## RINGERS AND C

A letter which appears in another column, froms the Hon. Secretary of the Central Council (who, all will hope, will have a speedy recovery from the results of his recent accident), is a reminder to ringers of their duty to ensure that their names are on the electoral roll of their respective parish churches. Since the passing of the Act, which set up the new representative organisations of the Church, the management of church attairs has become nuch more a matter for the laity, who now have a greater voice in the concerns of the church than formerly, and as ringers are responsible for what is recognised as an important piece of church work, and have charge of valuable church property; it is wise that they should be represented on the Parochial Councils.

This matter has been urged before, but it needs emphasising again, for there are doubtless many parishes where no representative of the ringers has a place upon the Council. It is true that the appointment of ringers to the belfry is still a matter entirely in the hands of the incumbent-it was specially so left by an amendment to the original Bill-but that does not alter the fact that important matters affecting the belfry may come before these Councils, and unless the ringers are directly represented their point of view may be entirely lost sight of.
Another reason why ringers ought to be directly represented on these Councils is that those responsible for tha aftairs of the church would thereby be reminded that the ringers are a recognised part of the church organisation -a point which is apt to be overlooked. A representaltive on the Parochial Council would add dignity to the ringers' position. It is also the first step towards securing that in all matters in which the tuells or the ringing are likely to be affected, the woice of the ringers shall be heard in the Ruri-Decanal and Diocesan Conferences, and, indeed, in the National Assembly itself. But the primary essential is that ringers should see that their names are on the electoral roll of their parish, and Mr. Young's letter comes as a timely reminder that the opportunity for doing so is before Easter.

Another sulject indirectly connected with this matter is that of securing representation on Diocesan Advisory Boards. The Central Council took this matter up at their last meeting, but it is not at all certain that in every diocese there is a person with a knowledge of bells and ringing sitting on these important bodies. By working through their Parochial Councils and Ruri-Decanal Conferences, ringers can help to bricg about sucl? an appointment where it has not already been made.

Ihe St. Mary's company of ringers, Durban, South Africa, of whehs Mr. O. Clarkson, of 78, Wiadermere Road, Dnrlan, is secretary, will be glad to correspond with any riager who contemplates going out to Dtirbant.
A 'long, peal of Stedman Triples is contemplated. No one, let us hasten to say, has yet found more than 5,040 changes, find the 'long', refers to tho ringers and not lo the mumber". A band of "six-footers ' has been crganised for a peal ut St. Giles-ir-the-Tields. It is not true, however, that some of the ringers are so tall that wells will have to be sank in the foor for them lo stand in so that their hands will not come fo confact wifl the coling, when the bellag go ay at back stroke!
The Sheriff of Nottingham, a leading solicitor in the city, replying to arm invitation to attend the W. D. Crofts Memorial Dinner, has written, "l shall bo plessed to take anlvantage of an opportunity of menting the gentlemen who ring the changes much more pleasantly than is the case when I meet them profossionally.
Mr. Philip Hodgkin writes lhat the peal of Oxford Treble Bols Roynl at Madstone, renarded in our last issue, was wof the first in the method on the bells. The first, whe nccomplished on Nov. 15th, 1784, when the Collego Youtls rang 5,040 Old Oxiond Treble Boh Royal in 3 hours 40 minutes.
The weight of Chard tenor is 28 cw ., not 23 . as recordef last weck.
Those who follow the development of change ringing in the Wrest will read with intarest of the first 720 of Cambridge Minor rung by a-resident Dewon band. This is a promising, if small beginaing, for the 2nd lalf-century of the Guild's history, alld is we lope, the precursor of a mew hievelopment in ringing in the contaty of creard and cider.
Mr. C. H. Foward, Master of the Essex Assogialion, has the proud record of laving mow rung for 40 consective years (with one exception when D.G.R.A. Was in operation) for the carly celebration of Holy Communion on Christmas Day, and on New Year's Eve.
The frst kuown peal on tea bells was rung at St. Bride's, Fleet Street, London, on January, 111h, either in the yemr 1716 or 1717. This was Grandsire Caters, but, the ancient board recording the performance disappeared when the chureh wiss reprired 14 1796. The peal was rang by flie London Soholats, find was supposed 10 be the anly peal of Caters rung while St. Bride's contained ten heils.

