## METHOD NAMES.

Lancashire ringers evidently do not relish the suggestion made by Mr. Burton that the method which has beer named after their county should have its title changed to that of the county town. We are not surprised at the attitude which has been taken up by those whose opinions are voiced through the letters in our columns-and we happen to know that our correspondents' views are very generally sbared in the County Palatine. Mr. Burton's suggestion was prompted, we feel sure, by the best of motives, but what we like most about the discussion is the fact that ringers are, after all, really interested in the names which are given to methods. About many things connected with the Exercise, members are often inarticulate, but Lancashire ringers, at any rate, are proud to have a method named after their county, and will make their voices heard when a proposal is put forward to change it.

We had begun to think that ringers cared nothing at all for the nomenclature of methods, but siace it is pretty obvious that they do, we should like to recall to their minds the fact that the Central Council, jockeyed into the acceptance of a report by the threat of resignation on the part of one of their committees, foisted upon the Exercise at their last meeting a batch of names for methods that are out of place and stupid in a science based on mathematics. The committee entrusted witb the naming of the Minor methods had a splendid opportunity of purging ringing of some of those ludicrous names which have come down to us from the past, and have frequently made the Exercise a laughing-stock. Instead, they emphasised and perpetuated them, by adding to a class of titles which are positively silly when applied to ringing.
As to whether we call a method Lancashire or Lancaster, Yorkshire or York, is of little importance while we have such titles as Marigold or Geranium. Happily the resolutions of the Central Council are not as unalterable as the laws of the Medes and Persians, and we yet hope we may see the whole collection of garden, and other equally unsuitable names, swept away. After all, ringing has passed beyond the nursery stage, and it is due to those who treat the science seriously that, when they want to ring a new method, they should be able to publish their performance under some title that will not bring ridicule upon them or upon the art they seek to foster. And there is danger in the future. If the Exercise is going to swallow the kind of thing that was foisted on it at the last Council meeting, worse may follow when the Major methods come to be dealt with, but it would be a simple thing for the Council to wipe out those present titles, and substitute something more rational and more in accord with the seriousness of the art.

Now that there are so many contuctors in the Milton hand I would suggest finey try to emulute the ahove iwo peals, the latter especially will provide them with occasion for practice for some timo to come. 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## BELERY GOSSIP.

The one hundredth peal of Stedman Cinques by the Middlesex County Association and London Diocesan Guild was rung at Bow, Cheapside, on Saturday. Probably the only two other sacietios which have this distinction are the College Youtis, and the St. Martin's Guild, Birminglam. Of the Middlesex Association's peals, 39 lave bean on handbells.
It. will not be long before the one Inundradith peal of Stedman Cinques on the frmons bells in the Bull Ring will be rung. Tlis is quite a unique recotd for any church.
It is intercsting to note that the peal of Stedman Cinques rung at High Wreombe, the report of which was published last week, was the Bitst by parishioners of Wyombe. A week prewionsly the Ail Saints' Society rang the firsi peal of Stedman Triples by 'Wycomlse men.
The report of a peal rung al Radstook, Somerset, has boen sent without the time.
In the long history of record peal attempta is a peal whicliwas rumg on Novernber $23 \mathrm{ul}, 1732$, at St. Giles', Oripplegate. This was 8,012 Grandsive Caters rung by the Society of Gity Scholars, 息long defunct organisation, in which it took three men to ring the tenor.
The same length in the same methad was rugg at Southwark on November 28th, 1735.
On November 25th, 1737, one of the earliest and longest peals of Bob Major was rung at West Ham. This was a 15,120 rung by the Eastern Scholars, and although a similar length was rung at Oldham in 1807 , we believe it is still the longest peal rung in the method.
To-morrow is the anuiversary of the first peal of Oxford Trebio Thoh Maximus on hentbells, which was rung at Sheflield on Novemher 24th, 1816. It is also the 80th anniversary of a peal of 5,295 Stedman Caters rung at St. Andrew's, Norwich.
Recorted on a tablet in the tower of St. Chad's, Shrewsbury, are particulars of a peal of 6,006 Crandsire Cinques rung or Novomber 25th, 1799, by the ald Union Society. This, of course, whs not tho longest length in the method at the time, for the sane length harl been rung more than 70 years earlier by the London Scholars, and an 8,008 was rung in 1735 at Southwank, hut it was e food performance for a prosincial tower in those days.
The centenary of a peal of Treble Roh at St. Andrew's, Norwich, will occur on December 5th. From the present condition of affeirs in that tower, there is, we are afrait, no likelihood of an anniversary celebration at St. Andrew's, at all events.

The Rev. F. R. Bonsey, president of the Midileser County Agsociation and London Diocesan Guild, has been appointed Rector of Wrenliam, Suffolk, and on Saturday a peal of 'welcone' was rung for lim.

His many friends throughout the Exercise will learm with regret tihat Mr. Jolin Certer, who was unable to attend blhe Collego Youths dinner on account of ill-health, is stil! very unwell.

