## STOCKTAKING.

It is a customary task with the first issue of a journal in a new year to do a little stocktaking, and to hazard a guess as to the future. While the former may be of use, if it reveals our weaknesses, and may give us satisfaction. if it shows us any gains, the latter is generally a rathe profitless speculation, albeit one which is dificult to resist. Looking back over the year which has just closed, we think it may safely be said that, on the whole, 1924 was a period of general progress in the ringing Exercise. In the practice of our art there were features which mark a general forward tendency. There bas been an 'expansion,' if one may use the term of twelve-bell ringing, if not in the actual number of peals rung, at any rate, in the number of ringers who have been able to participate in twelve-bell ringing, which in the past used to be reserved for a much narrower circle than is now the case. Opportunities are still somewhat limited, but we believe an analysis of the twelve-bell peals rung this year wouk show that more individuals and more towers were in cluded than in almost any past year. There has not, perhaps, been much expansion on other numbers, but a useful standard has been maintained, with a band at Willesden breaking new ground with plain Major methods -an example which many more might follow with advantage.

For the most part the meetings of the various associations have demonstrated a sustained interest on the part of members, but there have been instances in which a slacking off of enthusiasm has called forth comment. The apparent loss of interest by ringers in the doings of their own association is, of course, a matter for regret; but so long as those in office realise the position and take steps to revive the flagging zeal of the members, there is no cause for despair. At the same time facts should be looked in the face, and, as this is a time for good resolutions, it is an opportunity for special effort to pull things together. Without doubt there is room for increasing the attractiveness of the average meeting, and unless the arrangements are adequate there is always the risk that they may be a disappointment to many, from the sheer lack of opportunity for ringing which a large attendance may impose.

There is still much in front of our associations to be done. Although they may be counted successful Irom the point of numbers, they have not accomplished their mission by just adding to their membership, and we are not sure that they are all sufficiently well organised to carry on efficiently the work which should be theirs. There is spade work to be done everywhere, both in re-

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[^0]gard to ringers and bells, and associations might do more than is often done at present in getting dilapidated rings restored and preventing others from reaching the last stages of deterioration. It ought to be the business of each association to see that all the rings of bells in its area are maintained in good ringing order, but it must be admitted that the efforts made in this direction are not always as definite and determined as they might be. It is in this direction, particularly, that we should like to see more enthusiasm displayed in the coming year. Where the policy of 'drift' has been permitted to creep in let it be exchanged for at campaign attacking all those centres where neglect and indifference prevails in regrard to the belfry. Energy in this direction would bring its reward in more ways than one. It would stir members to new effort, bring in more ringers, and awaken a wider interest in the association's doings. It is a policy that would pay good dividends, and we hope that some of the results of its more general adoption may be seen in the year 1925 .

PEAL BOARD UNVEILED AT WEST WYCOMBE. CEREMONY PERTORMED BY THE MAYOR.
At West Wycombe Church, on Sunday, December 2lst a board was unveiled and dedieated, commemorating the first eight-bell peal rung in the tower-Stedman Triples on December 16th, 1923. Tha cere mony was performed by the Mayor of Higlı Wycombe in the presence of a inrge congregation whel gathered to honour the memory of the late Mr. Thomas Martin, who devoterl a long life to public work in the parish. The board was presented by tis son in memory of his father, and is a handsome plece of work carved out of fine old English dak. It is surmounted by eight bells, and the inseription in gold leiters is 2s follows:-
'Oxford Diocesan Guild of Clurch Bell Ringers. This tablet com memorates the first cight-bell peal rung in this tower, 16 December. 1923. 5,040 Stedman Thiples Thurstans' Four-Tart: Fred Hayes Treble; G. Twitchen, 2; Ralph Coles, 3; Artbur 3. Haing, 4; Edward Markham, 5; Sidney T. Goodelild, 6; John Evans, 7; War. Coles, tenor. Conduated liy Jolin Evans. Presented Nofember, 1924, by Thomas G. Martin, in memory of his fallher, Thomas Martin, of Downley. Ob.: August 3ath, 1919. Rev. H. Pickles (Vicar), Sir Johr Dashwoad, Hart., W. A. Day (churchwardens).'
The Mayor eulogised the work done for West Wycombe lay the late Mr. Martin, Fho, le said, spent a good and protitable life devoted to the service of rioing his best for his fellow men.
The Vicar (the Rev. Harold Pickles) also referred to the great esLeem in which Mr. Martin was held, and remarked that it was a coincidence that the last two bells added to their tower were dedicated to the memory of the Mayor's anestor, zind now the peal tallet to the memory of Thomas Martirs. They would notice that at the top of the peal board there were carved eight bells, lapresenting the number which they had in their tawer, and he had no hesitation in saying that the whole was a splendid piece of workmanship, and the gift, unselfighly made, woutd be a credit to their helfry. He saw there that day members of the High Wycombe belfry, and many others would have been present had it been possible, 5uit the mresonce of that great congregation showed that the memory of Thomas Mertin still lived rmongst them. They had heen privilegen to take part that afternoon in the dedication of a memorial not only to their Perish Chureb, but above all to do honour to the memory and unselfish spirit of Thomas Martin.

