## ASSOCIATIONS AND THE COUNCIL.

No fewer than ten of the principal associations hold general meetings next week-chiefly on Easter Monday and two or three others will follow with similar gatherings of members before the end of the month. We sball be interested to see whether any single question is raised at these twelve or more gatherings-which include meetings of some of the leading ringing organisations-that will provide anything for the Agenda of the Central Council. Very seldom indeed does an association sead a resolution to the Council for consideration, which seems to be viewed as a body apart, instead of being treated as an integral and, indeed, a pivotal part of ringing organisation. When ringers speak of the Central Council, they not infrequently refer to it as a more or less useless body, apparently oblivious of the fact that it should be their business to make it a live wire in the constitution of the Exercise. Ringers must, at least, have some ideas as to the manner in which the Council could be of service, and they ought not to hesitafe to ventilate these views in their own associations, so that the subjects could go eventually to the Couacil for consideration and decision.

Up to the present, we believe, there are no notices of motion for the Conncil's Agenda for the Lincoln meeting, but the forthcoming association general meetings ought to be able to, and we hope will, provide suitable topics for debate at the Whitsun gatbering. The absence of any such resolutions does not mear that the Council will have no business to transact ; indeed, there is always a considerable amount of work provided for the members from inside the Council, such as the reports of the Committees. At the same time it would show that the Council's position as the hub of the Exercise was more widely realised if, from the initiative and interest of the rank and file of the ringing organisations, subjects of general interest could be sent up.

What all those who have the wider interests of ringing at heart desire to see, is a closer community between the Council and the associations; and in this there is room for advance by the Council itself, as well as by the affiliated bodies. One step which we hope will be taken at the next meeting of the Council is so to amend the constitution that the Council will thereafter officially communicate its busingss to the associations after each meeting. At present it is left' to the representatives to report to their associations, and if an association happens not to be represented, or to be represented by someone who is unable to attend the meeting of his own association afterwards, nothing comes officially before the association as to any decision taken. There is, of course, the report of the pro-

As things at present stand, none of the decisions are communicated through the officials, and this could easily nultify to a large extent the work of the Council.

## BRISTOL-AN ANALYSIS.

By A. YORK-BRAMBLZ
From time to time there arises a controversy on the subject of the extension of this or that particular methof. Many variations are praduced, some obviously 'foreign,' others appareatly ' native.' There follows a great division of opinion, and, as a resuli the inevitable shelving of the question until some leter expression of view opens it up again. Now what is the causo of this failure to reach an incantrovertible decision? Apparently it is that the principles underlying the construction of the method have not been debermined. Now, in the absenco of a statement, by the original author of a method, as to what constituted his principles of construction, we are left to adopt a. retrograde process; and from the original example of the application of his general principles of congtraction, we bave to dotermine whet those principles were. Failure to apply this gracess logically and mathematicalily leads to the discovery of-well, not the basic principles; but a means of producing a so-called extension ' of that original example of "method." But the basic principles, once determined will provide the truly 'scientific ' extension of the method upwards; acd will be such that, if properly expressed, they will eaable the novice to produce extensions (true) forthwith, and without dificulty. Further, if any so-cailed 'extensioy, be found to vary from what these basic primeiples produce for us, then it cannof be the extension proper. Before proceeding with our investigation for these principles in the particular case of "Bristot," however (as is our intention) it will be advisable to make quite sure of our ground up to this point; although wo may be stating nothing really new' in so doing.
First of all, then, what do we understand by a method? It is gensrally accepted that a method is a modifed form of "principle,' in which one unit has a simple ' path, (the treble-either plain inut or T.B. hunt) while all tho ather units have the game (and a more complex) path. But what, after all, is a 'principle' (e.g., Stedman) to this sense? It is simply a practical way of expressing certain mathematical facts regarding the Laws of Permatation; by means of changed orrier of sounds in the belfry, and by a graphical representation in eymbols on paper. All the units to be permuted, or changed in successive order, obey the same 'regulations (except that in the case of a 'mothod 'proper one unit, ' The Treble,' has a regular and symmetrical path; in relation to which, the complexities in the paths of the other units stand definitely fixed). Hence it is that ituese 'regulations: may be expressed, in general form relatively to the position of the "exempt ' unit (the Treble bell) amongst the other units (the working bells); or, in the case of the principle proper, relatively to the remurrence of cerbain well-defined features. These regulations ra ay be framed and raried at the will of the mathod-buifler; his only restrictions being those conventions which are laid down in the 'Rules and Decisions,' as published by the Centrul Council. Thus it is clear that a "method ' is simply a cartograpfical representation of the behaviour of certain processes of mathematical permutation. when those processes are modified and restricted: (a) by certain universally accepted conventions: and (b) by variations introduced at certain relatively fired points, at the will of the method builder. These may be called his "Principles of Construction
Our mext point for consiceration is as to what is meant by extemsion." First of all wo must find out mhether that which we wand to extend is in itself already an extension or not, of something yel nore elementary. Investigation, on the lines indicated below, will Immediately give us our answer to this question; and thus it is that wo can detormine, eventually, the simplest (or elementary) form of expression of the 'prinejples of construction' on which the methor is founded. In proceeding towards our conclusions we must be careEul wo test. step by step, the geveralisations which we are deducing; even to the extent of their restricted application when the working of the "exempt' unit (the Treble bell) is modified from T.B. hunt to piain hunt. In fine, the generalised laws will, when determined, inatantly produce any extension of the method, subject to the payiag of due regard to the adjustment of relative worting positions ans to the admission of naturail 'developmental' features.

