## NOTES BY THE WAY.

## BY J. ARMIGER TROLLOPE.

The following are Mr. Segar's instructions for tapping changes, according to a system which will work in Plain Bob, Grandsire, Treble Bob, and the few other methods in which the coursing order of the bells is not broken or practically not broken throughout the course.

At first do. not use handbelis, but obtain a circular piece of cardboard, say, seven or eight inches in diameter, and write on its edge, as on a clock face, as many figures as required in this order-

For example, try eight figures-

It is necessary to use two hands, say the forefinger of each. Place R.F. (right-hand finger) on I and L.F. (lefihand finger) on 2. Nove them in opposite dipections until they meet.

Now tap afternately, starting with R.F. on 1, and you produce rounds. Then, still starting with $R$. $F_{\text {. }}$. on I and L.F. on 2 , tap allemately, begimning with L. F., and you will produce $3143658 \%$. You have now fitished (both ways) with pair $1-2$.
Take the next pair in clock-wise direction, namely, 2 and 4 .

First R.F. start proctuces 24 I 038857 .
Then L.F. start prorluces $4{ }_{2} 66$ I 8 3 75.
It should be noted that in aritimetic there are only four pairs in eight, but round this clock face there are eight pairs, which must be used clock-wise-12-24-46 -68-87-75-53-31.

Start twice from each pair, first clock-wise, and then anti-clockwise, which produces the first lead of Plain Bob on any number so far as the row $132 \begin{array}{lllll}3 & 4 & 6 & \text {, etc. }\end{array}$

Every time the treble leads move the treble anti-clockwise, as shown:-

This clock face contains the sixteen changes of the second lead. Aiter satisfying himself that this is so, the tapper should throw away this card and practice this lead on the original clock face. He must get used to tapping 1 between 3 and 5 and omitting it where written.

Similarly, with all the other positions of the treble moved anti-clock-wise, until you have tapped the plain course. Then fetch out the handibells and hang them as under-

You still have the elock face, but it is a very much flattened circle.

For Kent move 2 round, then 4 , and so on.
For Grandsire move 1 and 2 round.
! have copied these directions exactly as Mr. Segar wrote them, for they are quite clear. Obviously, however, the directions for tapping Kent would in practice require a little amplification.

Now here is something to amuse a ringer for an hour or two on a winter's evening, And when he understands it he will learn something more than just how to tap a plain course. For the system is based on the most important thing in Method Construction-the law of cyclical moventent.

If the reader is interested he may, when he has mastered Mr. Segar's directions, turn to the article I wrote in 'The Ringing World' of February 20th, 1925, on Constructional Shunts. This tapping is a practical example of what I was there trying to explain. And, perhaps, if he is clever enough, he may from my article find a way to adapt this system to such methods as Double Norwich or Double Oxford. It is easy to see from Mr. Segar's letter how it can be adapted to Reverse Bob and Double Bob. Note, too, the light it throws on another question at one time much disputed about by the experts of the Exercise-the question of whether Plain Bob and Grandsire are the same method.

Here you have a proof of the truth of Shipway's statement that Grandsire is only bob ringing with a bell in the hunt, for in tapping them you usc exactly the same means, only in the latter you move a only through the other bells, and in the former you move $1-2$.

Though Mr. Segar does not deal with anything beyond the plain course, it is easy to understand how to ring touches. When a bob is called you must not only move the treble one step anti-clock-wise, but also the two bells at the time coursing one in front and one behind it. You nust then remember the altered coursing order of the working bells, and move the treble among them. The thing now begins to be difficult-not nearly so difficult as tapping by transposing every change, for you have to alter the imaginary positions of your bells once only every lead. From lead head to lead end the process is practicaily mechanical-but more than difficult enough to be the master of the vast majority of us ordinary ringers.

## CONDUCTING.-BY GEORGE WILLIAMS.

The explanation of the calling of Grandsire Doubles given last week should have given the young conductor sufficient insight to enabile him to call any of the different 120's that are given in the ringing books, with which every aspirant in ringing should have armed himself. In case, however, there may be any young conductor who has no such book in his possession, it may be pointed out that in addition to the calling explained in the last notes, namely, a bob at alternate leads, with a single substituted for one of the bobs at a corresponding place in each half, there is another simple form which produces 120. This is to call a single every time the observation bell is in $4-5$ up and a bob at each alternate "Before, which is when the observation bell makes 3rd's. Thus you can call a single the first time the observation bell is in $4-5$ up, a bob the next lead (when it is 'Before '), and a single the next lead, when it is again in 4-5 up. You then nmit a call the next lead, when the observation bell is again "Before." Or you can begin with a bols at the first' 'Before,' and omit it the next time the observation bell makes third's.

