## THE 'EDUCATION' OF THE RINGER.

The subject of 'lectures ' for ringers, which has been referred to once or twice recently in our columns, and to which another correspondent returns to-day, is a matter which is really worth serious consideration by those responsible for promoting the art of ringing. At present such teaching as is officially given by associations is limited almost entirely to the most elementary leatures of the art, and time and again we have pointed out the inadequacy of the system which is generally adopted. What usually happens when a band is placed under ofiticial tuition is that a comperent ringer is sent to the tower to instil into a band of begimers the first principles of change ringing, which generally carries them to the length of ringing plain Doubles or Miner, and, in exceptional cases, perhaps, as far as, say, a peal of Grandsire. But when they have reached this fringe of the subject no more is done for the band 'officially:' Often, of course, the instructor will carry on, especially if he has a promising band not too difficult of access, but what we are now referring to is the 'official ' attitude usually, adopted. The point where most bands of beginners are left is about the equivalent to that of a child who has been taught how to spell simple words and is then told that, having been given a-start, he must now create his own enthusiasm and go on and learn by himself. For every band that goes on from the official instruction stage to become competent ringers in advanced methods there are a dozen who stick ' just about where they are left.
What is wanted is a policy that will introduce "continuation' classes, whereby beginners may be led on to greater things, and " lectures 'on various phases of ringing given at district meetings might well be one feature of this advanced education. There are many sides to our pursuit, among them the historical and the engineeting, as well as the mathematical and the practical application of our art, and knowledge on all these could well be spread by means of papers read at meetings, and dis. cussions upon the subjects dealt with. Such features could not but add to the general interest of meetings, as well as being of benefit to the individual. Something on these lines is being carried out successfuliy in the Exeter District of the Devon Guild-where, at the periodical ' Iraternal ' gatherings, there is always a discussion on some subject of mufual interest connected with ringing. The whole question, as we said at the beginning of this articie, is well worth serious consideration by all associan tions, and doubtless there could be found connected with most, if not all, of our big sosieties men capable of preparing a paper on one of the many topics of interest to ringers.

## BELFRY GOSSIP

The recent references to Stonlam Aspal bring from Mr F. W Bawe the intimation that lie took part there, on Whitsun Monday, 1884, in a 5,000 Kent Troblo Bob Royal, which' was called by the late Mr. W. L. Catchpole. The brothers Motts were in ilhe band, which was composed mainly of lpswich men, dnd the tenor, which was mot gang well at the time, was rung by the oldest member of the party, Mr. Edward Reeve. At the time, it was said to be the first pual on the ten bells.
The College Youths rang the first peal of Cimquos on the 191 h January, I724. The peal-Grandsire-was ring by a band which included Bonjamin Amoble, and Robert Catlin, the bell founder, and was "ye first that was ever done.
A peal of 'Garthings Trelules' was rumg at St. Murgarat's, Lyma, an Janmary 20 th , 1740.
On Jamury 20th, 1777, the Cumberland Youths mag a peal at 6,240 'Trehte Bol Royal at Shorediteln.
The first peal of Norwich Maximus was rugg at St. Peter Manerolt Clureh, Norwich, on January 20th, 1817.
The Cambrikge Youths rang a peal of 6,600 Bob Maximus at the Chureh of St. Mary-the-Great on Janunry 21 st, 178 .
A ponl of Cambridge Surprise Royal was rung af Cheltenlam on January 2lst, 1898. At that time it was believed to bo the firsi, Jut a few jears ago "The Ringing World" was able to publish the record of a peal rung at hakefield in 1822.
The anniversaries of the deaths of two noted ringers oceldr next week. Harry Bastable, Ringing Master of St. Martin's Guild, Bitmingham, for eleven years, djed on Jnnuary 19th, 1899, aged 50; dames Motts, of Ipswith, died on Jamunty 21st, 1923.
The ' Lym Advertiser' of Jantary 2nd, 2875, reconded the lollowing: 'On Saturday, Robert Pamonta the chimer ist St. Nicholas chapel, performed for two hours without intermission on the pual of eight bells, chiming a large number of changes in a very regular mamer hy pulling cords atiached to the clappers of the bells.

