## BACK TO THE BELFRY

This week marks the close of 'summer time,' and with the putting back of the clock there will be a material shortening of the evening period of daylight, and consequently a limitation of the opportunities of outdoors recreation. During summer many towers suspend their practices, on account of the claims which outdoor pursuits make upon members of the belfry, but this change over from 'summer' to nornal time should, in all such instances, witness an immediate resumption of work in the belfry. This is the best period at which to enlist new blood; for with a full winter ahead there is more than time to teach a beginner to handle a bell; there is space enough in which to make a method ringer of him, before the summer pastimes once more call him away from the tower and loosen his interest. Any time, it may be argued, is a good time to get hold of a promising recruit for ringing. That is true, but there are times which are better than others, and these days of early auturna and the first of the dark evenings are certainty the best. Therefore we would counsel those who have bands which are weak in numbers to start right away to recruit their strength from the best material they can obtain, out of the congregation and the choir.
It is, however, not merely with beginners, that the present offers the brightest opportunities. There are bands who will be starting afresh, after the summer's suspension, and others who, by putting their hearts into it anew, could make substantial progress before the winter ends. In these respects there is great scope for our ringing associations to give help, if only they would really set about the task. It is true that many ringers lack enterprise, and it is often said that these deserve to get on only so far as they help themselves. But we do not look at it quite in this light. There are, of course, some who are not only hetpless, but hopeless; and it is of no use to waste time in endeavouring to rouse in them enthusiasm for ringing. There are, however, many others who, with the least encouragement, would well repay any effort made to help them, and we should like to see far more extensive efforts made to assist struggling bands.

Why should instruction cease when at band reaches the Grandsire Doubles or Bob Minor stage-as it often does where instructors are sent out? Why should not such ringers be coached by a competent man until they have got a grasp of the more complicated methods! A teacher of music does not leave his pupil to get on alone when he can play his first simple air; and why should ringing instruction stop when a band has learned hardly the rudi-

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ments of ringing? The practice is really absurd when yout come to think of it. What our associations ought to do is to formulate much more extensive schemes of instruction than any of them at present put into operation, and they might also do a great deal more in the way of organising regular interchange of visits between the ringers of neighbouring towers, which should take place not once or twice in a year, but more or less every week. If such a scheme should be asking too much of the district secretaries there ought to be little difficulty in putting this special work in the hands of a capable mat in each centre, and the more centres there are, within limits, the better. Much progress might be made by this means, which would not only benefit the ringers, but react to the advantage of the association.

## ST. PETER MANCROFT BELL FRAME. OLD TIMBERS DECAYED.

St. Peter Mancroft Parish Magazine for August contains the following with regard to the bell frome at this famous Norwich Church. The hells, as our readers know, ayc already in the laands of Messrs. Taylor and Co. for rehanging.

For some time past it las heen known that the condition of the bell frame and bell fittings was far from satisfactory, and several of the larger bells had been going alnost too badly to be rung. From time to time small fragments of decayed wood have fallen in the ringing room. The bell frame was slowing considerable movement when the bells were being rung, and it was thought that this movement was attributnble in part to the condition of the frame itself, and in part to the failure of the main beams which earried the frame.

On removing the bells it was found that the joints of the bell frame' were lonse, and, what was worse, that some of the timbers were in too bad a state to allow of their further service.

The bell frame was necordingly taken to pieces and the under beams, which supported it, were examined. It was found that there were three sets of beams. Tire upper ones, presumably of 1775, were fairly sound, hut the second set, of much older beams was in very bad order, and some beams badly rotterd. These beams had at sometime (provaluly because the euds had decayod) been wedged up from the bottom set of beans-those which are visible from the clurch. The result of this was that nearly all the weight of the bells came ultimately on to the lower set of ceiling beams, nad of these it was found thal several were in wery poor condition and the ends much decayea.

The lower heams, forming the ceiling wisible from the cluych, will not be removed. They will be repaired and made perfectly safe. The bells in future will be carried on new beams of steel, and quite independent of the old oak beams, which will benceforward be relieved of any duty except that of carryiag themsolves and the wood flooring laid on them.

The work will need considerable time, but when it is done we shall have the satisfaction of knowing that crelything in the tower is sound and in good order, and that the strain of the bells is more evenly distributed on the tower walls, which will henceforvard be much less likely to be injured by the ringing of our heary peal of bells.'

What is believed to have been the first "peal" of Stedman Doubles was rung at Chtesterton on Sopt. $25 \mathrm{Ll}, 1873$.
The bells at Braughing, Berts, were opened with a neal of Triplea on Sept. 25th, 1745.
The many friende of Mr, C. D. Heginbotiom (claniruan of the Devies branch of the Salishory Guild) witl be pleased to know that his second operation for peritonitis was most suceessul. Mr. Heginbothom is now making excellent progress.
The peal at Clifton, Bristol, was ruag with tha bells half-mutitod in menory of the son of the conductor of the Olifton Society (Mr. R. Clarky, who died on September 3rd, and was buried on tre 8th. Before his Ilness, Giltuert, who was 12 years of age, ofteu came to the tower with lis father on tho practico night.

I never remember having read of sa many organised 'weeks' as bbero have heen this long-drama-out mutumn-ar should I have said springe Summer is cerLainly not the lerm to npply, for that is a geason of the year zo longer vouchsufed to the peopile of theso islands. Ab least, yt comes and goes in a mere Atsif, Last roar, tho weatler experls tell us, it happened on a Wedmesday afternoon, aboust 4.30; this year we are still waiting for il, and the Press photageplerg are kept constantly an duty in readiness to snap it when it passes. Gertainly those who
have boen out or ringing weeks. have not ben on summer touws, have boen out on ringing "weeks" have not been on summer touws, depencent on the weather. If the wealher is thad it may be unpmeagant to get from one tower to another; but, once in a belfiry rain or titino makes no difference to the ringing. 'llsere is an oeed for delays or abandonatents lyecause the fitch is watertogged or frost hound, no postponement for fog or know. Onee at the tower there is nothing to prevent the ringers geting down to the joh; and that
