## THE DAY OF REMEMBRANCE.

What is the right thing to do with the bells on Armistice Day ? It is one of the occasions when the bells have their part to play in a national commemoration, a commemoration, by the way, which recent controversy has shown is deep set in the hearts of the people. Noother anniversary throughout the year touches the spirit of the nation as does the eleventh of November, and nothing out of harmony with the feelings of the public should be done in any tower. Various views have been expressed in our columns, but we think those which are given in this issue are those which, on reflection, ringers everywhere will agree are most consistent with the commemoration. The Durham and Newcastle Association has issued a general request that, at the churches in its area, ringing before the service at which the Silence is to be observed, shall be half-muffled, and that subsequent ringing shall be with open bells. That, too, is the trend of other opinions, and we think this is the most expressive way in which the bells can be used.

Unquestionably the anniversary of the conclusion of the most terrible war in history, is a day for rejoicing, but we cannot overlook the fact that the day is also a Day of Remembrance. We shall all go to our churches or our war shrines on that morning, filled with the thoughts of those brave dead, who gave everything, even life itself, for their country, and bells that ring for such a service would, we feel, not be in sympathy with the feeling of the moment unless they were half-muffled. At the conclusion of the service of remembrance, however, it is fitting that the spirit of rejoicing should prevail, for never, surely, in the worid's history was there a moment which brought greater relief to millions of mankind than the hour of the Armistice. The strain of more than four years of war, with its suffering and anguish, was lifted, and it is with a feeling of thankfulness that we can celebrate the anniversary.
To adopt the suggestion made by the Durham and Newcastle Association, which other correspondents' letters support, will not tend to make the occasion the day of gloom, which Mr. Cave is desirous of avoiding, but in our view the least ringers can do as their contribution, publicly made to the celebration of the Day of Remembrance, is to ring the bells half-muffled for the service at which the most impressive feature of the anniversary will be observed. What we hope is that there will be unanimity of action, and that in every tower throughout the land the same practice will obtain. The opportunity of taking part in a national commemoration presents itself to ringers in a unique way on Armistice Day, and we trust it will not be lost. Associations might do as the Durham and Newcastle has done-give a lead to their towers in this matter. There is yet time.

To momind, if any ringing is done at all, it aught to be muffled for the memorial ser-

The recent public outcry against the canceliation of the conotaph sorvice las cassed tho Government to reinstate it. This shows the hold the day lias upon the people, whether sacred or secular at other times.
