## COVENTRY BELLS' FATE.

The fate of Coventry bells will be decided early in the new year. The hearing of the petition for the factulty to recast the existing bells and to add four others to make a carillon of fourteen is fixed for January fth, and the scheme is likely to meet with strenuous opposition. It is the unanimous opinion of those who heard the old bells rung-it is forty years since that was done-that this peal was one of the finest rings of ten in the country, and it is for that reason that no effort has been spared to save them from the melting pot. On the other hand, those who are anxious to see the carillon erected are arguing that the bells are overrated, and we have heard the view expressed that they could not even be tuned up to form the nucleus of a respectable carillon. These are vastly divergent opinions, and the case, when it comes to be heard, is likely to be the most interesting of its kind that has ever had to be settled. While ringers are often only too glad to use all their influence to get bells recast, this is, so far we know, the first instance where they have taken steps to save a peal of bells in the face of an official desire for a wholesale melting up.

When we commented previously upon this matter we made a protest against the scheme to recast the ten bells into fourteen smaller ones, and we are glad to learn that the intention now appears to be that the other four bells shall be cast of additional metal, for, apart from the preservation of the existing ring, it would have set an extremely unpleasant precedent to have heavy ringing bells melted down for a more numerous but lighter carillon. That point, at any rate, seems to have been gained at Coventry, and it now remains to see if the existing bells can be saved. The Central Council's action in the matter has been officially recognised, for the secretary has received formal notice of the hearing of the petition, and Mr. J. S. Pritchett (Recorder of Lincoln and a member of the Central Council) will appear as counsel in the case. This is the first occasion upon which any such intervention has taken place, and from that point of view alone the inquiry will be of importance to the Exercise. Whatever happens to the old bells, and all who heard them in the past hope they will be saved, we trust the spirit of the people of Coventry will lead them to erect the campanile, for which plans have long been in existence, so that the bellis may not only be mechanically chimed, but also properly rung-it is rather ominous that the petition refers to the provision of 'a chime' and not a 'ring ' or 'peal' of twelve bells. The bolder and finer scheme ought not to be beyond the finarcial power of a city like Coventry, and courage and enterprise would, we feel sure, see such a project carried to a successful conclusion.

By thes peal, G. Stertman Morris, who is not yet 18, has now rung in peals of Cambridge Minor, Major, Royal nod Maximus, and is the youngest to do so. The lightest tenor previously rung to a peal was Lye, Worcestershive, where the weight is juat over 3 owt. It would be interesting to know how the weights of the two trebies nompare.
It is good news to leasm that the people of Camberweld are inquiring what has become of the bells ab St, Giles' Church, which have not fuecta heard in peal for a considerable time. The cause of their silenee is the want of overhaul, and now that the public are becoming interestol the churel anthotities may think it an opportume moment to raise a ro. storatiou fund.

The Taunton baud, who rang last Saburday the first seven-methond Surpuise Minor peal in Somerset, are to be congralulated upon their suecess, which is the reward of their continued perseverance.

The bells of Blackawton, Devon, have been silent for len years, anal the parishioners are now anxions to hear them again. Their silenci is atated to be due to the fact that the ringers wonld not regularly attend chureh, and therefore the Vicnr fiebarred them from ringing. Another attempt is now to be made to organise a band of ringers in tho parish,
One of the esiliest : als rung at St. Mary-lc-Tower, Ipswich, was it peal of Guadsive Triples on December 12th, 1735, so that to-morrow is The 190tla anaversary. It was recorded in the 'Ipswich Gazette,' ant it is curious to note that the names of the ringers are given in reverse order, that is, beginning witlithe tenorman. He was fatmes Kirridge, and his age was 61.
A peaf of 6,400 Oxford Treble Bou Major wat rung at foworts, Middlesex, on December 11ih, 1770.
On December 12fls, 1848, 7,392 Stedman (inques was rung at lifo minglam. Henry Johmson composed aud conducted the peal, which was the longert in the method at that date.
In the jear 1806. The week from Dec. 13th to Dec. 20th was produc tivo of a great deal of ringing at Chrisu Church, Spitalfielde, whire it that time there was n ving of tweivo bells. On Dec. $33 t h$, the Senior Cumberland Fouthe rang over 5,500 clanges in a fruitless attempl for a peal of Stedman Cingues, but were successful on the following shturday, Dec. 20th, when they brought round a 6,334 in 4 hus. 55 whins.
Between these two bouts of ringing. viz., on Dee. 15th, thr Jtanior Cumberlands rang a peal of 5.886 in the same method. Whal wntid the inlabitants say to-day to such a 'feast' of ringing?