## SALISBURY DIOCESAN GUILD.

## COLLEGE YOUTHS' NEW MASTER

## MR. TOM FMBBERT'S ELECTION.

At their meeting last week the College Youths elected Mr, R. T. Hibbert as Master for the ensuing year. Mr. A. A. Hughes was re-elected luou. treasurer; Mr. I?. E. Clark was electod seaior steward; Mr. W. Hibbert junior steward; Messrs. C. F. Winney and Walter Prime were re-appointed trustees, and Mr. W. T. Cockerill hou. secretary.
Mr. W. E. Garraru", the retiring Master, is the leading spirit anong the ringers at the fanous Chmoch of St. Mary Abhot, Kensington, where since 1893 , he has laboured assiduously in the art. Ab that time the bells were rung by a 'stoney ' band, but Mr. ciarrard trained a company of change ringers, and for the last twenty-six years the bells have been rung every Sunday for morning and evening service. What that has meant in labour to the man responsible $j_{5}$ known only to those who have carried out a similar task, ant in Mr. Garrard, London ringing luas one of its most able as well as one of its most modest exponents.
The election of Mr. Tom Hibbert, of Reading, as Master of the Ancient Society, is a notable event, for' it is long since a "provincial' member, residing as far from London as Reading, has ibled the principal office. But Mr. Hibbert is an old mentber of the Saciety, he las taken part with them in more than one memorable performance, and during the period ho las serven as steward, he has been constant in his attendance, desgite the journey that thas been involved.
There are many in the long list of Masters of the Ancient Sociefy of College Youths who have uade a kistinct contribution of personality in attaining to this high office, but mone more so than he who lias just been elected for the ensuing twelve months. A true son of the Berkshice Dowas, he is strongly attached hy many ties to the little village of East Ilsley, his native place, where greatly to his joy, and very largely to his credit, there is now a heautiful little ring of eight hells replacing the old peal of five upon which lie nommenced his ringing career.
Eis work for the G.W.R. Company has taken him into various parts of the conntry, where he has always made friends, and where he las left bebind hinn a reputation of as fine a bandler of a bell, hig or little, as one could wish to see.
A member of many associations, lis longest connection has heen with the Oxford Diocesan Guid, of which he is the valued secretary, and that sombly of which he is now Master. He has for many years resided at Caversham, where he is a stammeh member of the St. Peter's Society, and deputy foreman. Chief among his many ringing achievements are perhaps the record peal of Stedman Cingues at Southwark, and the longest peal ever rung by ten men (Stedman Caters at Appleton).
Mention may also be made of the fact that he has rung peals at the heavy end on the three heaviest rings of cight, ten, and twelve in the kingriom.
Fis speeches are plain, strajght and vigorous, with occasional touches of a quaint humour which is absolutely his own. He is possessed of a frown which has been known to alarn strangers; it is, however, morely indicative of concentration of thought anil lenacity of purpose, except when the ringing is bad, when it signjfies a state of feelings guite beyond words.
He is known to all his friends as 'Old Tom,' and to know lifm is to love lim.

## THE COLLEGE YOUTHS' DINNER.

## (Continued from page 737.)

Mr. G. R. Favdon next proposed the teast of " The London and Provincial hinging Societies, and referred ig the feelang of brotherhoud which existed belween the College Youtlis aud the kinared organisations of the country. He thres out the suggestion that it would bo aice if the Colicge Fontlis could be given' the opportunity of ringing iL peal oecasionally at St. Martin's, or some other towet of the Cumberland Youths in London. IFe went on to express re gret at the disuppearance from ancong the ringing societies of London of the old Waterloo society, which formenly was the means of hringing on many young ringers. Mr. Fardou added that while in the Isle of Wight Inst year he and some other ringers visited the grave of william Raynor, who founded the society of Jnion Youths in tise Isle of Wiglut abort the year 1777 . They reng the handhells round the tomb, which le regretted to see was in a sad state of decay. Fe suggested thet the Winclacster Guild might consider the restorstion of this memorial, as the Kent County Association had dealt with the tombsione of the great James Barlam at Leeds.

