## PLAIN MAJOR METHODS.

In his recent article on odd-bell methods, Mr. J. W. Parker commented upon the striking lack of variety exbibited in the ringing of peals of Triples, Caters and Cinques. To a large extent this is admittedly due, in the case of Triples at any rate, to the paucity of actual methods, and Mr. Parker pointed a way to obtaining something new which would be at least as interesting and difficult as anything which has hitherto been practised. The performance last week of the first peal of Edmonton Bob Major is a reminder that there is an equal absence of variety in the peals of Major rung in plain methods. Glance through our columns week by week, and there is seldom any peal in a Plain Major method outside Plain Bob and Double Norwich Court Bob. It is strange that this should be so, for there is a far wider range in Major methods than there is among the ' legitimate' methods of Triples, yet the fact remains. What the actual figures were for 1923 we shall know when the Analysis is published, but going back to the previous year, what do we find? There were 142 peals of Double Norwich, ita peals of Plain Bob, and for the rest - two peals of College Single and two peals of Little Bob! These figures are a striking evidence of the limitations which ringers set for themselves. These limits do not exist in reality, for there is plenty of scope in Major.

Edmonton Bols Major was one of a group of methods which we published in these columns ten years ago, founded upon combinations of Plain Bob and Court Boh, but probably the war caused the opportunities which they presented to be lost sight of. They are methods weil worth ringing, and easily within the capabilities of any man who can ring Double Norwich. They afford an excellent jumping-off place for any band which desires to get away from the beaten track, and, in view of the figures we have quoted above, there is no question that the ringers of Plain Major need getting out of the rut. Many bands have the desire to make progress, luet, finding Surprise ringing a little too big a jump from Double Norwich, or simple Treble Boh, content themselves with the 'standard' methods, because they imagine there is nothing else to ring. The idea is, of course, entirely wrong, and we sometimes think this word 'standard" ats applied to methods, ought to be scrapped. It is certainly out of date in ts present alceepted use. Shortly we hope to see produced the Central Council's collection of Plain Major methods, whim for various reasons hats been delayed. This should sive a bigs fillip to plain method ringing. Meantime, we can commend the methods like College Single and Edmonton Bob Najor to those who have a real desire to break from present narrow limits.

AN INTERESTING GROUP
The peal of Edmonton Bob Mejor which was rung at Willesden on Tuesday of lint week is one of a group of fifteen Major methods, the construetion of which was explained ir an article by Mr. J. 4 . I'rollope, whicl appeared in our columas on September 4th, 1914. They provide nu interesting variation in the direction of plain method ringing. In the ziticle veferred to Mr. Trollope explained that the methods of this group reare, in coustruction, the simplest that can be had with the treble as a plain hunt bell. Thoy are based upan the four following methods

Bob Major is constructed by making second's place when the treble leads, and the effect is to put the treble, which had been coursing between 3 and 2, between 5 and 3 .
Reverse Bob Major is conslrueted by making seventh's when the treble is belind, and that has exactly the same effect and brings up exactly the same rows as Bob Major.
Double Court Bob Major is constructed by the bell that is coursing in front of the treble making 4th's and 3rd's, and then Jiuntiag up aifter her, and this has the same effect on the cosising ordier as 2nd's place in Bob Major, it puts the troble from between 3 and 2 to letween 5 and 3. The second pair of places in the second balf of the lead puts the treble from botwcen 5 and 3 to between 7 and 5 .
The places in 5-6 in Reverse Double Coart Bob have the samo effect as the places in 3-4 in Double Court Bob.
Thus there are six distinct operations, each of which puts the treble one position forward in coursing order: 1, 2nd's plece in Bob Major; 2, Thb's of Reverse Rob Major; 3, 4th's and 3rd's of Double Court; 4. 3rd's and 4th's of Double Court ; 5, 6th's and 5th's of Reverse Double Court; 6, 5th's and 6ih's of Reverse Double Court. To preserve the symmetry of the method, if you use 3 , you must also use 4 and if you use 5 you must also use 6 .