The Vicar then recited the dediontory prgvers, and after the service many of lhe congregation inspected the tablet. ns it stoon in the chareel.

Major. In ringing, it is never too late to begin, and it would be interesting to sncw if anyone else has rung inis frrst peal of Major at this age.
The peal of Stedmin Caters at Sheflield Cathedral on Koxing Day was rung after short for Trelle Bob Maximus. The band, througis seme oversight, also had the riovel experience of ringing tho peal by cundelitht, ns all the ofler lights lind been switched of in the Cathedral, which was locked up.
A peal of 14,480 Boh Major was rung at St. Paul's, Oldiam, in 8 hours 24 minutes on January 4th, 1784.
St. Martin's Youths ranc a round 8,000 of Grandare Major, at St. John's, Deritend, Birmingham, on January 4th, 1794.
Junuary 4th is the anniversary of the death of James Barham, the famous old ringer of Leeds, Kont, who dred in 1818 at the age of 93 years.
The first 'John' peal was rung on January 2nd, 1904. It was a peal of Loudon Surprise Major at St. Steplien's, Romhester Row, London.

On January 6th, 1851, a peal of 7,524 Stedman Cingues, then the longest Length, wns rung at Cripplegate, London.

What was claimed to be the first true peal of Norwich Court Bob in London was rung at Bethal Green on January 7th, 1788.
The first pcal on the bells (Grandsire Cingues) at Cirencester was rung by the College Youtis on Januapy $7 \mathrm{~h}, 1767$. Citencester's bells were the second ring of twelve in the country.

## SHUNTING.

## To the Editor.

Dear Sir ,-At last the murder is out. And it is neither caused by loss of blood, not, I hope, by at 'cut.'
The Rev. C. D. P. Davies says that from the days of his boyload he has nlways understood by the railway 'shunt,' the oporation of causing a velicle or train to run from the pair of rails along which it was going, on to anather pair.
But this is not a slunt at all, the riglit name for it is switching.' A. switch' is a piece of parailel rails hinged at one end, antl with poime at the other. As these points are 'switched or moved on their linges, from one pair of lines to the other, so the train running over them is switched over, or left to run straight on. If the new pair of rails is another line, there is no sluunt at all. If, however, they lead only to a siding, then a train, diverted by the switch, is shunted, in order to let something else pass.
It will bo seen that there are three essential parts to the idea of a shunt. (1) That which is shunterl must have its course broken, but mot altered or transferred to mnother lifte; (2) something else must be allowed to pass; (3) that which is shunted must resume its Former course, after the slunt, cxactly is it would beve done hail thare been no shunt.
No explanation of a shunt that has yet appeared in your columns fulfils any of these requirements. lt is cienr that Mr. Davies is thinking of something quile different. Mr. Powell says the shunted train is ready as in whole to start off ' on another set of rails.' And Mr. Baker says, 'We are doing the same tling all the time.' How can a train be shunting 'all the timesp'
I do not think Mr. Davins cath be realiy hinmed, as he modestly calls it hik "private name, slowing some doubt as to its correotness. And I ihink lie would be the first to agree, that if he really meant a 'switching Bob ' when le wrate a 'Shunting Boh,' on page 196 of 'Grandsire, he deseribes actually in different operation from that which he intended to explain.

