## WHAT'S WRONG?

There is food for rellection in the letter of the Rev. R. H. Whitford, which appeared in our last issue, in which he points out one answer to the inquiry of 'What's wrong?' in those associations where there is a falling off in the attendance at district meetings. Mr. Whitlord suggests that too much is crowded into the time at the disposal of ringers, and that the actual ringing takes but second place. This is probably true of some meetings, and his suggestions for remedving the mal :r may well? be seriously considered in those quatters whet they apply.

It must, of course, be borne in mind that ineetings are called for the purpose of transacting the business of the associations, and those who attend are aware of this before they go. Often, however, except when it is an annual meeting, there is little more than a few routine items to be disposed of, which, under an efficient chairman, can usually be dealt with in a few minutes. The business portion of the proceedings therefore need not cause any serious loss of time. Nevertheless, there is a way to reduce even the present minimum, and that is for the members to hand over the transaction of ali routine business to their committee, leaving the general discussion of affairs for the annual mecting only, in the same way as the business of many organisations is run. What is the use of a committee if they lave nothing to do, or are given no responsibility? They might well be entrusted with the conduct of the affairs of our associations and asked to give an account of their stewardship amually-that is, if the members want more time at their disposal for ringing at their ordinary meetings.
Our correspondent's inquiry as to whether it is always necessary to have a service touches a rather delicate point. The practice has grown up as our associations have come in closer contract with the Church, and there are many who would seriously object to forgoing this feature of the meetings. What might, perhaps, be done in some cases is to curtail the length of these services and to omit the sermon. Often the latter is devoted to giving ringers a historical survey of bells, with which they are already well acquainted, or to a homily upon their duties and responsibilities which has now become so hackneyed as to have lost much of its influence if not of its importance. It is rarely that ringers are treated to a discourse which has anything original in it, and if it is desired to add to the time available for ringing at these gatherings the sermon might be cut out without any serious loss, for the act of corporate worship would in itself be sulficient. We put these two suggestions forward as means of, at any rate, partly meeting the objections voiced by the Rev. R. H. Whitford.

## BREAKING TIME RECORDS.

## To the Eiditor

Dear sir, I feel I woulit like to say a few words in reply to 'Normal 'Time' with regard to the recent quick peal of Cinques rung at Shettield, as from his fetter it would appear he las got 8 bad impression of same, and this, if left unchallenged or without some caplanation, will probably tond to creato a fueling amonstst the Exercise at large that peals are rung lere without any respect to striking, or ungthing else.

In line first place, let me say at once that I agree with him m principle, that to get the best music out of bells, no matter what their weitht, fley shouk not be struck too closely, but to hint that such a thing as firing or even jumbling took place is far from what actually occurred.

The ringers of Sheficld took mecisely a similat view on the quick peals that have beet rung at Southwark, and such performances coutd vot be fully eredited until the fact was brought lowe to them by iheir own achicrement,
However, I wish to say emphatically that such a thing Rs breaking time or making reconds was not sought after or even thought of. The thimg just liagpened, as other things often do,

1 can lonesily assure my friend, whoever he is (and I believe they are all friends in Birminghan), that the peal in question was a good peal, or it would certainly wever lave been completed, let alane published. i cannot say what it sounded like outside, although we were complimented at the completion by various listeners (and we have some critics in Sheffieln, you know, but inside the beats were clear and distinct. In fact, it liad to be a good peal, or it would have gone up' like a cartload of rotten apples on a refuse heap.
As my frieud compares it with the "Twelve-bell week peals, which occupied a longer time on lighter belle, I may say that I had the honour to take part in the first one at St. Margaret's. Leicester, and although I personally consider this was slightly the better peal of the two, I am sure thet the great ' A. WF.' himself would have been delighted to have beert under the one at Sheffeld.
Previously, our normal time was somewhere round about $\mathbf{3 . 5 0}$, but if are explanation is decessary $I$ would like to point out that circurastamees alter cases.
Firstly, no douht my friend is aware that we have a very short draght of rope to contend with; secondly, that our bells heve recantly been relung on the marlerm ball-hearing principle, both which in nuy opinion are conducive to quick and acctrate striking, and last, but not least, we harl some young and befty lads on the hack end, who instinctively, without word or waraing, commenced at a brisk pace, and heing pliysically hit, kept it up to the end, the littio bells ringing to the hig bells, as they should do.

In conclusion, ${ }^{l}$ would life to add that although the unexpecter took place on this acoasion, record breaking peals are not encouraged here, due respect to quality always being our oonsideration, and the very joy and pleasure of getting the besi aut of the bells is for ever uppermost itr our minds.
If a thing is not worth doing well, we don't attempt it; but if the result, is sometimes a surprise. it is not justice ta condernn it anheard. Let those that lieas, speak. That's all!-Yours fafthfully,

They are now in the care of Mr. G. S. Needham, and are in good condition. Mr. Needham lial them repaired by Messis. Taylor atid Co. at a cost of several pounds They have ball clappers maxle of box wood, about $1 \frac{1}{2} i n$, in diameter. Theso make them cmit a rather harals sound, and it; was a considerathle time hefore the band ringing the pall felt' at homes with them.

## FOUR SHIRES GULLD. <br> LMMNGTON'S FOURTF CONSECETIVE COMPETITION VICTORY.

The halt-yearly meting and compotitions of the Four Shires Guibd was held at Quinton on Oct. 25 th. ## METHOD CONSTRUCTION.

