## ASSOCIATION REPORTS

One of the biggest tasks that fallis to the fot of the association secretary is the prepatation of the annual report. These publications involve a large amouna of labour, often unctalised by the ordinary members. Some reports are more elaborate thath others, and are not only interesting but useful produrtions, giving a great deal of information, and making a permanent and compact revord of the soclety's doings during the year. Even the less pretentious of the reports seem to be looked upon by the members as of indispensable importance, and for this ruason the associations go to considerable expense to produre them. But with all the care expended upon these reparts, errors constantly occur, and there is nothing which gives the secretary se much trouble, if he does his work conscientiously, as the revision of names and midresses.

At the last annual meeting of the Winchester Guild the question of dealing with the resident members was disrussed, for district secretaics had found the dilatoriness of focal bands, in supplying information, a considerable hatedicap in compiling the reports. How much more difficult is it, therefore, for those responsible to revise the list ol non-resident members, of which every association has it growing list. Many reports include the names and atdresses of these ringers, and it is almost impossible to keep them up to date unless the members themselves kecp the secretaries advised. Eiven then cases of death go unnoted, and names that onght to be deleted remain, sometimes for years, on the 'live ' list.

In another columo we publish a useful suggestion by the secretary of the Lancashire Association, which migho be developed with advantage to all our ringing associalions. He suggests a kind of "clearing house " for the rusion of the informations, and it is probable that somelling of this kind might be established. In the meanlime, one way of effectively revising the lists could be: frund in an arrangement whereby each association secretary should send copies of his last report to all the othe: sevetaries so that the latter could give any information at their disposal. It sounds, perhaps, a littie formidable, to ask secretaries to do this, but the amount of work in which each would be involved would actually be small, ats he would only be responsible for the corrections in Which the names of his own troritorial members were conacrised, and as the action would be reciprocal, whatever atra labour was involved would be repaid. The whole: value of these reports lies in their accuracy, and atry scheme which will make fir this should be welcomed, not only by members, fut even by those bard worked secretaries whose desire is to discharge their task efficiently.

 AN AHRITIUN ATTAINED．Nothing so dificult but diligence will overcome．＇Sa ruus the superseription to a peal board in the belfry at the beautiful churola at Staunton Harold，Leicestershire．With this spirit，Mr．Ernest Morris，of Leicester（whose ambition is to ring peals at as many towers as possible in his native shire，and，incidentally，revise North＇s book， The Church Bells of Leicestershire＇？set sbout getting a peal on tho bolls at the private church of the Tight Hon，Earl Ferrars，D．L．， J．P．A band visited leve on August 26 th，but gwing to a serions acci－ dent which involved；the Countess Ferrers，her son and his wifo（Lord and Lady Thamarth）the previous avening，the peal could not be attempted．Eas！Periers，howevor，graciously showed the visitors over this historic church，which was built by his anpestors，and is bennti－ frily situated in front of the hall，amin the trees by the wator－sime， It is said to be the onif Anglican church eracted durieg the Common－ wealth，and over the entrance is the following epitaph to the foumer：

> when all things sacred were throughour the uation either demolishit or protaneyl, Sir Robert Shirley Baronet, founded this claurch, whose singular praiso it is,
> to have doha tho best of things in the wurst of times, aud hoped bhem in the most calamitous.
> The Jighteous shall be bad in everlasting renemhunce.

His Lordship ascended the tower and copied off the hell inscriptiong， as dictated by My．Ernest Morris，and later listened to tunes and ahangeringing on the liandbells．A further risit was arranged when the distinguisherl invalids were betker，und last Saturday tho band （with slight varintion）again met，full of zeal aud ambition，in spite of those critics who declared an ambulance would be required to earry off those who collapsed，and a lond of etimulants to revive fle remainder．
Tho two seaior＇Eunasts＇attended to the banings，one with a botile of eastor oil and the other with a pound of lard！and after solving the mysteriea of the clock（to take off the striker）descemied to bie belfy where Alfred（the Great）had trimmed his lamp，and set the candles alight in the quaint，ancient，wooden caudelabruan，
A start was made，and all wont well for over two hours，winen one of the candes spluttered and eventually snuffed out．Then one after snother they all disappeared，until eventually a solftary one was left． This lasted till noont fivo mimutes from the end，wher it，too，collapserl， leaving only the faithful lanp to cast a feeble glow in the Stygian darkness，aind he ringers apponved like go many ghosts moving their arms up and down．Ill stuck to theif work and finished a rery good peal in just over the threa bourz，thus accomplishing an ambilian so difigently sought．
Then arose the question，Is it to tee tea and miss the bus to Ashlay， meaning in four－mile walk，or no teat and catch the bus？Needless to any the tea won，and the loand are very greteful to Earl Ferrers for his kindness in grunting permission for the peal，and his generosity in providing tea aftermaris in the hall．It is worthy of mote that he tenor man in the present peal is the son of the tenor man for the latst peal over 37 years ago．It is also the $82 n d$ Leicestershire tower the conduator has rung a peal at．

Tha Dalitor lins asked me to write a few notes on my book, which contains 278,828 feals of Landon Surptise Major. This, to mee, semms su muth like bowing one's own trumpet that for a thme I bave been whther relatethan to andertake it. Still, all explanation of the methodz otwployed in loulding up these campositions may ite useful iop tho4e caming fites', nated may prolishly stimulate some to work on similar lines in olizer duections, and at lengelt I aus therefore cornplying with the request.