## TEN BELL TOWERS. STONHAM ASPAL, SUFFOLK.

[By J. R. Jerram.]

The tower contains a peal of ten bells, tenor 24 cwt . note E. They were given by Theodore Eccleston, of Crowfield Hall, in ${ }_{1742}$, but several of the belis have beey since recast. Their history is fully set forth in the inscription on the ninth bell. These bells bear the following inscriptions at the present time:

Tieble, Second and Fourth. T. Mears of London Fecit, 1826.
Third. Danl. Wade. aged 8o years. Wm. Last, two af the parish ringers. T. Mears of London Fecit, i826.
Fijith. Wm. Banyard \& Saml. Davie. Ch: Wardrns. Pack \& Chapman of London Fecit, 1770.
Sixth. Joz Roper, John Blomfield. T. Mears of London Fecit, т 826.

He was a member of the Society of Eastern Scholars, and rang the temor at St. Saviour's, Southwark, in a peni of 6,012 Grandsire Caters on November 28th, 1735; just after the new peal of twelve, cast by Sautuel Knight, had been hung there. He was elected a meraber of the College Youths in 1744, and served the offee of Master in 1750.
His matie appears on an old peal boarie at Coddealam in a peal of 5,040 Bob Major, November 9th, 1742 . He died in 1753, and was buried at Mortiake on January 14th in that jear.
It may he anded that he also gave a treble and second to MortInke Parish Church in 1746, thereby augmenting the peal to eight. Tha treble wns afterwards recast by Robert Catilin in 1784
I have no record of any peal hoards at Stonham Aspal. If there are any it would be interesting if some correspondent would furnish copieg of bliens.

## DEATH OF MR. W. CRANE, Jun, OF BANGOR

## THE TASK OF THE INSTRUCTOR

 HELPING YOUNG RANDS.The monthly 'fraternal' and smoking concert of Devon ringers took place on Saturday, December 13th, at Franklin Hall, Exeter, afler the Gathedral Guild practice. This was the third of the series, whiell Mr. W. J. Southwood, hon. secretary of the Exeter district, hus organised, and thase galherings have met with great success. The Rev. K. A. Lake (Vicar of Heavitree) presided, and an emjoyable programme oit untisfo wus provided, ills. H. E. Kingdon conrributing some Devonshire yarms and dities. Mr. Z. Laver opened ant interesting fliscussion an 'How best ban we anstruct and young bands?' and some most thelpful suggestions were put forward out of the experiences of the speakers. The chairman ably summed up the discussion from his own standpoint, adeling some useful advice.
The debate was opened by Mr. T. Later, honorary secretary of the Excter Cathedral conapaty, who dealt with the dificullies of teaching change ringing to the two classes of bogimers; the existing round tingers with thair prejudice ngainst scientific olange ringing; and the young hath who come fresh to the belfry without any such prejudice. He urged the necessity for breaking the round ringers " of their luraly-gurdy style, which gave no open leads, the advatuge of blackboard illusitration on the methods of producing changes and of hathdbell practice, although, he nddet, that if one that to start from the begiming with the handbell ringing it would probably nat be wortis doing, for round riugers clid not take readily, as a rule, to handbells. Lads of 14 to 16 gave an instructor a better chance of turning out a good band, as they lad nothing to unlearin, and were genevally more tractalle and willing to be tanght than older men. Fiandbells could be made a great lielp in the instruction of lads.
With round ringers, a gool deal of persuasion and cuaving would be necessary on the part of the instructor, lut wil? yourgsters a more peren:ptory manner was pessible, although with all it was necessary to have lact, and make a carefull stady of the teminerament sumb ability of the pupsis. Practice should be mude as altractive as possible, berause nothing hinderel progerss so much as irregular attendence, ant at certain stages ono absentec could spoil a night's practice for all the others. Mr. Laver went on to emplingise the importance of impressing pupils with tho becessity of regulat attendance in the belfry. and thas stipdy of change ringing at hrome. The instructor's ta:k would not always be an easy one but if he carried on his work impartially and consideralely many of his diffeultics would smooth themselves out Fe would need to he endnux a witls mach patience and discernment. and slonied not too lanstily form an oninion as to the nbility of an npparently backward pupil. Seemingly dull-witted nups have heen known to blossom cut all al once indo auite brillinnt ringers, as if a sudden revelation lad come to them, like $a$ dream or the opening up of a dorment brain cell. Therefore, the instructor slonta not be ton ready ta reject a dullert as a uselese adiunct to hiss hand. wilhoul giving him a fair trial. Three were, howeres, some who monld never make tingers. althongli they dir not generaliv reatise their disability flemselves, and it would only he wasting time to go on tryine th leach them. The instructor must trise his fliserimination, ant if he rould afford to flo so. give such a one a hint to drop out of the band. The instrucfor would nueet with disanpoinlments and sel-backs, but should not be discontager. Tf lie kept steadily on lie might liave thar antisfaction of torning nil a band who wew a erruit to lue Guild. and when the dav eame that ha could hear his manils striting a touch Canlitesects, then he might wafl he mroud of the result of his effortsrop fing his whe nrite a parinner might feel when ha got a good rop fromiths twn eforis at culiwation. Even it that hand never migla. have heen the nteths of furning ont onn n' two ringers who night go awa and be a help in some cther towe:.