congregation of about two hundred people, mostly ringers, assembled at St. Ebbe's Church, Oxford, on \$aturday afternoon, for the dedication of the Washbrook Memorial. Edwards (Master of the Salisbury Guild), (he Rev. R. L. C. Newhouse, Mr. and Mrs, A. D. Barker, Mr, and Mrs. A. E. Lock, Misses S. Duvis and M. M. Webb, Messrs. A. A. Hugles (College Youths), G. H. Phillott (Chelteuharn), H. Chapuan, Conmeillor Frtppier, J. W. Washbrook (Manclester), G. A. Smilh, R. T'. Tiblert (general secretary, Oxford Guild), A. J. Wriglit (Heasurer, Oxford Guild), R. While, G. Holjfield, J. F. Barlow, W. 1. Nevard, D. Napper, and representatives from eleven of the branches, including the following Lowers; Chipping Mortom, Shiplon, Chalgrove, Winey, Benson, Avdington, Eynsham, Goring, Stanton Harcourt, Chillon, Abingdon, Nowbury, Appleton, Tackley, Yarnton, and St. Giles', St. Wbbe's, and All Seinls' Oxford.

The memorial, as is well known, takes the form of the addition of two trobles to tite six bells of St. Ebbe's, the existing six having been cleaned, tuned and relang. In adidition a bronze tablet has been phaced near the entrance to the ringing chamber, bearing the following inserjption :-

## A.D. 1925

The bells in this tower were repaired and rehnug, and the two trebles added by the Oxford Diocesan Guild and ringers of the British Empire, in memory of James Wiliam Washbrook, a highly skilled ringer and talented composer, ablo conductor, and for many years instructor in the Guild.

The ceramoly, which took tho form of tho dedication service from 'he Oxford Diocesan Service Rook, was conducted by the Master of the Oxford Guild, and the address was given by the Rev. Ganon G. F. Coleridge. Led by the St. Whise's choir, the singing of swoh a large body of men was very hearty and inspiring.

