## ROUNDS ' IN A PEAL.

The question whether 'rounds,' when it occurs through an accident in the ringing of a peal, should invalidate the performance, is a matter of considerable interest to the whole Exercise. Point is given to this matter, of course, from the discussion upon what recently happened at Ealing. So far as that particular peal is concemed, there seems to be a difference of opinion as to whether rounds actually did occur two courses from home, and no one but the ringers concerned are in a position to settle the point. But it does raise an important question of principle. Our correspondent, "An Inquirer," put the whole matter concisely, yet adequately, in his letter last week, when he asked why a peal in which rounds is accidentality struck should be worse than one in which some other less noticeable row is repeated, and added that neither could be true, and, logically, both should be placed in the same category as a peal whose composition is false.

In general practice, we believe, 'stand ' is called when rounds unquestionably turns up, from whatever cause, before the end of the peal. Ringers, or the majority of them, do this, because "rounds ' is looked upon as the finish, and anything that is rung afterwards is in the nature of another touch. In this sense, therefore, rounds in the internal portion of a peal is treated as being in a different category to other 'accidental' changes, and there is good ground for so doing. It is quite true that, in a peal of Triples, for instance, the occurrence of rounds, through a mistake on the part of a ringer, would make the peal no more false than would any other change accidentally repeated, yet there is about 'rounds ' a recognition of finality, whick, in the ordinary view, brings the touch to an end.

If we refer to the 'Rules and Decisions' of the Central Council, we find that the only ruling which affects this question is the one which states 'that any shift or error in ringing (shall) be immediately corrected.' Under this decision, it is manifest that the accidental accurrence of rounds before the end of a peal is condoned so long as the mistake is at once put right, that is, that the bells are not allowed to continue ith what is, really, a wrong coursing order. In view, however, of the rapid strides which are being made in peal ringing, we imagine many ringers will agree that the rule reguires strengthening, or, shall we say, amplifying- At present the word ' immediately' is sometimes loosely interpreted, and to some ringers wo have heard of may mean anywhere before the next course-end. That kind of acceptation of the term was never intended by the Council, and in these

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days, when peals are so easily attained, it would be well if the Council turned their attention to tightening up the rules. At the same time they might add an expression of opinion, if they are unable to go to the extent of lay. ing down a decision, on the particular question of "rounds." They may like to say that this row, however it occurs in the body of any peal on seven bells and upwards, should invalidate the performance, or they may express the opposite view. But some opiation on the subject might well be added to the existing definitions of what constitutes a peal.

Hibbard and Rovill, respectively: Duying the afternoon, several members paid a visit to South Oollinghan Clurch for propaganda work, and touches of Doubles were brought round, but the bad 'go ${ }^{3}$ of the bells, and the fact that they are very much out of tunc, convinced the company that the attention of the bell hanger and founder was much needed, sa their stay was brief. Sixty memberg and friends sat down to a gubstantial meat tea, providen by the local ringers, their wives and friendis. Amongst those present were the Vicar (the Rev. F. F. Graukil, Mra. Gould, the churchwardens, and several members of the Parochial Council, the Ref. C. J. Sturton, and the assistant lion. secretary (Mr. D. A. Pjercy). -The Assistani Secretary explained the unavoidable absence of the lion. secretary (Mr. H. Haigh), whose ser rices were required at Wembley.
Three new members were duly elected, via, the Misses Birchnall and Mr. Hather from Suthon-on-Trent.
The date of the annual meeting was left in the lands of the committee ankl will be nivertised in the 'Ringing World.'
The Assistant Mon. Secretary proposed a hearty vote of thanks to the Vicar for presining over the tea and meeting and for the use of tho bells and schoolroom: alsa to the ladies and ringers for providing tea, and to eyeryone who had assisted in making the meeting a suc-cess.-This was carried with acclamation.
The Ficar said how very pleased he was to welcome sueh a large number of ringers, and paid a great compliment to them for ringing so micely during the day. He was pleased to say the church possessed a nice ring of six hells. Tp to two years ago they only had four bells in the tower, the dates being 1613, 1661 , 1715 and 1779 . They were in a very lod condition, cracked, and very mach out of tune. Ten yests ago a scheme was set on foot to have the belfry restored, tut the war came along, and overything liad to be suspended, hut abont three years ngo the work was again faken wn, and properly crined ont at a cost of hetween £700 and $£ 800$. Ther liad now a hand of voung ringers, which ineluded two or three laties, who, alordinary. hind done very well indeed. and had succeded in ringing their first 720 ehanges on the halls. He wished specially to mention the food work done hy Mr. Whilhapd, their instructor, and also the hearty ro-operalion the ringers lad given him.

