## DISTRICT MEETINGS.

Happily the recent experience at a Surrey district meeting, of which a correspondent complains this week, is not a common occurrence. A meeting at a six-bell tower was arranged and duly advertised, but only nine ringers attended, and those attached to eight and ten bell towers were notable for their absence. As our correspondent points out, this is extremely disheartening to the officials, apd especially to a secretary who is struggling to work up a district and has been promised help from outside, which assistance failed to materialise. It is seldom, especially in areas where bands are fairly numerous, that ringing meetings are as poorly attended as the one mentioned, but the point of greatest interest is whether, as our correspondent seems to think, ringers on higher numbers than six bells shun meetings at six-bell towers. This is a complaint which, we think, cannot be made of ringers in general. Experience proves that, as a whole, ringers at eight and ten bell towers give valuable support to the six-bell meetings. Often they are more strongly represented than are the six-bell men at eight-bell towers, and their assistance is a great asset.

The question arises, however, do we make the most of the opportunities which these district meetings present? For the most part the ringing is of a casual kind, with no definite object in view, except that everybody shall get a pull. Often, of course, someone gets a touch in a fresh method, or some beginner is given a start, but there is generally an entire absence of any organised attempt to make the ringing progressively educational. Nor would it be easy to arrange the ringing on these 3ines. At the same time we think something might be done, particularly in those districts where it is the practice to hold monthly meetings, which enable members to come together with frequency. For instance, it might be possible to arrange to devote certain periods at each meeting to the definite practice of specific methods, efforts being made beforehand to secure the attendance of stfficient accomplished ringers to ensure adequate help for those who availed themselves of the opportunity thus offered for advancing themselves in the art. Obstacles to such a step as this are easy to be found, but there is unquestionably a need for ringing more organised, educationally, than is usually the case at district meetings, and the subject is worth thinking over. We are pleased to note that our earlier observations on the question of more advanced instruction for ringers at such gatherings is already bearing fruit, and that in more than one association arrangements are being made for competent ringers to read papers on subjects dealing with the art.

The handbells were bronglat into action, ant tateless of Stedman Cinques were rung, followeri by tunes and warious kinds of jazz ringing, and, last but not loast, a rise and fall (more fall than anything). This brought an enjoyable half-rlay to a close.

## DEATH OF MR. EDGAR WIGHTMAN. <br> MEMBER OF A WELL-KNOWN RINGJNG FAMLY.

Deep regret will bo felt by a large number of ringers at the death of Mr. Elgar Wightian, late of Woodford, Essex, who passed away on Sunday evening, Trebruary 15th, at Uxbridge Hospital. He had had an atanch of induenaz, and got out too soon after it. A yedupse followed, and plewrisy and pncumonia doveloped. He was removed to hospital on the Thursday, but despite all efforts on the part of the doctors and nurses he succumbed on the following Sunday.
Horn at Framsden, Suftolk, in 1875, ho was one of the well-known ringiag family of Wightman, father and sir sons forming the bulk of the band at Cretingham. Farrier and general sinith by trade, he rent to woodford, Essex, in 1896, and while thero assisted the joung bunds at Woodford and Leytonstone, where he soon made thiags move. His ringing activities were carried on in the Issex, Kent and Middesex Associations, and with tho Gumberland Youthe. Unlortumately he kept no record of his considerable number of peals, but anoug those that he rang whs the 15,072 Double Norwich (his favourite bictlod) at Erith on April 3rd, 1899, one of his own conpositions. Ho also raug a pair of handbells' in the first doublebanded peai of Stednan Cinques by the Middlesex Association, conduded by Mr. W. Pye. Mr. Wightman was rery active among the Cumberlands in the early yearg of the present century, and later, wile will Mossrs. Warner and Son, got together a liandhell party comeeted with the foundry. He was a very fine ringer and conduetor, thoroughly at home at either cod, but particularly good round the back.
Only last yoar lie romoved fron Wondford to take up a new business at Uxbridge, Middlesex, whece he was assisted by his son (who is also a ringer'). He was making exeellent progress when stricken down by jllnces. Fis death will be keenly felt amongst ringers in the Sunth-East of England especially in the South-Western Division of the Essex Association, where le had endearcd himself by his courteous manner, and his readiness to help at all times. For a aumber of years he neterl as Master of the Division.
The deceased was buriet on Wednesday, February 18th, at Uxbxidge Cemetary. Anomgst those present were Messrs. W. Miller and F. D. Snith, of the leeytonstone St. John's band; Mr. C. Morths, of the Woodiond baud and Mr. E. J. Butier, represonting the Essex Association. Amongst the numerous floral emblems was at wreath from the St, Joln's, Leytoustone, Society, and also one from the members of the woodford and Loughton bands.
On Sunday, February 22nd, and Monday, Fob, 23rd, Jalf-mufed ringing took place at St. Jolu-the-Baptist's Church, Leytonstone. On each oecasion 720 London Surprise Minot was ming non-conducted andi sfrictly "silent", as $n$ mark of respect to the late Mr . Wightman, who conducted the first extent of London Surprise on these bells on $\Delta$ pril 1711, 1898.

The funcral took place at Reading Cemetery, the first part of the service being conducted at St. Mary's Clurch by the Ven. Archdeacon of Berks and the Rer. C. W. O. [ROOF OF ROUND BLOCKS AND PROOF OF CONSTRUCIION. By GEOLGE BAKLER
Li an old but not forgoter controversy of 1913, I foumd that a particular method, one of my owa discoveries, published in ' 13eh Nuws,' March 17th, 1900 , was produced thy three orthodox bobs, \&uick 6uth's, Quick 3rdrs, and Quick 6th' $\varepsilon_{3}$ and there nnd then I lajd it duwa as an axium that all methods, principles and systeuls were produced by making loobs and Extremes in the Primary Principles.

Lixcept that I hava adophed Lhe tern! 'Shunis,' I have never deviated from that statement, and that i was right in making is can now be abuudantly proved. Moreover, 1 can go a step further, and dectare that there is a general baw in ancthod construction, and that lay applies whather it be method, principle or system, and the axiom frid down in 1913 ean be anplified in 1925 as follows:
All methods, principles and systems, double or single, reyular or irregular, symmetrical or asymmetrical, with one, two, or ary numher of hunts, or no hunts at all, are produced by making SINGLE WEUNTS which form LuUCND BLOCKS in the Primary Principles os tho Trable Bob Priveiple, and these round blocks are not wonfined to the first lead or division, but rua rigit through the Plajn Course.
A crude way of proving the rxiom above would he to write out a [ull plain course of LEEK MATOR, but 1 hope to make myseli undurstood by the use of two đivisions ouly.
