## WAITING TO BE PAID!

There are still, it seems, towers where tingers can only be found if payment is made for their services. It reads strangely in these days, to find, set out in the cold print of a county newspaper, the offer of a correspondent to "raise a side of ringers to start at once, "if some other person will raise a fund to pay the ringers \& a year each. In the old Oxfordshire town of Dorchester the Abbey bells were silent on New Year's eve, and apparently there has been a general desire on the part of the inliabitants to know why the time-honoured custom, to 'ring out the old, ring in the new,' was not observed. In enlightening the public a ringer resident in the town gave two reasons. The first, which was a good, if not an entirely sufficient one, was that 'there are no recognised ringers at the Abbey tower, although there are plenty in the parish.' The second was in the form of a question, which asked if there was one person in the district that contributes one single farthing towards the help of a side of ringers in Dorchester? And then comes the conditional offer referred to above, with the promise that there shall be no more grumbling about not hearing the bells.

Now, as we have cver been ready to tagree, there are circumstances under which payment to ringers can be justified-especially in cases in large towns and cities where their presence in the belfry to ring for the services actually involves out-of-pocket expenses-but there seems to us sometking radically wrong somewhere when in a country town, with 'plenty' of ringers, a peal of beils hangs silent in an ancient abbey for the sake of a pound a man. The men who hold aloof on the ground that they will not ring without pay, are evidently not men who love the art for the art's sake, and yet they are prepared to ring the bells (presumably twice each Sunday) if someone will guarantee them something less than twopence halfpenny per ringer for each attendance! It is almost staggering to think that men who are 'ringers' can stand out over a quibble of this kind. One could understand the 'mercenary ' attitude better if the demand were something more commensurate with the time involvedassuming that the men want to be recompensed for their services. As a ' remuneration,' a pound a year per man is absurd, as an obstacle to the ringing of Dorchester Abbey bells it is a folly. Surely there must be annong the ' plenty in the parish ' at least one ringer who realises the opportunity which is presented, to raise a band who will give their services to the church and count it a privilege to be allowed to futfil the duty. In thousands of country towns and villages throughout the land, there are companies of ringers (not all of then versed in the practice of scientific change ringing) who gladly give their services

## BELFRY GOSSIP

It is interesting to note, writes Mr. R. G. Rice, 36 comertion with the peal of Bob Major rung ut Hagbourne, Berks, on the LELA January, that the only previous peal in the method on these bults was cung on April 2lst, 1772 , by eight members of the Oxtord City Society (founded 1757), in threu lours twenty minutes, condacted by d . Baket. This was also the first peal on the belle.
Mr . Rice aiso replises to an inquiry made by a comespondent in our issue of January $\mathrm{B} \mathrm{l}_{1}$ as to whether any tower possestas l.wo older bella than the two at Eythome, cast in 1470 . He points oul lhint there are two much older bells at Dorelsester Abley, Oxon. The 7ths was cast in Londan in 1320 , aud tho tenor at Wokiogham in 1380.

Tho peal at Wilton, Tamnton, on Jamuary 10th wits rung in two hours 54 minutes, and not two hours 45 minutes, as printed last week.
The Swindon Parish Churela Guild has, after many attempts, sutceeded in ringing the first peal on the fine new ring of tew. The conductor, who was so intimately associated with thes sclieme for providing this noble church on the liill witla a mew ying of ten, rang his first peal of Caters al the fine old Clurch of St. Lawrence, Rendiag, in 1884.
What would lave been the first peat of Stedman Triples for all except the eonduclor was lest on Saturday evening at All Sniuls' Church, Newport, in the lust half-course of the peal, after 2 hours 58 minutes' ringiag. The attempt wha in honour of the nowly ioducted Vioar, und those taking part were regular service ringers it the church.
Althongla Mr. I. Gi. Shade's 84 peals in 1924 is a wonderinal total it is by no means an individual record for a ycar's riมging. In 1913 the late Mr. A. W. Grimes rang 136 peals, which followed on it iotal of 114 in the preceding year, and set up the unigue pertormaned at 250 in two years. In 1912 the late Mr. Bertram Prewet alsa tang 100 peals.
It would be interesting to Enow, writes Mr. C. F. Ehberson, at which tower the greatost number of peals and methods were rung in 1924. At Willesden, he adds, eighteen peals were rubg in fourteen methods during the year.
Bonjamin Amable, one of the outstanding figures of the early days of ringing, died on Februnty lst, 1766. Hz was buried at St. Bride"s, Fleet Streat.
Harrison's peal oí 10,176 Treble Bob Major was ruag at Waralam, Sussex, in the Kent Variation, on Fob. 2ad, 1891.
"Composed by Mr- Holl, of the London College Youtlis," a peal of Grandsire Triples was rugg at St. Mary's, Nothingham, on Shrove Tuesilay, February 3rd, 1761.
A peal of 10.032 Grandsire Major was rung in 6 hours 18 minales at Walsall on Feb. 4th, 1861
The Crmbridge University Guild mis founded on Feb. 4 th, 1879.
On Feb. 5th, 1783, a peal of 12,672 Bob Major was rung at Bromley. The fime was 7 hourg 48 minutes, On the same day in 1888, the then record lengils of Stedman Caters, 12,041, was rung ic 7 hours 26 mimutes, at Appleton. The last long peal in twis methoul on these bells was nearly twioc the length.

