## THE DAY OF REMEMBRANCE.

Falling this year upon Saturday, 'Armistice Day' provides a great opportunity for peals in celebration of the anniversary of the cessation of hostilities in 1918, and, doubtless, there will be many bands who will avail themselves of the occasion. The day which saw the end of the great clash of arms in Europe is one which will remain a vivid memory with the present generation, and, as it marked the triumph of our arms, after more than four years of fierce warfare in which our sword was drawn for freedom and right, we may well celebrate the anniversary of such an epoch in the world's history by the joyous pealing of our bells.
But 'Armistice Day' as an occasion for rejoicing occupies on the Irth November only a secondary place in the thoughts of most British people. Primarily do their minds revert to those brave sons who fought and died, and hence it is as 'Remembrance Day' that this anniversary occupies first place in the hearts of the public. Last year ringers in hundreds of towers throughout the country joined in commemorating the day, first by muffed riaging, as a tribute to the fallen, and then, in many cases, an ' open ' peal or touch to celebrate the triumph of the nation on the field of honour. The suggestion is made that a similar course shall be followed next week, and we imagine that in a majority of the towers the proposal will be acted upon.

From among the ranks of the ringers who went out in such large numbers to bear their share in the great adventure, approximately one thousand laid down their lives; and 'Remembrance Day' would be a specially appropriate occasion upon which those who now occupy the belfries, and grasp the ropes tbat once these departed heroes handled, could collectively honour the memory of their old comrades. In some areas the ringing is being properly organised, to ensure that it shall be general, and also, which is important, that where mixed bands are made up for peal attempts, individual companies shall not be so depleted as to deprive them of the opportunity of taking their proper part in the general ringing. This is, of course, a necessary step, for it might easily happen, where towers are not overmanned, that the absence of a couple of ringers might make impossible the effective use of the bells. 'Remembrance Day' is emplatically one of the days in the year when the bells ought to ring in every steeple in the country, and we hope that it will be possible this year. If it be only rounds that are rung it matters not so long as the ringers give of their best. It should be done even at the sacrifice of personal convenience, for what is this

What encolvagoment is it to Minol ringers who, doing their best with the hells at their disposal, here their efforts bolittled, and who Fagin, mny I ask, is entitled to a "Cerlificate of Merit,' he who is nearly always ringing with a good bind or lie who goes about the countrysitlo giving a holping hand and withing to stand in with a band of movices, giving encourggement rather than disconragoment? - Yours very trulg.

## BELFRY GOSSIP.

Name 'peals are not mommon in theso days, but it is interesting to regail the first of these, which was rung by the Royit Cumberfani Youthe at St, Martin's-in-the-Fields on Sinturday, Nov. 3rd, 1796. The ringers wors all Williams, and it is eurprising to find that in those far-off days, when facilitios of locomotion were so linaited, that eleven riugers boasting all the same Cluristian name could be got together.
The peal was a 5,129 Grandsire Cavers, and it is recorded int tho tower as' the first peal cere ruug on any bells by any sociofy, tho members being all of one amme, The band wns Willinim Whitehead treble, Willian Richardson 2, William West 3, Willinu Stophens 4 Whilam Gibson 5, William Shipway 6. Willan Brown 7 , Willam Court B, William Tyler 9 , Willian Castle and Willium Eney tewor The peal was called by William Shipway.
This number of ringers of one Christian namo in in pral has on[5 been once exceeded, and that was when fwelvo Johns rang a paal of Stectuan Cinques at St. Gites", Cripplegate.
Ol Noventer 5th, 1787, as recorded in tha anals of Sti, t'ater's, Sheftield, "was rung on eight belis at this church a peal of 6,040 changes of that intrictute method called Gambridge Surprise in hours and 18 minutes, by the fohowing persons, yiz.: $\mathbb{R}$. Ower treble, G. F. O. Wylde 2nd, Sanuel Willey Zrd, Wirlinum Iee 4th, Oharles Fletcher 5th, John Fill 6th, Samuel Dutton 7h, Thomas Babls 8th. The weight of tenor $33^{3}$ ewt. The nhove is the lirst peal of this usethod ever rung in the calntry.
This composition has not been handed down to us, but it is beyond question, we beliave, that the peal wns a falae one. In any avent the ringers evidently did not know of a 5,152 Cambridge which had been rung in 1783, at St. Giles-in-the-Fielks, Loudan,
The first peal of Superlative was also rung on Norember 5th. This was at Huddersfield in the jear 1821.
Wic lave aiways looked upon Mrs. George Willians as ble first lady peal ringer, for 30 years ago she rang the trebles to a handbell peal of Grandsire Triples. The Bury Post of Nor. 5th, 1788, however, records a handbell peal of Bob Major rung it Nowton, in which the tenor was rung lyy a girl of 13 . We have no further in formation than this, and wouder whether any of ons readers can ghe us futher particulars.
On Novernber 8 th, 1888 , a peal of 6,720 London Sturprisa Major then the longest leagit in the method, was rung at Burton-on-Trent

Tho fist eight-befl peal al Coddenham was rung on November 9th, 1742. And on the same date in the year 1800 the Grst peal of Oxford Treble Bob Major in Liverpool was rung.
The ringer of the 7 th in the peal of Double Norwien at Oswald twistle wes Willimn Barnes, nol William Riling, as printed.
At an infomal meeting held recently; the members of the belfry of St. John tle Baptist, Hillingdon, pregented Miss N. G. WjThime (upon lier learing Hillingdon to take up her residence near Bath with an irory-fthed dressing case, at a foken of apprecintion of her Fork as local secretary.

