## STRIKING.

We have often urged that advantage should be taken of district meetings to discuss subjects of general importance and interest to the Exercise, outside the purely domestic alfairs of the association immediately concerned. It was certainly a step in the right direction that led to the introduction of a topic for debate at the Braintree meeting of the Essex Association last Saturday, especially as nothing more important could be found in the whole gamut of ringing matters than that which comes under the head of 'Striking.' A debate on matters of this kind can only have a beneficial outcome, for the practical advice tendered by experienced ringers is bound to be welcomed and acted upon by younger aspirants in the art.

The imporlance of good striking cannot be too greatly stressed. Ringers must remember that what they do is heard, not merely by theniselves, but by the general public. There are churches where the beils when rung must be heard actually by thousands, and bad ringing jars just as much on the nerves of the outside listeners as upon those of the ringers inside the tower-perhaps more so, when it happens that the band are indifferent to the noise they make. We are afraid that some ringers do not fully realise how much the public notice the difference between grood and bad ringing; do not, in fact, appreciate that they have an audience at all. Some allowance has, of course, to be made for practice, but there is little, if any, excuse for bad ringing on Sundays. The best possible in quality should be the object of all bands for service ringing, and for this purpose good rounds are preferable to bad change ringing.
The problem is how to educate ringers into being good strikers. There are some who have no 'ears ' at all, and these, unless they are ringing on a perfectly 'even-struck' peat, are almost beyond redemption, for unless a man can pick out his own bell from among the rest it is hopeless to expect good striking from him. Such a ringer is a real handicap to a company. The matter of first importauce, then, is to give a ringer of this type a pair of 'ears,' or, in other words, to teach him to use those which he has got, for 'ropesight ' in itself is not sufficient to make at man a good striker, however adept he may be at grasping new methods. There are many extremely valuable hints which experienced ringers can pass on to those who are capable of being taught, and which would tend in a large number of cases to raise the standard of their ringing. Often, however, these hints are never given, and the young ringer, whose indifferent striking is due to equally indifferent training or lack of experience, grows into an habitually bad striker, to whom no amount of coaching afterwards seems to make a material difference-indeed,

'lins disfrict eovers the north-western comer of Surrey and takes in a few Hampshire towers, all af which willtome within the area of the new diogesa. The meeting was presided over by the Rev. E. H. W. Leachmau ( Fiest), and was atteuded by abont twenty members. It addition. theve were preseat Messrs. A. C. Hazeldea, R. Whittington and NY. Nelville, the deputatian anpointerl at the Guildiond District mentigg the prevous week, to lay before" hae Yorktown Distriet the kiews of Lhe Guiliford Districk in fnvour of a separate diocesan Guild.
Che subject was introduced by HI. J. B. Hessey, the district secretary, who shid the question had been diseussed at several meetings of the astrict daring the last three gears, At the annual meeting hed at Batslot, in 1923, when eight towers wese yepresented by ahout 25 members, it was resolved that a slivision of the Guild was not desirable, but thai it should be contintud, on the division of the cliocese, under the title of The Winchester, Guddford and Portsmoulh Dio cesan Guitd of Change Ringers.' They also resolved that the annuad meoting of the Guild should be hold in the three dioceses in rotation. These resolutions were carried nanninuonsly, anal he proposed that they be reafirmed. Mr, Ir, Nye (Angelat) seconded
Replying to Mr. Chalfey, the han. secretary said a posteard vote of all the fowers in the distriet was taken, and all wero in fayour of remaining as they were. Mr. Hossey added that he knew of towers have nothing to do with the new organisation, The Surrey Associstion was working very fard to cover that aros, and he was of opinion that west.

## GOOD-WILL URGED.

Mr. J. S. Goldsmith explainet to the meeting what had transpired at the Guildford District meeting, leading up to the resolntion in favaur

elhange ringing it lieart to thow their weight into the scales to make the vew Guild a success. Thing had moverl on since finc Yorktown resolutions were passed, and to have the ringers of the new Yorksown Dishrict not to come to a definite decision that night, but Yorktown Dishict not to come to a detimite demsion that might, but Gnildford District to discuss the question in all jts bearings. II goodwill were allowed to prevail, he was stre a satisfaclary outwome would be reached.

Hy. Whitimeton said, ase nover of the resolution at Guififord, his was equally desirable to split the fuild for the sume purpose, becanse it was big and unwieldy. Fe pointerl out that the money which the districhs now sent to Winchester conld be spent in their own areas, and the members would reap the benelit of their own subseriptions He bad consulted several incumbents on this question, and all had expressed the opinion that they would be alaing the right thing to have a Guildford Diocesan Guild. Moveover, there was a tread of novement, which would expand on the splitting of the diocese to make every organisation diocesam inı charater, which was not so slready The Yorktown District and the Guildiakl District, worked properly, would form a most efficient and compact diocesan Guild, and it wouk be a great pity jf they did not consine. He hoped a committee wauld be appointed la discuss the whole question
Ma. Nye disagreed with the opinion that a severance of the diocese necessitated a division of their Guild. A multiplication of societies added to expense, and pergonally lie thonght they ought to bave a quabined body of men from ade end of the country to the other. As they now stood, they hark in that arcu two or three societiea overtheir duties as ringers were concemed, ho wold see no reason at all for separation
Mr. Armstrong (District Ringing Master) said there were so many towers in the distriet who had resolved not to join a Cuildford Diocosan Guid that he thought that ayea would he overwhelmed by
sirouger associations if thoy split from the winchester Guif. Ihe winohester Guild was one of the leadiag assomitions in the country: lie did not ese how a Guildiord Diocrsan Grald could ever hope to be anything like as strong. With regand to expense, he did not think there would be any saving.

