## RINGERS AND PRACTICES.

A question of interest and importance to ringers is raised in the annual report of the Middlesex County Association, laid before the members on Saturday. It is that of securing to ringers at every church a regular practice night. It is pointed out that at some towers a regular practice night is almost out of the question, or if there is a practice night, it has frequently to be given up on account of other parochal events- The suggestion is not that the ringers are not considered, but that they are for the time being forgotten. That, we think, puts very fairly the conditions which exist at many towers, not only in Middlesex, but in nearly every other county. in almost every instance it is the ringers who must put off their ringing when anything else is in the wind. Even an organ practice or a special choir practice have been made sufficient reason to interrupt operations in the belfry, and it has been because the ringers' practice or peal has not been rightly valued.

On the other hand, ringers themselves are sometimes prone to think that their practices are of small moment, otherwise fewer of them would be among the absentees on practice nights, and there would be less anxiety to abandon practice during the summer months. This is a thoroughly bad habit. Except abandoning practice altogether, there is nothing calculated to throw a band back than this closing of the tower for all except Sunday ringing through the summer. Indeed, it often affects the regularity of the Sunday ringing. One realises that in the country there are times when the claims of, say, harvest, may keep men away from the belfry on a weekevening; but even harvest does not last from April to October. Gardening, cricket and other outdoor occupations are often advanced as an argument against summer evening ringing, but the ringer who cannot so arrange bis work or play to spare once a week an hour after eight o'clock at night to maintain his efficiency in the belfry is but a lukewarm individual so far as ringing is concerned.

What ringers need to produce the best results in ringing is a regular weekly practice night throughout the vear. When it rests entirely with themselves it ought never to be in question; when the church authorities place obstacles in the way, through forgetfulness or otherwise, it ought to be possible to put the matter tactfully before them, with a polite insistence that at least an hour a week should be set aside and left clear for them to practise their art. There are some places where the ringers' practice night is so well established as to become almost a tradition. At Birmingham, for instance, it is recognised not only by the church authorities but by the public, and

If, Etucefore, the Council bas cauglat the itch of morlernily, then let it restrain science from crushing all sentiment. It will, indeed, lave a herculean task in eradicaling 'Grandsire" as a name'from our minds.

Had the general secretary been lold at the meeting, some ringing waulu have been possible. The Vicar of St. Andraw's, and the secrotary, much regret the disappointimet that was ceresed.

The peal of Stedman Cinques at Canterbury Cathedeal, on Eastur Monday, by members of St. Morlin's Guida, Birminghem, shows that the Geild can rely upon its non-resident members as well as those who practise regularly at St. Martin's, and that they are equally keen in upholding the reputation of the Guild.
Some of thg Birmingtham contingent had what might ba termed a hectic time. Leaving the Midiadd city at 8.15 a.m., a late mrival in Loadon caused them to miss the train to Canterbury. They did not reach the Cathedral, therefore, until 4.20 , the start having been arranged for 4 a'clock. The bells ran round at the end of an excollent peal at 8.3 p.ni, and then there was another rusb to catch the 8.22 train to London, and Bivmingham was reacled at 3.30 on Ityerday morning. Some day!
Will the ringer whose home is in Dover, and who lias recently beth visiting Watford and Chorleywood, communicate wath Box M. C., "The Ringing World" Office, Woking, enclosing testimonials, when he may hear of a situation?
Among the wreatles sent for the funeral of Mr. Rock Small was one from the members of the Society for the Archdeaconry of Siefford. This was described last week ns being from St. Peter's Society.
The peal of Grandsive Gaters rung at Trowbrigge on Easter Monday was compased lyy G. Holifield.
Members of the Midnad Counlies Association, who propose to attend the mocting of the Nottingham District at Bingham should pay special attention to the request that they should give notice of their intention to be present, The reason for this ougtt to be obsious, and this parograph should emphasise the matter.

To-day is the anniversary of a peal of 10,400 Kent Treble Bob Major at Shipley, in 1896.

On April 26th, 1894, 11,300 Bob Major was rung in 5 hours, on linadbels, at Norwich. The game day is also the anniversary of anotler ' long " handbell peal, 8,896 Kent Treble Bob Major haying been rung 'in hand by Gollege Youtls at Barking.

A similar length in the same metlod was rung by the Cumberland Youths on tower bells at Highgate on April 27th, 3876 . In connestion rith this peal it is inleresting ta recall that the composition was the frmous one by william Harrison, the longest fength obtained witl the tenors together.

