringing chamber. Receiving the bell ropes from the captain of the tower, Mr. John Chilcott, the Bishop dedicated afresh the six recast bells, and then dedicated the two new bellsthe treble in memory of those of the parish who had fallen in the two world wars, the second in memory of Thomas and Rebecea Green. Then, to the sound of the bells being rung in wounds by members of the Wincanton company, the procession returned to the choir.

After the service over 150 clergy and ringers were entertained to tea by ladies of the parish. Here the Rector introduced Mr. D. Bradford, representing Messrs. Gillett and Johnston, Ltd., of Croydon, and the Bishop, recalling that he had been Archdeacon of Croydon, said that this was an added reason for the pleasure he had felt in taking part in the dedication ceremony.

For the many risiting ringers then came the climax of a memorable day, a touch on the bells. Throughout the evening their musie pealed forth, and all of us who knew' the old bells realised that at last Wincanton has a ring of bells of which it can be justly proud.
The old ring of six consisted of five bells recast in 1793 by Robert and James Wells, of Aldbourne, at which time the tenor bell was added. They were unmusical, and their goingorder had been atrocious for many pears. The need for recasting and rehanging lad long been felt in the town, and the Rector is to be congratulated on steering the enterprise to so successful a fulfilment.

The augmented ring of eight is hung on ball bearings in a metal frame with a tenor of 15 ewt. in F shard. In the light of recent correspondence in 'The Ringing. World' it is interesting to note that the six recast bells have been inscribed each with a different name. These names include, as well as those of the Rector and churchwardens, those of three ringers : on the 3rd, F. W. Hunt Obit 1945: on the 4 th. F. Francis Obit 1936: and on the 5th. J Chileot, the present captain.

On May 17 th, one week after the dedication. the first peal wac rung on the new bells br members of the University of Bristol Societr of Change Ringers, being conducted by one born in Wincanton, who received his earlv instruction there, and who extends bis qood wishes to the present band in their future efforts.

best peal he had ever rung, and only pay ls. 6d. for it. Such was his principie throughout life, and we who knew him can only strive to emulate it.

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\section*{GUILLOTINE}

Looking back on the Central Council meeting at Exeter, the most talked of matter was the introduction of the guillotine to the amendment submitted to the report of the Peal Analysis Committee. To move to pass on to the next business is legitimate and a recognised procedure in public business. Its effectiveness as a guillotine depends on one thing only, the measure of support received. At Exeter this was not less than 75 per cent. of the members of the Council, and it came before a member of the committee had replied.

When it was too late, one sensed a consciousness in many minds that the motion to pass on to the next business was premature. The questions of Mr. C. H. Kippin had not been answered; they had been brushed summarily aside. It is true that much of the ground was traversed at Norwich, when the peculiarities of the nine bells at Basingstoke-two separate rings of eight and in no sense a Caters combination-were digressed upon at length. The arguments of the Rev. K. W. H. Felstead and Mr. Kippin were based an the decision not being explicit. In their minds there was uncertainty, but as far as the majority of the Council were concerned opinions had been formed. Unpleasant as it may sound to those who participated in the performance of Kent Treble Bob Major at Basingstoke on October 11th, 1946, with a covering tenor, the Exercise as a whole regarded it as a stunt and, in the words of the Psalmist, these changes 'travaileth with mischief.'

Mr. P. J. Johnson introduced Yorkshire wisdom and logic to the debate. His point that the backbone of our art is to secure as musical a combination on the bells as possible should be kept constantly to the fore. Ringers are largely dependent upon the goodwill of the public, and this is one of the reasons why so much emphasis is given by our leaders to the importance of good striking. The rhythm of the bells is no idle catchphrase, and it is purely from an interest in the listener's viewpoint that the Council decided 'that a performance on seven bells without the addition of a covering bell is to be discountenanced.' It is to be hoped that in peal ringing there will not be too great a concentration on 'polishing off' the 5,000 changes. There is no credit in the quickest peal on the bells if it becomes a jangle. No, the first consideration must be the musical qualities of the peal.

At the conclusion of the conference Mr. Harold Poole wisely warned the Council of the dangers attached to the
premature introduction of the guillotine. It would have been a pretty point of procedure for the president to decide if, after the pass on to the next business motion had been carried, another amendment had been submitted not relating to the Basingstoke performance. The introduction of a new topic would, subject, of course, to the president's ruling, appear to be in order. It was generally felt that much was left unsaid, but the fact that the Rules and Decisions of the Council are to be revised is a crumb of consolation to our friends at Southampton.

THE second half of the agenda was of mide interest. The Rerision of Rules debate was not such an uphill battle for the Rev. K. W. H. Felstead. In 'Other business,' a variety of topics was raised, including synthetic bells and commemorating fallen ringers. LITERATURE, PRESS \& BROADCASTING COMMITTEE.
Many and frequent references to bells and bellringing in the Press at large during the past twelve months indicate that editors have reason to regard the subject as one of general interest, and it is satisfactory to note that articles and occasional paragraphs of this nature show a marked improvement in accuracy and afford proof of commendable care taken to acquire correct information.
On the lighter side two or three national newspapers made midnight ringing on New Year's Eve the subject of humorous cartoons, while a local publication, after reporting a peal rung at Wrexham, indulged in unconscious humour by stating that 'the same band set up a record in London by ringing a peal that lasted 18 hours.
'The Ringing World,' after having heen ably piloted through a most critical period under the erudite and resourceful editorship of Mr. J. A. Trollope, has during the past year been edited with marked success by Mr. T. W. White.
On the subject of broadcasting we are glad to be able to present a definitely gratifying report. Through the good offices of the Rev. A. G. G. Thurlow, the criticisms and suggestions made in our report last year were communicated to the Rev. M. W. Willson, Religious Broadcasting Assistant, from whom a letter was subsequently received with a copy of a memorandum subnitted by him to the Director of Religious Broadcasting. This memorandum embodied, though with some oonsiderable modification, the points suggested by the committee. It is perhaps to be regretted that Dr. Welch shortly afterwards vacated the post of director, but in any case the recommendations made have to quite an appreciable extent been put into practice. The principle was accepted that bells broadcast before a service should be heard for a shart time without any interruption, and only after that faded into the background to give place to any introductory statements, and that change zingers should have opportunity to bring the bells into rounds before such fading out. In sume instances this has been done with complete success: a notable example was that of the ten bells at Watford on a Sunday morning.
It is satisfactory to note that in most "of the broadcasts heard, whether method ringing or otherwise, the striking has been good. though there have heen a small number of indifferent performances. Some broadcasts were supremely good.

Apart from religious services, both church bells and handbells have been heard in various connections, and here again a high standard has been consistently maintained. With assistance from members of this Council an admirable talk was broadcast to schoo!s on 'Ringing the Changes.'
A perfect example of a broadcast designed to interest the general public was given from Cambridge. It included information about Great St. Mary's bells, the Cambridge Youths, method ringing and the Curfew, with corresponding illustrations. A recent broadcast from Loughborough gave a lucid explanation of the making, tuning and ringing of bells. The bells of Loughborough Parish Church and the famous carillon were heard to full adrantage.

In view of the fact that most broadcaste of ringing take place without being specifically announced in 'The Radio Times,' the committee request on behalf of the Exercise that those arranging to broadcast make a point of notifying the fact, with details of date and time, through 'The Ringing World."
The Rev. F. Llewellyn Edwards, in moving the adoption of the report, said in the Transatlantic quiz the English question master asked his American counterpart: ' What would a man be doing if he was hanging on to "Sally " and calling "Bob"?" Naturally, the American was stumped!
Mr. A. Walker seconded the adoption of the report.
Mr. W. Ayre said he had a tentative enquiry in regard to televising. He was going to continue his enquiries and then pass them on to the Central Council.
Mr. Atkins said he lad also been asked about televising. The difficulty was to find a suitable tower within 15 miles of Alexandra Palace. Handbells had been televised.
The President: I took part in the first television of handbells.
Mr. F. Dukes spoke of the good relations concerning broadcasting that had been established in Northern Ireland. The time signal was of bells rung by ringers instead of chiming of the bells of Armagh Cathedral. No less than five occasions were the bells broadcast, and on one occasion the secretary of the Northern Branch attended to give a talk on change ringing and gave illustrations on the bells.

The report was adopted.

\section*{PEAL BOARDS COMMITTEE}

Mr. W. Ayre said unfortunately Mr. Wilson, the convener of the committee, had been sentenced to six months in bed. A few more records had come in and they hoped to have them copied out in the proper way.
Mr P. Crook said he liad been asked to give some assistance from the Northern District. These would be completed before long.
The President: How far have the committee got records of peal boards destroyed by enemy action?

Mr. W. Ayre: If we had a list of the boards destroved we could oheck on that. I have nad one of interest: On January 31st, 1911, a peal of Small Bob Minor, consisting of 12 changes
Mr. Kippin: How does that comply with the rules? (laughter).

The work during the past year has consisted mainly in obtaining biographies of present members of the Council. One hundred and twenty letters and formis were despatched, and so far 53 have been filled in and returned. We are grateful to these members, and hope that the remaining forms will be received shortly.
In some cases photographs of members have been sent to us on loan, and we ask the Council to give us pernission to reproduce these, and others that we mav receive on the same condition, in order that they may be returned speedily. We ask for this permission in these cases only, for the cost at the present time is rather prohibitive, being 6s. per photograph. It is estimated that at the present time there are some 30 to be copied
Mr. A. C. Hazelden, in moving the adoption, thanked Mr. Dyke and Mr. Golden for their help.

Mr. Hair seconded and the report was adopted.

\section*{THE RINGING WORLD.}

Mr. G. W. Fietcher presented the accounts of 'The Ringing World' for the year ending September 30 th, 1946 . The revenue for the year was \(£ 1,918\) 11s. 7d. and there was a profit of \(£ 1589 \mathrm{~s}\). 7 d . against \(£ 293\) 9s. 6d. in the previous year. He regretted that it had not been possible to complete the audit of the accounts. There was one serious question, that of income tax, which he would go into. He asked permission for the accounts in future to be brought up to December 31st in each year, which would simplify the apportionment.

He did not think there was much else to say. They had topped the 4,000 circulation mark for, he believed, the first time in the history of the paper. The introduction of 16 page issues depended on the release of paper. They could still take additional subscribers.

Mr. Barber proposed and Mr. Kippin seconded that the financial year as regards 'The Ringing World' end on December 31st.

On the proposition of Mr. F. Perrens, seconded by Mr. Hair, it was decided to circularise the accounts to all associations.

Mr. Fletcher said they had all heard that Mr. Trollope was seriously ill. He did feel that the services that he rendered throughout the war jears should be recognised. It was discussed by the Standing Committee and they recommended that they grant to Mr. Trollope £1 per week for the coming year and the position be reviewed at the next annual conference. They knew that they did make a considerable profit during the war years and that was largely due to Mr. Trollope
The Rev. F. Llewellyn Edwards: It was a wonderful work that he did when there were no meetings.

Mr. J. Jones, Mr. Harold Poole and the Rev. H. Drake supported the motion, which was carried.

\section*{REVISION OF RULES}

One notice of motion was before the Council, viz. -

That the rules of the Central Council be revised, especially those governing the ringing of peals.
The Rev. K. W. H. Felstead said he hoped that if this motion did not meet with the wishes of the majoritv it would not be guillotined like the amendment. It would appear from the morning's discussion that there was every reason for a revision of the rules of the Central Council. If the rules had been revised there would have been no controversy that morning. A clever person could get round a rule, as the Editor of "The Ringing World" said, but these peals that had been disallowed were not rung with that idea at all. They were rung because of certain circumstances which the Central Council rules did not face and these circumstances should be faced. The second point was that the rules should be logical. One point mentioned that morning was that a covering bell for seven may or may not be necessary, but is necessary for nine and eleven and not for five bells. As far as he could see, this was quite illogical. The third point was that the rules should be brought up to date to cater for new circumstances. The reason there was this talk of nine bells was because in that particular tower there were nine bells.

Mr. Frank Smallwood: On a point of order, is it in order to bring it up when we have alreadr made a decision.
The President ruled that the mover was in order.

Continuing, the Rev. Felstead said the rules of the Central Council had grown up piecemeal. There was another point mentioned by

Mr. Butler , of Liverpool, in asking whether local conditions could not be taken into account. He did not think that their rules should be hard and fast and thus prevent people getting on. Take the nine bells at Basingstoke; there was a chance of ringing Caters and it was the only ohance for miles around.
Mr. G. Pullinger seconded on behalf of the Winchester and Portsmouth Guild. Apart from peals, he said, there were other matters requiring attention as were mentioned at Norwich. It was possible for an officer to be elected by the Council to an important office and for his own association not to elect him to the Council.
Mr. Harold Poole pointed out the irregularity of the Basingstoke peals, as the bells were not a ring of nine, but two rings of eight. They had two rings at Leicester, he said, and although a peal of 13 bells had been suggested, he had not fallen for it. It might he argued that the first peal at Basingstoke was due to ignorance, but on the second occasion the views of the Council were known. His opinion was that with the exception of peals on five bells, only peals on an even number of bells should be permitted.
Mr. P. J. Johnson remarked that it was an dementary fact that the reason they could ring peals on five bolls without a cover was because ringers were ringing the extent of that number of bells, but to suggest that one could extend that principle to the higher numbers would jeopardise the principles of ringing. He suggested that the words 'especially those the committee was going to spring a surprise they would not have it.
The Rev. Felstead said his one idea was to get the rules logical so they knew where they stood.
Mr. Pullinger added that he had no time for the ringing of stunt peals, and when it of bringing the matter in again at a later date. So far as he was concerned he did not wish to lower the standard of peal ringing
The President: If this is carried it does not go beyond the stage of a committee making suggestions.
Mr. Johnson: We have a Standing Committee and I am going to suggest that the Standing Committee be asked to eet up a subcommittee for the purpose of revising the rules. You have a Standing Committee which is the consultative governing hody of this Council, and I feel that they are the people to deal with this matter in order to present their views to the Council. To establish a further committee would be creating a precedent.
The Rev. H. Drake supported Mr. Johnson's point of view, and the Rev. Felstead said he was prepared to accept it.
The motion thus amended was carried.
Mr. F. Dukes : May I suggest that the draft rules be submitted to each member of the Council for comment and brought back to the Standing Committee before the next Council meeting?
Mr. Pullinger : Would it not be easier if it was done through 'The Ringing World.'
The Hon. Secretary: There seems to be some doubt as to what we are talking about. The thing that required revision was the decisions of the Council; the rules were a domestic matter.

\section*{HANDBOOK}

The Hon. Secretary said they wanted to give all members of the Council and secretaries of associations some handhook which montained everything in the Council's records. He had a rough draft showing sections and asked the Council for permission to print such a handbook. The first section would deal with the title of the Council when it was founded, past and present officers and leave room for additional officers. The second would give the objects of the Council, what they Intended to do and what they had done and What the Council was formed for: the Ethird
would be the domestic rules as circulated;
the fourth a list of all voluntary societies and addresses of secretaries; the fifth a complete Jist of honorary members past and present; the sixth a list of the contents of the library and the rules governing the borrowing of books; the seventh, decisions of the Council since it was formed classified to cover all the different branches of ringing. The whole thing would be bound in such a way that they could insert supplements.
Mr. J. P. Fidler proposed that authority be given for such a publication.-Agreed.

THE NEXT MEFTING.
The Council decided to hold the next meeting in London.
The Secretary asked members to consider whether the 1949 meeting should not be held at Dublin and be ready to vote on the matter at the next Council meeting.

\section*{RINGERS AND THE WAR.}

Mr. E. Alex. Young said at the end of the first world war they compiled a beautiful book which was deposited in the library of St. Paul's Cathedral containing the names of 1,200 to 1,400 ringers who fell in the war. He thought a similar list should be compiled of those who fell in the last war.

It was agreed that the Standing Committee appoint a committee of two to prepare suol a list.

\section*{C. T. COLES memorial.}

Mr. F. C. S. Turner called attention to the C. T. Coles memorial, which aimed at pro-
viding a bell in one of the rebuilt churches. Mr. Coles' activities, he said, were not confined to the Middlesex Association; he was a member of the Council for 25 years and he invited the nrembers of the Council to contribute.

Mr. A. B. Peck supported the appeal.
The Hon. Secretary said the Standing Committee discussed the matter last night and recommended that the sum of three guineas be voted to the fund.-Agreed.
The Rev. A. G. G. Thurlow said the had been asked to give a lantern lecture at the Royal Archzological Institute on October 15th on Norwich bells and bell frames. He would be grateful for photographs of Norwich bell frames, ringers and peal boards.

\section*{BROADCASTING.}

The Rev. F. Ll. Edwards asked whenever bells were broadcast would the ringing master send word to 'The Ringing World' ' mentioning the time and programme.

\section*{FORTHCOMING EVENTS}

Mr. H. Poole called attention to the Leicester Guild ringing festival, dinner and dance on October 25 th.
Mr. G. Pullinger announced the Bournemouth festival for April 24th.
Mr. G. W. Steere said there were still a few tickets left for the Cumberland dinner on
July 12th.

SFNTHETIC BELLS.
}

Mr. F. Waite asked if anything could be done about synthetic bells.
The Secretary: The matter was discussed at the Standing Committee and attention was drawn to the circular issued in 1938-9 to church authorities.
The Rev. A. S. Roberts said Cornish clergy were being sent a catalogue of carillonic bells from an American firm.

Mr. J. W. Clarke: There is one thing we ought to remember-the Chancellor of the Diocese has to give the final decision before a faculty for such things is granted. The application for a faculty goes before the Advisory Committee and it seems to me that in the interest of ringing we should be represented on the Advisory Committees. I am from Chester and I am chairman of their Advisory Committee. The cost of synthetic bells is about \(£ 150\). Ringers should be on their watch against these installations.
Mr. J. W. Jones said he knew of a tower designed by an architect to carry a proper ring of bells. Bluff had been brought to bear on the authorities and they had installed bells for chiming oniy.

\section*{MEMBERS OF THE CHURCH.}

Mr. Richard Post called attention to the very great evil which the Bishop of Exeter referred to of ringers ringing for a service and not attending it. He was not accusing anyone because everyone knew where he stood individually: If they as members of the Council were going to stop this evil they would have to see that they were all members of the Church.

\section*{THE ATTENDANCE.}

The Secretary said last jear he was able to report the attendance at Norwich of 100 members. That day they had a record attendance of 113 . There were 23 associations wholly represented, 22 partially represented and seven not represented. There were 52 associations and these sent 102 representatives and had 37 absentees; 11 lonorary members attended with six absentees.

THE NEXT BUSINESS.
Mr. H. J. Poole registered a protest against resolutions 'pussing on to the next business. Last year and again this year, he said, where there had been discussion somebody had recommended that we take the line of least resistance. He felt it was a most slipshod manner and a means of dodging the issure.
The Secretary: When a resolution of that kind is placed before the meetng it is voted on and members can defeat the resolution if they want to.

VOTES OF THANKS.
The President moved from the chair the following votes of thanks: To the Mayor for his welcome; to the Lord Bishop for coming to give us his welcome; to the Dean and Chapter for the use of the Cathedral bells; to the incumbents of the various churches where we have rung ; to the Guild of Devonshire Ringers for their hospitality and the arrangements they made for our comfort, particularly mentioning Mr. F. C. Smale and Mr. B. W. Biffin; to Mr. and Mrs. Dtokes for their delightful hospitality; to all towerkeepers; to Archdeacon Thompson far taking the members round the Cathedral. (As they went round the Archdeacon pointed out the great damage done to the Cathedral. He suggested that they send the Arohdeacon five guineas towards the cost of repairs. Agreed.)
Mr. W. H. Barber proposed a vote of thanks to the president and to Mr. and Mrs. Fletoher for the great work they had done. The resolution was carried with applause.
Mr. F. C. Smale, on behalf of the Guild of Devonshire Ringers, thanked the conference for their visit. I have been looking forward to this day for a whole year,' he concluded.
Members of the conference were afterwards entertained to tea by the Guild of Devonshire Ringers.

\section*{OBITUARY}

By the passing of Mr Frederick William Bennett on May 29 th at the age of 80 years, the Church of St. Swithin, Bicker, Lincolnshire, has lost its oldest ringer. Mr. Bennett was taught to ring a bell at this church by his father over 70 years ago and had been a ringer there up to his death. Four of his fire sons are also ringers, viz., Mr. A. H. Bennett (Bicker), Mr. S. E. Bennett (Spalding), Mr. F. Bennett (Holbeach) and Mr. 1. P. Bennett (Northampton). Three grandsons ure also carrying on the family tradition. Mr. Bennett rang as recently as April 20th. 720 Bob Minor, two sons, A. H. and I. P. Bennett, and his grandson, N. B. Fovargue, taking part.

\section*{Truro Cathedral Peal}

Dear Sir,-The ringers of Truro Cathedral are very muoh annoyed with the ringers who claim to have rung a peal to commemorate the diamond jubiles of our Cathedral. Like the Kington ringers, we know nothing about any arrangements being made for such a peal, and at a meeting of our ringers it was decided not to recognise the peal. Our ringers had loped to ring, with friends from other towers in the Guild, at the right time for a jubilee peal, and they feel that the peal rung on May 17th was in the nature of "peal snatching.

The Dean and Chapter were misled by the letter which they received from the conductior of the peal, but in future all applications for our bells will come before our ringers. Anyone wishing to ring a peal will have to be a regular Sunday service ringer. This will not apply to older ringers who have done good work for the Fxercise and are more or less retired.
I should like to point out that we have a good band of unpaid ringers, most of whom are active workers at the Cathedral. These include the Rev. R. E. Sibthorp (Succentor), the Rev. K. Peeke, Vicar of St. Paul's, and his two sisters, one churchwarden, a subwarden, four sidesmen, one lay reader, one choirman and one server.

Dear Sir, - About 30 vears ago I visited Exeter Cathedral, when Mr. Shepherd asked me to ring the 72 cwt . tenor to 503 changes of Grandsire Caters for Sunday evening service. It toak three ringers to pull it off the stay I then rang it without the slightest difficulty. Mr. Shepherd then arranged for me to come and ring it to a peal of Grandsire Caters. Ho then wrote me stating the authorities had decided that the tenor bell must not be rung in future unless two men were on it. I then wrote Mr. Shepherd declining to come as I shall never ring a bell with the assistance of another man. The next time I met William Pye I told him it was the easiest tenor I had ever rung and that I should have had not the slightest difficulty in ringing this bell singlehanded to a peal.
About 20 years ago I rang at St. Paul's Cathedral, London, for Sunday morning service. I rang the loth bell to a touch of Stedman Cinques with two men on the 11 th. Mr . Winney then asked me whether I would like to ring the 11 th with Mr. Prime, as that bell was going rery badly. I declined as I would never ring a beil with assistance, but I offered to ring if the second rope was taken off. He did this and I rang the 11th single handed anite easily to a course of Stedman Cinques. One of the ringers then asked me how it went, when I replied that I found nothing wrong with the bell and that it only wanted a man on it. I then rang the heavy tenor five minutes for the service bell.

\section*{Psychology and Beginners}

Dear Sir,-If it were possible, it would be interesting to obtain a record of the number of potential ringers lost to our belfries through lack of encouragement.

No ane is more acutely conscious of his inferiority than the inexperienced among experienced ringers. Hence the reluctance on the part of the former to 'stand in' at meetings. And, having been prevailed upon to do so, hence, too, the uncertain striking caused by fear of ringing over the wrong bell.

It may be that this sense of inferiority is a phase in the life history of every ringer-a phase too long forgotten by many-too long experienced by more.
But it is a crucial stage, when the ringer still fee's elated after ringing a new method, however elementary. If psychology is to be trusted, his elation must be made justifiable if greater confidence is to be gained.

Fvery new effort is worthy of commendation. A first plain course of Grandsire Doubles, rung unaided, gives as muoh comparative pleasure as a first peal of Superlative Surprise. For any such occasion, encouraging words are alone fitting. The criticism can await a more opportune moment when the learner has enjoyed his sense of achievement. His elation may only be short lived, but it will be found to serve as a foundation upon whioh the teacher can then hurl his criticism with far less likelihood of his efforts at teaching coming to nought, and of his belfry being bereft of potential campanoiogisłs. - Yours faithfully, R. 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\section*{INSURANCE}

From Derbyshire we have received an interesting query concerning the insurance of ringers. In a form attached to the policy the amount of payment per annum to the various church workers is given, and the ringers are shown as receiving \(£ 52\) yearly. Here the ringers are all voluntary; their services to the Church are gladly given. What is their position in the event of a claim in case of injury?

We submitted the question to a legal friend, who at once said that without seeing the policy it was difficult to express an opinion. He assumes that the liability of the insurers is limited to indemnifying the Church authorities in respect of any claim against them under the Workmen's Compensaton and Employers' Liability Acts. Voluntary ringers or an unpaid steeplekeeper would not succeed in a statutory claim under the before-mentioned Acts against the Church authorities, and the insurers would not therefore be called upon to indemnify except perhaps to the extent of legal costs incurred by the policy holders in resisting a claim.

A voluntary worker might have a Common Law claim against the Church authorities for any injuries occasioned through ' negligence' of the responsible authority. Some years ago a boy was awarded substantial damages against the authorities at a church by reason of the fact that, while he was tolling a bell, the clapper fell out and struck him, causing severe injuries. The word 'negligence, should be taken as meaning something narrower than its accepted sense. Perhaps it would be clearer if we state that the volunteer was injured by reason of some defect which was known or which might, with due care, have been known to the authorities, but was not and could not without undue investigation have been patent to the volunteer. If such was the case, a good claim for damages would exist.

It must be remembered that a Church Council is a corporate body, and its members are not individually liable, and as a body are only liable to the extent of the funds in hand. In the case of paid workers, if there is a definite contract for service at an agreed remuneration the worker could in case of injury arising out of and in the course of the employment be entitled to the compensation prescribed by statute. The maximum weekly payment under the Workmen's Compensation Act for total incapacity is 35 s., plus sundry small war-time additions which depend
on the number of dependants of the injured persons. The total sum payable in respect of a fatal accident under this Act varies, according to the dependants left, from the cost of the funeral to \(£ 700\). Generally speaking, the Workmen's Compensation, Employers' Liability and Third Party policies are not usually agreements by the Insurance Company to pay compensation in respect of accidents but are indemnities to the policy holder against claims which are legally substantiated. A subtle difference!

\section*{CHESTER DIOCESAN GUILD}

DIAMOND JUBILEE FESTIVAL AT MACCLFSFIELD.
In glorious summer weather the Chester Diocesan Guild held its diamond jubilee festival at St. Michael's, Macolesfield, on May 31st, when a large number of ringers from all parts of the diocese and friends from further afield were present. An early start was made with ringing, and the B.B.C. recording van arrived shortly after \(1 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}\). Some speech records were made as well as two of the fine twelve at St. Michael's, one of rounds and the other of Queens, which were later used in the Northern programme. It is to be regretted that the B.B.C. gave only twelve hours' notice of its intention to make these records and no definite time appears to have been arranged for the subsequent broadcast, which was, in iact, made the same evening after the news.
Service was held at 3.30 p.m. and opened with a special bidding prayer fitting to the occasion. In the absence of the Bishop through indisposition, the festival sermon was preached by the Ven. F. J. Okell, Archdeacon of Macclesfield, who had formerly veen associated with ringers at both Eccleston and Malpas.
The Archdeacon spoke of those whose convictions and foresight 60 years ago brought the Guild into being and whose efforts had resulted in its foundations being well and truly laid. He mentioned especially the names of Archdeacon Barber and Mr. H. A. Heywood. To its founders and to those who had so ably carried on since their day the Guild owed a debt of gratitude. He also stressed the objects which were in mind when the Guild was formed, including not only the advancement of the art of change ringing, but also the recognition of ringers as officers of the Church. Finally he emphasised the spirit of fellowship which existed, between members of any Guild and among all ringers everywhere.

Tea was served in the Beehive Cafe.
At the annual meeting, the Master, Mr. J. W.. Clarke, presided and at the outset expressed the thanks of the Guild to the Archdeacon for his kindness in preaching a sermon which was so perfectly in tune with the feelings of all members on that occasion.
The report on the past year gave olear indication that the Guild had gone a long way towards the recovery of its pre-war prosperity. It showed increased activity in peal ringing with many members ringing their first peal, and with membership rising there is ample evidence that service ringing is almost back to its former high level. Several restoration
sohemes are contemplated and others have sohemes are contemplated and others have
already been completed, notably the ring of ten at Christ Church, Macclesfield.
It was fitting, too, that in the report the names of several members who had given loyal service to the Guild throughout its 60 years of existence were recorded, and some who had but recently passed over proudly remembered. Among the latter the name of Mr . Harry Brocklebank, for over 30 Jears secretary of
the Wirral Branch, had a special place of honour.
The Master gave a report on the meeting of the Central Counci! at Exeter, stressing the point made by the president of the importance of striking and of the lesson the 'scientific ' ringer might profitably learn from the round xinger of the south-west where great accuracy of striking is insisted upon.
In the election of officers the Master was re-elected and his first duty was to propace the re-election of the Rev. J. D. Pearson as secretary, at the same time paring high tribute to the work he had so willingly done in the past. The fact that Mr. Pearson was not a ringer made his efforts for the Guild all the more commendable. After having held office for a considerable number of years, both the report secretary (Mr. H. Parker) and the peal
recorder (Mr. \(\mathbf{R} . \mathbf{W}\). Worrall) asked to he recorder (Mr. \(\mathbf{R}\). W. Worrall) asked to he
allowed to restgn. In accepting their resigna-
tions with extreme regret, the meeting expressed its keen appreciation of the work done by both these officers. Mr. Whittaker and Mrs. Lawton were elected to the vacancies.
The meeting concluded with hearty votes of thanks to the branch officials, whose untiring efforts had done so much to further the Guild's prosperity; to the Vicar of St. Michael's for his hospitality and to those members of the Macclesfield Branch who had been responsible for the arrangements for the day. Full use was made of the many bells available during the evening.
Six towers were visited by the Chester Branch on Whit Mondav when they held their anuual trip in Shropshire. The touches included Plain Bob, Grandsire, Kent Treble Bob, Cambridge, Double Norwich and London, both' in Major and Royal.

\section*{MR. GHARLES H. WATTS.}

The death has occurred at Dawley, Shropshire, of Mr. Charles H. Watts, who was well known, both as a bellhanger and a ringer, particularly in the London and Birmingham aress.

A native of Salisbury he started work as a boy with the firm of Blackbourne and Greenleaf, afterwards working for Mears and Stainbank and for Barwells, of Birmingliam. His work took him to every part of the country, and he assisted in rehanging the bells at Wells, Oxford and Hereford Cathedrals.

\section*{LETTERS TO THE EDITOR 'Guillotine \\ A True Ring}

Dear Sir,-May I be allowed to make one or two comments on your very fair leading articie in this week's "Ringing World.' Firstly, con cerning the 'guillotine.' Of course, there are times when it is better that we pass on to the next business ' without further delay, but I believe this should be done sparingly and when there has been a fair time allotted for full discussion. I don't think there were any objections to this procedure at Norwich because there had been a chance for everyone, but at Freter this was not the case. However, as the secretary remarked, it is up to the members to reject it,
Secondly, concerning the Basingstoke peals (and I am sorry to keep on bringing them up, but it seems to be necessary). There still seems to be some confusion ahout what the nine bells are (this is where I think the leading article is again misleading). These nine bells are unique ( \(I\) think) in that they are the back nine of a peal of ten, i.e., nine bells in the diatonic scale, or an octave with a treble added (note re). It is no comparison at all to mention a 13 where one bell is a flattened 6 th-the 13 are not the back 13 of a peal of 14, i.e., are not in the diatonia scale. In the usual sense, it is wrong to describe them as two rings of eight.
There would have been no peals lung on the Basingstoke bells if they had not been a nine in the diatonic scale, and if nine such bells are not a Caters combination, I don't know what is! Perhaps I ought to add that I neither took part in the peals concerned nor did I know they were being rung. I think it also ought to be mentioned that the second peal of Kent with a cover was rung because it was thought to be allowed by the rules (Mr. Kippin told me this after the performance) with the idea of showing how illogical they were. I confess I for one am still not clear why it was ruled out of order the sudden onding of the matter prevented us from learning this.

Thirdly, concerning 'music.' All would agree that we secure as musical a combination as possible, but I still maintain that the first criterion of a peal is 5,000 odd different changes. I don't believe the public (if they ever really listen to a peal) would know whether a peal was a good one for music or Whether it made ahi the most obvious them. For instance, has there been any hesi tation in parting the tenors in certain Major methods when a different' peal was required? Also, since it is usually acknowledged that odd
bell methods with a tenor covering give the most musically satisfying peals, who is to say that a Major method with a tenor covering is less musical than on the eight bells alone? I would hesitate very much in denouncing it, standpoint, I am certain (with all due respect to Mr. 士chnson)-and remain logical, of course.
I am sorry to go on at such length about this matter, and I fear some think that I am just trying to be awkward; that is why we were "guillotined,' I suspert. But unti] I am convinoed that we hare not a fair case I shall not be able to prevent myself having a nrm opinion on the question. Being a newcomer to the Exercise, I believe I can see things with a more unprejudiced eve than manv who hare been many years on the Council (I say that with all respect), and anything which is illogical is more apparent to such as I. To me, illogicality savours of unfairness, and so, for the good of all concerned, I feel bound to fight to remove it, and may I add that I hone this point will be carefully watched when the revision of rules and decisions takes place. P.S.-How ahout the Central Council adding treble at Bacingstoke and thus removing its peruliaritr and making a respectable ring of 10?-K.W.H.F.

Dear Sir,-We ringers at Basingstoke are much concerned that so many people are talk ing about the ring of nine belis at All Saints' Ohurch, without a true knowledge of the facts Without entering deeply into music, the facts are these:

The nine bells hung in the tower are a true ring of nine, their notes being \(G, F, E, D, C\), \(B\) flat, A, \(G, F\). It is impossible to obtain more than one true ring of eight, in either major or minor key, and that is the back eight. This may be checked on a piano or handbells.
A previous incumbent used to insist on the ringing of the front eight during Lent, but those bells do not give an eight in a minor key, or, for that matter, any musical scale. This practice is now discontinued. To obtain an eight in a minor key a flat third be!l, namely E . flat, is required, giving the following eight: \(G, F, E\) flat, \(D, C, B\) flat, \(A, G\). That bell does not exist. In any case the ringing world has its own means of expressing sadness, that of using muffles

I repeat that the nine bells are a true ring of nine, and would be a true ten if another treble bell, note \(A\), were added.

This case has no comparison with the 13 bells at Leicester, and that to be completed at Lincoln.- Yours truly

\section*{NOW A RING OF TEN}

The dedication of two new trebles at Chilvers Coton, Warwickshire, on May 17th, completed the ring of ten. The church now shares witl St. Mary's, Warwick, the honour of being the only churches in the Coventry Diocese witl rings of ten bells.

The date of dedication was aptly chosen as the sixth anniversary of the desuruction of the church by enemy aircraft. The service was held in the chapel, which has been built by German labour on the ruins of the old and is nearing completion. The tower was on'y slightly damaged and the ring of eight unhurt, although the ringing room suffered from fire.

The new bells were dedicated by the Vicar of Coton, the Rev. R. T. Murray, who is the prosident of the Coventry Diocesan Guilil. Among those taking part in the service, whici was well attended, were the Rev. J. Emrys Jones (curate) and Capt. R. Willett (Church Army). Mrs. D. E. Beamish (secretary of thi Coton band and also of the Coventry Niocesan Guild) read the lesson. Mr. J. P. Fidler re presented the Loughborough founders.

Among the congregation were Mr. Albert Walker, St. Martin's Guild ; Mr, and Mrs. John Thomas, Evesham; Mr. F. E. Pervin, Master of thie Coventry Diocesan Guild; Mr. E. Dodds, East Dereham, and Mrs. G. M. MosedaTe, Taunton, son and daughter of the late Canon M. A. Dodds, some time Vicar of Coton: M1ss M. V. Godderidge, Folkestone; and Mr. H. C. Spencer, Birmingham.

After the dedication of the two rew bel's the Vioar handed them over to the care of Mr. J. F. S. Moreton (Ringing Master). In his address, the Vicar spoke of the art of bellringing and stated that he had used some of the dedicatory prayers offered when the bells were dedicated 39 years ago. He praised the work put in by the members of the Coton band towards the completion of the xing, and congratulated them on the success attending their appeal for funds, stating that they had raised more than the original estimate of the cost of the bells. This was given to them over a year ago, but since that time the rise in the cost of materials and labour had added an additional \(£ 65\) to the estimate. Of the revised total they now needed just under \(£ 30\) to wipe off the debt, which spoke volumes for tir ringers' enthusiasm and the generosity of the various subscribers.

The first festival ever held by the Guild, 1888, was at Ross, but the last time it was held here was over 30 vears 9 go. The bells of Rass (8) and of Bridstow (8) and the six at Weston-under-Penyard were available from 11.30 and were kept going by the many ringers present

In the afternoon the Guild Office was sung in the Parish Church and the sermon was preached by Preb. Barker (Rector of Ross). After tea at the Valley Hotel the annual meeting was held in the Church Room at first presided over by the retining Master, Mr. William Poston, of Bridstow.
Mr. A. W. Davies, of the Hereford Cathedral tower, was elocted the new Master of the Guild, and on his election took over the chair. AII the other officers were re-elected: The Rev. F. G. Benson, hon. secretary and treasurer: Mr. L. Evans, assistant secretary and peal recorder: Mr. W. J. Beniams, auditor: and Messrs. G. J. Lewis, W. F. Moreton, G. F. Oliver and W. T. Poston, representatives on the Central Council (1948-50). The committee was re-elected with the addition of the Rev. R. H. Hill, of Berrington.

The statement of accounts showed a balance of £25 6. 8d in the General Fund and £21 9\%. 10d. in the Bell Restoration Fund.
It was decided that the annual subscription should be increased from 1s. 6d. to 2s. 6d. as from 1948, the whole of the increase to go to the General Fund of the Guild.
The secretary informed the meeting that the forthcoming report would contain a complete list of the rings in the diocese with details of the bells, and it was hoped thas would add much to the interest of the report. Some discussion arose in connection with a proposal for a war memorisl to the fallen, and a committee meeting is to be culled to congider it. Hereford was chosen for next year's festival.

\section*{' FRIVOLOUS'}

Periodically there are serious challenges at the whole basis and structure of bellringing and the Church's use of bells. One such incident took place at Sunderland, where the Chancellor for Durham Diocese, Mr. R. G. S. Bankes, held a Consistory Court to hear a petition from Mr. Friend, a schoolmaster, that no faculty be given for the installation of a ring of ten bells in the tower of Roker Parish Church. The contention of Mr. Friend was that 'the noise of bellringing will destroy one of the most valuable amenities of the area.'

The Chancellor overruled the petition. Mr. Arthur Greaves, who appeared for the Vicar of St. Andrew's, Roker, asked for costs, pointing out that the delay caused by this 'frivolous objection' had already penalised the parish to the extent of \(£ 500\) on account of the increased cost of material and labour. The Chancellor ordered Mr. Friend to pay five guineas Court costs.

We have not before us a full copy of the Chancellor's judgment, but he could not have ruled otherwise. A bell, or bells, is an essential part of the equipment of a church, and in common law the ringing of church bells has never been construed as a nuisance or an offence against the community at large. The society formed for the abatement of noise also does not regard church bells as coming within the category of its objections. Indeed, the society has admitted the Central Council of Church Bellringers to corporate membership, and the relationship between the two bodies has been most friendly.
Thus bellringers, both ecclesiastically and in common law, are upheld in their avocation. There is a sacredness about the trust; and while the great advance in our art came about by the secular development of ringing, as is so admirably told by Mr. Trollope in his book, 'College Youths,' the alliance between ringers and the Church is very real. Sunday ringing to the great majority of ringers is performed as an act of worship, and we commend the beautiful prayer composed specially for the ringers of Hull which appears in our issue.
The Epistle for last Sunday contains lines which we ringers should study: 'Be sober, be vigilant; because your adversary the devil, as a roaring lion, walketh about seeking whom he may devour; whom resist steadfast in the faith.' The days of the association of ringers with insobriety have long been dead; there are other matters which require vigilance. Our president is constant in his appeal to the Exercise for good striking, and it is a
matter for congratulation that a number of reports reaching us point to a marked improvement in this respect. Not all are satisfactory. A few weeks ago we published a letter which commended the striking in a country tower. Before us we have a letter dealing with the ringing at the same tower during the performance of a peal: "At times the bells were in a heap and firing,' was the comment. Peal enthusiasts should always consider two things -the outside public and the 5,000 true changes. 'Your adversary . . .' may well be inside as outside the belfry. So be vigilant.

\section*{Consecration of New Bells at Lija, Malta}

\section*{BY THE REY. MALCOLM MELYILLE.}

The announcement that a remote country village on the island of Malta has a new chime of five bells would have little interest for English ringers but for the fact that these bells have been cast in England. For centurles Malta has had her bells from Italy or from the Low Countries, and many of great age and beauty can be found within her churches. The recent consignment of English bells is thus a break with tradition, and these flat-topped bells have been critically examined and compared with the domed bells from the Continent.
Five of the new arrivals were for Lija Parish Church and the writer was privileged in seeing not only the enthusiastic reception the bells had when they arrived in the village, but also their beautiful and solemn consecration a few days later.
Their journey from the dockside to the church was accompanied by all the wild enthusiasm and colour with which the Maltese are capable. Five gaily decorated lorries were provided and lots were drawn for the honour of driving the biggest bell. The fact that this monster of four and a quarter tons happened to be on the smallest lorry was an unfortunate coincidence, but a doubly great honour, and both lorry and driver rose to the occaion.
On the outskirts of the village they were met by the village band, and together with hundreds of joyous sillagers and many more envious onlookers from far and near they made their triumphal way through the bedecked streets. A procession in Malta really is a procession, and nothing is spared to make it a magnificent spectacle. This one must have been equal to any that had preceded it, both for the numbers taking part and the length of time taken to cover the \(s\)-mile
through the village.
However, after three hours or so, and as darkness fell, the procession came in sight of the church. What a scene it was! The Square thronged with cheering people, the church illuminated with myriads of coloured lights, and what must have been one of the greatest displays of fireworks for many a year, formed a glorious background for their reception. As we left Lija that evening we wondered what these five strangers, if they could have spoken, thought of it all, as they stood there, majestically overshadowing the scene around, and having arrived at last at their journey's end.
The consecration of the bells took place in the evening of the Feast of Corpus Christi. Stone columns had been erected before the church, and the five bells hung between the columns with their mouths about 7 ft . from the ground. The columns were draped in flags and arehed with damask decorated with plants and flowers. The square was thronged with the people of Lija and with others from many towns and villages; flags fluttered from the roof-tops, among which could be seen the Union Jack, the Papal Flag, and the Flag of Malta.

The ceremony, which was performed by His Grace Mgr. Michael Gonzi, the Archbishop of Malta, took the form of the beautiful centuries old service of consecration used in the Roman Catholic Church, and with which many of our pre-Reformation bells in England must have been consecrated.

After preliminary blessings of water, orl and salt, each bell was sprinkled with the bap-

\section*{Burton's Victory Bells}

1,280 PEOPLE SUBSCRIBE.

Bower, D. Halford, \(P\) Kilburn, C. Rabbetts and T Mear (tenor). It is also hoped soon to have a band of iady ringers, as four - Jill Cochrane, Monica Smith, Margaret Munro and Gloria Inwood-are already well advanced and will soon bo able to ring without supervision.

The new bells are the Shirley ringers' memorial to victory and peace, the cost being raised exclusively by the ringers' efforts and bear the following inscriptions on the crown of the bells :-
Treble: Dei Glorias Qui Victoriam Dedit 1946. Second: Rejoicing in Peace 1946.
The addition completes a most musical octave which can justly be claimed as an asset to the St. Martins Guild
The clock is an electrical system controlled by a master clock in the ringing ohamber with an impulse movement driving the two dials on the tower, the hours striking on the tenor bell. The apparatus, which was supplied by Messrs. Gent and Co., of Leicester, is a thanksgiving gift from Mr. H. Norman Shirley, churchwarden of the parish, and Mrs. Shirley, and replaces the old weight-driven movement which had served the parish for 98 years.

\section*{LETTERS TO THE EDITOR \\ Film Studio Ringing}

Dear Sir, - Mr. Goodenough and other readers may be interested in a "ringing job carried out a year or two ago in the studios at Denham, in connection with the picture called ' A Canterbury Taie.
In the picture a peal of bells in motion had to be shown, and the expert technicians at Denham made a miniature set of ten, hung in a wooden frame. The bells were modelled in plaster (the largest 1 ft . 7in. in diameter), accurately shaped and fitted with beautifuliy made wheels in correct proportion. Having got so far, I suppose they found that nobody knew how they should be rung

The advice of our conductor at St. Paul's, Mr. Herbert Langdon, was sought, and at his request I went to Denham to see what could be done. I found that pulleys and one or two other details were missing, but deficiencies were soon made good, and sashoord 'ropes, provided. The clappers were of india rubber and bounced around in all directions. I arranged for the bells most prominent in the picture to be fitted with worked perfectly.

The frame was about 12 ft . off the floor and ringing was done from a confined space under a platform . so the ringers did not appear in the picture After a little experimenting, unobtrusively doading some of the wheels with lead, etc., I found it possible to raise and set the bells at will, except for two which for an obscure reason had only half wheels.

The arrangements completed, we assembled a mixed company of ringers, representing College Youths and Cumberlands, with three from Denham, and after c.ne or two
practices were uble to give the film people What they required - needless to say, these tiny bells called for very careful handling, as even a mild 'wallop' on the stay wourld cause loss of control.

As our proficiency increased, we were able to make a show at synclironising the movement of the back bells with the record used, which was of Grandsire Caters from St. Margaret's, Westminster. The small bells didn't matter so much-they were kept going as well as possible to give plenty of movement in the picture.

The effect on the whole was good, and 1 have since spoken to one or two practical ringers, who thought they had seen a fullscale peal of bells on the screen-they did not perhaps notice one or two peculiarities in the design of the frame. Personally, I got quite a 'kick' out of the experience. The studio people are very resourceful, and I found them excellent collaborators. I don't think even Hollrwood could have done it better!- Yours faithfulls.

\section*{Truro Jubilee Peal}

Dear Sir, - Rule 11, (v) (e) of the Truro Diocesan Guild says: 'No member shall forward to the Press any communication reflecting upon any band in union with the Guild or upon any member. In case of any disagreement or complaint, the matter shall be laid before the General Committee through the secretary.' I fear that our Diocesan Ringing Master has disregarded this rule in saying that the conductor of the peal, Mr. C. E. Lanxon, misled the Dean and Chapter. This is a grave reflection. The suggestion that the rest of the band may be neg'ectful in Sunday service ringing is also a strange insinuation. Their names are far too well known to the Ringing Exercise generally for this to sink

The facts are these: The peal was suggested last November when a few enthusiasts agreed it was time a peal of Bob Royal was rung for the Guild. Easter Monday was chosen and applicalion for the bells was made in the same way as for 11 successful peals which I personally arranged from 1926 to 1936 . This time Mr Lanxon made the application. This attempt lasted nearly two hours, and before leaving the tower everyone was eager to make a further ittempt. May 17th was fixed as the date provided we could meet again and the bells would be arailable. All was well and the peal rung. This being the diamond jubilee year of the Cathedral, we decided that the peal should be rung in commemoration of this. If there had been the slightest suggestion that the Catliedral band wanted to ring a peal I think we would have all bowed graciously and with drawn, and certainly we would not have honoured our Mother Church in the way we did if the local band wished to perform such an
decisions of the Council shou'd be pulled about to accommodate these stunt performances. These decisions were made by men of wide practical experience in ringing - much wider than the experience of the gentleman who is so anxious to have them overhauled.

It must be pointed out that the rules and decisions have resulted so far in building up a standard of good taste in ringing which is acceptabie to the majority of ordinary people, who loyally abide by them, and who do not try to find loopholes or weaknesses in them in order to prove their cleverness.

Lest I should be accused of getting excited over these freak performances, let me say at once that they leave me stone co'd: but we live in a free country, and if it pleases certain folk to do unusual things, let them get on with it, prorided they do not hring ringing into ridicule, or ask the Council to give its official blessing on them.-Yours faithfully.

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\section*{OBLIGATIONS}

Next Sunday is the National Day of Prayer, an occasion probably more than any other day during the year when the bells of our churches should be rung to summon the people to church. The emphasis is on the word ' national'; it is not merely the meeting together of those who worship Sunday by Sunday, but a call, at the request of the King, and with full concurrence of the leaders of the Anglican, Roman and Free Churches, to the whole people. Thus it behoves all who ring church bells to co-operate fully and proclaim the call. Let there be no silent belfries.