A peal of 6,048 ' Tmperial the Thind ' Trehle Bobl was rung at St. Michael Coslany. Norwich, on January 13th, 1772.
Samuel Thurston, of Norwichs, conducted an peal of 5.280 Oxiorcl Treble Bob Major at Redenhall, on January 13th, 1858, ${ }^{*}$ on the 102nd anniversary of the Ancient Ringing Saciety.
The first peal of Forward Maximus whs rung on January 13tlo, 1903, at SL. Martiu's, Birminglami.
On January I5th, 1774. n peal af 7,040 Oxford Trehle Bob Major was rung at. St. Peter's, Nottingiatm.
The dedication of the bells of St. Meter"s Clarch, Bumbley, which lave been recnst and selntag in a new frame by Mesars. J. Teylor and Co., of Loughborough, will take place on Janurry 17 h .
As far as records have been kept, we helieve that Mr. Brank Beaneth is the sixity ringer qo rencli flue one-thousand-peal mark. The others were the Inte Rev. F. I., Robinson Mr. Williarn Pye, Mr. I. G. Shade, the late Mr. Jirnest Pye, and Mr. George Willianss.

Eisteners throughout the Butitish Isles, atad, doubtless many on the continent, heard the New Year heralded by the bells of St. Mer-Lin's-in-the-Fickis. The ringing at this church, affer mirlnight, was broadeasted very auccessfully, and althougla other things were superimposed upons it, the bells malde a most mppropriate backeronnd for the occasion. This was, we believe, the first time that St. Martin's hells bave been hroadensted when netually ring, although their chiming lias frequently lieen heard.

RINGERS AND THE NATIONAL ASSEMBLY

## To the Edilor.

Dear Sir, At the last Central Council meeting, it was held to be very desirable that ringers should take overy opportunity to secure that representatives, conversant with beils and their harging, and also change ringing, be elected to the various Councils, confercnces, ete., to do with the above.
As the lime for action is between the Now Year and Eateter, organiged ringing centros, throughout the counliy, should now take such steps as will attain the desired result,
The Church of Engiand Aesembly (Powers) Act, 1919, provides For the alministration and govermment of the Church. There are conshituted threc 'Houses,' i.e., Bishops, Clergy and Laity. In respect to the last named the following extracts may bo of use, viz. :-
1.-The laity shall meeting in Parochial Church Meptings, and he represented (1) in Parochisl Church Councils; (2) in Rurjdecanal Conterences, where they exist; (3) in Dionesan Conferences; and (4) in the House of Laity of the Assembly.
2.-All sepresentatives must he actual lay conmunicant members of the Clarch of England of twenty-one years of age and upwards, but, except in the case of Parochial Charch Councils, need not the qualified electars in the area by or for which they are elected. No candidate may be elected at any election who fas not, previously consented to serve in the capacity for which le or she is a catudidato. All representatives may be of either हex. Section 3 provides for ati electoral roll, a copy of which should be Gixed to the churdh door. On this roll all regular athendants at the churcit, whether resident or non-resident, are entilled to be placed (heing over 18 years of age). Ringers should at least a fortnight before the nanual parish meeting, see that their mames are on the voll. They slond then ensienrour io elect some of their number to the Church Council, and further to see to be represented upon the Rurifleenal Conference. From ihese, latter memherg are elected to form the imporfant Dionesals Conferences, and, again, from these fatier are elected the members of the House of 'Gaity.' Yours faithfully E. ALEXR. YOUNG,

When the East Retford bells were relung and two new trehies added to make a ring of ten bells, a new band of ringers was formed by the Ficar, the late Canon Ebsworth, and Mr. Joynes became its fist captain, a position he had up to 1893. Some of his best ringing performances on the bolls he loved so well were the conducting of the first peal of Grandsire Caters by an East Rotford company, and the faneral peals of Qued Victoria and King Eiwarel VTT.: alse the conducting of Hold's Original of which peal he was very proun. By his ricath, the Northern Rubler Company also
loses one of its oldest emplones, lue laving seved them for over 47 gears. He was a formema in the lathe department, and was universally respecterl
The decessed, who was in his botb yedr, had taken a gral interest in religious and social matters in the town, of which ho was a opening of the new church of Sf. Alban, Landon Roat. where he resided, the became a sitesman, a teacher in the Sunday Sehool, and a member of the Parochial Clureh Comeil. Hp belanged to the Fictory Lodge of Oddfellows \{M.U.\}, and was, up to his denth, a siek visitor of the juvenile section. He was also a member of the ald St, Swithin's Cricket Clats, and had played for the elah connecter with the rubbr works, while in later yenw he neled ns an umpire in the
Bassetlaw Lengue. He leaves a widow and five sons and three draghters to monm the loss of a good hashand and loving father The funcral took place at Orisall on Monday week the Rev. A Horfie (assistant eatation of Eass Retford Chimeht and the Rev. E Collett officiating.