In the middle of the service, the clergy, the choir. and a bant of ringers chosen for the purpose, went in procession to the ringing chamber, whero tlo new bells were conscerated and dedeated by Canon Coleridge, after which a few rounte were rung by the following : Canon Coleridge, Fev. C. W, O, Jenkyn, Messrs. R. I'. Hibbert, H. Chapman, R. White, W. H. B. Wilkins, J. Monk, and H. Miles.
In tho course of his aifdress, Crnon Coleridge said that the ringers there assembled had just joined logether in dedicaling a memorial lo Tames William Washbrook, one of the mast noted riagers, if not the most noted, of all time. They had given these bells into the care of tho parishioners of St. Ebbe's to be used in bilis memory, and for the honour and glory of the dhrch. Canon Coleridge said that there were three reasons why he liad been specially asked to underdake the dedication ceremony, and to address the ringers: (1) Because the Brshop of the Diocese was mahle to come, as he had two Confirmation services that afiernoon; (2) Hecause as President of the Central Council of Church Bell Ringers he represented in a sense ali the associndions and indiveluals who had conlubuted to the erection of fhe mamorial; sud (3) becanse he was the only living ringing cleric who knew James W. Waslibrook from his youth upwards, and the ouly one nanang the linging clergy who had rung 87 peals with him, inchurling at Maber of long peals, one of which was the 15.000 of Stedman Caters
is Appleton. The preacher said he had visited many counties in many opporfunities of noting and adninging the clauracter of this perit many opporfunities of noting and admiring the clanacter of this veritWashbrock, Canon Coleridge said that he liad first come into contact wndergraduate mnmber of the Oxford University Society of Change Ringers. Every Wedmesdny afternoon in terna af 4.30 , the society used tn meet at St. ThomassaChtarch to rigg on open bells. Young Washallie to be in the ringing chamber when this ringing took place, ereepHng up to watch the undergraduates painfully endeavouring to ring sia-scores, ond as he whtelied he wondered when he, too, wonld be able was aille ta ring a bell and aboid eight or nine venrs old, Washlorook and whanever possible lie would carry ont the duts of tallime the death-bell for a death in the parish. Whes Washlurook was mboni. 16 rears of age, one of the clepgy of st. Thomas's Chureh erae him Troyte's book, and and in Minor (probably frandairs in Grandsire and Stedman Doitbing Fane lis firsh peal of Grandsire, and soon aftorwarals fook part ine
 sitiman Triples from a non-ohservation hell. and from that time his minging records grew apace. 'I'las year 1888 stands out ne a most conspicuous example of hisgreat ferits in ringing a uumber of long peals,
including 10,080 Double Narwich, 13,265 Grandsire Caters, and 12,041 and 15,041 of Stedman Catery. Later on lie had to give up lis work as instructor to the Oxford Diocesan Guild owing to the pressing clains of an noreasing family, and he went to Hereford, whore be diri a great deal to promote the art of change ringing.
From Hereford he went to take up a post at Arklow Churcla in Ircland, where, ont of very unpromising material, he formed a good yant of ringers, and after a time astonished the ringing world by the wonderful feat of ringing two tower bells in a perd.
After some pears in Irehnd, domestic reasons caused tis refura to England, first to Stafforlshire, ancl afterwards to Lancashirc, where he rang many peals, and whero ho spent the last part of his life Canon Calerifge suggested that it would be of great bencôt to the Exercise at Jarge if someone who hed the necessary leisure and ability would stady the available documents (such as the ' Bell News ' ont 'Ringing Worle'), and compile a complete record of Washbrook's peals.
The preacher emphasised the fact that Mr. Washbrook was an all round man being distinguished not only for his wonderful knowledge of the science and art of change ringing, but by his general ability and krowledge. To this knowledge he was always addigg, so that he be came a many-sided man. He was, too, a man who was appreciative of his religion. Ho was londest of all of going to the Cowley Fathers' Church, 'for there, ${ }^{\text {' }}$ he used to say, ' you can always liear' the best sermons by the best men in the cliurch." In conclusion, Canon Coleridge said, Two years ago this great ringer passed away. May that life go on in the Paradise of God, and may this peal keep ajive his memory
Immediately after the service, the first touch on ilıe bells (Stedmar Triples) was rang by the same eight ringers who rang duriag the service. Miny other visiting ringers then took the opportunity of ringing in tetaches of Grandsire Tyiples, Double Norwich, and Cambridge and Superlative Surprise Major, while lhose who were not aclually ringing strolled about for a while to hear the bells from different part: of the parish. All agreed that the bell founders (Messrs. Mears and Staimbank) liad effected an excellent blead, and that the bells wenl remarkablt well.
By the Findness of Canon Stansfeld, tea was served at 4.30 in St Ebhe's Parish Hall, and mote than oue hundred siogers participated. After tea, ilie Master of the Oxford Guitd said how tremendously he had been looking forward to that day, and how much he hoped that the bells had proved to all present that the Washbrook Bemorial Committee had not befrayed their trust. The commitiee had to consider the work that could be done with the money likely to be placer at their disposal. They then took steps to get the opinions of experts who advised the committee that the work of augmenting the sis bellis of Sli, Ebbe's could be undertaken with coufidence. He and the Oxford Diocesan Guild were very glad to welcome the ringers from other associations who wero present that day, aud to be the hosts at the tentable of those who had conse from far-off districts. He was especially giad to welcome there young James W. Waslahrok. Fic was wery pleased to hand over the bells to Canon Stansfeld, because the people who lived in this rather drab parish enjoyed the sound of the bells, and he sincerely hoped that the present ring of bells would bring to these parishioners the message of neate and joy, The speaker they suggested that the hells shonld be rung slowly in order that their beanty wight be brought out, and ha coucluded by remarking what a splandid opporbunity the roung Oxford ruggers now had of a sicep betwean six and ten bells