The Archbishop of Canterbury in his message states: ' Our need as a nation is for a sustained effort towards a better spiritual life and outlook, a real uplifting all round, and together to a more courageous, disciplined and compelling sense of spiritual obligation.' From time to time during the past year 'The Ringing World ' has endeavoured to present, either by letters selected for publication or through its editorial columns, the sentiment that Dr. Geoffrey Fisher so admirably phrases as 'the compelling sense of spiritual obligation.' The uniqueness of ringing demands that in the midst of all the joys and achievements of the Exercise a sense of spiritual obligations should remain constant.
With the advance of science, the introduction of amplified gramophone music is a very real threat to bellringing as we know it. If there are no ringers to proclaim the message of the bells then the aids of science will be introduced, because so engrained is the love of bells among the public that many a parish would not hesitate to employ this medium rather than have a silent belfry. Ringers and bells must be an integral part of the family of the Church-not a distant mysterious body performing strange rites in an unseen part of the building. We sense in the holding of Bell Sunday in a Middlesex parish, as recorded in this issue, an attempt to bridge the gap and let the congregation better understand the association of bells with worship. Bell Sunday was followed by the ringers being ' at home ' in their belfry and their guests numbered 100. Similar propaganda has been introduced before-a lantern lecture on bells was given in the place of the sermon in a Northamptonshire church-but it is by no means general, and explanatory visits to the belfry are in most parishes infrequent.

Finally, the National Day of Prayer is individual in its appeal. Our minds go back to that first day, with the
deliverance from Dunkirk. Singularly the Sundays coincide in the Church's calendar, being the Fifth after Trinity with the Collect for peace-' that the course of this world may be so peaceably ordered by thy governance, that the Church may joyfully serve thee in all godly quietness.' This Collect dates back to the days of Leo the Great during the period that marked the decline of the Roman Empire. Attila the Hun descended from Hungary into Italy. Pope Leo went to meet him unarmed, and so overawed was the Hun by the majesty of the Christian character that he consented to depart from Italy. To-day a feeling of frustration is apparent in all directions; that is an inability on the part of human endeavour to combat the modern Hun facing the world to-day with the spectres of famine, suspicion and distrust haunting not only nations but individuals. The guidance of 'the Unseen Hand' is more than ever a national and personal need.

\section*{THE REV. FELSTEAD'S RYPLY}

Dear Sir,-I fear Mr. Smallwood's !etter this Week only goes to prove my statement that a newoomer to the Exercise can see things with a more unbiased eye than many of the old stalwarts. As far as I am aware, I myself have never disobeyed the rules and decisions of the Council. I shall always maintain that the rules never contemplated the situation which has arisen at Basingstoke and that they should therefore be revised. There was certainly no question of finding loopholes.
The rules about Cater ringing presupposed there would be a tenor to cover and I would be only too happy to agree to the nonrecognition of a peal in a tower where there were ten bells and only nine were used. It was never contemplated that there ever would be a tower like Basingsioke, but since there is, something ought to be done about it, which means a careful consideration of the new case and new conditions. Until this is done (and it has not been done yet, for the five minutes' discussion at Norwich and perhaps 15 minutes at Exeter cannot be callied a consideration), then the situation should be accepted and the peal recognised.
Mr. Kippin's 'crime ' is more concerned with his being the first to recognise the peculiarities of the Basingstoke bells than anything else. If I were a betting man, I would be willing to wager that the majority of the old stalwarts would have done the same as Mr. Kippin did if they'd realised how the nine bells had been tuned. Being the first in the field, I believe, means more than anything e'se (even music) to most ringers!
Again, isn't it rather absurd to talk about bringing ringing into ridicule? A non-ringer (I can remember being one more easily than many ringers) casually listening to kellis does not know how many of them there are, especially if changes are being rung, and does not usually care. I would again be willing to wager that Basingstoke people would not have known how many bells were ringing in the controversial peals, and the most that could be expected of them would be the rather vague notion that they sounded a bit different from usual. How silly it all is to talk about stunt performances when the whole history of ringing has numerous examples.
Can it really be fairly argued, for instance, that a peal of Spliced Surprise is not a 'stunt' any more than one on nine bells when there are only nine bells in the tower? According to the rules, the 5,000 changes should be in one method, I believe, but that didn't deter the firsi performers of 'Spliced methods, and I gather there was a decision to accept the peal since the rules had not catered for such a contingency. I fail to see how the present conditions are different in their own way. Please, we must be logical and fair to all.Yours faithfully, \(\quad\) K. W. H. FELSTEAD. Southampton.

An unfortunate accident had occurred at a practice the night before, when the tenor clapper came out and broke the wheel of the treble, so that ringing was confined to eight bells.

However, some good ringing was scoomp"ished in most of the standard methods, sone particularly gond courses of Cambridge and London being brought round. Ringing was under the supervision of Mr. F. A. Finch (Ringing Master) and Mr. T. G. Bannister (deputy), and special attention was given to the claims of a number of learners, mostiy young ladies.

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\section*{TOWER SNATCHING}

A somewhat derisive or contemptuous term is 'towersnatching.' Who invented it we know not, but is there an enthusiastic ringer who will not confess that in his heart of hearis he is a 'tower-snatcher'? When the thrill of entering a new ringing chamber is lost to the individual then it might truly be said that his initial keenness as a ringer has evaporated. With what sense of expectancy does the newcomer climb the stairs of a strange belfry, for no two ringing chambers are identical. Some are palatial with rich apportionments; at the other end of the scale are those meagre boxlike chambers with barely sufficient room to handle the ropes, telling their own story of architects who knew nothing of bells and their ringing.

Charles Morgan in one of his essays writes of the power of the Abbey Church to refresh the spirit of private men; to which he adds ' a power the more gracious because it is shared by much humbler churches, each in its own manner and degree.' These visits to other churches are more than 'the bleak catalogue of photography.' They have something vital to give that develops the spirtual ego. There are some ringers to whom the grandeur of architecture makes but a fleeting impression, but they gain their sense of satisfaction through the peal of a bell by means of a bell rope. To them the bell is something living ; a rope to them is as a rein to a horseman, and by its perfect handling that sense of mastery is secured. Each tower and its bells bring a fresh experience, a new delight and in itself a refreshment of the spirit.

In tower-snatching as in most things there are specialists. We know of some who delight in measuring their prowess by the tenors they have turned in. To them a sense of physical delight is an added pleasure. The weights and pecularities, if any, of the 'go' are recorded with care. No one can deny that there is not something awe-inspiring to see a massive tenor revolving and to hear and almost to feel the vibration of a deep note which is frequently mellowed by age. Such a memory is constant, and the opportunity to ring such a bell by, say, the tenor enthusiastists, is one to be snatched at.
Then there is the spiritual experience of such visits. Ringing chambers react differently. Some we have visited are desolate and uncared for. Forelorn, they create a consciousness of not being part of the real life of the Church; no loving hands have swept them clean, and there is no joy in assembling in such a chamber Sunday by Sunday. There are others like a museum with
the walls covered with peal boards giving messages of emulation to all who ring there of those giants of the Exercise who performed in bygone days. Finally the great joy of going into a belfry where evidence of loving care and attention is everywhere. The ropes in good condition, the same pride taken in keeping clean the furniture and other apportionments as in the body of the church itself. It is indeed the unsaid sermon; the consciousness of the consecrated building is very real; the visitor feels that something far greater than snatching a tower has been achieved. Presence exists in such a room, built up and hallowed by men and women who let all strangers know :-

We love the place, O God,
Wherein Thine honour dwells;
The joy of Thine abode
All earthly joy excels.

The Council's Duty
TO GIVE THE EXERCISE A CLEAR VISION.
Dear Sir,-I have just read Mr. Smallwond's letter, and I am afraid that my first impression was that good taste was entirely absent from the context, although the two words were frequently used in the phraseology.
Surely, when such a matter is brought up at. a Council meeting, it would have been the correct procedure to get down to business and not side-track the issue, whatever the result might have been. This case could casily have been settled by diplomatic action in half an hour.

I do not know how many members agreed with Mr. Smallwood's remarks that "they were bored by the laboured presentation of the case,' but it seems to me that when a person consents In serve on the Central Council it is his duty to concentrate to the best of his ability on the affairs of the Council and to give his unbiased decision when he is called upon to cast his vote.

The Council were not asked to decide whether the performance was a stunt or not: that is, of course, a purely personal affair. If, after careful consideration, the rules had been revised to state definitely that peals of the description under review would not be officially counted, I think everyone would have been satisfied.

After all, the primary object of the annual Council meeting is to make decisions, so that the Exercise may have a clear vision of modern requirements. If loopholes are discoveredand with rules that are not modernised this must be expected-it is the duty of the Central Council to provide the necessary legislation to meet the circumstances.
I sincerely hope that, in future, if the Council find a disagreeable subject on the agenda, they will really get down to tackling it, cast aside all personal bias, and give the Exercise the lead which it has the ight to expect from its governing bodv.-Yours faithfully.

\section*{Film Ringing}

Dear Sir,-Readers of "The Ringing Wor'd ' are indebted to Mr. H. Goodenough for drawing attention to the excellent English film, Green Fingers.
The sound of Whitby Abbey bells is introduced early in the picture. Have you seen the ringing? It's very interesting, says the old fisherman, as he conducts his friend up the 199 steps of the Abbey.
Interesting it certannly proves to be. The old tenor-man (who incidentally appears to be ringing the treble all the time) is obviously the veriest tyro. He makes a brave show, but to keep his bell up and in place is quite beyond his powers. Standing well back, one foot thrust forward, he does manage to catch the tuffing, and even sets up at the end of the touch.
Did I notice a faintly perceptible appearance of surprise and relief at this success, and was there an accomplice perched high above to grab the rope and hold it taut as it ascended? The actor's fumbling attempt at tying up the rope lasts so long that the camera lires and the scene is cut.
This inexperience in such an experienced old ringer is happily and rather uncannily not reflected at all in the sound of the ringing, which is a pleasure to listen to throughout. The end of the touch is ragged, half the bells failing to set up, but in that there is no insonsistency.
We are told that this actor had less than an hour's tuition in the handling of a bell-rope; great praise should therefore be accorded him for his level playing of this part.
Although the ringing sequences are short and merely incidental to the plot, it does seem to me that a little more time might usefuly have been given to making sure of the details. They were so nearly right.

However, to the layman these inaccuracies will not be evident, a fact doubtless well realised by the director of the film. who knows his job and does it well.

Green Fingers, will not do our Exercise any harm. See it if it comes your way. It is beautifully photographed, has a sood story and is very well acted. I enjoyed every minute of it.

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\section*{TRADITION}

This week the thought uppermost in the Exercise is the bi-centenary of the Society of Royal Cumberland Youths. There was a memorable gathering in London on Saturday to pay tribute to the contribution the Cumberlands have made towards the advancement of our art. What was indeed striking was the number of young people present, recruits of this ancient society, who are endeavouring to capture some of the tradition associated with the Cumberlands. Tradition is not a thing to be ignored; it is a priceless asset inasmuch as it invariably sets a standard.
Associated with the formation of the Cumberlands is a wealth of legend of the connection of the ringers of St. Leonard's, Shoreditch, with the victor of Culloden. Mr. J. Armiger Trollope describes in "College Youths" as a pretty little tale the story of how, as the Duke passed by St. Leonard's Church on his return, he was welcomed by a merry peal, which so pleased him that he sent and congratulated the ringers and presented them with the medal which is still worn by the Master. To show their gratitude the ringers altered their name to that of the Royal Cumberland Youths. Mr. Trollope adds that the society was not founded until Sepember 6th, 1747, and, according to contemporary newspapers, when the Duke returned he did nat come by the old North Road nor through the City, but went straight to Kensington to report to the King.

There is no question that the Duke was a popular figure in London, and nowhere more so than among the Spitalfield weavers. Mr. Trollope, however, expresses grave doubts whether the Duke had any interest in bells or ringing, as is shown by his attitude at Carlisle in 1745, when his army attempted to confiscate the bells of the cathedral as 'a perquisite to the train of artillery.' Be that as it may, the word Cumberlands is an honoured one among ringers and the society has attracted into its ranks men who have been outstanding personalities.

The days of animosity between the College Youtbs and the Cumberlands are now gone. Both societies have capable and experienced leaders and draw their membership from the territorial associations. There is a school of thought which argues that the territorial associations should be all-sufficing, but the pull of tradition is strong, and these societies-the College Youths and the Cumber-lands-who are the Alma Mater of much of the performance ringing, have a rightful and legitimate place among ringing associations. In a sense they are the Oxford and

Cambridge of ringing, each rejoicing in its individuality and exclusiveness. The view of Mr. E. H. Lewis, the president of the Central Council, that it is an excellent thing that there should be this exclusive rivalry, is one generally accepted.

Tradition is of value in two ways. It weaves an air of romance and there is a sense of elation in being the direct descendants of those giants of our art and being responsible for carrying on the torch. The second is in the matter of example. Those feats of past years have to be emulated, if not surpassed, if the tradition of the society is to be warthily upheld. In the matter of performance the Cumberlands and College Youths have to look to their laurels in face of the challenge from Birmingham, Leicester and Lincolnshire. Of late years the Cumberlands have given particular heed to the matter of recruiting in attracting to their ranks young ringers of promise; it is the only way they will be able to maintain that rivalry with the Ancient Society of College Youths.

The immortal trio-Mr. and Mrs. J. Bray and George E. Feirn-have reached their objective of 105 methods in hand. Congratulations will be sent from all over the country to Cleatham, Lincs. The Ladies' Guild passed a special resolution of congratulation to Mrs. Bray at Manchester.
The peal record at St. John's, Erith for 1947 reads : 12 attempts, 11 peals, 10 methods (Superlative, Eardley, Yorkshire, Belgrave, Belvedere, Pudsey, London, Cambridge, Ipswich, Bristol 2), 7 conductors.

An attempt to ring the first peal of Major on the steel bells at St. Clement's, Hastings, came to grief on July 5 th after 2 lюurs and 50 minutes through the tenor rope fraying out on the wheel. Mr. A. Pat Cannon reports that the bells did not go too well.

The old idea was that the tower was separate from the Church and that when the ringers had finished their work they departed from the church and were not seen again until next Sunday or a practive. That was because of the lack of co-operation between the clergy and the ringers. Now there was more appreciation of each other and they were not looked upon as drunkards as they used to be. There was still room for them to do their part because ringing was service for the Church and not worship.
This Society in London was particularly indebted to three towers-St. Leonard's, Shoreditch, St. Bride's and St. Martin's-in-the-Fields. He coupled with the toast the Rev. H. Cecil, Yicar of St. Leonard's, and the Rev. A. Taylor, Vicar of St. Bride's.
The Rev. H. Cecil prefaced his reply with a word of congratulation to the Society on reaching lis 200th year. 'We all hope that your work will continue and that in 200 vears' time the bells of Shoreditch will be rung by the Roval Society of Cumberiand Youths.
The Church in these dars, he said, did not appear to be in too much favour with the ordinary people. It made it pleasant to find a strong band of men and women who liad not only a good word for the Church, but had continued to ring for rears. There was a time when the arts and sciences looked to the Church as their mother. With the growth of civic consciousness these hat graduall r -departed from the Church to the State or local authority and the art of beilringing was one of the few that were left.

\section*{THE DUKE AND SHOREDITCH}

I myself like to believe that the tradition that we hear between your art and my church has a certain amount of truth. I was only reading the other day that it is recorded that when the Duke of Cumberland returned to London after Culloden it was the bells of Shoreditch that rang out in celebration of that great event and that the ringing band named themselves after him and he presented a medal to the Society in 1747. There is another in connection with the oil painting of the Duke which is in St. Martin's. It is said that it was originally in St. Leonard's and a band of ringers, came along and purloined it and took it to St. Martin's. As St. Martin was kind enough to share his cloak with the beggar we might stand a chance of getting our picture back (laughter).

There is another fact. In the year 1807 your Society added two bells to our ring. I believe it was rather a ghastly business. When all the money had been paid for the bells the treasurer bolted and the money had to be collected again. The bells of St. Leonard's have been silent since 1939. We Lope that when the architect says you can ring you will come back to Shoreditch again. The work of repairing the church has begun. We have a new roof, but it will be a year or two before we are completed. I think we all look forward to a resurrection following the crucifixion through which we have passed, and when we call our people back to worship the Royal Cumberland Youths will be there and by the ringing of the bells, send a hearty invitation to our people again.

The Rev. A. Taylor said there was no couplet associated with the bells of St. Bride's as there was with the bells of St. Clement's and of Shoreditch. He thought it might be 'Step inside, said the bells of St. Bride's,' which might apply to all bellringers. He had seen the big bell at the Kremlin and stood under the big bell at Tokyo and listened to the bel's at Burma. It was something to be thankful for that there was this association between the bells of the Church and the people. The bells were the inarticulate expression of the voice of the community.
The toast of "The Society of Royal Cumberland Youths' was proposed by Mr. E. H. Lewis, who said he was in the middle of a holiday in the West Highlands of Scotland and the following night he was going back there to his second thome. He was afraid he would not receive a very warm welcome if he told them he had been to a function that in a way was of honour to the Duke of Cumberland. When in Scotland he belonged to the Episcopalian Church, which suffered great monetary loss by the troubles of 1745 . Some good, however, did come out of the evil of those times, and General Wade provided a series of good military roads.

He was not going to be so foolish, as a College Youth, to say anything about the history of the Royal Cumberland Youths, for they knew far more about their Society than he did. There were two points which rather interested him. At one time, at the beginning of the 19 th century, their Society was not content to stick to the plain methods on the higher number of bells: in fact an examination of their peal book looked as if their Soclety fried to find a new method each time. He wished to-day that ringers would do something of that sort. When an eight-bell tower got the addition of iwo bells ther started on Grandsire or Stedman Caters and rang nothing else. There were hundreds of methods which could be rung with rery little effort by
a good band and were also good musically. He hoped the Cumberlands would encourage their members to vary their methods.

\section*{KEEN RIVALRY}

Another thing the noticed in his slight incursion into their history was this keen rivalry between their Society and his. He did not know whether they would permit him to quote a song written for the Cumberlands in 1802:-
The College Youths do boast of what peals they have rung,
Saying by the Cumberlands such never could be done;
Their band the select eleven thousand and eighty rang complete,
But the Cumberlands rang twelve thousand and completely they did beat.
Next Treble Bob Maximus they at Overy's did ring,
And with twelve men only to beat their complete thing,
For with twelve men only they :ang and brought them round,
Saying never with the Cumber!ands will such a twelve be found.
Seven thousand one hundred and four we then did ring,
And with twelve men only to beat their complete thing,
On March the twenty-second eighteen hundred and two,
In five thours and thirty minutes rang the peal right through.
That showed the state of rivalry between the two Societies at that time, in which their Society, according to their own story, beat his Society. 'We don't bear you any grudge," added the President of the Central Council.

There was some complaint a few years ago on the grounds of why have two Societies. Why should College Youths not join the Cumberlands and Cumberlands become College Youths? 'Personally, I think it is an excellent thing that there should be this exclusive rivalry. Several times when talking about ringing I liave drawn an analogy between ringing and rowing. If a rowing coach told a crew that their finishing was like a peal of bells it would be the greatest insult they could get (laughter). A member of the Cambridge crew cannot row with the Oxford crew, but the two can row together for Leander at Henley even if they are beaten by Jesus in the Grand. I have no use for Mr. Horner and one big union (laughter). I hope our two Societies will retain their respective identities and work on the common ground for our art of change ringing.
COLLEGE YOUTHS' CONGRATULATIONS.
This afternoon our Society held a meeting at the Bell Foundry at Whitechapel and they passed a resolution sending the congratulations of the Ancient Society of College Youths to thr: Society of Royal Cumberland Youths on attaining their 200th birthday and their very best wishes for the future' (applause). He was asked to convey it to them, although it possibly might have come better from their Master. He coupled with the toast the name of the Master, Mr. G. H. Cross.

Mr. G. H. Cross, who was warmly received on rising to reply, thanked Mr. Lewis for his kind words in regard to the Society. They
knew of his good work on the Central Council, knew of his good work on the Central Council,
although sometimes he thought Mr. Lewis told them too much about striking. He was afraid that be persona!ly said too iittle about that. They met at Southwark that afternoon and he was very annoyed at the standard of striking.

With regard to the Society, it was formed between 1745 and 1747, and the first actual account of the Society was in September, 1747, but, as the Rev. Cecil said, there was a legend that the bells were rung when the Duke of Cumberland came through Shoreditch and that he became a ringer. But what he rang they had not been toid. It was also said that he
gave the Society the medal the was wearing as Master, but although he looked, he could find no date on it.
In any case, their Society was one of the rldest. The College Youths were formed in 1647 and the Norwich Scholars in \(i 727\) and they were finally dissolved in 1914, when all their old property and pewter pots were shared among the surviving members. It was very sad to him because as a youngster he was very proud to drink lot rum and beer from a pewter pot.

With regard to their performances, in the 18 th century the Cumberlands did put up some splendid peals. There was the 12,000 Treble Bob, which stood until 1911, when it was beaten at Ashton-under-Lyne. Another peal was the 7,000 at Southwark and the 5,200 at St. Mary-le-Bow. In those days they did not have such people as Mr. Hughes to hang bells and there must be great credit given to ringers of those days. Another performance was the peal of Court Bob Royal rung at Shoreditch in 1801 and conducted by George Gross. Another peal was that of the Norwich Scholars in 1778, who were all members of the Society of Cumberland Youths. The great ringers of those days were George Partrick, George Gross, John Reeves, Charles Purser, William Lyford and Henry Shipway.

In the latter part, of the iast century they had some fine ringers, including Mr. George Williams and Mr. James Parker, who had come from Yarmouth to be with them. In later years the Society owed a great deal to Mr. f. D. Mat Lhews and to Mr. Frank Smith, and it was a pleasure to have their widows with them that day. He was very pleased to say that they had many young ringers who had joined the Society, and he hoped that they would stick with them so that they could ring better methods. Perhaps one day they would ring the first peal of Pudsey Maximus in London.

The Visitors' were honoured on the call of Mr. W. R. Winterton, who mentioned especially Dr. Perry, the Senior Warden of St. Martin's-in-the-Fields, to whom all Cumberlands who rang at \(S t\). Martin's were greatly indebted. He gave them a new set of ropes, and the speaker expressed the hope that he would find the means to give them a little neat this winter in their little room almost suspended in the stratosphere. The greatest thing Dr. Perry had done was to arrange practices, which had been of tremendous benefit to St. Martin's and all Cumberlands, and the fact that it was 15 years since there had been a regular practice showed how difficult it was. One difficulty was the close proximity to Charing Cross Hospital, but some time in the next 20 years Charing Cross is to be moved.

\section*{ST. MARTIN'S STEEPLE.}

Dr. A. B. Perry, in reply, said it was close in 60 years that he had been associated with St. Martin's. and for 46 years he fad held ffice. It might interest the Cumberlands that there was a record, which was unfortunately destroyed in the blitz, that in the year 1647 St. Stephen's, Bristol, Society, came for the purpose of visiting the belfry. It was his duty to say to their Society that they owed them a debt of gratitude. He was sorry to tell them that only on Wednesday that week he had been served with a notice by the London Surveyor that he would have to have the spire inspected. He did not know what it would mean; it might be that they would not be able to ring for a week or two.

Mrs. R. F. Deal proposed 'The London and Provincial Societies,' and said the toast of kindred societies was nearest to their hearts. They had to remember that the kindred societies struggled for years with their youngsters, sometimes lost them, but in a great many instances produced fine ringers and eventually sent them with their good wishes to them, and without them their Society would not exist. "To-day I want on behalf of the

Tea was held in the Church Hails, followed by the business meeting. The president was chairman and he was supported by the Vicar (the Rev. J. Barton, M.A.) and members from Armley, Batley, Bradford Cathedral, Drighlington, Elland, Guiseley, Headingley (St, Chad's and St. Michael's), Idle, Leeds Parish Church, Ossett, Pudsey and Rothwell, aIso friends from Dewsbury.

Two new members were elected, Messrs. M. Lockwood and T. Duffin, of Ossett.
The rote of thanks to the Vicar and churchwardens was proposed by. Mr. J. McGlenn and seconded by Mr. W. H. Senior. The Vicar acknowledged the thanks, saying it was always a. pleasure to welcome visiting ringers. The vote of thanks to the local company and ladies for serving at the tea tables was propused by Mr. Gr. Benfield and seconded by Mr. H. L. Jones.

Royal Cumberland Youths to thank jou all Wherever we go we know we are welcome, and where there is a peal of bells we are sure of friends.
Mr. A. A. Hughes, in reply, said when he looked round the room he wondered if it was a Cumberland dinner or a dinner of his Society, as they were represented by the Master, treasurer and junior steward. 'You have given us a very happy evening, a good meal and delightful company. How different to those bad old days when, speaking as a College Youth, the relations between our two Societies were not, putting it mildly, of the friendliest. To-day you are welcome in our towers and we have often seen your genial secretary at St. Paul's.'

The concluding toast of "The Press" was ably proposed br Mr. J. E. Bailey, with special reference to 'The Ringing World' and its three editors. Mr. T. W. White replied and expressed the indebtedness of the company to Mr. G. W. Steere, the hon. secretary and treasurer, on the excellence of arrangements

The artistes were Mr. and Mrs. W. Ayre, duet; J. A. Geerts, entertainer; Dorothy Townsend, soprano; Russell brothers, handbells; and V. S. Harrington, pianist.

The Rings of Pembrokeshire Pembrokeshire possesses only four-rings of bells, but is a county that holds much for every part of the county one can find a church. Most of these have square battiemented towers. One of the oldest bells in the county is that at Gumfreston Church, which is stated to date probably from 1350.
The four rings are at Haverfordwest (the county town), Pembroke, St. David's and Tenby, representing a fair distribution over the area. They are all rings of eight. There are in addition three other rings hung dead St. Teilo's, Penally (two mỉes south-west of Tenby), has a slim square battlemented tower at the west end with a set of five bells. They are crowded in line on a small wooden frame and have canons and wooden headstocks bolted to the frame. They are sounded by a chiming rack, with wires attached to the cappers. The approach to the belis is via a vertical wooden ladder attached to the wall
St. John's, Pembroke Dock, has a ring of eight hung dead. The tenor has weight 9 cwt. 3 qr. 32 Ib., and is inscribed to commemorate the Coronation of Edward VII. The ring was compieted by Mears and Stainbank, in 1902.
St. Andrew's, Narberth, has a ring of six hung dead. Taylors completed the six in 1890, tenor 9 cwt. approx. Robeston Walthen has its two original bells in the original oak frame, cast about 1670.

At one time there was a peal of bells on Caldey Island, at the Monastery. Some years ago the monks there at the time moved to Gloucestershire and took the hells with them. There is now no peal there. These bells ance were to be heard clearly in Tenby, 2 miles across the sea.
St. Mary's, Haverfordwest, has a peal of eight bells hung on ball bearings in a 17th century bell cage. An original peal of five, which was rung to we'come Cromwell when he visited the town in 1645, was recast as six in 1765 by Thomas Bayly, of Bridgwater, who added two new ones. No. 6 bears the inscription, 'I do my best for Haverfordwest.' Only one peal has been rung here- Superlative by a visiting party in 1927 ('The Ringing World,' vol. 22, page 630). At present a band is learning and can ring Grandsire Doubles.
St. Mary's, Pembroke, has a ring of eight, tenor 12 cmt . Many have tried to ing a pual here, but ail have failed. The bells are in bad condition and are now never rung. Change ringing has never been practised. Detai's are

St. David's Cathedral is in the extreme north-west corner of the county, 15 miles from a railway. The Cathedral, of purple sandstone, is surrounded by part of the ruins of the city walls. It is in a restored ietagonal tower forming one pillar of a gate in these walls that a modern peal of eight has been hung. In 1930 the tower (ruined and roofless) was restored and a concrete floor put in to hold the belis. As the tower is not high, the bells are separated from the ringers only by this floor, and the noise is tremendous The conductor has, to shriek his calls. One

\section*{Record Peal of Spliced Minor}

105 METHODS IN LINCOLNSHIRE.
In our jeal columns we record the remarkable performance of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Bray and Mr. George E. Feirn in ringing in hand a peal of Spliced Minor, containing 105 different methods and invo!ving 215 changes of method.
The peal was rung on Jume 30tli, which day was also Mr. Bray's birthday. Mr. Albert Lambkin was the witness and he checked each change of method. In this performance four new methods have been rung, viz., Bigby, Elsham, Bassingham and Dunholme Aliance, and we hope at a later date to publish them and the figures of the seven extents, four of which were prepared by Mr. A. G. Driver and three by Mr. C. K. Lewis.

\section*{St. Martin's Guild}

A fine afternoon, an excellent peal of ten bells and an ideal belfry in which to ring them, coupled with a goodly number present, a short service with the accompaniment of a good organ, followed by on excellent tea, all combined to make the quarterly meeting of the St. Martin's Guild at Solihull on July 5 th a very enjoyable event.
At the business meeting Mr. Vice-President Albert Walker occupied the chair in the unavoidable absence of the Master, Councillor Paddon Smith. The following new nembers were elected: As life members, Messrs. A. L. Bennett (Buckfastleigh), A. F. Thirst (Isleworth) J. J. I. Gilbert (Handsworth, Sheffie'd), and Miss Madeline M. Lyon (Leamington Spa); as ordinary members, Messrs. A. J. Morrall (Sutton Coldfield) and F. Morgan (Birmingham).

It was decided to hold the next bi-quarterly meeting at King's Norton on August 9th and the quarter'y meeting at Sutton Coldfield on Saturday, October 4tb.

The Secretary announced receipt of a letter from Mr. Joln Freeman, of Lincoln, giving notice that \(a\) band composed of members of the Lincoln Diocesan Guild would make an attempt to ring a peal of 14,144 London Surprise Major on August Bank Holiday next at Heydour, and thus beat the present record held by the St. Martin's Guild. It is interesting to note that the previous record was rung at King's Norton on May 11th, 1903, and consisted of 14,112 changes.

An appeal for a donation towards the cost of new ropes for the bells of St. Chad's (R.O.) Cathedral was made by Mr. W. E. Box and on the proposition of the treasurer, seconded by Mr.

This peal surpasses the one in 104 methods rung at Bigby on tower belis on July 19th, 1939. If it had not been for the war starting soon after the Bigby pear, Mr. Feirn writes that he is certain that band would have rung the 105 methods then.
peal-Grandsire Triples, March 28th, 1932has been rung there by a South Wales risiting band. Change ringing has never been practised. The bells, tenor 24 cwt . 3 qr .5 lb ., were cast in 1930 by Mears and Stainbank.
St. Mary-the-Virgin, Tenby, has a ling of eight, tenor 143 c cwt . in \(F\) sharp. Since John Carter visited Tenby about 1900 and he.ped the original change ringing band, there las always been change ringing there. The church is of magnificent proportions and seats 1,800 . The tower is on the southeast side and is surmounted by an octagonal spire 157 ft . from the ground, forming a well-known local sea mark. The belis were augmented in 1888 and have a wooden frame and plain bearings. The dates are : \(3,4,5,8,1789 ; 1,2,6\), Barwell, Birmingham, 1888. Five peals have been rung here, three of Grandsire Tripies, one of Double Norwich, and one of Bob Minor. The present band can ring Grandsire Triples and P1ain Bob Minor. (Visitors are always welcomewrites Mr. Jenkins, Nytlıfa, St. Mary's Street.)
The county has, therefore, heard only seven peals-and most methods are still unrung there, but the newly-formed St. David's Diocesan Association is doing much to help ringing in the county. As far as is known, no handbell peais have been rung in the countya chance for 'first' enthusiasts!

Rigg, for so generously providing tea, and to their enthusiastic ladies for serving it, was carried with acclamation. It was good to see Mr. Roland Bragg at the service and to find that in spite of his in capacity he had lost none of his former cheerfulness and happy disposition. His many old friends in the Guild wish him a speedy recovery.
During the afternoon and again in the evening the bel's were kept going in various methods ranging from Grandsire Caters to Cambridge Royal.

\section*{LETTERS TO THE EDITOR Truro Peal \\ Dear Sir, - After reading the letters from the Rev. Roberts and Mr. Lanxon, I think \\ The Diocese and Church Bell Ringers} ringers should know the other side of the story.
In the first place, I did not write the letter as Diocesan Ringing Master, and I do zot agree that it is an offence to write to "The Ringing World,' which is the ringers' own paper. If have broken a rule, many of our life members have done the same thing. If we are going to keep strictly to rules, we shall find that two ringers who rang in the peal are not members of our Guild, and one is Mr. Lanxon.
As regards the peal, these are the facts: A few weeks before Easter Mr. Lanxon asked if I would mind him approaching the Dean and Chapter for permission to ring a peal on Easter Monday. I agreed, hoping it wou'd encourage him to come on Sundays and for practice, but I am sorry to say we lave not seell him.
Two weeks after the peal failed a few Cathedral ringers, including myself, were ringing with the Rer. Roberts, and some other ringers who were in the peal, at a combined practice held at Camborne, but not a word was mentioned to us that a date had been fixed for another peal attempt at our tower.
A ferr days before the peal was to be rung I received a letter from Mr. Lanxon saying he had obtained permission from the Dean and Chapter to start for a peal on the following Saturdar. This was five weeks after the date was fixed. If Mr. Lanxon had said it was to be a jubilee peal I should have asked him to include at least one of our band.
We had been promised a ringers' meeting in the Truro Branch, which has gone dead, but it seems as if the peal must come before everything else. The Rev. Roberis, when arranging pea's at the Cathedral, alwars consulted me, and in some cases I took part in the peal with other members of our hand.
Asking the ringers for their advice before granting permission to people who wish to ring a peal is not losing authority over the bel.'s. In case there is any doubt, I may mention that this week a person was sent to me hy the Bishop regarding the ringing of our bells, and this morning the Sub-Dean phoned, asking me if it would be all right for St. Stephen's ringers to come and ring our bel's on Monday.
I would like ringers to lrnow that in the Dean and Chapter we have the finest men that any ringers could wish to serve under. There is always that personal touch inside and outside the Caithedral, and that's whr besides being ringers we are members of the Cathedra Fellowship.

Dear Sir,-I hope you will give me space to sav how much I flatly disagree with certain statements in your leading article under the heading of 'Frivolous.'
As my former estimate that eight ringers out of every ten are non-worshippers has never been disputed, may I ask how the majority of Sunday ringing can be designated an act of worship?
The standing of ringing to-day within the Church wou'd seem to rest on the fact that the Bishop is usual: \(y\) president of his Diocesan Association and that many clergy (not all) are well disposed towards ringers. Let me make the point that there is. I believe, no official mention of ringing in any diocesan handbook so far as I am aware.

A common fault of the whole Exercise is to regard progress in terms of peals rung and a'so to refer to ringers as beionging to towers rather than churches
If we were half as particular over the truth of our standing within the Church as we are over the truth of a peal or service touch we should see ringing in true unity with the Church, to the mutual advantage of bothand it goes without saying that if the Church is again to become a dominant power in the life of this nation, then there must be above all lovalty on the part of every individual, whether bishop, priest, deacon, ordinary lay-man-or bellinger.
As a churchman, my own attitude to ringing at present is governed by I. Corinthians, chapter 8.-Yours faithfull

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\section*{REVERBERATING}
' We have all been impressed by the length of time during which the reverberating hum of a great bell will linger on the air,' writes 'The Age,' Melbourne's daily newspaper, in an editorial on bells. The phenomenon intrigued the fancy of Charles Lamb, and Lord Frederic Hamilton, in his 'Here, There and Everywhere,' comments upon it most entertainingly. It has been the subject of scientific research, and we know there are competent pens within the Exercise who could give the correct answer to this question from Australia.

The immediate concern of 'The Age' is not so much an enquiry into physics as into the realm of romanticism. Whence do bells derive their distinctive genius for spanning the tyrannical chasms of time, they ask intriguingly, and quote the autobiography of Frank T. Bullen, in which he states that in his early days before the mast, nothing made him so homesick as the sound of bells. As the ship lay at anchor in some unfamiliar port, the bells from a nearby belfry would send his mind flying back across the oceans and across the years; his rough and roving sea life would be left worlds behind, and the surge of emotion would be almost uncontrollable.

This annihilation of both space and time is even more pronounced to-day by the introduction of broadcasting on a world-wide basis. 'The Age' reminds us of the poet of the African jungle expressing his sensations as his wireless set reiterated the chimes of Big Ben:-

Who shall appraise the hidden tears,
Born of the loneliness that sears,
As once more, sonorous and deep,
We hear the chimes that never sleep?
It sounds to us across the foam, The beating heart of all that's home; The very core of England's heart That holds us close, though far apart !
Other poets have come under a similar spell. Longfellow, in his 'Golden Legend,' describes Prince Henry and Elsie standing in the twilight on the terrace of the old castle at Vautsberg on the Rhine. Suddenly they catch the strains of distant bells and Elsie asks the Prince what bells they are. He replies that they are of Geisenheim and ring out the curfew, and then, with a touch of sentiment (and who can escape the spell?), adds:-

Dear Elsie, many years ago,
Those same soft bells at eventide
Rang in the ears of Charlemagne As, seated at Fastrada's side,

At Ingleheim, in all his pride,
He heard their sound with secret pain.
In fantasy, the vibrant hum of the bells is deathless. Another essayist, Mr. Arthur Scammell, in his 'Cheapside to Arcady,' points out that, long after the last stroke of the bell is heard in the building beneath the tower, the sound survives in the belfry in a protracted diminuendo. These lines are not for the practical ringer whose outlook is bounded by the accuracy of his peal and the mechanical perfection of the bell. Most of us have a grossness of our perceptive faculties and are unable to find any logic in Mr. Scammell's argument, but to the poet the tower may be alive with the thin ghosts of all the joyous and mournful notes that have endeared and embittered the sound of bells to human hearts. Thank you, Melbourne 'Age,' for this incursion into the realm of fantasy, and giving to your readers a new interest in British bells that ring out from your cathedral in the traditional British manner of change ringing.

Of these he should like to mention Winslow, Eynsham (under the leadership of Mr. Harry Floyd) and the keen band at Sunningwell.
Several restorations had been carried out, notably at Bloxham, where the noble ring of eight bells could again be heard: Deddington, where two trebles had been added to make another fine ring of eight.
In the South Oxon and Mid-Bucks Branch, Mr. F. Woodwards had retired from the secretaryship after very many years of liard and painstaking work. His successor is Mr. H. Badger, of Thame. Great keenness was being shown in several towers in this branch, including Shabbington, where the bells had been pronounced safe to ring after 30 years of chiming and where a keen young band was under instruction. Congratulations were extended to Miss Stella Davis and Mr. Farmer on having each completed a full year of office as secretaries of the Newbury and Witney and Woodstock branches respectively, in each case with conspicuous success.
The report contained a reference to the death of Mr. R. T. Hibbert, general secretary for nearly 30 years, stating: 'We continue to miss his inspiring leadership at Guild meetings most sorely, but we can feel thankful that his son, and successor in the office, is a chip off the old block.'
Miss Marie R. Gross presented the librarian's report, which mentioned that there had been a steady demand for the loan of books, especially for the bound volumes of 'Bell News' and The Ringing World.' which were presented
by Canon G. F. Coleridge. If any member had any ringing books which were no longer required, would he inform the librarian before disposing of them elsewhere? There were still a large number of old books which the Guild did not possess, especially the type of "The Bells of Gloucestershire' and 'The Bells of Cornwall.

\section*{NEARLY 100 PEALS}

The secretary's report said it had been a sad year oring to the resiguation of Canon Coleridge from the Mastership and the death of the secretary, and he must leave other pens to portray the valuable work his father did from 1917 until his death in March, 1846.
Nearly a hundred peals were rung during 1946, with Walter F. Judge well in the lead as conductor and with G. Gilbert still going strong with his lassies at Burnlam. Two outstanding performances were the 12,663 Stedman Cinques at Christ Church, conducted by Walter Judge, and a peal of Stedman Trip'es at East Itsley, conducted most admirably by James Higgins, of Oxford, aged 15 years; also seven different Surprise Major methods were rung and the first peal of New Cambridge Surprise Royal.
The hon. treasurer's reporis stated that the general funds of the Guild amounted to £491 16 s .8 d ., of which \(£ 41517 \mathrm{~s}\). was in the Restoration Fund. The appeal to Parochia! Church Councils resulted in \(£ 34.7 \mathrm{~s}\).
Officers elected were: Master, the Rev. C. E. Wigg; Deputy Master, Capt. A. B. Poyntz; trustees, the Rev. Canon G. F. Coleridge, Mr W. Evetts and Mr. A. D. Culium; hon treasurer, Mr. A. D. Barker; hon. secretary, Mr. W. Hibbert; librarian, Miss M. R. Cross; committee, Messrs. C. J. Hibbert, G. Caudwell, W. Dixon, J. T. Fowler, R. White, A. D. Cullum, H. Sear, J. W Wilkins, G. Holifield, W. F. Judge and A. Pink and Miss D. R. Fletcher; Central Council representatives, Mr . and Mrs. A. D. Barker, Mr. A. E. Locke and Mr. F. D. Boreham.
It was decided that the festival should again be held at Oxford next year. The meeting agreed to 15 guineas restoration grants to Cuddesdon, St. Paul's, Wokingham and Slough.
After a long discussion on suggestions that the increased cost of printing the reports should. be met by menbers paying 6d. for every peal they rang, or that the subscription to the Guild be increased from 1s. 6 d . to 2 s ., the question was referred to a special subcommittee

THE LUNCHEON.
A company of 258 sat down to luncheon at Christ Church Hall, which was attended by the Bishop of Oxford and the Bishop of Dorchester, hoth of whom welcomed the ringers and expressed the lope that the Guild would prosper.
The Master presided and the toast list included "The Visitors,' proposed by Mr. W. Hibbert and responded to by Mr. J. Harver (St. Martin's Guild) and Mr. R. Speed (president of Cambridge University Society) 'The Oxford Diocesan Guild, proposed by Mr. J. Hemming (Worcestershire and Districts Association) and replied to by the Master.
Canon Coleridge, now in his 91st year, was present, and all were pleased to observe that he had recovered from his illness when on his way to the Central Council meeting. Haring the chance of a ride home to Crowthorne. he left immediately after lunch, and as he walked down the long hall the company rose and with a spontaneous gesture of love and affection for a grand old English , gentleman sang 'For he's a jolly good fellow.' The Canon, very much moved, wished the meeting a very happy dar and the Guild long life and prosperity for the future.

\section*{NEW DISTRICTS BEING FORMED.}

The anuual meeting was heid at Manchester on July 5th, when 38 members attended from Bowden, Burfon-on-Stather, Caister-on-sea, Duffield, Ealing, Epsom, Flixton, Halstead, Hyde, Leicester, Leeds, London, Macclesfield, Norbury, North Mymms, Nottingham, Pebmarsh, Scunthorpe, Stockport, Todmorden and Wallasey.
The bells of Manchester Cathedral and Town Hal afforded the members a good opportunity of trying their skill on heavy bells, and at the Cathedral rounds, Grandsire Caters and Kent Trebie Bob Royal were rung by Guiid members entirely.
Erensong at the Cathedral was conducted by the Precentor, the Rev. W. Megicks, and the lessons were read by the Rev. F. F. Rigby, president of the Lancashire Association, and the Rev. Canon H. F. Woolnough.
After tea, attended by 63 ringers, the Rev. F. F. Rigby welcomed the (iuild to Manchester on behalf of the Lancashire Association, to which Mrs. R. F. Deal replied.
Through the unavoidable absence of Miss E. Steel, president of the Guild, the chair at the meeting was taken by Mrs. R. F. Deal, vicepresident of the London District. The retiring president, Miss E. Steel, had notified the secretary that she would not seek re-election, but the members feit they would wish her to be present when she handed over the office which she had held for 20 years, and she was therefore re-elected. Mrs. G. W. Fletcher was reeiected hon. secretary and treasurer, and Mrs. Fletcher, Mrs. Richardson and Miss Steel representatives on the Central Council.
A long discussion took place regarding the new districts in course of formation, and it was eventually decided to form a NorthEastern and North-Western District in prace of the present Northern District, a Midland District to replace the North Midland District, and to restore the former Lincolnshire District. The London District would revert to the original title of Central District. It was left to the members of the Southern and Central Districts to discuss divisions with the newlyformed branch in Sussex and Kent, and to report at the next meeting.

It was decided to hold the next meeting in London and if possible to arrange a reunion dinner the same day.

\section*{HIGH WYCOMBE'S TWINS}

High Wycombe's twin sisters-the Misses Sylvia and Doreen Coker - are in our peal columns. At the age of 15 they first visifed All Saints' belfry in the summer of 1945, and by the following spring were bunting the treble to Grandsire Doubles.

Then Sylvia injured her arm in the playing field and for nearly 12 months she dared not touch a bell rope. All this time she continued to attend the weekly practices watching her sister's progress and keeping in step so far as possible on handbells.

Eventually came the day when she was allowed to handle a bell rope and the sequel is to be found in our peal columns.

\section*{A Doctors' Peal}

BAND TRAVELLED 562 MILES.
After two unsuccessful attempts and one postponement, a peal of Bob Minor lias, for the first time, been rumg by a band of six doctors at Abbots Langley, Herts. On June 12th, during the week following Victory Day, last year, Bob Minor was rung for 55 minutes; and on September 18th, Kent Treble Bob Minor for 2 hours 19 minutes. The dedication is that original'y decided upon at the first attempt.

At no time since this peal was mooted some 18 months ago were more than mine doctors known to be active ringers, and the loss of Ur. J. Moreland-Smith, who stood in the last attempt, and who died in April, while the present one was being arranged, has been very keenly feit.

Another difficulty, which appeared to be almost unsurmountabie, has been the distance apart of those availabic; the ringer of the treble has only recently retired from practice in Sevenoaks, but has travelled up from Tintagel, Cornwall, on each occasion to take part.
The rest of the band came, in the order of ringing, from Romford (lissex), Abbots Langley, Wareham (Dorset), Ash (near Canterbury, Kent) and Great laddow (Essex). It is estimated that the band trave.led a distance of 562 mives from their homes to reach the tower. Is this a record for a six-bell peal?

\section*{ELY DIOCESAN ASSOCIATION}

JUBILEE FESTIVAL.
Ringers from a wide area gathered in Eiy on July 5th for the Association's jubiee festival. After ringing at St. Mary's Church, a service was held in the choir of the Cathedral, the Bishop of Ely giving the address.
Tea was served at St. Mary's Hotel, when the ringers were joined by the Bishop, Canon Covey-Crump, the Rev. J. B. Rowsell (Vicar of St. Mary's) and the Rev. H. M. Boswell (Vicar of Wilburton).
Canon Covey-Crump, who was the ïrst general secretary (now 83 years old and still going strong) recalled the inaugural meeting of 50 years ago, and wished the Association every success in the future.
The Bishop expressed his pleasure at Eeing present, and spoke of his interest in the Association's work in the diocese. On behalf of the ringers, the Rev. J. P. Pelloe (Vicar of Wisbech) expressed thanks to the Bishop for his interest and for giving the address.

After tea ringing was resumed at St. Mary's, and the bells of Littleport and Wilburton were also available.

\section*{TRURO DIOCESAN GUILD}

The Diocesan Festival was held at Saltash on July 5th, about sixty being present, including the president, Miss E. Symons, the Assistant Ringing Master, Mr. H. J. Clark, and several members of the Devon Guild. There were five towers available, Saltash, St. Stephen-by-Saltash, Botus Fleming, Landulph and St. German's, all with six bells except the last, which has eight. St. Stephen is about the finest six in England and ought to be better known; with a tenor of 16 cwt. the tone is giorious and the 'go' of the bells perfect.

A service was held in Saltash Church, conducted by the Vicar, Canon Prior, who had already welcomed the ringers in the belfry. The lesson was read by the Rev. W. H. R. Trewhetla, secretary of the Guild, and the sermon preached hy the Rev. H. M. Brown, Vicar of Torpoint, who is himself a change ringer. The arrangements for the tea and the ringing at Saltash were made by Mr. H. Batten, the captain of the Saltash ringers.
It was an experiment holding the Diocesan Festival on the extreme edge of the county, but it was justified if only that it attracted some of the Devon Guild, for the Truro Guild is an offspring of the Devon Guild and the two Guilds ought to mingle from time to time.

