## FRIENDLY RIVALRY IN SUFFOLK.

A very satisfactory year of progress was recorded by the Norwich, St. Edmundsbury and Ipswich Diocesan Association at the anoual meeting. A growing membership, despite heavy losses from death and other causes, a marked activity in the districts, and the largest aggregate of peals among the associations of the country, all go to make up a gratifying result. 'The 'fly in the ointment' has been the failure to come to an arrangement to induce the newlyformed St. Edmundsbury and Ipswich Diocesan Association to join forces with the older organisation, but it is recorded as a source of satisfaction that the East Suffolk members bave remained loyal to their society. This course was only to be expected in towers which, for more than forty years, members have owned allegiance to their old Diocesan organisation. Indeed, we should have been surprised if, all the while the Association professes to cover that area, there had been any serious secession.

The position of Suffolk has been rather different from that presented to existing ringing organisations by the formation of other new dioceses. Two Associations, neither of them taking its title from Suffolk, covered the county so far as ringing affairs were concerned, and there was a fairly clear demarcation of their boundaries. The new diocesan arrangement cut into the districts of both Ely and Norwich Associations, and while the former gave up any claim upon West Suffolk, in order that a new diocesan organisation might be formed, Norwich took action in the opposite direction, and sought to absorb the whole county. On the other band, the new society has aspirations of its own, and desires to unite all Suffolk towers in one Association. That this course is the one which commends itself to the diocesan authorities seems emphasised by the title which the Bishop of St. Edmundsbury and Ipswich chose for the new Association, and the fact that he has resigned his position as one of the patrons of the Norwich, St. Edmundsbury and Ipswich Association. And now we have the anomaly of two societies in Suffolk using, so far as that county is concerned, the same title. This curious state of affairs may some day lend itself to a better and less confusing solution; but, in the meantime, the Norwich, St. Ednundsbury and Ipswich Association, while regretting the absence of fusion, expresses a hope that the two organisations may live side by side in friendiy tivalry. This ought not to be difficult, for there are many instances to be found in which ringing associations overlap one another's territory, and yet dwell in peace and harmony. All that is needed is that both sides 'play the game,' and do not endeavour to undermine the allegiance of members in the opposite camp by methods of a doubtful kind. (Continued on page 658.)

## ROCHESTER DISTRIOT'S SUCOESSFUL YEAR

The annual meeting of the above district was held at Sittingbourne on Saturday, October 7th, and was attended by a thoroughly representative gathering. It was pleasing to note the young blood.' of the district taking interest in theso meetings, and they surned up in force. In the absence of tho Vicar, who was away on mission work, the Rev. M. Allen, curate, officiated, and the organist was also present, and enlivened the service. A collection at the close realised 11s. 2d., and helped to swell the Association War Memorial Funds.
Tea was served at Cremer's Restaurant, and 44 members sat down. The business meeting followed, Mr. W. Haigh, Gillingham, being elected to the chair.
Three non-resident members, Messrs. A. H. Pulling (Guildford), G. W. Steere (Guildford) and O. H. Dobbio (Surrey), who had been proposed previous to peal attempts, had their eloction confirmed, and one rew practising member was elected.
The District Secretary presented his annual report and balanco Eheet. In the former he reported that Sunday ringing was being fully maintained, and in the matter of peal ringing the district was not bohind, as some good peals were recorted. At thair district meetings they had been entertained by the Rev. Campbell Ward, at Swanscombe. The membership showod a slight fulling off, owing to the large band at Halling last year, which numbered 2 , falling down to thrree. Bell restoration was going ahead in their midst, as Gravesend were boping shortly to have their peal of eight recast and lung in a new steel frame. Mr. Bowell hañ put in a frame for six at Chalk, and rehung the present three, which was a step towards getting six at that tower. Cliffe bells were shortiy to be overhauled by Mr. Bowell, and rehung, and it was hoped that this peal of eight woild be ringable by Christmas. Their old friend, Mr. Haigh, of Gillingham, astomatically ceased to be a member of the general committee, and he was sure the district could not let the ocoasion pass witiout expressing their keen appreciation of his valued services for a. great number of years. Their share in the County War Memorial was slowly, very slowly, going ahead, and be was pleased to report that that day their total had reached 510 , and urged the members to hurry on with their collecting cards. Their balance sheet, including the day's expenses, showed a balance in hand of $\& 12$ 10s., and le commented on the fact that they only mustered four hor: members in their district, which was a very poor total. On behalf of the Association he thauked all for thelr support, feeling assured it would be continued,
On the proposition of Mr. Shellock (Chastham), a hearty vote of thanks was necorded the secretary for lis repart and balance sheet.
The Chairman eaid that having heard such a report he was lound to gropase the re-election of their secretary, Mr. F. M. Mitchell, which was unanimously agreed to.
Mr. W. Haigh, who had so faithfully sorved the district on the committee, was sent back to that body, as fistrict representasive, to accompany Mr. W. Spice (Tunstall), the other representative.

