## WHEN EXPERTS DISAGREE.

The Hon. Secretary of the Devon Guild, in writing upon the position taken up by Mr. John Carter in the question of the definition of a Surprise method, touches upon an important aspect which ought not to be overlooked, and that is that after a lapse of years Mr. Carter puts forward views which do not coincide with those to which he had previously subscribed his name as a member of the Central Council's Legitimate Methods Committee. Without entering into the question whether Mr. Carter's contention is right or not, we have in this controversy, as we have had in others, the spectacle of a member of a Committee disagreeing with a report to which he bas been a party. Every man, of course, is allowed to change his mind; but when the Council's experts, to whom the Exercise look for a lead, disagree thus strongly upon a matter of principle, the faith of the general body of ringers in the Council's authority, or its ability to legislate, is shaken.

It can hardly be hoped that on any subject relating to method construction and classification we shall get unanimify among the experts, and failing this the Exercise must presumably accept the views of the majority; but the position of the Council is a little difficult when committeemen throw over the findings of their own Committees. In Mr. Carter's case, his views upon Bristol Surprise, if accepted, would rule out of the Surprise class several of the six-bell Surprise methods, for the classification of which he was jointly responsible with others. In change ringing the methods came first and the definitions were made to suit the methods-Bristol included. The whole argument in this particular case, of course, turns upon what is meant by a 'cross-section,' and as the definition was specialiy drawn by the author to cover Bristol and methods of kindred construction, the Exercise, we think, will be prepared to accept the Rev. E. Bankes James' claim.

But the broader question remains: what is to be the position of the Council in attempting to guide the Exercise if those whom it selects to give that guidance disagree among themselves? We had a striking instance of this disagreement in the controversy on Lead Ends, and now we have another example. As a correspondent remarks, - Under şuch conditions, what authority are we to attach to the Central Council publications, which are perhaps the most important and lasting work which the Council has done for the Exercise? The Council has no way that we can see of guarding against a sudden change of view on the part of a sponsor to a report; but the committeeman who had commitled himself to a proposition by adding his name to it might reasonably be asked officially to give the reasons for his change of wiew.

I have take! the trouble to write out and examine the fonr methods montioned by Mr. Carter in your last issue. It is quite true of all of them to say that the hells are in juroper contrsing orfler in 7-8, but by no stretch of the imagination can they be sidid to be in proper contsing order in 1-2. Following is the first learl of my melhod Brighton Surprise phes 7uh's and 2nd's places acded when tho treble is behind and in fron* tespentively.
It is quite true we gel. a variation in this way of the origimal methol, but 7th's atmed 2nd's places mext the Ireble, or any other bell liswe been objected to by mosf of the moder method builners.

## TRIUMPH FOR BRITISH BELL FOUNDING.

FIFTY-SIX BELLS FOR WASHYNGTON.
The Loughborough Bell Foundry, it is reported is to make a carillon of 56 bells-the heaviest aud finest of $j$ ts kird in the work-for the War Memorial at Washington, U.S.A. The bells are to be placed in a tower 500 feel lugh. This is a great tiumph for British beli founding.

The ' Morning Post " Fays: "The idea of fuctaling keyboard caril. lous, on which n nusic suftable for bells car be artistically interpretes, as war memorials is evidently catching on. THe sum required for tho Loughorongh bell tower and earillon is already assured, and other towns, such as Spalding, are likely to follow this exceltent example. A true carillon-wol the abliul musial box grinding out airs whach. much more often flan not, are nuite unsuited to belle is manifestly the bust means of recilling the service and self-sacrifice of our Glorjous Dead sinue all who leal it: must nceds remember the warlige past, as Longrellow did when he distened at, night to tho famous Dumery beft at Brages.

America is also adopling this method of commemorating her fallen fghting men. The War Memorial at Washington, U.S.A., is to be a great builditte, of which the central feature will lye a wower, not less han 500 ft . in height, in which a carillors of 56 bells is to be installed with the adost modern applianoe for playing it. Exsept ad Buffalo, where a set of 43 bells (of which only 20 ate in use) existz, nu keyboard curillon exists in the United States.