Council Guidance Wanted

\section*{on delivquent peals}

Dear Sir,-May I most heartily endorse and add to Mr. F. W. Housden's remarks iu your recent issue. The Exercise naturally expects to have the Council's guidance on obscure and difficult points, however debatable or tedious they may be, and, in shirking the issue of the three 'delinquent peals' (varied and rung under diverse sets of circumstances as they obviously were) without considering each one on its merits and in reation to the existing rules, I feel that the Council failed to do its job.
Stunts there are and always will be, in ringing as in everything else. Some. no doubt, are quite unnecessary and serve no useful purpose, others (such as the peal of Stedman Sextuples and that conducted from outside a tower some years ago) are extremely cever and interesting performances, whilst yet olhers are born of necessity or owing to peculiar local circumstances, and it is with the latter I am principally concerned.
Since I first wrote you regarding the Basingstoke 'peal' over a year ago, I have received many letters from ringers in various parts of the country, several of which I regret I have been unable to answer, but all of which at least imply that there is certainly no lack of interest in this subject. A most significant factor, I find, is that all those ringing friends who disagree with my views hail from such districts as London, Birmingham or Leicester, where, from the word 'go,' anyone with reasonable aptitude and keenness is assured of a comparatively successful ringing career and not from any tower where to start any change ringing at all involves a long, bitter and uneven struggle against powerful local influences and prejudices such as a. we.l-established stoney ' band.
I wonder if Mr. P. J. Johnson and those other gentlemen who talk so glibly of what the pubic want and do not want have ever in actual fact made any unbiased auditory test in this connection. I have and, as a result. am perfectly satisfied that the majority of non-ringers have, for instance, a distinct preference for Doubles, Minor and Major with a cover rather than without, but do not care a very great deal anyway. I suggest that Mr. Newnan's dislike of Kent Minor with a cover is not actuated by any true musical consideration at all, but is solely because, as a ringer lie first became used to hearing it without.
No, sir, in my submission our art is brought into ridicule far more by the Council's inconsistent rejection of a peal which is similar to one it has recognised previously and by illogical rules which veto a peal on nine bells in the diatonic scale, but accept one on five which are cracked or out of tune. Does Mr. Smallwood seriously consider that a thorough overhaul of such a farcical situation (and there are others as ludicrous) is not required?
Finally. in fairness to Mr. Felstead, I would point out that, although he may be a comparative newcomer to the Exercise, several of his supporters are by no means as ' raw,' and, whilst perlaps they are in a minority, minorities have very frequently throughout the ages proved to be right, in the end.-Yours faithfully,

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\section*{WINCHESTER}

By a coincidence the report of the annual meeting of the Winchester and Portsmouth Diocesan Guild is appearing in the same issue as the history of its vigorous daughter, the Guildford Diocesan Guild. The Winchester Diocesan Guild is among the senior of the territorial ringing organisations, being founded in 1879, the year after its veteran Master and a vice-president, Mr. George Williams, started change ringing. This story of continuity is a feature of the life of this Guild, as early this year we published a picture of six veterans who had each more than 50 years' membership and rang a 720 Bob Minor together at Swanmore, viz, : Messrs. A. Millard, G. Chappell, G. Williams, W. Linter, F. W. Burnett and H. W. Merrett.

Our subject, however, is not so much of the past as the present, as told in the comprehensive printed annual report for 1946, and it is a sign of better times as far as the Exercise is concerned that these reports are appearing. The Winchester and Portsmouth operates through eight districts, some of which are vigorous centres. Portsmouth district elected 27 new members, Southampton 16 and Winchester, the largest district numerically, 5 There are districts where the setbacks arising from the war still keep numbers below the pre-war level, and the immediate problem is to make good this deficit. The two dioceses have not yet a hundred per cent. coverage as there are two eight and eight six-bell towers not affiliated. Probably the majority of these towers are not satisfactory from a ringing point of view, but there is no lack of evidence that a substantial amount of work is necessary on the part of Guild and district officers to ensure that a full complement of ringers who are members of the Guild exists in every tower. This maintenance of bands of regular Sunday ringers, who efficiently discharge their duties, is the primary function of every diocesan Guild, and should never be allowed to recede into the background.

Good ringing will not be created by series of short touches at services or meetings, a point emphasised in this issue by a North Country Ringing Master. Performance ringing of lengths of 720 and upwards is essential for the furtherance of our art. This is well maintained by the Guild. Not all of it was of the publicised performance type. The bells at Wickham and in neighbouring towers were rung during 1945 for seventy-five \(7^{20}\) 's, in which \(4^{2}\) ringers participated. Peal ringing is in no sense neglected by the Guild. Of the \(5^{8}\) peals
scored in 1946 io were in hand, all by the Bournemouth enthusiasts. There was variety in the methods. Among the \(x_{3}\) Surprise peals were Painswick, London, Yorkshire, Cambridge and Superlative. No longer is it necessary to scarify the diocese for a Grandsire band, as the 90 -year-old Master recently recalled. There were no fewer than 13 conductors for the peals, one of whom was a lady, Mrs. Marshallsay.

Finally, Basingstoke is within the area of this Guild. Under the heading of miscellaneous performances are printed the 5,021 Grandsire Caters and the 5,184 Kent Treble Bob Major with the tenor covering, with this footnote: 'The above 5,000 's were not recognised by the Central Council as "peals " since they did not conform to its rule.' This loyalty is commendable.

IN AFFILIATION WITH CENTRAL COUNCIL THE GUILDFORD DIOCESAN GUILD
}

The life of the Guildford Diocesan Guild is so comparatively short that this article must of necessity take more the form of an essay than a history.
In face of some opposition, which, as subsequent events proved, was purely on sentimental grounds, the Guildford Diocesan Guild of Church Bellringers was inaugurated on December 31st, 1927, as a logical sequence to the division of the ancient Diocese of Winchester, out of which the present Guildford Diocese was created by an Order in Council dated May 1st, 1927.
It must be said at once to the credit of those who were at the outset opposed to the creation of a fresh organisation that they bowed unreservedly to the will of the overwhelming majority, and from the first worked wholeheartedly in support of the new Guiid.
The Diocese of Guildford covers about 300 square miles, comprising roughly the western half of the county of Surrey and a small strip of the adjoining county of Hants, and, of course, the new Guild rightly claimed to be, and set out to make itself, the principal ringing organisation in that area.
There were, on the formation of the Guild, 56 towers in the diocese with five bells or more hung for ringing and one further completely new peal of eight has since been installed.
For convenience of working, the Guild's area was divided at the outset into four districts, each a self-contained unit holding independent meetings. controlling its own finances and appointing officers.
The central organisation of the Guild derives its funds from a percentage levy on the districts.
Unfortunately, owing to the necessity of keeping in mind the question of inter-communication in each district, it was not possible to form four districts all of equal size, but generally the scheme of division has been successful and made for very efficient working.

\section*{A WORTHY TRIO}

The Guild had the great fortune to enlist as its founder secretary the late J. S. Goldsmith, who served for ten years in that office, and it is not perhaps out of place to quote here part of the tribute that was paid to Mr. Goldsmith on his retirement from the office of secretary:-
'His inspiration and hard work has created a diocesan spirit among the ringers in the Guild, and, while many felt keenly the severance from the Mother Guild of Winchester, a spirit of youth and adventure has permeated the towers of this new Guild, and there is today a particularly solid foundation for ringing in this area.
Our first Master was the late J. H. B. Hesse, who then lived at Haslemere and whose ringing abilities need no stressing here. He held the office without challenge until, to the regret of all members, in the early days of the late war he left the Diocese.
Another distinguished service man, in the person of Admiral T. P. Walker, D.S.O., of Old Woking, an enthusiastic and practical ringer, although he entered the ranks of the Exercise long after he reached the retiring age in the Senior Serrice, was our first treasurer, and it was with a deep sense of grief and personal loss that in 1932 we laid to rest this great-hearted Christian gentleman.

Reference could in all justice be made to the valued services to the Guild of many more of its founder members, but it is perhaps sufficient for the purposes of this brief history to mention only two others, both non-ringers and both of whom have passed from this life, namely, Canon E. C. Kirwan, Provost of the namely, Canon E. C. Kirwan, Provost of the

ter Harrison, of Guildford. The Guild owes a debt of gratitude to them for their assistance and counsel in early days.
A great deal of the Diocese of Guildford, especially in its southern half, is, in spite of the great housing estates which have been built within its borders in fairly recent years to act as dormitories for the great daytime population of London, still completely rural, and there are no really large towns in the area to form populous centres from which bands capable of practising advanced methods can be drawn from a compact area. In these circumstances it is understandable that the Guild has few centres at which ringing in the higher methods is generally practised. Indeed, the officers and tower leaders find that great efforts are needed to maintain Sunday service bands capable of ringing even the simpler methods, but throughout its existence the Guild has been fortunate enough to find many men who have been real leaders and workers in their own small and often isolated centres.
Up to the end of 1946 a total of 526 peals had been rung for the Guildford Guild, a large percentage of these being the result of Mr. A. H. Pulling's enthusiasm for that branch of the art.
It has never been the policy of the Guild to build up large balances on general account, and from the first the members have voted on every opportunity and to the extent of available funds donations towards bell restorations and augmentations within the diocese. In the comparatively short history of the Guild well over \(£ 100\) has been applied out of central and district balances in this connection. In addition, an amount totalling nearly \(£ 50\) has been collected and allocated to a fund to assist in providing a ringing peal for the new

Cathedral of the diocese when eventually that building is completed.
Entirely apart from the last-mentioned fund, the members have subscribed, as a fund to provide a memorial to the late J. S. Goldsmith, about \(£ 60\), out of which it is intended to give a Sacring bell as part of the furnishing of the new Cathedral
' It is, of course, quite outside the scope of this article to describe the ringing conditions at towers within the diocese, but brief reference to the bells at some of the more important places will not be out of place.

PRINCIPAL TOWERS
Guildford-the county town of Surrey and situated practically in the centre of the diocese has three ringing peals within its borough boundaries: ten at \(S\). Nicolas', eight at the Cathedral Church of Holy Trinity and a. humble six at Merrow Parish Church. Pera. humble six at
haps S. Nicolas' chief claim to mention here is the fact that the Guild's library, which contains some rare and valuable volumes, is foused in the spacious ringing room, as the bells, although easily handled, are somewhat odd struck and the acoustic arrangements are interfered with by the fact that the draught is short and the sallies have, when through the eyelet holes, a tendency to muffle the back strokes.

A large proportion of the Guild's peals have been secured on the grand eight at the Cathedral Church in spite of the fact that they hang in a brick tower with marked elastic properties and that, in the words of a wellknown ringer, you earn any peals you ring on these bells. The fact, too, that many peals are rung in the centre of a town without undue complaint from the neighbourhood is a testimonial to the efficiency of the shutters with which the louvres are blocked for these occasions.
That part of the diocese which lies north of Leatherhead and comprises the Epsom towers of Christ Church (eight) and St. Martin's (ten). lends itself best to inter-tower visits, and it is hardly to be wondered at that at Leatherheal alone the consistent ringing of advanced methods on its easily handled and fairly melodious, if somewhat clamorous, ring of ten, has been maintained from the frrmation of the diocese to the present time, although now another tower in the same dis-trict-Banstead, on the borders of the diocese -with a ring of eight, rung from the ground floor and rejoicing in a fairly long draught of rope, seems to threaten Leatherhead's former monopoly.
The light ten at Haslemere, rung from the ground floor, and on which our first Master lavished so much attention, are the Guild's show piece as regards ease of handling and musical and acoustic properties.

The recently recast and rehung eights at Shalford and Chiddingfold are both a delight to the ear and a joy to handle.
Ranmore's eight, on the high ridge ahove Dorking, had a reputation for quality, hut, alas, of recent years they have been seldom heard, and at present, through lack of ropes, are unringable.

Although the spacious belfry at Farnham, which church was claimed in some quarters to be the most suitable one for the pro-Cathedral of the diocese, provides plenty of accommodation for a large meeting, its heavy ring of
tid eiglit, mostly odd struck, hung in a large circle, and none too musical, require a better
band, than is usually found haphazard at a maeting to make them sound their best.
Mention has now been made of at least one tower in each district of the Guild except the Chertsey area, and, as in all justice reference must be made to one tower in that district, it is fitting to include Chertsey, nominally the

mother tower of the district, where a heavy eight with a long rope stretching from the ground floor has been going too badly in recent years to be attractive. These bells have now been relung, and the Guild officers sincerely hope that this improvement wili have its repercussions in the area

Although the Nazi H.E.'s and incendiaries were scattered throughout the Guildford diocese with a fair degree of liberality and impartiality and many doodlebugs chose our towns, villages, woods and fields as landing grounds with the truly delightful uncertainty which was the essence of the entertainment afforded by these amazing examples of human ingenuity, our churches generally (but for one direct hit at a spot in the heart of rural Surrey) suffered little but blast damage, and our bells (except in that one instance-and it was not a ringing peal)-none.

Many bands, however, were seriously depleted by the call of their younger members to arms and the toll of war has robbed the diocese of a number of promising ringers. In addition, some who left us for war and who were fortunate enough to escape inclusion in the casualty lists have settled down in other areas, but many have returned, and with an influx of recruits most bands have resumed activities and are rapidly building up to their pre-war standard.

So, in a county whose population is not likely to decrease and where money for improvements should be readily forthcoming, with no long years of history from which to fashion precedents and no musty traditions to fetter its activities, the Guildford Guild looks confidently forward to a bright and prosperous future-to the day when its life will be centred around the great new Cathedral of the Holy Spirit, which, until the necessities of war called a temporary halt, was rapidly rising on high ground above the mean level of the town of Guildford, and in which it is intended eventually to hang a ringing peal worthy of the noble building housing them as they, in the words of Tennyson,

Ring in the valiant man and free,
The largen heart, the kindlier hand;
Ring out the darkness of the land;
Ring in the Christ that is to be.'

The proposed revised Form of Service as drawn up by a sub-committee comprising Canon F. A. Berrisford (Bramshott), the Rev F. S. H. Marle (Deane) and the Rev. K. W. H. Felstead (Southampton) was presented by the Rev. Marle and was approved, with minor alterations. The Archdeacon suggested that as a trial it might be used that evening at the Guild service, the Vicar of Newport (Canon W. B. Hogg) saying that it would give him the greatest pleasure to conduct it

A detailed report of the Central Council meeting at Exeter especially covering the points raised by the Guild's representatives, was given by Mr. G. Pullinger, for which he was heartily thanked. It was suggested that the date of future annual general meetings be altered so that they would be held kefore the Central Council meetings, but after a discussion it was felt that no change was warranted. It was decided to hold next year's annual meeting at Andover (where the bells have been recently restored) on the first Saturday in July.

A discussion arose on the question of increasing the Guild's income, and on the pronosition of Mr. Upton (Newport), seconded by Mr. Hunt (Portsmouth), it was suggested that the subscription be raised from 2s. to \(2 s .6 d\). for ringing members. Mr. Tucker (North Stoneham) objected to the increase fearing a loss of membership, but it was eventually agreed to place it on the agenda of the next annual meeting to take effect as from January 1st, 1949.

An appeal was received on behalf of the restoration of the bells at Wolverton, and it

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\section*{THE OUTING}

To those who will not this year enjoy a holiday by the sea we reproduce the experiences of members of the Guild of Devonshire Ringers on tour in the neighbourhood of Kilkhampton, Cornwall. All who revel in Cornwall and Devon will renew their holiday memories by these lines.
' The party met at Clawton, near Holsworthy and, after a few touches on a handy six, proceeded to Pancraswyke. The tower, standing on an eminence near the Bude main road, was at last "discovered." Friend A. A. Searle " led up" the really fine five (tenor 14 or \({ }^{10}\) cwt.), and though he looked ruefully at the diminutive sally of the treble, he found her quite responsive to expert touch. The tower stands high above tall trees, and it may be wondered why Pancraswyke has been so elusive. And what a fine church; even as Clawton, it. is beautiful.
' Our next objective was Morwenstowe in the northern tip of Cornwall. As we descended the hill from Shop we had views of the great Atlantic and Lundy Island, and we remembered the wonderful butterflies and lanes, the pure air and tall cliffs above Rose Passmore's beach. Morwenstowe Church tower is a landmark for sailors, built almost in a valley between headlands 400 feet high. The church is a gem for the ecclesiologist and the antiquarian. The Saxon font, of unusual shape, the Norman doorway and arcade with the Earlv English chancel are notable features. Prebendary Cox would have discovered "Hawker's Hut," where the eccentric old parson wrote: -
"Still points the tower and pleads the bell, The solemn arches breathe in stone; Window and wall have life to tell The mighty faith of days unknown."
'When all the party had rung touches on the merry little six we proceeded to Welcombe, but the way was not easy. - After taking wrong turnings through lack of signposts, we eventually arrived at the church and set the really beautiful light six going to Grandsire Doubles. Turning our backs once more on the expanse of the Atlantic, we ran on to Kilkhampton, arriving just in time to secure a cup of tea. Kilkhampton Church, so well known to tourists and famed for its wonderful oak pews, bench ends and fine monuments, has a good six rehung by Gillett and Johnston in 1925.
- By the time Poughill was reached the day was ending; even so we could admire what has been called the most beautiful village in our land. The really splendid six were a joy to ring. Stratton was our last tower. Mr. H. G. Myers led up the treble to a good rise and all the party, except the ladies, took part in touches of beautifully struck Triples. And so the end of a happy day had come; Messrs. Myers proceeded to Plymouth, the Rev. Cox and his party to Exeter and ourselves to Okehampton and Petrockstowe, leaving behind Jack, Charles and Fred Sangwin with Rounce Hill all well satisfied with a most interesting outing.' F. C. S.

THE INAUGURAL MEETING, 1886.

\section*{On March 2nd (1886) I attended, and} spoke at, a meeting at Hereford which resulted in the formation of an Association of Change Ringers for that Diocese'-so wrote the Rev. F. E. Robinson in his book 'Among the Bells,' and in the following July he records that 'it fell to my lot to conduct Holt's Original peal of 5,040 Grandsire Triples under the beautiful spire of St. Mary's Church, Ross.' Though this was the second peal rung for the Hereford Guild, the Rev. F. E. Robinson maintained no further, connection with it, and it is not among the twenty-six societies of which he claimed membership on the title page of his book.
The Rev. C. D. P. Davies, another wellknown clerical ringer, was also invited to speak at this inaugural meeting. He had recently come as curate to Redmarley, just over the Gloucestershire border, and was the newlyappointed Master of the Gloucester Association. But being a near neighbour, he joined the Hereford Guild as a ringing member, and in the following April came to Ross as one of 'eight members of the Association' who at tempted, but failed, to ring the first peal for the Guild. For many years afterwards he subscribed regularly as a member, but he never accomplished a peal for the Hereford Guild. Unfortunately this early association of the Guild with both these famous clerical ringers was in later years forgotten

The real founder of the Guild was the Rev G. M. Custance, Rector of Colwall. He it was who arranged this inaugural meeting and became the first secretary of the Guild. He had also interested Canon Musgrave of the Cathedral, who took the chair, and a number of other clergy in the diocese, notably Preb. Phillott, Rector of Staunton-on-W ye, who was elected treasurer. But there is no doubt that enthusiasm came as much from the sons of two of these rectors, Arthur F. M. Custance and George H. Phillott. Both of them had been up at the University of Oxford (the latter with the Rev. C. D. P. Davies, son of the Vicar of Tewkesbury), and both had rung peals with C.D.P. and with the Rev. F. E. Robinson, Master of the Oxford Guild. Thus it was through them that these two clerical ringers were invited to speak at the inaugural meeting. Thus, too, Mr. G. H. Phillott was elected first Master of the Guild and Mr. A. F. M. Custance to the committee.

However, it was by no means only the clergy and their sons who were behind this movement for the formation of a Guild There were already several centres of change ringing in the Diocese and a number of ringers, six of whom served on the first com mittee, and among these John Overton, of Bridgnorton, and John Wall, of Ross, conductor of the first local peal by the Guild

\section*{EARLY CHANGE RINGING}

Hereford Diocese, comprising the whole of Herefordshire and the southern half of Shropshire, is a rural diocese of scattered villages, a few small market towns and the Cathedral City. At the time of the formation of the Guild there was but one ring of ten (at the Cathedral) and some ten rings of eight in the whole Diocese, otherwise there were only fives and sixes in the village towers. There are now three tens and 21 eights.

Before the middle of the nineteenth century change ringing had been almost unknown The first peal rung in the Diocese was one of Grandsire Triples at Condover (Salop) in 1842; but this was rung by a visiting band from Shrewsbury, which is outside the Diocese. In 1851 a local band at Ross accomplished the first peal in Herefordshire and the

first in the diocese by a local band. Change ringing must therefore have been introduced at Ross somewhat earlier. In 1882 the Ross Society rang Holt's Original, and after the formation of the Guild in 1886 the first five peals in the Diocese (all of Grandsire Triples) were rung at Ross. Ross has ever since re mained a stronghold of the Guild.

Bridgnorth, at the other end of the Diocese, was another early centre of change ringing for the Guild. In this tower it was due very largely to one stalwart ringer and leader, John Overton. In 1874 two bells had been added to the old six of St. Leonard's Church to make an eight, and a peal of Triples had been rung at the opening by a risiting band, which was afterwards proved to be false. This no doubt inspired Mr. John Overton to learn ringing, and a year later he became head ringer of the band, a post he held till his death in 1939 at the age of \(88^{*}\). The first true peal on these bells was called by J. W. Washbrook in 1887, and although Mr. Overton rang in it, most of the band came from Kidderminster, so that it was not rung for the Guild. By 1891 the Bridgnorth band was ringing peals, and in 1907 they accomplished the first peal of Stedman Triples in the Diocese by a completely local band, and in 1933 of Double Norwich.

\section*{AIM OF THE NEWLY-FORMED GUILD.}

Elsewhere call changes were the normal method of ringing throughout the Diocese Thus the Guild, on its formation, set itself to cultivate the art of change ringing as being the keystone to its deeper object of belfry reform. The point of view of the founders is

well summed up in the words of Preb. Phillott at the inaugural meeting: 'Round ringing is utterly dreary and spells monotony; monotony produces weariness of mind; weariness of mind that of body; weariness of body suggests thirst. Do away with monotony and have scientific ringing, which will elevate ringers:

It was no easy task that the Guild set itself to accomplish in this Diocese of small scattered villages; but the history of the Guild shows that it started this work in the right way, and has gone far to accomplish what it set out to do-at least as regards the cultivation of change ringing and belfry reform.

QUALIFIED INSTRUCTORS.
To begin with, however, it was necessary to appoint a qualified instructor (on the lines of tlre Oxford Guild), and the first instructor of the Hereford Guild was the famous J. W. Washbrook. During 1886-7 Mr. Washbrook visited many towers in the Diocese as instructor, and it is to the honour of the Guild that the 'first peal achieved by this newly-formed Associalion' at Ross was conducted by him.
In 1887 Mr. W. H. Fussell, of Slough, was appointed the instructor, a post he held until 1895, when he was succeeded by Mr. J. E. Groves, and after 1902 by Mr. William Short, of Stourbridge. Thus many of the early peals of the Guild were conducted by these famous ringers, whose real homes were outside the Diocese.

The system of having a paid instructor continued until the Great War of 1914-18, although after 1902 several local ringers like Mr . Charles Layton, of Colwall, and Mr. T. J. Bration, of Welshpool, acted as assistants.

By this method of systematic instruction, change ringing was introduced and developed not only in the bigger centres but also in the villages all over the Diocese, and many of the five and six-bell bands soon became proficient in the art, though all the early peals were of Triples. The first peal of Minor was rung at Mathon in 1896, but it was not until 1901 that the first peal of Doubles was rung at Eastnor. A few years later peals on five or six bells became common, and the present large proportion of peals of Doubles in the Diocese is clear evidence that change ringing has spread into the villages, for of the 140 towers in the Diocese with rings, only 24 have more than six bells.

\section*{THE ANNUAL FESTIVAL}

Besides the appointment of a qualified instructor, the other most characteristic feature of the Guild in its early days was the annual festival. It was held during the summer in a different parish in the Diocese each year. There were the regular features of a service with a special preacher, a dinner and a meeting, and of course ringing. Often several neighbouring towers were also available, and horse conveyances (and later motor-cars) were chartered to take parties to them. Occasionaily, as at Ross in 1906, a steamer was employed instead to take ringers up the River Wye to ring at Foy. But other attractions than ringing were not despised. At Bridgnorth in 1909 barge trips were arranged up the Severn, and at Ledbury in 1911 most ringers also paid a visit to the agricultural show.

Since the formation of the districts the annual meeting has lost something of its festive character, and any outside attraction now that took members away from ringing would be frowned upon. For many years, too, it has been held on Whit Monday and usually at Hereford, though occasional visits to Ludlow or Bridgnorth have been arranged for the sake of the Shropshire members.

The chairman, Mr. W. Dyer, then mentioned the reason for the meeting, and called on the present secretary (Mr. C. Rouse) to give an account of the formation and progress of the branch, which was started in 1919 with 19 members. Mr. Yeend became officially secretary in 1923 and retired through ill-health in 1946 In that time 58 meetings were held, and \(£ 117\) collected.

Mr. Waite, Gloucester, spoke of knowing Mr. Yeend and of his help when he was quite young. Mr. G. Kilmister, in calling on Rev. N. Hope to make the presentation, said a great point was how Mr. Yeend had helped and encouraged the young members.

The Rev. Hope stressed the danger of the public becoming used to recorded bells broadcast from towers, and urged all to strive for new bells where there are none. Mr. Yeend, in his reply, said the years had been happy ones, and especially so when teaching a young band.

The evening closed with a social gathering at the Western Hotel, ably organised by Mr. T. Boreham, who was also responsible for the subscription lists. Forty-five members and friends were present from Cheltenham and nearly every tower in the branch-Gloucester, Tewkesbury and Cirencester Branches, Taunton, Nottingham and Manchester.

SUMMER MEETING AT HOAR CROSS.
The summer meeting of the Guild was held on July 26th in glorious weather at the wonderful Church of Holy Angels, Hoar Cross, near Burton-on-Trent.

Built by the beneficence of Lord and Lady Meynell Ingram, this church possesses features such as may be found in few churches of its size. Beautifully proportioned and rich in carving of wood and stone, its beauty holds one spellbound.

By the death of Mr. Frank Medhurst on July 11th, at the age of 77, Christ Church, St. Leonards-on-Sea, has lost its leader and oldest ringing member.
Mr. Medhurst commenced his ringing career as a pupil of the late Mr. George IWatson in 1897, and in 1898 was proved - an efficient ringer and elected a member of the Sussex County Association.

\section*{MR. F. ROWLINSON.}

We regret to announce the death of Mr. F . Rowlinson, of Peterborough, which took place on July 18th.

\section*{Rules}

\section*{Dear Sir,-Writing as a Central Council} delegate who has followed, with keen interest and some anxiety, all discussions and correspondence regarding our rules, I feel that we should, without further ado, ask ourselves in all seriousness the pertinent question: What are rules?
Rules can best be defined as being 'the formula of the unwritfen law.' Their sole purpose is to guide, encourage, and assist members toward fulfilment of what are considered to be the highest principles forming the basis or foundation of any specific body.
For instance: A rule governing subscriptions is never primarily of monetary importance. Members are asked to pay subscriptions chiefly because it is 'an unwritten law' that no person can give of his best without some cost to himself, nor can he get the best out of that body of which he is a member unless he recogrises this principle.
Or again; in the realms of sport. Handicaps are not placed upon respective competitors in order to give the other 'chaps' a chance. It is to ensure that the individual must give of his best to win. So with our rules, especially that governing peals.
When one seriously considers the many advantages ringers of to-day have over their predecessors it is difficult to believe that anyone who prides himself upon improving on past performances should advocate the relaxing of our rules. This, however, is of minor importance. What the Central Council have to consider is: Will the alterations suggested enhance the fulfilment of our highest principles by each of our members?

I say without fear of contradiction that one of our fundamental principles is 'responsive recognition of one's obligations,' and I suggest that alteration of the rule governing peals as has been advocated will undermine this principle.

No member should at any time be encouraged to ease his conscience with the thought, - They can ring Minor with a cover if I'm not there,' either for peal or service ringing.
Consider also the member who has yet to ring his first peal. In the majority of cases his or her chance will come only when it is impossible to complete the band without them, and if the rule is relazed in order to avoid the trouble of looking for them, not only will their opportunity be long delayed, but the time will not be far distant when it is the rule rather than the exception, that seven-bell peals are rung in eight-bell towers, and, what is far more serious, absenteeism from service ringing will be prevalent.

I was therefore very glad to see that they had used his composition for the third extent instead of a rather simpler composition by myself. For the sake of those who may be interested I enclose the figures. Incidentally Mr. Driver's remarks on receiving it are worthy of quotation to show the type of man he was: ' Your new arrangement for the 17 methods is very welcome' (then follows a description of how he got his composition). - But this new composition of yours is immeasurably superior in that it has two singles per part instead of six.

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\section*{KEITH HART}

The Exercise has lost by the passing of Mr. Keith Hart, of Brighton, one of its outstanding personalities, who was in that select band of ringers with more than 1,000 peals to his credit. Keith Hart will go down in history as an almost faultless performer, who had a complete mastery of his mental and physical faculties. Such were his gifts of concentration, that one who had rung scores of peals with him confessed that he had never seen him make a mis-blow. He was also a graceful ringer, and invariably performed on the back end. With his mastery of bell ringing he found it difficult to understand how other rational beings could make errors. Indifference in ringing and striking he would not tolerate, and because of his criticisms, for he had the reputation of being a John Blunt, he was at times misunderstood. No one, however, could be in his presence without having an admiration for his prowess as a performer.

When Mr. George F. Attree created his famous band of Surprise ringers at St. Peter's, Brighton, Keith Hart was already in the town. This company included two other 1,000 peal men in George Williams and Frank Bennett, but other names who come to mind are George Baker, E. C. Merritt, George Smart, Harry Weston, and Charles Palmer. Their performances were the talk of every belfry. Ringing weeks would be held, during which a peal of a different Surprise method would be rung each evening. Another memorable occasion was when Keith Hart rang three peals of London in 24 hours. Upon George Attree migrating to Canada in 1908, Keith Hart became the leader of St. Peter's band, a position he held with distinction and only relinquished this year.

Although he reached his 1,000 th peal in 1931, to the regret of his many friends he did not participate in that peal at St. Olave's, Hart Street, on February 1 5̈th, 1936, in which each performer had 1,000 peals to his credit. Survivors of that peal are J. George, George Williams, F. Bennett and A. H. Pulling. Whether the fact that he never kept a record of his peals had anything to do with his not receiving an invitation we do not know, but he was the only other living ringer then alive with 1,000 peals to his credit. Since then two others have joined that select company in Mr. James Bennett and the late Mr. C. T. Coles. Perhaps the biggest day's ringing in Keith Hart's life was in September, 1912, when he rang the sixth at Sherborne Abbey to a peal of Stedman Triples, and in the evening the
eighth to a peal of Stedman Caters at St. John's, Yeovil. Ringring in both these peals were W. and E. Pye, who shared the respective tenors of 46 cwt . at Sherborne and 42 cwt. at Yeovil. Preb. C. C. Cox rang in the peal at Yeovil and the Rev. E. V. Cox at Sherborne Abbey. A great ringer thus passes to his rest.

\section*{THE PASSING OF TWO FAMOUS RINGERS}

\section*{Mr. J. Armiger Trollope}

We regret to record the death on Friday, August 8th, at 52, Lammas Park Road, Ealing, of Mr. Jabez Armiger Trollope. As an authority on all matters appertaining to the Exercise. Mr. Trollope held a unique position. He was a vice-president of the Middlesex Association and an honorary member of the Central Council. His age was 71 years.

The following biography has been written by his close friend, E.C.S.T. :-

Jabez Armiger Trollope was born at East Dereham, Norfolk, on January 8th, 1876, and was educated at King Edward VI. School, Norwich. During his schoodays he and various school friends, including J. and G. Burton and C. Borrett, used to visit various five and sixbell towers of the city and taught themselves ringing. They also obtained some handbells and rang several peals of Plain Bob, including what was for many years, if not still,
record length of Bob Major on handbells.
In about 1904 he came to live at Ealing and for a few years his chief interest was photography. He joined the Ealing Photographic Society and was always very proud of a silver medal he was awarded at one of their exhibi-
tions. The subject was St. Peter Mancroft Church. Norwich, taken from an unusual viewpoint. He never lost his interest in ringing, however, and eventually joined the Waterloo Society. who used to ring at St. Johns,
Waterloo Road. He later held the office of Waterloo Road. He later held the office of ciation and London Diocesan Guild for more than 20 years.

He was without a doubt the most gifted ringer of his age. His peals totalled well over 600 and he conducted a fair proportion of them. Twenty years ago they comprised a greater variety of methods than had been achieved by anyone else. He was even more talented in his knowiedge of the theory of ringing, and it is only within recent years that a few others have caught up with and in perhaps one or two directions even surpassed him. Furthermore he could impart his knowledge to others, both in his writing and in his conversation. He devoted a considerable amount of time to the study of the history of
the art of change ringing from its eariest days, and his work on this subject alone occupies at least ten hand-written volumes illustrated with his own pen and ink drawings of churches.

This wealth of knowledge was free.y drawn upon when he was Editor of "The Ringing World' in the many weeks when the amount of sopy received by post bare! filled a single page. Without it 'The Ringing Wor'd' must have ceased publication altogether.

His published works include most of the books prepared by the Methods Committee of the Central Council, the latest edition of 'Stedman' in the 'Snowdon' series and 'The College Youths' - a history of the Ancient
Societry of College Youths. He had recently been engaged on a new edition of 'Grandsire, for the 'Snowdon' series and had completed a book on Surprise Major methods, which has long awaited publication by the Centra] Council.

He had been a member of the Central Council since 1897 and served on the Methods Committee, of which he was for many years convener.

His work for 'The Ringing Wor'd' during the most difficult period of its existence when there was a complete ban on the ringing of church bells cannot be over-estimated, and it was a great disappointment to him to learn that his efforts were not adequately appreciated. He endeavoured and. in the opinion of manv, succeeded in making the paper as interesting and as useful to the majority of its readers as possible, and steadfastly refused to allow its pages to be used to satisfy the
personal vanity of a minority. His treatment at the Central Council meeting at Norwich in 1946 over this matter was the direct cause of a serious decline in his health, from which he never really recovered for any length of time.

\section*{AN APPRECIATION.}

By the sad news of the death of J. Armiger Troilope, the Fixercise will learn of the loss of one of its leading personalities.

I must leave it to others to write of his great work for the Exercise during the last 50 years his technical knowledge and skill, shown in his published and unpublished writings; his unsurpassed knowledge of the history of ringing and ringers and his ability to make such knowledge live in his writng (His book, 'The College Youths,' is a mere selection of appropriate extracts from his manuscript history.) For many years he could claim to have rung a greater number of different Major methods than anyone else. Although a small man physically, he could turn in a heavy tenor to Major with the next man. His work for the Central Council and its Methods Committee over nearly half a century is well known.

All this led up to and was crowned by his greatest work for the Exercise, when, on the death of his friend, J. S. Goldsmith, he assumed the editorship of "The Ringing World.' At that time there was no ringing and, therefore, no ringing news no peals, no notices or reports of meetings. Mr. Goldsmith had managed, with his wide experience and his accumulated material, to carry on, largely with the help of special articles by Mr. Trollope. But during Mr. Goldsmith's illness and from his death in 1942 Mr . Trollope was
able week by week to produce-often from nothing-our paper, without which the Exercise wou'd have lost its homogeneity and perhaps have dwindled into a number of isolated units. Many weeks practically the whole paper was written by him - leader, special articles and correspondence, and yet he set and maintained a high standard and, as paper allowed, increased the journal's circulation.
J.A.T. did not shine in debate and was never at ease in public speaking. He was at his best in the company of a few friends-after a peal or on a day in the country. For although ringing was his life, he had, in full measure, the ability of the well-educated man of his generation to taik interestingly and knowledgably on an infinite variety of subjects.
But to me, and I know that this is true also of Mr. Ernest Turner, his death is a great personal loss. He taught us to ring just over twenty years ago, and from then on he was our guide, philosopher and friend, and we were proud that he regarded us as 'his boys.' Week by week he rang with us at Christ Church, Ealing, and at other local towers content, if the band could manage ro more, with call changes or Doubles, so long as the striking was good. Bad striking he could not tolerate. Many a visitor to the tower was surprised to learn that the little man ringing call changes or standing behind a beginner was the J. Armiger Trollope whose article or 'Notes by the Way' he had read in that week's "Ringing Wor'd.'
I shall be grateful if rou. Mr. Editor. can find space for my very inadequate tribute to the memory of a great ringer and a true gentieman. - Wilfrid G. Wilson. 28, Abbey Avenue, Alperton, Wembley.

\section*{Mr. Keith Hart}

We regret to record the death on July 30 th of Mr. Keith Hart, of Brighton, aged 73. The following memoir is contributed by F.I.H.:-

The name of Keith Hart probably means little to many present-day ringers, as his peal ringing career ended in 1938, but he was without doubt one of the outstanding ringers of his generation. He kept no record of his peals, but so far as can be ascertained he rang 1,164 in all, of which he conducted 462. No fewer than 924 of his peals were for the Sussex County Association, and one man onlyWilliam Pye - has ever rung more for one society.
His first peal was at Brighton in 1891, and his 1.000 th some time during 1931, so that he must have been the eighth or ninth ringer to reach that total. In several years he rang over 50 peals 60 in 1898,52 in 1909, 55 in 1912, while in 1913 he rang no fewer than 70 , of which he conducted 61.
It was not only as a peal ringer, however, that his reputation was gained. One had only to see \(\lim\) handling the 25 cwt . tenor at St . Peter's, Brighton, with an easy, graceful style, and with perfect accuracy of striking, to realise that he was no ordinary ringer. Not only did he ring his bell supremely well, but it was said of him that rarely, if ever, did he make a mistake.

In January, 1905, he took part in three peals of London in two days, and "The Bell News of January 28th. 1905, referring to these, said : - It is wortliy of record as an instance of concentration of the mind that one of the com-pany-"K.H. "-rang the 15,296 changes without making a trip.

Mr. Hart was associated throughout his career with St. Peter's, Brighton, and was a member of the band which made history there at the end of the last century. He took part at St. Peter's in the first peals of Champion. Oxford. Norfolk and Westminster Surprise, and in 1926, on the modern peal of ten, he called the first and only peal of George Baker's version of London Surprise Roval. It is not
known how many peals Mr. Hart rang at St. Peter's, but the number must be close on 200 . In recent years he had done very little ringing, but until a short while ago he retained clarge of the tower, and the condition both of the bells and the ringing chamber testified to his care and attention.

\section*{(Continued from page 379.) \\ THE MASTERS.}

The first Master of the Guild was Mr George H. Phillott, son of the Rector of Staunton-on-Wye (to whom we have already referred), although he had already left home and was living in Cheltenham. Here, in 1889, while still Master of the Hereford Guild, he took part in the record length of Grandsire Caters ( 15,227 changes). In 1890 he resigned the Mastership and was succeeded in 1891 by the Rev. G. M. Custance, who had hitherto been the secretary. Three years later, Mr. J. G. Buchanan, of Clun (afterwards at Hereford), became Master, which office he held until 1923.

In the early nineties, besides Ross and Bridgnorth, local bands iwith occasional outside help) were ringing peals at Coalbrookdale, Welshpool and Colwall, and by the end of the century also at Ludlow and Hereford Cathedral.

Under Mr. Buchanan steady progress was maintained. Though he never conducted a peal, he was a genial leader of men, a fine figurehead, whose personal qualities iuspired others and did much to maintain the spirit of loyalty in the Guild. This progress is exemplified by taking a few random notes from the reports of these years. In 1902, for example, it is reported that 'Ludlow and Ross have made excellent progress in Stedman,' and in the following year scored their first in that method. In \(1903^{\prime}\) Colwall scored its first peal of Bob Major, while Ludlow and Hereford were busy but unlucky with peals.'

During 1908 there were 51 peals rung to the credit of the Guild, the largest number so far in one year.

After the Great War of 1914-18 an important change was made in the organisation of the Guild. It was wo longer financially possible to engage a qualified instructor nor was it any longer necessary. Instead, therefore, a scheme was drawn up for the division of the Diocese into twelve Districts, each with its own Ringing Master. Henceforth, the duty of instruction was to fall largely on the District Ringing Masters, each in his own District. This was a wise move, and the scheme has worked well, though some Districts have shown greater activity and progress than others.

The other important event of this time was the recasting of the tenor bell of All Saints Church, Hereford, by the Guild, as a memorial to the fallen ringers from the Diocese.
In 1920, Mr. Charles Edwards was appointed Ringing Master of the Guild to assist the Master, now there was no longer a paid instructor, and on the resignation of \(\mathbf{M r}\). Buchanan in 1923 took over the office of Master. He threw himself energetically into the work of Master of the Guild, visiting the Districts to encourage und instruct. He also arranged and conducted many peals in the Diocese. By 1922 the Guild had well recovered from the set-back due to the war, and 60 peals were rung.
By 1924 the total number of members had reached 850, but in this year and the following the two. Welsh Districts of Brecon and Welshpool withdrew from the Guild. Welshpool had been active centre of change ringing from the early days of the Guild. In 1926 the first peal of Grandsire Caters at the Cathedral was rung; it was also the first peal of Caters by resident members of the Guild and was conducted by the Master.

In 1932 the first peal of Bob Royal was rung by the Guild at Leominster, also conducted by the Master, and in this year, too. Ross District was very active, scoring four peals of Stedman Triples and the first of

Little Bob, Double Norwich (by a district band) and Oxford Treble Bob. In 1934 the 1,000 th peal of the Guild was rung at Ross.

1936 marked the jubilee of the Guild, and this was fittingly celebrated at Hereford on Whit Monday by a dinner presided over by the Bishop, at which Mr. W. H. Fussell was the guest of honour. Sixty-six peals were rung in 1938, the record number in one year, and in the same year the Bell Restoration Fund was inaugurated.

One important work undertaken by Mr. Edwards was the visiting of towers at the request of incumbents, to advise and report on the bells. This has been a valuable work, and encouraged the proper rehanging and augmenting of the bells throughout the Diocese, a process which had been going on since the formation of the Guild as a direct result of its widespread cultivation of change ringing.

When Mr. Charles Edwards left the Diocese in 1939 he was succeeded as Master by Mr. William Saunders, of Coalbrookdale. Mr. Saunders was the leader of an enthusiastic band of ten-bell ringers in the far corner of the Diocese, and held the unusual position of holding office in two Associations at the same time being Master of the Hereford Guild and representative on the Central Council of the Shropshire Association. Unfortunately the war broke out soon after his appointment so that he could do little more for the Guild as Master than 'keep things going, and his death in 1945 xas a great loss to both Associations.

He was succeeded by Mr. William Poston, of Bridstow, near Ross, who has done a great work for the Guild in the Ross area since
1911. He has done much to encourage Minor methods in the six-bell towers, and as District Ringing Master since 1920 he has conducted many 'firsts' on the eight bells of Ross and Bridstow, including a peal of Cambridge Surprise by resident members in 1933. This year he was succeeded by Mr. Arthur W. Davis, of Hereford.

THE HONORARY SECRETARIES
From the first the Guild has done much to bring the clergy and their ringers together and to create a mutual appreciation and understanding between them. Under its influence many of the clergy started to follow the example of the Revs. F. E. Robinson and C. D. P. Davies and learn ringing. Thus in 1892 it was possible to report that 'in at least nine belfries in the Diocese the clergy are now found as regular ringers with their men.' Unfortunately such active interest of the clergy has not been wholly maintained, but it well illustrates the spirit of the Guild in its early days. The clerical contact has remained however. A number of clergy, for example, have been active members of the Committee, some serving for many years; and, except for two years, the hon. secretaries have all been clergy of the Diocese.

The first secretary of the Guild was the founder, the Rev. G. M. Custance, Rector of Colwall (1886-91). Mr. Buchanan beld the post from 1891-93; since then the secretaries have been as follows: The Rev. A. C. Lee, Vicar of Lugwardine, 1893-1911; the Rev. J. S. Roper, Rector of Quatt, 1911-20; the Rev. (i. W. Turner, Vicar of Madley, 1920-28; the Rev. II. S. T. Richardson, Rector of St. Nicholas', Hereford, 1928-37; and the Rev. E. G. Benson, Vicar of Burghill, since 1937. Most of these clergy have been themselves ringers, the Rev. H. S. T. Richardson being the most outstanding. As a fine ringer and conductor he had many peals to his credit; in his younger days he had rung several peals with the Rev. F. E. Robinson, and in 1910 took part in the clerical peal of Royal at Warwick. He was also a prominent member of the Central Council, and did a great deal of work on peal compositions for it. As secretary of the Guild he set himself the aim of ringing in every tower in the Diocese, and with bicycle and train or bus visited local bands far and wide, and was everywhere welcomed.

Finally some reference should be made to the many ringers who have done loyal and steadfast work for the Guild in their own towers or districts, who who are not widely known to the Exercise in general. The late Mr. J. P. Hyett, J.P., was one of these. He was a ringer at Clifford (8) for 35 years, secretary of the Clifford District from its formation and peal recorder of the Guild from 1923 till his death in 1944, and for many vears a representative of the Central Council. He did much spade work for the Guild, visiting the smaller towers, encouraging beginners and getting them through their first peal of Doubles.
But most Districts have had, and still have, two or three such members on whom the vitality of the Districts so largelv depends. THE PRESENT POSITION.
The Hereford Diocesan Guild is steadily recovering from the serious effects of the war and the ban. Out of the 140 towers in the Diocese with rings of five or more bells, some 67 are in union with the Guild according to the latest report (in 1939 there were 103), with 538 ringing members. Amongst these there is a large number of young members, and in some Districts the Ringing Masters are very active, visiting towers and assisting in instruction.

It is still alive and still has much to do in the service of the Church. Indeed it can proudly claim to be the oldest, largest and most active Church society for men in the Diucese.

The Northern District of the Yorkshire Association is larger than most counties, and includes, in addition to the whole of the Archdeaconry of Cleveland, in York Diocese and the Archideaconry of Richmond in Ripon Diocese, parts of the Archdeaconries of York and the East Riding in York Diocese and part of Leeds Archdeaconry in Ripon Diocese.

Despite the largeness of the district successful meetings have been held recently and much progress has been made.

On July 5 th a very good meeting was held at Middleham, famous for its association with Richard III. and for its racing stables. The fine old Church of SS. Mary and Alkelda possesses a fine ring of eight bells, and a visit was also paid to the neighbouring village of Fast Wetton, where there is a good light ring of six bells. \section*{AN AFTERNOON}

Saturday, July 19th, had been chosen by some enthusiasts of the Oxford Guild for an excursion amongst some of the lesser known towers in the Banbury district, and fortune favoured us, for the day was fine and warm. One member of the carload from Eynsham was quickly in good humour, for the route chosen took him close to his birthplace, which he had not visited for many years.
The first objective was South Newington, situated in delightful Cotswold country, which was at its loveliest, the hills and turns in the road revealing wide views over peaceful valleys and distant vistas of Edge Hill, and the roadside wastes were ablaze with poppies. At South Newington we were joined by members from Adderbury, Banbury and Aynho, and the musical ring of five in St. Peter's Church was soon in action to various Doubles methods. Half an hour was the allowance for each tower, and this sufficed tlyoughout the day to give everyone a pull in each tower, and for a large variety of methods to be rung. South Newington's allowance was very nearly shortened by a fraying rope, but it just managed to last the time with some doctoring.

No time was wasted in getting away to the next tower of Tadmarton, our route lying through more glorious parklike scenery. Here the captain of the local band had the bells up ready for us, and we were fortunate, for a new treble had only just been added to the old ring of five in memory of one who died in the last war. The ascent to the ringing chamber is somewhat precarious, being a lengthy vertical ladder situated in a sort of wooden funnel in one corner of the tower, and the gentlemen waited in some trepidation to see if the lady of the party nad a ' head for heights.' All was well, and a good touch of Plain Bob was soon under way. More Doubles and Minor followed, but the bells didn't know Oxford Bob, or was it the ringers? The splice was generally agreed to be a good one, and will be even better when the new bell has mellowed.
There was just time to take a quick look at the remarkable Early Norman font and the carved bench ends (14th century) in St Nicholas' Church before embarking on the short run to SS. Peter and Paul's, Swalcliffe. Here again we were met by the local ringers, one of whom joined us in a touch. A good rise and fall was one of the features of the ringing here. The ring of siz (tenor \(13 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{cwt}\).) go excellently, a tribute to the efforts of Mesers Gillett and IJhaston. who rehung and returned them in 1933. We thought, however, that the trebles sounded a bit thin Oxford Bob came round successfully in this, 13th century tower, where the width of the splays to the windows of the ringing chamber caused comment. Tea was partaken of in Banbury and enjoyed by all. No effort had been spared so far this day to point out the 'blondes, to one of the party who appears to have a weakness that way, and at this meal he was fortunate in almost rubbing shoulders with two excellent specimens.

After tea the Cotswolds were left behind for the green plains of Northants, and only a few of us knew what a treat was in store at the next stop in Middleton Cheney. The Church of All Saints is a magnificent building, mainly 14th century Decorated, but with a wonderful Perpendicular tower and spire rising to a height of 150 ft . and a typical specimen of that great belt of spired churches which runs through Northants and Lincolnshire, the home of England's finest spires.
We had now been joined by the Bicester and Banbury branch secretaries, and one from Oxford 'fresh' from an abortive peal attempt, and the bells being up Stedman Doubles on this glorious siz, tenor 24 cut . was soon charming the ear. The long

draught with no guides, although difficult, was successfully overcome, and the full glory of these beautiful bells was heard in a touch of Treble Bob. One is tempted to ask the old question whether there can be a better ring of six of comparable weight.

