## A VALUABLE AGREEMENT.

There has just been issued in printed form the 'conclusions ' arrived at by the conference between the Central Council and the Society for the Protection of Ancient Buildings, and this report will, we understand, come up for discussion at the Council's meeting at Salisbury. The conclusions have been arrived at as a result of complete agreement between the representatives of both bodies, and the report is a complete vindication of the position which ringers have all along taken up in regard to bell hanging in ancient, and indeed in all, bell towers. In past years there has been a feeling among ringers that the restoration or augmentation of bells in old steeples has, in a number of cases, been obstructed by the society for the Protection of Ancient Buildings, through, it has been felt, the mistaken but wholly honest belief that sucb work could not be carried out without detriment to the tower. Led by the late Sir Arthur Heywood, who laid the foundation of the movement with his book upon the subject, fortified by the indisputable scientific calculations of Mr. E. H. Lewis, and with the many practical proofs provided by the leading firms of bell founders in hanging bells upon sound engineering principles, the Central Council, through the Towers and Belfries Committee, have convinced the Society that it is perfectly possible to carry out such worls and the 'conclusions' of the conference lay down the principles by which it can proceed. To have reached this stage is eminently satisfactory, and the report is an extremely valuable agreement, for we now have two interested bodies pulling in the same direction instead of in opposition, and we hope that this report may reach all Church authorities contemplating bell restoration.

The methods which the conference recommends should be applied when bells are to be rebung or augmented in ancient towers are just those which any ringer conversant with the subject would advocate, and which all our leading founders in these days put into practice. There is one recommendation, however, which we are pleased to see included in the findings of the conference, and that is, that - in no circumstances should a pre-Reformation bell be recast or its canons removed, and that when such bells cannot be retained in the ring, that they be used as single bells or preserved as a valuable and interesting work of the past. This is a point which we have urged in this column, and we are glad to see that the preservation of these relics is thus strongly advocated. As bells, many of these castings are not fit to take a place in modern peals, hut as examples of the work of old founders and specimens of an ancient craft, in which after all, ringets have a deep interest, these antiquities of the pre-Reformation period, all too many of which have disappeared, ought to be saved from the melting-pot.

## BELFRY GOSSIP.

As will be seen from a notice, the new trebles, completing the ring of twelve at Exeter, are to be dedicated on Feb, 3rd.
What was probably the first peal on twelve bells, was a peal of Grandsire Cinques ab Si. Bride's, Fleet Street, recorded as having been rung on Thesday, lite 19th of January, 1724. Among those who took part in the peal were Benjamin Amable and Robert Catlin, who was a London bell founder, and carried on the busimess brought from Readiag by Samuel Knight.

On January 19th, 1767, the London Fouths rang 6,200 Oxford Treble Bob Royal at Shoreditel, and ten ycars later, on Jan, 20th, 1777, the Gumberlands rang 6,240 in the same method on the same bells.
On January 21st, 1788 , a peal of $6,600 \mathrm{Bob}$ Maximus was rung at the Church of St. Mary the Great, Cambridge.

In 1898, on January 2lst, a peal of Cambridge Surprise Royal, which sot the lead for modern Surprise Royal ringing, was accomplished at Cheltenham. It was believed to be the first peal of Surprise Royal, although, of course, it is now known that a peal in this method was rung at Wakefield in 1822.
A peal of 'Garthing's Trebles' -Garlhon's peal of Grandsite Triples-was נung at St. Margareb's, Lynn, on January 20 th, 1740.

- Thet most ingenious and intricato poal, Norwich Court Bob Maximus,' was rung for the first time aE St, Peter Mancroft on January $20 \mathrm{th}, 1817$.

The first peal by the Finchester Diocesan Guild in Hampshire was rung 39 fears ago last Wedneskay, at Soberton, Hants, and was Mr. George Williams' first peal. Guriously enough Mr. Williams rang his first peal as conductor in the same tower exactly a year later. Since then he has rung over a thousaad!
Owing to umforeseen circumstances the annual meeting of the Ohew Deanery Brauch of the Bath and Wells Association is postponed until February 3 rd.
' Loner peals ' of Cambridge Major' are few and far between, but the enterprising Leicestor men rang, last Saturday, a 7,008 by Mr . Fred Dencli.

Mr. Wilfred Overton, of Bridgnorth, writes to point outt that the peal of Oxford Bob Triples at Holm Lacey, published in our last issue, cannot be clamed as the first in the method by the Hercford Diocesan Guild. A peal in this method was rung by the association at Bridgnorth on January 11th, 1902 .
The annual meting of the Nottingham District of the Kidland Counties Association is to be held at Nottinglam on January 27th (the same day as the dinner to honour the memory of William Doubleday Grofis), and nof on the 2oth, as advertised last weok.