## THE SUFFOLK GUILD

## GREAT PROGRESG IN MEMBERSHIP

On Easter Monday, the Suffolk fuild met for its annual meeting at Bury. The day hegan with a short service in the Gathedral, at whid the Bishoy preachens. With his laxt, Ps. Ixxit. 24, he remarked thist the Israelites had only little tiokling bells: we lad the organ mside, and bells outsifle our churches: thesu later ware not likely to be superseded. The work of ringel's was as iruportant as that of other churel workers, though it might nat have received the atitention tu the pest that it ought-periaps owing to the ringers being out of sight. While it is woll that bells should express men's extraordinary t'eelings, batli of sorrow and of joy, ringers shonld always remember that they use the chardi hells for the worship and service of crod.
At the meeting in the Abbey House afterwards, the Arcladeacon of Sudbury, who presided, mentioned that this was the first meoting at Bury since the 'Great Schism.' Fhe had great pleasure in welcoming them there, and in introducing to them the Bislop.
The Bishop (Dr. Whittingharm) said how glad he was to meet then. He referred to experiences in the belfry of St. Margaret's, Leicester, to which church ho was ordained. Ever since, as a hoy, hu liad lived near a nolle ring of belle, lie liad always felt that the ringer's art had an uplitting influence; and ringers should feel that they were not ouiside the elurch, bat in it and of $i t$. He supposed there were still a few ringers in tile diocese attached to the Norwioh Guila instead of theirs. Well, one conld not but sympathise witla all who ndmiyed Norwich; he did so himself, having got his wat from there; still, zingers as chumb workers in the right epirit, shoula! help diocestill work

Proceeding to business, the meeting nccepted the report nnt ancounts. These showed a balance in hand of e26.

The offeers were all rewecten, with the addition of Mr. Fuhart Day, of Eye, aud Mr. Ermest Poppy, of Stoke Ash, to fll the two vacancies on the Central Council, to which the Guild, with its increased membership, was how entitlofl.
It was decided to hold quartarly meetjngs, and invitations from Lavenlam and Falenmorth werc accepted.
The commiblee were instructed to start a Bell Restoration Fumal, to take sleys to stop 'clocking (a pernicious way in whirh old church hells are still being injured), nmit to issue cortilicates, botlo of profinjency and of record porformances.

Requests laning been received hotly from the Leytonslome hansl, and from Mr . Burton, the representative of the Nomich Guiln, that the Central Council should take iu lishi the nrming of new meilhots, t resolution th that effect wes manimausly adopted.
sixty new members were elected. It was reported that flirea districts were still dormant, but members present from them saifl that sigus of aqakening intercst were now appearing.
After the meeting, lunch was served at the Golden Flecee, nud thrfng the aftermoon the hells at bolh churches were kept going i and over 70 remained to accept the Areldeacon's invitation to ten. al 1 lm Abbey Honse, where they were joined by Canon Goldsmith, Vicar in the Getledral, and the Rev. Dr. Giray. Vicar of St. Mary's.

