## THE COUNCIL AGENDA.

The Central Council meeting is drawing on, and tomorrow is the last day for receiving notices of motion for this year's agenda. Once again, as far as reports of meetings of the great ringing associations have revealed anything, there is a dearth of topics put forward for discussion at the 'Ringers' Parliament.' There is, perhaps, less time at the London meeting than at the provincial gatherings for debates on general ringing topics, as there is more formal business to transact, in the shape of elections of officers and committees, while this year the Council will also have before it the revision of the booklet, ' Rules and Decisions,' which is to be brought up to date. It may be that the actual contents of this little publication may cause some difference of opinion, and it may be that the 'Rules' portion, governing the Council itself, will provoke some debate. Under the circumstances, therefore, it is as well that the agenda is not likely to be overburdened with notices of motion.

That circumstance, however, does not alter the fact that it should be the aim of the associations, who elect the representalives, to provide the Council with subjects of general interest to the Exercise which they can discuss. At present it is left very largely to the ingenuity of the Standing Committee and particularly of the honorary secretary to frame an agenda, and, if it fails to produce sometbing of real interest, the man in the rank and file of the Exercise is inclined to turn round and ask the old question, ' What is the use of the Council; what has it done again this year?' Where that feeling is aroused, it should be pointed out that the remedy, as we have so often said, is in the hands of the ringers themseives. They know the difficulties which they experience, they know the little problems they come up against; and they often realise how, even in little things, the general interests of the Exercise could be advanced. In all these directions they could find material, which, in a body representative of the whole of the ringers of this country, could be discussed with advantage, and help to secure uniform action, and, in some things, universal progress.
The initiative should lie with the individual, and the channel is through the association and its representatives to the Council. Even in the case of what may be termed the 'domestic' matters of an individual association, there is often the germ which might produce a fruitful debate in the Central Council. As just one instance, there may be some purely local administrative scheme which has proved successful in an association. Why should not this be passed on to be more widely discussed by the Council on the basis of general application, so that, if feasible, it can be adopted by other ringing organisa-

## A COUNTRY CLTRGYMAN'S WAY

Dear Sir,-May I, as one who is not a great ringer (my few peals for Yorkshire were rung long ago), suggest a method of instructian whioll is within the power of most country bands to try? Four years ago there was a baad here at Monk's Kirby who could ring call changes, more or less well.
For reasons not necessary to go into we were faced with the reed of raising a mex band. Some of the best possible young men offored themselpes. We met in the tower and in my study alternately. Tis work in the study was talking over ringing (a pipo or cigarate helps), and, starting with four bells, practising change ringing on handbella, one to each ringer; We used Snowdon's 'Ropesight,' and, latar, 'Standard Methods,' which can be, I believe, sumicient if practised io this way. The result is a really keen band with plenty of ringers for Sunday zinging, morning and evening, really well-struck Bob Major, with some Enowledge of Grandsire and Kent Treble Bob.
We jave had no Jelp from outside, and ringers who have rang with me realise that what success there has been mist be due to the miethot of teaching, and that any tower conld do it.

Ringers of Saltoura-by-the-Sea, who sam me through my first 720; may be interested to know that the liandbells are the ones they gave me so many years ago, and which alwaya recall to me such lappy memories.-Yours faitufully,

