## SUBJECTS FOR THE COUNCIL.

Little time remains now for notice to be given of any motion to be brought before the Central Council at Whitsun, and any subject which members desire to discuss must quickly be in the hands of the Hon. Secretary, or it will be too late for inclusion in the agenda. Weare pleased to see that our endeavours to bring home to the various affiliated associations the importance of taking a more active interest in this matter has not been entirely without result, as, from the reports of the Easter meetings which have been published, there bave been some few matters veatilated which may find their way into the agenda of the Council.
For instance, two subjects were brought up for discussion at the Midland Counties Association meeting. One of them was before the Council last year, but no action was taken on account of the absence of the proposer. This motion is to come on again, and deals with the desirability of establishing a bell restoration fund in the area of each ringing association. Another proposal is a suggestion to award certificates of mesit in method ringing. At the Herts County meeting tie benevolent fund scheme was once more brought forward, although this is a subject in which the Council have been rather shy to take action in the past. At the Worcestershire Association's meeting it was suggested the Council should discuss the test means of preventing the ringing or publication of false peal compositions. Here are subjects of general interest to all ringers which the Council could proftably debate, whatever the ultimate decisions upon them might be.

At the moment we are not concerned with the pros and cons of any of these matters, but what we do feel is that this raising of questions which go outside the purely domestic affairs of ringing organisations mist, in the long run, be for the good of the Exercise at large. The Central Council is established in the interests of ringing generaily, and it is for the affiliated societies to see that it fulfils its functions. Hitherto, as we have so often pointed out, associations have been content to leave the Council to find work for itself, instead of giving it work to do. We hope that the action of the three associations mentioned is but a prelude to a wider and mors direct interest in the business of the Council. We have al ways felt that, instead of sitting still and criticising the Council for an absence of usefulness, it would be far better if ringers, through their societies, provided the Council with matters to which it might devote its attention; and while we bave done our best to move the Council out of the sterile condition into which it was falling, we have always urged that the most effective means of increasing its utility lay with the associations 1 who elect it.

A reprint of thie diagrams of Snowdon's 'Stundard Methods 'Has now been completed, and can be obtained (price 1s. Gd.) from Mrs. Laura Snowdon, Gartmel, Lancaskire. Tho complete work (letterpress and diagrams) can bo bad for 28.10 d .
Ou May 5th, in 1817, of peal of 12,312 Titum Grandsire Ceters, "the greatest achievement of change ringing in England by ten men only (as the tablot, recorus), was rung at Painswick in 7 hours 44 minuten. Except for one of the band, who tied at the age of 50, all thig eempany lived to a ripe old age, one, Giles Manafibld, resching neary a century. Of the rest three passed 70 years, and five exceeded aighty years.
The first peal of Gramsiro Bob Maximus was rieg at Southwark on Monday, May 7tl, 1792, by tho Cumberlund Youths. It was called Sy John Reeves, and William SLupway took part in it. A poal of 5,040 in the method was rung on Juno 12th, 1815, at Birmingham, sud chaimed to be the first in the matlod, but Jasper Snowdon's inwestigntions brought the earlier and longer peaf to ligit.
In 1777, on May 10th, the Cumberlands rang 10,200 Troble How Royal in 7 hours 40 minutes, at Shorediteh. This was one of the peala which figured in the rivalry between the society and the College Youths fol the lorgest length.
May 11 the is the annivergary of the 14,112 London Surpriae Mejor record, rang in 8 hours 40 minutes at King's Norton, iti 1903.
On May 5tb, 1887 , the first perl in the coundy of Dorset was rung at St. Mary's, Bridport.
Sunday mext is the 34 th anniversary of the, 10,176 of Kent Theble Bob Major, rung at Foxeerth, Essex, on Hay 7th, 1888, in 5 hour 55 minates, It was composed by w. Harrison, and condueted by Charles Sillitoe. Dees this peal still stand is the Treble Bah recont in the ounty of Esser?

## TEE LONG PEAL AT APPLETON.

$A_{5}$ one of the few ringers who had tho priviloge and great pleasure of hearing the last two hours of tho long peal on the lovely leells at Appleton, may I add a few words to what wilt surely be eaid by others more anpable.

First, I think it was unfortunate that, probatily owing to short notice, the reabons for whicin we were toll, so few ringers were premont from a distanee, only about a dozen, besides twice as many local enthusingts being in the rillage. Moreover. I think it was a pity thet some competent ringer was not engaged and provided with the peal figure, 3 or 4 meais, and a comfortabje neat near by, and so lave furnighed the Exercise with a reliable witness of this great performanes.

As a mere listemer, I shotill like to say how greatiy I was impressed with the wonderful regularity and real excellence of the gtriking during the last two hours' ringing, when one might reasonably be expacting to hear-if not auy mistakesat least gome belf lagging. Not so, but according to careful tests by the second hand of my wateh exactiy 29 changes to the minute were being ralled of with wonder[n] procision, and the course ends came up in grandi style. As a smalif matier of mathemnties it will he seen that if 29 changes per miaute had been the speed throughoul the peal the time rould have been 12 jours and 13 minuteg, but the time being 12 hours and about 25 minutas, the averge speed was it frulion under e8t clanges per minute, so that in the last. 'lap' at 29, the apeet was just above the aversge.

It was remarkable to see tho keen interest in the peal takan by all one mee in thig old ringing village. Some worthy rustic remarked. "I thinks thay be gwain to get un this time., and the reply from anotlier. "I lopes thay "ull too, showed that the parishionerg were followilg the ringing with earnest interest.