We are now face to face with the consideration of the thind, and, perhaps nost wital point; that of the distinction botween modes of extension in relation to (a) 'Single, methods and (b) "Double* methods, Again let us make quite certain of our ground. Let us examine carefully our instrument of expression-commoniy called a lead '-lat us dissect and label its component parts; and incidentails. aiscover their intar-relationship. For purposes of illustration Iet us take the lead of is Major T.B. hunt method. Now each lead is marked off from jts neighbours at the "foremost a positions of the "regulating' unit or treble bell. This "foremost " or deading position accupies two rows of symbols, the upper being the lastr row of the 'Tead, above; and tize lower being the first row of the lead below Thus the division between the leads occurg between these two rows:

Grandsire Triples appears in the list frelve times, and while some of these preals are noted to show progress by new ringers we strongly recommend members not to cense their offorts at this method. The fifteen Minor penls are divided into five classes, but one of these classes continins eight peals of Boh Hincr. The number of bolls, of course, prevents progress heyond Minor, but on six bells there are many excellent methods to be rtulg ; in fact, it is anl open question whether Minor ritgers have put a better chance of progress towards the best metholls than Major ringers.'

As there is certain to be a large mumber of Wuohes for publiention after the Ereter Festival, we hope those responsiblo for sending in these reports will do so on Monday. Only those which reach us on Tuesday morning can be guarauteed insertion. Reporta of peals rung on Monday should also be posted the game night.
Next Fridey is the anniversery of the existing Treble Twelve recond, which was rung at Ashton-undor-Lyue on April 17th, 19:1. The peal was 12,240 in the Kent varinkion, composed and conducted by Mr. Sam Wood. The tenor was rung by Mr. James George, and the time was 8 hre. 31 ming.
It was on the same day of the month, but in the year 18e0, that a prewious long length of Keut Troble Twelve was ruvg. Then known ac, New " Treble Bob, 7,200 was brought round at St. Martin's, Birmingham, in 5 lus. 8 mins.
The long peal of Doulble Norwich at Romford in 1894, to which we have recently referred in these columms, was rung ou April 18th, so that the anniversary falls on Tuestay next. This 13,440 was rung in 8 hrs .16 mins. after an attempt about thee weeks previously ut Brentford, when a rope broke after more than 13,000 changes had been rung.
Only two members of the band, we believe, survive. Messes. Ben Foskett, the 'father' of the Cumberlands, and $\mathrm{Mr}^{\text {, Fedrin Bernett, }}$ sear. The fatter writes to point out that the peal was not composed by Mr. Heury Dains, ns we mentioned, but by Mr. Georgo Newsan, Who also conducted it from the tonor.
Many long peals bave been rung at the famons Painswick tower, and one of the earliest was on April 18tir. 1737-a i2,006-GFanteire Oaters, in 7 hiss. 55 mins.

It was on April 18th, 1916, that Sir Arthue Herwood died.
The first peal of Cumberland Exereise Major was ruus on April 16th, 1838-5,600 at Birstall, Yorks.
Thal promising foung riuger, Mr. Alivert E. Norman, of Birmingham, has callerl a peal of Stedman Cinques on handbells at the firat attempt. He is only 19 years of age, nad his ringing performances already include many peals in the bigler metheds up to Cambridge Maximue.