A QUAINT CAMPANOLOGICAL PERFORMANCE IN 1809 In . The Metcor,' 吵e 1kugby School Magazine, of July 14th, 1887, is ith accolnt, written by Mr. M. H. Bloxam, then 82 years of age, of the welebrations ath Rughy on the occasion of the Jubilee of King George III. an October 25th, 1809. This accotut also contains somu rominiscences of the Rev. Clarles Hunc, who was a boy at the schod at the period, and was, int the time of writing, Rector of Monstoke, Hants, and g9 jears of age. Mr. Hunle gives the following iceomid of a putformance on fugly Enrish Clutech belle:-

It was cried roand the lown that in the course of the day tunas would ho rusg on the church bells and royal ealutes given in homaur of his Mujest?, Gearge the Thiod, the whale to be performat by whe persan. This exciled so mheh curiasity in me, that I determined would see how it could passibly be dane, and to setisfy myself i went up into the townt of Rugby Church, bofore the performance cons-
menced. The professor was ia strong-huilt mati, and his evident selinssurnure gave me conlidenct and expectation as I watched lis pruwemhings. I observed that linving taken at central point of the vary solid toor of the belfry, he described with chalk a circle arothtul it IL: then, sith the lich of his assistant, at strong-looking wan, drew each bellorone just short of achatly sounding tho bell, and in sucesssion secured each rope on the chalk circular line by strong staplea elevery driven home into the floor. This done, the soloist st flown in the center of the cireutar arrangement of ropes and wilh a sur prising command of his " norporation sole," head, slioulders, ploows, wrisks, hands, back, knees, feet, with g versatility and precision could not have bolieved wless 1 had seen it lone, the professor pinyed on those Etrong hempen cords the popular tunes of the day, finishiug with "God save the King," and lor a royal ealute swecping those strong lyempon corcls with a contimunes rolling of himself round his sentral pivol olt the floor, which 1 may descrihe as a centrifugal nomvolvulons hoh major of himself, well deserwing the applause alicited bs it performanee so surpassing axpectation and challenging prov.

## DEATH OF MR. F. J. COPE

RINGER A'I LICHFIELD CATMEDRAL FOR OVER FJFTY YEARS. It is with roghat we recort the death of Mr. Frederick James Cope, of Lichfied, which took glace on August 17 th , at. the age of 71 years. Deceased'g occupation was that of a priater, and hu fad worked at Mesals. Meacham's for the long previod of 56 years wher in March last he had to give up owirg to illuess, which proved, latier, to be enncer. For the last eight weoks le had taken 10 his bed, and his sulferinge were acate.
'The finmeral took place on August 22nd. The first part af the selVing was tuken at St. Mary's Church by the Rew. H. Crexswell, Vicar, assisted by hychdeacon Bright and the Rev. Canon Penay, and the interment in St. Michacl's churchyard. At the conclasion of the obsequies a course of Grandsire Triples was rung on handbells over the grtave by A. Walker. 1-2, H. Knighe 3-4, J. E. Groves 5-6, and 4. Paddon Emilh 7-8. The bearers were six of deceased's ald ringing frimids fom the local towers, wix.: Messrs. A. Bowler, \&. Powles, C. Baryiti, W. Roters, S. Giegory and H. fiallimare. Other rimgers

who altmded were alessrs. J. Key (aged 84) (St. Mary's), J. W. Tinms (Tamworth), and T. Swinfeld (Burton). Many forsl tributes were sent, amonget which was one from members of the Staford Arehdeaconry in the shape of a bell with whed attached.
A wiflow, five sons (two of whom are ringers), ald a daughter aro left to mour'u their loss.
Athough no record lins beon kept, it is known that deceased rang in upwads of 100 peals, many of which lie conducted, inclucing tho four staudard methods and Double Norwich. These were rung under thir auspices of the Midland Counties Association, St. Martir's Guild, and Hin Society for the Arehdeaconry of Staffard. Mr. Cope was one of the original members of the lutter, when it was formed in 1883, and attended eacls annual meeting except the one in June last, when he was too 111 to do so. He had heen a ringer at St. Mary's for 57 years, rua at the Cathedral fov 53, the xingers at these towers being mome or less ant band undertaking duty at both places, ant Mr. Copa wis the conductor. Fis interest in ringing was maintrined to tho nst, aud in fow minutes before his donise ne asked that his glasses miglat be put on so that he could read 'The Ringing World.
Taneles of Gruradsire Triples, halif-mutted, were rung at St. Mary's Church and at the Catuedral, nud Bob Mininoes on the fout ohd bells at St. Chad's, the fenor of which is reputed to luave been cast in , D. 1255.