TAUNTON BELE HANGER'S SUDDEN DEATH MR. T. DOBLE DTES IN THE BELFRY.
It is with deep regret that we have to anmounce the suddea death of Mr. 'Thomas Doble, of Tamzon, head of the firm of Messrs- Thomas Doble aldi Sion, bell laangers. The firm lave recently carried out an order for Lord St. Audries at Stogursey Cburch (of which the Vicar is the Thev. W. J. Slatart-Crump), whieh lies al no great distance from the Bristol Channel, and not many miles from what is hoped will become known as the celebrated somersel oil fields. The work comprised strengthening the fraure with tig bolts, and fitting new gudgeons and bearings far the bells. It had been arranged to test the work before Leat commenced, but owing to an epidemic of infuenza prevailing in the viliage it was postponed until May 3 rd.
Mr. T. Doble and his son, Mr. W. Doble, also Messis. P. Merson, F. Millard, E. Priddle and J. Hunt left Taunton for this purpose in Mr. Doble's motor-car on Saiurday. 4 run of about 22 miles brought the party to tive ancjent church. Having looked round the building, they ascended the tower, and inspected the worlc done. The bells, a peat of six, with tenor 25 cwt, were raised, and a start made for Grawdsire Boubles. All went well for about 80 changes, when Mr. T. Doble, who was ringing the treble, released his rope, and fell to the foor. The bell set up, and the others set their belis and went to his assistance. Mi. W. Dohle rushed off for a doctor, who grrjved in abont ten minutes, and confirmed the lingers' Fears that Mr. Doble, senr., was beyoud human aid.

Sorrowfully and with dificulty the deceased was carried down the tower stairs, and laid an a bier in the nothe porch of the church fyy the Vicar's kindness.
Much sympathy is felt for Mr. W. Doble and his three sisters, who lost their mather onjy last Decesubut.

The Boaraville carillon has just been enlarged from 22 to 37 bells (three full chlromatic octaves) by Mr. George Cadbury, junr., in memory of his father. A new elavier, with the most up-to-date mechanism and action work, las also beon ndded. It was oponed on Thursday of last weok hy M. Nauwelacts, the carilloneur, of Bruges, who gave two recitals.

The name given to Mr. Joln Carler's finging machine is the - Campinomutophone.'

For some mouths past the bells of Wool, Dorset, have beca silent, owing to a dispute between the ringers and the oburch nuthorities over the removal of a lamp which served for the lighting of the tower. A new lamp las been proyided by the Dorchester Branch of the Salisbury Guild, and the thouble has now happily ended.
To-morrow is the anniversary of two long peals rung in the faroff days of the eigiteenth century. In the ancient parish church of St. Mary, Braughing, Hertfordshire, aro several old peal boards, and one of them records:-
"May, the 10th, 1779, wns rung by the Braughing Youthis $n$ Compleat Peal of 12,240 Bob Major which was Perlormed in Seven Hours and 34 Minates by Lawrence Tottingliam, trebble; Thas. Whyman, 2nd: Wm. Prior. Zrd; Wrs, Hoy, 4th; Geo. Beadle, 5th; Jno. Hubbard, 6ith; Jas. Walker, 7th; Jos. Walker, teunor. Composed and called ly James Walker. it was long each man dir? stand, with zeal and ardent union performed the peai.

A peal of 10,080 in the same method had been rang about a year earlier.
The other peal, of which the anniversary occurs to-morrow, was 10,200 Treble Bob Royal rung in 7 thours 40 minutes at Sloreditoh in the year 1777 by the Cumberland Youths
On May 11th, 1903 , the peaf of 14,112 London Surprise Major was ruag in 8 hours 40 minutes at King's Norton.
Thirty years ago mext Thursday the 8,800 Suncrlative Surprise Major was rung in 6 hours 16 minutes, composed and coniucted by Nathan I. Pitstow. The band was N. J. Pitstom, Rev. F. G. Coleridge, A. James, E. Pitstow, J. Hardy, S. Smith, R. F. Lane and J. W. Taylor, junr. It is interesting to note that it was the first peai in the method for the ringers of 5 th, 6 the and 7 th.
At All Snints' Churel1, Frifhatm, on May 15th, 1837, a peai of 12,096 Girandsire Caters was rung 'by the young ringers of St. James' Societry . . being the greatest amount of changes ever performed by ten men only, the truth of which is attested by several of the ablest fudges of the art, whe witnessed the whole performance, and which can only be equalled by the same nbility and persevering exertions.' The peal was rung in 7 houls 50 ministes, and was condreted by Thomas Tolladay.