## To the Eaitor.

Dear Sir,-I did not really, in my letter of Oclober 17th, clajm to hie infallikle. I did not really write, 'I do not think, I know.' What happened was that the printer puf it full stop for a comma, and so materialiy altered my meaning. It was like this. Mr. Parker had written about two schools, one of which consists of those who say liat places are the method; and the other of those who "think they have progressed far beyond that stage." And I ratorted, "I do not merely thimk, 1 know I have progressed far heyoud that stage.' It was a claim to be progressive, not to be infallible.
I cen assure Mr. Parken I realise to the full, the force of the arguHeats he uses. I have used them myself. But I can also assure him that beyond a certain point they break down and mislead you. His last letter affords an interesting example. 'Look at London Surprise, he says. "As the bells come below the treble thes are hunting forwari. Fach bell, however, must make a place which effects a clange, and the bell is said to be luating backward. If the piace is nat made tho bell continues to hunt forward, then does the place hring aljaut the cbanged condition?"
Now look at London Surprise above the treble. Herc. From the lead und, and previous, the bells are bunting backward, matil the fifth change, where they tura to forward lanting. Is this brouglat nhout hy a place? Is it even accompanied by a place? Look and see. There is no place ati all made in that change, either internal or external.
Why I object to the axiom, ' Places are the method.' is becruse it prevents you from realising what really does operate in the nonstuction of methods. I must not argue further mhout the position of time in method construction. It raises matters which cath latrdy be Healt with in the colurnms of 'The Ringing Worlit.' But I may remind Mr. Parker that there is sequence in logie, i.e., in our explaining a thing, and also in our apprehending it. But that sequetce is in our own hrains, and not in the fhing itself. And le must read in that light the gnotations he gives from my writings.- Tours truly.

## BED ROCK STATEMENT WANTED

## Dear Sir--Credit where credit is cue

Mr. Powell and I have not always seen eye to eye in the past: but his letter in your issue of October 24th contains an expesition of fact in method construction, put more clearly and truthfully than anything one hins observed in the emrespondence columns for some time past. I refer specifically to what is includen under his definitions.' (Although the second needs qualification.)
It is a great pity thar so muel valuable spnce and time hape been utilised recently in wandering all roltad these points at issue. 1 have several times protested against the sort of half-trutits which cimak the facts in a kind oi mystericus superiority: and umity last week appears a ccacrete illustration of the outcome of the dire results af that vicious practice: I 1 fler to the perfectly reasonable requests of "Interested.' Now, I have no desire whetever to 'hutt in.' hat T fear that interested, runs the risk of getting nolhing mare than another abominable dose of that vile medieine!
The fact is that the fundamental truths of the "Theory of Method Construction' are, like those of most of the seiences beautifully simple: and while all this bickering is going on over nomenelature of details (after all, what's in a name?) the actual principles themselves are nof being ellumerated. The concise and straightforward statement of these principles would go a long way towards composing, for example, the differences between those now arguing over such questions as the maming of Slumbs; for after all, they are advancing,

- if by widely divergent routes, towards a common goal

I am not proposing, Mr. Editar, to proceed to lay down those primciples; but at the same time I frel that the time has come when the bed-rock of the whole busidess slopuld be set ciown in plain English, sometling like this (which may, perhaps. satisfy ' Iuteresten

1. Changes are profuceil on a basis of what is krown es 'hunting'; or the regular exchange of neighhouring positions, in cyelic order. of ALL umits in a given series.
2. This 'huating' may proceed ill either a direct or a retrografle fashion.
3. ## YORKSFIRE VETERAN HINGER DEAD.

## SEVENTY-SEVEN YEARS AT BDRNSALI.

There has passed away at Slipton, in the person of Mr. Jolin P?ckersgill Birch, of Burnsall, one of the best known characters in Wharfedale. For no less than 77 years he bad been a vinger at his native vilage, and he was also known in Leeds and Bradford.
Mr'. Birch was admitted to hospital at Skiptou on Sept. 24th last, and had been in failing heath for some time. He celebrated bis gith birthdey on the day before his death. Born and bred in Burnsall, $\mathrm{Mr}^{\text {. Bitch's ancestars had resided in the village for a great }}$ number of years, and the name of his great uncle, Fichard Pickers: gill, together witi the date 1762, is to be foutul seratohed on a spaall pathe of a latticed window ut his late residence at Burnsall.
Mr, Birch was best known as a carrier belween Burnsall and Skipton, and, on eccasion, between Appletreewick and Grapen's ameient tapital. He had fifty years' experience in this duty, and coutd recalif many a memorable occasion when his cart was held up in snowdrifis on Barden Moor.
A postman for many years, he tramped lis 20 miles a day with unfailing tegularity, carrying the letters at ld. A fime and receivity a pittance of 10 s . 6d. a week for a loag porfod before the Gorormmant recoguised bis position.
Wh. Birch was only twelve years of age whon le learaed to ring on the six belles in tha Burnsali Parisli Clourdi. In 1877 he was elected a member of the Yorkshire Association. Mr. Birch had come to Sleipton on show dey, almost without a break sinee the first Skipton show was hela, and lie always assisted in the clange ringing on ithat accasion on the Sifinton Parish Church bells, which is one of the old customs still preserved in connection with the exlibition. In 1921, Mr. Birch was the only Finger present who assisted itu the celebration on the occasion of tho first show.
Mr. Birch's wife died about 17 years ago. He was the father of elerct children, six of whons are liviug. He had 40 grandchildren and 30 great-grandchildren