Canon Stansield, in a Pew heartfolt words, voiced his own pleasure and that of his parishioners in welcoming them all that day, and satd how very grateful they were for the generous and unexpected gift of the beautiful ring of bells.
Mr. A. J. Wriglat gave a bricf account of the financial side of the undertaking. during which he stated that $£ 232$ 9s. 4d. had been subscriberd it all, of which $\mathbf{E 9 2} 12 \mathrm{~s}$. 9d. came from ontside the Orforv Diocesan Guilki, Lancashire heving sent a Ronation of $£ 20$. He flimated that there were some 600 subscribers to the memorial, and he wishen to take the opportunity of thanking the ringers throughout the country for their generosity.
Mr. A. A. Hughes (Mears and Stainhank) sain? that he consjemod t a great hononr and privilege to have heen asked to make the new bells. The old six, afthough very lightu bells, were unusually deep it pitan for ther weight, and it was, therefore, recided that two brebbes conk be added to them succersfnlly if the old six went to the faum dry and were aljusted in tume, Upon weighing the tenor bell, it was found to bo but a fow pounds ower $4 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{cwt}^{2}$.
Mr. T. White, who underthot the work of hanging the bells. expressed his thanks for having had the honour of hanging this lighi ring, and his plensure thal everything proved so satisffetory.
Mr. FI. Chapman (Manchester) said that he was delighted with the two trebles, and that lie would he able to tate back to the norlt a very satisfaclory account of the Washbrook Yemarial.
Mr. G. F. Phillott (Chelfenlanm) expressed il as his opinion that lhe result of the work was most satisfactory.

Wikle then commented upon the leading article of tho 'Ring ing Woriti, pablished Ho previous day, on "Noiby Bells and Fant Ringing. la the apiaion of the speaker, it was a nity such mone had not heen written much sooner, fad he hoped that it would havo good effect. Fie said it hohoved all to tiy and get tho best out of the bells.-Sevoral other members voiced their opinion and rapraval.
Eventunlly the topic turned into a most interesting and entertninin dobate; first on the correct way of teaching a lerraer, in order that he thay ring his bell to the bestadvantage, the ptinatry object; of course, being slriking, and it whe umammonsly agreed ho should frat the put on a light bell, and only be permitted to go iuto diarges when he could ring rounds correctiy, Afterwards, the discourse moved on to the ringrag of the mere eliffacult methods. Mr. AF. P. Fidher suggested thai a hand who could ring Kent Treble Bob Major well, and who desirad to make good progross, should commence to proctjat the Minor methocis which hari been detailed by hira in the *Ringing Worlh." and which would slartly appear jn book form. In them they wauh fand a good steppiagestone to higlier things, aud wentually lia Surpuise methorls would nppeaf less formidable.
Mr. W. W. Wolstencroft supported this view. Jo his own personal expericnce lic had comed that the knowledge of Miner methorls of tained at Nothurg hadi ibrown a new light on the bigher methods and le hani formd them much easier to ring, through possessing goorl knowidgo of six-bell work.
Mr. A. Barnes togk ap the opposite wiew, staling thal a six-helf band wonkt find the two extra ropes an ohstacle to good Major ringity withont a vast amount of practige, and that lac chiof thing was ample study nt home, not learing it until atrival in the ringing-room. and relying on someone else to pull thens through. This wis sgreed upon, hut the arguments had been on a band conversant wilf cight-buld
ringing, and who desired to mashey the more intricate work. There fore, being usecl to eight bells, ouce they had acquired a good knowlenge of Minor methods, the two extre ropes woulrl cause no trouble.