Inexorable time drove us to our next tower at St. Peter's, Brackley, where the handy ring of six (tenor 13 cwt .2 qr. 28 lb . in F) was retuned and rehung by the Whitechapel Foundry in 1939, and is all that can be desired. Here we found our only evidence of the day of cha:age ringing amongst the local ringers, and opportunity was given them to progress. Minor and several Doubles methods were rung before going to Croughton, where in the low tower of All Saints' Church we found a handy ring of five, recast and rehung in 1923 after a fire. Opportunity was taken further to confuse the mind of the member from Banbury, who was heard to declare that he hadn't the least idea what many methods were called but he didn't mind having a shot at them. Mr. F. H. Crossley, in his book, 'English Church Craftsmanship,' tells us that the finest of Englands 14th century wall paintings are to be found in this church. Frankly, we were disappointed, but there was compensation in the shape of an excellent 15th century oak chancel screen with some of its original colouring still adhering. The benches are also of this date and well carved, although not comparable with the magnificent work of the West Country.
This actually concluded our ringing for the day, for our visit to Aynho was not to be, a death in the parish preventing the use of the bells. However, everyone was well satisfied, and farewells were said, coupled with the avoued intention of having a similar outing next year. Every ring of bells had been good, but how sad to think that change ringing is seldom heard from them.

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\section*{J. ARMIGER TROLLOPE}

Last week we published the sad news of the death of Mr. J. Armiger Trollope. The intimate biographical details and the appreciation were written by two of his close friends to whom in the early days of ringing ine was guide, mentor and friend. This week others have added their tributes and thankfulness for his life. It is probably true to say that hundreds of ringers after having surmounted the elementary stage have secured that deeper knowledge of the art from his writings and the books he revised. His great contribution, however, was as an historian. 'College Youths' was an invaluable contribution to the somewhat scanty histories of ringing, but the greater part of his literary labours, we understand, are so far unpublished.
J. Armiger Trollope had no easy road in acquiring his knowledge of the history of ringing. It was accumulated by years of research. Day by day he would patiently search the files of the British Museum to find the facts that he wanted. And it was facts and facts alone that he searched for. Expressing his indebtedness to an individual for the privilege of perusing his magnificent collection of original and copied manuscripts he shrewedly observed, 'Almost all his opinions I have ignored.' That in a sense sums up so much of thê scholar's mind that was behind his work. There must be personal conviction in everything he did and wrote, and that was the dominating feature of his work as editor of 'The Ringing World.' It was the advancement of the art of ringing that counted with him: the individual was merely an agent or instrument.

For 50 years he had been a member of the Central Council. With his unrivalled knowledge of methods and compositions he occupied an honoured position. Again the words are 'personal conviction.' By direct or indirect means he achieved his purpose, and it was said of him that no man exercised for a longer period such an influence on the affairs of the Council. With him there was no compromise; it was not in his makeup. The circumstances attending his last Council meeting at Norwich had, in a sense, been anticipated by him. When he completed 'The Ringing World' prior to leaving for Norwich, he bade farewell to the composing staff of this journal, and with an old-world courtesy that must have come from a character in Dickens, he thanked them for what they had done during his editorship and expressed a doubt as to whether he would be editor after the Norwich conference. There
was expression of regret, but all were conscious that even then he was a sick man owing to his heart trouble; it was with difficulty that he mounted the stairs to his office. He was never dismissed from the editorship; he thought his best service was to withdraw, and it was left to another at a moment's notice to pick up the reins of office and maintain the continuity of publication of the journal founded by his friend, John S . Goldsmith. The Council did appreciate his work; at Exeter this took a tangible form, and it is to be regretted that he never lived to enjoy what his friends hoped would ease his closing years. But his memory will live, and it is to be hoped that his literary executor will find the means of giving to a wider public the results of his research into ringing in bygone years.

THE FUNERAL.

Wreaths were from his sister and two nieces; Mrs. Hockley and Hilda; the Middlesex County Association and London Diocesan Guild of Change Ringers; the Central Council of Church Rellringers: Mr. and Mrs. W. G. Wilson; and Ernest and Winifred Turner.

Owing to the condition of Christ Church bells no ringing was attempted there, but later in the evening half-muffled ringing was carried out at St. Stephen's by J. F. Churehill, A. Gutler, T. E. Davies. E. C. S. Tumer, J. E. Lewis Cockey, F. A. Finch. A. Harding and W. H. Coles.

In memoriam peals are to be attempted shortly at Acton and Willesden.

\section*{APPRECIATION}

May \(I\), as a very humble research worker in nur art, be allowed to pay my small tribute to the memory of J. Armiger Trollope? The Fxercise has truly lost its greatest historian, for no one ever delved into past events and tabulated more data on the worthies of the past than did Mr . Trollope. I know from m own experience the vast amount of time and patience one has to exert in these matters, and I considered it one of the greatest compliments when Mr. Trollope came specially to Twicken-
ham to see me and brought with him some of his notes and books on the College. Youths history, before the publication of his work. He invited me to his home to see the rest of his searches and I was truly amazed at the great amount of data he had most sissiduously collected. His whole life must have been spent in visits to the British Museum and other sources of information, and I should fay no one ever put so much time and energy into this side of our art.
His work, too, on the practical side is too well known for me to reiterate, and his knowledge in the field of composition was boundless.
Truly the passing of this great historian will leave a gap very difficult to fill, and the Exercise as a whole will feel his loss most keenly.
I trust his collection of MSS., books and records will be preserved by those in authority, as they are priceless and irreplaceable.

AN ORDINARY RINGER'S TRIBUTE.
The passing of J.A.T. severs a liuk with the past, for he collected more material connected with bygone generations of ringers than any other person. He was once described by the late William Willson as an habitue of the Lrondon museums poring over ancient manuscripts. By diligent perseverance he gradually got together a great mass of material; one of the results we see in his book. 'The College Youths.' Not all of his books found their way to the publishers, and the one he wrote about the science of change ringing was never printed, chieflo uwing to lack of capital. Clearly the Central Council should be given this book by his executors. He wrote also for the Snowdon series and had just finished re-writing Grandsire.
His work on the Central Council and the Methods Committee is too well known to be restated. He occupied the editorial chair of 'The Ringing World' during the difficult war years and many regretted the abrupt termination in 1946 . Still, he was undoubtedly the best writer on ringing matters that the Exercise has ever seen, and he had the gift of making himself understood. The views he put forward did not always go by unchallenged, and crities assailed him, sometimes unfairly. But with all his human faults J.A.T. knew more of the science of change ringing than any other man. The Exercise is undoubtedly the poorer by his passing, but his great wish was to see the Exercise mourish. So we must carry on and spread the knowledge of our art to keep green his memory, May he rest in peace. E.R.M. Preston.

\section*{Oxford University Society's Ringing Week}

Moreton, Dickinson, Grey, Wright and Rohbins, with the addition of Dr. W. B. Leese and the Rev. C. E. Wigg during the first and second parts of the week respectively.
The main purpose of the week was practice, which, owing to the small number present, was obtained in large quantities by all. Methods rung ranged from Grandsire Douhles to Bristol Surprise Major some of the intermediate stages being Spliced Plain and St. Dlement's Bob Minor, Cambridge and London Surprise Minor, Double Norwich, and Cambridge aud Yorkshire Surprise Major.
Two tower-bell peals were attempted, Double Norwich being scored at Colwall and Yorkshiro leing lost at Ruardean. There were also two unsuccessful attempts in hand for Double Norwich and Grandsire Caters, but handbell ringing was otherwise confined to sampling some of the excellent sets which the party came across on its travels.

\section*{READERS' LETTERS: Critical and Explanatory \\ Ringing and Music \\ The Truro Peal}

Dear Sir,-The report in 'The Ringing World, of August 8th of the peal of Kent Treble Bob Minor rung at Filiand, Yorks, lrings to my mind again the correspondence iir connection with the "Basingstoke" peals.
These peals, it must be admitted. were perfectly correct performances so far as the numher of changes rung were concerned, but they were doubtless musically incorrect.
I know the peal of bel's at Elland quite well, ant as the tenor is'reported as \(9 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{cwt}\)., I am prompted to assume that the peal was rung on the front six of the peal of eight, which, is as musically incorrect as the "Basingstoke peals, which have been officialiy disallowed.
If my assumption is correct, then I consider that this peal and any similar ones rung shou'd also be discounted.

Filland bells are an excellent going peal of sight with a tenor 16 or 18 cwt , and should present no difficulty in ringing a peal of Minor on the back six, which would be correct musically
In the case of the 'Basingstoke' peals, the umfamiliar number of nine bells being published, immediately brought to notice the obvious peculiarity of the music produced, whereas, if a peal is rung on a lesser number of bells than are in the tower, no one is aware by reading of the performance which bells in particular are used.
I am far from being in agreement with the Basingstoke performances, but if Mr. Kippin and his supporters are to be denied their peals on the grounds of being musically incorrect, surely the same action should apply to any other peals which are equally incorrect from the music point of view.
Obviously my argument falls flat if it can be said that Mr. Kippin's peal of Major would have been accepted had it been rung on the front eight of Basingstoke's nine bells.
If this should be so, then it would appear that we can jumble together any bells we like and ignore their respective tones so long as there are \(6,8,10\) or 12 of them as the case may be, and the composers' efforts to produce the 'best" music to a peal are in vain and an absolute waste of their time and study. FOREMAN DFNIES STRIKE.
Dear Sir,-I would like to thank Mr. Bayles for his letter in 'The Ringing World,' August lst. No doubt rou have heard the Vicar's point, but you lave not heard the ringers' point concerned in this matter. On April 17th, which was a practice night, there was a vestry meeting in the Guild House. The Vicar came down to the meeting, saw two ringers waiting and remarked that he hoped they would not ring, but as it was practice night he told them that he could not stop the practice.
Other ringers came up and went into the beifry and started to ring the bells up. We had been ringing for about 20 minutes or so when his churchwarden came un and asked us to stop, which, of course, we did. After a few minutes' consultation we decided to drop the bells for safety's sake.

During the evening \(I\) toid the ringers that \(I\) should not be present the following Sunday as I was going out. I still deny that I ever told any ringer to stay away from ringing on Sunday. April 20th. There were seven ringers in the tower that night and they all say I did not say a word about stopping. Two ringers turned up on Sunday morning and waited for others to arrive. As no one else came the bells were not rung for service.

On Friday a certain lady ringer, who had not attended the belfry for nine months, canvassed the village for ringers with a tale that the ringers were on strike, which was untrue. She did not go to any of the regular ringers.

I might add that the Vicar has not come in the beffry during any service ringing an Sundays since he was inducted in 1932 . The only time I have seen him in the belfry was when the war put a ban on the bells when he instructed me to take the ropes off except on two or three bells that might be required for emergency. The last time I saw him in the belfry was on New Year's Eve, 1943, at midnight.
For Mr. Bayles' information I might say that the new ringers have broken three stays since they started. They have no one in the belfry to teach them to ring properly; it is only a jangle on Sundays.
The report in 'The Daily Telegraph' is not true. The voluntary band is not headed by the schoolmaster - Yours faithfully

\section*{BY AIR TO OPEN NEW BELLS}

AN AUSTRALIAN EXPERIENCE
Mr. W. K. Rowe, who is an honorary member of the Central Council, sends us the following report of the trip of nine Sydney ringers to Adelaide to open the new ring of bells at St. Peter's Cathedral, Adelaide.

At 5.15 a.m. on June 23 rd , nine Sydney ringers left Mascot by A.N.A. plane for Adelaide. The object of the trip was to officiate at the opening of the new ring of eight bells at St. Peter's Cathedral, and give instruction in the art of change ringing to the Adelaide team. The team was as follows: Rowe (St. Mary's, conductor), J. B. Watts (St. James'), R. 'S. Rowe (St. Jude's), J. Duncan (St. Jude's). G. Williamson (Ali Saints'), W. H. Slort (St. Mary'sl, J. McCartney (St. Mark's) and A. R. Grant (St. Jude's).
I would like to make it quite clear that this was not an official visit by the N.S.W. Association. Mr. R. A. Joyner arranged fhe trip with the Bishop of Adelaide (Rt. Rev. B. P. Robin), and was in charge of the team. The journey was an eventful one, and after nn exciting landing at Narrandera due to a hlow-out of the tyre on the starboard wheel, the plane touched down at Adelaide nine hours late. Although it was 10.30 p.m., the visiting team was welcomed by members of the St . Peter's company.

The Cathedral of St. Peter is 100 vears ald and the bells were opened during the celebrations. On arrival it was found that the bells were not in perfect ringing condition. Minor adjustments to the stops and general tightening up were necessary. The new ropes were replaced by ropes brought from Sydney which had been used.
The bells have been installed in the southeast of the twin towers of the Cathedral, the north-east being used as a club room. The towers are joined by a large gallery. The ringing chamber is of a good height and very well lit, about 15 ft . square and well anpointed. Included in the furnishings is an electric clock presented by Mr. P. Vincent (one of the ringers) in memory of his son.
The hells. by Taylors, Ltd., are a ring of cight. the tenor weighing 40 cwt .1 qr ., and
are hung in Taylor's patent frame. Nos. 1, 2 and 4 are swung on a plane above the remaining five bells, and provision has been made for an additional five bells at a later date. There is a properly constructed baffie clamber belween the belfry and the ringing clamber. A chiming apparatus has also been provided. Fntrance to the ringing chamber is in the centre of the floor. The ropes fall in a reasonably good circle.
The bells were consecrated by the Bishop holding the sally of each bell in turn, from treble to tenor,. and saying. 'Praise thou the Lord,' after which each bell was sounded in turn. The bells were officially opened by the Bishop saying, 'Bless ye the Lord; praise Him and magiify Him for ever.' The belis were then rung in rounds for two minutes. Later they were rung to changes.
On July 1st the team went out to Walkerville, a suburb of Adelaide, and the following rang a 1,200 of Grandsire Doubles: W. H. Short treble. W. M. Rowe (conductor) 2, R. S. Rowe 3. J. B. Watts 4, J. Dunean 5, A. R. Grant tenor. To our knowledge this is the longest ring in South Australia. While there we met Mr. W. Knight, who rang at the opening of the bells in 1885 and still rings. He has been a chorister at the church for 76 years. On the Honour Roll in the porch of the church for the 1914 war are the names of Sir Ross and Keith Smith, St. Andrew's being their parish church. The bells are a ring of six hv Mears and Stainbank with a tenor of 12 cwt. 3 qr. 17 lb.
Whi.e at Bishopcourt, one evening we had the pleasure of meeting the late Rev. E. J. Loveday, Rector of St. Martin's-in-the-Fields. The Rev. Laveday passed away the following week in Melbourne.
In closing, I think this trip has put up a few 'firsts.' The first time a team has travelled so far to open a peal of bells- 900 miles each way. The first time a team has travelled bv plane to open a peal. On St. Peter's bells the first touch of Oxford Bob Triples rung in Australia.

In closing I wish to extend to the ringers of St. Martin's-in-the-Fie'ds the condolences of mr team mates and self at the loss of their
Rector.

\section*{ARCHITECT'S ADDRESS TO ADVISORY COMMITTEES.}

At a conference of representatives of Diocesan Advisory Committees for the Care of Churches (Northern Province), held at St. William's College, York, a paper of narlicular interest to hellringens was read by Mr. Leslie T. Moore, M.C. F.R.I.B.A. We are indebted to 'The Ruilder' for the following points from his address:-

Towers and their roofs are often sadiy neglected; they are much exposed, particularly their parapets, and defects may easily become dangerous. The condition of the church noofs can generally be seen to advantage from the tower. a point of view which should not be missed when inspecting the structure. Any loose masonry on the east elevation of the tower, which incidentally cannot be easily detected from the ground, may cause costly damage in falling on roofs below. Access to all roofs both for external and internal examination should be kept in order.
The fixing of flagstaffs and weather-vanes on towers is frequently the source of damage. To withstand the strain of even a moderate-sized flag the post invariably has iron stays from the parapet: by these, constant vibration is transmitted and the corrosion of the iron altachment loosens and damages the masonry The fixing of such poles on ancient roofs which were not constructed for them is to be condemned.

All open belfry windows shou'd have hird wire internally; a small mesh copper wire guard fixed on a frame is best for durability Any accumulation of hird droppings causes decay in timber, and birds often attack lime mortar inside towers in a remarkable manner. BELL TOWERS
The hanging of bells in our ancient church towers needs much more care than is usually given. Most of the earlv towers were built for refuge and fortification and later to the glory of God-with spires in stone cistricts, and a small number of light bells which probably only chimed.

Tn future we are more litely to construct underground crypts as sheiters rather than towers, so the preservation of our fine mediaval examples is very important. It should not be forgotten that the change ringing of bells as we know it was not introducer till late in the 17 th centurr, when more and heavier bells were often added, and that the mediæval towers were not built to withstand the considerable strain involved. The thick walls of some towers faced with coursed stone inside and out may be very deceptive-for it is the condition of the core of the walls that matters.

Mant towers are structural's weak in having no horizontal tie in the whole height. This is an important moint, structurally

To reduce the strain, belis shou'd be hunc as low as practicable-the sound from a hell emanates when the mouth is um-and the bell frame is best arranged if mossible well below the belfry windows, and so more protected from the weather.

Wood frames shou'd not he hastily condemned on account of some decay-ther can often he repaired. Metal frames need paint ing and if neglected corrode.

Mablethorpe Ringers' Tour
The Mablethorpe bellringers, together with guest ringers from Alford, Blankney and South Wigston (Leicestershire) and friends, held their second annual outing on August Bank Holiday, When the party travelled by motor-coach to North Lincolnshire.

The first tower, that of Ulceby, was reached shortly after \(10 \mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m}\). where the ringers were met by the captain of the local hand, \(\mathbf{M r}\). Martin Walker, who acted as guide for the remainder of the journey. The five bells at Ulceby were kept going to a variety of Doubles methods for about half an hour.
The party then journeyed on to Thornton Curtis, where a fine heavy ring of six bells is located. Several ringers tried the tenor (weight about 18 cwt .), and all of them agreed that it was not too well matched with six bells and required an additional two trebles to keep it company and help to reduce the labour which is now required to be expended upon it by the ringer. During the ringing at this tower the non-ringing members of the party paid a visit to Thornton Abhey, where they found much of historical interest.
The next tower to be visited was \(S^{t}\). Peter's (Barton-on-Humber), but before trying this peal lunch was partaken of in the Assembly Hall, where tea was kindly served by Mr. Hoodless, captain of the Barton ringers. The magnificent eight bells at St. Peter's were found to be a very melodious and easy going peal, and the bells were rung to a variety of methods until the ringing was curtailed owing to a wedding service.

The sun now broke through the earlier leaden skies, and the next stage of the journey, along the bank of the River Humber to Burton-unon-Stather, produced many delightful views of the broad expanse of the river with the Yorkshire bank in the distance. At Burton-upon-Stather the ringers were welcomed by quite a number of local ringers. The bells, a light and musical eight, were soon in use, whilst the non-ringers had a walk to that wellknown beauty spot, Burton Hills, where a marvellous view of the two tributaries of the Humber River, the Rivers Derwent and Ouse, can be seen joining the outlet to the sea.
The next stop was at Srunthorpe, where they were received by Mr. Frank Lord, captafn of the local ringers. After some difficulty with the treble, which upon being 1 aised jumped the slider stop, the hells, a delightful eight, Dealed out over the industrial town and quite a number of methods were rung by all.

Thackery, president of the Northern Branch of the Lincoln Diocesan Guild of Bellringers, welcomed the ringers. The light ring of six bells was found at first to be rather difficult to handle, but eventually the feel of the bells was found and they were put to good use for about an hour.
After saving good-bre to the kindly Vicar and his wife and haring exnressed thanks to the former for his hospitality, the bus was hoarded for the homeward journey, and so that none should sleep until they reached their heds. the handhells were brought out.
Mr. H. Dunnington, the popular captain of the Mablethorpe bellringers, was the organiser of the tour. and he was suitably thanked for his successful endeavours by Mr. I. Smith. an Alford ringer.

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\section*{THE ANALYSIS}

Five columns in this issue are occupied by printing the analysis of peals rung on tower bells during 1946. The space is not wasted. Tabulated in this fashion, it is possible for the practised eye to discern the trend of change ringing. The year 1946, with 1,795 peals, of which 1,555 were on tower bells, was a good ringing year and compared favourably with pre-war peal ringing. It marked a great advance on 1945, when the aggregate of peals was 1,304, with 1,126 on tower bells. The year was not only a good year as regards the number of peals but also as to the quality. There was an adventurous spirit afoot ; a desire for variety in more difficult methods which was an encouraging sign.

More peals were also rung on higher numbers of bells. While in 1945 only nine peals of Maximus were scored, the number reached 15. Particularly praiseworthy was the work of the Leicester Guild with six peals of Surprise Maximus. In regard to Cinques, St. Martin's Guild stand pre-eminent with 12 peals of Stedman out of a total of 39 . Cinques rung in 1945 were only 24 peals against 42. Peals of Royal showed a marked increase from 37 to 68 . These peals were divided among 32 Associations, compared with 17 in 1945. Caters, however, still hold an unchallenged popularity in ro-bell towers with 86 peals. In this class of ringing the Worcestershire and Districts with seven peals head the list.

The most impressive thing about Major ringing was the big increase in Surprise peals. Of 676 peals, more than 40 per cent., or 282, were in Surprise methods. The previous year the total was 156 out of 464 . Surprise peals were in 19 different methods, as against 14. Conspicuous is the list of the Kent County Association, with 14 peals of Cambridge and peals in 13 other Surprise methods. Double Norwich, with 115 peals, an increase of 21, was rung by 33 different Associations, compared with 21 in 1945. This method was most popular in Lancashire, with 16 peals. A similar honour is also held by Lancashire with regard to Treble Bob methods; in fact, peal ringing advanced considerably during the year in this Association. Peals of Plain Bob were almost stationary, numbering \({ }^{137}\). With the desire for higher methods, Triples with 238 peals were only eleven more than in 1945 , and it is in the Southern Counties that the desire for this class of ringing is most strong. Guildford head the list with 22 peals, followed by Oxford Diocesan

Guild 20 and Kent 17. Grandsire Triples show a decline from 146 to 127 peals.
Roughly, 22 per cent. of the peals recorded were Minor, the total being 339 against 177. These were spread among 41 different Associations, and there is no question that the number of first peals was as great as in any year. Six-bell ringing is very strong in the agricultural Guilds-Lincolnshire, Oxford, Chester and Salisbury, all being prominent. There were two peals in 25 methods from the Chester Diocesan Guild which have been dwarfed by the performance of 1947. While there was little change in the number of Doubles peals, 94 against 89 , the enthusiasm of the Bath and Wells Diocesan Guild with 18 peals calls for special mention.
The Kent County Association have the distinction of being at the head of the table with 125 peals ( 14 in hand), their total having been swelled by some successful tours. Other leading Associations are Lancashire 103 ( 4 in hand), Leicester 97 (32), Oxford Diocesan 96 (3), Yorkshire 92 (1), Lincoln 90 (15), Chester 83 (7), Middlesex 76 (39), Essex 70 (28), Norwich 69 (3). Last year the pride of place was held by the Midland Counties with 93 peals. This Association has been divided into three, and Leicester with 97 peals, in gaining third place, have had a very busy year.

A youthful performer was equal to the occasion and rang it while kneeiing on a hassock. He was able to control the bell perfectly in this posture, but nearly hanged himself with the superfluous rope when standing up.
A frequent saying of Mr. William Robinson, sexton and verger of Ambleside, Westmorland, who had dug 600 graves in his time, was, - Nobody will ever sweat to dig a grave for me.' They did not. He was cremated at Blackpool. A memoir of this well-known Lancashire ringer appears in this issue.
Birmingham ringers were surprised recently te find in 'The Birmingham Mail' a photograph taken in the belfry of \(\mathbf{S t}\). Martin's of Mr. Albert Walker, with Mr. George Swann and Mr. Frank Smallwood. The vecasion merited a picture, for it was Mr. Smallwood's 100th peal on 12 bells, his 100 th peal with Mr. Walker and his looth peal for the Guild.
Seven members were ringing their first quarter of Grandsire at St. Nicholas' Church, Ash, near Canterbury, on August 17th. when the bells were haif-muffled for the unveiling of the memorial to the fallen, 1939-45. The exception was W. Bottrill. The band was Miss IL. J. Holman 1. A. C. Gambrill 2, Miss D. M. Tenner 3, J. D. Ogilvy 4, W. Bottrill 5, W. C. E. Goldup 6, E. J. Wells (conductor) 7, A. Kemp 8.

COLLEGE YOUTHS HONOUR JOHN HARDHAM
}

It will be remembered that in 1946 members of the Ancient Society of College Youths kept green the memory of Benjamin Annable, who was Master 201 years ago. Annable was succeeded as Master by John Hardham, one of the members of his famous band. A happy suggestion by Mr. E. Alex. Young resulted in between 40 and 50 members of the Society visiting Chichester on August 9 th to honour the memory of this famous Master of 200 years ago.
Perfect weather favoured the visitors, who were received by Mr. R. G. Blackman and the local Ringing Master, Mr. Falconer.
The bells at the Campanile were soon set going to well-struck touches in various methods up to London Surprise. Tea was served at the Tower Cafe and a distinguished company, including the Precentor of the Cathedral, the Mayor of Chichester, the president of the Central Council and the Master, secretary, treasurer and stewards of the Society, did ample justice to the good fare provided
The company then adjourned to the Cathedral, where, on behalf of the Dean and Chapter, the Rev. Brown-Wilkinson very graciously welcomed the visitors.
The Mayor of Chichester, on behalf of the civic authorities, also welcomed them and paid a high tribute to John Hardham and the Society, of which he was Master and such a prominent member. The Master, Mr. G. W. Cecil, expressed the thanks of the visitors and called upon Mr. E. Alex. Young to say a few words about the purpose of the visit.
Mr. Young spoke of the sterling character of John Hardham, who was a native of Chichester. He came to London and founded a business in Fleet Street (just a few yards away from St. Bride's Church), which prospered and attracted many famous people to his shop, including the great actor, David Garrick. . There was no picture of him which could give an idea of his appearance, but he pictured Hardham as a man of slight build, as he was inclined to ring at the front end.

Hardham was a great friend of the poor and very often he provided deserving cases with an annuity out of his own pocket. After making several bequests, he left the residue of his fortune-about \(£ 22,500\)-for the relief of the poor rates at Chichester. That was a

very considerable sum in those days and would be in present-day values loughly about £100.000. Hardham was a man of very simple tastes and directed that not more than 810 should be spent on his funeral. Mr. Young mentioned that he had recently visited Hardham's shop and had purchased a supply of his famous snuff taken from the ' 37 ' box. The Mayor of Chichester tried this and pronounced it to be excellent. Photographs having been taken, a company of College Youths ascended the tower and rang a service touch of Stedman Triples: E. G. Fenn treble, W. H. Pasmore 2, A. A. Hughes 3, J. Waugh 4, J. F. Smallwood 5, E. H. Lewis 6, R. F. Deal 7, A. B. Peck tenor.

At the business meeting which followed, six new members were unanimously elected to the Ancienl Society, and hearty thanks were accorded to Mr. Blackman for making such splendid arrangements for the comfort of the party

Altogether a most enjoyable and successful gathering, and the visitors returned to London. Portsmouth and other places with happy memories of Chichester and John Hardham.

\section*{DEATH OF A LANOASHIRE STALWART.}

On August 11th, Lancashire lost one of its real backbone members by the death of Mr. Wi'liam Robinson, of Ambleside.

In 1904 he was the pioneer in forming the Furness Branch of the Lancashire Association and its first secretary, a position he held for 15 years. He was a keen ringer and instructor.

His keen interest may be gauged from the following exploit-one of many. He followed a Rugby team, and when they visited South Lancashire he would be running about the field all the afternoon, have tea, then ring in a peal. The train service home was inconvenient, causing him several hours' waiting at Preston, and then it only took him to Orenholme, whence he was faced with a '6 miles' walk home. This he did, and he was always in his place in the belfry at \(10 \mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m}\). He would attend meetings at Kendal and then walk the 14 miles to his home.

Mr. Robinson was the caretaker at Ambleside Church for 20 years, and his genial disposition to everybody, whether ringers or not, caused him to be well known. This was shown by the large attendance at the church on Wednesday prior to the cremation at Carlton, Blackpool.

Although the time of the service was inconvenient and such short notice, there were over 30 ringers present. These included representatives from the following branches, viz., presentatives from the following branches, Niz.,

William Taylor, Preston; Peter Crook, Bolton; and W. H. Trueman and his son, of Swindon, who were staying in the district.

He must have been well known to many ringers outside Lancashire, because Ambleside is a popular holiday resort and he always accompanied the members of the National Police Guild to their annual meetings.

He rang and conducted many peals, but his pet performance was a 720 Bob Minor, rung double handed and 'silent' in a train whilst returning from a montlily meeting with Alf Brighton and another.

A widow and son are left to mourn their loss. The son is a regular ringer at Manchester Town Hall.

At a meeting at Kendal on Saturday last the members stood in silence to show their respect. For the service and during the afternoon Ambleside bells were rung fully muffled.

MR. J. A. GODFREY
We regret to announce the death of Mr. JoFn Arthur Godfrey, of Caythorpe. Grantham, and formerly of Gressenhall. Norfolk, on August 19th. He had been ailing since Whitsun, when he suffered an attack of bronchial pneumonia, from which he never fully recovered. He was 73.

Mr. Godfrey was for many years Ringing Master of North-West Norfolk, and he retained his characteristical!y keen interest in the activities of his numerous ringing friends right up to the time of his death.

\section*{LETTERS \\ More Oddities}

Dear Sir, -Mr. Eric Nobles' memory must be very short about his illustrated oddity of ringing from a chair, or he would :emember ringing with myself and others at Oundle last Boxing Day, where the treble man has to look up at the person on the 2nd, who rings from a similar contraption (only with no chair back to it), and the fourth ringer has to look up at the person on the 3rd, who rings from the stone steps as you enter the belfry. Between the 2nd and 3rd is the clock case. The ropes fall in a more or less half-circle.
There is also an oddity at Saddington, Leicestershire. where the 2nd ringer of the five has to stand on a stone platform above the level of the others to ring. When I got ihe ban removed on the ringing of Kelmarsh bells on December 14th, 1944 (and Mr. Frank Tysoe will bear me out), to try them we had to borrow four ropes from Bromliam. One of these was very short, and the ringer had to stand on two hassocks mounted on top of a wooden form about 4 ft . above the others. The bells had not been rung for 15 years owing to a dispute with the late Rector. Kelmarsh bells are now ringing once again. They are an interesting ring of six, all by Edward Arnold, 1774, tenor \(9 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{cwt}\). Shortly they are to be put on bail bearings, and contributions to the Rector, Canon Cattell, would be welcomed. About \(£ 230\) is required.

\section*{UNDERSTANDING}

The other man's viewpoint is constantly being exemplified. In the field of international politics some regard it as the basis of world peace; in industry it is the starting point towards team spirit; and among the all sorts and conditions of men who go towards forming the Church it is one of the secrets of unity. For example, the question might be asked, What is the price of coal? \(£ 4\) a ton or more might be the answer. Through other spectacles the price is the mining village, the miners' homes, the conditions under which they live and work and the fatherless children.

True understanding will only be reached when we see the other side of the picture. The principle applies with equal force to ringers and parsons. Ringers are frequently reminded of their duty to the Church, and it is right that such talks and, if necessary, admonitions should be given. On the other hand mutual understanding will only be achieved if the parson succeeds in understanding the outlook of those in the belfry. The Rev. C. Carew Cox, in his notes as Master of the Salisbury Diocesan Guild, makes a timely observation on this subject. He writes:-
* 'I do want to appeal especially for a knowledgeable backing of their ringers' work by the clergy generally, and would dare to suggest that the incumbent of every affiliated tower should become at least an honorary member of the Guild, if not a ringer. Also, that he should, whenever possible, accompany his ringers to the quarterly and annual meetings of the branches. The proceedings at the business meetings do help to widen interest and give some insight into the technicalities of ringing, and every parish priest should qualify himself to some extent to appreciate the prowess of his ringers beyond just thinking of them, perhaps, as pulling the bells.
There is a school of thought which advocates that affairs in the belfry go sweeter without the presence of the incumbent. We do not subscribe to that view. Ringers desire to rank as servants of the Church in the same manner as the choir, and they need their priest just as much as any other section of Church workers. Their pride in service to the Church takes a different footing if it is understood that it is not the mere 'pulling of bells.' The Gospel for St. Bartholomew's Day has this telling phrase : - They that exercise authority upon them are called bene-
factors.' Yes we ringers want our priests to be benefac-tors-not in the financial sense, but in the spiritual sense ; and the basis of benefaction is doubly increased when it is given with understanding.

of Leicester, who, after 41 years of ringing, reached the 1,000 peal mark last week. Mr. H. J. Poole, the conductor, tells us that the enthusiastic Morris insisted on getting the peal rung before he, Poole, left for a holiday!
Seventeen-year-old Mary E. Davis has reached 150 peals with the handbell peal of Grandsire Triples at Bournemouth on August 17th, and incidentally her first as conductor.
The peal of Grandsire Caters at Burton-onTrent on August 22 nd was Mr. J. T. Dyke's 600 th peal. His first peal was rung at the same tower 38 years ago.
- Old Joe, the Lreicester Rhythn King on handbells, still retain his form, in spite of his 80 years, as he very forcibly domonstrated in the recent peal of Stedman Cinques.
The clock and chimes of St. Lawrence's, Surfleet, kindly given by the late Rupert Richardson, will be dedicated by Canon Carnegie, of Spalding, on September 7th, at \(3.30 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}\). Ringing 2.30 and after service.

Had the peal attempt, which preceded the quarter-peal at Long Buckby, recently, been successful, it would have been the first peal on the bells, the only other attempt being in 1856, when unfortunately the 4 th bell was turned over in the last 120.
In the columns of this journal is an appeal for the church bells of Hanslope, Bucks. About 18 months ago they were declared unsafe by the Church Council, and expert opinion advised that the bells be rehung, new fittings, new wheels and bell ropes provided; in fact, a complete overhaul. It was also decided to add two new bells, not recast the six into a ring of eight, in order to retain the individuality and depth of the bells. The cost will be in the neighbourhood of \(£ 750\), but the Council have 2500 in hand. The balance is needed.

The peal at Martin, Lincolnshire, marks the achievement of a years old scheme by the inhabitants of this small village to provide a peal of bells for their parish church. The church was built in 1876, a tower being added in 1911. Soon after this a bell fund was started, but it was left to the present Vicar, the Rev. J. T. Paddison, to bring the project to a successful conclusion. Only a small 'ting-tang' had been available for all purposes since the church was built, until the new bells were dedicated on June 7th this year by the Ven. K. Lamplugh, Archdeacon of Lincoln.
The bells are a fine ring of six by Messrs. Taylor and Co., and are hung in a massive iron frame designed for eight bells. The tower being only about \(9 \frac{1}{2} f t\). square, the frame has had to be constructed in two tiers, the 5th bell and the two empty pits being in the upper portion. As there were no ringers in the village, an entirely new band has been formed. including three girls of school age, and instruction is being given weekly by ringers from the neighbouring tower of Blankney. Good progress is being made, and it is hoped that the bells will be rung by an entirely local band before the retirement of the Vicar in a few weeks' time.
To celebrate the eightieth birthday of Mr. Harrison Smith, ringer for over fifty years at Wickhambreaux Church. Kent. Frank Ellen 1, Jack Walter 2, Sidner Walter 3, Percy W Smith 4, Edward Wood 5, and Stanley White (conductor) 6, rang a quarter-peal of Minor, 1,260 changes, on Aug. 21st. In spite of a recent serious operation, Mr. Smith continues to ring short 'touches.' He has an excellent record of service to the Kent County Association, and particularly to the Canterbury District, where for a number of vears he held office as district representative. His many ringing friends will wish him well.

It has laken Mr．Morris 41 years to fulf this ambition；in August，1906，lie rang his first peal at St．Andrew＇s，Grimsby，and on August 28 th his thousandth，a handbell peal of Stedman Cinques in St．Margaret＇s Church， Leicester，to which he has been attached all lis life．His father that grand old man Josiah Morris，rang with lim in his first，and with him in this，his latest．
As a boy．Ernest Morris，who was born in Leicester on July 281h，1889，was not content to simply ring for services and an occasional peal．He wanted to know who made the bells， low they were cast，in fact，all about them． Numerous articles and books are the result． Morris wanted to be able to ring any kind of bell，large or small，good going or bad，and in any wethod and on any number．His record shows how he carried out this ambi－ tion，how he tackled some very tough proposi－ tions in remote country places where the bells were deomed impossible，sometimes going two or three times until be got through．With the exception of three only，Morris has rung a full peal on all the possible belle in his own native county．Peals at 125 churches in his native shire is a number not reached by any other ringer in any one county，and this includes 49 first peals on the bells．
Mr．Morris is well known as a conductor， and his first peal as such was at Melton Mowbray，where he called Grandsire Triples in May，1908．He has rung and conducted peals on all numbers of bells from five to twelve， and he is a ringer who thinks as much of assisting in a peal of Doubles as he does a peal of Maximus．
HIS RECORDS AND LITERARY WORK．
Morris has taken part in many record lengths，including conducting the longest．by the Midland Counties Association of Doubles \((6,600)\) ．Minor（ 7,200 and 10,080 ），Bob Major \((7,008\) and 13,440\()\) ．Kent Treble Bob \((10,912)\) and Orford Treble Bob（7，840），He also con－ ducted the longest lengths of Bob Major by Central Northants Assaciation，one of 7，488， and another of 9,760 with 400 singles．He called the record peals of Little Bob \((6,720)\) ， Sittle Canterbury（ 6,720 ），Spliced Treble Bob （Ilkeston arrangement， 9,120 ），and rang in 9,600 Kent and Oxford Spliced．He also took part in the record peals of Cambridge Major （7，008 and 12,896 ），and the recent record 12,663 Stedman Cinques at Oxford Cathedral．

He called the quickest tower－bell peal ever rung．a 5,040 Cambridge Minor in 1 hour 50 minutes ；and also the only＇Ernest＇peal．He has rung peals with four sets of brothers，four fathers and sons，and five fathers and sons， while his handbell peals range from Doubles to Maximus and include the lightest and heaviest rets ever rung．His peals have been spread over 219 towers in 24 counties for 25 associations and guilds．
It is．however，not only in peal ringing that Mr．Morris has done some excellent work． He served the Midland Counties Association as it honorary secretary from 1925 until it was divided into Diocesan Guilds in 1945．He is now vice－president of the Leicester Guild and acts as consultant for bells on the Ad－ visory Committee for the Leicester Diocese．
With a penchant for historical research，Mr Morris has a complete record of every bell in Leicestershire and all historic facts known of them．He has completely revised and cor－ rected North＇s book up to date，and it is hoped that thin will be printed as conn as the paper

crisis permits．He is the author of a＇Chrono－ logy of British Bell Founders＇and many historic articles on other subjects，but he is， of course，best known to ringers as the author of＇History and Art of Change Ringing＇and ＇Legends o＇the Bells，＇two volumes of great interest and value．He has in the publisher＇s hands a new work entitled Bells of All Nations，＂which covers every type of bell in all lands．

He transcribed all the ancient baptismal， marriage and burial registers of St．Mar－ garet＇s，where he is now Parish Clerk and Clerk of the Vestry，and for this and other works was made a Fellow of the Royal His－ torical Society and a Fellow of the Royal Geographical Society．He is a member of the Johnsonian Society．

Latest is the contribution of an illustrated article on bells for the new edition of Cham－ hers＇＇Encyclopedia＇and others to the B．B．C．， Apollo Magazine，Nautical Magazine，Mec－ cano Magazine and many journals on sub－ jects as widely removed as horse brasses，fire backs，door knockers and，of course，＇Bells．＇ The art of illuminated design Mr．Morris taught himself，and this has enabled him to write peal tablets and peal books．

And all this has been achieved with one eye． Ernest Morris has been blind in the right eve from birth．Following is a list of the 1,000 peals．

COXDUCTOR ANSWERS.
Dear Sir, - Why the peal of Kent Treble Bob Minor rung at Flland, Yorks, brings to Mr. V. A. Jarrett's mind the correspondence of the Basingstoke peal I cannot imagine. Musically incorrect or not, the calling was true, and, most important to me as conductor. the striking was of the best.
The ringers' ropes were as tight in the last seven twenty as the first.
The light six were chosen for the benefit of iwo young ringers attempting their first peal, and thesmiles of happiness which lit up their faces when they heard "This is all" amply rewarded the efforts of Mr. F. Linfoot and myself.
This is not the first nor the last peal which has been rung on the front six at Elland, and if at any time it was deleted from the records of the Association, it will still be seen recorded on a peal board in the bell chamber of St. Mary's, Elland.
The tenor is 15 cwt. 3 gr. in \(F\), the fifth is odd struck, the sixth rope slips the wheel if not kept tight, and the seventh is apt to drop when ringing. In the light of the above stated faults, these bells cannot be truly termed an excellent ring of bells.- Yours truly,

Dear Sir, - I was surprised to read Mr. Jarrett's letter on the musical demerits of the Elland peal, and was more than surprised when he stated that our bells were an excellent ring of eight and should provide no difficulty for a Minor peal on the back six. Jarrett that I considered which six would be best to ring before we started the peal, and decided on the light six in the interests of (1) good striking, which to my way of thinking is the major point next to the truth of the peal; (2) of the comfort of the ringers; and (3) in consideration for the ringer of the 3 rd, who on the back six
would be ringing the oddestruck 5 th, and who would be ringing the odd struck 5 th, and who
incidentally is a young first pealer of 15 years. We started with the hope of ringing a good peal, well struck, and we were highly satisfied with our performance.

From 1934-9 he was the efficient Ringing Master of the branch, and then became chairman. an office he relinquished in 1944 owing to failing hea'th. Recently he had gone to live with his son at Caythorpe, Lincolnshire, where lie died on August, 191 h , aged 73 . He will be much missed in the Norwich Diocese.

\section*{PROPAGANDA NEEDED}

Ambling around country villages and searching for bells and ringers is a broadening experience, full of pleasant surprises and at times rude shocks. The writer was in the 'round ' and 'call changes ' counties last week and had the privilege of discussing various ways of ringing with one who had had nearly 50 years' experience of 'stoney' ringing. And it was illuminating.
He was what he classified himself-a 'call changer,' and frankly admitted that he was not too struck with those 'methods ' men. 'Methods,' he maintained, could only be rung on light bells and, further, there had been a 'methods' ringers' meeting at his church, and the striking had been very bad, which he attributed to the fact that the bells were heavy! To this argument a recent experience in a neighbouring county seemed an appropriate reply. Here some ringers on their 'outing ' were contacted, and it was noted that they travelled complete with calling board. Accompanying them to one tower which had a light ring with the 'go' excellent and almost new bells hung on ball bearings, the writer was appalled by the bad striking. The veteran eventually agreed that there was good and bad amongst both kinds of ringers.

It then occurred to the writer that, while appeals for good striking could be made to 'method ' ringers through 'The Ringing World,' as was constantly being done, there was no vehicle of approach to change ringers. A copy of this journal was shown to the veteran, and to a question if he had ever seen 'The Ringing World, before he replied in the negative, adding that he did not know such a paper existed! What a shock, after so many years of publication, to find a man who had been ringing for nearly 50 years was ignorant of this journal and its purport! A copy was given to him, and he was told how to procure it weekly.

The story does not end there. This tower was within a sixpenny bus ride from a city where there are several rings of bells and change ringing is practised. For such ignorance of change ringing to exist points to the need of propaganda. It is doubtful if my friend of nearly 50 years' experience will ever change his mode of ringing; he is too set in his ways; but it is incumbent upon all who cherish the art of change ringing to see that the younger generation are given an opportunity of learning ' method ' ringing and come under its fascinating spell. There must be a concerted effort by all who love change ringing to proselytise these 'stoney ' towers. The task is by no means easy.

\section*{Bells accompany Hymn Singing}

The old saunce bell of St. Mary's, Acton, dated 1583, has had a new experience. After 360 years of continuous service, the last 60 of which have been spent as the treble of a peal of eight, it has with its companions had the novel role of leading the singing of a church service.
The Bishop of London, in his recent primary charge, asked that experiments should be made to reach the man-in-the-street, and that new methods and new types and times of services should be tried. The Rector of Acton, the Rev. Percival Gough, decided that St. Mary's should make such an experiment, and that the bells should play their part in it.
So on August 11th, the evening service was held in the church garden, a pleasant stretch of grass backed by trees and shrubs, with the church on one side and high buildings, which protect it from much of the main road moise, on the other. By 6 o'elock people began to arrive, and for haif an hour the bells sounded their joyous message, and many well-known hymns and sacred songs were chimed. The Rector announced the first hymn, the bells gave out the tune, and, singing, the choir moved down the church steps and crossed the lawn to their appointed place, followed by the Rector, with the Rev. F. H. E. Harfitt, who was to preach.

The \(\mathbf{F}\) to \(\mathbf{F}\) range of the bells was suitable for singing, and the combination of bells and voices was pleasant. In spite of the distance between choir and chimer, the synchronisation of the Magnificat. 23rd Psalm and five hymns was excellent. The Nunc Dimittis was sung as the recessional.

Many passers-by stopped to listen and join in. The words of the hvmns were striking and beautiful. set to familiar tunes within the scope of eicht bells. That limitation, however. gives a wide choice of both hymn tunes and chants. The service aroused much interest and was felt to be a missionary effort vell worth repeating.

Mrs. F. John Marshallsay has completed her 150 peals, and not Miss Mary E. Davis, as was wrongly stated in this column last week. Mary's enthusiasm will, we trust, enable her to reach this exalted position at an early date.

A young lady from Leicester, who rang Sherborne tenor during a recent tour, is anxious to know whether she is the first of her sex to have this honour.

Group Captain T. V. Lister, R.A.F. (retd.), is the new chairman of the Tewkeshury Branch of the Gloucester and Bristol Association, and not Mr. A. R. Lister, as stated on page 428.
Mr. R. H. Dove informs us that the first peal at Tutbury, Staffs, was rung on February 2nd, 1935 - Bob Minor, conducted by Mr. Jack Bailey. The claim in last week's issue of the first peal since augmentation to six in 1934 is consequently not upheld.

Just after the start of the peal at Keevil, Wilts, on August 30 th, the Vicar entered the belfry and-without disturbing the bandplaced an envelope on the table. The delighted ringers later found it contained money for refreshments.

Also Cambridge University Guild is credited with three handbell peals of Doubles. These should be three of Minor in one method.

Mr. Wm. H. Male, of Warwick, has at last accomplished a peal on bells. This was on July 17th, on the back eight of a chime of ten bells, constructed by Mr. T. Male. The apparatus consisted of ten house bells, tuned and fitted to play by keyboard, and the composition was Holt's Original, and occupied three hours and nine minutes. Then on August 4th a quarter-peal of Stedman Triples was tapped on them in the morning, and in the evening one of Holt's peals of Bob Major was hammered out in two hours and fifty-eight minutes. Mr. T. Male witnessed the peals and turned the pages of figures from which they were read.

THE Durham and Newcastle Diocesan Association covers the counties of Durham and Northumberland, which are the respective dioceses of Durham and Newcastle. The Association was formed in August, 1877, and, in order to obtain a view of its operations, one is well repaid by a brief glance at the background of the country.

Bounded to the east by the coastline of the two counties, it extends from the north of Yorkshire to the Scottish border, and to Westmorland and Cumberland in the west; it is a iand steeped in tradition. From earliest times matters ecclesiastical have been closely integrated with Northumbria, and recall the Venerable Bede, his monastery at Jarrow, his solitude on Holy Island, Lindisfarne, the Cathedrals of Durham and Newcastle, jewels of those northern cities, the deaneries and Collegiate Churches of Darlington, Staindrop, Chester-ie-Street, Lanchester, and others, the Abbey of Hexham, with its monks' night stairs, and the names inter alia of Bishop Auckland, Bishop Wearmouth, Monkwearmouth and Monkseaton.

From the days of the Prince Bishops and the border raids, when men went about their occupations sword in hand, rural Northumberland has changed little; sheep still graze in the shadow of the Roman Wall, and Otterburn tweed is still spun, but on Tyneside and in Durham County a vast change was wrought by the Industria! Revolution. The dales of Tyne, Wear and Tees still preserve their charm, but the development of the coalfields and the opening of the Stockton and Darlington Railway marked the beginning of a new era. The busy ports
of Hartlepool Sunderland. Shields and Newcastle, and the great shipyards, steelworks, railway undertakings, collieries, and the diversified ancillary activities of a vast industrial expansion were the result.