## A PEAF, BOARD UNVEILED.

Saiurday, April 30tz, saw the fulfilment of a promise madio by Mr. E. Breeze, of Bebington, that when he Iang in a peal of Double Norwich on the bells of his own tower he woudd make a present of a peal board to the tower. The peal, which was one of 5,136 efanget, was rung on February 16th, 1924, composed by Mr. H. H. Tucker, lak of Bristol, and conducted by Mr. G. R. Nexton.
A company of Liverpool ringers assembled in the towor prior to ths unveiling ceremony, which was periormed by the Rector, Rey. H. E. Boultbee. The Rector extended a cordial welcomo to the ringers, and said how pleased he was at all times to seo and hear visiting ringers. He paid a high tribute to the work and worth of Mr. Breeze as in ringer and also as a chorister, services whicl had been faithfuly rendered over a period of upwerds of 35 years. He thanked $\overline{\text { Ir }}$. Breazo for his gift of the peal board, and lhoped it would act as an incentive to the younger ringers not only to equal but surpass his achievement.
The band were particularly glad to see Mr. Tucker, the composer of the peal, present, and he, along with the conductor, suitably voiced the thanks of the band to the Rector for lis kiud welcome and also for unveiling the peal boavel.
Mr. T. B. Worsley's 5,088 Kent Treble Bob Major was aftenwards rung to commemorate the event. This turned out to the Mr. Caunce's 200 E peal for the Lancashire Associstion, and he is the first Liverpool man to attain that distinction.
The band were hospitably entertained by Mr. Breeze at the conctrsfon of the peal, his health beiog drunk, along with that of Mr. Tucker, Who unfortuuately could not stay or take part in the peal on account of ill-health.

Decenged was a bschelor, and leares an unmarried sister to mourl her loss. They had lived together all their llves.
It will be bard for someone else to 畐fep into the breach in Beldock belfry, and carry on in the kind and gentlo way that Mr. Cawdel always did. In the words of the Rector, he was 'faitaful unto denth."

## THE PEAL AT WALSGRAVE ON SOWE.

## A QUADNT RTNGING CHAMBER.

To the Editor.
Dear Sir,-I think the band who recently rang the peal at Barkby really ough't to include a trip to 'the Sowe' in their itinerary, as it is the most unique tower I over visited. When you arrive at the door of the-er-place where you stand to pull the rapes-ringing chamber would be a misnomer-you descend into a pii 10 ft . by 5 ft . by eft. deep, open to the elements, is there are no window frimes or glass in the holes in the tower walls, and I don't believe aver have buen. The nsmes of the two heroes who ring $a$ peal on the treble and tenor aro the only two which should be published, sa the other three sro only aecessories to tho fact. The 2ad and Jxd 'go' really well; the 4th only tries to slip wheel once in each six-score. The fourth rimger heing a. good fisherman was used to the "got another bita" seasation. The poor tenor man has to throw his rope out all tha time, ag the hole in the roof is so close to the wall, and he only has about four equare fent in which to perform all his gyrations. If he exceeds this, he hangs the 4th ringer. But the poor treble ringer! His rope comes down oxactly in the corner of the pit only three inches from the angle, and he is obliged to ring with his back to the rest of the band, Fith his face to tho corner like a bad boy. Only the tenor goes really badly. The tendency to slip wheel could be rectified.' 'Tis the ring' ing room and other appurtemanees which are so bad. The towor is in nice oae, and why such conditions prevail ono cannot understand. Surely, the small sum required to rehang this fine little peal and sugmont them to a nice light ring of eight bells, and at the semo time remodel that ringing pit, could be raised. Two of these bells aro amongst the older bells in the county. Around the 4 th is inscribed: 'All Ye that do hear, our elsppers want beer, 1702.' The undersigned is of the opinion that at the present day its poor cracked cry is: 'All yo that do hear, please get us recase!

## BELFRY GOssiP

Under an Order in Council, published last week, the מow Seen of Guildford and Portsmonth, carved out of the dinnee of Winchester, came inta being on Sunday last. There will aventrally be on new Grild
 other dioceses will be continued, it is expected, under one manegement, with a dual titie.
Congratulations will be extended to Mr. George Williams to-momow when he reacher his 70th birthday. Few men are as well known in the Exercise as Mr. George Willinms, and probably none bes done more to advance the art, than he hes. He holds the office of Master of the Wincnester wund, and it is hoped to cerebrate his bitthday by a peal on the Cathedral bells.
'The best-laid schemes o' mice and mon gang aft a-gley,' wrote Bobby Burns, and the truth thereol was again apparent down in Kent on St. George's Day. The eight Georges rang over two hours and lost their peal of London Surprise, and the companion penl of Cambridge, which friends of the Georges attempted in an adjoining parisj, ended prematurely by the tenors coming up the wrong way. Sh-h-h, tell it not in Gath!
On May 7th, 1780, John Reeves and a party of London Youths rang the first peal on Harrow bells, a peal described in the records as 5,040 Bob Majors.
The first peal of Grandsire Maximus, described in the Cumberland Youths' record as 'Grandsire Bob Maximus,' was rung at Sauthwark on May 7th, 1792. John Reeves called this peal also, and Willian Shipway was one of the band.