Mr. A. C. Hazelden said the foputation from Guildford was fully aware of the dificultiee which Mr. Armstrong had in mind, but some at tham who were interested in this matter hed had it pretty clearly from the anthorities that associalions which were not diocosan in character would not ha acfeptable in theis parish churches. Whether Liey liked it or not, the Winchester Diocese was going to be divided. Lostherlhend, and by that he meant the purishes in thit rural deanery, would bo in the diocese of Guiniford and no other. Whether this ringers there enred to join a Guildford Diocesan Guild was a matter
wheh the future must determine. But with good-will-in fnet, le
rand take it a little further and suy bvatherly love they could ge a lowg wify. In the Guileford District hhes hoped for the spirit of good-will and unity among all the towners in the diogese. ## A DISCUSSION ON STRIKING.

Alter the meoting, Mr. L. W. Wifen apemed u, discussion upon ' Stuking;' which was taken up by several present. Mr. Wiffen said: We often read in 'The Ringing World' long articles and discussions doaling with verious subjects, such as names of mekhods, method consbruction, Bimpson tuning, etc. Has it over occurred to you that we seldem see inything denjing with the subject of striking? I don't remember ever having read an article dealing with it. I have often wondered that some of onr eminent ringers have not giver us some of their ideas on this velj intportant question.

I have discussed it with a few, and one or two are of the opinion that it is al dificult materer to deal with on paper. It may be, per haps, hut thore is no reason why we shonid not realise and keep betore us the fact that striking is of the greatost importance in change ringing.

In the frot place, the beginner should learn to handle shis bell well, otherwise ha will alwrys be greatly handicapped in striking, and be shotald also be able to leat his own bell wherever it is striking. Bometimes it las been said that striking has been gacrificed for metlod, but if the ringer learns to strike well in the first place be will always be a good striker, whatever the method. It is also a fact, as many know, flat it is easier to ring and strike your hall when the striking is good

It was resolved to bring [orwird at the next meeting of the Central Committee the advisability of allowing district seeretaries' Hravellizg expenses to meetings.

The proceediogs closed with a vote of Lhanks, proposed by Mrs. Crocker, to the Ficar for the service, for the uso of the bels, and for presiding at the meeting.

During the aftermoon touches in the standard mednods were rang at the Parish Chureh.
than when the time is broken by earcless striking, because when paing are baken a good beat is gradually worked up, and it is possible to ring shmost automatically atd with little eftort.
The pause at hand-stioke is, of cohrse, known and observed by most, bub there are some who do nof tako sufflent care with this most proportant detail.
There is another small point which improves shriking; it is ilhis, tho last blow behind at the back-stroke should be a little bit on the slow side, not mash, hat just enough to got the proper finisk. It sounds much better than when the last blow is 'clippy." Then there is the quastion of helping the tenor man. In segard to this there are two groups, one which helps the temor man and the other which doesn't. Of courte, this applies more especially to heary peals than light ones. The help that can be given to the tenor nans especially if is peal is beng attenapted, is very much apprecinted by Jim. For instance, suppasing file tenar is dodging in $1-2$ 1tp, as in Deuble Norwich, the bell that is doaging wibh it cen be just a hittle bit quicker at hand stroke-not enough to omit the pange-Lhen the tenor can get his blow th botter at hack stroke.
This applies to any position when temor is dodging up. Il is rather atroyiag when the bell in front is slow and then fnislics un by giving the tench' it clip, when he shand be woll over it.
uitie things like these are a great help. This can be rutised betipr $\mathrm{b}_{\mathrm{y}}$ riggiug 'he tenos if you haven't itready dune so.

## BEGINNERS' COLUMN.

## CONDUCTING,-BY GEORGE WILLIAMS.

Taylor's six-part peal of Grandsire Triples, which I first called, I took from Troyte's book on change ringing. This book hatl been handed to me by my uncle, who had never made any use of it, and never got beyond ringing the tenur behinel. T'aylor's composition at that time appeated to me on account of its being so easy to learn 1 will give just two or thrce remarks upon how 1 made myself self-confident in calling it.

As already expluined, the observation bell (the 6ith) only callecl in two positions, Middle ' and 'Wrong, throughout. The 'Before' (the only other lead avai able for the sixth when there is a call' at every ' Alidule and 'Wrong') is always a plain lead. This, I learn later, makes up what is called the three-lead-course plan

The next thing was to find my guide for calling the first single in each division. This also presented itsel very simply, as it will be seen that the stly is called ' Be fore ' with a single (that is double 3 rel's) in the first two divisions, and ' In ' (znd's place) with a single in the last two divisions.

The other singles are somewhat mechanical, as they come at each division end with ' $6-\overline{7}$ at home ' $; 5$, 6 , cominy home each part encl, and a 'Bob,' instead of