## INCREASING DIFFICULTIES.

Mr. I. D. Mathews, who first responded, said he looked upor their chairman and bimself as the godfathers of the ringing brotherhood, by virtue of the position which they held as wasters of the two olit Eondon Societies (applause). They were the two oldest ringing societies in existence, and all the county associations and diocesan guilds were riore or less offshoots of them. With regard to inviting the College Youths lo aing peals in Cumherland towers, he would be rery glad if M. Fardon would tell him how he could get one of the Cumberland towers for a peal for his own sactety, much less for someone else (laughtert). Continuing, Mu. Mathews sainl an article had appenced that meek in ' The Ringing World , telling thero how to put their house in arder in Lonllon, tut lie was afraid the diffeulties in connection with ringing iu London wore nat mily appraciated by those outside the Metropolis. were incrensing in regard to the twelve bell towers in London. People complained about the bells being rung for penls, and it was impossible to heep a regular Sinnday company going at many of 1Wese towors. When some of the towers had been shat up, it hart been the towers where peal ringing hati been nost froquavi, ant it behoved wem to consider whether the closing of some of these towers liad not heen due to their own selfish aclion. Directly peal of bells was put into arder'; if they were askerl-to furnish Sunday band they would not be able to do so, but the Vicar would this wis a position which they as Loncton ringers anglat to safeguard and in their own interests see that, these towers did not get closed throuth over-lise for peal ringing. In view of the difficulties which they were experiencing, he thonglat the next best thing they could do was to try and ring peals together on handhells (applause).
The Res. F. Li. Edwards responded for the Erorincial Societies, and referved to the countesy which country ringers always experienced when they risited the Londion Societies in their towers. He trusled that this spirit of good fellowship would ever continue, and that the time would pever come whon Landon dingers would fail to give such a hearty welcome and fratomal greeting to their brothers from the country (spplause).
Mr. C. H. Forton submitted the toast of "The Visitors," and read some amusing extracts from ancient records, showing low visitors Were sometimes Ereated in oldea duys. The Ancient Society of College Fouths was proud that evening to welcome so many guests, and he assured those connected with the various churches in London tiat the Society was alowas ready to hetp them bap nay wey contecterd with the bells of their charches, for they recognised that it was by the kindly courtesy of the church anthoritios that they were able to progresg and to accomplish those peals, of whith thes had the records in their peal hooks (applause).

## THE BELLS AS A PARABLF.

The Rector of Steprey replied in a thonghtful speedt, whieh was lit ip by many touches of humour. Briefy referring to same of the historical associations between his church ann? the oity he mentioned that the tenor hell at Stepney was cast for the Monastery in the Minories, in 3346. Tn thanking the Society for their invitation to the visitors, he remarked that the clergy appreciated the opportunitw once a vear of thanking the ringers for what they did. $\mathrm{H}_{\mathrm{c}}$ was very much indebted to Mr . Tanging for his personal help. and he also wanted to tilank Mrs. Fughes for the great assistaneen she gave him, br her handbell ringing, at a parochial soiree. Personally, he continned, he would love a peal at Stepncy every week, hut that was not mossible on account of the inlabitants and the shankeepers who lad to earry on their business rigit under the walls of the tower. Ther had to admit that constant peals would be a littla diffeult far those neople who lived eloge to the holls. At the same time, evea if business was carried on round the fower there

Was something wonderful in the ringing of the bells which permeated the whole commercial life yolug on beneath it. Through it all there was the sounding of a woie which, by awakening a religious consciousness, created ar atmosphere that must raise the tone of the secular life going on uround. It was inded a parable of what religion ought to be at any time, permeating the whole secular life of the nation, raising it to leenven, as the notes of the bells raised the thoughts of them all to ligher things. For that ho rendered them most cordial thanks (applause)
Mr. W. D. Smitis proposed the toast of 'The Press,' and rofering to ' 'lhe Ringing World, expressed regret that. its so many lawers the ringers were content to take only come copy for the whole band Instead of supporing it by taking a copy each, and thus enabling the scope of the paper to he exteafled by the fact of its much larger circulation.
Wr. J. S. Goldsmith (Editor of - The Langing World; respoaded, and remarked upon the increasing notice which was bring takeu of hells by some of the leading joumals in the land, articles having appeared which wite likely to mecurare public appreantina at ring iug. With regard to the Coilege Youths, he said he felt sure that the members of the society throughoui the country, andi ringers generally, would like to see published move details of what tho society was doing. At present very little was ever heard of them except for the peals they rang, and on the occasinn of that gathering, but some more frectuent notice of their activilies would be greatly interesting, for there was no need for such an ancient ant honourable society to hide its light unter a bushol.

This concluded the specehmaking. and the very pleasant gathering oame to a close with * Auld Lang Syne and the National Anthem.
Tha musionl progeamme included two fine songs by Capt. Frecborn, 'Songs of Araby,' and ' I pass hy your window,' sung in response to the demand for an encore. Mr. James Rullock was also encored for the song "Down Fauxlaall Way," and sang " Come to the Frir.' Mr. H. Castell, the accompanist, also sang. The fouture this part of the programme was, lowever, sanaia the hanthell playiug of Mrs. A. A. Hughes, who, to harp accompaument by Mr. Ti. A. Youbz, played "Meditation (Bach-Gounod), of which sho gave a beantiful rendering, ant an old finvourite in * Ash Grove, ${ }^{4}$ in which her skitl in handling the large number ot hells was fully manifested.

Mr. Carter dees not make limself very clear regarding his objection to : Bristol ' and 'Rutland,' but I imazime he thiuks an intiernal piace should be made at the treble's whole pull behind. I do noto take that position as a cross section of the treble's path. It is like the whole pull at lead. A dead end, the only way out is to go back. It is the starting and finishing place.
Mr. Carter also states that 'Rutland' Major, Royal and Maximus are three different methods. The odil pair of bells dodge in $1-2$. This is a new feature and I eapected some comment.-Fours truly