\section*{NEW RING OF SIX FOR BEDFORDSHIRE.}

\section*{TEMPSEORD BELLS AUGMENTED.}

The village of Tempstord, Beds, is now in possession of an excelleat peal of six bells, which although somewhat light, the tenor being only 9 cwt. \(1 \mathrm{qr}_{\mathrm{s}}\) are of eplendid tone. Originally there were in the tower of St. Peter's Church five bells, a moised lot of varying dates, and chiefly notable far the fact that they contaiued example of the work of Newhome and Milos Gray. Newcome's bell was the ofd 4 thi, and he cast it in 1614. The treble and third were cast by Miles Gray.

Anolher belh, the 2nd, was the work of Richard Chandler in 1703.
The eugmentation to six, by tile addition of a new treble, has actompanied a complete restoration of the ring, which are now bung in a new steel and iron framo with all new fittings. To turn the hells into a musical peal it was found necessary to recast the Miles Gray bells, as well as the tenor, while the other old bells have been tuned. The work was admirably carried out by Messrs. Gillett aud Johnston, of Croydon, and the belis, which have a total weight of 30 cwt . 64 H. , were idedicated during morning service on Sunday week.
The ceremony was performed by the Bishop of St. Abans, who also preached. The bells were ruag, efter the dedicatory prayers, by H. L. Harlow 1, C. J. Ball 2, Miss Evelyn Steel 3, W. E. Folidn 4, T. Bartram 5, G. Wells 6. These ringers also brought round 3 K0 Bob Minor (conducied hy H. L. Herlow) immediately after the service. Ringing was continued during the afterneon, and for evening service 720 Bob Minor was rung.

My attempts on the subject produced from lhis Roynl a metbod that would go on eight and even numbers upward. The band practiged this on eight sand ten hells. Later Mr. Craren puthlished the method our band had rejected. Its name was 'Princess Mary,' and, such is human nature, 'Pudsey' or 'Loughborough,' ns we called it, was thrown ovorborrd in favour of the lady. In this case Pudsey accidentally turned out to be the revorse of Yorkshire, for the reverse at that time was not looked for It was simply an attempt to get a Major and Maximus out of what has now been rung ns Princess Mary. If Pudsey dees not belong to Mr. Carter, who claims the Princess? - Yours truly,

To-day (April 18th) is the 30th anaiversary of lle isht40 Dubble Norwich Major rang in b hours 16 minntes at Romford by the Royal Cumberlend Youibs.

April 18th is also the annivarsary of one of the aarliest lone Inngtis of Grandsire Caters, in peal af 12,006 Inviug been rung in \(?\) hours 55 minutes at Painswick in 1737. Bui in those days there wero no ringing papers and no 'wireless,' and the Painswick men must lave been unaware that less than six weeks hefore a peal of 12,603 lind ben rung at Norwich.
It was at Appleton on April 11th, 1888, that this Norwich peal was baten by a 13,265 , and then on April 22 nd, 1889 , at band met at Cheltenham and set up the present record for the method of 15,227 in 9 hours 43 minutes.
There were some promineni mames among that band, few of whom now surrive. The ringers were F. Musty, (i. H. Phillott, S. Reeves, F. Roberls, F. E. Ward, C. H. Hattersley, J. Plant, W. T. Patea (conductor). T. Reynolds and A. W. Humphris.
By a coincidence the same day, April 22nd. is the anaiversary of the record length of Stedman Gaters, the 21,363 at Appletnn, in 12 hours 25 minutes in 1922
A peal of 8,000 Oxford Treble Bob Majov was rung at Rerknaall in 5 bours 9 minutes on April 23 rd, 1828, and on April 24 th , 1896, 10,400 Kent Treble Bob Major whs rung al Shipley, Yorks.
Ringers shonld note that there are now iwelve bells at Grent St. Mary's. Cambridge, the aracked 7th laving been recast, and replaced Barly this year. The Ely meeting ou Basier Mondry, writes n correspondent, wil\} afford a good opportunity for iwelve bell experts, inclading out old friend, "Bob Major," to delight fise inhalitants witht some good twelve-bell tonches.
The Fon. Secretary of the Yorkshire Assaciation land a pleasant experience at Birminghum last week, whon, attempting a peal of Stedman Cinques on Jandbella for the first time, se rang \(3-4\) to his first twelve bell peal.
The peal at Bishop Ryder's Clureh. reported inst whek, was Fang in 3 bus. 2 mins. The dionor of the hells was Mr. R. R. Golling. not Mr. R. E. Gelling, as printed in the repart.