Mesers. Mears aud Stainbank, of the Whitechapel Foundry, have recently secured the order for a lange carillon for Oshawa, Canada,
The peal of eight at Northallerton, North Yoiks, has been rchung by the same firm.

Congratulations to Walier P. Whitelead uporn his furs peal as conductor. To call a peal of Superlative at the age of 15 years is more than a promising performance.
In their annual report the Lancashire Association have set an example in bringing the doings of the Ceutral Council under the special notice of their members by printing a summary report of the last meeting.
The Lancashire Association has now a total membership of $\mathbf{1 , 4 5 0}$, of which 1,163 are ringers attached to towers in the county.
At Beverley Minstor belfry, just before midnight on New Year's Eve, the old custom was observed of reading Tennyson's poen, "King out, wild bells.' Following a touch of 395 Grandsire Caters the Vicar read fhe poem, and after the hour of midnight had struck the now year was welcomed by another short touch.

On January 66h, after the Epiphany ringing, the Westminster Abbey company of ringers were entertained to lunch by the Dean (Bishop Ryle) and Mrs. Byle, at the Deanery, an exceedingly enjoyable time being spent.
A Weymouth paper las recorded the ' keen appreciation and dolight , of the iubabitants of the town at learing the bells of Christ Church, King Street, at midnight on New Year's Eve, for the tirst time for many years. Ifymus were rung, and the bells' pealed forth a joyful welcome to 1923.' Congratulations are extended to those who have put these bells in order after they liad been allowed to rust in inactivity for so long a time.
We should also join in the congratulations were it not for the fact that these bells are saucer-shaped and worked on the barrel principle

## BELL HANGING IN ANCIENT TOWERS.

## OENTRAL COUNCIL AND SOCIETY FOR PROTECTION OF

 ANCIENT BUYLDINGS.1. Bell cages can be mado to satisty the various requirements oi bell ringers, archmologists and architects, having particulat regard to the protection of ancfent towers.
2. The design and workmanship of a cage are of more importunce than the material of which it is made.
3. When the renewal of an old bell cage or the recasting of an oid boll is under consideration, the benefit of any doubt should remain with the retention of what exists.
In these words the Conference betweon the representatives of the Central Counci] and the Society for the Protection of Ancient Buildjugs summarise their agreed findings on the subject of bell hanging in uncient towers, a subject upon which there has been considerable disagrement between the two bodies in the past.
The report containing the conclusions of the conference has just been printed, and it opens with the general statement that 'during the past quarter of a century or so very many different statements witli regard to the right way in which bells should be lueng in oid towers have been made; and a considerable difference of opinion appeared to exist iretween bie recommendations made by the society und the Central Council. Added ta this difficulty the bell hangiug tirns were still, to a great extent, experimenting with metal coges, and recommending new and untried methods of construction,"

The Conferance between the two bodies resulted 'in complete agreement," and the primiples agreed upon are put forward as a guide to be used by those who bave the care of rings of bells in ald towers, i.e., towers built bofore the end of the 16til century or thereabouls. Tho first recommendation is that with regard to any ghestion concerning tzeir church bells or work in theit towers. Parish authorities are strongly urged to consult the Advisory Commitfee set up in their own dionese or the Central Committee for the Fiotection of Churebes and their Tremsures, with whom the parties to the conference would be prepared and willing to adise on technical points.
The recommendatious go on to deal with the technicalifies of bell hanging, urging the importance of the careful distribution of the strains and stressed, the protection of belfries from birds ancil weather, tho proper rentilation and care of the ringing clamber, the care of the bells and their fittings.
The report advocates that in no eircumstances should a pre-Reformation bell be recast or its canong removed, and that, when such bells cannot be retained in the ring, they should be used as single luells or preserved as a valuable aud interesting work of the past, also that bells of special interst of post-Reformation date, such as those ast by such famous flounders as Miles Gray ar Abraham Rudhall should not be recast without reference to the authorities reforree ta above.

Clocking ' of hells is strongly deprecated, and atiention is diracted to tha necessity to quarter-turn a bell whes it wears thin, and also to the importance of the form and condition of the clapper. The report adds this significant paragraph, "With rogard to bearings it is doubtful if any advantage is gained by the uge of ball bearings.
To the report, whicin is signed by Mr. A. R. Powys, secretary of the Society for the Protection of Ancient. Buildings, and Mry E. Alexander Young, seoretary of the Central Council, is appended a schedule setting out the merits and demerits of various materials for the construction of frames, viz., oak, chestnut, teak and metal. The only demerits urged against the metal frame are that it needs regular painting to prevent corrosion, and has not got the shockabsorbing qualities of timber; but, it is added, in a properly corstructed frame iu proper condition shock does not arise.