Bells existed here from time immemorial, but records are very sparse. Three pre-Reformation bel's. however, hang in Newcastle Cathedral, and three similar bells at Heighington were made a peal of six by the addition of three by Taylor. With the growth in population, more bells were lieard, but the earliest knowil attempt at combination was the Neweastle and rrateshead Societr. which was ringing peals some hundred and fifty years ago. There is evidence of continuing combination, culminating in the formation of the present Association. The inaugural meeting was held in the Choristers' Schoolroom of Durham Cathedral on Saturday, August 25th, 1877, with Canon Rogers in the chair. This was recorded in 'Church Bells of that time, and was followed by the first ringing meeting at North Shiclds, on November 24 th, 1877 , the first President being William Reed of that town, the Seeretary G. J. Clarkson, of Stockton, and a membersnip of 99 , the title being The Durham Diocesan Acrociation (changed to its present stvle in 1882).

Then began the bui!ding of an organisation to stand the test of time. With a vot large number of rincs arailable perseverance bronght its reward, and enthisiasm reached a high level. A scheme for recording Sindar service ringing. and awarding of certificates, introduced by S. O. Ferry, proved so popular


\section*{DURHAM CATHEDRAL}

In those days publications were few, and everything was done in the 'hard way. It was not, therefore, until December 26th, 1903 , that the first peal of London was scored, when two peals were rung in this method, one at All Saints', Newcastle, conducted by T. T. Gofton, and the other at St. John's, Newcastle, conducted by C. L. Routledge. Owing to an earlier start, Tom Gofton's peal came round first, and took priority, but two pea's of London, rung simultaneously in the same city by local bands, was a feet in 1903.

Amongst other performances was the turning in of Newcastle tenor to Superlative (1894), and Double Norwich (1898) by F. J. Harrison, being the heaviest tenor rung to peals in those methods at that time; the first peal of Real Double Superlative (March 9th, 1922) at St. Ignatius', Sunderland, of Premier Surprise (February 28th, 1922) at Whitlev Bar. the first peal of Spliced Surprise Major (Cambridge and Superlative) at Whitley Bar, composed br J. W. Parker and conducted by J. A. Gofton. the double-handed peals of London hr the four Gofton brothers, and seven Surprise Minor methods double-hand by the three Parks.

Of stalwarts there are R. Story nresident 1883-1905: F. Lees, vice-president 1877-97: C. L. Routledge, president \(1908-20\), 1926-8. and seven vears secretary; T. T. Gofton, conductor
that two divisions became necessary. Two wars, and industrial depressions, made their presence felt on the membership, however; this had risen to 380 in 1897, 460 in 1922,712 in 1927. but dropped to 554 in 1930. 516 in 1939, and 481 in 1946. A tablet recording the names of the 41 members who fell in the 19141918 war was unveiled in Newcastle Cathedral on April 7th, 1923, upon which a wreath is laid at the Annual Festival.

A great day for the Association was in 1914. when its first ring of twelve became an accomplished fact by the augmentation of the ten in Newcastle Cathedral, although the first twelve-bell peal (Kent Maximus) had heen rung at St. Peter Mancroft, Norwich, in 1894.
The first peal by the Association was Grandsire Triples (Taylor's six-part) rung at Christ Church North Shields, on October 1st, 1878, by G. H. Park, J. T. Gibson, W. H. Park, R. Smith, J. Caulson, W. Reed (conductor), G. A. Overton and S. Nott. All were North Shields men except the 7th, who was from Darlington. It was the first peal for all.
of 186 peals; J. W. Parker, composer and conductor, whose research compositions and untiring efforts stand as his monument; W. Story W. Brown (founder of the Wednesday Guild), E. E. Ferry, J. Stuart and J. Symm. A faithful band of long service members is still with us: W. H. Barber with a relish for difficult compositions (e.g., Carter's odd-bob-and-single-one part, whilst blindfold), J. E Keen, W. Sheraton, Dr. Barrow, O. Simm, G. W. Park, J. W. Shipp, R. L. Patterson, the reigning president, and many others, whilst juniors are Dick Gofton, double-hand London at 16 , and R. S. Stratford, London 'inside at 12 years of age.

In 1912 the territory was divided into districts, each with its own secretary and vicepresident, and power to arrange its own meetings. This proved entirely successful and flourishing organisations now exist.

The Central Council met at Newcastle in 1913, when five peals were scored, and 610 members and friends, with the Lord Mayor and Bishop Wood, were guests of Gillett and Johnston and 'The Evening Chronicle, at the North-Fast Coast Exhibition in 1929, to a demonstration of the Wellington (New Zealand) War Memorial Carillon, tea at the exhibition, and a social evening and refreshments afterwards. A president's badge in enamel and silver gilt was presented to the Association in 1935 by the then president, Councillor A. Payne, O.B.E., J.P.

Enjoying the support of the Bishops and clergy, the members, whilst never monotonously unanimous, faithfully carry out the Association's objects. and preserve a spirit of friendship unaffected by triumph or disappointment, and nowhere can this be more clearly seen than at the annual festivals, which year by year come round to the pleasure and profit of all.
Fintering upon its 70th year with one ring of twelve, 4 of ten, 37 of eight. 24 of six, and 2 of five, and 460 members, the Association views the future with the same confidence extant in 1877

\section*{LLANDAFF AND MONMOUTH ASSN.}

The large number of nut-diocesan visitors Was a pleasing feature of the quarterly meeting held at Chepstow on August 23 rd , when visitors were present from Hempstead and Norton in Gioucestershire, Newark-on-Trent, Ross, Gorseinon, Morriston, Sidmouth, Bristol, Cheitenham and Nailsea (Somerset), in addition to representatives from various towers in the area, about 50 in all. Visitors were entertained to tea by the local band and their wives.
At the meeting, which, in the unavoidable absence of the Vicar, was presided over by the curate, the Rev. L. W. Sapsford, points to be raised at the annual meeting, the increase of the subscription to 2 s . and the division of the Association into districts, were advanced by Messrs. Stitch and Prosser.

Six new life members were elected, also six new members from the Chepstow tower. It was decided to hold the next Monmouthshire meeting at Penhow. The secretary was asked to send the promiced donation towards the restoration of Blaenavon beils. A collection for the Bell Restoration Fund realised £1 17s. 9 d .

\section*{MR. E. DENISON TAYLOR}

The funeral of Mr. Edmund Denison Taylor, whose death in the Loughborough Nursing Home on August 28 th was reported last week, took place on September 1st at Loughborough Parish Church.
Mr. Taylor had entered the nursing home the Thursday preceding bis death following an examination by a specialist the previous day. On the Tuesday he had attended at his office as usual. His home was Buckland. Burton Walks, Loughborough.
The son of the late Mr. John William Taylor, sen., he was born in Pack Horse Lane, Lough borough, where the bell foundry was first es tablished in the town. He was educated at Loughborough Grammar School and was then apprenticed to a Leicester iron founder, after which he took his share in the management of the bell foundry, together with his father and his bnother, Mr. John William Taylor, jun
Mr. J. W. Taylor, sen., died in 1906, alid the brothers carried on together until the death of Mr. J. W. Taylor, jun., in 1919, sunce when Mr. E. D. Taylor had been assisted in the manarement by his nephews. Mr. Pryce Taylor, who died in Canada in 1927, and Mr Arnold Taylor, who was killed in action in 1916. In recent years another nephew, Mr . Paul Taylor, has assisted to run the rusiness .

\section*{AN AUTHORITY}

As a bellfounder. Mr. E. D. Taylor had a complete knowledge of all matters connected with the art of bell-making from start to finish. His opinions on bells were scught all over the world, and at any gathering of campanologists his words carried weight and were received with respect. During the time that ho directed the business many thousands of bells, large and small, were cast and sent out to all parts of the world.
An expert of modern methods of tuning of bells, be had paid many visits to the U.S.A. and to the Continent. It was largely due to his enthusiasm for carillons that several carillons were erected in this country, notable among which is the Loughborough War Memorial carillon.
Many of the famous carillons in the U.S.A. were made under his direction at Loughborough, and at the opening ceremony of one he met President Coolidge

\section*{HUNTING ACCIDENT,}

In addition to being an active bellringer up to the time when he lost the proper use of his left arm through a hunting accident while out with the Quorn Hounds at Wysall early in the century, he was deeply interested in music and attended many concerts. He was a skilled performer on the violoncello and piano and in the late 1890's he formed and conducted his own orchestra.

As a sportsman he was well known, and played for Loughborough Town Cricket Club, being a useful all-rounder. He was a member of the Notts and Leicestershire County Cricket Clubs.

Mr. Taylor was a bachelor. The flag on the bell foundry tower hung at half-mast as a tribute to his memory
His on!y surviving brother is Mr. Owen J. Taplor.

\section*{THE FUNERAL.}

The Rector (the Ven. W. J. Lyon) officiated at the funeral service, when the representative congregation included the Mayor (Cclr. W. R. Banner). In a short address, he referred to Mr. Taylor's career as a bellfounder, and his paternal interest not only in his business but also in the workpeople, for whom he did many an unobtrusive act of kindness.
The chief mourners were Mr. Owen J. Taylor (brother), Mr. and Mrs. Paul Taylor (nephew and niece), Miss Margaret Taylor (niece), Mr. and Mrs. Moore, London (nephew and niece). Major Mears, Letchworth (nephew), Mr. Denison Mears and Miss

Pamela Mears, Nurse Reeve, Mrs. Adams (housekeeper) and Mr. Jim Smith, an employe for 64 years.
The bearers were the six oldest employees of the bell foundry, Messrs. G. Black, T. Roper, B. Harris, W. Burnett, W. Smith, and A. Smith.

The Leicester Diocesan Guild was represented by Mr. E. Morris, and Mr. H. Withers represented St. Martin's Guild for the Diocese of Birmingham.
Present from the firm were Mr. John Odiham (general manager), Mr. J. P. Fidler, Mr. F. H. E. Stubbs, Mr. C. E. Morley (cashier), Mr. W. Mitchell, Mr. J. Brailsford, Mr. E. Frisby, Mr. J. E. Littler, Mr. J. Humphrey, Mr. A. Fidler and others.
A course of Grandsire Triples was rung at the graveside by the handhell ringers, who were Messrs. J. P. Fidler 1-2, Harry Withers 3-4, Ernest Morris 5-6, Horace Stubbs 7-8.
In addition to the family and other wreaths there was one from the staff and employees of Messrs. John Taylor and Co.

\section*{MR. E. STONE.}

The death occurred on August 28 th of Mr. Ernest Stone, of Coventry. in his \(59 t h\) year. He was a native of Nuneaton and for many years a member of the Parish Church Societv of ringers. He also did a great deal of work for Chilvers Coton Church, having panelled the belfry in oak. His. work as a joiner brought him to Coventry in 1938, when he became a member of the All Saints' Society of ringers at Allesley.
Interment took place on September 1st at Keres'ey Church, and was attended by a large number of ringers from Allesley, Bedworth, Bulkington, Chilvers Coton, Nuneaton, Rugby. Stoke-in-Coventry and Keresley. Those present were Mr. F. E. Pervin (Ringing Master of the Coventry Diocesan Guild), Mr. T. W. Chapman, of Worcester, Mrs. and Mr. A. H. Beamish (secretary and auditor of the Guild!. Mr. A. Roberts, Mr. E. Sibley and many others.

The funeral service was conducted by the Rev. Bastin. Vicar of Keresley, and the Rev. F. W. Moyle, Rector of Allesley, and at the close a plain course of Grandsire Triples was rung upon Mr. Stone's own handbells by the Alleslev ringers: C. H. Webb 1-2, H. G. Summers \(3-4, \mathbf{J}\). H. W. White \(5-6\). J. W. Tavlor \(7-8\); and in the evening a half-muffled peal of Bob Major was rung at Allesley.

Mr. Stone rang 125 peals, 116 being for the Coventry Diocesan Guild and nine for thr Midland Counties Association. He is survived by a widow, two sons, both ringers and both at present serving in the Forces, and one daughter.

\section*{Young Ringers go on Tour}

\section*{FROM WINCHESTER TO MARLBOROUGH.}

On Saturday, August 9th, twelve young ringers, whose ages range from 16 to 23 years, met in Winchester for the start of a unique and memorable ringing tour. Gathered from such towns as St. Albans, Bath, Bristol, Coventry, Godalming, Guildford. Leicester and Londen, and representing some ten or twelve associations, few had met each other before, but as is usual amongst ringers, a friendly band was quickly formed
The tour, which lasted a fortnight during ideal weather conditions, took the ringers through the lanes and by-ways of Hampshire, Dorset, Somerset and Wiltshire. Travel was by bicycle over roads which sometimes became mere cart tracks, of, as in one case, a stretch of Hampshire downland. The nights were spent in youth hostels or in barns and fields where accommodation was unobtainable.

First ringing of the tour was at Sparsholt. where a band of ringers, a congregation and part of the choir were provided. No doubt a church organist could have been produced had the need arisen! Handbell ringing in the Close and service ringing at Winchester Ca,thedral, where a comp'ete young band rang the opening touch, 168 Grandsire Triples, ard, finally, attended at service, filled the afternoon. More service ringing, again \(b x\) the tourists alone, took place at St. Maurice's for evensong.
Monday, the 11 th, was the beginning of ringing at many famous and historical tewers. Among the 55 visited were such well-known names as Romsey Abbey, Bath Abbey, Wimborne Minster, Queen Camel, Wells Cathriral, Trowbridge Parish Church and Finly Trinity Church, Bradford-on-Avon. At the beautiful Abbey of St. Mary, Sherborne, a mernker of the fair sex showed how a tenor bell sl nuld be rung!

On Fridar, August 22nd, the tour came to an end. The finale was a well-struck 720 of Bob Minor on the fine six at St. Mary's, Marlborough, and although several attomnts were made to ring a touch on the eight at St. Yeter's Church, they were unsuccessful.
The standard of ringing, generally, was high, and methods rung included (irandsire (Doubles to Cinques), Stedman. Plain Bob (Minor to Royal). Cambridge Surprise, Kent and Oxford Treble Bob, Double Norwich Court Bob Major, Single and Double Court Brb Minor, Oxford Bob, St. Simon's, Reverse Canterbury Pleasure. Handbell ringing proved to be popular at the hostels, although doublehanded ringing was too much for some of the band. Only one tenor was not turned in, and that was the \(57{ }_{3}\) cwt. tenor of Wells Cathedral, where the band voted against a touch of Bob Major, to the disgust of the tenor man.
Despite many warnings by 'old timers,' the band did not suffer too severely from histered hands. but how legs ached afier climbing those Somerset towers!
The tour was made possible by the enthusiasm and the careful arrangements of Messrs. T. Mark White and Eric Free, and with them the band wish to thank the many incumbents and tower. captains who co-operated so readily. Best wishes for a speedy recovery go to Tony W' J. Appleton, one of their number, who was unfortunately involved in a road accident while on the tour.

Landewednack, Mullion, Cury, Manaccan and St. Mawgan-1nMeneage (all 6's): and Phillack (8), wh:ere the local captain, Mr. Shepherd. conducted the last touch of the evening on Friday.
Col. and Mrs. C. F. Jerram "nlertained the party at the house, Pengwedhen, Helford, on Thursday, and. Saturday morning saw the break-up of the party, but a remnant went to Crowan for Grandsire Triples. The attempt did not last !ong, however. Thanks were expressed to the many incumbents who took much interest in the ringing.
Local ringers, too, were interested and several shared in the ringing; at two six-hell, towers a lady in each case completed a ladies' band. It is unfortunate that some helped in the arduous task of looking after the labe and three young children, and heiped with the transport, and were involved in the three failures.

\section*{CHATTERIS RINGERS' MEMORIAL}

For many vears there has existed a strong feeling of comradeship among the ringers of Chatteris, Cambs, which found expression on September 3rd, when a tablet to the memory of two of their number, Russel Paul and Joseph Haylett, who fell in the second world war, was unveiled and dedicated.
Ringing preceded a short service conducted in the belfry by the Vicar, where the ringers were joined by the relatives of the fallen, the district secretary (Mr. C. Gimbert) and the general secretary of the Ely Diocesan Association (Mr. W. W. Cousins). The simplyworded tablet is of bronze with engraved letters in white enamel, the cost being defrayed by the local ringers.

\section*{SALISBURY DIOCESAN GUIID} PRESENTATION TO FORMER SECRETARY.
Thirteen towers were represented at the Dorchester Branch meeting at Charminster on August 16th, when Canon A. Wilkinson Markby (Rector of St. Peter's, Dorchester, and chairman of the branch) presented Mrs. Godley, of Stratton, with an illuminated address and a gift from the ringers in appreciation of her services as hon. secretary from 1914-47.
The address had been prepared by the Rev. A. S. Bryant, Rector of Upwey, and accompanying it was a list of 128 members from all lowers who had subscribed towards the gift. Canon Markby spoke of Mrs. Godley's outstanding work for the branch, a tribute that was warmly endorsed by the ringers.
The Vicar, Rev. D. B. Eperson, and Canon Markby conducted the ringers' service, and at tea thanks were extended to the Vicar, the local ringers, and the lady helpers for their hospitality.

\section*{Sanity Questioned}

Dear Sir,-The various references in recent issues of 'The Ringing World' to ringing oddities can, I think, be capped by a recent experience of members of the Oxford University Society of Change Ringers. This should not, however, be regarded as typical of the ringing activities of the society!
On visiting the tower at Bronllys, during the society's ringing tour this summer, the ropes were found to be extremely low. One member found he could ring much better sitting down, but in a few minutes the whole band had descended to its knees, in which position a touch of Bob Minor and then a well-struck course of Cambridge Minor were brought round. In each case the word 'stand' brought the ringers to their feet, and the bells were set at the call ' stop!'
Although doubts were expressed by certain onlookers concerning the sanity of those participating, it was generally acknowledged that the striking was some of the best experienced at the tower.

\section*{WELL KNOWN RINGERS WED}

\section*{REVIEW}

DOUBLE NORWICH COURT BOB CATERS'
The complaint has often been made that the style of writing used in ringing text books is so involved as to go over the head of the average ringer. That criticism can hardly be made of the excellent work on 'Douhle Norwich Caters, the method and its proof,' written by Edgar C. Shepherd and.just published in useful size book form. The work shows that the author has been at great pains to help the student to compose and prove louches and peals in this fascinating Cater method, and he is to be congratulated on having dealt with his subject in simple terms, easily understood.
The Rev. H. Law James and his brother made an attempt some 40 years ago to popularise this useful method by ringing a peal with the Gloucester St. Michael's band, under the conductorship of that great pioneer, the late John Austin. Tradition in ringing, as in many other things, however, dies hard, and the effort misfired, prohably through the discouraging attitude of the Editor of ' The Bell News, who regarded the method as a novelty.
Those lucky bands who possess a ring of ten hells will do well to study this latest book, which provides us with a welcome alternative to Grandsire and Stedman Caters. We can well do with booklets of the kind under review, and it is to be hoped that others who are gifted in the same way as Mr. Shepherd may by his example be induced to deal with other methods in the same simple but effective manner.

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\section*{AN AMERICAN W.ANTS TO KNOW}

A copy of the Rev. F. F. Rigby's book, 'Elementary Change Ringing,' has reached Mr. Ralph R. Mahlum, of Long Beach, California, U.S.A., and has aroused in him and five other members of the choir of the First Congregational Church in Long Beach an interest in change ringing. His church hopes to introduce a carillon. He writes to the president of the Lancashire Association: - The growth of bells and particularly carillons is apparent in America, but all too slow. Few of our churches have rings of bells-mostly one bell only-and many none at all. The only time they are rung is on Sunday morning, the five-minute period before 11 o'clock church service, as well as before Sunday School. Many communities have even dispensed completely with the bell, and it hangs idle on the roof-top in the dusty belfry.'
Mr. Mahlum pertinently asks what is the attitude of 'the man in the street.' Do they object to long periods of ringing? Do they thoroughly enjoy the sound of ringing bells, for instance in change ringing? Do they take them as a matter of course? "Here the cry goes up to heaven when carillons are played, often "the bells are out of tune," and one has to play them softly lest they offend some crackpot who thinks his or her ears cannot withstand the sound of their playing. And how unfortunate that attitude is here where we daily live in a maelstrom of assorted sounds. I wish we might hear the bells more often; perhaps some day we shall, but there is need for a lot of conversion in America. People simply do not know how to listen to bells, nor what to listen for.

This interest in bells is particularly welcome. There are in the States a number of English ringers who have settled there, among them being Mr. E. Weatherby, of Los Angeles, who is making the journey by air this month to British Columbia to renew his handling of bell ropes and, if possible, to stand in a peal with a distinguished English visitor. Change ringing is practised in Australia, where ringers produce a typescript monthly journal, and Canada, and also to a limited extent in South Africa. If this venerable English art should find favour in the United States it will be an added means of cementing friendship between the two peoples and possibly a means of earning dollars by the export of British bells and carillons. The leading bell founders, we know, are sparing no pains in endeavouring to increase this avenue of trade, and recent issues have mentioned new rings of British bells at Malta and in Australia. It is to be hoped that at an early day mention can be made of securing American contracts.

\section*{Hampton Court Bells}

Recently the bells at Hampton Court Palace were cleaned and rehung. In the process an almost indistinguishable founder's mark was discovered on the two quarter bells. A tracing of the mark was made by the contractors con-cerned-Messrs. Mears and Stainbank-and identified as belonging to William Culverden, an early 16 th century London founder.
An illustration of the tracing accompanies this artic.e. The late H. B. Walters, F.S.A., in his work, 'Church Bells of England,' makes the following observations :-
and Gnally we have William Culverden ( \(1510-1523\) ), whose foundry shield is the most elaborate of all, and a rebus device of the most subtle description (305). Long a puzzle, it was finally elucidated by the ingenuity of Mr. A. D. Tyssen. The centre of the shield is occupied by a large bell, on which the letters FOWN of the word founder are visible: below are a \(W\) and a figure of a bird. On either side are inscribed the words, FN DNO COFIDO, with a trefoil and DE below: and in the base is a mark like two \(P\) 's conjoined, one being reversed. The name of Culverden being known as that of a founder from records of the period, it was ingeniously pointed out that culver is an old English word for "pigeon," the kind of bird evidently here represented. Combined with the W and DE we thus get "W. Culverden." Now the significance of the text is apparent, for the Vulgate of Ps. \(x\) (xi.) I. runs: "In Domino confido; quomodo dicite animae meae transmigra in montem sicut passer." The other two marks are still unexplained, but the trefoil may indicate a reference to the Holy Trinity, Culverden having had some relations with the Priory of that name in Aldgate.


The Henry VIII. astronomical clock in the turret is being restored by the Ministry of Works, and regilding of the dial is in progress. The hour bell was cast by Thomas Harrys, a London founder, between 1478 and 1480. The astronomical dial of the rlock was installed by Henry VIII., but the existing mechanism is of later date.

\section*{BRISTOL}

By A. Yorke-Bramble
A correspondent in these columus, recently claiming that Drayton is 'an illegitimate Surprise method,' and giving his reason as lack of internal place-makings when the treble is passing the cross-sections, said, 'Bristol Royal has the same fault.' 'Now it may be shown that the 'natural' extension of Bristol Surprise from the Major to the Royal compass has no such fault.
It is now a quarter of a century since this matter was before the notice of the Exercise in the pages of 'The Ringing World.' During 1922 and 1923 in a series of articles on methad construction and extension, and in correspondence, both public and private, with the brothers James (Bankes and Law), C. D. P. Davies, E. S. Powell, J. Armiger Trollope, George Baker and others, I discussed, inter alia, the Bristol method range from Major to Maximus. In the issue numbered 615 and dated December 29th. 1922 (page 820), appeared the concluding article with the figures for the method on each compass. Needless to say, the correspondents voiced their various criticisms; but the Royal version as published embodied, I believe, more of the recognised features than any other one version at that time put forward; and it certainly had not the fault of no internal places at the treble's crossing of sections, such as the correspondent has alleged.
But it had one feature about which I was none too happy. This oocurred in the changes at the quarter and three quarter rows of the full "lead,' i.e. those where the treble is dodging in 5.6. Here adjacent places were made simultaneously in 3.4 ana 7.8. The figures of this section were included as from another version of the Royal, which my old correspondent George Baker sent me at that time.
Another arrangement of this same section, however, with places at 7 ths and 10 ths in the first two rows, and at lsts and 4 ths in the second two rows, was also sent to me in 1922 by the late J. Armiger Trollope, in the course of some very lengthy private correspondence, and it seems to me preferable to include this arrangement of the rows of the sections with the treble in 5.6 for the finalised mode of Bristol Surprise Royal
In taking up again the threads of method rescarch after an absence of some years I am 1325476980 finalised figures have yet become

(b) Bristol-type shunts
(c) Mr. Baker's 'pivot bell' as for a double method, throughout the range; in this case No. 2 .
d) Associated lead-ends of the Bristol range
(e) Corresponding section rows as
found throughout the range.
(f) The typical Bristol working bell path throughout
and possibly-
(g) The hest music obtainable in the Bristol method on Royal comprss.
At this encouraging time of greater effort and achievement in ringing generally, it may be opportune to put forward the following point of view for the student of method construction: A method may be built or evolved originally in any one hell-compass of the range of rings; and this may be known as its 'basic compass.' For example, Bristol was evolved in the
major compass. The basic compass of Bristol is therefore major; similarly that of Stedman is doubles. Once evolved, a method can be considered as to its application to higher or, in some cases, lower compass; and even, sometimes, to all compasses, both odd and even; as for instance, the Grandsire system. Application upwards is properly known as 'extension', while application downwards may be called 'contraction.'
Some methods are found to have quite
natural' extensions above, and contractions below, the basic compass, while others are found to be strictly applicable only in one direction; that is to say, providing the conventions of method construction as covered by the Rules and Decisions of the Central Council are always observed
Bristol applies both above and below its basic compass. In other words, contraction to Bristol Surprise Minor is possible. In fact, it approximates to No. 29 of the C.C. Collection of Legitimate Methods, in the Surprise Minor group, known as Norwich Surprise. The latter differs, however, in having one less pair of places made in the half-lead, which prevents it evolving as the double method that Bristol is throughout its range

But this is material for another article.

Roberts, in acknowledging the vote of thanks, said they were always very pleased to receive the Society at East Ardsley and were more than grateful to the members for coming and ringing the bells. He felt that such Associations as these performed an excellent work in cementing the friendship between the various towers
The vote of thanks to the local company for making such splendid arrangements was proposed by Mr. F. Rayment, who said that the way in which Mr. Watson and his friends had made the preparations was quite an achievement in such difficult times

The local company were few in numbers now, but they tried to keep the bells going for service ringing. \section*{New Era of Change Ringing !}

Sir,-It would seem from the correspondence columns of 'The Ringing World' that we may be eutering a new era in change ringing where all this rot about bothering what a peal sounds like outside will be discarded and thrown overboard. Let us hasten to salute these brave reformers, Linfoot and Rhodes, in comparison with whom even Kippin must be label'ed reactionary.
Just take a look at the present position and compare it with the goiden future that may now be not so far away. Think of a youngster whin learns to ring rounds at a tender age and might then pass on to 'covering' but for the weight of the tenor, which is too great for him. What a sliame it is that the present antiquated rules of the Central Council debar him froin ringing a peal when he could quite casily 'cover' with the treble. In future we may hope that this will soon be recognised, for, after all, with eight bells the treble has the same note as the tenor only an octare higher, and the ropes would still fall in a clockwise direction. It may sound a bit unusual to the old fogies,' but think of the pleasure that it will give the little chap!

Another valuable reform that is surely long overdue is one which will benefit ten and twelve-bell towers. No longer shall we have to bother about the music of the peal and be tied down by these ridiculous and out of date conventions so that a peal of Major will have to be rung on the 'back' eight. No, we shall be able to go to a tower with twelve bells and pick out the eight most suitable. For instance, we shall leave out the tenor because it goes up false and we should have to waste time turning the clapper; the seventh is "odd struck, the fifth has a weak stay and the rope on the second looks a bit frayed so we shall leave those three out as well and use the eight left. Once again the reactionary old fogies are going to turn up their noses and make loud protests, but it will be quite all right as we shall take care to strike well, use the production of the clanges.

Doubtless the Central Council will be bitterly opposed to these new ideas and will seek to shelter behind its antiquated rules drawn up years ago before progressive ideas like these were heard of. But all ringers who have the future of our art at heart must band together to compel them to move with the times. Let
us show them that we are in earnest by holding meetings at Basingstoke and Elland if necessary and burying copies of their out of date rules with due ceremony. Surely the idea] is to abandon rules altogether, for it is impossible to lay down any set which will cover all possibilities. Think, for instance, how with the aid of wireless it would be possible through each ringer wearing headphones to have a peal rung where each bell was ringing in a separate tower. Dn our present rules recognise such a possibility?

I could wish that my name were better known in ringing circles and that thereby my plea might be made the more forceful, but as the campaign for reform gets under way I feel that my name will be much more in evidence in the new era that is dawning for change ringing.-I am, sir, yours faithfully,

'The Ringing World' is not the only publication devoted exclusively to the art of change ringing. Last April 'The Ringing Towers,' the monthly journal of the New South Wales Association, made its first appearance, and the four issues which have reached us via Mr. A. G. Williams, of Bexley, Kent, are good reading. Much of the information is intimate and personal, but most issues contain an article of instructional value.
The New South Wales Association was formed in February, 1946, and since then has made considerable progress in raising the standard of ringing and in getting bells ringing again, not only in Sydney, its birthplace, but also in outlying places in N.S.W. The Association feels that the best method of establishing ties between the various centres of ringing in Australasia is by the journal, 'Ringing Towers,' and while present issues are in typescript it is to be hoped that funds will permit of a printed publication at an early date.

Although the standard of change ringing in Australia is below that of any Diocesan Guild or County Association in this country, the New South Wales Association embarked on a courageous policy when it was formed. The qualification of membership is the ability to ring a working bell to 120 changes of Doubles. Commonplace as this rule is to us, it was a revolutionary step to them, as no other organisation in Australasia had set any similar condition on membership. The qualification was dilticult to introduce in the rules, as out of 40 odd foundation members only eight to ten could ring 120 changes of Doubles. To accommodate the majority, probationary membership was introduced.
Already 'Ringing Towers' has contacted the Christchurch Cathedral Society, New Zealand, and this society are giving the new venture every support. Apart from the Christchurch Society, other keen ringers in New Zealand are Mr. A. Roberts, of New Plymouth, Mr. Barnett, of Wellington, and the composer, Mr. J. S. Wilde, of Dunedin. At the moment, the Christchurch Society are trying to get a 720 of Plain Bob Minor on the light six. The ten bells at Christchurch are rung every Sunday. There is a ring of five at Papanui, three miles out, and hopes are entertained of buying or casting a treble for this church.

To Mr. W. M. Rowe, who we believe is acting as Editor, we wish every success. The first issue contained an Easter message from the Right Rev. C. V. Pilcher, Bishop Coadjutor of Sydney. He writes, 'I can never
forget the bells of the churches of the English countryside at the season of Easter. I was in charge of a beautiful church among the Cotswold Hills of Gloucestershire. The sound of pealing bells, rung by the skillul English bellringers, floating over valley and hill from a neighbouring villaye, filled the air.

Peals that delight an association's heart are those like that of Grandsire Doubles at Benwell. Newcastle. It was the first peal hy all performing, first for the Benwell Guild and first in the method on the bells.
By his peal of Cambridge Surprise Minor at Newington (Hythe), Kent, Mr. William Bottrill has rung peals of Cambridge from Ninor to Maximus.
Mr. T. W. Sheppard, of Foleshill, Coventry, came of age in true ringer's fashion. He called his first pea! of Surprise and rang his first of Yorkshire Major on his natal day.

\section*{CAMBRIDGE UNIVERSITY GUILD TOUR}

The annual ringing week was held from September 1st to 6th at Birmingham, lieadquarters being at Primrose Hi!l, Selly Oak, and arrangements being in the very capable hands of Frank Haynes. Other members present were E. M. Atkins, Dr. Poole, M. Lindley, R. Leigh, J. Butler, W. H. J. Hooton, C. W' Woolley, P. Williamson, B. Price. A. Rousel, Dr. Cunningham, G. Dodds and the Revs. E.
G. Benson, B. F. Sheppard and A. G. G. Thurlow. Some of these were only present part of the time.
During a fairly good peal of Cambridge on September 1st at St. Laurence's, Nortiffield, smongst the many 'phone calls received by the Vicar was one asking whether 'those diabolical and selfish people; might be stopped-despite this we went on to the bitter end. Touches at Edgbaston concluded a pleasant opening day. On September 2nd a peal of Bob Royal was greatly enjoyed on the grand new ten at Sulihull, and the afternoon passed pleasantly with Double Norwich, etc., at Shirley : one of R. I'.'s queer touches - spliced Grandsire and Stedman-at King's Norton; then a visit to the carillon at Bournville, whose keyboard proved too great a temptation for some memfiers. A very pleasant evening was spent at St. Martin's with members of the local band.

On September 3rà we visited Walsall, where we were encouraged to read on a peal board that on October 17th, 1859. a 'true and ex. cellent peal of Grandsire Majors, 5,007 changes, was rung in one lesson.' Despite this encouragement, Little Bob Royal went west after 26 minutes, sfter which we rang a quarterpeal in the same method by way of prep fine twelve, also lunch at the George. We were interested to note here thiat on February 41h, 1861, 10.032 Grandsire Majors was rung in excellent strle, also on June 20th, 1843, 7,248 Grandsire Majors was rung in a masterly style-our style had been too quick, and for our quarter-peal we tried to go slow and strike, which policy proved more successful in ringing than in some other spheres. Walsa!l possesses two churchwardens and two foreign wardens, of what nationality we did not discover. It also has a peal board recording on October 25th. 1809, 5.040 Bob Majors, on the Grand National Jubilee.

Tamworth, our next tower, more appropriately records in 1913 a peal for the 1,000 vear millenary of Tamworth Castle. This tower possesses a most convenient arrangement of two spiral staircases arranged round one
newel. This is not immediately obvious to the visitor, and if a peal band were to notice a hostile crowd coming up one stair. they could si!ently descend the other stair. On the way from Tamworth, one car load nearly came to blows on the question whether such a stair could have both its bottom doors at the same level or not. Peace prevailed, and we enjoyed the pleasant eights at Sutton Coldfield and Frdington. In the evening we had a good time at St. Mary's, Selly Oak. and finished up with a business meeting, at which we decided to hold the 1948 week at Manchester if possible.

On September 4th some took part in a peal attempt at Wi!lenliall. followed by a course of Cambridge Roral, whilst others rang at Lye, on England's lightest eight--the tenor weigls \(3 \frac{1}{5}\) cot. and the treble 60 pounds. The bells have to be rung 'wrong clappered' or the clappers will not strike hard enough. Despite these difficulties, several touches were more or less successfullv completed. Then to the fine eiglit at St. Thomas'. Stourbridge. and an enjoyable ring at Brierler Hill. The undersigned 'scribe' had to leave at this point. and takes no responsibility for the accuracy or otherwise of what follows.

T'ndismaved, the rest luwehed at 1)udler. At Wednesbury. Cambridge Royal, etc.. were rung on a fine ten recently rehung by \(G\). and J. At Coseler hidden in the Black Country, the eight rehung by Taylor in 1936 provided
enjoyment, as did tea kindly provided by some of the local band. A poem on the wall, incouding ' He giveth water for His thirsty children to drink, aroused feelings of more or less sympathy amongst various readers. At Halesowen the Ringing Master was not unnaturally surprised to hear Cambridge, etc., emerge from the tower, as he had not been advised of our visit. Birmingham Cathedral that evening provided another welcome opportunity to ring with local members.
On September 5th, Holy Communion was celebrated by B. F. Sheppard for members at St. Mary's, Selly Oak; a very successful morning followed for the 14 who now comprised the party, as between them they rang a peal of Bob Major at Edgbaston and Cambridge Minor on the back six at Selly Oak. After lunch the fine 12 at Aston were rung to Stedman Cinques and Caters, also Little Bob Royal with the back bells in the .Tittum 'one of B.P.'s novelties. London, etc.. followed at Bishop Ryder's, and in the evening there was a visit to St. Peder's, Harborne, five of whose bel's are by William Bagley, 1691.

On September 6th a good peal of Double Norwich was rung at St. Chad's. This was officially the end of the Guild week, but some members were privileged to take part in a peal of Stedman Caters at St. Philin's that afternoon, for the St. Martin's Guild, and some remained for Sunday morning.

We had too few members, we felt, to attemnt a twelve-bell peal, but the week was high'y successful and we were most grateful to the weather, the local ringers, our very kind hosts at, Primrose Hill, to the various tower keepers, the car drivers, and to F.E.H. for his or-
ganising.

The Birmingham and Coventry contingents arrived at Surfleet on Friday, and the London contingent on the Saturday. After a substantial lunch, three cars set out for the 38 mile drive to Lincoln. where tea was provided by Mr. and Mrs. John Freeman. At the Cathedral the other members of the peal band had already gathered, and the visitors were welcomed by the Cathedral ringers.
The peal, Stedman Cinques, was successful in 3 hours and 47 minutes, and it is interesting to note the band represented Guildford 2, London 2, Newcastle-on-Tyne 1. Spalding 1, Leverstock Green 1, Coventry 1, Lincoln 1. and Birmingham 3.

\section*{MR. THOMAS W. CHAPMAN.}

The death of Mr. T. W. Chapman, of Nuneaton, occurred on Sept. 13 th, the date of his golden wedding. Mr. Chapman had been in failing health for the last five months due to a seizure which rendered useless his power of speech. Another seizure a week before his death rendered him unconscious, and he passed peacefully away without fully regaining consciousness. He leaves a widow, one son (Mr S. T. Chapman, of Nuneaton) and a daughter (Mrs. T. H. Payne, of Worcester).

Mr. Chapman was in his 80th Jear and for over 60 years he rang at Nuneaton Parish Church, serving also as a sidesman for many years. He would often recount the early struggles of the Numoaton Society to ring Grandsire Doubles for Sunday services and how they progressed until Surprise Major was the rule rather than the exception.

A good all-rounder, Mr. Chapman as a teacher was unsurpassed. The present band at Chilvers Coton owe much to his patient en deavour. Whatever the ringing had been, for peal, practice, or service. Tom loved a good fall in peal, and to see him lower the treble so faultlessly, and to hear his famous 'Don't thrash 'em about,' are things which will long be remembered.

Blitzed out of Nuneaton in 1941, he resided with lis daughter in Worcester until May this year, when lie returned to Nuneaton. He was a Freeman of the Coventry Diocesan Guild, of which he was a founder member. He also served the Guild as Ringing Master 1924-1930 Although his peal records were destroyed, he is known to have sung 119 (including the 12.896 Cambridge Surprise Major) for the Midland Counties Association and 193 for the Coventry Diocesan Guild of which latter total he had ronducted 11. His first peal was rung at Nuneafon Parish Church on April 13th, 1889, and his last at the same tower on July 15th, 1946.

The funeral took place on Sept. 16th. A short service in the church he loved preceded the interment in Nuneaton Cemelerv, the Vicar (the Rev. F. S. Herbert) officiating. The hearers were Mescrs. A. H. Beamish, J. E. Moreton and J. Lloyd, of Coton and G. J. Stoneler, of Nuneaton. In addition to the family monrners a number of friends followed. including Mrs. D. F. Reamish, hon. secretary of the Guild, and Mrs. H. Billington (Nuneaton). Ringers present were I. J Hinde and F. Ashley (Bulkingion), J. Beale (Wolvey), F. Brassington, G. Freeman and A. Roberts (Stoke), W. Aldridge (Nuneaton). A course of Grandsire Triples was rung over the grave by H. Summers 1-2, J. H. White 3-4 F. E. Pervin 5-6, and J. Taplor 7-8

\section*{MR. FRANK NEWMAN.}

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\section*{READING'S BELLS}

From the recently published Part X. of 'The Church Bells of Berkshire,' by Mr. Frederick Sharpe, can be pieced together the romance of 'Harry ' or 'Kelsall,' the tenor of the ring of 12 at St. Laurence's, Reading. For five centuries no expense has been spared either to keep these bells in ringing order or to make alterations to the ring in accordance with the fashion of the time.

While it is known that there were three bells in this church in 1433, 'Harry' was consecrated in 1499. The first recasting was in 1567, but its weight was such that additional metal was required for the bells. In 1579 a ring of five was provided, the fourth and tenor being recast, the latter bell having a weight of 34 cwt .1 qr .

The bells of St. Laurence's were frequently cracking, caused through 'clocking' (tying a rope to the clapper and pulling the latter against the side of the bell), so much so that the following resolution was adopted at the vestry meeting of 1593: 'Whereas there was through the slothfulness of the Sextine in times paft, a kind of toling ye bell by ye clapper rope: yt was now fforbedden and taken awaye : \& that the bell should be toled: as in tymes paft: and not in anie fuch Idle forte.' 'Kelsall' was recast by Joseph Carter, the celebrated bell founder, who was then churchwarden in 1594-5. In 1646, Joseph Carter's 'lowd' tenor became cracked, whether or not on this occasion through the slothfulness of the sexton, we are not told, and was recast in the following year.

An important step forward was the decision of the Vestry in 1662 to recast the five bells into eight tuneable bells, using the same metal. The two largest bells were again cracked in 1703, and eventually recast, and it was on these bells that the first recorded peal in Berkshire was rung-Grandsire Triples in 1734. A ring of ten was introduced in 1748 by recasting the eight and adding two lighter bells. The tenor by now had been reduced in weight to 23 cwt .; four of these bells are in the present ring of 12.

History of these famous bells in modern times tells of how the Rev. C. Kerry in 1881 found them in a deplorable condition and that they had not been rung for several years. Three of the bells, including the tenor, were recast and the dedication and reopening ceremony was on February 21st, 1882. The augmentation to 12 was as recent as 1929, when the ring underwent a thorough restoration. It was through the enthusiasm of the Rev. C. W. O. Jenkyn and-Mr. R. T. Hibbert that
the \(£ 180\) was collected for the two new bells within the space of two months, and Mr. R. T. Hibbert conducted the first twelve-bell peal in Berkshire on April 21st, 1930. Has any tenor been recast more times in the history of bellringing?

\section*{N.E. YORKSHIRE AND S. DURHAM TOUR}

A week's ringing tour in N.E. Yorkshire and South Durham, which concluded on Sept. 6 th, produce 10 peas out of 14 attempts. One taiiure was due to a rope silpping the wheel at Northallerton, and the other three losses could be put down to physical strain due to lack of reserves. Ten ringers accepted Mr. J. E. Cawser's invitation to take purt in this tour, but il was regretted that Mr. W. L. Critchley, of Duncaster, couid only be present part time, thus a heavy strain was put upon the remaining nine ringers.
The party met at Thirsk at \(10 \mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m}\). on Satus day, August 30th and commenced by scoring a good peal of Yorkshire Major on the oid belis there, most of which were cast in the 15 th century.

After lunch a move was made by road to Northallerton, where an attempt for London was made. It soon became obvious that the band had to be fully awake to the job they had in hand; for not only were there one or two bad going bells here, but the 5th had a tendency to slip wheel occasionally even though rung with a tight rope, and once the treble ringer had to retrieve his rope from off the top of the clock case behind him. Despite these sdverse conditions, a good beat was maintained, but with the end well in sight after \(2 \frac{1}{2}\) hours' ringing, the 5 th rope slipped again and the bell set at back-stroke. This put an end to what may have been considered the best performance of the tour. After a very fine tea at a nearby cafe, the party moved on to Middiesbrough, where they made their head quarters for the following three days at the Corporation Hotel.
On Sunday morning the party was cordially welcomed in the tower of St. Hilda's, Middles brough, by the Vicar and local ringers. After a course of Bristol, a touch of Stedman Triples was rung with two of the local band standing in. In the afternoon the party went to Ormesby, some three miles out of town, and scored a good peal of London on the delightfu? Tayior eight there. A good touch of Stedman was then rung for Evensong with the local towerkeeper standing in.

Monday proved the most strenuous day of the week, for peals of Bristol and London were brought round on two heavy rings of of Bristo! was rung, three of the party put in a good hour's work on the ropes before the peal could be attempted. Eventually a start was made only to come to grief after 40 minutes owing to a change course, but the band seemed so determined to score a peal on this fine eight that a fresh start was promptly made and a good peal was brought round in 3 hours and 36 minutes.

At Saltburn the party were cordially greeted by the Vicar, even though they were then two hours behind their scheduled time. This very fine eight, although a littie too noisy in the ringing chamber, were soon set going to London, but a fresh start had to be made after two courses owing to the tenor rope breaking beneath the sally. This was soon remedied by our ex-R.N. friend, who proved that his ser vices in the Navy had not been entirely wasted. It was perhaps fortunate that Mr. J. C. E Simpson had been asked to call this peal, for no other voice present could have penetrated the noise of these bells, but at least he did have the satisfaction of silencing his critics by ca!ling a peal of London from a working bell

Tuesday morning found a rather tired band attempting a peal of Pudsey Major at Middlesbrough. After two or three false starts the party adjourned for lunch and made a fresh start at 1 p.m. After a short interview with the local Press, when a couple of photographs of the part were taken, \& start was made and eventually a peal was brought round. In the evening a peal of Lomdon was lost at Thornaby owing to a change course.

On Wednesday morning an early start was made for West Hertlepool, where the band
had the satisfaction of scoring a peal of Yorkshire Royal, being the first peal in the method by all the band except the conductor. In most cases it was the first touch in the method. An attempt for London in the afternoon was lost at St. Aiden's. West Hartlepool, a light but musical eight, after an hour's ringing. It was at this point where it became nuticeable that the strain due to lack of reserves was telling its tale. There were many very sore hands which called for careful treatment, such as yards of Elastoplast and handkerchiefs woven into the rope ends.

The Imperial Hotel, Darlington, was chosen as our headquarters for the remaining three days of the tour, and the party duly moved in on Wednesday evening. The next day found the ringers at Sheldon, where they did not find any difficulty in obtaining a beat on this pleasant ring of eight, temor 16 cwt , by Taylors. Here a good peal of Bristol was scored, but once again the afternoon attempt failed. this time Norfolk at Bishop Auckland after an hour. Even after three losses in three days the band still considered they were equal to Spliced Surprise. This they rang in masterly style on the old ring of eight at Richmond, the writer having the pieasure of listening to every blow. Again it fell to Mr Simpson's lot to call A. J. Pitman's most recent and difficult composition for the third time within two months, no other composit:on being available at the time. This proved a particularly pleasing performance, for three members of the band earned 'stars' for their first peal of Spliced Surprise.

At this juncture Mr. Simpson had to leave for home, which left the band seven strong, Mr. J. L. Millhouse also having left for a prior appointment. This gave the remaining party the opportunity to assist Miss Kilingiey, of Richmond, to score her first peal at first attempt-Bob Major-at Catterick, ably conducted by Mr. Leonard Trevor
To wind up the tour a peal of Norfolk was decided upon at St. Cuthbert's, Darlington This was successful on this fine new ring of eight by Messrs. Gillett and Johnston, 1937 , G. F. Newton for standing in at short notice.

Sincere thanks are extended to the many ringers who met. and welcomed the visiting ringers at the various towers also the clergg and towerkeepers for placing the bells at their disposal. In particular most sincere thanks are extended to Mr. Addison, of Middlesbrough, for the Yorkshire arrangements, and to Mr W. N. Park for the Durham arrangements The touring band wish to accord Mr. J. F Cawser their most sincere thanks for the arrangements he made for their help and comfurt during the whole week. He organised everything to the last detail, and they feel that they ought not really to have lost those three peals, as he left them nothing to do bu

It is useless for anyone to deny that the placemaking is not the same on 8,10 and 12 bells so far as the first ten changes are concerned, and if we want to make a double method of the Royal, all we have to do is to reverse the place-making of the first ten changes as shown, and the Maximus then follows naturally.

In Bristol Surprise Major the bells are in proper coursing order in front and behind, and ther are also in Roval and Maximus.

Mr. Bramble's so-called extension to Roya? does not conform to that rule.

\section*{WHITLEY BAY 'OPEN DAY'}

\section*{BEOLEY BELLS TO BE REHUNG}

Nir.-Readers of 'The Ringing World ' may be interested to know that the 14th century tower of Beoley Parish Church, which has been unsafe for a considerable period, is to be repaired, and at the same time the bells are to be rehung in a modern cast-iron frame by Messrs. Gi'lett and Johnston. The ring consists of six bells and was broadcast at Christmas 1943.
The details are as follows: No. 1, founded by R. Sanders, 1708 ; No. 2, H. O'dfield, in 1622 (this is the only Oldfie'd bell left in Worcestershire); No. 3, R. Sanders, 1709; No. 4, Newcombe. 1611: No. 5, Rudhall, 1789 ; No. 6, Nugh Watts. 1601
The church is famous for its association with the illustrious family of Sheldon, who introduced the art of tapestry weaving into England in the 16 th century. Many of this family are buried in the ahurch, and their names are on three of the belis.
The work of rehanging the bells and reparring the tower witt cost \(£ 1.450\), and we are advised to aim at raising a further \(£ 150\) as a contingency sum.

