## THE CENTRAL COUNCIL.

Although the Central Council meeting at Ipswich on Whit-Tuesday is still somewhat distant, there is, we think, promise that this gathering wilt be one of the most interesting in the anmals of the assembly-interesting, we mean, in the business to be transacted. Usually we hear nothing of the Council from one Whitsun to the next, but during the past year the Council, through its officers, has been active, as, for instance, in the agitation to obtain cheaper railing travelling facilities for ringers, and the Coventry belis' case, upon which members may be likely to want a 'say.' Then, too, there are topics promised for discussion which are likely to find the Council sharply divided, as, for example, the question of method names, and the advantages, or otherwise, of Simpson tuning for bells. One or two resolutions, also, are likely to be coming up from the associations, such as that recommended by the Stockport Branch of the Chester Guild, to get practical ringers appointed as advisors to Archdeacons as to the conditions of belfries and bells.

There will be a large number of associations holding general meetings between Easter and Whit-Tuesday, and it might be well if they took the opportunity of expressing their ideas on any controversial points, so that representatives on the Council may go equipped with the views of their own members. In the case of the method names consideration of the committee's report was adjourned for a year in order that the proposals might be properly digested, and doubtless members of the Council will be glad of a guide on this subject from those who elect them, but we wonder how many associations will even give five minutes to discussing this matter? So, too, with Simpson tuning; will members at any association meeting be invited to express their views? We still hear ringers ask what grod does the Council do, but how often do ringers bother thenselves to consider Council questions, even though they may be specifically invited to do so? We should like to see a change in this respect.

Very liftle of the business before the Council is ever the product of discussion at an association meeting, and yet this is where questions ought really to originate. The Council will not reach the zenith of its utility until the affiliated bodies do their part in providing work for the Council. At present the central loody is left almost entirely to find its own topics, and it gets blamed if the Exercise does not think them interesting or important enough. Perhaps some day the Council's agenda will include motions submitted officially by the associations, and when that comes to pass its decisions will be more valued than they are now, when a large number of ringers con(Continued on tage 130.)

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tinue to treat it as a gathering of individual ringers rather than as a representative body. Except for a small proportion of honorary memlers, who, by the way, are generally men who are doing or have done a great deal of the 'donkey' work, the members go to the Council meetings as the elected representatives of their associations, and it is to the associations that they ought to be able to look, not only for support in the decisions that are come to, but for the initiative in all those matters which go to improve and toplift ringing and the Exerelse.

## RINGER'S DEATH IN CANADA.

MR. JOHN T. TOMPKINS, LATV, OF FINEDON.
A letter just received by Mr. D. J. Nichols, of Ketfering, from Mr. W, R. Hensher, of Dundus, Ontario. Cunula, who will be well remensbeice by many ringery ns the very highly-esteemed and respeded leader of the Keltering ringers some 26 years ago, states that ML. Jobar Thomas Tompkins (late of Finculon, Northamphonshirel pasked away in his flst year on January 28th lasi at West Humikon. Ho was buried in Duradas Cemelery on the 30 h h wlt.
Besides his widow he leaves three sons (who are all married) nume iwo daughters, for whom mueh sympathy will he felt by all those who knew the decensed.
In a short tribute 10 his memory, Mr. Hensher says: ' John mas a good, honestand upright man; a man ft was good co know, and whons you could respect, and he leaves a family all of the same kiud behmi him.
Mr. Tomplins was ane of the earliest memherg of the late Centras Northants Association, and represented the Finedon fower as delpgate to the association untiz le went to Canada some 20 years ago. Always a very keen Churchman, he toak n very great interest in fu. management of the nssocirtion.
In 1906 , when a resolation was brought forward to divide the assacialion into three districts, Mr. Tampkins seconded the molians, which was carried; aud. as cventag lase proved, the step wis wery benefieia] to the work of the association.