The peal of Minor reparted lasf week ns rung at Liverpool on April 23red, was rung at Childwn!t.
The treble ringer in the peal at Frorlsham on Easter Monday was Thomas W. Gilmeur, and not Jolm W., as stated in the report.
The time of tha peal of Trehl Toh rine at Willesden on Aprif 2end was 2 hirs. 43 mins.

## MR. JOFN CARTER'S RINGING MACHINE. A MARVEL, OF INGENUITY.

14. las been generally known it ringing circles for many years past that Mr. Folm Carter had invented a machiac for ringing any numbis of chages in any method, amd an any number of bells up to twelve. Mr. Carter worked and resided in Jimingham for many yoars previously to his recent removit to London, and many ringers in that neighbourhood had tho privilege to see lis machine working, us did also visitors from all parls. To nill such the roachine seemed a masel of ingenuity, and one that harl mara dima achieved its original purpose. To the intentar, however, it alsuys seemed to fall short of that higla samdard of perfection to which ho characteristically aimed, ant additions and alterations wero continually being tried. The machine, therefore, was never demanstrater beyond a "plain course " in any mothod, nor was a tonch' ever allowed to be brought round. It was saved up for epmal, or some other demonElpation which should seem futing to the inventor

The machine, to one insperting it for tho first time, apperss remarkubly compact, as can be seen by the photograph. It is an as-

sembly of mechanical contrivances of all sorts, of high finish, and Lo as scalo of about ordinary clockwork size. THe power is obtainot from an electric mator within the pedestal box. Gearing from this sets up longitudinal motion in cranks and eccentrics, which in turn ingol oleven rods, these transmit their motion fo twelve plates moving transversely neross the machine, the whole being most beautifully eoverned by a sort of dual control, creb in two parts and allied to the hand fod back strokes in ringing. The phates move backwards and forwards aceording to the places they are moking in tho method to which the machine may have bean set, and, as they carry contact pins, thoy elcetrieally control their several allied gongs in an adjoing bellhox. This latter is the last addition to his machine, which Kif. Carter has made despite the fart that lis recent illness renders all work difeult to him. The box hos twelve gongs, being those kindly given him by Messus. Taylor and Co., who purposely cast them for tho machine. According to the original plan the gongs were fixed along tho top, and the brass seating for fhem still forms the mutho of the machine.

The machise will ring any known or likely to be known methor. one of the last, that composed by the inventor, and named after himself, viz., Garter Major, was tried as its first quarter peal, as

Whs reported last week. It was set to his method in two or three minutes, and rang it faultlessly (except when Mr. Carter at the firat altempt 'called a bob' too late!).

The machine is ane of the most remarkable inventions of its kind in the world, and the opportunity might be laken to quote a few words of the late Sir A. Hoywood, who, besides being a man of business, and an engineer, will always be remembered iu the Exercise as a gifted exponent of ringing. He expressed his views as follows in a letter to Mr. Carter, dated March 7th, 1897 :-

1 lavo been tbinking a good deal about your machine, and 1 cannol belp admiring wery deeply the perseverance and intelleatual ability which you have brought to bear on the problem. I am lost in woader at the ingenuity of the contrivance and the foresight with which you have covered the many requirements of such a machine if it is to be perfect. Clarles Babbage's machine on whinch he - or rather the Government spent $£ 17,000$ is now in King's College Museum, London.
Well, your machine is, in a way, on the lines of Babbage's, though, or course, its purpose being difterent, the machanisms are novel intieed. But it is to all intents and purposes a calculating machine for proving, either in figures or sonnd, tho lesults of certain modes ef dealing with permutations.
The fret that you do not stop short of the maximum number of bells, and that you cover all possible methods, makes the machine of immense interest, because there is no future dovclopment of change ringing that cannol be worked out on it. There is no doubt that if oorspleted and made to work witl accuracy, its ulfimate home should bo in a National Museum.'
Sir Arblur's desire will probably be fulflled, for Mr. Carter has decided to deposit the machine in tho Victoria and Albert Museum, with the proviso that it shall be demonstrated occasionally.