It was composed in March, 1876 , ant at the inslance of Mr, Tasper Snowdon it whes first publisleed in an appendix to a now edition of Hubbard's work. The books were sent out on April $\mathrm{Sth}^{\mathrm{S}}$, ons was received by the secretary to the Cumberlands on the g6th, the ringerg were chosen the same evening, and the peal rung the nort day. The peal was called by Gcorge Newson, and the band included Henry Dains, John Cox and E. Gibus.

The College Youtiss set up a Trehle Bob Major record on April 27th, 1868, when they rang 15,840 in 9 hours 12 vinutes at Bethanal Green. Mr. Ted Harrex. now the 'father " of the society, is the sole surviror of that band.

Another annivereary on April 27th is that of the 8,580 Stedman Cingues, at Combill in 1861. It, was rung in 6 lours 41 minutes, nud at that time was the longest lengili in the method on fwelve bells.
Three interesting nnnivergaries fall on April 28th. In 180t, the Cumberland Youtlis rang 10,112 Oxfori Treble Bob Major at Edmonton; in 1890, the Cambridge Umiversity Guild rang their first pmal : in 1923, the Midland Counties Association rang 12,896 Camhridge Surprise Major, at Stoney Stanton.
The 210th anniversary of the firgt recorded peal falls an May 2nd-s peal of Triples at St. Peter Maneroit, Norwicd. As this lappens to be a Saturday, at will be a convenient day to commomorate the event.

the committee met at 11.15 anh., atul after the business, usual on these occasions, muthe grants from the Belfry Repairs Fund of fis to St, Jolm-ilne-Baptist, Erith, and ed 2s. to Bythome.
The service was at noon, in the theatiful old Chuteli of SS. Mary and Lanswgth. The association's - form was used, the lonk secretary intoning the prayets, Mr. W. E. Pitman, Mus.Bac., being at the argan. The opening hymm was the liaster lyann ; before the address, the ringers' special hyum, ' Unchanging God,' nad 'O praise aur God Lo-day' (A. aud M. 380) for the collection, which was for the benevolent fund, and amounted to 5148 . 7a. The address was given by the Rev. (1. A. Lewis, Remlor of C'heriton, from the iext, P5, oxix. 45, I will walk at liberty : for I seek Thy commanslments.' This, he said, was an apparent contrediction fo ignowant and ill bislanced minds, obedience to commandments, suggesting a curfailment of ifberty. But properly understood, liberty was only to be seured by reasonable discipline and orderen obodicace. This was a lesson much needed at the present time, and the preadher gave a brgps illustration of this truth, by painting but low, after the intial difficulties of learniag to ving, the change ringer 'was free to orjoy bis skill only in oheyng. with others, the rutes of the particular method they chose to ring. In like manmer, it would be found that, as wo confessed in our daily maming prayer, Godss service was perfect freedom.

## ST. PETEK MANCROFT BELLS.

The rededication of the bells of St. Peter Mancroft, Norwich, after extensive restoration, which has been carried out hy :Messrs. Tnylor and Co., look place on Sunday.

A history of the bells of St. Peler Mancroft is almost a history of ringing in miniatare. It was on these bells that the first recorded peal was rung, two hundred and ten years ago. The first peal of Stedrana Triples also was rung lere, and afterwards, on the enarged ring of tell and subsequently on the lwelve, some of the most lamous performanees of past generations havo been put up.

The original peal at St. Peter Mancroft, existing as early as the fifteentli century, consisted of five belis, wrote Mr. J. R. Jerram in "The Ringing World" of September 14th, 1914. In 1602, a treble, cast by Willinm Brend, of Norwich, was added, making a peal of six. In $1675-6$, two more bells were added to make eight. These were cast by Edward Tooke.

A board in the belfry records that in 1736 the ring was made a peal of ten by an addition of two bells "subscrib'd for by geutlemen in ye Parish.' The first peal on them was rung on Mareh 8th, 1737, I2,600 Grandsire Caters in 8 hours 15 minufes, and was *perfectly compleated, to the entire satisfaction, surprise, add amazement of thousands of learers."

Nearly 40 years later it was decided to replace tle old peal by a new peal of twelve, ant at a vestry held on January 31st, 1775 , it was agreed to accept the tender of Messrs. Pack and Chapman. In 1814 the tenor was cracked, and was recast in the samb year.