## BELL RINGING BROADCASTS

## To the Editor.

Sir,-Athough one can never get much sound intornation, par henls from time to time that tho change-ringing 'troadeash' From Various towers is far from satisfactory. While the bells themselvas they be gaturactury in every respecti, the quality of the ringing sometimes is the subject of adverse criticism, not only from riugers, who understand the difficalty of producing a periect touch to urder, but from members of the general public who do not, but naturally expect t" hear re perfect a piece of music as they would if listening in to at piany solo, for instance. Even from cathedrals and famous Lowers, whe hears of pabs performances on the wireless. This is ingportant and serious, hecause it is liable cithar to lower the public opinion of the art of ringing or dearease tho number of opportunities to boadcast, pr both. It seems to be assumed that because a cathe(dral or other tower has a good peal of bells that the ringers there are sure to pitt up a goorl performance, whereas it is well known to ringers that this is often far from being the case.
Fyequently the perfect ringing that will occur in long stretelzes during a peal camot be uttained in a short louch, sometimes not even in t plan course, especially on what I will call a "mervass' Docasiun before the liateaing-in public. A tompany broadeast a Lotoh of Gunadire Caters stme months ago, which was saverely eriticised, on st fuod peal of bells. It is the only method ihey practise, and there tis plenty of evidence that they seldom, if evor, accomplisha a well-struck truch. To use a common term, liey have been in the sanse rut for years.
I unt aware that the suggestion I slajl now put forward is liable to cause controversy by its very nature, but as this question is entirely in the hands of ringers, to securb good ringing for bromeasting it should the tackled in a spirit of broudmindedness.
The suggestion is that a committee, preferably of the Central (omucil, he formed, to draw up a list, of towers suitable for broadeusting, where competent bands are knowa to be in goon practive, rud likely to put un gond permmances
This conimitece flould he empowered to get in touch with the broadcastiag anthorities, aul be in a position to explain why cortara good peals are not arailable becuse at preseat the ringing is not up to the standard; secondly, to present their list of towers where good ringing is likely to be obtained. Lastly, that in big centres, astany rate, apecial band might be ohtained for epecial ocensions where the lonal cormpany is jneficient and could be induced to stant nown.
This suggeztion is drastic, but surely necessary. If ringers are 10 pet control of the broadeastrig of their own art, some selieme should be starled before the situation is out of control. But anyone with one grain of conmon sense will agree that a bell is not like leetroot! df the latter is scraped ar chipped the least, the juices ran out, and the heetroot losea jts beautiful carmine. Peopla wha are born under the planet of Mercury are quick to undersfand this: they dou', wat a hammer and chisel to drive it in, and they love 'hatmony' in all thinge.
Miflet nust have been bour under Mereury, on fre would not hawe givell us that picture of tmo Norman peasants, stameling with bowed hards in the mellowing shades of twilight, blending in perfect harmony with the Angelus:

Atu! Mr. Editor, 'The Angelus ${ }^{\text {a }}$ bell was tuned with Inammer and chisel, is the old style, and those who do know a Iitile about ting subject will agree that the Angelus and the Ave Maria bells have weathenci the storms of centuries; lat I ash, Was the unge fhe same? With emphosis I say "NO!' Theze mediaval specimens left to uslu suy notinng of otber rubbish (from is misical standpoint) whict: Ferend trestment fram the time they were firsi easf, and for centaries alternards. Has it ever dawned on the people who profess to know sa math ahout bells-old and new-that the riuging of it 5,000 to day will huse a more far-roaching affect on that anciemt bell, which alone chimed three strokes at the Elevalion af the Host year in, year out, ths the ordered preface nimmanded? Just consider this same mass of metal now throbbing, throbbing. throbbing for three solid hoursmat ane fraction of jty whale conctitulion in a state of inertia. What's going ots interally in that belly Who's ruining these 'heautiful ohil halls'?

Jells of to-dry are bashed and bumped, peal saatching! Bells of old, that lave weathered the centuries, wore treated quite differently. They told tho canonical hour: the are not content with Aves, Matins, Tierte, frime. No; we most have the whale twenty-four hours boomed aut, and, gluttons as we are, mut content with that, we demand the quarlers. Wwery oue of these blows brings abaut glowly, but surely, fitransformation in that metal! The elasticity is undermined and uvarmined, till at last the modulus is reached, the metal takes ar pernmaent set. What flien? A fracture