In the first place, I might explain that each peal contains the 6th - xtont in Gith's, the 2ud and 3rd nevey in 6ih's, and no pes! over 5,088 changes in length.

My lirst plan, whien I afterwateds swrapped, is not without inlerest. It consisted of writige out, ou separate :lips of still cartridge paper, the prious ways of ralling the bith whe extent, and in the order in which they wothd have to appear in the subserpent eompositions.
. Hach set makists af two round blooks, the junations being a boh, M, when 2nd ind and are respeotively 3 yol's and 5ith's place bells, the blook which ines not contain rounds heing sandwivius between two pontious of that block which does. The followirg is all example:-

## NOTES BY THE WAY． <br> THE MODERN DEVELOPNEN＇OF CHANGI： RINGING． <br> By 1．ARMIGER TROLLOPE．

The zemarkable development of the art and science of change ringing during the last lonty years is alue，in the first instance，to the general quickening of Church life that began in the middle years of the nineteentin century， but the immediate causes cane from within loe Exercise and not from without．As a result，the continuity of the traditions of ringers and ringing was perfectly preserved． We 1o－day are，as ringers，what we are，and think aud do what we dn，because of those who went before us．

Things might just pussibly have been otherwise．As a contrast we may take the old village church orchestras of a hundred years ago．What they were like you may read in Thomas Hardy＇s＂Under the Greenwood Tree， doubtless the contemporary ringers were very much the same；in fact，were composed of protty much the same men．In course of time they were considered tusuitable for the services of the Church，and the hand of the re－ former swept them away entircly，not without great loss both to village life and the Church itself．And no doutht at similar fate might have befallen the vilfage band ringers，only the belfry is a mather inaccessible place，and a substitute for the ringers was not easily to be lount

In matly cases reforming parsons did quarrel with their ringers and dismiss them．In many more general neyfect of bells and ringers had a slower but more certain result， and in country districts refom of clurch services was at first accompanied by a marked decline in bell rimgring． In the big towns the ringers were，for the most part，too firmiy entrenched in their old ways，and the clergy load too much to do elsewhere for any ideas of reforms a the thought of．The church auhorities simply fynored them， and left them alone，neither leelping nor bindering．

It says much for the vitality of the Exercise lhail able to survive this period of neglect，and，while in now way breaking with the past，gradually to adapt itset to changed conditions．No one can saty that even now things are always and everywhere what they shoukd bu but，generally speaking；the＂belfy reform＂that leading meir among ringers were working for lorty yeats aso has been attained．

Among the many catuses within the Exercise which have led to this iniprovement，the most important are （1）The establishment of the tertitorial associations， fliocesath and county；（2）the writings of Jasper Whit field Snowdon；（3）the Central Conncil；and（4）＂The Bell News．＇These all atcted and interacted one with another，and it is impossible to say which has been the most potent，but certainly not the least of them was＇The Boll News，＂Perhaps I＇should have written＂the ring－ ing press，＂，and so have incluried＇Cluurch Bells．＇＇Cam panology，＂＂The Bellringer＂and＂The Ringing World． But＇The Ringring Workl＇was not founded until some years after the time I am writing about，and the influence of the others compared with＂The Bell News＂was negligible．
$l 11$ early days，when ringers wanted to record their peals and other doinys，they had to depend on local papers or sporting periodicals，such as＇Bell＇s Life．The first paper that regularly devoted a part of its columns to ringing was＂Church Bells．＂This was founded by Canon Erskine Clarke，and was primarily a chutch paper writtem for and read hy others than ringers．The befer
ences to ringing were mecessal rily lrief, ath the records of penis very incomplete. But it did it good work for the Exercise, Space was found for many articles on the archatelogy of bells, matters relatins to composition, and to the history of ringing ; and by its means a good many charch peoplt: first leamed that ringing was something different from hard pallins of ropes by old men fortified by big mugs of beer.

In the: severaties Jasper snowdon began to wrife on change ringing; and many of his arlicles were printed by Charch Bulls. Natumbly at mathose main work was done by his pen was acutely conscious of the need of a paper which shonuld be whiten by ringers for ringers, and entirely devoted to matters connected with ringing. It was largely due to bis influence that 'The Bell News was-started. The man who actually founded the paper was Harvey Reeves, who owned, edited and printed it from 1881 until his seath.