This parish of 770 people has raised \(£ 1.400\) in \(n\) vear. and the Appeal Committee now hope that lovers of the art of bellringing may feel disposed to help us. Mr. W. Jackson, Keswick, Birmingham Road, Bordeslev. Redditch. is the treasurer of the Appeal Fund. Yours sincerely,

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\section*{SOUTH CAROLINA}

From Charleston, South Carolina, George W. Williams, ex-sergeant in the 377 Infantry, U.S.A., has written to the Vicar of Basingstoke one of those human letters on bellringing's appeal to the stranger. The story starts with Mr. Williams arriving early at a Basingstoke Church for vespers. He writes: 'A gentleman came and opened a side door in the tower and asked if we would like to see the bells rung. We were bewildered and curious and went up into the tower with him. We were even more bewildered when we found ourselves in the ringing chamber, and became thoroughly confused when seven other men joined us. To see the ringers form themselves into a mystic circle and begin their alternating jack-in-the-box antics left us completely baffled. When the bells in the chamber above responded to the urgings of the mystic circle and gave tongue to Grandsire or Treble Bob, methodically and unrelentingly crashing out their coursings, our amazement and delight knew no bounds.'
Next steps in Mr. Williams' story were the reading of Dorothy Sayers' ' The Nine Taylors,' and while at Yale University getting a copy of Troyte's book on change ringing and mastering the principles. To take up his narrative: 'You can imagine my surprise when I discovered of the dozen rings of bells in this country hung to be rung in changes, one was in my awn town.' St. Michael's, Charleston, was built in 1761 and equipped with bells cast in England the same year. They were taken down and melted into cannon for the Revolution 1775, recast in England, taken down for the war between the States 1860, again recast in England and returned to their original frames in the belfry in 1869. For the last hundred years or so they have been played as a carillon on important occasions. This year a new electric ringer, in memory of the dead of this war was installed.'
- This summer I was asked to serve as substitute organist for St. Michael's. As soon as I could I wrote out several hundred changes in musical notation of Grandsire Triples. There was considerable interest in the city. Those who had been to England immediately recognised the changes; those who had never heard changes clamoured to know what the jangling was. I was obliged to write a letter to the paper explaining what I had been doing. My letter in turn evoked an inquiry from St. Paul's, Cleveland, Ohio, and I was
happy to send the organist there some scores of changes and the rules for making more. When the regular organist returned he was very much interested in what I had done. He is now carrying on the tradition I have re-established at St. Michael's.' Thus the art of change ringing is being perpetuated in the L'nited States. Peradventure, the next stage, the ringing of the bells, will not be too far distant. The seeds are being sown.

Must ringers would feel that a theolugical college situated in a village with a tower containing six bells should be used as a training ground for parsons of the future w?lo could take an interest in bells and have a knowledge of elementary change ringing. At present this is the policy pursued at Cuddesdon. On the writer's arrival last summer it was found that the bells had not been rung for at least 12 years, as the frames were said to have been condemned, but later this was found to be falsc. A few of the men of the village had rung in the past, but they said they were badly out of practice, also none of the students could handle a bell. However, we collected a band, and, thanks to the gencrous offer of a local tower some three miles away, we were able to get our men practising handling a bell, but it was hard work for one man to instruct six novices, especially when the instructor is still in the 'learner' stage lhiniself. But we persevered and at last we tried our first open rounds-what a din! It was no use giving it up at this stage and so we continued to practise, cycling over to the tower once a week. During one practice we met Mr. Wi.ite, of Appleton, who on hearing of our difficulties promised to come over to Cuddesdon and test the frames, which he duly did, and pronounced them safe to bear the stresses and sirams imposed by the bells while they were being rung.

On December 4th. four months after arriving at Cuddesdon, we had our first ring in the tower, when the bells were heard to speak again after so many years. But there were many obstacles, the bells were hung in old frames, the gudgeons did not rest in hall bearings, and it was a great effort to keep the 14 cwt. tenor moving well; the lighter bells were either odd-struck or too badly hung to

enabie them to be rung with ease, and the ropes were in a very bad condition. Yet thes? difficulties discouraged neither us nor the members of the o!d village band who, led by a very steady tenor man, were glad to he buck in the belfry once again. And from then cnwards there has existed a very happy and successful co-operation between village and college ringers.
Most of the 'change ringing' done was taken from cards hung on a stand in the centre of the ringing cliamber, each man following the number of the bell narked on the card, and in this manner it was possible to ring a plain course of Grandsire Doubles. We were greatly helped by the arrival of a student who had spent some time on the early slages in change ringing, and he was able to give considerable assistance, and attempts wero made at ringing a plain hunting course, cach man following the path of his bell unaided, but with so many learners in the band it was impossible to obtain regular striking, and as a consequence ringers occasionally lost their positions. But we are persisting in this method of learning and it may be hoped that when our ringers, who now compose a band of twenty, arrive as curates in various parishes in town or country, they will with help be able to stand in with the local bands and ring a straightforward method and handle a well with accuracy.
In conclusion, the writer would ike to mention the consistent help and friendliness which he has met with in all ringers, and on his part to say that as our 'ringing parsons' come out into their parishes they lope that they may be at the service of the local hand, as their parson and as a fellow ringer, joining in a service to the Church and a pastime which makes a fellowship shich is hard to better.

The bells at Wordsley were rung before and after the service, and during the evening halfmuffled ringing took place at Brierley Hill, Stourbridge and Wollaston.

\section*{London University Tour Kent}

37 TOWERS VISITED.
Fourteen members of the London Universily Society and three very welcome guests (not only because they had cars) met for the Society's Second Annual Ringing Week, held in Kent in the last week of August. Based on Folkestone, a fully-mechanised unit carried out highly successful ringing operations in 37 towers over a 30 -mile radius of grand country in glorious weather.
The avowed object of the tour-that everyone should accomplish something he had never done before-was not forgotten, and, on the whole, very usefully achieved. People who arrived only in the round-ringing stage were soon trebling to Grandsire and Plain Bab with the best of them: a number of others got 'inside' and kept there; and although London Scholars' Pleasure belied its name to some, most got the measure of it by the end of the tour, and same well-struck touches of Oswald Delight, Original and Carshalton Bob Triples come to mind among the rather formidable collection of new methods previously set for homework by the Master.

Of the four peal attempts, the first (at Folkestone) was not so much lost as strategically abandoned: a rather mired band had not shaken down sufficiently to do justice to this fine but heavy-going eight. The successes -Plain Bob at Cheriton and Kent at Lyddwere perhaps uost notable for the gratifying number of 'firsts.' Bob Royal at Leeds came to grief after two hours-which was a great pity, since one unbiased listener was certain that it was quite the best striking of the whole tour.
More memories than can possibly be recorded here will doubtless enliven many an empty hearth during the coming winter: the detached wooden tower at Brookland, for one, built out of flotsam and jetsam from the seashore, and whose curiously atonic five were nersuaded to render Stedman Doubles in the Findemith Variation. This strange assortment of hardware, by the way, is visible as well as decidedly audible from the ringing floor-a useful purgatory, one might suggest, for nattering conductors. Then there was the very sporting six at Livmpne, rung from the chancel, and the equally tricky tinklers at Burmarsh, rung from a most exiguous vestry; the grand tive
at Eastry, surely one of the heaviest fives in the country; and then the cryptic telegram from London, which arrived too late to warn us off the bells at Wye, the front three of which magnificent eight were rung stayless and regardless.

The Society is most grateful to Mr. Willis, of Folkestone, for very helpful and active interest; to Mr. Peter Small, of Canterbury, for unfailing moral support, and unerring dragomanslip in his home town: to

Skeffington (5), Shawell (5) and Stap'eford (6). The latter are hung for chiming only.

\section*{Norwich Ringers' Outing}

This, for want of a better title, describes a new venture. A motor-coach left St. Peter Mancroft on September 13 th at 7.30 a.m., filled with ringers from Bergh Apton, Lr,ddon, Mul barton. Norwich (St. Giles' and St. Peter Ban croft), and Saxlingham Nethergate; others were picked up on the way from Caston Hingham and Watton. We proceeded rapidly, via Peterborough, to our first stop, Oundle, which was reached about 11.30. Here we enjoyed the use of a fine eight rehung by Taylors in 1934; the ringers of 2 and 3 stand on high boxes to see each other over the clock. Then to St. Mary-the-Virgin's, Tichmarsh, whose fine pinnacled tower contains a grand ring of eight recast by G. and J. in 1913. Then to Thrapston, where wo noted that the Rer. F. E. Robinson called the first peal of Stedman on July 6t.h, 1899.

A coincidence took place here. One of nur members produced a column cut out of "Thn Fwening News of the previous day, in which it was noted that, amongst other old publichouse games, that of 'Ringing the Bell' still survived at the Fox Inn, Thrapston. Naturally we gravitated thither, determined to play the old game. We found the paper had made a misprint, and the game was actually ' Ringing the Bull '-an ordinary bull ring hangs from the ceiling by a string, of such a length that it is just possible to swing the ring on to a hook on the opposite wall. Clouston, who had first produced the paper reference, succeeded in 'Ringing the Bull' at the third swing though nobody else got anywhere near! Lunch being at a 'dry" place, our visit to the Fox was doubly profitable.

Then to Raunds, a magnificent church with a fine ring of eight (tenor 22 cwt .) in a grand Early English tower, under the tower arch of which, inside, is a 15th century clock face. F. F. Robinson called the first peal of Sted man here on July 4th, 1899.
Finedon, another magnificent church, notable for its organ in the western gallery, was our next call. The eight here, of which we made good use, were also rung' by F. F. Robinson for their first peal of Stedman, on February 7th. 1898. We noted on the wall the names of the ringers and steeplekeeper painted in 1686. On to the Wicksteed Park Pavilion, a sort of inland Blackpool, at Kettering, where we had a grand tea. Then at Kettering a touch or so of Grandsire Caters, etc. on a good ten. A fine peal board here records 5,040 Grandsire Triples in 3 hours 18 minutes, on February 28th, 1729.

Our last call was at Peterborough, where the fine recently rehung eight at St. John the Baptist's were made good use of. Finally we arrived home tired, but well content, and determined to run a similar outing next year We are most grateful to the varinus steeplekeepers, to George Jeffs, of Thrapston, who made the local arrangements and accompanied us most of the day, and to Nolan Golden for his most efficient organising.

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\section*{SUSSEX PONDERS}

Some might regard the Sussex County Association's extraordinary general meeting as 'much ado about nothing.' We think not. The position was an interesting one and might well occur in any Association. The committee, in pursuance of their duties in making arrangements for the annual meeting, ruled that no rail fares or tea allowance be paid to ringing members, Sussex apparently is one of the few associations that in the past has been able to make lavish provision for the entertainment of members. Still more, the subscription of the ringing member is in the form of a block affiliation fee of one guinea, paid in most cases by the Church authority. The committee's decision was objected to at the annual meeting, and a resolution was passed that rail fares and tea allowance be paid. This was not so much on the grounds of parsimony but arose from a fear of being dictated to and the curbing of the rights of members.

Nevertheless, the position of the Master and his committee was untenable. They ruled that they were within their rights in deciding, and the matter was outside the jurisdiction of the general body of members. Before convening the special meeting they did the best possible thing in securing legal opinion upon the interpretation of the rules. Mr. F. S. Tomkins, an eminent Chichester solicitor and a former Master, was consulted, and he gave the opinion that the decision of the committee on these two points could not be revoked by the annual meeting.

Some might argue that the controlling body is the members themselves, and it rests with them to approve or veto the proposals of the committee. A Guild committee normally is appointed to carry out certain functions, prepare reports, arrange meetings and to see to the smooth running of the organisation, and the general principle is that in the absence of special executive powers they report to the members for confirmation. In the Sussex affair there were two principles upon which the committee justified their action. In the first place, it was their duty to make arrangements for the annual meeting and, secondly, Rule \(\mathbf{X}\), which reads: 'That thirdclass return railway fare (with or without limit as may be decided for the current year by the committee of the Association) may be paid to resident ringing members at an annual (or special) general meeting of the Association, provided always that this rule shall become inuperative when the amount of the balance of the general
account shall have become less than the sum of \(£ 25\). The meeting on Saturday concluded on a happy note with a resolution being carried that the committee were within their right in making the decision. The rule is not easy of understanding to the lay mind, and a very useful function the committee could perform would be to redraft the rules and the conditions of membership for the next annual general meeting. The present membership fee-a block tower affiliation to embrace all the ringers practising there-is to our way of thinking unsatisfactory. More practical is the individual subscription; membership always means more if it involves a payment by the member direct.

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\section*{SUSSEX ASSOCIATION PROBLEMS}

\section*{SPECLAL MEETING TO DEAL WITH}

\section*{FINANCIAL POSITION}

The Sussex County Association held a specia! general meeting at Brighton on Saturday to sfraighten out their financial position. A Sussex tradition has been to pay part of rail fares and provide a free tea or allowance for those attending the annual meeting. The committee anmounced the discontinuance of the privilege at the last amual meeting on financial grounds. The right to make such a de. cision was challenged at the annual meeting and resolutions were carried that rail fares and tea allowance be paid. The committee fe't this decision keenly, maintaining that the rules permitted them to take such action. The Master and his officers also interpreted the decision at the annual meeting as a lack of confidence.

The Master (Mr. F. I. Hairs) presided, stipported by Mr. S. E. Armstrong (loon, secretary), Mr. O. Sippetts (hon. treasurer) and the divísional secretaries, Mrs. Hairs, Messrs. G. T. Jennings, J. Downing and E. Treagus, Mr. J. Dearlove (peal secretary) and Mr. R. G. Blackman.

The hon. secretary explained that there were three points. At the annual meeting discussion took place on the subject of the Association's income, and it was decided to urge members to pay a voluntary subscription of 2 s , in addition to the tower affiliation fee. Four months had elapsed since the annual meeting, which was attended by 140 members, and the total sum received in voluntary subscriptions was less than \(£ 2\), which he thought was a disgrace.

The second point was the question of a raffle. At the committee meeting in March a lot of time was spent considering this matter. In previous years they had held raffles, and this year it was exceptionally well sunported and cleared about £7. There were objections, but no other way had been found of clearing the cost of the annual meeting.

The third point was the question of rail fares and tea allowance. That was considered by the committee in March, and it was decided to look round and see what economies could be made. It was obvious that the working expenditure and income was not balancing. The greatest cost was the annual meeting, and the item of that which they thought they could justly economise on was the rail fare and tea allowance. It seemed to him that the Association had existed largely during the whole of its life on charity. In the early days there was a large number of honorary members, and when they became tired of dipping into their pockets the Association went bankrupt. For the next few years George Attree paid for the Association out of his own pocket and set it going. They had now \(£ 300\) in hand, some of which was in the Benevolent Fund, but the main part of this sum had not come from the ordinary ringing members.

After the decision of the last annual meeting that the rail fares and tea allowance be paid. he decided in consultation with the Master and the hon. treasurer to get legal opinion. He wrote to Mr. Tomkins. who used to be Master and was a leading solicitor in Chichester. Rule 10 read: "That the amount of third class railway fare (with or without limit as may be decided for the current year by the committee of the Association) may be paid to resident ringing members at an annual (or specia!) general meeting of the Association; providing always that this rule shall become inoperative when the amount of the balance of the general account shall have become less than the sum of \(£ 25\)

Mr. F. S. Tomkins, in his reply, wrote - Under Rule 3 the General Committee are the governing body of the Association. While it - is true that rail fares have been paid in the nast, mv recollection is that this appears in the notice of the annual meeting. which is prepared by order of the General Committee, and this paymont has always been made by
resolution of the committee. The committee has executive powers to set the limit of the amount to be paid. ... I think that the decision of the committee not to pay rail fares or tea allowance could not be revoked by the annual genera! meeting.
It was quite obvious, continued Mr. Armstrong, from the decision of the annual meeting, that the committee did not hold the confidence of the general meeting, and fliat meeting lad been called to find a way out of that dificulty.

Mr. Stalham: The main point was that it should be put to the meeting and not dictated to by the committee.

Mr. R. Blacknan maintained that the onus was on the committee to keep the Association in a good position. They realised that it was necessary for them to show a slightly increased balance rather than a deficit at the end of the year. On finance there was always two sidesjudicious spending or judicious saving. He thought if the money was available it was far better to spend it carefully than not to spend it. As to the powers of the committee, he had always he?d that the primary object of the committes was to act in an advisory capacity. Very seldom had a committee the right to legislate.

Mr. Armstrong: It is set out clearly in the rules that the committee is the governing body of the Association.

Mr. H. Sta!ham submitted that the activities of the committee were subject to the confirmation of the anmual meeting.

Mr. Armstrong replied that the committee had gone to a lot of trouble and taken legal advice.

Mr. Downing explained that all the committee were concerned with was the making of arrangements for the annual meeting. It was open to members to decide what appeared on the ageuda.

Mrs. Hairs contended that in these days it was not a hardship on any member to pay his own rail fare and fea.
Mr. S. White felt it was most necessary that rail fares be paid for youngsters.

In rep!y to a question. Mr. O. Sippetts said that at the meeting before the cost of rail fares was \(£ 52 \mathrm{~s}\)., and at the last annual meeting it was 9s.

The Chairman : The point at issue is whether the committee is the governing body or not.

Mr. Levitt: You elect a committee to serve vour interest. They spend a lot of time on it. They are in sole possession of all the facts concerning the financial position, and it was their decision that rail fares and tea allowances be not paid. You have in the past accepted their decision.

After further discussion Mr. W. C. Hart proposed a vote of confidence in the officers, and Mr. Russell. in seconding, said he thought their officers did a good job of work and they ought to support them much better than they did (applause).
The Chairman: There is only one way to show that confidence, by withdrawing the resolution at the last annual meeting.

Mr. W. C. Hart then proposed that the resolution be rescinded.

An amendment, moved by Mr. Stoner and secgnded by Mr. A. F. Lewry, that in the opinion of the meeting the committee were within their rights in making a decision on rail fares and tea allowance, was carried by a substantial majority.

A discussion then followed on improving the finances of the Association in view of the expenses of printing the annual report. It was the general opinion that each tower should par for its copies of the report.

Mr. Downing suggested that the rules be amended at the annual meeting to place the subscription on a proper basis.

Mr. Armstrong pointed out that if each member paid a subscription of \(2 \mathrm{~s} .\), the Association would be solvent.

\section*{LETTERS TO THE EDITOR}

IN DEFENCE OF DEVON
Dear Sir,-In your issue \(\xlongequal{ }\) September 12 th. the leading article, under the headine 'Propaganda Needed,' recounted the impressions formed, and some of the opinions arrived at, by a ringer from Lancashire during a holiday spent in what he called the 'round and callchanges counties '-presumably Devon and Cornwall. The article ended with an appeal for a missionary effort on the part of halfpull ringers to convert the call-changers from the error of their ways.

Devon and Cornwall are very popular holiday centres, and despite the pre-war activities of the jerry-builder and the post-war attentions of the War Office, their appeal is not likely to diminish. Visiting ringers are always welcome, whether in method or call-clange towers. and whilst most half-pull visitors are wise enough when in Rome to do as the Romans do, a minority of well-meaning but over-zcalous individuals adopt a superior and somewhat palronising altitude. Their hosis are, of course, polite, but after the departure of their guests their comments tend to be in a slightly different vein. This letter is an attempt to describe the conditions obtaining in Devonthe writer cannot claim to have more than a superficial acquaintance with Cornwall - in order that future visitors may be spared the rude slocks and avoid the more obvious pitfalls which have apparently been experienced by at least one 'foreigner' this summer.
There are approximately 375 rings of five bells and over in Devon, whilst the Gui!d of Devonshire Ringers has abcut 55 towers in union. Not all of the latter, however, practise method ringing, but the Guild does make a valiant and by no means unsuccessful attempt to keep the flag flying, and its numerical strength is increasing. Although the fumber of methods rung may not be large, the average standard of striking does not compare unfavourably with that obtaining in other
parts of the country. But in the majority of parts of the country. But in the majority of
Devon towers call changes are the rule, and there exists the Devon Association of Ringers, under whose xgis over 300 towers are somewhat loosely organised, and whose avowed object is to promote the cause of call-change ringing. This it does by organising competititions, at which prizes, in the form of shields and certificates, are awarded. The Guild has approached the Association with a view to amalgamation, but negotiations. through no fault of the Guild, have, it is hoped temporarily, fallen through.
The quality of the striking, as well as of the rising and falling in peai, in most callchange towers is very high indeed. Whi'st al!
are naturally not on the same level, it is rot are naturally not on the same level, it is not
ton much to say that the striking which is tolerated in rery many half-pull towers Sunday after sunday would horrify a Devon ca!! change ringer. It is this poor striking, heard perlaps at meetings or on the wireless, which cuuses the Deronian to regard method ringin: not so much with indifference as with open hostility and contempt. Ffforts to improve the striking of call-change ringer: by selling fhem "The Ringing World.: as suggested in vour article, would not, it is feared, meet with any startling success.

Let it not be thought that this superiority of eall-change striking is due to the fact that it is easier than method ringing. The writer can claim to have a good acquaintance with hoth, and to know what he is talking about. First-class call changes require intense concentration, and any man who attempts to tale part in them without putting his whole mind to the task is making a great mistake. The reason for the high standard of striking in Devon is to be found in the fact that callrlange ringers are trained from the ery keginning to listen with both ears every man co his own bell. The slightest infringement is insiantly corrected by the leader of the band. Competitions, both the local affairs run
by individual towers, and those officially sponsored by the Association, afford bands frequent opportunities of comparing their 0 W 11 striking with that of their neighbours, and it is this factor, perhaps more than any other, which tends to keep up the general level of striling.
Call-change ringers are not often stylists in handling their ropes, the open lead at handstroke is unknown, and the bells are rung at a much lower swing than in 'Scientific,' as method ringing is known in Devon. If the visiting ringer will bear these facts in mind, and try to strike his bell as best he can, he may well earn the high praise which was ince bestowed upon an eminent member of the Oxford Diocesan Guild in the writer's home tower, 'Well, young man, you didn't ring that tenor too bad. Onow word of advice to visiting bands. Do not expert that call-clian ese ringers will like to hear the femor turned in: that is something which they camot appreriato and it is therefore, much better to sticls to odd-bell methods. If you can produce some really first-class striking do not, however, fear that your efforts will not be appreciated. The peals rung by visiting bands of whom Canon Coleridge is now the only survivor-in the 80's and 90's are still remembered in Norlh Devon and Cornwall, and the proudest moment of the writer's ringing career. was at the end of a peal of Grandsire Triples in his heme tower by a mixed hand of Devonians and visitors. when the local call-change ringers were warm. in their praises. The only note of criticism came from their captain. ' Don't tell me, said he, "that all Scientific is like that. I'll warrant you had to scour the country to get that band.' He was not, alas; very wide of the mark.
It is the considered opinion of the writer that it would be a thousand pities if call-change ringing were to die out in the West. It is a survival of the days of the three-quarter wheel when stays were unknown: it is capable of creating as much enthusiasm among its performers and of giving as much delight to its hearers as method ringing: and since it is, generally speaking, more strenuous than the latter. it raises a thirst in a much slorter tîne.- Yours faithfully,

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\section*{THE MIDDLESEX}

This week in the ringers' calendar the place of honour is occupied by the Middlesex Association, with the celebration of the 50th anniversary of its foundation. The most significant part of the title of this Association is the tailpiece added in 1903-' the London Diocesan Guild 'and this at times is apt to be overlooked. The Bishop of London, the Association's patron, spent Saturday afternoon with his ringers and gave to the proceedings the spiritual atmosphere of 'diocesan' rather than the territorial or secular side of a county Association.

Mr. Ernest C. S. Turner, the Association's Secretary, during the festivities gave an historical sketch of the birth and growth of the Association during the past 50 years, recalling to mind the names of those who by their labours and enthusiasm had developed its work and added to its prestige. He was not speaking about unknown personalities, as no fewer than eight of the nine surviving foundation members were present. That nine out of 338 should still retain membership after 50 years is an added evidence of longevity associated with ringing. The Middlesex ' Die Hards' extend beyond the narrow confines of its famous regiment.

In his speech Mr. Turner regarded Mr. Wm. Pye as 'perhaps the most outstanding practical ringer of this century.' He was elected a member in 1899 and was Master from 1910 until his death in 1935. A prolific peal ringer, his enormous total included 15,264 Bristol Surprise Major at Hornchurch, 7,392 Cambridge Surprise Maximus at St. Mary-le-Bow, and first peals of London and Bristol Major on handbells. Altogether he rang 1,114 peals for the Guild, of which he conducted 859. As a memorial to him, the bells of St. John's, Leytonstone, were augmented from six to eight through the combined efforts of the Middlesex and Essex Associations.

There were other names mentioned by Mr. Turner with affection: Mr. C. T. Coles; Mr. A. T. King, who had the vision of the London Diocesan Guild; Mr. F. A. Milne, first hon. treasurer and one-time president ; and his special friend, Mr. J. Armiger Trollope, of whom the Association's secretary wrote a special memoir in 'The Ringing World' recently. To the Middlesex Association we would quote from Proverbs, 'Iron sharpeneth iron, so a man sharpeneth the countenance of his friend.' The present leaders of this Association have been sharpened by great men in different spheres of ringing, and by maintaining the best of these legacies an illustrious future is assured.

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\section*{JUBILEE OF THE MIDDLESEX ASSOCIATION}

\section*{Bishop of London and Religious Intention in Ringing...... Nine Foundation Members Honoured at Festival Dinner...... Historical Sketch by Association Secretary}

IN the historic Church of St. Giles-in-theFields, members of the Midd!esex County Association and London Diocesan Guild met on Saturday in honour of their jubilee, to remember those who during the past 50 years had given service to the Association and to pray for blessing on future activities.

Patron of the Association is the Bishop of London (Dr. J. W. Wand), and he attended to preach the sermon. He based his address on St Luke's life as evangelist, physician and artist, and it was, said the Bishop, on the art side that St. Luke touched them. Bellringing might be a different kind of art to that of a painter, but it was in its effect a very graclous art. It was in some respects the most typical English artchange ringing was a typically English pursuit, and the sound of changes being rung was part of the typical sounds of the countryside. He recalled the hearing of the bells across the Lincolnshire woids and at Oxford, where on most evenings bells were rung from tower or steeple, sounds which one loved. In Australia one of the things he missed most was the bells. In his diocese of Queensland there was on!y one ring of bells, at Maryborough, where was possible to keep up the art of ringing.
In ringing they had an art and skill which had contributed to religious endeavour. Not always on the part of ringers was there a good religious intention belind their ringing, but, they should remember that with a reilgious intention the beauty of their art was enhanced a hundredfold. If religious intention was there then there was strength, beauty, truth and goodness. It was that beauty that it was their privilege to preserve, and in preserving that they were adding something to the totality of their life. Remember-

A thing of beauty, is a joy for ever;
Its loveliness increases; it will never
Its loveliness increase
Pass into mothingness.

Proposing the toast of 'Church and State. Mr. J. E. Lewis Cockey said the Church to-day was subject to great criticism, mainly from those who did not attend, who emphasised

ailures and ignored good points. The frequent criticism heard was.' I am not good enough and they who go are not as good as they ought to be.' The Bishop of London said recently at a gathering he attended, 'The Church is a school for sinners and not a synod for saints.' It was a helpful thought.

The Rev. Percival Gough, Vicar of Acton, in reply said he looked forward to the time when spiritual things in the Church would be free from secular control, and that eventually after an interval the Church would come back to the State and exercise that proper influence.
The toast of "The Middleser Courty Association and London Diocesan Guild ' was proposed by the Rev. J. D. Richards (St. Botolph's). who said it was a great thing to have reached 50 years. Their association was started by keen churchmen, so it was right and proper that they should have a fair sprinkling of clergy present.

\section*{CHARACTERISTICS OF RINGING}

There were certain characteristics abont people who were enthusiastic about bellringing. One was a tremendous sense of brotherhood and good fellowship. Bellringers could alwars walk into another tower and be immediately welcomed and made one of the family. Another characteristic was their tremendous enthusiasm and sense of duty. It was like a disease - a kind of 'bug' that was caught by association with ringers. John Bunvan had it and his writings tell how he tried to resist it.

That afternoon he had a very great privilege of unveiling a memorial in the form of chiming apparatus at St. Boto'ph's Church to an old friend of theirs, Jim Davis. He was a man who made St. Botolph's a great ringing centre. In 193331 peals were rung in that church and many ringers rang their first peal with him. In association with him were men who made the Middlesex-William Pre, C. T. Coles and J. A. Tro!lope.

Concluding. Mr. Richards said the verr activity of bellringing was of worship and giving glory to God and proclaiming the gospel. Their ringing should always be a g'orification
of God and they should never forget that theirs was one of the oldest methods of pru paganda of the Church.

Mr. E. C. S. Turner, the association's secretary, in reply, said before 1897 there were two relatively small associations operating in Middlesex. The first was the Middlesex Assuciation. established in 1889. Bands affiliated to this association were Barnet, Edmonton, Fdgware, Finchley, Gospel Oak, Hadley, Hampstead (St. Stephen's), Hendon, Southgate, Stoke Newington, South Mimms and Tottenham. The second was the South and West Middlesex Guild, established in 1894, to which the bands at Acton, Ealing (St. Mary's and Christ Church), Staines, Hillingdon (St John's and St. Andrew's), Harnondsworth. Heston and Isleworth were affiliated.
These two societies did not remain independent for very long; in 1896 the committee of the Middlesex Association approached the other committee with a view to uniting henth organisations as districts of a Middleser County Association. Behind these negotiations was Mr A. T. King, the secretary of the Middlesex Association. His ambition was to form a Guild embracing all change ringers in the London Diocese. The first step was the amalgamation of the two independent Middlesex societies. It required the greatest diplomacy to overcome the objections, mostly based on misconceptions. On Whit Monday, 1897, these two associations were welded into one, a condition being that the two district secretaries should hold the office of secretary of the new association jointly and that each district retained a percentage of members' subscriptions for its own use When the first report was issued the member ship numbered 338 , with 23 affiliated towers: to-dav it was 846 with 48 affliated towers.

In 1903 with the apnroval of the Bishop of London the words London Diocesan Guild were added to the title. Again objections had to he overcome. Some little feeling, which, however was destined to be but of a transient nature, was expressed on the part of some of the older London ringing societies to the effect that the Midd'esex had ignored their existence. Needless to say, they were never actuated by any such feelings. Membership of their association was. and they hoped alwars would be, compatible with membership of the older societies to one or other of which very many of their members deemed it an honour to belong. This recognition by the Bishop of London as the Guild for his diocese had undoubtedly a great and lasting effect upon the history of the association. and only a man with an infinite a mount of tact and good judgment such as Mr . King had could have overcome the difficulties of the first few years.
Outstanding personalities of the Middlesex Association recalled by Mr. Turner were Mr. F. A. Milne, hon. treasurer from 1897-1920 Mr. W. Pye, Master from 1910-1935: Mr. C. T Co'es. secretary from 1910-1945; Mr. W. H Hollier, secretary of the 'South and West District and founder of the Peal Boards Committee of the Central Council: Mr. J. A Trollope, vice-president from 1930-1946, historian and editor of 'The Ringing World.' A"? these men offered them a challenge to follow their example. He hoped at their centenary a further record of service comparable with that they were remembering to-day would be recalled.

Prevented br illness from being with them that day was the Rev. E. R. Monre. Rector of St. Giles-in-the-Fields, Mr. W. Gr. Wilson, who was at present in Clare Hall Sanatorium and would be pleased to hear from his old friends. and Mr. J. Herbert. of Twickenham. He was sure they would like him to write to each of (Continued on page 512.)

\section*{LONDON SURPRISE MAJOR RECORD}
-THE STORY OF A GREAT ACHIEVEMENT.
On Saturday, October 4th, 1947, the record length of 14,112 changes of London Surpise Major rung at King's Norton, Birminglam, on May 11th, 1903 , and conducted by Wiisam Pye, was surpassed when eight resident members of the Lincoln Diocesan Guild rang 14, 144 changes in the method in 8 hours and 25 minutes. Seven were from Lincoln Cathedral band and the treble ringer came from Sedgbrook.

At various times in recent years members of the Guild had expressed the opinion that since the longest composition of London Surprise Major had been produced by the Rev. H. Law James, sometime Master of the Lincoln Diocesan Guild, it would be fitting if his peal could be rung by a Lincolnshire band. Nothing definite materiaiised until John Freeman decidod that 1947 was the year for the attemp:.

An ideal place for long peal ringing is Heydour, situated 'twixt Grantham and sleaford. In late 1945 the old ring of five were augmented to eight and rehung on ball bearings. Coup'ed with this is the fact that there are only four houses in Heydour and two of these are an appreciable distance from the church. The Vicar, the Rev. C. N. Hodge, was interviewed and he readily gave his consent.

During the three months prior to August Bank Holiday much time was devoted to ringing London. Several ordinary peals were rung, and on July 5 th the chosen band met at Heydour and rang 5,824 changes with the tenors parted for the greater part of the peal by way of rehearsal. A similar peal was rung at Waslingborougn on July 231 d . During this period several visits were made to Heydour, when worn ropes were replaced, others adjusted and a curtain fitted over the be'fry window as a protection against the glare of the sun.
To all ringers, sooner or later, there comes a day when, while they do not make serious mistakes, they are not at their best. Such a day for the Lincolnshire band was August -none had attempted a long peal before-but whatever it was, the ringing did not run smoothly and during the second 'schemozzle
of the day the conductor called 'Stand.' The attempt had lasted 6 hours and 36 minutes, and umpire Harry Withers reported that up to that point the course ends had turned up according to schedule, but in the opinion of the band and of those listening, the ringing was not good enough for a record attempt. Several weeks elapsed, blistercd hands
healed and all were ready for the fray again. healed. and all were ready for the fray again.
If August Bank Holiday had-been a bad day, October 4 th was a good day, for everyone was at ease and master of his job. The bells went into changes at \(9.30 \mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m}\)., and at 5.55 p.m the last hob at home brought the be!ls mund, without any serious hitch occurring throughout the day. Mr. Harry Withers again represented the St. Martin's Guild for the Diocese of Birmingham and acted as umpire. The listeners volunteered to lower the bells, while the band put in some steady demolition work among various parcels of food provided by certain good ladies well conversant with the requirements of their menfolk after ringing peals.

The bells lowered, the food eaten, the trehle ringer returned to Sedgbrook, while the Lincoln contingent returned to Lincoln, where they were kindly entertained to supper by Mr. and Mrs. J. Walden. Followed some conversation, and then the party went to their various homes and so to what soemed a veritable heaven on earth, bed!

5th. John A. FREEMAN. - Age 62 rung 178, conducted 98. Master of the Lincoln Diocesan Guild and one of the Guild representatives on the Central Council. He is an excellent conductor on all numbers of be!ls. He called the peal of Spliced Surprise Major in 16 methods and the first peals for the Lincoln Guild of Stedman and Grandsire Cinques. London Surprise Major, Spliced Surprise Major in 4,6 and 10 methods, as well as a number of firsts for the Guild by resident bands. He took part in the first peal of Cambridge Maximus for the Guild, a peal of Superlative Royalthe first for 100 years-and has called peals of Cambridge from Minor to Maximus. The high standard of method ringing in Lincoln and district is entirely due to his untiring energy and leadership during the past 30 years.

The subject of this sketch entered the field of ringing on a high plane, for at 16 he rang and conducted his first peal, one of Stedman Cinques. He lias called most of his peals from working bells, including London Surprise Major, at the age of 17 and, more recently, a peal of Stedman Cinques in short courses throughout-only the second ever rung. \section*{MR. T. L. SPARROW}

The death occurred at Stowmarket on Oct. 5 th of Thamas Langford Sparrow, aged 62. He had been ill for about eight months, bearing a very painful complaint with great patience and fortitude. He leaves a widow.

Except for a break in the 1930's, when he lived at Dagenham and rang with the Dagenham and Hornchurch companies, Tom Sparnow had been associated with the Stowmarket band for over 40 years. With his brothers Shelford and Walter, he learnt to ring at Great Fin. borough, where their boyhood was spent, and it was always a delight to see them displaying their skill, acquired at an early age, on handbells. 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\section*{LEICESTER}

A triumph of organisation was the Leicester Diocesan Guild festival. The event attracted a most representative gathering from all parts of the country and also from Ireland, and for entertainment, both as regards ringing and hospitality, nothing was left undone on the part of those who planned the occasion.

And for the secret. Leicester Guild owes its success to a perfect understanding with the clergy from the Bishop downwards. Immediately this confidence is achieved a Guild will make progress. Ringing as work of the Church was the theme of the address by the Bishop of Leicester; when this is recognised a hallowed responsibility will be behind the changes. On both sidesclergy and ringers-there are individuals who classify ringing as purely an exercise or art and nothing more. When the spiritual dedication of ringing is recognised then our Guilds will flourish.
Is this compatible with peal ringing? Perhaps the best answer to this came from the Bishop of Leicester. When does ringing cease to become a clash and a clang and become perfect harmuny? Every change ringer knows that perfection will only be reached by the thoroughness acquired through peal ringing. The Bishop and other speakers expressed their congratulations to Mr. Ernest Morris on having rung one thousand peals. The recognition of the peal as a standard is pleasing, and while in the distant past such a performance had its roots in the secular side of ringing and still is largely associated with pleasure, yet the training has an ultimate spiritual objective in the service of the Church.

Now the message of Leicester is clear and emphatic. With the recognition of ringing in the service of God there is an accompanying corollary. That recognition must extend beyond the mere act of ringing: there must be that personal relationship between the ringer and his Maker. The familiar words of P'salm 150, 'P'raise Him on the loud cymbals; Praise Him on the well-tuned cymbals,' so often sung or read at ringers' gatherings, are shallow and hypocritical if the recognition of His service is absent in the act of ringing.

The Leicester festival of ringers was a prelude to a big diocesan festival in commemoration of the 21st anniversary of the founding of the See of Leicester in its present form. The anniversary is not to pass by informally as the ticking off of another year on the calendar, but to be commemorated by an act of personal rededication by
all churchworkers. And let it be known tar and wide: Leicester ringers are counted among the churchworkers and individually will be associated with this great spiritual act.

\section*{LEICESTER DIOCESAN GUILD'S FESTIVAL}

\section*{Record Gathering of Representative Ringers ...... Bishop's Tribute to His Ringers...... Company of 1,200 at Festival Dance}

Prubably the largest gathering of ringers since the end of the war was the Leicester Diocesan Festival, held at Leicester last Saturday. The representative character of the gathering was a tribute to the popularity of the Guild's president (Mr. Harold J. Poole) and his officers.

A programme to delight a ringer's heart had been arranged. In the morning a number of peals were planned the afternoon was devoted to ringing in Leicester's well-known towers and a service in the Cathedral, at which the Rishop gave an inspiring address. The festival dinner was followed by a dance in the city's largest hall. For non-dancing handbell ringers a room was set apart for their enjoyment.

\section*{THE SERVICE}

A congregation approaching 400 attended the service in the Cathedral Church. The Provost (the Very lev. H. A. Jones) conducted the service, and the address was given by the Bishop of Leicester (tho Right Rev. G. Vernon South).

The bells are like the heralds; they proclaim great events, said the Bishop. That week they would be rung to proclaim the 21st anuiversary of the restoration of the ancient diocese of Leicester. Bells were so fully Christian; they had never been commercialised. The great crash and clash of the bells was brought into perfect harmony and obedience by the still small voice which called the elanges. They had a simile in the confusion in the world to-day. If only the nations would say, 'Christ is King,' and bring Him into everyday affairs, life would be so different from the discontent prevailing to-day.

\section*{THE DINNER.}

There was a company of 270 at the dinner held at the Bell Inn. The Bishop presided, supported by the president (Mr. Harold J Poole), the Provost (the Very Rev H. A. Jones), the Lord Mayor and Lady Mayoress
and Mr. Firnest Morris. Representative guests present included Mr. A. B. Peck (Ancient Suciety of College Youths). Mr. J. T. Dyke (Bath and Wells Diocesan Association) Miss F. After the toast of "The King,' the Provost submitted the health of the City of Leicester. recalling that for 700 vears the church which was now the Cathedra! had been closely asso-

ciated with the city. He always thought of the city as combining the attractions of a very long tradition with the efficiency of a mudern outlook.
The Lord Mayor (Ald. W. H. Sinith), in his reply. recalled his first association with ringing when as a boy he rang the bell at a mission church at Narbarough.
The toast of 'The Diocese' was submitted by the Chief Constable of Leicester (Mr Oswald J. B. Cole), who traced the development of the diacese from 713 A.D., and when it once extended from the Trent to the Thames. To-day, he said, there was a tendency towards materialism instead of looking towards the things spiritual. There was a great need for the rededication which was being associated with the 21st anniversary celebration, and he belfeved that bellingers were looked on as some of the most earnest churchworkers to be found in the diocese.

\section*{A LONDON SURPRISE.}

In his reply, the Bishop of Leicester said he was a suffragan bishop of London before he came to Leicester, and his arrival at Leicester was 'a London Surprise' (laughter). Calling attention to the forthooming visit of the Archbishop of Canterbury for the start of the anniversary celebrations, the Bishop mentioned that the Primate was born in a Leicestershire parsonage and received his early education in a Leicestershire school.
As a diocese they were proud to have \(\mathbf{M r}\). Harold Poole, their president. as a lay canon and to congratulate Mr. Ernest Morris upon ringing his 1,000 th peal.
What really was the diocese? He would describe it as a household of faith-a collection of men and women who had faith in God and faith in Christ the eternal Son of God. Secondly, the diocese was the Christian home of all sorts and conditions of men. When they drank the health of the diocese he asked them to say. "Hold on to the faith and be strong, and may its love, beauty and strength put heart into people who are losing heart, and put courage into a world that is in need of hope.

The health of " The Leicester Diocesan Guild was submitted by Mr. G. W. Hunt, who said that in Mr. Harold Poole they had a Christian
gentleman, and they were all delighted when it pleased the Bisliop of Leicester to confer on him the rank of lay canon not only for his serviees to the Chureh. but to his profession. Never was a belter officer in the courts or one who would try to help mankind than the president. The Guild also had that wonderful ringer in Mr. Lirnest Morris, who along with 15 others had completed 1,000 peals and had written a classic on bellringing.

Mr. Hunt also mentioned three of the young ringers of the Gui'd who had rung a peal of Cambridge Surprise Maximus - Mavis Whitehead, aged 13, Alan Cattell (16) and Kathleen Tilley (18). Last and not least he would mention Jill Poole, who had been secrelary for their ringing festival and whose ringing performances were known not only in the diocesc, but wherever ringing took place in the British Isles.

\section*{THE HUMBLI: MFSSAGE:}

You can't all be Surprise ringers, and those who rang in country towers with five or six bells ringing standard methods should not he discouraged; their message was just as oincere as the great peal from a cathedral tower.' He hoped the bells they rang with such enthusiasm would bring the message of God to men and that they would try to build a new foundation of peace for all times.

Mr. Harold J. Poole, who was coupled with the toast, in reply. said they had been told the Diocese of Leicester was celebrating in the very near future its coming-of-age, and those responsible for the activities of the diocese and its spiritual welfare were looking back on the first 21 years with a certain amount of gratification and satisfaction. While they could not put the clock back, it was just as well to reflect from a ringing standpoint where they were. Twenty-one years ago there was no Leicester Diocesan Guild; they were then part and parcel of the Midland Counties Association. Twentyone years ago Fred Dexter was in fulf blast in Leicester. and those who knew Fred Dexter would appreciate that remark, and appieciate what he did for ringing.

The success of any ringing gui'd or assoriation depended on co-operation with the Church authorities, and they in the Leicester Diocesan Guild were very fortunate in tlat matter. Without the co-operation of the incumbents they would be helpless. They provided them with the bells and they were very happy and getting a great encouragement from those respunsible for the government of the diocese.

Mr. Poole also spoke of the pleasure it gave him to see so many of his friends from olher associations as guests that day. It did show what appeal the Leicester Diocesan Guild made to the Frarcice

The Bishop of Leicester gave the toast of 'The Visitors' and had a special word of welcome to Mr. George Williams of the Win-

Mr. C. Harrison, in presenting the toast of 'The Ringing World, expressed apprnciation of the work of the Editorial Committee in placing the journal in a sound financial position.

\section*{WAKEFIELD CATHEDRAL BELLS DEDICATED}

The great scheme of recasting and rehanging the bells of Wakefield Cathedral was carried out througln the generosity of the Mayor of Wakefield's 'Cathedral Bells' Find and the Cathedral congregation. The dedication ceremony was performed on October 18th by the Bishop of Wakefield (the Right Rev. Henry McGowan D.D.).

It was early in 1936 that the bells were condemned as being unsafe, owing to the serious oscillation of the massive wooden frame. At that time the Cathedral authorities were faced with tremendous financial commitments. The ravages of the deathwatch beelle threatened the fabric and the necessary restoration work cost some \(£ 6,000\). In addition the old Chantry Chapel on Wakefield Bridge was being lestored, and il was, therefore, decided to defer the restoration of the bells. Nevertheless, a sum of \(£ 800\) was collected; last vear the Provost (the Vely Rev. Noel T. Hopkins) decided that the time liad come to launch the restoration appeal.

The then Mayor of Wakefield (Celr. Mrs. Crow) readily consented to issue such an appeal for \(£ 4,0 \mathrm{MO}\). Deep satisfaction was at once felt When the Provost made an offer of \(£ 1,000\) as the Cathedral congregation's contribution. The appeal net with an overwhelming response and in the matter of weeks the fund had been oversubscribed.

The work of recasting and rehanging was carried out by Messrs. John Taylor and Co., nind they have given the Cathedral a truly magnificent ring worthy of the grand old building, which for many years has been the centre of religious life in the city.

The impressive service attracted murh attention. The Mayor and Corporation the M.P. for the City and many civic leaders were present. About 140 ringers from as far afie! d as London were admitted into the Cathedra? which was packed to capacity br Friends of the Cathedral. Outsile some thousands of people were gathered in the streets wailing in hear the bells. Traffie had to be diverted from the centre of the city.
The service opened with the singing of Psalm 150. and the lesson was read by the Bishop of Pontefract. This wa- followed hy the hymn, "Praise to the Lord, the Almighty: After prayers the familiar ringers' anthem, 'When morning gilds the skies,' was sung as a procession, which included the Bishop and the Mayor (Celr. Harry Wुatson), went to the tower.

PAST HISTORY.
The first reference to Wakefie:d Cathedral bells was made in 1552, when, according to a surver there were five great be'ls. In 16.39 the bells were rehung. In 1704 three new bells were obtained, and in 1739 all the bells were hung in a new frame by James Harrison, of Barrow-in-Lincolnshire.

WRINGTON, SOMFREET. Oet. 18th. Intimate friends of the late Major Hesse have assembled in the ringing room of the belfry here to-day for the dedication of a plaque erected to his memory. It is inscribed as follows :-
To the memory of John Harley Bridges Hesse, a lover of bells and ringers, who died at Wrington on 18th Ortober, 1946, aged 74 years. He was devoled to this tower, and its bells were his constant care. It was largely through his inspiration that in 1911 the old six bells were increased to the present peal of ten.

\section*{MR. T. W. GILMOUR.}

The Lancashire Association, particularly the Liverpool Branch, has sustained a great loss by the death of one of its oldest members, Mr. Thomas W. Gilmour. Mr. Gilmour died on October 11 th and was buried at Sefton on Wednesday. October 15th. The bells of Sefton were rung by some of his old ringing friends. An impressive service was held at St. Peter's, Aintree, which was the parish in which Mr. Gilmour and his family resided. The Vicar (the Rev. W. K. R. Strickland) gave an appropriate address.
Tommy Gilmour, as he was affectionately known became a member of the Lancashire Association upwards of 50 years ago, and in his early days was taught by the late Mr . Charles E. Wilson at the Church of St. Mary, Walton-on-the-Hill, where one of the finest sixhell companies in the country was then to be found. Mr. Golmour was one of this hand until 1919, when he became a member of the St. Nicholas' conpany and rendered valued service there for many years. ITe was an excellent ringer and striker on all numbers of bells.
'The desfruction of St. Vicholas' Church with the taking away of the bells from that tower was a great grief to him. Another sorrow wam the loss through fire of the peal boards and records that were in the tower of St. Mary, Walton-on-the-Hill. Among these records were the ringing of 720 's in the 41 Surprise Minor methods and the silent peal in seven Surprise Minor methods. Mr. Gilmour had rung many peals, but latterly he was more fond of short touches and an occasional quarter-peal.