Amil is well to remember that it was nol the carillonites who commitich the first work of desfruction a Coventry; il was the noble art ant sciellen of clange ringing that unquestionably robbed Coventry of the jalentity of nowlisewal bells. Tafte tlat! with Coventry medicine! Andias an antiquary, permit me to say there is mo historical walne $\mathrm{E}_{1}$ a peal or bells that came out of the furnace, nonfomporasy with the nutry of our great-mranil'athers into this wale of woe. Aye! an' wait for York! Lley"ll lage wheels on, and resonativg breath!

## dN ARCUMENT AGANST THL MUSICAL FXEERTS

Dear Sir, It has been said that' fools rustl in where angeis foav to tread. So br il, I apologise for the folloning.
On reading the accound of the proceding of the Consistary Court at Coventry, one is struck wilh a curious phase of the situation. That is, why did not somedne attempt to thte up the musical experts on their own ground a Dr. Brazil demonstraied on fise piano tones contained in Simpson tuaing and ohd slyle tuning, and gave the following chords: (1) $\mathrm{C}_{4} \mathrm{C}, \mathrm{E}$ flat, $\mathrm{G}, \mathrm{C}$; (2) C sharp, $\mathrm{C}, \mathrm{E}, \mathrm{G}, \mathrm{C}$.
Heviog thus used the piano, and nowsical terms in support of his argument, it could lave fone no harm to have quoted at few musical terms ugoinst him andi carity the argument a bit further.
1 camot seo in the ncconht that Dr. Brazil played a succession of these chords, in either style;: but had he done so, so as to represent a peal of lyelis, a succession of parallet or ronsecutive 5th's and octaves would hare been heard, particularly in No. 1 style, as the " coot "is doubled.

Now, on page 19 of Sir Jolin Stainer's + Harmony ' are given six chords, from C to A, each chord containing fits perfect $51 \mathrm{H}_{1}$. Dr. Stainer says of ihem. - If the pupil will now play nill these chords ita suceession le will find they produce a very had effect. This is an aecound of the consecutive Sils's they contain, nor wilt he fard any lesse unsatisfactory result if conscoutive ootavis be arlded. Therefore, consecutire 5 \hrs- and octares are forbidden.

The chords given, being [roma $\mathrm{C} t 0 \mathrm{~A}$ inclusive. are the same as mondd represent a peal of six bells, tenor in C. If Dr. Sitainer was right. Hnd at trial on the piano proves il, then one of two things is evident, eifer ifrat hoth the specinens given by Df. Huazil fall undir condemanalion; on that the ordianry rales oi masical theory camot the applied to hells at all, and probably the latfer is correct, for a alord on the piano, or a succession of elmols, have notes af equal loulness whinin each chord. In a heli tha keynote or " rool" is prodomimat; the lammonics are nol so noticcable.
In fature, in a case of this sorl, il wauled lie a great ider to have one of ofjr ragerg who is also an organist (there aye a fem such) lo take on the musicat theorists at their own value, for it scems that most of the "defenders' disclamed a " unasionl ear," thus leaviag tho field to hiase antions to reenas the bells.