## CROWLAND ABBEY BELLS.

The peal of Doubles which was recently mentioned as beivg the first pead on the bells at Crowland Abber Lines was nat the anly peal that has been rung there. ## TOO MUCH MONEX?

M.CA. QUARTERLY MEETING AT LONG £ATON.

Saturday, Januarj 17th, saw the memters of tho Midland Counties Association assemble for the quarterly meeting at the Jerbyshire town of Long Eaton, where ringing took place at the Parists Church trom 2.30 to 9 p.m. Although not numerically large, the gathering uonprised jingers who tang nearly everything up to and including London Surprise. The committee, tea and gencral meeting all took place in tho Co-operative Cafe, a splendid repast being served to aboul 45 members. At the subsequent meeting, Ald. R. B. Chambers presided, supported by Mrs. Chambers, Mr. P'yce Taylor, Mr. A. C. Wright (fon. secretary), while a churchwarden represented the local athorities. The Rev. R. E, Wilkinson, of Mansfield-a ringer-parson-joined the gathering, which was representative of the various districts of the essociation. Twentyseven new members were gatliered in, and a long discussion followed on the suggestion to reconstuct the rulus to permit lacal automamy. It was eventually decided to call a special committee mecting sometime in Mrech to disouss the ways and means, providing the various districts approved.

A grant of five grineas was made from the Bell Repair Fund to Hinckley, Leicestershire, for the relanging of the ring of cight, and a grant of thee guineas from the general funds was apportioned to the Washbrook Memorial.

Messis. Wallace and Draper were elected auditars for the treasurer's accounts, which again show an increase of funds.

Apropos of the special committee's iuture meeting, is is boped that all branches will seriously consider the matter hefore sending their secretary as delegate. There are several ways of disposity of the surplus funds-if it is decided to dispose of them. The proposition contained in the suggested new rules is that the capitation fee should? be 6il. per member instead of one shilling and sixpence, and that the report should be free.
It las been decided already to reduce the cost of the report from one shiling to sixpence. The lron. thensurer would suggest that a return be made either by reducing the annual subscription to prewar scale ( $1 /-$ ) or by a rebate at the end of the financial year, whenever the association shows a profit, and that the quarterly or anmual Eea or tinner should be free. The peal trouble is, he says, that the association las foo much money! These remarks are writen solely to draw the attention of absont members to the subject.

## AN ARCHITECT ON BELLS.

CONDEHNATION ON IRON AND STEEL TRAMES.
If correctly reported, some of the statements made at a leciuse on Friday last, at Liverpool, by Mr. W. D. Carae, the architect. ought not to go unclallenged. Speaking at the Clurel House, on "Church Bells and Bell Hanging.' he gave a warning to church offeials (says the 'Liverpool Post and Wereury' to look before they leap into acceptance of some of the bell hanging improvements ("gadgets, le called then onee) offered by some bell fonders. Particularly he was against iron or steel bell frames. They deteriorated, le said, and required constant nursing.

Change finging, said Mr. Caroe, was pecnliar to this country. The caritlon bell of the Continent was a musical iastrument. The other bolls were not, musical instruments. 'There is music,' he said, 'and there is bell music. A bell has tirge distinct notes - the top, the lower, and the major thircl, which demands a musical ear to detect it." Bells, he ackled, should be heard from a distance. Talking of towers, the strmin caused by the bell ringing was very great, le ssicl. In the tower itself, weight nnti solidity were the first desiderata, There must be solid material and good mortar. Bells were api it make mincemeat of bad mortar.

January 23rd, ant was attented by several of liss friends of St. Lawrence's, who provided a wreath, and also by brother ringers from other Reading towers.