\section*{MR. FREDI:RICK C. LAMBERT}

The Suffolk Guild lhas lost an old and very valued member by the sudden death of Mr. Frederick Charles Lambert on October 20th at the age of 78
A ringer from the age of 10 , he had been district secretary of the Halesworth Branch since the Guild's formation, and his work as instructor and conductor and local ringing organiser will be sadly missed.

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\section*{TWO CATHEDRALS}

In two successive weeks the bells of two English Cathedrals, after being recast, have been dedicated. At Wakefield a ring of 12 with a supplementary bell to permit of a light eight being rung has been provided, and at Lichfield ten bells. That two of our Cathedrals should have been so enriched within the space of eight days is unprecedented in the history of ringing.

Both rings of bells have for many years required attention. Wakefield's bells have been silent since 1936, the frames having been condemned because of the oscillation. But even before that date the bells had not given satisfaction, as the trebles which were added in 1892 for calibre and tone failed to blend with the other ten. In consequence Wakefield has nor the reputation of being a ringing centre. Ringers from Ossett helped substantially at the dedication festival, although the event created widespread interest. Wakefield have before them the task of training a new company, and we feel sure that the helping hand will be forthcoming from Yorkshire towers within easy reach, so that this skilled oxample of the founder's art will be truly used to the glory of God and for His service.

The story of Lichfield is in some respects similar. Here a Cathedral with beauties in architecture that, on first viewing, almost takes one's breath away with its magnificence, had as poor a specimen of English bells as one could find. Noisy and jarring to the nerves of those living in the vicinity, they had none of the mellowness that might be expected from a cathedral of such antiquity. Very little appears to have been done to these bells since the days of Waterloo, although endeavours had been made, without success, to tune the trebles. The gift of the recast bells from the Freemasons of Staffordshire is munificent and timely. There is a dignity about the new tenors that is pleasing to the ear, and the Exercise hopes to have the pleasure of recording the first peal on these bells on the occasion of the wedding of Princess Elizabeth. While Lichfield will have to train more ringers, they have the nucleus of a young band in the Beresford family, and if other young people can capture their enthusiasm, then Mr. G. E. Oliver and Mr. A. F. Sedgwick will have a company to be proud of, and there will be an added glory to the Cathedral of St. Chad of bells well and truly struck.

A question for research experts. When was the last peal of Tiverton Little Bob rung ? Mr.J. Swindley, now 75 , found no difficulty in learning this method and rang it faultlessly at Buckley, Flintshire.

William M. Stepney, who rang his first peal at Warbleton at the age of 12 years 8 monfhs, is believed to be the youngest ringer in Sussex to ring a peal. Mr. W. A. Kitchenside has now thrice 'circled' this tower.

What is the record for father and son peals? The Groombridges, of Nottingham, have rung 236 together.

A regretted omission from our report of the Leicester Guild Festival concerns the Coventry Diocesan Guild. Mrs. D. E. Beamish, the Guild secretary, and three other members attended to bring their good wishes and congratulations to their neighbours.

In the Worcester Variation of Spliced Ken \({ }^{4}\) and Oxford Treble Bob Major, rung at Ipswich on October 18th there are no bobs. It produced some excellent music on this grand old back eight, reports Mr. Oliver G. Barnard, the conductor. The company met short for Royal.

Peals of Cambridge from Minor to Maximus have now been scored by Messrs. W. F. Judge, F. A. H. Wilkins, N. I. Allnatt and Alan R. Pink. The last lap for these worthies was at Middleton Cheney, Northamptonshire, on Oct. 18th.

Mr. R. J. Brocklehurst, of Sneyd Park, Bristol 9, who has family connections with Charleston, South Carolina has received a letter from Mr. George Williams concerning interest in change ringing. He states that the bells of St. Michael's Church, Charleston, are rung by an electrical device from a special keyboard near the organ console, the organist thus being able to chime the bells and then start his opening voluntary.

\section*{BELFRY GOSSIP}

To hand is a copy of - The Scout,' telling of the unsuccessful attempt to ring a peal by eight Scouts at St. Nicolas' Godstone, last September. For the attempt Scouts came from Guiseley, Yorks (3), Aylesbury, Edmonton, Farnborough, Leatherhead and Worthing, the conductor being Eric Dench

Comments B.D.P. in telling the story: 'Change ringing has a brotherhood that is akin to Scouting. If you can ring, you can walk into almost any belfry, introduce yourself and make friends immediately. And, like Scouting, it isn't easy. It needs stickability and a helping hand from others, and the experienced ringer in his turn helps those who are beginning.

Holy Trinity bellringers, Hobart, Australia are attempting a peal on November 20th for Princess Elizabeth's wedding.

Sunday service ringing has been resumed at Holy Trinity Cathedral Church, Guildford, after closure through decaying roof timbers and for decorations.

The peal of Painswick Surprise at Ashlead was rung for the golden wedding of Mr. Alfred L. Brown, of St. Martin's, Epsom. Mr. Brown rang his first peal at Ashtead on March 10th, 1903. Unfortunately, the bells of St. Martin's were not available.

Mr. James G. Rumsey celebrated the 50th anniversary of his first peal by a peal of Bristol at Framlingham, Suffolk. The band tender their thanks to Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Maulden for their hospitality after the peal.

While there were four first pealers at Staly bridge on October 14th, the ringers in question learnt to ring in 1925 and 1927 respectively. Mr. F. Hodge, the conductor who has been ringing since 1919. has two pea's to his credit. While the "go' of these bells is excellent, they are very noisy, being 13 or 14 feet above the ringers with only a 9in. floor between.

\section*{LICHFIELD CATHEDRAL BELLS DEDICATED}

LICHFIELD Cathedral was enriched on Sunday. October 26th, when the ring of ten bells, recast as a gift of the Freemasons of Staffordshire. was dedicated by the Bishop of Stafford. The gift commemorated the 750th anniversary of the Cathedral.

It was a memorable ceremony and was attended by a congregation that numbered over 2,000. The Masons entered the Cathedral from the west door in procession, wearing aprons and collars. The Provincial Grand Master, the Earl of Dartmouth, was attended by his officers. Another procession was formed by the Mavor and members of the Corporation of Lichfield, escorted by a detacliment of the Special Constabulary.

\section*{SERVICE RELAYED.}

The service opened with the singing of the National Anthem and the hymn, 'Before th' eternal Father's throne.' The dedication followed the first lesson, read by Canon J. E. W. Wallis. In the spacious belfry were assembled the Bishop of Stafford, the Dean. Precentor and singers, together with the Provincial Grand Master and his officers, and the ceremony of dedication was relayed by loud speakers to all parts of the Cathedral.
In making the offer of the recast bells on behalf of the Freemasons of Staffordshire, the Earl of Dartmouth asked the Dean's acceptance of the gift 'to the greater glory of God and for the enrichment of our Cathedral Church.
The Dean (the Very Rev. F. A. Iremonger), in accepting the bells with due thankfulness, added, 'It shall be our endeavour to see that this gift is preserved for the purpose for which it has been offered.' He asked the Bishop to dedicate the ring of bells 'that it may thereby be set apart from all worldly and profane purposes and may be used in the worship and service of Almighty God in this church.'
The Bishop then hallowed and dedicated the bells, and the prayers he offered included one for bellingers-that they may be filled with reverence and godly fear. and mindful of the sacredness of Thy house, may put away from them all idie thoughts and light behaviour.'

The singing during the service was of great beauty. It included two anthems, S. S. Wesley's 'Lead me, Lord, lead me in righteousness' and 'Let their celestial concerts all unite ' (Handel). The Te Deum was to Stanford's setting in B flat.

\section*{THE MUSIC OF THE STEEPLE}

The Dean in his address, said: 'You, whose generosity has made this gift possible, must surely feel a thrill of pride and joy when you reflect that for generations to come the bells of Lichfield Cathedral-now recast and more tuneful than any of us can remember-will ring out, as of old, over the Staffordshire countryside.

There is a music of the steeple as well as a music of the choir stalls and the organ loft. And it would be surprising if both the greatest and the least distinguished writers had not vied with one another in describing in verse or prose the emotions aroused by that music in their hearts.

On the sound of the church bells has centred some of the world's best poetry, and much of its worst, and most sentimental doggerel from Edgar Allan Poe's immortal masterpiece to 'The Miner's Dream of Home.' One verse of a poem describing the bel's of Oxford which has haunted me from the day I first read it I will quote:-

Mind'st thou the bells? What a place it was for bells, lad!
Spirits as sharp as thrushes' bilis to pierce the sky with song!
How it shook the heart of one, the swaying and the swinging,
How it set the blood a-tramp and a.l the brain a-singing.
Aye, and what a world of thought the calmer chimes came bringing.

\section*{THE FALUES OF ETERNITY}

The greatest of all the associations to which the sound of church beils ministers is the associations of worship. Only one thing was needed, during the war, to make all days alike, and to secularise completely our communal life; and this the Government achieved when they stopped the ringing of church bells on Sundays. It was the snapping of the last link. however feeble a one, in the chain that hound many of our fellow countrymen to the values of eternity.

Is it too much to hope that from this morning there may he fornied in vour minds some fresh association with the bells which; thanks to the skill and initiative of Mr. Sedg wick, the captain of our bellringers, and his team, you will hear ringing as you leave the Cathedral? If the hope of any such association is justified, will vqu rest assured that we, in this Close and City, will do all in our power to encourage and sustain it. A thou-
sand men and women have banded themselves together, under the name of the Friends of Lichfield Cathedral, to secure this aim-to hand down to the generations to come this Cathedral unspoi't and unimpaired.
Ringing during the dedication was two whole pulls in rounds, and the following took part all local ringers: Joan Beresford 1. F. T. Hayle 2, F. A. Sedgwick 3, L. Smith 4; L. Monk 5, A. Smith 6, A. Bowler, sen. 7, W. J. Cope 8, A. Bowler, jun. 9, G. E. Oliver 10.

The opening touch after the service of Grandsire Caters was by ringers from Coventry, Birmingham, Stafford, Stourhridge, Wolverhampton and Lichfield, with Mr. Harry Withers as conductor. Over 100 ringers were present during the day, the ringing being in the capable hands of Mr. G. E. Oliver. Opinions were unanimous that a magnificent ring of bells had been provided by Messrs. John Taylor and Co. of Loughborough.

The nine smallest bells also bear Taylor's shield with 'Recast 1947' below. The tenor bell weighs 31 cwt .2 qr .9 jb . and sounds note \(\mathbf{D}\) natural.

HISTORY OF THE BELLS
The early history of the Cathedral bel's is purely conjectural, but in 1477 Dean Heywode gave a great bell cal'ed Jesus.
which bore the following inscription :
I am the Bell of Jesus, and Edward is our King,
Sir Thomas Heywode first caused me to ring.
This bell was destroyed during the partial destruction of the Cathedral during the Civil Wars. A Bodleian MS. says: One Pickens, a pewterer, on July 26 th, 1653 , knokt in pieces the fair bell called Jesus at Lichfield, he being the cheif officer appointed for demolishing that Cathedral.' In 1670 Bishop Hacket. who restored the Cathedral, contracted for 'six bel's becoming a cathedral.' When Bishop Hacket died on October 26th. 1670. three of the bells had been cast, but only the tenor fixed. On hearing this bell for the first time the good Bishop observed that it wowid be his passing bell and died shortly afterwards. In 1687, the Hacket bells having become bad and useless,' a subscription was raised to replace them with a new peal of ten, and the contract was placed with Henry Bagley, of Ecton, Northants. This peal was completed in 1688. A fire occurred in the belfry in 1758. and the intense heat cracked the ninth: this was recast by Abel Rudhall. The treble was recast by Thomas Rudhall in 1764.'
The three smallest and also the sixth hell had been very badly chipped away on their edges, and still they were flat in relation to the tome of the other bells; the musical qualitv of the peal as a whole was very poor indeed, especially for such a magnificent Cathedral.

\section*{Oxford University Society}

Mr C. J. DICKINSON THE NEW MASTER.
A general meeting of the Society was he!d at Magdalen College on October 14th, the president (the Rev. C. E. Wigg) being in the chair. Thirty-seven people were present, including 15 new members. The treasurer's report, showing a balance of \(£ 92 \mathrm{~s}\). 5 d ., was adopted.
Miss Higgins gave an account of the Society's activities, ringing and otherwise, during Trinity Term and the ringing tour held at Hereford in August. This was followed by an account from Mr. Semmens of the ringing-cum-farming holiday at Honeybourne.
The Chairman announced that as the present Master, Mr. W. F. Moreton, had gone down, the election of a new Master was necessary. There were three nominations-Miss K. Higgins (L.M.H.) Mr. P. C. Wright (Univ.) and Mr. C. J. Dickinson (Magdalen). The nominees having withdrawn from the room, Mr. Dickin. son was elected. The office of male secretary, previously held by him, thus fell vacant, and Mr. Wright was elected nem con.
The Chairman suggested that the secretaries should, write to Mr. Moreton expressing the Society's regrets at his departure and thanking him for his many services during his term of office. The Society heartily concurred.
The date of the Society's annual ringing tour caused some lively discussion. the main question being whether it should be held in the summer as in prerious years or in the Faster vacation to avoid interfering with the Universities' Association tour. It was decided to obtain the opinions of members who had gone down before making a decision. The tour will probably be held at Rerkhamsted next year.
A proposal that a social should be held this term was eventually carried, nad a commitzee was elected to make the arrangements.
With the aid of a model, Miss Higgins explained how a tower bell was rung, for the benefit of new members, and described the
basic principies of change ringing.

\section*{UNIVERSITY OF LONDON SOCIETY}

The Vicar of Battersea (the Rev, A. S. Hopkinson) made the Society very welcome to St.
Mary's Church, and after their ringing conMary's Church, and after their ringing caninteresting and original address. After an excellent meal at the George II. Cafe, the business meeting and further ringing were he!d at St. Stephen's Church.

Capt. D. N. Layton, R.E.M.E., the first Master of the Society, acted as ringing master and also as chairman for the lengthy business meeting.
The reports of the Master, secretary and treasurer all showed that the main aim of the Society during the next year should be the finding and thorough training of recruits from the University, thus making available to the Exercise more ringers who could help depleted service bands and also help to bring into use for church purposes the very many good rings which now hang idle. An increase in member. ship and in the balance in hand was reported. Officers were elected as follows: President, Dr. J. C. E. Simpson; Master and representative for Loudon on the Universities' Association Committee, Mr. V. J. Benning ; secretary and treasurer, Mr. P. R. Blackman: committee, \(\mathbf{M r} \mathbf{P}\). R. Layton, Miss J. Yearsley and Miss H. Y. Gardner; and auditor, Mr. G. C. Carter. An ambitious programme is to be attempted during this session, details of which were left to the committee. and if possible a dinner in London on January 3 rd if sufficient support is forthooming and it does not interfere with other functions.

\section*{800 Peals}

MR. T. GROOMBRIDGE, SEN.'s RECORD.
Many congratulations have been extended to Mr. T. Groombridge, sen., who rang his q00th peal on his 80th birthday. His ringing career seemed to peter out with his accident in July, 1939, and after his 794th on October 9th. 1941, Mr. Groombridge announced that he wou'd not attempt another peal.
This held good until last year, when he rang a peal of Kent Minor at Stapleford and Grandsire Caters at \(\overline{\text { St. Peter's, Nottingham. }}\)
A few attempts which failed followed at intervals, but recently the suggestion was made to complete the 800 on his 80 th birthday, and he just succeeded as No. 799 was rung two nights before. To keep in practice, a quarterpeal of Stedman in hand was started for on the remaining evening, but it was not taken too seriously.
One of his most cherished memories is deteted from the 800 , the record peal of Cinques at Southwark, which turned out to be false, but he often cites this as some of the best ringing he ever took part in

He had handled the tenors at Bow, Southwark, Manchester Town Hall, Cornhill, etc., but was equally proud of managing Foots Cray treble of 1 cwt . plus a few pounds to a peal of Stedman Doubles. His record is as follows:

\section*{HODNET BELLS}

Two new trebles have been added to the ring of six at Hodnet, Shropshire, to complete the octave. These were dedicated by the Bishop of Shrewsbury on October 19th after a Cunfirmation service.
Immediately after the ceremony the bells were rung in rounds and 'Queens' by the lacal ringers, and the tower was afterwards thrown open to visitors, who rang methods ranging from Grandsire Triples to London Surprise Major. The striking was of a high order and the parishioners had a chance of hearing their bells at their best.
Both the new bells are inscribed, 'Thanksgiving for victory. 1939-1945,' on the waist, and round the shovider, 'John Taylor and Co., Founders, Loughborough, 1947.' The treble weighs 4, cwt. 2 qr .27 lb ., and the second 5 cwt 2 lb . Thev blend perfectly with the old bells (Rudhall, 1769). which were retuned at Loughborough in 1931 and rehung in a low side \({ }^{3}\) iron frame for eight.
Everrone was delighted with the peal, and the founders are to be congratulated on making such an excellent 'splice.' The Hodnet people now possess one of the best eights in the country.

\section*{Kent County Association}

\section*{ROCHESTER DISTRICT.}

An attendance of 120 ringers representing 18 towers was recorded at the annual meeting of the Rochester District on October 18th. Ringing preceded the service in the Cathedral, conducted by the Dean, assisted by the Archdeacon. Prayers from the Ringers' Service Handbook and the ringers' hymn were introduced into the service.
Following tea at the City Cafe the Dean welcomed the company. At the business meet. ing the Archdeacon of Rochester presided, and the secretary reported an all-round improvement on last year in membership, finance and ringing. Three new practising members and an hom. life member were elected.
Mr. B. W. May was re-elected district secretary as were the two district representatives. Rainham was selected for the next meeting. In the evening there was ringing at the Cathedrat, Chatham and Frindsbury.

TONBRIDFE DISTRICT
A suggestion by Mr. H. Goodwin that a collection should be made at each meeting for the benefit of the church concerned as a mark of the visitors' esteem led to a spirited dehate at the annual meeting at Tonbridge on Octoher 4 th. The suggestion was rejected, and the matter was left as at present, viz., that deserving towers receive donations from the Belfry Repair Fund.
The secretarr's report was adopted and the accounts accepted. Officers elected were: Secretary, Mr. R. Whitehead : district representatives, Mr. B. Collinson and Mr. F. Ladd: Ringing Master, Mr. B. W. Pankhurst.
Two proposals of the Lewisham District were considered: (a) That a neal secretary be appointed for the Association: (b) that a beginners' booklet on change ringing be produced for sale at a nominal price to learners and others.
The first was well sunported. but the second was rejected, the district deciding to give it no support.
The Vicar (the Rev. Russell B. White) offlciater at the service, Mr A. H. James. a member of the local band, acting as organist.

\section*{INITIATING A NEW BAND}

Dear Sir,-Your leaders often give rise to interesting questions. One is : Has the best way to initiate a new band into change ringing been discovered. published and adopted as standard practice? Not that I am aware of; but of the various possibilities, one must be the easiest for learners and therefore the quickest. Which is it?

In my experience the propagandist is very liable to be faced by two obstacles, either of which singly, would make matters very difficult. When both are in evidence at the same time, the position is hopeless.

In my last opportunity I undertook the task at the invitation of vicar and curate. After the usual war-time difficulties had been overcome, a strictly local band of novices reached the stage of being able to ring the 14 hunting lines on seven bel's (tenor covering) in preparation for Grandsire. Triples. This success proved that I was working on the right lines; it only remained to bring the striking up to a satisfactory standard, and they were ready to tackle the Plain Course.

In the meantime, unfortunately, the sympathetic vicar had died, and his successor took the opposite view. Then the captain left the town, and the remnant (instead of making an intensive effort to repiace losses) aliowed themselves to be inoculated by some unknown counsellor with the opinion that the right approach to change ringing is by way of Grandsire Doubles. As it was known that in an eighthell tower, surrounded by thousands of people. I do not approve of changes on five bells, I received no further requests to be helpful. I.ater, at the next branch meeting, there were handed in nine lacal names for associate membership; so why was there any need to give up cight-bell ringing?

It is now over two rears since I was last in the tower as an invited guest, and (to the hest of my knowledge) no local six have succeeded in ringing any Doubles. On the last three oncasions that I have happened to pass during time for service ringing, the worshippers were being invited to attend by means of (1) one be'.l; (2) and (3), chiming on eight bells.
If the blame for the failure rests on me, where did I go wrong?

As he had no reply, no doubt he assumed that St. Paul's had changed their mind. I fail to see how Mr. Knott can say that the Sydney ringers were unsportsmanlike. \section*{THREE JOHNS}

A feature at the annual dinner of the Ancient Society of College Youths is the concluding toast, in which the respective Masters of 100,200 and 300 years ago are remembered. Mr. E. Alex Young, who since the death of Mr. J. Armiger Trollope has been the society's historian, delved into the past and gave sidelights of these three worthies, all of whom were christened John, when the 310th anniversary dinner was held on Saturday.

In 1847 the Master was John Bradley, who was one of

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those energetic men of the middle of the 19th century and was a contemporary of John Cox, who during Bradley's mastership was the leading conductor of the College Youths. Bradley joined the society in 1840 , and at the time he came in he rang a peal of Oxford Treble Bob.
John Hardham, who held office in 1747, has been much in the news this year in view of the Ancient Society's visit to Chichester this summer. Chichester was his birthplace, and the town he endowed in a handsome fashion by his will. He succeeded Benjamin Annable as Master, having rung his first peal in 1725, and also stood in the record peal of Maximus. Mr. Young described him as ' a reliable man and one who did not push himself to the front.' In business as a tobacconist and snuff purveyor, he was a man of substance. His shop remains to this day at Fleet Street, and 'Hardham's Snuff Shop' is still to be seen on the facia of the premises.

John Bayes, the Master in 1647, was elected a member a couple of years before, and he never filled the office of steward. There was no question that he was a man of standing, as the composition of the College Youths in those days was largely professional men or law students. His predecessor, John Houghton, was a writer of learned books and dealer in coffee, chocolate and other luxuries 'against the Ship Tavern in Bartholomew Lane.'
This pride in the achievements of the past and the maintenance of continuity is ever constant among the College Youths. Shades of past performances undoubtedly were present on the occasion of the peal by the society recorded this week at Southwark Cathedral. From those distant Stuart days when the society was formed until to-day it is doubtful if any great royal occasion has passed by without appropriate ringing. And next Thursday will be such an occasion when the bells of Westminster Abbey will express the rejoicings of the people on the occasion of the marriage of Princess Elizabeth, the heir to the throne, and her gallant sailor bridegroom.

COLLEGE YOUTHS' 310th ANNIVERSARY
}

\section*{A Year of Progressive Accomplishment ...... Thirty-seven New Members ...... Fourteen Half-century Members Present}

FOR the 310th anuiversary of the Ancient Society of College Youths at Pimms, Bishopsgate, London, on Saturday, a dinner was substituted for the war-time expedient of a mid-day meal. The limitation of the company to 100 through Ministry of Food regulations meant many disappointments; nevertheless, there were 14 Youths with over 50 years' membership present to give that loyal support to the reigning Master, Mr. G. W. Cecil, the secrelary, Mr. A. B. Peck, and the hon. treasurer, Mr. A. A. Hughes, J.P., after his tour of Canada and the United States.
The Master, in proposing the toast of "The Church,' said they as churchmen-ringers owed a great deal to the Church-in fact, they might say they owed to the Church the very existence of their Exercise. During the last 50 or 60 years there had been developed a better understauding between the clergy and the ringers, and that probably dated from the time of the formation of the Central Council in 1891. Since then particularly in the last 10 or 12 years, they had seen a greatly increased interest between clergy and ringers. It had been a great pleasure and honour to be Master for the past year. and he would like to thank his feilow officers and members for their advice and help during his period of offico.
Canon Jocelyn Perkins, of Westminster Abber, who replied, said he was sure that the ringing of bells must have an uplifting effect on people even if they were not conscious of the purpose. He recalled that when a glorious ring of bells was sent from the Whitechapel Foundry to Victoria Cathedral, British Columbia, he received most amazing letters about them. People stood in the streets with tears streaming down their cheeks, not having heard the sound of bells since they left Eng-land-in some cases 50 years.

\section*{ABBEY'S TRIBUTE OF LOYALTY.}

He would like to pay tribute to the ringers of Westminster Abbey, where for 25 years he had had among his duties that of superintendent of the belfry. They were all great fellows. 'May the Abbey belfry successfully accomplish its tribute of loyalty next Thursday week to the bonny bride and the gallant sailor to whom she has given her heart' (applause).
Mr. E. H. Lewis, who proposed the toast of - The Society,' said he would like to congratulate the Society and its officers on reviving the dinner. It was a pity that circumstances over which they had no control limited their numbers to 100 when they ought to have had 200. He would also like to congratulate them on the reopening of Southwark bells, and what a noble ring they were, especially after the little 'tickling they had received. Another matter of congratulation was the little event at Chichester. It was a happy inspiration to celebrate the 200 th anniversary of John Hardham being their Master.
There was one olher event to which he would like to refer, and that was how sorry they were to hear of the passing of the historian of the Aucient Sociely. He felt that Mr. Trollope did a great deal in writing that masterly history of their Society. Whatever his failings. he had a great talent for historical research, and he did not think they should let his death pass without a tribute.

Thev were pleased to have with them Mr. J. C. Mitchell, and he would like to thank him for the odportunity of joining in the celebration of the 60th anniversary of ringing Holt's Original in hand, silent. Another striking thing during the past year was that they had admitted three new members from Weatern Canada (applause).

That day they missed one who for years had proposed that toast-Canon Coleridge-and he hoped the Society would send him a message on his 90th birthday.
Membership of the College Youths had gained for him friends in all parts of the country. In 1906 he was in Lancashire and could not get to London, so four of them had their dinner together. There was John Aspina?, George Newton, who was still going strong, and William Davis, who was apt to get very ercited and would cry out in his Welsh accent, 'Now listen at them.' Another old Lancashire worthy was Jack Eches, and he remembered attending a meeting at Wigan where the bells were pretty lumpy. Jack came into the belfry and said, 'Eh lads, what's t'matter? Is it mean or bells?' After a pause he added, 'I think 'tis men.'

Mr. A. B. Peck, the hon. secretary, whose name was coupled with the toast, said they, had still four towers-St. Michael's. Cornhill, St. Paul's. Southwark Cathedral and St. Dunstan's. Stepney-and at all these four they rang the bells every Sunday. The Society had held 13 business meetings during the year and 43 ringing meetings, including a visit to Chichester, which was a great success. He thought with the help of Mr. Young they could arrange something similar during the coming year. Their visit to Chichester was to mark the 200th amniversary of John Hardham; perhaps in 200 years' time they would be going to Stepney!

CANON COLERIDGF.'S MISSAGE
From his dear friend Canon Coleridge he had received the following letter: 'An unexpected attack by some unknown germ was made on me when I was on my way to Exeter for the Central Council meeting sir months ago, preventing my attendance. It is not a germ now, but weak knees and bad feet, which I am sorry to say will keep me from the 310 th anniversary of the College Youths. I can only hobble about with the aid of two stout sticks to keep me up. As I must be here on Monday I don't want to be taken to hospital in case of an accident and disappoint many of my friends here (Crowthorne).
- I know many will be disappointed at my non-appearance at Pimm-but no one more
so than myself. I can't tell you how disappointed I am in being forced to "give a miss " on Saturday-but I remember the old proverb, "Discretion is the better part of valour," and feel that I ought to show it. I have not missed many-if any-anniversaries of the College Youths for quite 50 years, and I feel that I should like to stand up with others during one's 68 th year of membership of the Antient Society and in person offer mv best wishes to all members present, in particular yourself, the Master and Stewards coming first-and also to the new officers to be elected next week.'

Mr. Peck said he had also received a letter from his old friend, Albert Walker, who had been a member for 51 years.

ment of suitable material to carry on the art. There was a tremendous wastage which they would do well to analyse. He would gay that it was no longer safe or desirable to treat yungsters as they were treated in his young davs. He was reminded of a story concerning John Day, of Birmingham, who was very pompous. Seeing a stranger in the belfry, he went up to him with a patronising air and asked him where he came from. 'Walsall,'
replied the youth. 'Can you ring 12?' asked Jolin. 'No, I can only ring one!' was the rejoinder.
The other problem was how they could practise their art without giving annoyance to other people. He asked them all to give special attention to that problem.

\section*{SOMERSET AND WALES}

Mr. J. T. Dyke, who replied, said in Somerset they definitely looked up to the College Youths not only because of their high standard of ringing, but of the personalities in the Society. His earliest recollection of College Youths was in 1910, when he came to London to take his matriculation. In Somerset they were very bellminded and they liked to get about and ring, but he was afraid that owing to the decision of His Majesty's Government they would be stuck for some time.

\section*{Essex Association}

A HIGHLY SUCCESSFUL ADVENTURE.
The 'Crusaders' of Wouth-West Essex completed a two years' programme on October 25 th, when 40 ringers met at Hornchurch and participated in touches of many of the stan. dard methods.
The movement, initiated by Mr. G. L. Joyce, began in May, 1946. Twenty or so experienced ringers promised their support, and the average attendance has been eleven. augmented by visitors, numbering from twenty to forty, the number varying according to the weather and accessibility of the tower. (The 'Crusade' meeting arranged for Chigwell Row in September had to be cancelled at the last minute due to a fete nearby.) This collection of towers comprises rings of five, six eight and ten bells.
The officers of the district are grateful for the wonderful backing received from the 'Crusaders,' drawn from various towers in the district. Their loyalty, enthusiasm and forbearance have been outstanding, and many contacts have been made which should be treasured in the days to come. Also thanks are extended to the incumbents and the steeple-keepers-without their ready co-operation the scheme would have failed.

\section*{Wakefield Peal Boards}

Dear Sir,-I feel suce that all who visited Wakefield for the dedication of the Cathedral bells went home with the conviction that a really magnificent job had been made of the restoration. Indeed. some may have departed with feelings of envy

We often hear it said, "Nothing is as good as it used to be, but this cannot be said of the new ring at Wakefield. All concerned are to be congratulated on the result, particularly the founders, who have made a notable addition to their already long list of heauliful rings in the County of Broad Acres.
In the Wakefield Cathedral Magazine, the Provost, the Very Rev. N. T. Hopkins, writes

I have had the large unsightly hoards in the ringing chamber, recording the peals rung during the pasi 100 years or so, removed; they occupied an unjustifiable amount of space in the chamber, they darkened the place and, though perhaps possessing some interest to a very limited number of people, were of no particular antiquarian or historical value.

Nevertheless. I have taken care that the records inscribed on the boards shall be preserved and, for this purpose, a vather beautifully bound book has been procured and all the various inscriptions which have now disappeared from the walls have bcen inserted in the rolume. An account of the present restoration of the bells and their dedication will also be included, together with any notable peals which may be rung in future years. I shall have the volume preserved in a dust-proof case in the ringing chamber.'
There will be many ringers who, whilst being thankful to the Provost. for his good work in connection with the bells, will not see eve to eye with him with regard to the old peal boards. He must realise that the very limited number of people to whom the old boards were of interest are the ringers, who are the only prople who use the ringing chamber
One feels when ringing in a clamber with its walls covered by old peal boards that one is ringing against a background of history ; history made by our predecessors in days when ringing knowledge was not what it is to-dar
The removal of the boards is to be deplored but we get a few crumbs of comfort from the knowledge that the old records have been pre served in a book: a book, however which, no matter how beautiful!y it may be bound can never replace the old neal boards. - Yours fruly,

\section*{The Loughborough Attempt}

Dear Sir,-I hesitate to indulge in the wash ing of dirty linen in public, but I am so filled with righteous indignation at Mr. Clift's galant but misguided attempt to excuse and condone the fiasco at Loughborough that 1 cannot refrain from one or two comments
Excellence, as I would judge it is a quality seldom experienced in ringing. If excellence is to be the standard, far less than one per cent. of the peals at present rung should be published. Certainly none of the ringing we hoard at Loughborough was in that class. For one thing, there was a tendency for the treble to be rung just a shade slow at hand. For another, the first two courses were a trifle too slow ( 17 minutes a course) eren for such a majestic peal of bells. But taking it all round, the ringing was good average stuff until the first trip of the attempt occurred. This trip could. and should, liave been stopped al a missed dodge as it occurred at the easiest possible lead of the course (the third lead). Even so, the bells were right well within the lead, and with a proper effort at the back end to keep the beat going, an immediate recovery would have been possible.

Right or wrong, my opinion is that the conductor, having omitted to put the bells right himself, resented the fact that someone else did. It ought not to take 23 hours to find out whether or not ringing is good enough for a peal, however excelient the bells, and in any case there are occasions when private feelings should be subordinated to the claims of common courtes.y. As the popular song would have it, 'It ain't what you do, it's the way that you do it.'
In conclusion, may I say that I hope I shall have the pleasure of ringing a peal with Mr. Clift under more propitious circumstances at some future date. He can be assured that I for one, having started for a peal, will make every effort to play my part in ringing it. This is the least that can be demanded of any ringer.
The opposing opinions having now been put in public. I trust the matter will be dropped and that an incident best forgotten will not be allowed to mar the pleasant memories and friendships of a very happy week-end.-Yours faithfully,

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\section*{THE PRINCESS}

Y ESTERDAY was a memorable occasion in the life of the British Commonwealth with the wedding of the Heiress Presumptive. It was not only at Westminster Abbey, where amid pageantry this solemn sacrament took place, that the bells rang out their message of felicitations, but also from all the great cathedrals of our land as well as the churches of our towns and villages. And the vibrant hum of the bell was not confined to this land; messages have reached us from Canada, Australia and South Africa telling of the plans to give expression to that devotion that in a remarkable manner has been displayed towards the House of Windsor.

This loyalty is almost a paradox, coming as it does in an era when men's minds are drifting towards communal ideas and objectives. Outlook has changed since the days when the first Elizabeth ascended the throne and the individuality of the Sovereign found expression in vigorous direction of the affairs of State. 'Have a care over my people,' she charged her judges. 'You have my people; do you that which I ought to do. See unto them; see unto them, for they are my charge.' To-day the great ties of the throne are by precept and example. The unity of this people has been brought about by the Christian example and the display of those homely virtues by the reigning sovereign and his family. They constitute a pattern for a great people, and while those virtues of truth, unweariness in duty, courtesy and consideration for others are revealed in our King and Queen, then will the traditional respect and homage knit the peoples of their dominions together.

The good wishes and blessings, which have been showered on the young lovers from the hearts and minds of millions are not mere platitudes; they have been stimulated by the words of the Princess in her famous coming-of-age broadcast from South Africa. There was the sense of statesmanship of the first Elizabeth behind her message, which read: 'I declare before you all that my whole life, whether it be long or short, shall be devoted to your service and the great imperial family to which we all belong. I shall not have the strength to carry out this resolution unless you join in it with me.' That dedication of service is not reserved to the Princess. We humbler folk of the ringing chamber will surely accept the challenge and share kinship with her by performing whatever tasks are before us to the best of our might and skill.

Before our next issue, M1. Tames George, of Heather View, 118. Rossmore Road, Yarkstone, the ringer of 1,279 peais, will have passed his 94th birthday. Best wishes from us all for Nov. 27 th.
Mr. Peter Lafin has circied Norbury (Hazel Grove) Church, Cheshire, and Philip Barnes, Burton-on-Stather, Liucs.
A sign of progress from Ringwood, Hants. Six first pea's and all service ringers at the church.
Appeals have been made in the local Press at Driffield, Yorkshire, to provide ringers. A ring of six, with tenor 12 cwt., dated 1593 , was restored in 1880, and during the past 67 years the tower has never possessed a change ringing band. The Beverley and Dislrict Society are only tow anxious to help if the recruits are forthcoming.
Frmest Morris had hard luck at Botlesford, one of the only two remaining towers in Leicestershire he has not rung a peal. After \(2 \frac{1}{2}\) hours' perfect Stedman Triples the 1 enor clapper broke!. This is his second similar occurrence within the last three months. November 25 th is the \(55 t^{\text {h }}\) anniversary of the first peal of Stedman Caters by the All Saints', Fulham, Society. Of the band, Messrs. Adams (Warwick), Elson (Fulham) and W. S. Smith (Wimbledon) are still with us.
The first peal of Roval by a band of the same Christian name was 5,000 Treble Ten at Fulham on April 19th, 1902. The band consisted of \(\mathbf{W}\). Weatherstone, W. S. Smith, W. T. Fison, W. E. Judd, W. H. Hollier, W. Pickworth. W. J. Jeffries, W. Berry, W. J. Nudds and W. Pye (conductor).
Inadvertently omitted from the list of those who had completed 50 years' membership and attended the 310th anniversary dinner of the College Youths was Mr. Francis T. Hoad, of Reigate. With his father, the late Francis T. Hoad, and his brother, George F. Hoad, he joined the Society in 1897 and is very proud of his membership.
What is probably the finest model bell in existence has been loaned to the tower at Wrington in Somerset. It belonged to the late Maior Hesse, and is comp'ete with wheel and steel frame, a remarkable engineering iob of the utmost precision. The actual bell was cast at the Whitechanel Foundry from the cannons of Sherborne Abbev tenor, and it is fitter with a clapper of special design perfected by Major Hesse, who bui't the model himself.

\section*{Ringing in British Columbia and the U.S.A.}

Dear Sir,-During my recent tour in Canada and the United States I visited Vancouver and Victoria, B.C. The framework was erected and the eight bells, hung in five days by local labour under the guidance of Mr. E. W. Izard. The band included Mr. Izard, his son and daughter. Miss Chaudler and Messrs. Lomas, White, Melhuisl?, King, Lake, Merritt and Emest Weatherby, who had flown from Los Angeics for the occasion. The tower is not yet complete and the bells are housed in a wooden structure on top of the walls. After the ringing the party was royaliy entertained by Mr. and Mrs. Izard in their home on the shores of a beautiful inlet.
On the fo'lowing evening, further ringing, and an attempt for a quarter-peal of Stedman, conducted by Mr. Lomas. This unfortunately came to grief after 30 minutes. Three new members were elected to the Ancient Sociely of College Youths, riz.. Messrs. Izard, jun. E. G. H. White and D. Boniface. On the following day I greatiy appreciated a tour thiough Messrs. Yarrows' shiphuilding rards, through the kindness of Mr. Izard. These yards must surely be the most beautifully situated of their kind in the wor'd; they havic been described as a shipyard in a beautiful garden. A 7,000 ton ship under construction was to be launched two weeks later
Ringing in Victoria is certainly making good progress. After visiting California we finally arrived in Boston, Mass., and it was a great ioy to meet once again Mr. Warren Sturgis his son, and Mrs. Arthur Shurcliff (daughter of the late Dr. Arthur Nicholls). Ringing for divine service at Groton School Chape! followed on Sunday morning. The ringing here is car riod on by boys of the school, and it is a pity that their progress caunot be continued after school days, for in the great majority of cases the boys are settled where ro ringing is possible. The same conditions anoly to Kent School. Ther are, however. wouderfully keen and make good progress

On the following Tuesday evening, after an enjoyable dinner party at the College C'ub in Boston, we attended a meeting of tune ringing handbell guilds, originated bv Mrs. Shure!iff. The performances were of a very high order and the harmony produced \(h v\) some of the bands with only fourteen or fifteen hells was wonderful. Mrs. Hughes also contributed to the evening's enterfainment. Mr. Sturgis. Mrs. Shurcliff. Mr. Walker (totally blind) and I were able to ring a course of Grandsirc Triples. It was all a delightful experiance.

A few days later we returned to Montreal and after a rough passage arrived at Liverpool 14 hours late to face stern realities once again.
The wonderful kindness and hosnitality we received everywhere will never be forgotten.

RNNGER'S WIDOW DEFRAYS COST.
The bel's of Holy Trinity Church, Old Hil!, Staffordshire, a fine, rich toned ring of eight origiualiy cast in 1876 by Messrs. Tayiors, of Loughborough, with a tenor \(23 z^{3} \mathrm{cwt}\), have now been retuned and rehung, complete with new fittings and ball bearing movements, in a new steel frame by Messrs. Gillett and Jolinston, the Croydon bellfounders.
The cost of the work has been defrayed out of a legacy by the late Mrs. A. E. Parsons, widow of a member of the original local band. Many of the older members of the ringing fraternity will remember Albert Parsons, who, with Aifred and Charles Bessano and Harry Mason, were well-known ringers in towers up and down the country.

The bel.s were rededicated by the Lord Bishop of Worcester on Sunday evening, Nov. 9th. Amongst eight or nille hundred worshippers were many ringers from local tower: Messrs. Giilett and Johnston were represented by Mr. Lonovan Bradford, who presented the local ringers with photographs of the hells as reassembied at the foundry. The ringing which followed the service was thoroughty enjoyed; the local band partioularly, are grateful that a somewhat hard-going ring has been transformed into a pleasurable one

\section*{THE LOUGHBOROUGH ATTEMPT}

Dear Sir,-When rour remarks on this subject appeared in Belfry Gossip it was obvious that someone was annoyed at the outcome of this attempt. It was, therefore, not surprising to me when Mr Corby "rose to the bait. In his display of righteous indignation he has, however, missed the essentials, and by stooping to level criticism at individual members of the band he bas left himself open to similar treatment.

Had he levelled his criticism where it was really due I should have respected his opiniou by allowing the matter to drop. In the circumstances I feel that I must ask him why he did not include in his letter a criticism of the manner in which the third was rung. It would be a conservative estimate to state that 90 per cent. of the fault in the attempt were cansed by the bad handling of that particu'ar bell. If this were not the case, can he say why he found it necessary to speak to that particular rincer so many times? Can it be that love is really blind?

I wonder how Mr. Corby would feel if someone took over the conducting from him in the middle of a peal; his behaviour on that occasion was such as to give the impression that a peal was to be scored at all costs.
I would, therefore advise him to take the words of his popular song to heart, "The way you do it,' counts for very much, especiall? mong strangers, and while hoping that I shall one day ring a peal in his company. I wou'd assure him that 'peal at a!l cost' methods will not be tolerated by-Yours faithfully,

\section*{MR. WILLIAM HAYNES.}

Many ringers knew Mr. Willam Haynes, who died on November 6th in his 90th year. He retired early in 1932 after 60 vears' service with Juhn Smith and Sons, Midland Clock Works, Derby.
In 1893 he undertook the installation of the new great clock at St. Paul's Cathedral, and during his long career travaled all over the British Isles on behalf of the firm. From 1913 until his retirement he was manager of the firm. His sound advice was in great demand by the clock making industry.

\section*{MR. FRED RIGBY.}

The sudden death of Mr. Fred Rigby, secretary of the Preston Branch of the Lancashire Association, is a distinct loss to the Exercise. \section*{in affiliatinn with central council EAST DERBYSHIRE AND NOTTS ASSN.}

WITH the object of restoring Sunday ringing to its rightful place in the -ervice of the Church, this Association was formed in 1887 at Clay Cross under the title of the East Derbyshire Association

Its carly existence was a struggle; at times The threat of extinction lomed large, but happily for change ringing in this area a stalwart invariably made his appearance in the hour of need and so kept burning steadily the flamo of enthusiasm for our art . In the forefront of these is Mr. J. F. England, of South Normanton, whe at the last annual meeting resigued the post of secretary owing to pressurc of other duties after ho'ding office for 16 years. In the Jess onerous pust of vice-president he is still ever ready to help as opportunities arise, eilher in ringing or church work.

\section*{THE OI3JBCTS'}

At the inaugural meeting the following were the fur main objects of the Association:-
(1) The observance of good and peaceful belaviour in the belfries of our churches, as being an integrai part of the church, and therefore consecrated to the service of God; while the bells and ringers are intended to be exercised rqually wilh the organ and choir, for His glory and worship.
(2) The refrain as far as porsible from using the bells on the Lords Day execpt for the services of the Church.
(3) To oblain full recognition of the Ringer's Office, as exsentiaily a branch of the Church's work; that they and their services (which demand much tine, skill and mental labour) may be placed upon a true and acknowledged basis.
(4) To cultivate the art of change ringing, by meetings in various centres for friendly peal ringiug; and to provide, at a reasonable cost, instructors for those who may require them.
The first patron that can be traced is the Bishop of Southwell. Other officers esected at the inauguration of the Association were Canon Massey, the then Rector of South Normanton president; and the late Rev. J. B. Nodder Rector of Ashover, as vice-president.
at its foundation the Association was confined to six towers, these being Clay Cross, North Wingfield. Ashover, Brampton (Chestertield). Crich auid South Normanton. From these. which were all six-bell towers, there were 46 ringing members.
Of these towers, Ashover, Crich and Brampton have ceased to be members, but the Association has increased its soope and has members at the following towers: Alfreton, Ault. Huckna!l, Blackwell, Denby, Heath. Heauor, Mausfield, Mansfied Woodhouse, Mortom. Pleasley, Ripley, Silston, Swanick, Sutton-in-Ashfield, Shirland, Tibshelf and Warsop. with the original three. These towers are throe eight-bell, five five-bell, one four-bell and the remainder six-bell.
Clay Cross was the centre of ihe Asociation until 1902, annual meetings always being held in this tower. South Normanton was selected for the 1903 meeting, and since then weetingliave been held at different centres.

\section*{TWO ASSOCIATIONS.}

Rivalry caused by the presence of two Associations covering much the same area was a cause of early weakness. In 1903 a joint meeting of the East Derbrshire Association and the o!d Fast Derbrshire Association was held, when a resolution was moved by Mr. Butler that both East Derbyshire Associations he merged into one association. This was de-
feated by a large majority and the Associations continued as two separate bodies. The chauge in the title was introduced in October, 1927, when tho association became known as - The East Derbyshire aud Nottinghamshire Association.
The Association has always workod as once body and beon ceutrally administered. A proposal was, however, made at the meeting at Wingerworth in 1918 that a northern and soutlern division be formed. This did nol find favour with the majority of members.

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\section*{OURSELVES}

'STIR-UP' Sunday has just passed-a day when our forefathers first stirred the Christmas pudding. While your Editor has no desire to cause a general 'stirup' among his readers, he feels that there are certain domestic matters concerning ' The Ringing World ' which he should ventilate.

At Leicester and at the College Youths' dinner he was privileged to mention some of his difficulties. The first was in the matter of circulation. The new regulations governing the control of paper mean a reduction by 600 subscribers if our present size is maintained, but any reserves in hand can be used to counterbalance loss. Fortunately our reserves are adequate to retain a 12-page issue until the end of February. New subscribers will only be taken on as old ones leave.

In the realm of performance peal ringing has increased considerably. Although we have allocated another halfpage to peals and curtailed footnotes, the number of peals in arrears continues to grow. To grapple with the influx of peals arising from the Royal Wedding, our next issue will be 16 pages, but in order to husband resources We regret that the Boxing Day issue will be only eight pages. The decision to give prominence to the Royal Wedding will result in abandoning the chronological order of publication of peals and quarters in our next issue.

Just a word concerning quarter-peals. For a time the Editor did succeed in publishing all that were submitted. To-day it is necessary to make a selection, and the guiding principle in making a choice is first-quarters and firsts in the method. An exception is also made of special occasions. May we again remind conductors that the sender's name and address must accompany all peals and quarters. The frailty of human nature is such that errors do occur even among our regular contributors. It is also important to write peals and quarter-peals legibly and in a manner in which they will appear. Many are rewritten because the copy is not suitable for the compositors. Typographical errors can thus be substantially reduced.

To the many excellent correspondents who supply reports and letters the Editor would say 'Thank you.' The brightness and interest of 'The Ringing World 'depend to a large degree on the material supplied. There is still much ringing news that does not reach us. After all, the purpose of 'The Ringing World ' is to be a journal about ringers and ringing, the link that binds all ringers, whether in a village church or a great cathedral, into one confraternity as servants of the same Master.

The Castle and the White Clifis
Are known the world over,
Now listen to the sound Of the church bells of Dover. Once again the bells of Dover are ringing out their joyous message of 'Good will to a.l. A special dedication of the work of the bells and clock took place on Sunday morning. Nor. 16th, by the Vicar, the Rev. A. Stanley Cooper. Among those present were Mr. Douglas Clark, who defrayed tho cost in memory of his wife, who died during the war the Mayor and Corporation of Dover, members of the Dover Harbour Board, and masters and students of Dover College.

Considerabie damage was done by the shells that fell ail around St. Mary's Church from the uross-channel guns on the French coast, and the tower did not escape. For some time anxiety was felt about the tower. The Oanterbury Oathedral architect exanined it, and while be was satisfied it was all right, be was convinced that the contents had been shaken up.
The bells have now been repaired and placed in ball bearings by Messrs. Mears and Stainbank. They were cast in the year 1724 by Samuel Knight, and each bears an inscription. But St. Mary's had bells before that date, as old vestry books show reference in 1496 and 1603 and 1633. The clock was placed in the tower in 1866 and connected are the Bow chimes, which represent the sacred link of the town of Dover with the city of London.
Special touches of Grandsire and Stedman Tripies were rung for the dedication of the bells on Nov. 16 th by Mrs. H. George, Messrs. f. Dennis, P. S'aughter, B. Moore, E. J. Walker, E. T. Eilender, G. Godfrey, H.J. Saunders, C. George, C. Turner (oonductor), R. J. Harling (Roval Artillery), W. Kitchin and A. Binfield (Folkestone).