Another peal of which Mr. John Reeves was the conductor was a peal of Oxford Treble Bob Major, with which Edmonton bells were opened by the Cumberlands on May $8 \mathrm{th}, 1788$.

One of those long peals of Treble Bob Royal, which formed a source of rivalry between the College Youths and the Cumberlands in the latter part of the eighteenth century, was rung by the Cumberland Youths at Shorediteh on May 10tur 1777. It was 10,200, but was beaten nine days later by an 11,080 rumg on the same bells by the Gollege Fouths. That was just a hundred and fifty years ago!
A record which still stands is the 74,112 London Surprise Mijor, rung at Eing's Norton on May 11th, 1903 , is $\mathrm{C}_{\mathrm{a}} \mathrm{hrs} .40$ mins.
The restored peal of bells at St. Sepulohre's, Nortbamption, were delicated on Morday week by the Bishop of Peterborough. Seven of the bells have been recast, and the whole rohung in a fer frame and dittings by Messrs. Gilledt and Johnston.
' The Mtalander' for April publishes an interesting biographical sketch and portrait of Mr. Frank B. Yates, of King's Norton, who was responsible for raising funds for recasting the bolls at that church, and recently very generously gave the two trebles to make a pasl of ter.
Mr. Yates has been a prominent Midand cyclist, and put up triny fine performances on road and track. A lover of horses, he has beea a successful exhibitor, and in addition to being actively jnterested in ringing, he has done magnificent work in connection with the Church and philanthropic institutions. He was recently entertained on the occasion of his 50th birthday.
The meeting of the Axbridge Deancry Branch of the Bath and Wells Diocesan Assaciation, which was to have been held at Cheddar to morrow, has been cancelled, owing to the lamented death of the district secrotary, Mr. G. Chamberlain.

## COURT BOB ROYAT..

MANOTOFT PEAL NOT THE FIRST,
In our issues of August 10th and December 28th, 1923, we gave some details, culled by Mr. T. E. Slater, of Glemsford, and Mr. G. P. Burton, of Norwich, from old newspapers, by which it eppeared to be established that the first peal of Court Bob Royal was rung at St. Peter Muncroft on April 17th, 1769.
Our reminder of this event under 'Belfry Gossip' a fortnitht ago, now brings the information that a peal of 6,720 Court Bob Ten-In was rung by Jannes Barham and bis company at Leeds, Kent, in 1765 . Mr. G. W. Moss, of Manningtroe, Essex, who has a copy of Barbam's records, writes:
"The following is from James Barham's peal book: "Sunday, January 20th, 1765 , was rung at home, 6,720 camplete changes of Court Boh Ten in 4 hours 42 minutes, being the most of this method yet rung, viz., William Attwood, Fdwavd Mason, Thomas Eacy, Richand 3-[anters, Stephen Bayley, William Davis, John Swaetlove, Edward Cook, James Barham, william Tilby.'
'If it was the same method,' adds Mr. Moss, 'evidently the Norwich men, when they rang their peal in 1769, had no knowledge of the peal rung in 1765 by the Leeds Youths.
There is, of course, more thas one variation of Cowrt Bob Royal, and it wotld be interesting to know which was rung at Leeds. Porter Wes the anthor of the Norwich penl, and it wes the methor to whinl wa now prefix the word Norwich.
Shipway, in his 'Gampanologia, gives: 'Court Bob; containing three distinct systems, each consisting of Single, Roverse and Double." One is called simply Court Bob, one is London Court Bob and the other Norwich Court Bob. Is there any further information avalabio as to the method practised by Barham and his men? In azy avent, the 6,720 does not seem to be the first peal, for Barbam Etates that this is 'the most of this methor yet 2 ung,' indicating that there had been previous peals.