## ELY DIOCESAN ASSOCIATION.

A most successful meeting of the Funts district was held at St. Neots on Saturday last, The ringers present camo from a wide ser. Roxtan, Chateris, Lyerton, Sandy, Cambridge, Hitahin, Long Stanton, Nemnarket and Fulbourne being represented. Various touches were rung on the magnificent eight at St. Neots, and at Fynegbury (6) and Eaton Socon (6), the methods including Plain Bob, Trebie Bob, Cambridge Surprise Minor, Grandsire and Stedman Tripies, and Double Norwich. A short'service was held in the fine churcla of St, Noots, with an address by the Vicar. At the tea, which was held in the commodious Clurch Room, 32 ringers were present.
At the subsequent meeting the chair was taken by the Rev. Wh. Knights, Vicar of 㿽t. Neots, and several new members were admitted. It was decided, if possible, to hold the mext mecting at Iuntingdon on February loth.
A hearty vola of thanks to the incurabents of St, Neots, Eynestury and Eitan Socon for the use of the beils, and to the Rev. W. Knights for lis excellent address, was proposed by the district secretary (the Rev. H. B. Woolley), seconded by Mr. J. Wilis, and caryied unenimously.
This district is evidently * a lite branch."

## BRISTOL UNITED GUILDS' DINNER.

Johnston, af Messrs, Gillett and Johnston, of Croydon, the firm of bell founders who have carried out the repairs and alterations.

Commenting on the Otley bells and the ringers, Mr. Johnston asid That he was taking home with birn a photograply of tha three oldest ringers-Mr. W. D. Clough, Mr. O. Ralphand Mr. J. Harner-whose total age is 214 jeas, and whose fotal years of service in ringing is 170 Vears. That was a record to be proud of, and he doubted if it coulci be beaten anywhere in the country.

Ganon Hadland congratulated the staff of Messrs. Gillett and Johnston on their workmanship. He said there were quite a lot of men in Otiey who really understood the engineering part of the alterations, and they lad spoken most appreciatively of the steel frame work which had replaced tine old oak beams. Tine bells liad also lyeen subjected to a most minute inapection, am? everybody was full of praise for the obviotuly excellent job made of them. ## SPEEDY RINGING.

How fast is it possible to ring clanges? This question arises from the fact that at Long Stanton on Sumay afternoon, after an unsuccessful attempt for a handbell peal of Grandsire Caters, a 720 Bob Minor, was rung ' in hand 'in 10 mins. 40 secs, which is at the rate of about 67.5 changes per minute! The ringers were: W. H. J. Hooton (conductor) 1-2. J. B. Woolley 3-4. R. W. Woolley 5-6. The report adds that this was the fastest 720 by all. That is not gurprising.

## EXTENSION OF BRISTOL SURPRISE MAJOR

Sir:-Now that Mr. York Brambie and the Rev. E. B. James Have produced their figures, and also made their full statement of criticism of my figures, kindly allow me your space to make ono reply, for the sake of your readers, in support of the accuracy of mine and the error of theirs.
Do both these gentlemen recogine the two basic laws which must control both construction and extension of all treble dodging methode That there is one bell commouly temed the pivot bell, which must make a plate either 1si, 3rd, 5th or 7 th , at the sume time ns the treble lies lier whole pull belind, which is the centre ling of a single method. The second halit of the method is simply a reflection of the first half, opposite liand, backwards.
When we come to a double method this reflection or centre niue occurs when the treblo has completed half her jourtsey outwards, wiz. passing from the $3-4$ to $5-6$ dodging positions, or, say, one quarter of the treble's course. The whole work in any double method is revealed in this first portion up to the reflection line, but tho keystone io any double mothod is found in the position in which the two necessary places are made as the ireble crosses the line. 1st, 3rd's, 6th and 8th places can all be made, as follows: lst and 6th, or 1st and 8th's, ord's and 8th's, or 3rd's and Gth'e. The last is what occurs in Rristol Major
Now then, turt to the figutes of Major and take stock of all the work which has been done. We find that 1234 awe doing ordinary Treble Bob dodging, while 5678 have heen making places, 5th's and 8th's is theil turm, exactly fitting with the repetitious rowa of 1234 as these bells dodged. While the mecessary lat and 4th's places are made to allow the breble to pass from $1-2$ to $3-4$ dodging prositions 5678 altemate with a snap to fit. If this work is carefully examined we find we can sum the whole work up under two items.
(1) That the treble todyes all positions up and down, and (2) that all other bells make the nearest place to the treble immediately before and after passing or dodging with her. I give a balf lead of Major, Royal and Maximus, and ninvite all to examine them when they will platinly see the accuracy of the extension I publishod-Yours