Evedtually the Rev. A. T. Beeston was prevalech unou to express his opinion, and stated that if a band desired to make progress they must stoop to concuer. Mang eight-bell ringers thought they ware lowering their fignity if they cathe down to six-bell ringing, liut if only they would lose that mistaken iden, then they land a mach hetter chane of ablatning the desired olyject, and he loped that those who wrere so grejuchiced mould remove the bias, get down to work, and prantise Minar melhods. The work would be band and slow, wel nevertheless sure, with rauch hetter results when it came to ringing Surprise Major, ete.
The Fon. Secretary gave notice flat at the annual mreting lae proposed to britg forward a resolation, which he liopod woalal be passet on to the Central Council for , hein consjeleration and action. Knowing full well thai many bells are almost inaccessmble to Rural Deans, aud even when they can get at them their lack of experimen nakes ik a difficult task to repolta on the condition of the bells, ete. and, as it is the duty of Ruma Denas to inspect belfyies periodimily as with ofleer church property, it is unfortunate that the bells natu toa often overlookech. He suggestad, therefore, knowing the contibnan of many hells and belfries, that, the Central Conncil, though Diwresan or other chanmels. draw attention to the adrisability of Rum Dearas, when they have no perwonal icelnical knowledge of bells, to apponint as tanid deputy for the purpose of inspection, some perfon With the pequisite quatifentions. ## NOTES BY THE WAY. <br> HISTORY-AS WRITTEN BY MR. DRAEE. I\$y J. ARMIGER TROLLOPE.

Really, 1 cannot cougratulate the Rey. H. Drake on his fistory He Lells us that besides Plain changes and Cross Peals, there were, before Stedman's tirte, also Bob methods. Now, these were not ab litst melhods with one dodge in them, but methorls which were all dodgtag, or at least as thearly so as possitale. A method was not considemed it true Bob mehod unless one bell at loast dodged abl the time afler the Hunt leit it until it returned to it again.'
I'here is not the slightest fonadation for this statement.
Alt we know of the begimaing rad early development of riuging anters from Stenman's hook, tho 'Tintimnalogia,' published in 1668. thedman was au accuratu, thorougls and accomplighed writer, and can suffy Im liusted. He viescribes ringing under lwo distincl heads. Tlue tirst is lann Changes, which occupies roughly the first half of his lanok: the second is Cross Peals, whinh oceupies fite other and rather hinger hali. As these terms, no doubt, saean nolhing to a good many reddess of The Ringing World,' tei me explain that the distinctive fenture of piain Clanges was that only one pair of bels changed at a time, IMais Changes were likt modern stonoy; wilh the following ianotiant exceptions. They were composed on a highly sciealific plan and wilit ns much skill as any modern peal. the trutil of the changes whis bernputously adhered to. The helis changed at every blow; the conductor was dispenseri with, every man bimself kowing when to make a change. It will easily be seen that to ring a 720 under these conditious would requive a skilled band, and we must nob suppose that
(hese conditions obtaned evertwhere. In some places the ringiog was these conditions obtained everywhere. $I_{12}$ some places the ringing was whole pills, and in other's the changes were 'walked.' 'By walking thear is mant that. the bells go round four, six. eighl or more it une change, which is commonly used by youtg praclisers. And when the bells were * walked,' we may assume thai linere was a conductor. It was not till a good many yenrs after the birll of ringing thal Ploin Changes reached this stage. We may gafely couchude that thoy wero fully developed sanawhere about 1680 . Mr. Drake tells us hisi il is so molikely that Stedman developed Plain Changes that one can saicly say that it is impossible. I can only ask in astonisfumeut, foon le know who Fabian Stedman was, when he lived, and what he wrole? Perbaps the explination is that he thinks $I$ meaut that Scedman invented Plain Changes. I said nothing of the sort. I said thai The nad other seventeenth contury ringers developed them with great
Eut Flain Clanges lad scarcely been brought to perfection before they were superseded by Cross Peals. Tho feature of Cross Peals was that instead of only oue pair of holls changing at, a time, generad novenoent of ail the luells was introduced. Our modern Change Ringing would lave ranked as Cross Peals, hut it was some time before mothods in the present meaning of the term appeared. The first Cross Peals prelty obriously were variations of Plain Clanges, but with the invention of "Toukles and Simgles on four Bells, and 'Grandsire on Five Bells, an entirely new thing was introdnced into ringing composilion, which made modern method ringing possille. By 1700 The distifacion belween the method and tonches aud peals produced by
 Thus Stedman gives as Cipandsire Bob on Six Bells a parlicular 720 ; hook calied "The schoool of Recreation" in 170 t gives as Grandsire Rob what we now call Boh Minor, with Jlain Course and louches produced by hebs. This writer says, ' There are two kinds of changes, Plain Clanges and Cross Peais.
Tt is thus clear, hoth from direct testimong and from lhe nature of he ease, that there was no room for a thith kind of changes (the Soh methods), which Mr. Drake so coafidently tells us existed hefore Stuman's lime. Stecinann only once used the word Boty as the equivalent fractiad. or in cannection with methods, and that is in the ease of Grandsire Bob, which is the axact opposite of what Mr. Drake says llitase Bob mielhods wele. I have in menns of consulbing his secant