Harvey Rewos was at one time roployed by the great publishing louse of Casscll as a ' reader"' and afterwards owned at printing business at Walthanstow. He was thas no amateur when he anelertouk to loring out a ringring paper, it is quite cortain that he linew his business iboroughty. In his early davs he was, according to the standards of the time, a skilled riager, and had rung and conducted peals of (inandsite and Stedmat Triples. He also thad amhitions as a composer, and knew at good deal for those days of the composition of peals of Grandsire Triples. One of his compositions has passed into the regular repertoire of Grandsire conductors. This is his quarter peal, uncoubtedy the most popular and the best quarter that can be had in the method.
His connection with practical ringing was soon dropped, and it is remathable how very lithle he was known anong ringers. Even among his contemporaries the number who had seen and spoken to him personally was very small. He never went to meetings; he never appeared in any belfry, He canried out the tradition that she editor of a mexspaper must be anonymous to an almost excessive degree.

The early number's of "The Bell News' contain leading articles which were very well written. As time went of these bewme more and more sketchy, and practically disappeared, and either through policy or indolence, the editor made no attempt to influence the opinions of the Exercise. The value of the paper consisted in the fact that it gave ringers the chance of knowing something about eacl, other, and so promoting that fecling of unity which is one of the best possessions of the Exercise. It lostered a spisit of rivalry bewween bands, and a jealthy rivalry which need not degenerate into jcalousy is onc of the best incentives to progress. The homely and widespread itsing of men for seeing their manes in print has helped peal ringing in no smatl degree, and those nen who were interested in the scientific side of ringing now found an opportunity of publishing their compositions or making their views known on many of the alostruse problems of theoretical ringing.
The Exercise has been fortutate in that it has had a lomes succession of able men who were able ta contribute articles on different matters, and as we ture over the pases of "The Bell News " of thirty years ago there is yery muct: beyond the mere record of the peals of the day to interest us. Nany of those articles were far too learmed for the average finger, and the ordinary reader, no doulst, would have prefured a fuller and more prompt
account of the touches he bad rumg and the meetings be had atunded. But, of the value of these anticles to the Extreise ats athole there cannot be any doubt. It is certain Hat when the interest of the besi ringers in the higher problems of composition ceases ringiog, as a whole, will derline.

In its last years "The Bells News" did not live up to its early standards. After Harbey Reeves" death the paper was carried on for a short time by his sons, and then passed into other hands. The war came, and, after struggling for twelve months, "The Bell News," like other publications, found the thmes too haid for it and expired. Fortmately, the Exercise has not been left without at weekly paper. That would have been a calamity.

## FOR THE BEGINNERS.

CONDECTING.-IBY GEORGE WILLIAMS.
Coming to the calling of Triples, it is presumed that the young conductor would be practising and be conver. sant with the Grandsire method. I do not propose to deal with Bob Triples, as it is wery little rung, although I am in favour of the Plain Bob method being practised through all its stages by a young band. But, in dealing with Triples, we will turn first to Girandsire.

The young conductor must make hinself master of the names and positions of the calls. He must know not only where the positions are, but when the observation bell will come to them. Calls in Grancsire Triples are made ' Before,' • In ' and ' Out,' • Middle, ' Mrong Home. '
Before ' is when the treble turns the observation bel! from lead, the effect of which, it will be remembered, causes that bell to malse zrd's place. This is the only place in Grandsire in which a bell is not affected in its position at a lead end, whether a bob is called or not.

- In "is called when passing the treble in a-3 up, which causes the bell to make zrd's and go into the hunt.

Out is called when striking in $5^{1 / 3}$ s place cominer down in the hant behind the treble, which puts the bell in 4 th's place at the lead end. The calling of the "Out' is guded by the mumber of leads the observation bell is 10 be in the hunt in any particalar composition.

Middle' is called when passing treble in $3^{-4}$ up and the observation hell has to dodge with the bell out of the bunt, and it is in ' 5 th's 'place at the lead end.

Wrong ' is after passing treble in $\mathrm{j}^{-6}$ up, and this is the lead following 3 rd's place. Therefore, instead of going to 4-5 down, the bell stops to dodge in $6-7$ down, and becomes the bell in ' $6 \mathrm{th}^{7}$ s "place at the lead end.

Home' comes after passing treble in $4-5$ tip, anci, instead of dodging 6-- down, the beil dodges in $6-7$ up, and becomes the $7^{\text {th }}$ place lell at the lead erd.

This was my first idea to master the very interesting art of conducting, but I hope to give a few other simpler hints in my next notes. It is, howerer, very ditheut 10 get of the beaten track which hats been lollowed by the authors of our ringing bools.