## NEW BELL AT EYTHORNE, KENT.

## DEDICATION BY THE ARCHBISHOP OF CANTFIRBURY.

An event of much importance to the juhabitants of Epthoroc, near Dover, took place on Wednesday aftemoon, Dec. 37 tis , when the Archnshop of Canterbury dedicated the new trebse bell recently added to the old peal of four bells, the work having been carried out ly Mr. T, Groombridge, jums, of Crayford, and the cost detrayct hy pubtic subscription of the parisilioners and frieads.
When the presenf Rector came to Fthorne, 30 years Hyo, one bill only, the tenor, was humg in the tower, two others being housed in outbuildings. In 1896, he had a new treble added. and the whole hang for ringing in a new fume, which was foumi large enough to take the new bell just installed.
The charch was well filled for tle dedimation service, and prohably no parishioner now liwing could remember any previons oceasion when An Archbishop of Caterbury had taken part in a service in Eythome Church.
A shortened form of servite was wsed, contliteted by the Rector (the Rev. Basil Burrows), Miss Burrows presiding at the oryan. Other clerty preseni were the Rev. Canon Thoras (Northbourme, the Rev. J. D. Bevan (Chillenden), and the Res. A. T. Harre (Tilmanstonte). At the conclusion of the lywna, 'When morning gilds the skies, the choir and clergy, followed by the Archbishop. moved in procession to the church porch, where the new hell was dedicated, athd rounds wore rung on the five bells by local men, whilst the procession returned. The hymm, "Fark. liark, my saul, was sumg. aftam whinh the Archbishop gave a short address. His Grace said that the bells of our churches were really more important to people ontside the church than to those inside. Whether they came or neglected the smmmons to God's house to worship, they were reminded that prayers were being offeren to Hirm who cared for them ath, He said he had daily to deal with those who came from other lands. settlers from the Colonies, and dsewhere and he was struck with the way they always said what they missed most-was the sound of the bolis on Sundays and days of publie rejoicing: and how they welcomed them on their return.
The coneluding hymn was 'Angol voices erer singing.' nad the Archbishop concluded an impressive serrice with the Blessing.

## ONE THOUSAND PEAES.

MR. F. BENNETT'S ACEIEVEMENT.
My. Frank Benuet, of Brighton, rang, on December 27th, ad Chiswick, his ouenthousabulth peal, and thus became a menber of that very limited bathd of asen whose peals run into four fgures. A thousand peals is at proud record, and as will be seen by the list given helow, Mr. Bennet.t's collection covers a great variety of metheds.

Mr, Hennett began his ringing at Basingstoke, Hunts, wliere he was a pupil under ilie late Nr. Farty White, in 1885 . In 1887 ho removed to Guildford, where he rang at S. Nicolas' Church, and was one of the now company formed there in the following year. Mr. Bennett rang his flrst peal, wiih three others of the band, on March 2ad, 1889, this being conducted by Mr. Gearge Williams, with whons he was later so closely associated at Brighton, and who, it may be remarked, is himself also one of the few to scove a thousand peals. Mr. Remetl's first peal as conductor was a peal of Grandsire Triples on Uctober 3 rd, 1889 - the first peal by the local band. In the following year the first local peals of Boh Triples, Bob Major aud Union Triples were added to the list. In 1894 two new trebles were placed at S. Nicolas' tower, and a peal of Grandsive Gaters rung on them. The following year SIr. Bennett, went to live at Brighton, where he became a meniber of St. Peler's company, at that time one of the leading Surprise bands in the kingdom. During the twelve years he remained in Rrightan, BIr. Bennett fang no fewer than 409 penls, including the firsti peals of Oxford, Norfolk, Westminster and Bristot Surprise ever riag.
In 1907, Mr. Bennett removed to London, where le organised a Surprisu' band. which met with great success. Mr. Bennett was for some years hou. secretary of the Society of Royal Cumberiand Youtios, which he represented on the Central Council. After a lengthy spell in the Metropolis, Mr. Bennetit once more returned to Shstry, where he is conlinuing his peal ringing antivities.
