## DEBATABLE PROPOSALS.

Last week we referred to two of the motions which are to come Defore the Central Council next Tuesday, and which, we think, are likely to meet with approval in principle. It is not sd certain that the two other resolutions-one already on the agenda and one which may be brought forward by sanction-will commend themselves so readily to the approval of the members, The first of these proposals is that the Analysis Committee be asked to arrange, if possible, that each peal be credited to the Association in whose territory it is rung. Without going into the question as to whether this would be an advisable course or not, one can foresee difficulties in the way of the practical application of such a proposal. The most obvious are the obstacles that arise in areas covered by more than oneSociety, and the trouble that may arise through the men who ring the peal not being members of the Society in whose area they are ringing. Suppose, for instance, a peal is rung at St. Andrew's, Holborn, to whom should it be credited-to the College Youths, the Cumberlands, the Middlesex County Association and London Diocesary Guild, or the London County Association? Or again, if a band from Birmingham pay a visit to Norwich, and none of them happen to be members of the Norwich and Ipswich Association, is the peal to be counted as a Norwich peal? We do not know what the Council will say, but, subject to the enlargement of the idea by the proposer, the suggestion on the face of it scarcely seems practicable.

The proposal which Mr. Pulling hopes to have the opportunity of bringing forward, is framed with the object of inducing all associations to bold their annual meetings within the space of three months before the meeting of the Council. We think Mr. Pulling will have to advance some strong arguments if he is to persuade the Council to interfere with the internal arrangements of the individual associations. At present, each association fixes its annual meeting to suit the convenience of its members and not the convenience of the Council; and while anything that would increase interest in the doings of the Council would be all to the good, there are, in some cases, local circumstances which would prevent the adoption of a date just prior to Whitsun. Then, too, there are some associations so little concerned in the doings of the Council, that the Council is seldom if ever mentioned at their meetings except when triennial election of representatives takes place. Associations such as these would not be in the least concerned to nake a change. If Mr. Pullen could, by his motion, galvanise wider interest in the Council among the Associations, he would serve the Exercise a good turn, and we hope, when be comes to move his resolution, that he will have some useful advice to give on this point.

The resolution of the Council anthorising the work of this Com mittee is as follows:-
"That the Central Council compile and keep up to date an
offind list of the first Penl and longent Peat in cacla Method and on each number of beils.'
Yonr commitue bave noted the suggestion that "progrtasive lengtiss. should be included in the list, and also the apmoval of the suggestion by the author of the resolution, Eand have aecardingly ventured so far to extend the terms of reforence.

Very early in our efforts we were fHoB mitl the difficulty of insuffciency of sources of information. Many such are only 10 b foumd in the British Museum, and weve out of reach. Similurly ap were the private rectris of the Ringing Focieties and Associations. Wre hopet for an edequate rasponse to the appeal fur claims to first performancea made in "The Ringing World ' lasia June, but were disappointed. Our joint possessions of the old bonkg aftorded us only limiter assistance. Wo felt it to be necessary to search throuph the files of "Church Bells * and 'Campanology,' hut were quite at a lons to know whero to find Either, nor had either of us a completeset of the "Bell Niews.' Under such eireumatances we felt it mould be ndyinable to confiue tho field of cearch to modern limes. Two facts contributed in Feading tus to thidecision: frat, a reference made by the auther of the reonlution to the satisiacfory claracter of the similar wort of the late Mr. Jinper W. Snmporon in connection with the Sfandurd Methots: and, ercond, an axpression of his opinion that ' لhe majn thing mos is to enteh the newer records before they are lost, auk humt an the older ones later.'
We have accordingly made the time mached im Mr. Snowdon's records oul reneral staring-point. Even thougls frmited, the inquiry haproved to the such as to make it impossible in the timo aritathle to collect and inchude all the details retimired. We bare not taeon ablee.g., to deal with the lianduell performances as thoroughty as we wished-the information now submitted pertaing principally to wreater lengths. We have not renturen evern to touch Mjuor and Doubles peals. Perhaps it is better we hnve not. For we liase felt thm diffculdy of deciaing how to deal with them: or whother it is possibte to deal with them ad all.
Generally speabing, if may be unflersoon that dach performance in the list carries the claim to lee the "firsh" $\mathrm{nt}^{\text {t }}$ "greatist." Respertine"
some, the claim is qualified by such expressions as ' supposed to be, or "Lelfeved to he, or ' on record."
We have corsidored it to be outaide our provinge to sotble-even if it were possible-bonficting claims to 'firei' Derformances. In caseg where such conflict oxists we have included both performances.