Mr. Carter, before parting will the machine, also decided that it should be allowed to prove itsalf wortly of its reputation, before a small party of ringers and friends, who should be iavited to a private demanstration. ## A NOISY RINGING CHAMBER.

## To the Editor.

Dear Sir, Our ringing chamber is very noisy. Woald any of your realers who have had experience in overconing thin grave defect advise us as to whether the following proposal is likely to be successful? We propose to fix a gew floar (1-fneft boards) to the underside of the beams which support the flonr of the helf chamber. These beams are 15 incles deep, and the resulting space to ba packed with suitable material would be about 300 cubic feet. We propose to nse slag wool, and slould be glad of guidance as to the quantity thet would be required, and the approximate cost.
The height of the ringing clinmber is about 20 feet, and the space between the joists which rest upon the beams, with thick boards above and below them, lins rhrendy been filled with slag wool. Possibly this space was insufficiently packed. At any rate the noise is too great.- Yours faithfully,

The repori; meutioned above, contained the following:-

- In addition to the unuunl mecting. Feveral successful meetimg were held daring the year, the jorense in the ateudances being vary notimeatle. Men were lield in the North and East distriet, four ot which weye in six-hell towers, twa of fhese later being lield in mintweek. I'lue averago attendance wat the excelfent one of 35. Ina tha Soutli and West distriat twolre meetings were arranged, all but one taking place an a Saburday. A great improvement in the standard of rimging wis noiicente at these meetinge, whilst the attentance reached the fane average of 40 .
Seveaty-fiwe new members were flected during the fear, flse North and East abistrict admiting two honorary and 41 riagirng rnembers, whilst the Soutla aud West distrides obtainerd iwo and 30 respectively. The retaren to the Assuciation of tha thand at St. George-ire-the-Fast. is a matter for congralalation, whilst we are ulso pleased to weleome the ringers al St. Olave ${ }^{1}$, Fant Strect, to onr rauks. Same of the members of the hand at st. John of ferasalem have aiso joined us, and we hope it will not the long before this tower is whotly affliated. Our total membership, attor allowing for losses through dentis, rosiguations, etc., is 712 .

The peal list fol 1923 embins some wory satisfactory features. Seventy-six peals were rung, and 249 members took part in lhwn, ten of whonn joined tite peat ringing rants for the first time. Thost who whit theik first peals in a new mathou or on a different number of bells numbered 88 . Six of fle peats wite rang on landiolls, including oue cach of Keat 'l'rolite Boh Maximus and Superlative Fiurprise Wajor. The conductorg numhered 19 . nad of the 70 tower-hull peals, which were rung in 33 towers, 19 werr rung at Willesden.

Among the performantes challing for special mention wete the litst. peal of Erin Caters by Llut Associntion, whirh was rung at St. Mary's, Walthamstow, on Februmry 10th: a pral of Grandsire Douhles, vung on the Pro-Refomation hills at, St. Batholomm the Great, on Mituht 21st, to eommemorate tha 8001h anniversary of the dedication of 1.he church, this peal probatbly heing the firct ever rung ous those bells: a vory for meal of Cambuidgn Surprise Maximus, at St. Mary-le-Row, ou Mareh 24th; and a peal of Cambringe Surprise Minor al Willesden on August 14th, which completed the Ifariette of Camherign an all nambers by members of this Ascouintion. The frst peal of Double Oxford Telo Major lyy the Assometion was ming at St. Mary's, W'illesAen, an October' $9 t l_{1}$; followed by the first of St. Clement's Bob Major. at the shme chnrely on December 18ith. The peal of Superlative Jang on hamaluelts on Sentember 26th was the 200 h in in that method by that Association; which ulso completed the cerstury of Stedman Cinques at St. Marv-le-Rtw on Nowerluer 17ik: and of Pastol surprian Mnjor at St. John-the-Baplist, Frith. on Decemher I5tls. The year's recom of noteworthy performanees was brought in a elose lyg the ringing of a peal of 10,440 Cambriclge Surpriso Royal at St. Mary's, Walihanstow, on Decenber 26th, this lieing the longest Surprise peal ever rung on tell bells.