\section*{In Lighter Vein}

RULES: ORDER OUT OF CHAOS
Dear Sir,-Your correspondent. 'K. Osse,' secms a little befogged, and I cannot allow his facetious indictment of our rules to remain uncha lienged
May 1, therefore, be permitted to point ouf tu him that they ceriainly do not, as he amagines, prevent any 'enterprising young band from using for a five-bell or even-beil peal any of a ring of 13 bells or less; neither is he correct when he asserts that a ringer is debarred from 'covering' a peal with the trebie.
I consider it extremely uncharitable of 'Mr. (Osse' to belittle the 'old fogies' who drew up the yules. Surely the fact that these good rules also permit peals on 'imperfect' front
vights of tweive-ve.l towers and on hopelessly oights of tweive-le.l towers and on hopelessly
out-of-tune rings (remeniber Christieton, Halewood, etc. F) should make him appreciate how far-seeing these ancient gentlemen actually were! Surely, too, he must realise how broadminded are the many eminent dignitaries of the present Council who have taken part in such performances!
Our friend 'Osse,' therefore, can go right ahead and fix up the peal he requires for any 'dear little chap of tender age? whom he may have in mind. I would suggest that, for a start, any old five of 13 bells be selected for a peal 'of Doubles. If, as he says, the tenor goes up false, young 'Osse' (or is it old Osie'?) will perhaps want to conduct from the eleventh and the suall fellow can be given the distinction of ringing the sharp second (or flat sizth)!

Mr. Osse' need not have any qualms aboul being a bit unconventional or what the peal
sounds like outside; it doesn't even natter if sounds like outside; it doesn't even matter if
the bells are practically all the same note or the bells are practically all the same note
how unmusical the method providing straightforward peal on the back 7 , 9 or 11 is not rung and the jolly old rules (a bit hazy, perhaps, in this respect) are not transgressed, he will have the glorious satisfaction of knowing that the peal will be allowed by the Central Council.
One word of warning. If he wants his peal recognised, I would advise ' \(\mathbf{K}\). Osse' not to ring Minor with a 'cover,' neither should he attempt to emulate Harry Withers by calling a peal of that lovely method, Superlative, from outside a tower. It is true that at one time he could have done these things and rung Minor with, a 'cover' or two but since that 'bad man Kippin put the Council's august beck up and made the mere mention of the word 'Basingstoke, to that learned body is the proverbial 'red rag' is to a bull, the good old rules do not seem to have quite the same meaning as of yore.

Nevertheless, a little ambiguity is good for the soul, so how ridiculous it is for Parson Felstead and those other blokes to want to clarify and bring up-to-date our dear old antiquated rules, just like they do the laws in Parliament.
Strangely enough, my musical and lettered friends insist that the Filland performance and indeed any consecutive six bells in the diatonic scale are quite perfect musical combinations. and that 123680 of a ten-bell peal is exceptionally so. Now doesn't this nonsense just prove that we ringers know music nuch better than these listeners outside?
I must admit, however that it does seem a shame that Mr. R. D. Blackman should be so upset and worried to death regarding sevenbell ringing in eight-bell towers when the golden rules actually permit fiye or six-bel! peals, not only in eipht, but in twelve-be! peals, not only in eisht, many fine peals of hells have no ringers to ring them at all. Incidentaliv, I wonder if Mr. Blackman is aware that some of his Council colleagues have taken part in a recognised six-bell performance in a twelve-bell tower. but forgwe me, sir I mustn't 'tell tales out of school.'mam sir, yours faithfully.

With sma'l boys the motto is hasten s'owly, and Bob Singles and Doubles are about the limit of their endurance. Recent!y however, we managed to achieve a fairiy welistruck p.ain course of Grandsire Doubles with myself ringing 34 a small boy aged 8 on 1-2-Michael King-and another, John Jerman, on 5.6.

I don't believe I am flattering myself when I say that it is a fairly popular ' activity '-and if one drops out there seems to be a nerr recruit wailing. One must be content with very little at first-mereiy ringing well-struck ruinds on handbells is quite a feat tor a boy beginner, and the changes have to be learnit by custom and by rote. They must get the hang' of it by doing it again and again and by having it simply explained to them. This is, I know, not ideal belfry practice, but I don't think any ather is possible with the very young.
A section of the modern youth lacks interest and background, and I can see nothing but good in filling the blank with an interest that is genuine and linglish. And another thing. sir if I may trespass on your indulgence being mentioned in the papers is a great thri!! to little boys, and an occasional pat on the back from your excellent journal would, no doubt. encourage other recruits to the art and Exercise. \section*{CLOCKING BELLS}

Dear sir,-I am fold there is a danger in what is known as 'clocking' bells-lying the rope to the ciapper to chime the bell insfead. of from the wheel.

In the course of my trave's I oflen visit churches with \(1,2,3\) or 4 hells in searcle of history. At Claycoton, Northants, the other day I found the tenor (a 1619 bell) had the rope tied round the clapper; needless to say. I released it and warned the responsible authority of the danger. This is about the 2nth similar case I have come across within the last year or so.

We ringers may think three and four bell towers of no importance, but there is always the possibility of augmentation, and what may be an incentive to add a treble (or trebles) can be retarded if extra expense is involved in recasting other cracked bells, besides perhaps losing a bell of some historical valuc. Guilds should not only print a note of waming in their reporis, but also make it known by some means to churches where there are
less than five bells.-Yours sincerely. AMOS.

The respective ages of the band you mention are \(79.0,81,82\), myself being the senior, 'gooduess and merey having followed us all the days of nur life." \section*{ROYAL GREETINGS}

No finer salutation could have been given to H.R.H. Princess Elizabeth and the Duke of Edinburgh on the occasion of their wedding than that accorded by the ringers of the British Empire. To date, the number of peals rung was 162 , which was far in excess of the total that marked the end of the war, when there were public holidays. It is not possible for us to gauge the number of quarter-peals and miscellaneous ringing, but naturally this was very much in excess of peals.

This large number of peals is an indication of the strength, ability and keenness of the Exercise. Summarised, they were :- 12 -bell towers, \(4 ; 10\)-bell, \(22 ; 8\) bell, \(92 ; 5\) and 6 -bell, 43 ; and handbells, 1 . The pride of place of the associations is held by Lancashire, with 10 peals, followed by Winchester and Portsmouth and Chester with nine, and Lincoln, Kent and Oxford each with eight peals. In all, peals were scored by 41 Guilds and Associations, the peal at Westminster Abbey at the second attempt on the following Wednesday being for the Ancient Society of College Youths.

Standard methods were much in evidence. Grandsire Triples, which this year has not been so popular (probably on account of the desire for progress), came into its own with 29 peals, followed by Bob Major with 22 and Stedman with a modest 12. In most towers it was the regular Sunday service band ringing, and probably many conductors, in view of the occasion, were playing for safety. Surprise peals were hardly as many as a normal week. In Major ringing there were only 11, including one of Spliced by that intrepid Banstead band which had to draw lots to select the ringers! Leicester Cathedral's choice was New Cambridge Maximus and Cambridge Royal was rung at Lincoln and Nottingham. In Minor ringing there was one of nine methods and four of seven methods.

Most gratifying about this wonderful royal salutation was the many who were taking their first step in the art of peal ringing. At the time of writing no fewer than 101 rang their first peal, the youngest of whom was a schoolboy aged 13. To all these new peal ringers 'The Ringing World, sends a special word of congratulation on behalf of the Central Council. We trust that, encouraged by what has been accomplished, they will extend their knowledge of the art of change ringing and add to the prestige and distinction of a study and pastime which is essentially British in origin and practice.

}

\section*{St. Margaret's (Westminster) Band of Veterans ..... Banstead's Spliced Surprise Lichfield Cathedral Peal ...... A Blind Conductor \\ Bath Abbey-1906 Last Occasion}

It was the bells of St. Margaret's, Westminster, that were ringing as the Royal bride made her journey to the Abbey. These bells started ringing at 11.3 (the time of the Queen's departure from Buckingham Palace), and continued until the arrival of the King and Princess Elizabeth at 11.28 a.m. At the conclusion of the service the bells of the Abbey rang out their salutations and good wishes.
The failure of the peal at the Abbey was due to an omission in the calling, but we are happy to announce that full amends were made on November 26 th, when a peal of Stedman Tripies was rung in 3 hours and 15 minutes. The peal was under the auspices of the Ancient Society of Coliege Youths and was conducted by Mr. H. N. Pitstow.
Mr. W. H. Hewett, who had the pleasure of calling a peal at St. Margaret's. Westminster, for the wedding of the King and Queen, conducted the peal there on Saturday. His band consisted of five College Youths and five Cumberlands. Three veterans were in the party, W. J. Nudds (79) ringing his 498th peal, R. W. Stannard (78) his 100 th peal, and R. Sanders (74).

Mr. Walter Allman rang his 50th peal during 1947 at Runcorn, Cheshire. for the Royal Wedding. This peal was by the Sunday service band.

Mr. Leslie G. Brett, the Suffolk ringer, scored his 300 th peal on November 22 nd.

STARTING AT 70.
We lift our hat to Mr. Walter H. Goldsmith, who at the age of 70 has started peal ringing at Watton, Norfolk.
Probably the oldest was Alfred Barnes, who at the age of 79 rang at Manchester Town Ha!l. He rang his first peal over 60 years ago.

His colleagues in Holy Trinity, Guildford. note with pleasure that Mr. Peter Davy is continuing his peal ringing proclivities with the Lancashire Association.
Ramsgate tower's captain, Mr. A. E. Jarman, will have reason to remember the Royal Wedding peal by proximity to his natal day. There were birthday greetings.
Mr. Ernest Morris for one of his wedding peals (Bob Major at St. Margaret's, Leicester) wus surrounded by a young company-he was the only one not under 20 ' It was a great credit to them a.l,' was his comment.
The peal at Wymondham, Norfolk, by the local company was the 100 th on the be.'ls.
One of the more advanced efforts was the Treb'e Bob peal in nine methods at Disley, Cheshire, called by James A. Milner.

There were more local candidates than ropes for the peal of London, Bristol, Cambridge and Superlative Snliced at Banstead. so the conductor (Mr. H. N. Pitstow) selected his company by the spin of the coin. One who had to stand down was the conductor's daughter, Margaret. All the ringers are members of the local band, and with the exception of 7 and 8 learnt their ringing in Banstead. Is there another tower in the country whose local band could ring this peal?
Nottingham's contribution was peals of Kent Treble Bob Roval. Cambridge Surprise Royal and of Grandsire Triples.

\section*{LINCOLN CATHEDRAL'S FIRST OF ROYAL}

The fact that the company met short for Stedman Ginques enabled Lincoln's tribuie from the Cathedral bells to be one of Cambridge Surprise Royal. This was the first peal of Royal on the bells.
To select the Stedman method for a first peal is unusual. At Irthlingborough in the peal of Stedman Triples there were three first peals and one first in the method. To cap it all Mr. B. Jack Stubbs was calling his first of Stedman.
At Leatherhead Parish Church a peal of Treble Ten was lost after two hours' ringing by the tenor rope slipping the wheel.
Two lady ringers stood in the peal of Grandsire Caters at Burton-on-Trent. They were Miss Doreen Roden and Miss Noreen Brain, and they are the first ladies to ring a peal on ten bells for the Midland Counties Guild.
Bournemouth is maintaining its reputation as a happy training ground for young ringers. First peals were scored by three members of St. John's company-Michael Best (13), James Daniels (14) and George Evenden (15).
Great interest was displayed in the peal of Treble Tweive at Winchester. There were seven firsts. Peals on the Cathedral bells are rarely permitted and the occasion will certainly yo down in the history of the Winchester and Portsmouth Guild.
The two brothers Collett, aged 14 and 15 respectively, scored their firsts at Burford, Ozon. Here again it was the regular Sunday service band which rang, all being members of the Burford Guild.
At Rodbourne Cheney. near Swindon, there were three 14 -year-olds participating in the peal of Doubles called by Mr. W. B. Kynaston. Two Bernice Strange and Keith West, were ringing their first peal.
Welcome into the company of peal ringers, Miss Benedicta Whistler, whose first was at Harston, Cambs. We helieve she is the first
Benedicta' to grace our peal columms.
TWO PEALS AT ONE CHURCH.
Two peals were rung at Holy Trinity Cathedral Church, Guildford, on November 20 th, in the morning and evening. Four ringers participated on both occasions, viz., A. H. Pulling, W. J. Robinson, Haroild A. May and Herbert G. Andrews.

Bath Abbey peals are rare occasions. The last was in 1906. The peal on November 20th was by a local band.

There were two weddings commemorated by the peal at Biggleswade, Bcds-Miss Phyllis C. Smith the organist, was married amid the local rejoicings.

Probably the youngest company to ring for the wedding was at Morton Derbyshire, where the combined ages totalled 97 years, or an average of 16 years 2 months. We have commented previously on this company. Good work, Brynd, and good luck to all of you.

Gloucester Cathedral's peal, one of Grandsire Triples, was by Sunday service ringers. St. Martin's, Birmingham, did not ring their Royal peal-Stedman Cinques-till the following Tuesday. Owing to the proximity of the market, peals are only a!lowed on that day.
market, peals are only alowed on that day. was the first peal ever attempted by a local band on the bel.s, which has been formed since the war. The bells are the heaviest six in Worcestershire (tenor \(23 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{cwt}\).). On the treb!e was 13 -year-old Ivor Cook ringing his first peal. Mrı Geofirey J. Lewis, the conductor, has rung Grandsire from Doubles to Cincues.

Another local company to distinguish itself was at Birchington, Kent, with six first peals.

Mr. Roger Leigh, the retiring Master of Cambridge University Guild, called two peals on the Royal Wedding day-at Harston and Trumpington, Cambridgeshire. Mr. Peter Barder rang with him on both occasions.
The quarter-peal of Doubies at Tempiecombe, Somerset, was conducted by Mr. F. J. Hazzard, who is compietely blind. Participating was Mr. F. Hopkins, whose grandson, J. Browis (13), was ringing his first quarter.

Mervyn R. Shearn (15) will remember his first peal at Nailsea, Somerset, which gave himt a crop of 12 blisters. He was ringing for Sunday service the following day. His brother and father a'so participated.
Bebington, Cheshire, have the first Sunday service band in the Wirral Branch to ring * peal of Surprise Major.

\section*{FIRSTS AS CONDUCTORS.}

Familiar with St. Denys' Church, Rothelfield, Sussex. is Mr. William A. Kitchenside. who has twice "circled' the tower.
A simi'ar feat was accomplished by M1. Thomas E. Sone at Headcorn Kent. This, by the way, is the eighth eight-hell tower that Mr. Sone has 'circ'.ed.' Any challengers?
Mr. Andrew J. Corrigan called a new sixpart peal of Grandsire Triples his own composition, at Bitton, Gloucestershire.

It was very much a Royal occasion at Watford with eight firsts of Bob Royal. Mr. G. W. Debenham called the bobs.

Messrs. Walter Copperwheat and Ernest E. Whitmore have circ'ed' Raunds tower together. The former ended on the treble and the latter on the tenor.
The local band at Burnham, Bucks, which included six girls in their 'teens (one of whom rang the tenor), allowed Henry Hubbard to pay his compliment to the Royal couple by ringing his ten-part peal (trip'ess) of Bob Triples. The striking throughout was as near perfection as humanly possible. This was followed by exceptionally good firing. Would that Hubbard could have heard it.

It was the Sunday service band, as it should be, which rang the peal of Minor (three methods) at Halsall, Lancs.
Mr. John J. L. Gi'bert has now called a peal from every bell at Handsworth, Yorks. The tower was given something new with the Irst of Superlative.
The young company which rang the peal of Grandsire Doubles at Ashton-under-Lvne had a'so a special thought for Mrs. H. Wolstencroft's birthday.
QUEEN VICTORIA'S GOLDEN WEDDING.
Mr. M. J. Morris, who participated in a quarter of Stedman Caters at Aston, Birmingham, has rung on each Royal occasion, jovful and sorrowful since Queen Victoria's Golden Jubilee in 1877.

WITH December mists clinging with clammy fingers over the countryside, a little group of ringers climbed the eminence of Stag Hill, Guildford, to participate in a ceremony very near to the heart of most readers of this journal. Beneath the shell of the great Cathedral, whose building has been halted through the exigencies of the economic situation, is a crypt chapel with seating accommodation for 150 worshippers. This chapel was dedicated last Saturday, together with the bell to summon the faithful and to be a sacring bell at the celebration of the Holy Communion.

The treble seemed to utter three words, as after the dedicatory prayers by the Bishop of Guildford the Master of the Guild, Mr. A. E. Harman, rang it in the presence of the secretary and treasurer and other officers of the Guild: 'John Sparkes Goldsmith,' by the Exercise for ever remembered as the founder and first editor of 'The Ringing World '; by those in the Guildford Diocese as the first secretary of the Guildford Guild, a post he held for 10 years, afterwards becoming the guiding influence in its inner councils while holding the office of vice-president. Practically all in the little group assembled knew Jack Goldsmith intimately, and they expressed the wish that near the bell rope there should be a small plaque bearing his name. The bell is a memorial to his work in the Guildford Diocese, and has been subscribed to by his friends.

Everything about the service seemed singularly appropriate. The Bishop's text, 'Let us hold fast to the confession of our hope that it waver not,' came with heartening encouragement. Eleven years ago the start was made on the building of the Cathedral of the Holy Spirit. The dedication of the crypt chapel was a practical expression of a great enterprise. That people will assemble there Sunday by Sunday for worship is outward evidence of the working of the Spirit. To-day the voice is the plaintive one of Jack Goldsmith, but there will be a tomorrow when a Cathedral incorporating the vision, inspiration and imagination of the 20th century will grace this hill, and the mellowness of its bells will be wafted over the countryside in all its glory. To churchpeople of the Guildford Diocese and to others interested in this great building it is necessary, however, to be constant to the text given by Dr. J. V. Macmillan, to hold fast the confession of our hope that it waver not.'

\section*{Blackburn Cathedral Bells to be Kecast}

The beils at Blackburn Cathedral, which have served the church and town for mere than 200 years, are to be recast and rehung in a steel frame. The work has been entrusted to John Taylor and Ca., the well-known Loughborough firm of beli founders.
The present bells are a jight ring of 10 , in bad condition, it being neariy 50 years since they were turned and rehung in the old frame.
A hearier ring is to be installed, which will be more in keeping with the dignity of a Cathedral, and follows close on simi ar wort which has just been completed at the Cathedra:s of Waleefied and Lichfield.
The back sis were cast in 1737 by Abel Rudhall, of Gloucester, from the previous bells. but there is no information as to the founder or date of them. The tenor bell developer a fracture and was recast 10 years later
They hung in the old Parish Church tower. which stood behind the O'd Bull unti! 183zे. whel they were transferred to the new church, which was consecrated in 1826 .
The old church was pulled down in 1820 but the tower was allowed to stand in the churchyard until 1870.
The front four were added to male a ring of 10 in 1851, and for many years there was no ring of 10 nearer than Manchester, but in comparativeiy recent years ring, of 10 have been instal:ed at Leyland, Wors'ey, Preston and Wigan.
The old bells have been rung for all important national and local events. and the election of the Mayor of Blackburn has been hera:ded by theirbeing rung-with the exception of the years of the iast war, when ringing was banned-since the incorporation of the borough. They have been broadcast on two occasions, and were heard by local men serving in the Forces in many parts of the world. THE INSCRIPTIONS.
The bells all bear inscriptions which will be reproduced on the new bells.
One two, three and four have the name of the founders, C. and G. Mears, London, 1851, with the addition, on the fourth, of 'John Turner Hopwood, Esq., barrister-at-law, Rockliffe House, Blackburn, born March 2nd, 1829,' 'together with the arms of the Hopwood family :-

\section*{CLOCKING ' BELLS}

Dear sir,-From time to time I read in The Ringing World' about the danger of clocking bells.
Where I ring at St. Margaret's Church, Dunham Massey, Cheshire, our bells were clocked for about 50 years-until 1944, when another ringer and myself decided to try to get them rung again. We got the bellfounders to examine them and they passed them as safe or ringing. We started with the front six and later the ten. The bells were cast in 1854 by Taylors, the tenor being \(27 \frac{1}{4} \mathrm{cwt}\). None of he bells are cracked, but they are hard going.
Originally ringing was stopped because the spire was doclared to be unsafe, but that was taken down in 1927. On March 25th. 1944 a 720 of Oxford Treble Bob was rung on the front six.
We hope some day to get the bells rehung or recast, but many ringers say it would br a shame to have them recast as they are of such a good tone.-Yours sincerely

\section*{The Kindergarten \\ MASTERING ROPLSIGHT.}

Dear sir, - 'Adsum' of Devon raised an ill Wresting point on teaching beginners in your issue of November 7th. Whether the Exercis: as a whole is using the most scientific teachin, methods is a question I wou'd like to see aired in your columns.
Hy own experience is that beginner's are pushed on far too quickly; there are no intermediate steps between rounds and the plaiu course. Ropesight is allowed to come by magic. as it were, after perbaps mouths of trugging with the plain course.
It has beent stated in 'The Ringing Would That about one in twenty beginners eventually sticks' to ringing. Now, while a dithcu': apprenticeship may ensure that only the rea! cuthusiastic rewain as ringers, recruits are not comiag forward in such large numbers as to justify the low figure of 5 per cent., and if ringing is to flourish, something must be done to increase this percentage
Admitted that astonishing results have becu obtained in recent years with youngsters of 10) and upwards, but it is one thing when a single beginner learns with a band of experts and quite another when a whole 'stoney' Land essays to learn method ringing.
At school the pupil proceeds step by step. an lopesight be taught in like manner
It is my contention that the system laid duwn in Snowdon's 'Ropesight, shouid lse applied practically on the tower beils and not onfmed, as it so often is, to the teaching of the theory of change ringing.
By means of the three and four-bell exteni: with suitable leading, covering and dodging bells, musical half-pull changes can be pro duced at once by any 'stonev' band. Good striking, too, can be obtained an an earlier stage, because of the frequent repetitions and few ropes for the beginner to pick out.
May it not be that in our haste to ploduce Major or Minor ringers for Sunday service ringing, and in our dislike of ringing ' kindergarten stuff,' we put stumbling-blocks in the way of our beginners and extend by months the period of apprenticeship? - Yours faith fully,

\section*{MR. JAMES HERBERT BLAKE.}

Mr. James Herbert Blake, born 86 years ago in Beckenham, Kent, there first served his church as a choirboy and afterwards as an ardent beliringer

Moving later to Cowfold in Sussex, he became we.l known for his energetic keenness for service ringing around that locality, cycling almost every Suuday, often after many long hours in his bakery. to Warnham, and then to Horsham or some other tower in order to compiete the band for the service touches.
Subsequently he opened a small business at Fishbourne, near Chichester, and on April 9th, 1893, became a member of the Chichester Cathedral Guild of Beliringers, serving faithfully for over 50 years until ill-health caused his retirement
During this same period Mr. Blake became leader of the six-bell tower of his uwn Paris], Church al Bosham, and it was here on the evening of Tuesdar, November 24th, that the sound of half-muffled bells marked his having been laid to rest on that day.

Mr. Blake had a number of peals to his credit but as with regularity each 120 of Grandsire Doubles pealed out across Bosham Harbour that evening one felt how typical it was of his devated service and his love of

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UCH a question crossed the mind of Robert Bridges when he wrote his poem "Christmas Eve, 1918," and it is probable that a similar thought has occurred to many an individual as he listens to the bells from town and village tower as he wends his way to the Christ Mass. How the candles on the altar twinkle with a mysterious light! The miracle of Bethlehem those centuries ago comes afresh each succeeding year-baffling, mysterious, but with peace and quietude eventually giving way to inward happiness.
'Blessed be the towers that crown England so fair,' proclaimed Bridges. We, the people of the towers, rejoice with him for that blessing. The privilege of such service is great and should not be lightly regarded. The music of the bells on Christmas Eve is of the sweetest, bringing with it a spiritual happiness to those whose hearts are attuned to hear the message, and to the world at large a consciousness of the spirit of goodwill. Enmity and such evil thoughts associated with it give way to friendship between man and man that crosses the barriers of race, class and creed. It is the maintenance of this friendship-in the belfry, district and guild-which is the true essence of Christmas. It dare not stop, it must not stop with the passing of Christmas.

And on Christmas Eve, as the bells cease to ring, there comes from afar 'starry music-Angels' song comforting as the comfort of Christ.' There is not one of us who in this Christmas, 1947, does not need that comfort. Wherever one looks there are tribulations and difficulties which man himself seems powerless to surmount. The comfort of this Christmas with its accompanying goodwill will strengthen us in what lies ahead. Both spiritually and in mundane affairs we need that mystic touch told so expressively in the little-known Christmas hymn:

> Now display thy saving power,
> Ruined nature now restore,
> Now in mystic union join
> Thine to गurs, and ours to thine.

'The Ringing World' was founded in the year 1911 by John Sparkes Goldsmith, who remained its proprietor and editor until his death in 1942.

The B.B.C. have decided to broadcast the bells of Kilbroney Parish Church, Rostrevor, Co. Down, on Christmas Day, at about 9.2 a a.m. This is a smal! village church containing six bells, tenor \(12 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{cwt}\)., erected in 1880 by Taylors. In charge of the ringing is Mr. James B. Cumningham, J.P.. who is in his 90th year and is a past president of the Irislı Association. He hopes to take the treble on Christmas Day. Mr. Cunningham is Ireland's oldest ringer.
The bells of St. Martin's, Birmingham, will he broadcast, approximately 9.20 to 9.30 a.m., on Christmas morning, December 25 th, in the Round the World series, ending with the bells of Bethiehem.
Mr. E. T. Newbury, hon. secretary, Tewkesbury Brauch, has been in Che'tenliam Hospital sinee November 20th for an operation to an injured shoulder. He is progressing favourably and hopes to be back in the towers for Christmas.
Our attention has been drawn to an historical error in a recent issue. The Golden Jubilee of Queen Victoria's accession to the Throne was in 1887.. Mr. C. H. Webb, of Coventry, recalls attending a viliage feast on that day.

They decided to walk the remaining 18 miles, setting out at 9.40 p.m. and arriving at Salisbury at 3.35 a.m., weary, languid and sore distressed. Only one of the pair was present for service ringing later in the morning!
This missing of the last bus seems to be a habit in these parts. Recently a prominent member of the Guild was forced to walk from Warminster to Salisbury ( 25 miles) through the same cause. Perhaps proximity to the Plain gives rise to these pedestrian feats.

Holmfirth, Yorkshire, tower is in a built-up area. A number of bedroom windows are level with the louvres and not more than four yards away. Permission was granted for the first peal in the tower on November 11th, as it was in memory of the rictims of the bus crash at Holmfirth, most of whom were members of the Bolsterstone Clurch Male Voice Choir.
Mr. John Downing, of Hastings, ca?led his first peal on the occasion of the Royal Wedding. The peal by the University of London Society on November 20th was Grandsire Triples and not Stedman Tripies as was erroneousiy recorded in our issue of December 5th. Will those concerned please accept our profound a pologies?
Miss Nora Honey is unique among the first pealers. Her first was rung in 25 methods of Doubles, the greatest number of Doubles methods yet rung. The deve'opment of fivebell ringing by Mr. Alan R. Pink during the year is a feature of the performances on lesser bells.
The peal of Grandsire Caters at Bournemouth on November 11th was arranged especially for Percy W. Brayshaw, a member of the young ringers at St. Peter's, Bournemouth, all of whom are now in the Forces. Percy Brayshaw is leaving for South Africa shortly for a course lasting two years.
Between the ringers of Bedford and the Mayor a close contact has been maintained since the bells of St. Paul's were rehung two years ago. It was a special pleasure for the band to ring a quarter of Grandsire Caters on the occasion of the wedding of the Mavor's daughter, Miss Margaret Canvin, to Mr. Edgar Coker. Miss Betty Spice conducted and there were scored first quarters of Caters by A. Lacey, Miss Pat Gilbert, L. Williams, J. Davey and E. Jeffries. Other ringers were H. Harlow, S. Foskett, N. Inskip and D. Thompson.

\section*{DEDICATIONS AND AUGMENTATIONS}

\section*{TERRINGION SI. JOHN}

The recently rehung ring of six bells at Terrington St. Johun, Norfolls, was dedicated on November 29th by Canon Mowbray Smith, tine address being given by the Rev. J. \(P\). Pelloe, Vicar of Wisbech, a weil-known ringer. Previous.'y the beils were hung in a very slight and cramped oak frame, with the treble 'hoisted,' the frame being badly decayed. Owing to their high position, they set up a very heavy movement in the tall slender tower which affected the 'gG' to a arge extent.
They are now hung in a massive iron frame in two tiers of three, the base of the frame being some 14 feet lower in the tower. Hung oli ball bearings with completeiy new fittmgs, the be'ls now "go' as well as one could wish, and the movement in the tower is greatly reduced.

The bells, which were ariginally cast by Thomas Osborn, of Downham Market, have been retuned, and the treble and fifth recast, making a very satisfactory job indeed. The work has been carried out by Messis. Mears and Stainbank, who were represented at the dedication by Mr. A. A. Hughes.

\section*{DOWNHAM BELLS}

A moving ceremony took place at St. Margaret's Chrurch, Downham, Essex, on November \(22 n d\).

The Bishop of Chelmsford dedicated the new ring of six bells. The old four bells in this tower lavo been recast and a new tenor and treble added, and the ring lung in a new frame with new fittings by Messrs. Gillett and Johnston, Croydon, on the instructions of Mr. and Mrs. F. W. Keddie, of Downham Grange, as a memorial to their three sons who gave their lives in the last war.

The service was conducted by the Rev. W. F. Taughan-Jones, and the address given by the Very Rev. W. E. R. Morrow, Provost of Chelmsford. During the service, immediately after the dedication, a course of Bob Minol was rung by R. Thrift, E. Runter, P. Green, Dr. Patrick Spencer-Phillips, G. Green and Dr. P. T. Spencer-Philips, and after the service some Kent Treble Bob.
Tea was provided at The Grange by Mr. and Mrs. Keddie for the ringers. Mr. B. Newson was in attendance on behalf of the firm of Messrs. Gillett and Johnston.

\section*{HANSLOPE, BUCKS}

Two new trebles completing the actave were dedicated by the Lord Bishop of Oxford on Sunday, November 23 at Hanslope, Bucks. Following the service, the opening touch was Stedman Triples, after which the bells were available to visiting ringers. who numbered 60. Tea for these was kindly provided by the Church Parochial Council, and further ringing was enjoyed by all until 8 p.m.

The inscriptions on the new bells are:Treble: Dedicated to the glorious memory of those of this parish who made the supreme sacrifice and all who served their King and country in two Great Wars, 1914-18, 1939-45. Second: Dedicated to the memory of a beloved Vicar, the Rev. William Jardine Harkness, M.A., and his wife. Frances, 1892-1929.

Mr. Richard White, of Appleton, added two new bell pits and relung the old six. The architect was Major J. H. R. Freeborn.

The new bells blend perfectly with the old six, and this beautiful old church with its spire now contains a handsome ring of eight with a 22 ewt. tenor.

\section*{A NEW TREBLE AT LYNEHAM}

About 60 ringers from the surrounding villages attended the dedication of a new treble bell to compiete the six at the Church of St. Mary the Virgin, Lyneham, Wilts, on December 6th. The bell was cast by Messrs. Mears and Stainbank and weighs approximately \(5 \frac{1}{2}\) cwt. It was presented by Major and Mrs. Buxton in appreciation of the work of Mr. L. A. Wison during the past 50 years and is inscribed 'G. and M.B. 1947 and L. A. Wilson.
The act of dedication was performed by Archdeacon Coulter, after which the local ringers rang rounds. In his address the Archdeacon mentioned the work of Mr. Wison in North Wilts and elsewhere in looking afier bells and training ringers, aud thanked Major and Mrs. Buxton for their generous gift.

Tea followed in the Viilage Hall, which was also the gift a few years ago of Major Buxton. Before leaving, Major Buxion expressed his pleasure that he had been the means, thanks to the enthusiasm and persuasive tongue of Mr. L. A. Wilson of giving so many keople pleasure, and hoped the bells would te rung for many years, reminding them all of the House of God. He thanked Mr. Wilson for his kindness and help to the family over a period of 45 years.

Another pleasing incident followed-the presentation to Mr. Wilson of a model bell hung complete in an oak frame with rope, slider and stay, which would be useful for dumonstration purposes. Ringing during the day included the first 120 on the bells by a ladies' band from Calne, Yatesbury and Wootton Bassett.

\section*{ALDEBY, NORFOLK}

On Sunday, November 23rd, the Lord Bishop of Norwich dedicated a new bell at Aldeby, near Beccles. This fine oid cruciform church, once collegiate, now possesses a ring of five in a minor key. The work has been done by the Whitechapel Foundry in their usual excellent manner, and the 'go' leaves nothing to be desired. The new treble is 2 ft . 4in. in diameter, weight 4 cwt. 1 qr. 7 lb ., and is inscribed - Given by Aldeby and Wheatacre in memory of the men who gave their lives, 1939-1946.

At the dedication a large number of ringets attended, including the president, general secretary and Ringing Master of the Norwich Diocesan Association. Handbells were rung before the service, and afterwards the five were rung in various methods; also a grand tea was provided by the ladies of Aldeby.

\section*{A ceremony of some interest took place} during the annual meeting of the Bristol Branch of the Gloucester and Bristol Diocesan Association, held oun December 6th at St. Mary Redcliffe, when a peal board lecording peals rung in memory of Messrs. \section*{Guildford's New Cathedral}

ARCHITECT AMENDS PLANS.
Io enable better facilities for ringers, the architect of Guildford's new Cathedraf in course of erection has amended his design of the tower.
Representation was made to him by Mr. E. H. Lewis, president of the Central Council, that according to the original drawings there was not an adequate space between the bells and the ringers.
Mr. Edward Maufe has replied to Mr. Lewis as follows :-

I have always been very conscious of the defects in the height of the tower in my competition drawings, which did not allow adequate space between the ringing chamber and the bell chamber, but you will probably know that competition drawings seem invariably to be produced in a rush, and I had to keep the tower lower \(i_{2 l}\) height thal I wish, wecause of cost.

However, at a later date I explained the necessity of increasing the height of the tower to the Guildford Committee, and they agreed that I should raise it. Actually I put another 17 ft . in its height, which enables me to arrange the various floors even more generously than you set out in your letter.

I am very glad to lave vour clear statement of the conditions desirable for bellringiner in such a tower, and I think you can rest assured that my tower now satisfies these con-ditions.-Yours sincerely, Edward Maufe.

Mr. 1. H. Lewis acknowledges in the following terms:
Dear Mr. Maufe, Thank you very much for your letter of the 4 th. I feel quite happy that, while my criticism of the original drawings may have been justified, the alteration you have made should prove to be quite salisfactory. I will let Mr. Hazelden and his brother ringers at Guildford know that ther need have no anxiety about the hanging of the bells.

PRESENTATION TO MR. E. M. ATKINS At the quarterly meeting of the St. Augusline's. Kilburn, Guild of Ringers, on November. 30th, Mr. E. M. Atkins was presented with a book in recognition of his 25 years' service to the belfry.

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\section*{'THE CHURCH AND ART'}

UNDER the above title the Central Council for the Care of Churches published this week their tenth report, a comprehensive survey of how our great cathedrals withstood the damages of war and also principles for general guidance of Diocesan Advisory Committees and Churchwardens on the care of churches. References are made to church bells and, while much of the informa-tion-is of general knowledge to ringers, the comments will be of special interest.

What bells have we lost during the war asks the compiler of the report. We quote: ' First, perhaps, the wellknown bells of St. Mary-le-Bow, Cheapside. In this case the bells were not those long familiar and recorded for wireless broadcasting, but a modern ring. More serious losses are splendid rings by Rudhall, of Gloucester, in St. Bride's, Fleet Street, and St. Nicholas', Bristol. Another fine ring by the same founder was that of St. Dunstan-in-the-East; one which survived of these bells is to go to Canberra, in Australia. The ring of eight at St. Lawrence Jewry is gone, and also that of Whitechapel. There is little doubt but that these famous.rings in the City of London will be replaced.'

The report goes on: 'It is often pointed out that

These famous bell-founding firms have kindly con sented to this adaptation of their advertisements to meet the pressure on our space, due to the compulsory reduction in the number of our pages this week. modern tuning methods are usually undesirable where ancient bells are concerned. But such treatment is possible in the case of 19th century rings, and has just been successfully applied to a light ring of eight at St. Katharine's, Feltham.

But bell losses might have been much greater. The bells of Exeter Cathedral are untouched, so are those of St. Paul's, London, Canterbury, Lincoln, York, Westminster Abbey and St. Martin's-in-the-Field, and, indeed, the great majority of our ringing bells. Even at Coventry, where so much else went, the bells were untouched. Of ancient or mediæval bells, as far as our information goes, we have lost none or, at the worst, next to none.' As to protective measures in war time l'he report states that the earliest bells in the City of London were sent to Cleeve Abbey, West Somerset, where they still remain for the present. They include mediæval bells from St. Bartholomew-the-Great and \(\mathrm{St}_{\#}\) Bartholo-mew-the-Less, and early examples from the Whitechapel Foundry belonging to St. Andrew Undershaft.

At present there is only one member with a direct interest in ringing-the Rev. E. G. Benson-on the Central Council for the Care of Churches. Our Council should have direct representation or liaison with this body; the experts of our art could make a useful contribution.

Leicester handbel! enthusiasts remembered Mr. James George's birthday. There was a peal on the eve.
The Ladies' Guild will note with pleasure that Miss Evelyn Steel has rung her 250th peal-seven Surprise Minor methods.
To pea! ringers we would say have patience. We have 149 in hand at the time of writing. As far as possible publication will be in chronological order.
The first peal on the recast bells of Wakefield Cathedral was a silver wedding compliment to the Provost, the Very Rev. N. T. Hopkins, who gave such encouragement to their restoration.

Aristophanes ' is reminded that a rule governing the publication of letters is that the name and address of the sender must be forwarded to the Editor. The Editor is not an expert at guessing handwriting.
Sympathy is expressed with Mr. R. O. Fry, of Bath, who was taken suddenly ill last weekend. He was to have conducted in a peal attempt at Sherborne Abbey last Saturday. Because of his illness the attempt has been postponed.
We regret this is an eight-page issue. Unfortunately there are others to come, as the ration received from the Paper Contro!ler is not what we anticipated. It is probable that 'The Ringing World ' will alternate between eight and twelve page issues.
Steps are being taken to maintain interest. To conserve space, Notices are being set in a smaller type. May we remind socretaries that the charge is still one penny a word (minimum 2s.). Counting was particularly bad during The Christmas rush.
The peal at Seal, Kent, is the first peal on the bells since 1898 and was rung as a comnliment to Mr. T. Groombridge, sen., and Mr. H. J. Ford, the only two surviving members of the band which rang that peal, the first on the bells.

In connection with the Nativity play at Kilhurn Parish Church from December 30th to January 2nd. there will be ringing each evening. Mr. E. M. Atkins, of 18 , Westbere Road, \(\mathrm{N} \mathbf{W} .2\), appeals for volunteers to ensure that a complete band will be available each evening. He would welcome information of attendance in advance ('phone Hampstead 4510).
Veteran of the South Wigston band is Mr. John Clarke, who has been ringing there regularly since the hells were installed in 1901. \(\mathrm{O}_{\mathrm{n}}\) Decamber 7 th he called 1.260 Grandsire Triples in celebration of his 79th hirthday, the ringers being R. Perry \(1, G\). Deacon 2, J. F. Clarke 3. C. Marshall 4, A. Bodvcote 5, A. Patrick 6. J. L. Willars 7, F. Ford 8.

To mark the 40 th anniversary of the formafion of the Coventry Diocesan Guild, a neal of Relgrave Surprise Major was rung at Nilvers Coton Thnse taking part were the Master, a former Master, the general secretary, former general secretary. two district secretaries and the auditor and committee nember. History for the Peterborongh Guild was made by the peal at Tichmarsh, Northants. on Nov. 29th. It was the first peal of Spliced Kent and Orford Treble Boh for the Guild and the
first peal of Spliced Major, on the hells and by all the band except the sonductor (Mr. George W. Jeffs). There was, however, a first or two left for the conductor-the first to 'circle' the tower and his first Treble Bob as conductor.

\section*{The Banstead Peal}

Dear Sir,-I, too, would like to congratulate the local band at Banstead on ringing a peal of Spliced Surprise Major in four methods.
To answer your query: Is there another tower in the country whose local band could ring this peal?

We have, at All Saints' Church, Oxford, a band who have progressed so far in Spliced Surprise ringing that eight and ten methods are rung regularly for Sunday service. On practice nights we are joined by some of St. Giles' ringers and university members, and have rung up to twelve mothods spliced.

This local band is capable of ringing a peal in ten Surprise methods, but owing to two of its members not caring for peal ringing, no attempt has ever been made, though seven of its members-with the addition of Mr. Bennett, of St. Giles'-have rung peals in four, 1 ve, six, eight (2) and ten methods.

Perhaps a short summary on how ringing in Oxford has reached its present high level would be of interest.

When the ban on ringing was lifted, there atill existed in Oxford the nucleus of a pre-war band of Surprise ringers, and with the general public taking a more active interest in ringing, recruits began to come along and rapid progress was made. This progress, in the early days, wais helped largely owing to the keenness of John Snice and a few other university members. If, at that time, the policy of the more advanced members had been \(a\) srlfish one, a band conld have been formed which, in a shart spane of time. could have rung almest any method. This would have been a giave mistake, for with the "going down" of John and Betty Spice, Wilfrid Moreton, Hot to inention the secession from ringing of ' Dick' Post, the advanced ringing in Oxford would have broken up.
No, the policy of Oxford ringing has keen a long term one. We have never neglected to teach recruits, and bring along the slow ones, until we have, besides the Spliced ringers, several ringing, Surprise methods, and others in the Grandsire and Stedman stage. The combined ringers of the three active eightbell towers also meet at 9 a.m. every Suyday and ring for the Cathedral services, when some good Grandsire and Stedman Cinques are rung.
The motto here is, 'Keen Teaching,' a motto which some of the experts. Wnuld do well to adont.- Yours faithfully, W. F. iTDDGF.

\section*{NEW ZEALAND AND ROYAL WEDDING}

Dear Sir-Arrangements were in hand for the Christchurch Cathedral Bellringers Societv to ring on the occasion of the Royal Wedding, and the N.Z. Broadcasting Service were to make recordings of the ringing. It is with regret that we have to renort that these arrangements were canreelled because of the tragic fire in Christchurch at the time: this fire is the worst one in the history of New Zealand. Forty-one people were burnt to death and the city was in mourning for a week; a civic funera! was held on the Sundav. when an undenominational service was held in the Christchurch Cathedral, at the conclusion of which the bel!s were rung half-muffled as the cortege left for the cemetery.
At. a later date the N.7. Broadcasting Seryise visiter the belfry and made three recordings of the Cathedral bells. one heing eet changes on ten hells, consisting of Queen's. Whittington and Tittum changes. The second one was a plain course of Grandsire Trioles on the heavy eight bells. and the third recording was 120 Grandsire Doubles on the light six. It is propnsed to use these remrdings aceakionally prior to church services that are heing broadcast.

\section*{Royal Wedding Peals DEFINITION WANTED}

Dear Sir,-When is a 'Wedding Peal' not a 'Wedding Peal'?
This question is prompted by a carefu? perusal of the issues of 'The Ringing World' for December 5 th and 12 th, in which 158 peals, purporting to be 'Royal Wedding Peals,' have been pubished. Of these only 86 can, in my opinion, be regarded as such, having been actually rung on the day of the Royal Wedding. The remaining 72 appear to be just ordinary peals.
Perhaps the term 'Wedding Peal ' is subject to a periodic elasticity in order that certain bands will have ample opportunity to get a peal in.
On referring to the issue of May 9 th, 1947. it is noticeable that only five peals not rung on the Royal Birthday were classified as birthday peals, although many were rung within a few days of that date.
If this kind of 'date-stretching ' is allowed to continue, the whole point of ringing for theso special occasions will become a farce.
Whilst on the subject of Roval Peals, it is interesting to note that in only six towers were peals scored both on the 21st birthday and the wedding day of Her Royal Highness. This means that onlv a very few ringers managed to score a 'double.'- Yours faithfullv.

\section*{EVERARD SLADE POWELL}

\section*{AN APPRECTATION}

The recent death of the Rev. E. S. Powell has removed from the Exercise one whose contributions to the att of ringing have been considerable, both in the theuretical and pracfieal fields.

At the time he was completing his education at Orford at the turn of the century, \(E\). \(S\). Powell had not taken up ringing. nor did he do so until several years ?ater. It appeared that mathematies was his strong point, for he was a scholar of Christ Church and later achieved a first class in Maths. Mods. and in his Final Schools. However, he desired to enter the Church and after taking Holv Orders he was appointed curate of Fsher in 1899. In 1903 he was appointed curate of St. Thomas' Fxeter, and it was here that he became attracted to ringing and learned to handle a hell.
His next move was to Ho?beton, Nevon, where he hecame Vicar from 1906-1926. During this time his interest and ability in all that nertains to ringing were developing and matur ing, and it is not surprsing to see him becoming general secretary of the Devon Gui's (1913-1924) and the president of the same bods (1924-1935). During the last few vears of this nresidency he held the Rectory of Clyst St George (1928-1935), and he was alwavs very nroud of being Rector of the church whirh had nreviously heen in the charge of \(H\). T Plitacombe
It is by his work on the Methods Committee of the Central Conncil that he will nerhaps he hest remembered in future. He had hegun to represent the Devon Guild on the Central Council in 1914 and in 1927 he was eiected to the Methods Committee. Here with two others whose names are famous in the Exercise, H Law James and J. Armiger Trollone, he was iointly responsib?e for the comnilation of the Central Chuncil's 'Collection of Doubles and Minor Methods.' Later the committee, now monsisting of F. S. Powell, J. A. Trollope and Stephen Wood iscuen a similar work - the ' Collection of Trinles Methods '-and a notable contribution to this nublication was \(\mathrm{F} . \mathrm{S}\) Powell's work on Erin Trin'es

In 1928 he married Miss Molly Davendort, of Sheffield, who was also a ringer, and for manv vears, in fact un to the time of his death, thev were to have the great nleasure which accrues when husband and wife can share and actively nursue a common irterest

In 1932. taking the view that no up-to-rlate book existed hv means of which newcomers to ringing might be introduced to the four stan dard methods. thev indertonk the inint guthor slip of 'The Ringer's Handbook, which is sti'! the standard work for heginners

In 1933 F. S. Powell relinnuished his resi dence in, but not his affection for, Levon, when the Dean of Christ Chirch offered Fim the living of Staverton. Northamntonshirn which he held till his retirement in 1946. Hi abilitv made itself as annarent in Northamn tonshire as in Devon and in 1935 he hecame Master of the Poterborough Diocesan Guild and remsined so for 11 vears

While the Central Council nublications and his own work have ensured for his talents in the theoretical field the nonfoum iesnect of the Exercise, a visit to one of his practice nights, or, better still, membership of one of his hands, would engender murh admiration for his qualities as a teacher. He had pll the attributes which make for success in such a sphere, namely, a thorough knowiedge of ring ing, immense natience with a beginmer. a ootable sense of hamomr, an abilite to imnart knowledge and an insistence on good ditcinline while his nersonal example as a ringer coutd bardlv he bettered.

Needless to sar, it would never have done if the bells of the churches in his charge had heen unsuitable for good ringing. gnd he whe instrumental in secaring the rehanging of the hera at Holbeton and Stavertor.

He was not, in his own words, a prolific peal ringer, as he cared more for teaching, and strangely enough he kept no records of his peals, but it is estimated that he rang between three and four hundred; of these he conducted a good many. He was an ahle conductor, possessing to a high degree the attribute of knowing everyone else's work as well as his own. and thus being able to correct trips quickly and confidently.
The peal of which perhapls he had the happiest memories was ome of Grandsire Cinques rung entirely bv Devon men at Fxeter Cathedral on January 6th. 1926, and composed and conducted by himself. The time was 3 hours and 55 minutes, and the peal proceeded with scarcely a trip and felt most comforfable It is believed that there has been no other peal of Grandsire Cinques at Fxeter since that one.
At the beginning of 1947 he retired from active work and went to live in Somerset. In Septerrber he was visiting Sheffield and was ringing for evensong in Sheffield Cathedral when he gave un his bell and a few minutes later died peacefully.
Thus passed on in the surroundings that he wnuld have wished a grand and great man who made the lives of manv others the happier for his presence and who by the exercise of his gifts left rirher the art of ringing.
