## LONDON BELFRIES.

About a year ago, in this column, we commented upon the neglected state of some of London's bells, and suggested that copibined action might be taken by the London ringing societies to endeavour to bring about an improvement. As far as we are aware, however, nothing whatever was done, but at the College Youths' dinner the other night, the Master of the Cumberlands referred to the very unsatisfactory condition of some of the beifries of the Metropolis. There were belfries, he said, which were not fit for pigs, let alone ringers. Now this is a strong indictment, and it is a disgrace to the authorities of any church that such a stricture should be possible. There ought to be means of bringing home to those responsible the urgent need for improvement in the condition of these neglected belfries.

The bells are some of the most valuable of church property, and to permit their dilapidation is, in principle, as blameworthy as to allow the organ to remain in disrepair. The organ, however, is a favoured instrument, and has to be maintained at all costs, but the bells-well, if they cannot be rung, let them be chimed; if they cannot all be chimed, let one suffice. The bells are not a part of the service in which the clergy are concerned-therefore it does not matter whether they are in usable order or otherwise. This, we fear, is the line of thought which influences the action, or rather inaction, of those authorities where long years of neglect has told its sorry tale among the beils.
And the same unfortunate views must, apparently, be held in regard to the ringing chambers. Clergy and Church Councils would no more think of allowing the choir vestries to become places unfit for pigs than of permitting the chancel to become derelict or ' uninhabitable, 'but some of them do not seem to realise that the ringers are entitled to equal treatment in that part of the church to which their duties call them. Mr. Matthews did well to ventilate this subject in the presence of a number of London's clergy, and we could oniy wish that his audience had included some of the 'culprits, 'instead of those whose presence showed that they, at any rate, appreciated the services which ringers render to the church. It is, however, open to the London ringing societies to bring these matters home to the powers that be, and we would repeat the suggestion that there should be combined action between the organisations covering the London and Suburban areas. Let this fact not be lost sight off : the opportunities for peal ringing in London are not as great as they were, say, four yeats

ago, and, if the Metropolitan Societies are to maintain their facilitics, it looks as if they will have to extend the number of available towers, as peal attempts in specific belfries become more limited. If for no other reason, the renovation of bells and belfries is an important one tos them all.

## CHANGING THE RINGERS.

## DEVON TTCAES ACTION.

The Witheritige, Devon, correspondent writes as follows in the (urrenl issue of the 'Soutlı Molion Ruridecnal Magazine'
'The time has come when, in the considered opinion of the $\overline{\text { Ficar }}$ Hew arrangements should be matle in the inportant matter of ring-
ting the belle for service, and on other occasions. In the first place, it is well la remomber that a ball ringer is an offee-bearer in the charelt. It is. therefore. most expedient that anjoue who expeuter this office shanid be a convinced churchman. It is also desirable, in these times of progress in eampauology, that a ringer should he willing to 1 ake at least a little sicp forward in the art to which he is redicating his services. For these and other reasons, it has heen thotight wise to make two simple conditions for those who aspire to a place in the helfry. First, they should be churchmen whe recognise the cluty of atienting the services to whith they are summoning athers. Secondly, they should he ready to attend some instruction (which will he provided) in clange ringing as an adelition 10. The ordinary round-ringing which has prevailed for so long.

Simple as these conditions are we find any number of persons reativ to point out difficulties, of course, hleve are dificulties, ess pecially in country places. But difficrilties (in the common plinnse, were made to be overcome. At the moment, we are asking for men who are veady to jain a band of ringers formed, as we believe, on the only possihle lines which will give satisfaction. The Yicar will nre willing to offer their servicas are interested in the work, snt who that are specified above. To those of the late hand of ringers who for wrious 2 easous, have found themsolves unable to aceopt the corsfitions, tho Ficar has already expressed the thanks of the parishiovers for heir past services. To sueh of them as are able in ar rept the spwe arrangement, the cloor is as witle open as it is to of aser who are willing to to so."