## THE SIMPSON PRINCIPLE'OF BELL TUNING

 IS IT OVERDONL゙?During nearly thres weeks' enforced idfeness in bed and confinement to my bedroom, the question of the Simpson Principle of beil turing has been the predominant theme running through my mivd.
In auy renarks I may make I wish it to be clearly and distinctly understood that I do not wish to make any imputation against the firms who so strenuously adrocate this particular principle; thenwork, honour and integrity being unimpeachanve. I only attack the primciple as applied to church bells generally
I am prepared to admit that, from a scientific, musical and logical point of view, the Simpson principle of tuning may be correct, when applied to a bell used singly, where it does not matter how long yout have to wait for the note which oventually comes, though belated, but in applying that same principle to a peal of bells where the sounds follow in quick succession, it becomes quite a different matter I ask any ringer carefully to listen for and nate this fact on Simpson-tuned bells, and see for himself if it is not strictily true, that when the elapper strikes the bell you get a very lam irony twang, the full note coming when it is mixed up with all the other twangs and notes, the regnlt being pandemonium, which may be described as the striking of so many iron pots followed by a conglomeration of sounds ending in a weird howl. This has been my experience of the Simpson Principle up to the present time. I do not say all peals are as bad as each other, the bells in some belfries being a little further off; therbiore, the uoise is somewitat subdued, but that pandemonium is there all the same. Now, I am asked to believe that all this is good bell music. My good ofd trusty earp which has given me lifelong pleasure and enjogment, tclls me it is naything but that.
Some years ago $I$ was cycling with a friend to a ringiug meating where there had been recently installed a Simpson-tuned poal of bells, which I had heard several tines, though my friend had not. As we came within hearing we dismounted and listencd, and almost at once he said. 'They are certainly not a bat peal of bells.' said, 'Wait till we get near, we are at present a mile away.'
We eventually came close, and after some minates listening to the ringing, came to the conclusion that my description of tha noise wiss a true one, which was confirmed to an even grealer degrce when wo got up inlo the belfry. I have rung several peals on these bells, as well as on another peal of bells tuned on the same principle a few miles from here, where forlunately the ringers are a little further away from the bells and the noise is less painful, but in ringins a peal, as the bells work themselves into certain positions, that periodical howl is nothing short of nerve racking.
A year or two ago I was at the inauguration of a mew peal of bells in the neighbourhood, replacing a beatiful modern peal or eight fit to grace any Catherral tower in the land, for the sole reason that they were not Simpson-tuned. This I have always considered to be little short of sacrilege, a fact which I did not hesitate to tell that famous clurch dignitary who was responsible for their installation iu a conversation which I bad with him some time after. But, he said, 'surely you do not question the musical ability of Though, but --P' I said, 'No, I do not, they are not ringers, easy to see the impression formed in that worlar's mind by thos

Now, in replacing that leatuiful peal of bells, have they given us a better peal in their stead? I am absolutely convinced in my mind they have not, and that the old peal was better than the new, and that opinion is shared by many of the local ringers and others who liave heard and rung on both peals.
My true ideal of a good peal of bells is where the full note is produced immediately the clapper strikes the bell. Abraham Rudhall always gave us that note, and he knew how to give us good musio with his beautiful bells which have never heen beaten, Take F'ainswick bells, and those of St. Martin's-in-the-Fields, London, both Rudhall's bells, I believe: what better music could you wish for than these bells give? Then, to conne to more modern founders, take Southgate and Swanscombe. It is always a pleasure to listen to and ing on these beautiful parls of bells. These particular peals of bells I have quoted are only some of those with which I liappen to be acquainted, and are, of course, only a few among very many others. In conclusion, as a word of advice to those incumbents and church authorities who may be augmanting or recasting their bells, I say to not allow yourselves to he taiked to by these musical "cranks,' so that you do not know whether you are standing on your head or your heels, but if possible horrow one of our good friend Willian Hillson's battleazes, and approach the bell founder, something like this: ' We wint our bells augmented or recast (as the case may be). Are you prepared to give us bells similar to Rudhall's? If not hands off. We will hie ourselves to another bell founder who will." In all seriousuess. I believe, the Simpson principle of tuning, its applicd to church bells, is overabone; the note it produres being a ery thin, weak, soulless one, and a reaction against it is inevitable. In fact, I think that reaction las arrived, for many ominent pingers throughout the country are loudly condemning it
