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## WHERE THE CLERGY CAN HELP.

Speaking on Saturday at one of the serics of district meetings now being held to organise the new Guildford Diocesan Guild, the Rector of Leatherhead alluded to the need that existed in many places to stimulate interest in church bell ringing, if the art were not to become extinct. He pointed out how bands in his own neighbourhood were becoming depleted by the passing of old members and the absence of young ringers. This is a state of affairs which all those concerned with the welfare of the art have been seriously considering for some time, and for which they have been seeking a solution. It is well that it should have consideration also by the clergy who are outside the Exercise, because we believe the tasir of those who are endeavouring to keep the bell ropes fully manned will be facilitated if the importance as well as the difficulty of their work is realised by the Church authorities.

We have often dwelt upon the discouraging results which meet the efforts of many a patient ringer in his efforts to keep together a band and to make good with new material the ravages of time and the losses of men occasioned by other reasons. Men go on year after year teaching young ringers, not one-tenth of whom probably ever remain to be of real assistance in the tower where they are taught. They nove away to other places, or disappear from the belfry, because they fail to find sufficient interest in the early stages of their training to resist the many counter-attractions of this pleasure loving age. And so, time after time, the patient, painstaking instructor has to begin all over again.

The initial difficulty is, of course, to find the material to work upon. It is here that the clergy can be of such great assistance. They can influence the right type of young man to visit the belfry, and, at any rate, see for himself whether ringing is tikely to appeal to him. The clergy can even do a good deal by way of inducing them actually to take up ringing as a definite contribution to church work. The great drawback in many parishes is that the clergy do not interest themselves sufficientiy in the welfare of the ringers to lend a helping hand in this direction. They lose no opportunity of encouraging boys to come into the choir, or to join such organisations as the Lads' Brigade or the Scouts, and yet they display a marked apathy with regard to the efficient manning of the bells. A personal interest on the part of the clergy would do mucli to remedy the present troubles in recruiting for the belfry, and ringers should do their utmost to bring home to the church authorities that they, too, have responsibilities in this matter as well as the men who are (Continued on prge 642.)

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already giving their services in ringing the bells. The relations between the clergy and the ringers have improved immeasurably in the last five and twenty years, but there is still much to be done in bringing the authorities to realise the importance of their direct interest in the affairs of the belfry. In their scheme for the future management of the new Guildford Diocesan Guild, the committee have proposals which it is hoped may assist in this direction, and, while only time can prove their eflicacy, they are a step in the right direction in the organisation of a ringers' association.

## FATAL ACCIDENT TO WOLVERHAMPTON RINGER.

 KNOCKED DOWN BY MOTOR-CYCLE.We regret to record the death of Mr. Harry Andrew Farlow, of St. Peter's, Wolverhampton, at the age of 55 years.
The deceased, accompanied by two frieeds, was crossing the road in tine evening to join a birthday party-where he had but a few minates earlier been listening to sone wireless itcms-when a motoreycle came whizing by, catching him in the back and dragging him sume 20 yards. Upon examination at the hospitnl it was foum that little hope to save him could be entertained, and in less than three hours later he had passed away.

Harry, as he was familiarly known, was of a bright and cheerful disposition, was always ready to stand in for a paal attempla and was suecessful in scoring a tolal of 39 peals, including Granderire Triples, Caters and Cinques, Stedmain Triples, Caters and Cinques, nud Bob Major and Maximus. He joined St. Peter's company ou September 25th, 1907, and by a strange coincideneo died on Septersber 29th, 1827, thus being a member for exactly 20 years.
The funeral took place on the 4 th inst., when the mortal remains were horne to the grave by three of deceasel's workmates and threar ringers. The first part of the service was held in St. Peter's Ohurch, conducted by the Rer. Prob. Stocklay (Rector), aud the committal portion at the cemetery by the Kev. L. Morgan (senior curate). The floral tributes were many and beautiful, including some trom St. Peler's and St. Luke's (Wulverhampton), Tetteuball, and Pena towers. Kingers present included Messrs. T. Simith, W. Maddox ane H. Knight (bearers), T. Rodeu, T. Hinsel (Penn), A. Greenîeld and A. Preslidge (Netherton), J. D. G. Harris and G. Langley (St. Peter's).
Bells were rung balf-mufled at St. Luke's, both mid-day and in the evening, and a quarter-peal of Grandsire Triples brought round at Penn by: H. Brewster 1, A. Bowyer 2, J. Hickman 3, T. Hoden 4, J. Bloore 5, T. Beards 6, E. G. Bowyer (conductor) 7, E. Beards 8. A peal of Stedman Triples was attempted at Tettenhall, but came to grief after two and a half hours' ringing: J. Willianas I, H. Knight (conauctor) 2, R. Pickering 3, E. F. Niteheli 4, W. E. Cooper 5, T. Smith 6, W. H. Lawley 7, J. D. G. Harris 8.