Dear Sir,-There is one thing that Mr. G. P. Burton has omithed to mention mitla regard to the present weights of the individual bella at St. Petbr Mancroft, Norwich, which might prove of interest.
All the bels are weighed hefore being tuned, and this, I should thind, is the cause of the lighter weights, not so much as the inaceuracy of the scales.
No doubt modern Simpson tuned peals, if Inken down and weighed, would prove lighter than the weights which invariably hang in the belfry. The fact should not be lost sigint of that in former days bells were weighed without the clappers.-Yours faithfully,

\section*{ST. GILES, NORWICH.}

A great deal of ringting history has been made in Norwich, and the story of the betls, upon which some of the outstanding performances of the past have been achieved, is always interesting.

The original peal at St. Giles' Chureh consisted of three bells only, of which the present sisth and seventh are all that remain. The original tenor was in the tower until 1860, when she was cracked through tolling for-a death with a clapper rope. This is much to be deplored, as she was a splendid specimen of medizeval casting, with

The tenor is \(43 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{i}\). diameter, weight \(14 \frac{\frac{3}{3}}{}\) cwt.
The transiations of the Latin inscriptions are as follow:-

6th,- Gabriel sent down truly brings joys of blessed Mary."

' black letter' inscription and highly ornamented Lomthardic capitals, of which I shall have mote to say further on. Thas present fourth is by Wm. Brent, and the fifth by Richard Brasyer; both Norwich founders. The third hell (which has no inscription) was probably cast by Gilpin, about the year 1 jog, the weingt heing given in the ' Visitation Inventory' of that year as \(44 \frac{1}{4}\) lhs. The two trebles, says the lnventory of 1740 . " were purchased in the year 1738 by a voluntary subscription of the parishioners and of other gentlumen in the City of Norwich.
"The clock-bell is first mentioned in the inventory of \({ }^{1735}\), and in that of \({ }^{1740}\) is said to weigh 2 ewt. The inscriptions on the peal of eight are as follows:-

Mr. T. L'Estrange gives an elching of the inseription on the old tenor, in his "Churcht Bells of Norfoik,' p. 174.
Jolin Colton, by his will daterl January Sth, 1457, bequeatined a piece of land containing one acre with its rippurtenances ir Heygham-next-Norwich to the parisibioners of St. Giles', Norwicti, on condition that they for ever cause the ringing gallet "Curfew befi 'faithfully to be observed in the said clureh every night. Kirkpatrink notes that the ringing was to le during one quarter of tive ninth hour at night.' L'Rstrange, writing in 1874, says: "The beil is nom rung efery \(\begin{aligned} & \text { ight. Saturdays and Simdays excepted, st eight in the sin- }\end{aligned}\) ter and nine in the summer, for bue quarter of an hour."
Thare have ben many notewortly peal performances at St. Giles' Church, and some of them are recorded on tablets in the belfry. The oldest tablet records the death of a vinger. who, at the conclusion of a peal. the first ever ruag of 'Imperial the Third,' droppodedend. It was in St. Giles' beliry thar the first peal of Superialive Surprise Major was ruug, nanl it is here. nlso, that there is to be fond the record of the firs peal of London Serprise Major, although this was actually rung at St. Andrew's Church.
The following are the copies of the fablets:-
Near to this place Johm Webster fell,
Beloved by all who knew him well;
The most ingenious noted Ringer,
St. Giles's Sixth Bell round did bring her. He closed the Peal, struck well his Bell, Ceasing the same down dead he fell. Nowember 17ili, 1760.

