## THE REVIVAL.

To ringers generally it must have been very gratifying to notice the activity there has been up and down the country in the opening of new or augmented peals of bells it recent months. Very largely, of course, this has been due to bells erected in celebration of victory and peace, for in a large number of pariskes the provision of a memorial of this kind has appealed to the public as a type which will for all time serve as a permanent reminder of the sacrifices of this generation in the world's greatest conflict, and yet fulfil a useful purpose. In not a few cases the proposal for the bells, and the provision of one or more, has originated with the ringers themselves, specially to perpetuate the memory of fallen colleagues. The Gloucester and Bristol Diocesan Association and the Winchester Diocesan Guild are among the associations that are now raising funds for the same purpose, the former to add two trebles to increase a peal of eight to a ring of ten, and the latter to raise the bells at the Cathedral to a zing of twelve. The Peterborough Association has just decided to follow the same lead, and funds are to be raised to add one of the new bells which it is hoped to place in the Cathedral. Inspired by the sacrifice which was made by those of their nuembers who gave all for their country, the Association will doubtless raise the required sum, and thus substantially help further to emrich the mother church of their diocese.

Apart, however, from the impetus which is given. to ringing by these aumerous additions to the peals of the country, the work which has thus been created has come at a time when stimulus to the bell founding industry was vital. The war had brought bell founding practically to a standstill, but the provision of memorial bells has resuscitated the industry quickly and effectually, in spite of the heavy rise in costs, which might, under other circumstances, have proved an almost insuperable obstacle for long years to come. The foundries would, of course, have gove on without bell making; the enterprising management which is behind the firms who to-day lead the world in the bell making industry would not have collapsed because there were no bells to make-they would have made other things, as they did during the war. It is the Exercise that should be gratified that they have been able to return so successfully to their pre-war activities, and at present there is every indication that the revival, made with such unexpected rapidity, will be a lasting one. The success of the industry is inseparably wrapped up with the success of the ringing Exercise, for though one might exist without the other, it has only been-and can only be-by the continual advance of each that the limits of expansion can be widened.

## THE PEAL AT BAMEURGH, NORTHUMBERLAND

For gome yerrs the Newrestle Cathedral Guild hove contemplated ringing a 5,000 on the fine peal of bolks at Burnburgh in one of the most beautifu? and historic villages of the county, but on the outbreas of war all ringing was a copped, the result of the loyalty of the ringers who joined the rorces to a man, exuept one or two who were feyoud fighting age. No less than six members of tho Bamburgh Guild made the gupsems shcrince- n record which we doubt, any oticer guild of rimgers in the oountry ern equal. The bells are by Mesrs and Stainbank, augmenfed from two old bells to four, then to six, and finally to eight in 1913. All this was corried out by the onergy and interest of tho Fieqr himself, the Rev. F. Willinms, who is not only a ringer but has taken to himsolf the task of raising a new bancl of wingers to fill the place of the old Guild, so terribly deplebed by war.

While the peal was going on, the other members of the Guild, and folly of the ludieg who honoured the event by their presence, were taken rownd the church, whieh dates back to the loth century, and were mudh inderested in the beautiful and artistio monument to Grace Darins, who liea buried in this ancient and romantie churchyard which ovgrlooks the soence of her heroic elforts in saving so many lives from tho good slip Farfarshire, in 1847 when she and her fal her were in charge as the lighthouse on the outer Fern Islands.
By kind pelmission of the present oonupath, Mm. Pease. the visilprs were allowed in intorior mataintambe with the keep of the grand old feudal oastle of Bamburgh which shands like a grim sentinel, guarting the shores and ishands round nbout. Thon they had tea at the Crowo Arms Eotel, and leff lify motor to catch, the finst train to Newcustle at 4.50 y.m.
The Vicar himself Kindly made all the arrandernents, and also sent his own ear to meet the train a't Belford, four milos awny, at 8.36 a.m 3 yery welcome serwice which all appreciated as the party had to lenve Newerstle os carly as 6.20 a .m.
Mr. Edmumd Williams, the Vimers son, kindly photogaphed the bind who rang in the parl at the church door, and promised to have the photo phaced bolow the peal boad. which the Ficar has generonsly promisod to have crectod in tho belfir to commemorate the firsi 5,000 on the bells.