Dlficulties connected with nomenclakure have presented thernselves. Wo have concinded that Doublo Oxford Hob and Double Oxford Court Bob are idpntical.

For the present wo submit the resulds of our efforts in tabular form. Hut when the listi is brought up-to-dinte each method on euch uumber of bells will require a separate page. Fach record performance in the methof canld be entered as in the present lrat. We think it adpisable that a plain lead of the method shouk also bs included, and the nuggestion bas also pased between ut that the composition of oach peal should be entered as well. Whether the inclusion of thesm details comes within the Council's view of the 'official list 'we are nncertain. An expression of opinion would the helpful.

Our work repreanta a enreful searel through betweon 30 and 40 wolanies of "Boll News, and exversl of 'The Ritying World.' Ohviously it is t.60 much even to hopo that what we now submit is correct, in all respects. Yet to be of real value it ghould be. We sugnest, therefore, the advisabality of publiching the list with an invitation to the Fxercise to examine it and point out the errors,

We venture to hespeak the co-omeration of the Exercise in the cantimuance of the wark. Your committee would find it of grear anvantage to he in passession of the Council's authority to eppera in its name to each Association to authoriso its secretary to furnish infromation respecting jts claims to first and greatest performances. For the work of your committee, and most likely for other purposes, the addition of a completes set, ast far ra possible, of the anaual reports af all Asenciations and Guilds, to the Council's lihiary, woutrl he of great value and assistance. We also ask the Council to consider the advisability of including in the committee someone residing within easy rench of the British Musemm, to underiake that pari of tha work which can only he tone thero.

We conclude our repart with is grateful acknowletgment of the kinditess of those gentlemen who responded to the ampeal for information made last Jume, and of those who 7 jr gift and loan of volumes of " Rell News." alnge mado it possible for us to obtain the greater portion of the durticuliars we now submit.

HENRY JOHNSON'S TOMBSTONE 'CO BE IRENOVATED
The juta cuartarly moeting for the year of the St. Martiu's Guil.I for the Diocese of Birmincliam was held at Aston all Saturday, April 30th, and, as is usurl when meetings are held at this faveurite tower, was well nttended. The 15 th century wower of Aston Church las been a happy hunting-ground for ringers for consinderably more than a hundred years, as its ancient records tell, and severul old ft. Martin's Youtlas I lies at rest in the beautiful old churchyard, including the immortal Henry Johnson. Fhomas Reymolds and Jomes Jones art also buried here, the latter having passed away only a few aonchy ago, while tho former, who at the time of his death had rumg more peals of Stedman Cinques than any obther man, was "rung to his last deep, in 1912. One feals it is atways a duty, when at Aston, to visit the greves of these. Youths, and to spare e momeni from the bustle of the present to surver the past and what has been. And it is not awnys a fisul duty, for someone is almost certain to recall an anecdote or two which, instead of cending to tears, lead on to laugliter, and we bave it feeling tbal our old friends would rather haye it that way if they Enew-which, perlaps, bley do. On Saturday, then, it was ggreed that the lettering on Henry Johnson's tombstone ouglit to be regidt or blacked in, as may be actised by an expert, anal it was de cided that it thould be dome, The inscription, which is deeply in cised, reads as follows:

This Stone is prected by the Ringers of England
in grateful memory of

## graleful memory of HENRY JOHNBON,

To whose ability and pelseverance the Art of
Gbange Ringing is widely indebted.
Borlz at Lichfeld, Feb, 28th, 1609 , died at Aston, Jall. 7til, 1890. Whatsoever thy halud Incteth to do

> Do it with thy might.'