Evers defence of Simpson (ming is based on mataical timeory solely, and ignoms the cumulative effent of ringing hells in succession, whers. in there rast arise discords to ar achute eat, no matler how the hells are tured, and until eath bell ean he confined in a single tone these will coatintu to be heard, even in a Simpeos cearillon. Every now and then we lear of somu agerieved persoy who threateus to gret an injunction to slop the ringing of sonde perl of bells or other, but such cases never achually conme into the courts. Them was one some veare ago fot which I hate no [pirliculars) which diel result it some restriction of ringing. Sut that was in connection with a Roman Catholic Chureh, and strch stand on an entirely diferent legal footing to Cluref of Eugland Churches,
The case you bear ofican quatad $i_{s}$ St. Gabriel's, ${ }^{2}$ imitioo, and whit happenced there was something like this. St. Gubriel's is in Warwiok Wiquate, not far from Victoria Etation, in what is called a jighechas residential district. Somac of Itse inhabitants bitterly objected to the ringing of the bells, and, being of a contentions disposilion and having plenty of money, put the matler into lawyers' lands, wills insl ructions to apply for an injumetion to restrain the Viear and chiutelswarden thom laving the hells rang. Fhe phtuch \&uthorities took up the position that they late in law the right to rigg their bells, but as it was not their wish nor to their interest ta have a feud with any of the parishioners about a master on which no doubt they dial not reel very strongly, they decided, as an act of grace, and withoul prejudice to their rights, that the bells should not be rusg, and so they remain sileot to this day.
I have no donbt that in the particular circunstances they acted wisely. If a sufficient number of people ctose to a tower really mean business, and are sufficiently eaergetic (and disagreeable), they can nlways get ringing elopped or curtailed. It is a good thing for us that such peopie are rare. There aro a good many persons who olsjeet bitherly to beit ringing, but under the circumstances they are not: ate all likely to take any commonaction. The man who objects to the ringing in the fower next his house is only concerned to have those hells stopped. Fis grievance alonted, he doos not care twopene abous the trouble of a man who lives close to mother tower. And as the great majority of people live sufficiently far away from bells for them to be a pleasure amd not a nuisance, there is nob anv protjedrar eanse to fintr any renl altempt to curtail by legisiation the ringiag of ehurels hells. But we must recognise, and indeed we are increasingly recognisirg the fact, that noisg belis can be o real nuisance and hardship to those who live immediately nexe them, and especinily so when the ringing is bad. I noygelf arterery fond of music but I think $J$ shoult ohject if hegimers haran to pradice brass band music just ontside my sithing-room door.
And ilren, rangers being merely men and ohureluanthotilies ao more, we do hear now and again of trouble and kisputes helween them. Sometimes of the rugerst siriking, because the parson his displeased linem, end sometimes of ilie parson shutting ont the ringers, beenuse h.hey luve displeased him. But these disputes do mot get into courts of law, as did the following, which I copied from a mewspaper of jusi over a hundred rears ago. The first cause was the proceedings for divorce by George IV, againgt his wife, Queen Ceroline This case caused great feeling all over the coundy, When Caroline This case favour of the queen, liev partisuns gave themselves up to all manner of rejoicings, and among them were many ringers, who celebrated the oceasion by vinging the thelle. Fou will remember the bonrit in Ham. mermith Parish Churels. which I quoted some time ago in these motos, sud how the hells were rung for three days, and nine hottles of wine was drunk heve on the 13 th in honour of the vietory.
The ringers of Clarifstock, in Dorget, had similar opinions, and wanted to ring the bells. Sin hat not the parson who eillier was ot king's man or a sensible penson who thonght it no fit occasion for the ringiog of clurch bells. They porsisted, and so did lie, and it leit to an unceemily squabble, and a charge of common assault bronght iy one of file fingers against lhe patron. Hete is the nowspaper euttivg: -

