## THE PEALS ANALYSIS.

The tabulated results of the past year's peal ringing are published to-day, and, as always, are extremely interesting. Thanks to the labours of the Central Council's Committee, the Exercise has the opportunity of seeing in compact form exactly what has been done thronghout the country, and to compare, as far as comparisons are of value, the efforts of the various Associations. The most gratifying feature of the present analysis is the evidence which it provides of the recovery of ringing from the eflects of the war. The peals, which increased in volume as the year progressed, passed the four-figure level before the end of December was reached, and, as further evidence of the revival of the art, there is the fact that peals in a variety of the higher metbods reappear in the table.

The decision of the Council to continue the publication of the analysis in alphabetical order largely robs it of official recognition of the competitive spirit, but peal ringers will scan the figures with interest to ascertain which association has the best results. The divergence of view with regard to the merit of awarding peal points is responsible for the decision of the Council, but this attitude is hardly in consonance with the adhesion to the points principle. If points are worth recording, then there can be no objection, it seems to us, to giving full recognition to the competitive spirit, and placing the associations in the table in the order of point merit. On the other hand, if the opinion is that competition in this direction should not be encouraged, then there is little velid reason for recognising points at all. The present is only a half. and-half arrangement. Granted that peal ringing in the main is really a gratification of personal ambition, and that success in this direction gives an added glory to the records of an association, there is little valid reason why the point-scoring method should not be fully accepted as the basis of the analysis, for there is no doubt that in peal ringing, as in any other pastime, the competitive spirit makes for keenness among the members. But the point system is one upon which there is never likely to be unanimity of opinion.
The report which accompanies the Analysis Come mittee's tables is, as usual, full of interesting statistics, and there is one matter to which we feel compelled to refer. The Committee complains of the late publication of certain peals. In regard to three of these we must take the blame, two reports having been overlooked, while the third, defective when originally sent in, was kept back through a misunderstanding. Having thus made open confession we hope we may be forgiven, and plead, in mitigation of punishment, the many thousands of peals which we have