The quarlec-peal list is a more extensive nne even than that of lasd. sear ; no less than 211 loaring been reromed. Ealing (St. Marys) again heads the list with 38, Anton coming second witls 35, and Hillingelors (St. John's) third with 22. We are, of course, awatre of the difficulties af many fowers in commertion with the various sintvices Field on Sundays which often prevent lengtly periods of ringing, lut we klould wery muth like to sec more of our churches finuring in the quamer-peal list, fund moro quatcor-peals rang in the Norrl, and East district. The record af bell restoration work is agnin saljafantory. At St. Andrew"s Church, Frifeld, the peal of eight has heen relnug wilh new gudgeous and bearings and the framework strengthenct; whilst at the churches of St. Martin. Gospel Oak, and St. Jemes, Prebenf Square, Jslington, the peals of six have pach been rahang with new gutgeons ant bearings, with good reaults. All this work las heen carried out by Messrs. Mears and Stambank.'

Grnon Baker was re-elected president. The vice-presidents were reelected, with the addition of Mr. Cyril Herbert in the place of the Inte Mr. Charles Herbert. The hon. secretary (Mr. A. E. Sharman) was re-clected, and the president and lon. secretary were elected to the Central Conceil for the ensuing three sears.

## A DEVON RING RESTORED.

The bells of St. Mary's Parish Clureh, Black Torrington, Devon, Irave beon uniergoing repair, and have now been indedicated by the Bishop of Exeter. A fine peal of six, of exceptionally mellow tone, they were formerly huug in a wood frome, aud after many years of constant tise, feac was entertained as to their safety owing to filu truin ork beams showing sigas of decay. It was decided to have them relhug, and the cantract was placed with the well-known firm olt Messrs. Gillett and Johnston, of Croydon, who have carried out the work most satisfactorily.
The churcli posesses in remarkably fine tower, probably built about 1500. There is no record of bells being piaced in the fower until 1772, when four were lung by Peanington. In 2855 and 1856 two more were added by C. and G. Mears. These two are supposed to he peace bells' to celebrate the cad of the Crimenn war. The bells bear the following inseriptions:
1, 2 and 3'I. P. and Co., 1772 '; 4: "C. and G. Mears, Founder", London, $1856^{\circ}$; $5:$ Charles Burdon Gent, Humplrer Bramad, Churchwardeus. 1.P. $1722^{\prime}:{ }^{6}:^{\circ} \mathrm{C}$. and G. Mears, Founders, London, $1855 .{ }^{\prime}$ The treble is 27 inches iu diameter. The tenor is 40 melies in dinmeter, and weighs $8 \mathrm{cwt} .3 \mathrm{glr} .9 \mathrm{lb} ., \mathrm{tlie}$ total weight of the peal being 34 ewt. 1 gr .14 lb .
There was a large congregation prosent for the rededication service, which was ronducted by the Rector. Arter the 3rd Collect, the Bishop, Rector, charchwardens and choir proceeded to the belfre, Hhere the Bishop, after the sledicatory prayers, pulied tle tenor bell. His lordship afterwards gave a most appropriate adures.
Over 100 partook of a public luncheon. presided over br the Bishugn. and in the afternoon there was clay pigeon shooting for prizes, atal skittling for a pig, kindly given by Mr. B. Coham Fleming, while the bells were constantly kept going. The first ringing on the belis was done by the home band, unter Mr. E. Chapman (captaim, and afterwards ringers from Sheepwash, Shebbear, Petrockstowe, Little Torrington, Bradford and Bratton Clovelly tonk prit. All were umanimous in prasing horlh the tone and 'go of the bells.

## HAPPISBURGH'S ANCIENT BELLS.

## HEARD AGAIN AFTER A CENTULRT'S SLLENCE

On Easter Eve, the Bishop of Norwich dedicated the bells of st . Mary's Clauch, Happisburgh, which till then had been silent for more than a century, excopt that two could be chimed for service.

