THAT MUCH-NEEDED REGISTER.
Another instance has occurred of an old method being rung as a new one. A fortuight ago we published the report of a peal of Rochester Surprise rung by the enterprising Leiston band, and last week we gave the figares of the method. Now, it appears, the method is none other than Lancasbire Surprise, first published in 1907, reprinted in our columns in July, 192I, and subsequently published as Leek Surprise. The latter name was, of course, withdrawn when the prior claim to authorship was put forward, and 'Rochester' will, we are sure, be similarly surrendered under the circumstances. That the method should have been thrice independently produced does not detract from the skill of the separate composers, but the credit goes to the first in the field, and Mr. Arthur Craven has the right of authorship.
The point which we want to make, however, is that such a position of affairs ought to be avoidable. It may be said that it is an author's duty to investigate, before be puts forward a method or a composition as his own, to see if his production is original or a copy of something already in existence. To some extent this is true, but the difficulty that confronts an author is that the material through which he should search is so widely scattered that effective investigation is a practical impossibility. Just as we want a reference file of compositions, so is it necessary to have a complete register of all existing metbods in order that authors could have at their hand a ready means of ascertaining what has, and what has not, been produced. In the case of the compositions the work of arranging and indexing them will be a very considerable task, for there are in all methods many thousands, and a good deal of work in wading through the last fifty years of ri-ging publications for figures by bygone composers would be necessary to make the file of the real value that it ought to be. At the same time there is a growing need for the work to be undertaken, and the longer it is delayed the more formidable will be the task when it is attempted.

With methods the work involved would be nothing like so arduous. Methods are not only much fewer in number, but we already have a fairly comprebensive collection of Minor methods and a big collection of plain Major methods in existence. What is required is to get together the figures of Minor and Major methods outside these two groups, and to add all the known Treble Bob and Surprise methods on eight bells, and the more restricted variety of methods on the higher numbers. This is a task to which the Central Council could set their hands without delay, and we hope to see them put it in hand at their next meeting, making it a proviso that in future all new methods must be registered with the Council before any right to authorship can be established in the event of a rival claim.

In Buxlsall Churgh, Suffolk, thete ate engraved or scrachel on a pillar in the ringing chamber (f.e., tho central iower) the ' plain phanges , oa four bells with the tenor covering. These aypear to have been signed $\mathrm{hy}_{\mathrm{y}}$ ' John Gborla, Teillinger, hetween 1580 and 1620. For these facts. suggestions, and dates I am indebted to Mr. Fucent B. Redstonc the antiquary, of Woorhridge
This seems to be certainly the carliest record extant unless therio can ho found any other as enry or more certain. Unkil now, the earliest I have come across is that in Stedman's Tintinnalogia of 1667. Ho there states absolutely that mo changes were known or thought possible within fifte or sixty yerrs of that date. Thiwould barely takg ts back to 1619: ank it is pretty certain that Stedman knew what he was talking abollt

ROWLEY REGIS RESTORATEON.
DEDICATION OF CHURCH, TDWELR CLOCK AND BELLS.
It was a great day for Rowley IEcgis, the ' Black Conntry ' parish, near Birningham, on Suturiay. Sept. 29tl. the occasion being the completion and openitg of the new church. together with the tower, clock and bolls.
The chureh was bumb rown in Juna, 1913, but the tower nuf lu-lds escaped. 'The towor, however', was afterwards found to be tustic: and was laken down. So Rowley was withour as church, until the present Vicar. Lieut.-Col. the Hev. F.J. Cheverton was appointed to the living about two yearg ago. IIe at once set to work with a comnittee to rebuild the church at the cost of over. Ell4.000 and lhis great, undertaking las now been completed.
The hells, a ring of eiflat, with the tenor about 13 cwt., Inve been installed by Mr. J. © Groves. Moderti fittings. castriron headstocks, tust-proof ball hearings, have beon prorided, and the bells hums in it frame of steel $H$ sections, on ralled stesl joists. The sleel joists wert built in the tower walls cltring the progress of the builaliag and are fixerl some three feet abose $\Omega$. 7 in. concrete floar. The resull is a most excellent and up-ta-date job and no bells coutd possibly ga better. This work has been carvied out without taking the bells away from the church.
Not half the people who assembled for the rientication conld bo accommodated in the chuteh the ceremony being performed by the Bishop of Birmingham. On tha Sumday evening the crowd was even greater. The collections on both days amotuted to $£ 383$ but in spith. of this oxcellente addition to the funds muelh move is stijl needed, ant contributions May be sent to the Ficer or to My, Albert Parsons. Olr Eill, Staffs.

The first churel at Rowley Regis, dedicater to St Giles. was erecteri in the reign of King Johm, betwcen A.D. 1199 and 1216. In 1840 on nuch larger edifice was erected in its steard but the tower remanined. Tho tower was oventually vebuilt in 1858. The clurrch was rebuili in 1904, but the new tower wemainet untit the fire, catused by politienl incendiaries, in 1913.