their change of name was an "act of gycoplantic adulation "is utterty unfair and utterly absurd. We may now think ition a good change buy that is anolier matter. To understand the situation you must realise that, in the early years of the cighteenth century Engiand was divided into two great parties, olle of which, the Jacobiles, favoured the restoration of the exiled Stuarts, the other who stood by the Hanovertan kings. Beside the question of the personality of the rival clamants to the Eaglisli throne, there were some very big principles involved. The retmm of Whe Stuarts would have meant (or was believed to have meant) the establishmont of personal autocratic government by the Sovereign, the favouriag of Roman Catholicisas, ind the lapse of England to a position of dependence on France. The other side stood for Parliamentary Government, the Protestani reIigion (which meant the religion of the Charch of England) and personal liberty. No doubl in practice it clid not work out quite like a hat, but that was how it appealed to the majarity of Englishmen at liat Lime. In 1745 Charles Fdward Stuart landed in Scotland, raised an army of Highlanders, defeated an English army at Prestanpans. and imvaded England. He reached Deily, but receiving no support from any English rising, relreated to Scotland, where his hopes aud those of his cause were finally crushed at the battle of Cullonden Moor by an army cammanded by the Duke of Cumberland, second son of George II. All this tine England was at war with Trance and as London was solid for the Hanoverians and the Protestant Succession, fon can understand the panic when the Highlanders were jn fall march on the city, and the relief and joy when they were finalty defeated. When the Duke returacd to Loudon be was received ly everyone as the deliverer from a national catastrophe, and why should the London Scholars beblamed because they shared the general feeling? In ater years the Duke became very unpopular, mainly for political reasons, and hard things were said about the cruelty and bratality wht which the Northern rising was suppressed. There was eruclty, anl there was bratality, but of that no one, least of all the London Scholars, knew at the time. There was no more sycaplmatic adulabion' in the London Scholars welcoming the patroage of thetr king'g son than there would be if a modern society welcomed the patronage the present Duke of York
If one had time and space there are quite a number of questions that one would like to ask Mr. Drake, and among them would he: Does he seriously say that Double Norwich has shartened " dodgina? When have I made any 'striclures' on bim, and where? What gronnds are there for saying that belfries in olden times were noister than they are now? Or that coarse and offensive names wauld lave appealed to the ofd conductors? Or that I and others have not vend the repolt of his committee?

The belis at Sbillington, Bets, have been overhanied and rehung by Mr. A. Bowell, of Ipswiel. and the 'go' of thera is perfect. The first quarter-peal was rutig on them on Sniurday.