Both the wardens said how pleased they were to be present. They were so impressed with the board that they pronose having a duplicate of it. only in more subsitantial and hasting material, placer in the church so that all could see, and future enenerations would knos what was done in the nature of ringing after the most terrible war in the history of the world.

I comnenced my ringing career at Harby, Inicestershite, in 1887. On member of the band pessessed a copy of 'Troyte's "Chunge Ringling, which among obber useful information treats extenstvely os A'aulisire Doubles.
Glallgo ringiag proper was quite beyond our ability. At least, to we thought. It moant study and hard work, and grave doubts were enter ained as to whother it wal mractised unywhere, as laid down by Mr. Twoyte, on account of its intricticy, so each man stuck to his own bell, aud learnt by heart the bells he had to follow in the tirst ten of Grandsire Doutlos, and kept on ringing them over and over again until tho captain thought ringers and pablio lad hat enough, Then bo called thon round (after the troble had led) at hand stroke.
 By tho way, the captain alwass raus tho treble, then be knew when he had leal.

About hinis tima unglabomring village hand paid us is visit anc mats in difterent ten, which ran into rounds every 10 th change or so, when the captain-ou the treble, of con'se-called 'Bob.' We were jealous of his " bob '-wo hada't got one, buti we scorned a ten with raunds in it, so stuek to our own.
The next stop was to loarn the 30 (plain course). This took an ewtul lot of doing, as it was imposgible to put anyone right once they struck after the wrong bell, which caused much heated argument, and sometimes loss of temper, and was the cause of losing move than one promising ringer.

After much practice, we lenrat to do it fairy confidently, ant used to ring the ten nine times, then the 30 to finisly up with- 120 .
We got on so well we could ring the 30 four times over, equalling I20-same thing, but mach more dificult.
We weve quite cock of the district, ahd thotght we had attained atiout the Fast word in ohange ringing, when, lo! one fine day Mr. W. D. White came along with a marty from Cotgrave, Notis, ancl look the wind out of our sails properly.
Thicy rang real 120 's, with real bols aud singles, at least. Mr. White sath they did, and we were inclinod to beliove him, becruse, alliough he rang the treble, he didn't onll them out so often as the ohar captain had doae, and the bells alian't run into rounds every time, r'hen, when ringing had finished, and we were talking thjugs over in the villarge tavern he spoilt it all by sayiug Grandsire wasn't the only mothod they had ring-they had runs 120 s of Canterbury nurd Plain Bob as well. Well, that itid it,! Some believed him, but tha majority voted him a bigger fratid than the ather olapa, and said it was nothing more than a new kind of ten (or 30 at the most), finat we didn't know of. It was utiorly impossible for mere man to do what tirey said they had done. Fow coald they remember them fill ${ }^{2}$-and in difforant onder, too! Pshan, all bosh! But there was no getting aqvay from the fact that White's mons knew more aboul finging than we did, becaueg some of thern stood in with us and rang our 10 and 30 as well as we could do it ourselves, but we couldn"t ring theirs, so they tooks is bit of conceit out of of us. In the sulisequent controversy as to whether they did, or did not ring real 180 s, openions differed to such an extent that our band was completely smushed up. Some never rant afain, and others, including masself, did not tonclu a boll rope far mone than two years.
About that time, the Rev. O. H. Lacon was secretary of the Framinul (N. Lieicestershire) Ringing Society. and ho arranged witil Mr. W. Wilson, of Leicester, to give a collwe of lessons throughout the distrint at chucches witio not less than fire lells. A new bancl was formed out of the relies of the old, with some new blood adkled and undor Mr. Willson's tuition rapid progress was made. Within Year jue malled a phal of Minar in three methocls, with five of his framiland pupils completing the band.
The scorls he sowed hare borne frait. Change ringing flourishes ins erery tower he visiter, and has been lauded on to mang othere, both wittin and over the colinty border.