According lo eustom,' sad at Sitinglyoume paragrapla in a Kentian paper, "our crack change ringers had a glorious time during the Chisstmas holidays. On Boxing Dity the bells of St. Micliael, Borlen, ant 'runstall, were ptaling for hours. Darkness alone hsaught the ringing to anslandstill.
Now wo kinow why Messts. Cheesman and Co. did not ring all niglat. They camot ring when darkness sets in.
In ringing the extra bell in the tower at Newenstle Calhedral on Salurday, Jmunay Jod. in a peal of Stedman Trinleg, Mr. W. H. Barber has now rung a peal on every bell in the lower liunt for ringing. This was the first penl of Triphes on the light peal of night, the only other peal rung on them having been one of Double Norwich at ' Peace' time.

The Bishop, in replyarg to the tosst, suld lie often felt there was a thager of ringots feeling fini they, in the belfy were away from the centre of the chareh, that they were not part of the congregat tion, the shureh, or the worshin. Thas riagers were really a vory irnportant part, ard he was sume flat they wond make their place in the chureh all that was hest, not only in the conduet of the helle and their ability to use them, but also in other pliases of the life of the chureli. Thev as elergy, were open to criticjsm, he knew. They were nof up to the shandard that they ought to he, or as symnathetie as they mighit he. They know the reason. Thote was only one quarter Trath whinh they could draw elergry and that was the laily (laghter). The Bishop, Whose eloguent response was touched with
many passages of lumatur. in a refereace to the sense of humont thai le remarted, stust cxist in the lives of those like the ringers who were liolping to hring the message of foy and linimons into the lives of ofliers. recalled a conversation trith an old Wiltalive farmer, who remarked. 'Yes, I've seen three Bishops of Bristol, your reverence, and I mever want to see anollier " (lamothor). His lordship weni out to say that lof felt, he ought to say something about hells that evonang. Cortanty as he iooked round the inbles lie snw many belles
(langliter). Thare was uolhing so insnirine on fomatul summer's (langhter). Thare was holhing so inspiring on a bentiful stummer's oveling as the spund of a meal of hells aeross the fiolds, inviting the people to wome into thie ralurch, sounding of message of encouragement and aftection-l lie Clurision mossage into the cars nud to the licarts of all those who wore within liesring distance. Some of these hells land beantifal inserintions, and it was quite ns interesting to collent these as it was the eurious eptaphs that they found over chorchyard graves. Trobably ihere weve many wireless enthosiasts there that evening. remarked his lomakin. He lat heara landhelt ringing on the wireless mily a short while ngo, and he thought that some of their smletrlid experimente conald he hroadeast it would nonvey a gipat rleal of pleasute to countless homes (opplanse). He SILENT BFT.LS.
The Bristol United Ringing Guilds was mroposed by Mr. Ernest Bishop, of Swindon, who remarked that they land some excellent Fuidits in the cily of Bristal. inelurling St, Stenhen's, which hard "reated records of which they minght be nroud. The whole of the pit. was fall of heantiful towers and bells, He felt sure that it wont he good for the Guitrls if the elergy and ringors became hetler ar-
 fingers lad a grent rieat they could fo, not anly in Bristol, but in the surrounding distriets.

 26 prals of hells. The Bristol Guikls were in lheir infancy, but drurjug the past year they latrl put their work into excellent nes. vears weml an ithoי, would fincl tho ol'gnisation more and noore nenful. Mr. fiuise also mado an altusion to the nom-use of certain bells

The bishop, referring to fins, said that if the bells were to be trans ferred to a new churct they would lave to ensure that there would be adequate accomnorlation. It would be extremely difficult at the present moment to raise the necessury sums for this purgose. Arobliew diffienlty was that these churchee were under westrics, and there was no more reactionary hody than a seleed vestry (lauglater). It would lye extromely difienlt to persuade thern to part with any portion of their property, and there were legal diffealties also. His lordinip would be pleased to convey the remarks matle to the members of the vostrics.
Dr. Alexander, churchwarden of St. Marr-le-Port Chareh, Bristol, asked that he might be allowed to say fow words as a scelect vestrgman (laughter). He guite appreciated the suggestion made, - that with subur'hs rapidly growing the need for churches should be considered." Why not send these bells to give their message if they had no further message to givg in their present position?