## FIRST PEAL OF SUPERLATIVE SURPRISE MAXIMUS <br> IPSWICH MEN'S ACHIEVEMENT.

Ithe first peal of the above ever rung was accomplished on Saturday last at St. Mary-le-Tower Church, Ipswich. It is most fiting that this should have been performed at Ipswich, for hero it was that the tirst peal of Gambridge Surprise Maximus, on August 15th, 1908, and also the first peal of Double Norwich Court Bob Maximus (November 28 th, 1896), outside Norwicls, were rung.
It was on Sunday, September 12t1, 1926, that the first course of Superlative Maxious was rumg, and altogether sixteen courses have been brought round, the peal being achieved at the seventh attempt.
The society wish to thank Messra. Cross, Duffield, Kinsey, May, Mee, Shemming, Wood and Woolcock for their assistance in practices and peal attempts.
In "The Ringing World" of April Ist, writes Mr. G. E. Symonds, the conductor, is printed over the name of the Rev. Law James: 'It would only be a disgrace to-day for a band of ringers to ring the method published as Superlative Maximus ... in disregard of all musical qualities, ${ }^{\text {a }}$ This is not correct, for grand music is produced by the tenor going ap to the 8th, then the 9tb coming up to the tenor, and the beautiful cadences ending with the 10 th behind. Some of the best hymin and chant tunes end on this note, and the terrible monotony of the tenol always going up to the 10th, then the 11th up to the enor, is relleved.
The St. Mary-le-Tower Sodiety have now rung eight different Maximus peals in the present decade.

## PASSING OF AN OLD MIDLAND RINGER.

We regret to announce the death of Mr. Sidney Smith, which, as briefy announced in the last issue of 'The Ringing World,' took placa ath his resideuce at Handsworth, Birmingham, on Easter Tuesday, April 19th. Born in Devon in 1850, he migrated to the Midlands with his parents when he was a suall boy of five or six years, and lived the remainder of his days in the noighbourhood of Birmingham. As a youth, he was apprenticed to the late Paul Cashmore (composer of the well-Fמown 5,056 Kent Treble Bob Major), who had a gun and evolpel manufactory as West Bromwich, and was in due course introduced to "the Exercise."
Subsectuently he married his employer's daughter, by whom he had three sons, one of whom is the presenl honorary secretary of St, Martin's Guild (Mr. A. Paddon Smith). It is interesting to recall that tho deceased and the late Mr. John Carter for many years worked side by side at $\mathrm{l}^{\text {Paul }}$ Cashmore's, and were encouraged by their employer in the pursuit of knowledge of clange ringing,
Mr. Smith became a member of the band of ringers at West Bromwich Old Church, and was laid to rest in the family grave in the leautiful 'God's Acre' attached to that church on Friday, April 2and. Mr. Smith was never a keen peal yinger, and lad kept no record of tho dozen or so in which he took part, most of which were rung under the auspices of the Soeiety for the Arcindeaconry of Stafford.
He had for many years been a regular attendant at the Henry Johnson Commemoration Dinner, and was one of those who at the last dimer signed the menu cara which was sent out to the secretary (who was then in India) by the Editor of "The Ringing World." This souponir is much prized by the recipient, and it is a sorrowful thought that Death, the reaper, bas already removed one of the signatories rom human ken.
HIT, Smith was cnergetic and active to the last, and was very fond of a game at bowls and a hand at bridge. He loaked gaod for many Fears still, but Providence ordaiced otherwise. He suecumbed to hears failurs following influenza, and passed peacefully away in his sleep, leaving a widow and three sons to mourn their loss.