At a quarter to 8 p.m., the welcome result was known by rounde coming up and tapper off as though the peal was startine, and, then n a moment, b clean stand.' Cheers and hatid clapping from a mised crowd rown the tower door followed the slout of "alf right' from the belfry, and more for each man as lo came ontaide-the grastest being given to the local temorman, the naxt to the worthy conduetor.
Al] of them showed signs of severe strain, but really much less tonn one might have expected to Eec, and they went off to sees refresliment without any persuasion or assistance.

Well done, Langdon.' The beat credit is due to you and jour worthy bant?. It wif a masterful performance, worthy of record for all thme. and who Elalt say' We will beat it '?

Sir, - Mr. Barber says my letter of the 7th April is not very encouraging to a progressive band. I fail to see where any progress is mede when you go from Brisiol to Preaier, for, if anylijus, Premier is simpler than Bristol to ring. He aays in Bristol you get 5-5 at Home for three leads; in Premier you get them for three courses. You can have 5-6 at home three courses in Bristol if you like. I have called peals of Bristol with the 6th 12 courseg at home, but you cennot get the music that you get out of lon courses, The mugic comes roost with the large bells bebind. He amuses me when he eays Bristol is monotonous with too many calle. If he takes my advies he wil! think a little arore before writing again. I do not think I gan Wrong when I say he bas called peals of Forward. Duffeld, Eria and Double Superiative, and if you can find fout methods thet are more monotonous than these, I should like to see them. They are nothias but calls. If you do get six calls in 9 leads, with $2 \mathrm{~W}, 2 \mathrm{H}, 2 \mathrm{M}$, in Bristol, the work behind during thai time is shared by six diferent bells; there are fot1" different kinds of work, and you "gat plenty of musje, whereas in Double Superlative you are crowding two bobs into a lead, and while you keep doing it, the troble is saudwiched between the bame two bells and spoilitg the mathod in the bargain.
have never get heard any ringer say lie got tiredi of the back work of Bristol, and I have rung peals of Bristol with a great number of ringers. I do not think I aut wrong when I say Mr. Barber's knowledge of Bristol is limited, as I believe, witing from memory, the peals of Bristol he has rung can be cotnated on the fingera of one hand. I evideatly hit the nail on the hew when I said these methods only appealed to those who jumped at unything that is fresh, and E know he was alvays inclined to do that. He is welcome to continus, $a_{s}$ far as $I$ am ooncerned; but there is no need for others to be criticised because they do not feel disposed to do the came.

In reply to Mr. Holdsworth, I may say I have not seen Northampton recently, and almosf forget what it was like, but I have glways ccanned those new methods pretty closely, and I do not think I ghould hame missed it had it been so intricate. As to it being in class 10 , 1 should not pay much attention to that. I should be loth to fall in with the way points are given for methods. Some of them are abnolutely ridiculous. I have had enough experience at Surprise Methods to know which are the most difficult. Without being guided by the Points Committec.-T.ours.

## PREMIER versus BRISTOL <br> \section*{To the Edifor.}

Sir, -In your issue of April 21, Mr. Priker gays he sill cousiders Pvemier 'superior" to Bristol. I beg to differ from him. I am not eaying Premier is a bad method, whet $I$ say is, it is not on a par with Bristol. As regards the plain course there is not much in jt buth wien it comes to a 5,000 a diferent tale has to be told. In the grst place, methods on the leugthening lead plan are more interesting to ring, as the bobs affect more bells, and, in addition to that they always liave an advantage where there is plenty of scope for compositiou. In 'Prennier, you lawe to take the whole courses as they come; whereas in Britol you haro the privilege of putting in plenty of M calls when either 5 or 6 are in 5 th's, end W calls wher 4,5 or 5 are 6th's, and that is whers the music comes in Bristol-out of the bells in 5-6-7-8. To put it mildyy, you can get es much music out of 5,000 of Bristol as you can out of 7,000 of Premier, and then, again, if you choose, you call ring a zo-course peal of Bristol with qualities equal to Premier.
As regards Znd end 7th's places, 1 an by no means in favour of that. I prefer the bells in $2-3$ to cross when the treble is in front, and the bells in 6-7 to cross when the troble is behind. It may be argued that 2nd and 7th's are made in Superlative and Cambridge, but it is unavoidable in these methods where there is continuous place makine in 3-4 and 5-6, as thare is in Superlative. Neither foes three-puli dodgine in 34 and $5-6$ improve it. You do not get muely nusie out of wells dodging in 3-4. If theve is Bny three-null dodging it shauld take place either in front or belind.
As regards Double Superlative, I hope Mr. Parker does not think the is enlightening me in any way. He will probably be surprised to hear that as Iong ago as April, 1910, I was on a Eour in the Easterts Counties with a party that included the late Mr. ©. H. Hattersley, and it was turing a conversation about the proof of various Surprise methods that he asked me if I haft ever mone into Double Superlatire. I arose early the following morning, and pricked some of itout, and round he was quite right in what he had aatd about the extra scope it gave for comproition: hut he wis of the same opinion as myself, That it was a good method spoilt. As to the $9,600 \mathrm{Mr}$. Parker publifhes this week. I should think if it is passible for ringing to become monotnons, thesc 10-tead courses would bo before ther were al? finishevi.- Tours,