The ancient Clurch of St. Mary, which stands on the lofty cliffs ${ }_{3}$ the Tast Norfolk Const, 15 miles from Gromer, is an edifice of Jlini in tho Perpendieurar style, consisting of chancel, nave, aisles, sumth porch, and a lofty gmbattled westem tower 110 seet high, and, compled with the lighthouse a few hundred yards to the southward, is a landmarik to yisitors and to mariners, und commands an inmonse area of the sea and of the countryside. Three large bells, one at them weighing $14 \frac{1}{2}$ cwt., lung in the tower in the middalo of the 15th century (abond 1450). In 1637 these were recast into five bells, giving to the tenor a weiglit of $12 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{cw}$. In the restoration, the two with their crowns broken off have been recost, aud a mew treble ahked, thus making a ring of six bells, with a weight of 11 cwt. for the tenor in G.
The secoud, third and fitth bells, which remain as they were, anch bere the inscription :-

John Brend made me 1637.' The others are inseribed as follows
The new treble: "Given by Mary Caton, 1924, in memory of Nelson's men wrecked off the Norfdik Coast, 1801.

The fourth: ' John Brend made me 1637. Rewast by II. S. Todd, in manory of his wife, Fmma, who died in 1920.

The tenor: 'Reeast by 7 . B. Pearce, Mayor, 1924: 'Whomas Harris, Thomas Hnsted, Chareliwardens, J.B., 1637.

To those who never furned their backe, but marehed buenst forward.
Never doubted clouts would break,
Never dreamed though right were worsted, wrong would trimmply
Held we fall to rise, are baffled to ftght better, sleep to wake."
On one of the pilkars of the tower areli is a plate inseribed: "The bolls of St. Mary's, 1637.-To the Glory of God, and in memory of the nificers and men of the Royal Navy and Mercantile Marine who made the supreme sacrifiee in the Great War, 1914-1919. These belfs huw been restored. Easter, 1924.

The 4th aud tenor were recast and the treble cast by Messrs. Mears and Stainbank, of Whitechapel, and the work of rehanging in a new frame was admivably carried ont by Messrs. C. Day and Son, of Eye, Sufiolk.

Mr. Arthur L. Coleman, secretary of the Norfollz Guild of Ringers. orranised the ringing, and members of the Guill were recruited from Aylsham, Cromer, Norwich, Great Xarmonlh, Gorleston, Mulbarton, and North Repps.

After the dedication prayers by the Bishop of Norwich beneath the tower arch, a plain course of Boh Minor was yung hy George Neale 1, Ben S. Thompson 2, Authur F. Webber 3. Denison Hayward 4, John Moy 5, Gearge Mayers 6. At. the conelusion of the service, a touch of Bol Minor was sung with Arthur L. ## KIRKTHORPE BELLS AUGMENTED.

## OPFNING OF A YORKSHIRE PEAL

Kirkthorpe is a small hamet, pretty and nutiquated, two miles east of Hiaketied, on the eouts bank of the fiver Calder. If cons sishs of a church, vicarage, hospital, almulnouses, and a iew cotbiges. There is some evidence thatio a perl of six bellsexisted at the churct in 1492, but their fato is enshrouded in mystery. Two, dated 1611, are probably earlier ones reanst. Another belt of great historical interest, and now the 5th in the pracent pion, or the 3rdoriginally, formerly hung in Kirkstall Abbey, near Leeds. This bell which, it is supposed, was cast in York, is inscribed in beautiful characters: Lautentius : loles : De : Berdesay : Abbas : Aa: Di : Mo. Lawreuce is the jame given to the bell; John de Bardsey was Abbot of Kirkstall in 1396. The fourth, or presemb tenor, was givelu by the lata Mr, Gilbert Tonoant, of Heath Old Hall, the former residence of Sir Edward Grcen, Bart., tnown atl over the wortd as hearl of the grent firm of fuel economisers, of Wrkegeld. Mr. Tenuant's sot was killed in the war, and this bell was given in his memory. Recently two new bells have leen added by Messrs, traylor and Co., of Louglaborough, and the whole rchung in a strong and massive irou framowork, in steel girders on the latest priuciples. Their intings contain all the improvements in bell harging which Messrs. Taylor have indroduced luring recent years, so that even henvy bells can he rung with the greatest ease. These lwa new trebles contain the following inseriptions:-