Wo understand that a long pael of Stedrabu Caters (21,000 changes is to be attempted at Appleton an April 2Znd, but at tho time of writing no offial notification of this attempt upon the existivg record has been received.

## NEW METHODS

## To the Editor.

Sir- Fou mention in yout last issue that I might fave carried my analysis further and pointed aut the defects of Superlative, Cambridge and London. There is no need to do that, as they are too well known.
Superlative has always been considered the most musical Surprice method on eight bells, and certainly no method has ever been found to equal it, the only fault is the second and third cannot be kegt away from the teror. This lithle defect is, howber outweighed by its musical qualities everywhere else,
As regaris Cambridge, it is the mast perfect Surpinse method ever producerl. It has only one fault, and that is its smali scope for compor sition. It does not, at any rate, have pairs of bells lying stil] in 5-6, and it has an advantage that no other Surprisa method posresses; it will extend to any number of bells without fatroducing any adulteration, and the more you extend it the more attractive it be cantes.
Lonaion has always been called onmusical, and it certainly is rot to be companed to the others, from a musical point of riew, but for intricacy it has never been beaten. It is still the most difficult of all Surprise methods, and will come to grief quicter than Bristol or any of tho new methods. These methods have almays been popular, and will probably be as popular a hundrad years bence as they are to-day.
$\Lambda_{s}$ regards yonr remarks about these methods not having a clear proof scale, you cannot always expect a clean proof scale in all Surprise methods. What I object to is this: in Eristol you have a most musical and attractive method, aud none of the work is long enough to become monotonous, but such methods of Guildford. Suffolk, Premier aud Dublin, are aothing more or less than Brisiol adulterated, and all are very much inferior. It is unfair for riagers to be criticised because they da not fee] disnosed to ring them.Yours, etc.,

## STANDARD METEODS FLRST

Dear Sir, While being entirely in agrement with the idea expressed in your leading article of March 31st. I wisl you had added - when opportunity rrises. My experience Las beer that bands will launclz out in offer mothods when they have rung up to London. We have seen that in many cases but you cannot expect men to learn a new Surprise method before they ring the standard ones, so that they may be able to ring at meetings. Your remarla as to scoring of peals does not, I think, apply generally. No doabt other conrluctors, like myself, do not always ring just what they would like to. I have rung nearly 100 peal $l_{5}$ of Grandsire Tyiples "in hand,' but $I$ hope the Exercise does not think I sit down just to score a peal, or that I nerer want to ring anything else besides Grandsire. When you have taught people to ring "ib hand," you caneot turiu round and say. 'I have ruag enougli and do not want to ring any more Grandsire.' To me persomally (as much ag I should like to ring other mothods) it does not matter what it is, so loug as it advances niy friends and gires them pleasure, but when the opportumity arises We shall get out of the rut.- Yours, cic.

We sav lasu weak that Treble Bol is derivel directly from tho Plan Hunting Course by causing whe bell in the hunt to nuke second's placo and leturn to lead. When we come to Cambridge Surpriso we have to deal with a cotally diftorent wriangement. There is no 'lyeble Bolu Priuciple upon am even uumber of bells, bectuse the resule of the first dodge is to brimg the bolle round ngain, but if we try Treble Bob on odd unmbers we immediately get the Principle shown by the lisures at the side:
Now exanime this courte, aud you will notice that when the bells in front dodge the bells belnod hunt, and when the bells in front lunt the bells lisebing dodge
Add a working bell to this and let the treble be the bell
in the lusa and keep the rule as applied to the treble.
Whan the treble dodges every other bell shall hunt if it possibly can, and when the treble humts every other bell shall dodge if. it poncibly can, and we get:
Now this cot a regular metbod, but we can make it 50 if We allow two more belis to dodge when the freble dowges in the middle. Let 3 and 5 dodge at the hack when the treble is in the midde, and we Jave just lrall alead of Cambridge.

This gives us the rule for Cambridge Stuprise on all even numbers from six bells upwards. Whan the treble dodges, every other belf hunts efcept the two heils hehind when the twohle is rolging next to them, and when the treble hunts avery other bell dodges if it poseibly can. Now, nof only will

Wliy have not the bell hagers before now contrived some method of lockim the beils when they are feft up? In such a case as 3 . Powell when the ringer is obliged to climb among the bells for the pinpose of untying a clapper, the danger of jalling from the frame eme pullisg a tall off the balance would then be avoided.
'The locks couta be operated by a lever from the belfry, which would lift the lock from the "stay" ready for riggiug