The stone itself js in an excellent state of preserration, quite as god as when it was erected, but the atmosplaere of Aston has seriously afrected the gilding of the letters, which is not to be wondered at. It would affect anything. It reeks of the smell of all sorts of thiogs that are manulastured, and some that are fried-with chips. Of the mantifactured things, beer is perhaps the mredominant note, Astan laing II sort of imitation Burton-on-Trent, haring almost as many brewories, fut, thank goodness, not nealy so many level crossings!

One of the said hreweries is right next to the Vicarage garden, and the Vicar, the Rey. Canon Cole, remarked that if anyolle present did not happen to bo a teetataller be had only to take a walk round his garden, when he would, by taking long sniffs, be able to fill himself without going to a ' honse,' and that it would be cheapor, too. It was said that several members went for a stroll in the pleasaunce, but tound it rather * mild." The writer of these notes reminded Caran Cole that this condition of things was guite in accorlauce with fradition, as there wero several men in the room who rememisered when the two churchwridens ware brewer and malizter respectively.

Tea was mroviled in the Vicarage Rooms (not in the garden), the wardens, Mesms. Fhilifps and Poole very generously defrayiog the cost.

At the husines, meeting which followed, Mr. Alderman Pritehet proposed a very hearty vote of thanks to the Vicar for the use of his bells, room and garvien, to the wardens for wo kindly providing tea, and to the ladies fon whiting at table.
In reply, Canon Cole said how pleased he was to welcome the St. Martin's Guild to his tower. He appreciated very mucls the wort thet his ringers did Sunday by Sunday, and he wished them to know that though iner were out of sight, they wers recognigerl as dofing a good Dhristian work. He honed the Guild would make their risit an annual nine.

## PEAL REPORTS．

## EXPLANATION OF AN ERROL：

An elucidation of one of the errors that crept into a peal report last year，and was reforred to in the Analysic Committee＇s report in uri issue of April 29th，comes from Mil．Mi．Hoare，of Nem Fletton． The committeo romark：＇Amogg ather evidently incorrect statements， we find is peal of Minor which is said to consist of＂two EWO＇s of St． Clement＇a，and iwo 520＇s of Plain Boh．${ }^{\text {T }}$ ．I feel sure，＇seys Mr． Hoare，that this refers to a peal thal I conducted at Woodston， Peterthorough，on August 30th，1920．tife xeport of which I sent to＂The llinging Worid．＂This wes publiched exnclly as I neai it，with one propption，the word＂two＂was used instead of the figure＂2．＂In my roport I said：＂A weal of Minor， 5.040 clanges，cte．，consisting of 2，520 changets of \＄t．Gloment＇s Boh and 2,520 changes of Plain Bob．＂ It apneared as two 520＇s，ete．I called the rast of the band＇s atten－ tion to its not lreing publizhed as 1 sent it，and we were under the impression it was a missprint，and I left it nt that．That is where I made a mistake．I might say that was the second peal that I bad conducted，and，as we are not old hands，and do not ring peals once 4 week，I make this anology for a mistake．＇Mr．Toare a．dds that the real was a goofl one，and owing to the very bad gas that we were getting at that time，it was a ceedit to tho band for geting through it succestifully．
Thus，onco thore the printer must hake the blame．The thing that we wonder at most is not that ruistakes creep in，but that there are not a breat many more．Iri the case of the peni ai wordston the ＂eopy＂was uritieu as Mr．Hoare explains，lyut there are very many instances whin there would be every excuse for error：
We would suggest to corrcinondenis that when writig out reports of neals for fublicatiou they slowld th so willa a colly of＂The Ring－ ing World，before them，so that they can see exactly the particulars that should he given，and the fom in which they shath appear．This would often save the omission of eswential details．