Our Summy, hus given Simpsen tuning one of the best unsolicited lestimonirls it ever harl. Like all other crities, he alleges this, that, and tho other. le gods? He blames it, but lsell never shane it by saying, "The quanfity of reverberations emitted by each bell is greater in Simpson bells than in Lup-note bells." What a statement to make, especially whet we kanw he's got some oil it his lamp.
I have before mado allusion to beetroot, anil we all know the juices run out; but the resonancy, whels is the juse in a bell, does not sizzle oul in great pools to the bottom of tho bell-pit; it doesn't ovaporate dry up similar to the clothes on the clothes lime on wushtuys.
Is it not logic, and will not even the lay mind agree, that if the roverberation in a Simpson bell is greater than it is in the fap-note bell, it is only roasousble not to suppose but to be sure that the elasticity in the former is grater than it is in the latter? Comman sunse lells one that elastic finit will be reaphen first by the tap-note hell, which does noli comtain the elastioity of the Simpan bell.
Take a spliced riag of bells, Simpson tuned, or tap-note tuned, I don't eare which. Whll the elasticity in the ald hells be on a par with that whioh lias been remently fused and put in the new belle? No, it will nat! The ald bells have been subjerted to vibratory nction; the percussion blow of the clapper lass set up fi greator or lesser degree a granulitr structure; the moro promouncer this is the sooner will the elaticity be expended. Nom, thon, where are we? The new bells are free from this crystalline weakness, which really and truly is decompesition. The old bells are in an adpanced stage, the new ones quite fresh. If these bells are all treated alike, clanged and clanged in peaj ringing, the atew bells will devclop the same trouble. Yes, and their more eld erly sisters will gualually advance from stage to stage till at last there is no throb left in 'em, and they are as dead as 'Queen Liz.' The ethers, however, will still be breathing, nossibly for centuries after we lave done knocking tho elasticity out of belly, Which Sammy admits are choolfull of when they are' S.T.
Onc has not had occasion to seek counsel's advice an this question, ata, in conclusion, I may be pardoned far pointing aut one or two uther facls (uat wild imagimation). My friend speaks of speed-merchants, when he suggeste tapping a 5,000 in ten minutes less time then it took to tap one ar decade previously. To quote four peals, well over the decade, two of which I anl casvinced he has heard and rung on, $t_{3}$ wil, Dore cast 1909, Norton 1896, Ilkeston 1910, Eastweod (Nobts) 1905. Have the former-Dore and Norton-lost auy resonancy? That's a naughty one, Sum! I'll auswer for the lot of them. ## BELL DEDICATION IN PEAKLAND

 EYAM'S NEW TREBLES.Saturday, August 28th, was indeed a red-letter day for the Peak land village of Eyam, which is situated jume of the most beautifu? districts in wingland. The place has become historic because of the visitation of the Great Plague of Londan in 1685-1666, and for the heroie unselfishness shown by the pcople of that time in deciding to remain in the village and face death rather than fiee away and spreat the infection. Tho story tells us how at of 360 people thera were only 60 left when the plague died out.
There were at that time four bells cast by Oldiedd, of Nottingham, dated $1618,1618,1619$ and 1028 . These four bells have been rehung with new fittings, retuned, eighth zurnen, and, together with two new trebles, liung in a acw fron frame on steel girders.
The new trebles are memorial bells, ane given by Rev. W. P. Wright, in memory of his parents, Canon Charles Sisun Wright and Charlotte Elizabeth, his wite; the other, the giet of the rillage and friends in memory of their daughter, Emily Georgina Wright. The work las been admirably done by the Loughboraugh foundry, and gives the greatest satisfaction
The new bells were dedicated on Saturday, August 281 h , by the Bishop of Derby
Immediately after the service a very excellent opening 720 was rung by the following band: C. Harrison (St. Marie's, Sheffield) 1, sthur Craven (Sheffeld Cathedral) 2, P. Watkiuson (Handsworth) J. F. Brathwell (Rotherham) 4, W. Biggin (Norton) 5, Rev. W. P. Wright (Eyam) (conductor) 6.

The bells were kept ringing in varinus methods until nine in the avening by visiting ringers from Shefied Cathedral, Rotherham, Norton, Handsworh, Dore and Baslow, Ringers and village people alike were loud in their praises of the tone and go of the bells.
The visiting lingers were entertained to toa by the Rev. W. P Wright. We were again met outside by several of the local ringers and escorted to the restaurant, where amplo justice was done to good 'ears ' and long and short 'drinks,' 4 r. Brown acting as host on behali of the Rector. Votes of thanks were then passed to the Rev. Canon Davis for his extreme kindnees and hospitalitor, end to the locel men for haring overything in readiness. A short tour of the sea front and part of the Great Orme, with a view of ' Happy Valley,' was very eujoyable. The party were then escorted to the railway station, and as we took our departure the opinion, was expressed "that it's a great pity there ain't a few more like him.'