## INSTRUCTIONAL WORK. <br> To the Editor.

Sir, - You are right in urging the importance of providing instructors for change ringing, and in your view that moro might be dote, and with greater energy, in this direction. But it is only fair to the Associations to remember certain difficulties which in practice hamper the best intentions. The first is that of finding competent instructors. Many good ringers, with all tho will to lyelp, cannot beach others. They lack the infinite patience and sympathy wilh ignorance which is good teacher should have, in class room or in belfry; they cannot ' suffer fools gladly ; and they are too often impatient of results. Tho visits of such men to a young band may result in tisappointment rather than encouragement. Another diliticulty, felt more perlaps in country places than in towns, is that of securiug regular attendanco and perseverance on the part of learners, and their impatience of correction.

No man.' it has been well said, 'will make a good ringer who cannot siand being fold that he is wrong '; bud when this happens. neither the imsiructor nor the Association which sends hinz is to blame.
There are also difficulties of cost, of distance, of communication with remote districts, and हo forth: but where there is a will to overcomb these, a way can be found. The real difficulty, as with most machinery and with any scheme for benefiting others, lies ' $\pi$ the human element-in the man behind the machine, in the agent for carrying out the scheme, and in those whom it is intended to bonefit; and so it is with instructional work amonr zingers. Such work deserves every encouragement, and all the energy that can be put inta it; but it is not so simple a matiter as it seeme on paper. T. L. PAPILLON

The averafpe of points per poal was 17.65 , this being 1.761 points above the arerage value per peal bs all Associations. Three branch meetings and two distriet metings had been lyeld by the Norwich Diocesan Brameh, anct two hranch meetings and twelve district meetings had been held by the St. Edmundsbury und Ipswich Diocesan Branch.

THE SUFFOLN DISCUSSION
The leport reviewed the thsuecessind cfforts to federate the sociation with the new Suffolk Diocesnin Assoriation ander scheme of Federation,' which, alter careful delileeration, was rejected by both the Standing Committee and by the two branches of the Norwich and St, Edmundshury and Ipswich Diocesan Associa-
tion. It was satisfactory that this somewhat tion. It was satisfactory that this somewhat complicated controversy East Sufolk, had su happy issue, in so far that the Norfolk and oth bouchembors still, remained firmly mited. and that two Diocoses, the Norwioh Diocese nnd thas St. Edmundsbury and Ipswich Diocese. The only regret was that the founderg of the new Suffolk Diacesan Assomintion flit not seo their way to throw in their lot wilh them, sud that as a result, there were now two Associations at wark in the Suffolk Diocese. It wns hoped lhey would continue as good neighbours and friendif rivals.
The President said they had hardly reached their ante-war gguees, but they wara not far off. Cousidering all the difficuities, B total mombership of I,070 was very creditablo indect, and they had accomplished good work.-The report was unanimously ndopted
The Goneral Secretary and Treasurer submitted an estimated belance ghest far the year ending December 31 st, 1922 . which showed that thers would be a deficit of $£ 25$ (approximately) owing to the hearyexpense in prining the pesl records in the anntal reports.
The President stated that, the Stauring Commitiee liad that morning rarefully considered the Assoriation's financial position, with the
view of roducing the large expenditure on the reports, and thest they recommended as a temporary measure ouly, the tabulation of the peal records as being the only meang of making a substaniial reduction of oxpenditure without destroying the general feature of the annal report, so that the doficit could be wiped ous.-The report war unanimously adopted.
All the officers were re-elected. -The President proposed, and the Secretary scconded, the Rey. Canon F. J. Meyrick, Vicar of St. Peter Mancroft, Norwieli, as an elected member of the Standing Committoe, vice the Rov. E. C. Hopper, deceaged.
The General Secretary announced with regret the resignation of Mr. Jemes Matts as distriet secrotary for Ipswich, and paid high tribute to his serviees, covering a period of 44 years. The Dean of Norwich mored, and the Rev. W. O. Pearson eeconded, that Mr. James Motts be elected a vice-president of the Association, in recognition of his great services to tlie Association.-This was carrjed unanimously.