At the Dorset Sossions, an indielment was preferyer by one of the lwell ringers of the parisin of Charidisech in that county against the remgronan of the parisib for an assautt. The clarge arose out of the procedings against the Quen. Tlae bell ringers persistall in forchng linmenlyes into tho belfry, and ringing thin liplls in deffance of the repeated prohibitions of the elergyman, He thouglat it his dutop to apport his authority by peranally endeavouring fo remove thems from
the belfry, and for that purpose procended to the cluvel at aine ut night wintsh the tells were ringing. The ringers rushed out of the ethum when they heard (he clergyman eoming, and le caught the first Hat issued from the belfry in order to ascertain who le with The jury nequited the defendunt.'
The mash importutut legal ease whioh coneerms bells was Stuinbank Y. Becketi. This was an action for libel, and whs tried at the loorls instices' Court at Wusbminster on June 2711, 1881, and the following six days. This was before the opeuidg of the present Law Courts in the sitand. The plaintift was Mr, Robert Stainbank, at that time proprietor of the whitechapel Foundry. He was an hative of Nottingharn, and bufore becoming interested it bell fouming was 4 timber merchant. J is sidu that al one time, when " The Dail Telegraply ' in its early yeas was at a low ebb, jue nearly becano its proprielint. Inslead, in 1861 he joined Mr. George Mears fa boll foumding and forry years later the style of the firm, whith lad been (i. Mears umd Cio, was altered to Mears and Stainbink, and hes coutimud the same to the prosent ljnes. Fte dial an January 24th, 1883. whd was burion at Boston, in Lincolnshire.
T.Ie defundant, sir Einmmi Reckelt., Q.C., was a most remarkablu man. First known ns Mr. E. Beekel: Donisont, he elaaged his nante to E. Herkett, and then, when raisad to Lhe peerate, la land Grimm thotpe. He was by profession a lawyer, and wade one of the largast. forbunes, if not the very largest, cyur made at the Bat. Hu did nut appary in the oddanty ciminal or divorce cases which bring a man' mame prominently before the puble, lsul al the larliamentary Bar, where the fees for a frst-class mith mre mormous, and where, foo, solid legal knowledge nad ability count tnther lian anore slowy Gualifeations. But law was anly one of hls many aetivities. Hu wrate books on architecture on romestic houses, as wed as churches: The was an acknowledgen authority an clocks; he took of big part iu tha ritualistic and dectrinal controversies which agitated the Church of England in the Iatien lanif of the ninelendh century: mad ho poser and was largely accepted as an anthority on the foumbing of belits.
It everylhing lie did the pressed his opiaion with a dogmatic a sumplion of superior knowlelge. Fe was one of those men who lanmily admit fhad anyone could alifer from them and be righta naturally enough he found himself juwolved iu perpetanl dispnteg with architeds, clockmakers and bell founders. He used to write loug lefters to. 'The Times,' which were equally distinguished by the force of their expression and fle extraorifinary Englishathey wore written in. The most ingortand, thing tho did in architecture was the restoretion of SL. Albans Ahhey, first as one of a committec, arkl afterwnres prachically single-linuded, when ho not only acinel as arelsileel, hots supplied unos of the money. What he did licere was hillertre eriticiserl by the professionat architeds. He mane mishakes, some of them har! oncs, but on the whole I think his work was not any worse than what would have becn clone, if othe of these archilects, who found so much fatit, han lag the jols. The architects wanted to krep the old lowpitchet roof, he waited to put, on a high-pitehed one, ant got his way. aml I think tho was right.
In otber things lie was just as cerlainly wrong. There is a taic told of lim, which ilfustrates the kind of man he was. When lire propesed to underiake the resharation of the Abbey by fimsolf, the parish atthoricies ruther Eimidy suggesterl that he should lave a combmillee ar architects to alvise lim. 'A emamitice of norlitects!' lo said, 'I would not have a commiltes of archangels!'
When Ilse Houser of Parlisment wero huilt the proposal was to haro a hig eloch, ant he was onlusted with oversieht of the matler. He Arew up a specifination, and a condilion was that it should not Frary more than a certaim small fraction of time per weck. The clockmakers Etid $i l$ could nol he done; he said it conld, and proceeded to invent a new escapement which turaed out is be even more aceurate than his specifuation required. Other hig and accurate clocks hawe since ben made, but the Weslminster cfock still holds its owa among them, and the rredif is Beckettis.
In bell founding his opinions urere fusi as definje anel just as formibly axpressed. but $\mathrm{i}_{11}$ t.jis. matler he was mare offen wrong than right. ## PEAL RINGING IN THE ASSOGLATION.

The interment took place on Saturday, Fabranty 13 th at Fieywoorl Cemelory, nat four of the local band acted as bearers.