## GREAT TEW BELLS REOPENED,

RETUNED AND REHUNG.
An imoressive service took place at the Parish Church of St, the Right Rev. Bishop Slaw, Archacacon of Oxford, rededicated the bells.
The beautiful peal of eight has been retuned and rehung in a double tier of cast-iron and steel frames by tha well-known firm of Messrs. Mears and Stainhank, of Wliteclapel, under the nble suparintendence of Mr. Jesse B. Tyber. The work las been carried out according to the most appioved aud tup-to-date principlos, the bull bearings, which have been fitted, making the ringing of the bells much easier.
It is interesting to note that the greater number of the bells were cast in 1709 (in the reiga of Queen Anal), a fime noted in chareh listory as being full of promise for the sniritual life of the eharch urtil the deadening effects of the Whig ndministrations under the early Georges cast its hlighting effects on the Clurch of Englant, suppressing lier convocations and paralysing her efforts,
The darlicatiou of the bells took place nfter thie second lesson, which WRs read by Canon Carral of Baton, the service being intoned by the Vicar, and prayers reat by him. The Bishop, preceded by the two churchwardens (ML, Singleton and Mr. Legge), fhen procceded to Lho hase of the tower, where the bell ropes were hanging. Mr. Tyler, representing the firm of Mears and Stainbank, then handed the ropes to the churchwardens, who, in their turn, handed them to the Bishor with a request to dedicate the, hells to God's serrice. The Bishop, after the prayers of dedication, placed the ropes in the hands of the incumbent, giving the hells jnto his clanere.
This part of the service was immediately tollowed by ihe ringing uf The bells for two or three minutes, in the preseree of the congregation
The Bislop toolz for luis test, "Rejoice in the Lord always," From Plailip. iv. 4, being prut of the epistle for the fay. Tho Bigliop said it was not only at. Christmas and other greaf fentivals they were hold to rejoice, but always. The work of the Redeener should always give us cause for thanksgiving and rejoicing. Frizy especially rejoiced that day because of the restoration of the tower and the relanging and refuning of their splendith peal of hells. They possessed a beaniful chureh in a pieluresque village. The ringing of those bells reminded then of their duty as Chrisfians to assemble together and rejoice in

The work they hat undertaken to bring about such a Lappy result had, le sait, been a consideraljle effort for a small place; $£ 1,100$ had been required, aud there yet remained E180 to complete tinat sum. They fortumately had been greatly assisted by kind benefactors living outside the parish.

After the service, some change ringing was carried out by visiting ringers, including members of the Chipping Norton band.