## A NEW BELL BUFEER.

trial at warfield.
Dedicated to St. Michael, and gay with the decorations of harresti festival, the season of Michaelmas was kept up at Warfield Parish Church by the pealing oi the pretty octave of bells at this remote Berkshire parish on Saturday afternoon and evening of Sept. 30th. By kind invitation of the Vicar (tine Ikev, Clifford Toogood, M.A.), tea was provided at the Brownlow Hall, some 15 ringers bharing the joys of the teacup, a smoke and a chat.-Mr. A. J. Harmans (hon. secretary of the East Berks Brancli of the Oxon Diocesan Guild) thanked the Vicar for his reception and preseres in the chair, also for his thoughtfulness in asking the ringers to come and bear the effect of a set of ' bell buffers recently fitted to the clappers. Ringers in the district always enjoyed coming to Wartield, and he loped local men would come in to the Windsor practires whenever possible; they would be very welcome. The intraduction of this aid to the vibration of the bells was due to a holiday at Ashbourne, Derbyshire, spent this summer by the Viear, who was much impressad by the tone of the peal of bells there, and the enthusiasm of Mr. R. E. Sadler in adrocating thins buffer, which is made by a firm claiming to be the originators of the bell buffer at a local works and duly patented.
The tower was visited after tea, and further touches in the standard methods rung till 9 p.m., conducted by Messrs. Welling, Harman and Heuley.-Members present included Messrs. Farr, Smith, Kıinht, Cropley, W. W. Cross, Crotts, Fussell, Baieman, Harman, Henley, Welling, a fer of his boy scout teara, Mr. Higgs, J. Brant, junr., and several of the local ringers.
The first louch of the afternoon was a well-struck 600 of Grandsire Triples by the Windsor Parish Chureh company, conducted by a. J. Farman. Those not ringing wandered round the fields picking blackberries and listening to the added hum of what is a really fulltoned octaye hy Mears and Stamhank (without any aids to resonancel, the tenor being $13 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{cxt}$. only. It ought to be mentioned that when the tower was restored ibe windows opening on alf four sides of the bell loft were filled up with stave and cement (excepting the tracery of the Gothic heals), so that too much confusion of sound exists in the ringing room, howerer pleasant the resulf, to those who hesr the bells outside.
In the circular describing this invention the statement:- The bell buffer itself in no way corresponds with anf previous invention under the name of "Clapper Buffer," althougly its duties are the same '-appears to need some explanation. This is the iourth invention during the past 40 years to be placed before the Exercise. and in all probabilit it will meet with the fate of similar previous inventions. At Mr. Fusseli's suggestion a touch was rung with the buffers takell off خos. 2. 3, 5 and 7 betis, leasing 1, 4. 6, 8 las clords), with the buffers fitted, and this was found to be an improvemeat to the sound in the ringing room.