## BELERY GOSSIP.

Eleven poals were altempled during the Sussex tour and ten were successfu, viz: Triples 1 Major 6 Caters 2 and Royal 1. Details will be published iu our next issue.
The method wang as Rochester Surprise by the band at Leiston is mot, ufter all, a new mothod. It is Lancashiro Surprise, by Mr. Arther Craven, and was first published in 1907. It was subsecquently gublished under the name of Leek Surprise, and withdraw when Mr. Craven's prior claim was made known.
The College Yonthis set out for something of a 'feld day ' in peal ringing on Saturday. It had been hoped to arrange four twelve-bell peals at four different churches by four different bands, Only threc twelve-bell towers were however. obtainable and therefore one ten bell tower was sulstituted.
But tlie result was not all that could be desired, and only one peal was successful. Stedman Cinques being rung at Southwark, as re corded elsewhere. Young Ted Horrcy was in this peal
At Bow, Cheapside. Treble Twelve was lost after about an hour nt Stepney one of the band harl to give up, but the worst luck of all was experienced at Cripplegate, where Treble Twelve twent west * after about four hours' ringing!

How easy it is to make a slip in a foomote to a peal without careful roseacch, is again illustrated by the fact that in seecing the report of the handbell poal of Oxford Treble Bob Royal at Ipswich, Mr. $G$ E. Symonds said the only other peal in method rumg on haydiells in the county was that at Ipswicla on January 30th 1890. He entirely overlooked the three peals rung at Leiston in 1980, and conducted by Mr. C. F. Bailey.
In this comection it is interesting to nole that the firse doublehanded handlucll peal ever rung was Oxford Treble Bob Major at Sheffield on Octoleeg 30th. 1811
On Oet. SIst. 1791, a peal of 7.002 ' Grandsire Quaters " was rung at. Great Sit. Mary's, Gambridge.

Parish riggers ' of Dartford rang a peal of Grandsire Triples on Oct, $30 t h, 1749$ - a goot performance in those days when clocal hands; of clange ringers were fow and far betreen
St. Paul's Cathedral bells were opeaed 45 years aga-on Nov. Ist 1878.

Ringers are insited to an ' open' day at Derby on Nov. 3rd. wher the beils of St. Andrew's now augmented to ten. will be availalle.

## DEATH OF MR. J. WHITAKER, OF HEADINGLEY. <br> A LINK WITH GLANTS OF THE PAST

The Exercise has lost by the death of Mr. Joln Whitaker of Hoadingley. Leeds, a link with the giants of the phst, The deceased was born in Leeds in the year 1842, and took tup chauge ringing at the age of 17. at the Parish Church of Burley. Leerls, soon after the light pas of six, were installed there in 1854. Je hegan to have bigher ambitions, howevar and soon became a familiar figure at Leeds Parish Church, in company wilh such celebrities an the Snowdon brothers. Messte, T. and T. Lockwoad and Henry Hubbard semr., who were then attached to that tower, and it was during this time that Mr. Whitaker look part in what was probably the only peal of Treble Bob Maximus ever rung with the back hells in the tittum position. Mr. Whilaker also conducted the first peal of Dowhle Norwich in Leeds in the year 1894 , and about this time was associated with Messrs. H. Willams, the Brothers Thackray and A. Craren. in making histors locally, by taling part in the first handbel peals in the district of Grandsire, Bob Major, Ganterbury Pleasure and Kent Treble Bob. His genial disposition and entlusiasm caused him to be in great request among ringers, and every tower in Leeds has benefited by many hours spent in trying to encourage young ringers. and helping older ringers in more adranced methods
Fis interest in ringing continued up to the last, he being a constant singer at St Michael's. Headingley, until Sunday, Oct. 7 th When arrangements were made to ring a quarter-peal of Double Norwidh in honour of his 81st hirthday. Before that date however, the remains of a merious nttack of influenza asserted itself, and he passed away on Friday, October - 12 th, ufter a shom lout serere attack of bronchial pneumonia
The Puncral took place on Tuesday October 16tla the gervice at Burloy Parish Church and at Lawhewood Cemetery (whele the interment took place) was conducted by the Rer, C. The sermice was simple but impressive. and will long be ranemberen by those privileged to trake part in it. Tine surpliced clergy present in addition to the Priwate, were the Dean of Qanterbury. Dr. S Bickersteth (Vico-Dean, $D_{T}$ A. W. Robiason, Minor Canons F. J. O. Helmore (Precentor and hon. secretary of the lient County Association), A. H. Partridge (Sacrist), and R. $\bar{d}$, W. H. Potter, the Rev. C. Evelegh Woodruff, and the Rev. Henry de Gandole (Domestic Chaplain). Dr. O. Charlton Palmer (Cathedrat organist) presided at a small organ placed by one of the pillars, and the Cathedral choir was also present.

Soldiers of Christ, anise, Tas sung as a processional hymn, and the Arclibishop read opening sentences from the service of the Burind of the Dead. THE APPEAL FOR ThLLFE BELLS AT THE CATHDDRAL.