## CATHEDRAL WITHOUT BELLS.

We are bound together in one great object of pramoing clange ringling and hime fellowship and good conduct of the belfry, said Mr. Wiliam Knight, in proposing "Kindred Guilds and Associations." Eristol was supposed to be the city of churelaes and bells, said the speuker, but the Moller Clurch was without a peal of bells. He would rather see a peal of bells at the Cathedral than a new bell ab Bristol TTniversity.
Mr. Pryce Taylor, of Louglonough (who represented the Midland Counties Association), said that as he travellea about the couniry he saw an enormous number of young fellows who had taken up ringing and were sticking to it. These gatherings were of great assislance. The speaker referred to the great bell, weighing ten tons, that had been cast for Bristol University tower, mentioning that it was already cast and tuned alad ready for dispatcla. With Great Peter of York it as the third heaviest in Eagland. He atded that seweral names lad heon suggesteti for the now bell, such as 'Yellow Peril' and "(iold Fake' (laughter), but he did not know what vame it would eventually receive. It lad a Latin inscriptios, but, amid humorous reforts, lye said be whald ant divulge its translation; he wouli leave that for Bristol hiager's to do when they read it.
Mr. A. A. Huglies, of London, whe asso responded, remarked that ringers gatherings did a wonderful amoment to cansolidate the Guilds' position. They created links that were not easily broken between Dristol and Lohdon and ihe ratious districts.
The Rev. R. H. Whitford, in proposing the loast of "The Press," made reference to the amonul of usefulness which journals dealing with special subjects could be put to
Mr. J. W. , iones. in submiting 'The Artisis,' paitl a great tribute to Mr. F. F. Spiller, saying hat he singled him out because he (Mr. Joues) being a Welshmar knew what a baritone was. He would be going finto the Rlicndda Falley in the next few days and he would tell them that they would have to go io Bristol Enited Ringing Guild's hanquets on hear hetter haritone singing than they lad in Wales.
He (Ax. Jones) added: "We have ahtheard r lot akout Bristol Surprise, but evervoge in that room had hat Bristol Surprise that nigit. He had atended all four dinners of the Guilds, and it wot his emphatic opinion that that one was ihe best.
Mr. C. Read, in responding, said that it gave them all real pleasure fo come to the Bristol Uniterl Ringing Guilds dinner, and that they all hoped to be assonited with it for many years to come. He was surprised at the mumber of dinert tha, evering, there being 131 present. He had a lot to do with dinners, and know what at strugyle there 11sunlly was to get 80 . It showed, he said, the enthasiasm of the ringel's.

During the evening hamdbell selections were givent by Messrs. Browth Ald Mises Jorden. songs were contributel hy Mer. Lloyd Williams, Mise Filitl Fill. Mr. E. H. Cooke, Mr. F. Spiller and Mr. Yal Davies; Messrs. Spiller and Williams sang a duel; Miss Dorothy Hill and Mr. A. Stowell gave recitations, and Miss Read played some delightfol cello solos. The programme, which was a most enjoybble one, and of ligh musical meril, was artarged by Messers. W. S. Enery and E. Guise, and the accompanists were Mrs. W. Sowden aud Mr. C. Read, I.\$.M.
During the aiternoon ringing had been indulged in at various Bristol Churches, a peal attempli at St. James' being unfortunately lost about half-way

The deceased, who had been a ringer at the Parislı Churely of St. Mary, Bulwell, for orer 40 ycars, will be greatly missed. Four of his brother ringers rang a course of Grandsive Triples on handbeils at He graveside, and ft touch of 546 Grnadsire Triples was rung on the tower heils far moming serviee on Sundry, Jamuary 11th, with the bells half-muffed, as a last token of respect.

## THE ITINERANT BELL FOUNDER

## AND THE BEER ACCOUNT.

An interesting little article headed "The Thirsty Bell Founder,
 Daily News.' The information it contains is larecly hased upon ibe records of that itinernt founder, John Wiaylett (who was ith businpss trom 1714 to 1727), which uppear in Dr. A. [9. 'Tysen's 'Chureh. Belts of Sussex." Wa are not so sure, however, that the inference that the beer provided on various occasions was all for the founder. In all probabibty the ringers had their full shave uf :t-nad, perhups, parsoc and churchwardens, too, for the official expenditure on the beverage was appasently only on ceremonious occasions.' be that as it may, the writer, we think, is a little wide of the mark in sayng that Waylett was probably of the gipsy typs. She has not realised the fact that in those days-two centuries ago-the lack of means of transport made il imperative in many mases for the uell founder to go to the bells instead oi the bells going to the founder. Sul the article iz nowe the less interesting reading. Stie says

All ove: Sussex from the little willage churches come the chinses of the bells cast by old John Waylott, the tinkering bell founder of the 16 h century. Sussex possesses forty of his bells, and during his wavderings he repaired the peals throughout ilie connty.

Probably he was of the gipsy type, loving the npen rond, making friends as he tramped from place to place, and choosing to make his fires in the open and work in the felde instead of in a foundry. His bells stial chime from every quarter, and the old parish records prove that he drank heer as he worked, plenty of it.