In connection with the opening of the peal of twelve at Taunton at is interesting to yecall thai the former ring of ton was dedicated on June 25 th, 1885. Filhe ringing for the service was carried out by a speeially selected band, and sfter a luncheon in tha City Buildings the first peal of Caters in Samerset was rung on the bells
The band contained some well-known names, being raade up of Tosepla Field 1, Thomas Payne 2, A. F. M. Custanco 3, William Finch 4. Samuel Hounslow 5, Charles Hounsiow 6, Rev. F. E. Rahinson 7, Rer. C. D. P. Davies 8, James W. Washmrook 9, William Wakelin 10. The peal was composed by Hany Johuson, and conducten by the Rev. F. E. Robinson. It was rung under the nuspices of the Oxford Diocesan Guild.
The inguiry wis made in oltr columus a fortaght ago for any instance of a rigger taking part in his own golden wedding penl, as Mr. Jos. Gregory of Deane, Bollon, had done on Sept. 251 li. Mr. R. G. Ioveday, of Thrapston, Northants, writes that MI. W. J. Gi)bert rang the 3rd to a peal of Kent Trelsle Bob Major at Raunde ors Febroray eftli last, in colebration of his golden wedding.

The peal of a century ago is recorded in the belfry records at Ald Gaints* Wakefield, lis follows:-

## SURREY ASSOCIATION

ALLIANCL WTTH NEW GULLDFORD DIOCESE DISCUSSED.

In connection with the question of tho amalgamalion of the towers in the new diocese of Guildford with the Surrey despeiation, we understand the proposal originated out of a cammunication received from the secretary of the Guildiord District of the Winctuester Guild, in which towers now in the Guildford Districh but actively affilinted to the Surrey Association, were invited to a meeting to consider-
(1) Whether it is adrisable to form a new Guilel for the new Diacess of Guildiord, or
(2) To try and come to an arrangement with the Sures Association and combine tho two ringing societies in Surrey to form one Guild or Association with an alteration of name, say, the Guildford Diocesan Guild and Surrey Association, or vice versa.
(3) Any question which may arise from the above.

The discussion on the question at the Surrey meting was taker part in by, among others, members from Leatherhead and Bwell, two of the towers which would be affected, as they are at present in the Winchester Diosese.
The members welcomed the proposed alliance, but conte see no reason for an alteration of title. They, however, invited the Guildford members to form a Guildford district of the Surrey Assomation,
The towers in the Central District of the Surrey desociation which are also in tho Winchester Diocese are Dorking. Ieatherhead, Aahtead, St. Martin's and Christ Church, Epsom, Ewell, Ranmore and Banstead.
There are other towers in West Surroy similarls sitanted.
Consideration of the subject between the Mid-Surrey towers and the Guidiford District of the Winchester Guild is to take place at a meetiry at Leatherbead io-morrow.

## THE SHORT=COURSE SYSTEM. <br> By JOSEPH

It ia generally admitted that, in the caso of mefhods with a plain hunt or a treble-iob inant, the plain course is too long. There is too great an interval between the courseends, and, with two or three exceptiong, lends can, with advantage, be left out. There is nothing new in this juea, for peals of Bob Major with bods at Sthis and 4th's parfectly illastrate the principle of ahortening the course.

Sucli peala aro not popular because, being ragarded as parting the kenors, their good properties are overlooked.
The present artiele is to draw riteneion to the fact that Plam Bob and other methods, from Minor to Maximus, with a shortened course, may bo regarded as $n$ different system, i.e., mefhods with threre hunts,
Take any method which has 32 after the treble at tho first handstroke lead-and, say, $u s$ in Bob 1 ajor, 13254768 . If eigtht's plnce is made the bells come round, if second's place is made it is Plain Boh. If, howover, fourth's place is made, the result is 12357486, giving a method with threo hants coming jome every lead, and five working bella refaining their coursing order. Thus, in effect, five bob-leads of a method yocome a plain courge of the short-courge varintion, and, to obtain peak, gecond'g place must bo substituted for fourth's at in bob, and a plain lead becomes a bob lead
To put zit more clearly, it is better in sucli methods to learn the bob work as part of the caurbe, and wiren a call is made, to do the work of a plein lead.

Composition, of course, must meet the need of such altered couditions.
In Plain Bob tho three hunts all do the same work, but in othere,

It is not necessary, however, to confine the scops of the system to existing methoda, or to the grat lead end 12357488, for the shortcourse of Plain Bob has as its lead-ends the following :-

## 12357486 <br> 12378564 <br> 12386745 <br> 12364857 <br> 12345678

Then the first lead-end of a short-course method may be any one of the first four without sacrificing regularity. Further, it is quite legitimate to vary the work of the secondary hunts from that of the treble; as a mafter of fact, unless two bells lis still behind, it must be done in the case of Treble Bols.
This system gives to the Exercise the means of increased interest in ringing, as the secondary hunts vary the monotory of a method, a greater number of the more musical changes may be obtained in a touch or peal, and there is further scope for method building and composition.
The methods and peals appended show in some measure what may be done ith this direction.
It must be remembered that in ringing existing Treble Bob methods on this plan the proof is varied, and a method with a cleaf: proof scale may be false if the course is shortened.