## WESTBURY BELLS．

## A GlREAT RJSTORATION SCHEME．

A．scheme to make the bells of the Parish Church of All Saints， Wextbury，Wilts，one of the finest rings of eigit in the country has been adopted by tie parishioners．It had leen decided to rehang the old six，recasting 1 wo of the holls and auding two new trebles．The hells were sert to the Inoughtorough Foundry，but it was found by Messes．Taylor and cos，that ithe bells were so much ont of tune that it would be impossible to make al gatifiactory job without recasting ine whole six，and they submited two schemes，viz．：（a）To reusist tho old six hells plus two new trebles to a weight，of approximately 125 cwt ． Tonor 34 cwt ： C ＇Niatural ；（1）The canue with the excepiou，weight ajproximately 110 cNt ．Teror 30 ewt．Key＇ C ＇sharp or－D．
The fium＇s original report and estimate dink not emborly such drastic resronation，but merely suggesied that only two of the＝is bells needed recasting．Fortunately，or unfortunately，or perlups hoth，they found that no bell was true or enpable of heing unade of truc harmonies an ils present condition．A cieputarion was，therefore，smint to the foun－ dry，cansisting oi：Jher．F．Ll．Edwards，hon，racretary of the Salis－ bury Diocesan Guild：Mr．J．W．Washorrok，of Manchister：and Mr． E．H．Arnold．lion．sereetary of the lestoration Fund，the object being to go into the matter ou the spot，to see if stuet drastic action as recommended by the firm was absolutely necessary，and，if so，to report as to whicly of the two schemes that were put forward was
the more suitatje in all mapects．The deputation visited the works the more suitatule in all mespects．The deputation visited the works
on April 6ith，and dufy submited their report to a sulsectuent meet－ ing of the parishioners
This report stated：After close scrutisy and careful masideration we heg to submit to your committec she following report on Westbury hells：（1）We are satisfied that mo satisfactory resull could be ob－ tained without recasting whe six old hells，and we recommend that all the six be recast and tuned on modern principhts；（2）if there be
anr serious clificulty in raiping ite sum requirea for the more costly sclieme，the committee need have no hasitaion it accepting that for $a$ ring of 8 with tenor 30 cwt ．in C ，or evon $\mathrm{D}_{\text {；}}$ it would make a fine and very musical peal，and a handy weight for ringing：（3）at the same
time such a ring would not cexupy any position of prominence in the time such a ring would not cxupy any position of prominence in the leur and a depth of lone that would lend，to render westbury bells amous thronghont the south－West of England：（4）ako there may be dasirg at same future date to aupment the 8 bells to 10 ．In that rafe it would be a great advantage to lanve the heavier teror in ：$C$ ．
Thanth this point may appar sonmewal remato and nroblematical We suggest that the committer wili be well advisell to take it into consideration．
The parishioners adopted the larger acheme．and Westhurs should shorlfy ine the proud passuseor of one of the filiest peals of eight in the cotintry．

A sum of $£ 300$ is still nemiled to comblete the work，ant an earnest nnenl is made to nill ringers for help，so that the heils may he opened froe of debt．Mr．F．II．Arnold，of 4，Church Tertace，West－ bury is the hon．secretary．

## THE VOICE OF THE LEADER.

## I and the Good Shepherd, St. John 1.11.

Thee relation of God to His clitidrea is portrayed in that of the shepherd to his sheep. Communities of mankind ute thus described without any disparagement to the indivictials of which each community is composed. Communities are in dire need of leadership, and the idea of leadership runs through the parable of the Good Shepherd. The parable is a by pe of the world. So long as there is harmony everything works smoothly; but this cannot be if either leadership or followers are at fault. Today the difficulties though which the industrial world is passing, and the apparent confusion which has resulted from them, has been accentuated by the defects in the qualities of the leaders; different voices have spoken to different groups, and misunderstandings have arisen in consequence -and the groups have lost touch. The two talities of good leadership are honesty of purpose ant fidelity to the end, and this is where the message of the hells comer in. They spear not only to individuals, but to the whole community gathered up in corporate life. In then we seem to hear the voice of the Good Shepherd, the one great and true leader of men whoa lived and died for men and never let men astray. He spoke in the Sermon on the Mount. in His death upon the Cross, and in His resurrection, hot only to individual men, but to all men gathered together in a corporate motherhood. Have we given Christ the same obedience as other leaders? Are our leaders guider by His principles? Hare they the interests of their followers at heart? Are they ready if need be to die for them? Eternal lore is the key. Until we learn to love one another, we shall meter learn to live wits one another in peace. Than bolls, to those who can hear the message, are the voice of Him who was the leader of men. What kind of followers are we? How far do we stine to follow His example? Are our hearts with Him? To our purpose honest? if not. our service is merely coll full formal; we do not hear the Shepherd's voice, we are mot the true followers He would have us le.
