## NON-RESIDENTS' SUBSCRIPTIONS.

The question of iuter-affiliation for nembers of Associa. tions has again been raised at one annual meeting, but the present is scarcely an appropriate time for putting forward this scheme, when so many organisations are contemplating an increase in the subscription of non-resident nembers. In the past a small inclusive life-membership fee for those residing outside the area of an Association has been the means whereby a large number of ringers have become members of numerous societies all ovel the country. usually on the occasions of peal ringing. This has been a very uselul source of income, and one which associations would not lightly throw over in any event. Again, the payment of a definite admission fee gives the ringer a vertain sense of direct relationship with the organisations which he joins in this way, and at close and more permanent interest in their doings than he would have uncter an inter-afliliation scheme. These arguments applied in the 'good old days ' before the war, but, in view ol present financial difficulties, inter-affiliation is less ikely to commend itself, now that executives are looking round for methods to angment the incomes. Just at the moment the priacipal question is how to provide more funds, rather than eheaper facilities for members.

Opinion seems to vary as to the effect that raising nonresident members' entrance fees is likely to have. On the one hand, it is felt that when ordinary members are having thent contributions increased, those who come in from dutside should similarly be asked to pay more. On the other hand, there is the fear that a larger tribute from che casual visitor will result in fewer life members, as many of those who wish to join for the sake of a peal will prefer to pay one annual subscription and then drop out: This difitculty might be got over by making it a rule that any ringer lixing outside the area covered by the Association should be admitted only on life membership terms, and not given the option of becoming an annual subscriber, although, we date say, many of our readers would object to the adoption of suels a course. At any rate, the question of ont-members' contributions is a rather krotty problem, and the best test as to the advisability of raising the fees against would-be members of this class will be provided by time. A seven-and-sixpenny fee, stich as proposed by the Middlesex. Association, for instance, may be considered a rather large toll to take from a man who wanes to ring just one peal with the Society, although for the man who is groing to make freguent use of his grivilege it is not an exorbitant amount to ask. It will be interesting to watch the experience of the Mieddesex Association: in this matter.