This tablet refers to the ringing of a peal of IMPERTAL the THIRD on November 17th, 1760 ; in which Johm Webster rang the sixti, and fell down dead as they were 'falling' the balle after the peal. The other riugers were Joln Chamberlain, who rang the trete and conducted; Jolin Dye, who rang the tenar; Christopher Lindsay, John Barton, James Watling, ₹ohn Havers, and James Vines.
6,272 changes of TREBLE BOB wore, on Thuraday, the 15til of Aptil, Ig73, Rung in this Steeple, by eirht persons belonging to tha Company of Riugers of the Parish of St. Peter's of Mancroft in this City, ir four hours and seven minutes, without a Bell being out of caurse, on the repetition of a single change. The peal was candacted by Mr. Robert Chesnutt in a very ingonious manuer, and for bold and regular striking, was allowed by all impartial judges to be a masterly and unrivalled performance. The Bobs were called in the Sixth Place, and not in the usual rathod of practising this poal. This Board was erected by the Churchwardens and Parishioners bo commemorate the Display of Science and Ability in the Art of Ringiug, which was perfarmed by the following Persons:-

This great task on eight Belis was perfectly Completed iv the space of 3 lours and If minutes, without the repetition of Changes, and is only the second peal in this difficult method that ever was accomplished in this City. This Peal was composed and ably Conducted by Saml. Thurstou, and for bold and regular striking reflect great credit on the Coropans, and was rung by the following persons:-


On 3arch 9th, 1832 , was rung a complete and true peal in this steeple, comprising 6,720 Cbanges of OXFORD TREBLE BOB, in 3 hours and 53 minutes. Dear Sir,-Whe mistakc in the peal at Ealing was limited to one change only. The handstroke 10 whis struck perfectly correctly, but al the back stroke the ringer of the second instead of making the bob cut clown below the third and fourth. I shouted at him before his bell sfuck, and though the striking bufferen the belle were right immediately. When we finished anl Mr, Fardon made his protest, 1 explained what had lappened, and caid ft was a yery fine point, ard the band as a whole must decide what to do in the matter. They did decide that nothing lagd happmed which would really inwalidate the peal. In this conmection it must ba rememhered that while Mr. Fardon was positive thiat the hells had struck rounde, others were equally positive that they liad nol done se.
1 am afraid Mr. Fardon misunderstood what I said to hime afterwards. I did say that he was perfectly justified in making his protest, but that fid not menn that \(I\) ecentent his view of what happened. Quite obviously not, for if 1 had 1 should have either stopped the bells when the wistake occurred, or have said definitely when we finished that it was no peal. As a mater of fact, on a previous oecasion in thin amme tower and calling, as it happened, the same composition I did stop the bells in the last courge hecause the hob had not been made properly. The difference between the two erseg was 1hat in thal case the bells were wrong for half a lead. and in this for not mare than it single change. What I meant was that since he hat doubtg aloout the penl he was righi to say so. I land in mind the faet thint otion members of the ham seemed to think, not unnaturally, liatt ho was exceeding his lights that making unnecessary trouble.
 matiter. But as I knew, and he know. What the band had just eleeided that the peal should stand, and Litht not \(T\) hut anather would forward you the renorf, clearly then meand just the onposite from what he suggests. T must, not complatin of being misunderstooth, for I , on mv part, certainty thought he has remided that he hacl done sufficient in making his protest. and alan would do nothing more.