His method was simple. He would call on the Finat of the Prrish, and inguire if thew bells were winted, or if the old ones meeded repairing: when he received an order le would dig $x$ mould in at Aeld near the church, make his fire, collect the metal he needed, and cast his bell or repair the cracked onte on the spot.

In 1724 he was at Lewes, where lie built his furnace, and mended the peals for all the outlying villages. It was in that yoar he cast the Sterning peal. made a new treble hell for Mayfield, und recast the old one. Thred of his bells nere now in old withylam Chnen. the little village associated with the Sacksille family who have ouncd Buckhurst Park since the reign of Fenry II. The chureh was partially destroped by lightang, but the vaults where the Sackvilles werc buried escaped injury. $A$ large window gives their genealogy, now represented by Earl De La Warr. The Latin inseription reads:

The noble fanily of Sapeville lere awrits the Resurrection.'
fohn thaylett's work on the hells evidently made fims thirsty, and the old parish records show $f$ hee amount spent on beer diuring lis visits. Wheen he was at Withwam the churchwardens paid $3 / 6$ for his theer, and the price por gallon was less than for a pint now. Mayfichl, nocording to the old parish accounts, the expenditure an beer in conneclion witla lis visit was follows

In our Diocese, I do not know what liappens in others, we aro advised to hold tho panual Paroelial Church meeting (au which members of the Church Council for the onsuing yeat are elected), as early as possible in the New Year, now that tho financial gear ends with the civil ycer. This being so, ringers should, at once, seo that llieir nanes are on the roll. If there is any doubt about it, and the roll is not posted at the chatch, procare a form from the incumbent
of they are not placed eomewhers in the church-and fill it up, or ringers may suddenly wake up to the fact that the annual meeting $\mathrm{i}_{5}$ announced, and there is no tima to get their names on ' a fortright before the annual meeting.
Having gat this far, the mext duty is to aftend the meeting in force and plamp for their representative by giving him fle three votes allowed to any ane candidate. The regulations provide that any votor may give three rotes to one or more candidates provided Hat they do not give more votes in all than they are entitled to. Thlat number of votes each elector has is the same as the number of mambers to be election. Stupposing that 18 members are requiren, canh voter will have 18 votes, anti may give up to three each to the candidates he wishes to vole for but not mote than 18 in all. Of course, if the number of members to be elected is other than 18 , the number would be different.
It may be thought unnecessary to go into this hare, but at the nceting flis poinit may be overlooked, so it is just ns well to know about it beforelaad.
If a band of ringers, wifh their wives anti relations, who have votes will attend the meeting and each give the ringers' candidate lree votes his cleciion is in most cases assured. I do not suggest that they should not wote for any others, but do not plump for more firn the ringers who are up for election

## MR. HARRY CHAPMAN'S 500 PEALS.

## A LIST WHICH INCLUDES SOME RECORDS.

Mr. Harry Chapman, of Manchester, is the latest among ringers to score his five hundredth peaj.
Hary Chapman, that wham there is no better known or more popular ringer in the Exercise, was born at Bythorn, in Huntingdou, on Nov. 12th, 1863, and commences to pult a bell at the age of nine years, his father heing at that time parish clerk. It was, however, not until he was 19 rears old that he took up change-ringing, and visited Raunds, Northants, for the purpose. Later he came in contact with Mr. C. W. Clarke, of Bedford, and on Augusi 14th, 1886, he rang his first peal. This wus at Catdington. In 1888, Mr. Chapman went to reside at Manchester, where his first peal was Treble Ten at the Cathedral. He took part, in the first peal of Stednan by the Lancashire Association (at Eccles on December 28th, 1891), and conducted the first peals of Oxford Treble Bob, Superlative and Cambridge Surprige in Lancaslire. He was the first to ring Manchester Town Hall tenor single-handed wa peal, and a month after ringing it behind to Grandsire Caters, turned in this bell (52 cwt.) to Treble Ten.

Among other memorable performances, Mr. Chapman took part in the rccord 12,240 Kent Treble Bob Maximus, and the 14,000 Kent Treble Bob Royal at Ashton-under-Lyme, and the record 14,112 London Surprise Major at Eing's Norton.
For many years. Mr. Clapman las been a member of the committee of the Lancashire Association, wheh le las represented on the Central Council, which latfer body honoured him, during a period when he was not an elected representalive, by making limi an honorary member. Of his peals, considerably over 300 lisve been rung for the Lancashire Association. The followitg is his list of 500:-