## AMBITIONS.

In almost every walk of life we see and admire people with ambitionSome set their aim very high, some even at the impossible, yet he Who would progress must of necessity have some goal to aspire to. In ringing, we have certain prominent men who with carnestness and zeal set out with certain aims. Some are merely ambitious to ring every bell in their own particular tower to a peal; some to conduct a peal from each bell; others with wider interesta try the like at neighbouring towers. Then there are those with 'pet' methods to ricg tha extent of on all numbers, while others have the desire to ring us many tenorg as possible. The late Rev. F. E. Robinson, uot content with a 1,000 peals, endeavoured to get a like number of Stedman Triples. ' Uncle' Joe has (among others) the desire to ring evory possible number of changes of 'Yorkshire Glory' from 5,000 to 50,000 , as well as ' bagging ' all the tenors in this and other distant countries. The great ' J . G.' of England has the desire (and, if rumour be true, he is not the only one) to ring a peal on every date in the year. Jnt lika manner, the hon. secretary of tho Miduud Counties Association (Mr. Ernest Morris, of Leicester) has another ambition, and that is to ring peals on every ring of five bells and upwards in his native county. This may prove one of the impossible tasks, franght, as it is, with very many diffculties, such as travel to outlandish places (he is not blessed with possession of either motor or cyclef, finding the bells sadily neglectad, especially the fives and sixes, sometimes making more thar one long journey to oil bearings, tighten up frames and fittings, taking ropes to repiace worn-out and unfit ones, and, in many cases, only scoring under great dificulties and punisiment by way of blisters and aching limbs.
As reported recently, Mr. Morris has now scored peals in 100 towors in Leicestershire-a number yet huequalled by any for one county. Whey comprise peals in 35 five-bell towers, 31 sixes, 2 eights, 4 teng, 1 twelve, and included, in 33 cases, the 'firat peal on the bells.' Tha peals are in all the standard and many Surprise methods from Doubles to Maximus, and include Doubles, Triples, Caters and Oinques in both Grandsire and Stedman, Minor, Major, Royal and Maximus in Cambridge Surprise and Kent Treble Bob, and the three former in Prain Hoh and Spliced Treble Bob. They alsa include the longest M.C.A. peals of Doubles, Minor, Bob Major, Kent Treble Bob, Spliced Trebla Bob, Little Bob, and Cambridge Surprise.
In his wisits to thege Leicestershive towers, Mr. Morris is also correcting and revising up to date the book 'Churel Bells of Leicesteralites;' by the late Thos. North, F'S.A.

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## BELERY GOSSIP.

The performance of Miss Jessie Davenport, in ringing a peal of Bub Major at Dore, as recorded last neek, raises the question as to who is the youngest girl to ring a peal. Miss Drvenport was 14 years and 11 months old whon she rang this peal. Incidentally, she has a twin brother who has twice rung about half-way in an attempt for a para. They still have a chance of making history by being the first liwin brother and sistor to ring a peal together.
Mr. Wm. F. Fussell's jubilee as a ringer has been celebrated by a peal at Slougls, not in the tower where he learned to ring, but in its successor. Mr. Fussell is one uf the 'institutions' in the Excreise, and he must lave had more experience in arranging ringing tours than any olther individual. He las arranged three "weeks' ihis year in Scotiand, Ireland and Wales. And he looks as young as ovor.
'This board was placed here by order of the Clurchwardens, in consequence of the attention and good conduct of the ringers.' Thus runs the 'foatnote' to the record in the tower at Wakefeld, where on October 18th, 1820 , was rung a compleat poal of Grandsire Csters, comprising 6,030 changes of 60 nine six eights and 60 eight nines, composed by Won. Woodhead, and performed in 3 hrs. 44 mins.'
William Ineland, one of the foundation members of the Norwich Diocesan Guild, called a peal of 10,272 Kent Treble Bob Major at Debeulam on October 16th, 1880.
Thomas Tolladay, a leading light in the ranks of the old St. James's Saciety, in its early deys, died on Oatober 18th, 1843. He rang aud contucted many peals in and around London.

We have heard a good deal in recent, years about the necespty for retaining the old names of methods, but no one in these days riage "Union' Treble Bob, althourl that was the name applied to the method in the early days of Treble Bob ringing, and is found in the records down to the ead of the eiglateeath century. On Ociober 20th, 1776, a 5,376 of Union Treble Bob was ruag at St. Mary's, Rotherhithe, and on October 20th, 1794, 6,720 was rung under the same uame at St. Giles', Camberwell.
Exactly, 150 years ago next Thursday a peal of 5,040 ' Griandsire Trebbles' was rung by the College Youths at St. Mary's, Lambeil.
At the dedication of 'Great Peter' on Saturday, the zend instant, the York Minster bells will be rung prior to the service. Great Peter will be rung only at the dedication, end afterwards in conjunction with the peal of 12. The Minster bells will also be available for ringers during the erening-
The bells of St. Martin's, Birmiugham, will bo broadcast at 8 p.m. on Sunday evening for a special service.

## A BEGINNER'S THEORY. <br> BY 'MINORMANLA

This is the tenth of the series of articles which Gave been spocially written for beginners by 'Minormania, to explain to them the theory of change ringing. These articles are net merely for perusal. If they are to serve the purpose for which they are intended they must be studied

While we have set ourselves to the study of the theory, we can, in Whale we harme littie attention to the practical use of the pricking of tho lead-ente.
So fat as minor is concerned, our nomather what the firgt lead-and may be, so long as the same POSITIONS are used.
For example, the W.R.W. calling repeats the following characteristies in each part, when appifed to mettods with any one of the four end-ends:
The firg bob at ' $W$ ' in each part is always 'made' by the fifth's place bull at the part-liead (the 5). In other words, the ' 5 ' hell plake bult fourth's place at the bob row. The socond's-place bell ut the part-lead, always rung 'IN, to the treble. This is done by the ' 2 ' fa the first part, the ; 5 , in the second, and by the ' 4 ' in the third part. 'The third's-place bell at the part-head l'uns 'OUT' (the ' 3 , the 4 , and the ' 2 ' in the respective parts). The sixth's-place bell at the part-lead (tho tenor') iy, of course, always at ' $\mathrm{W}_{\text {, }}$ ' and the fourth's-place bell is always at, ' $R$ ' (the ' 4 ,' the ' 2 , and, lastly,

The bob at ' $R$ ' in each part is always made by the second's-place bell at the part-head ( 2 ," ' 3 ,' and tine ' 4 '). The fourth's-place belt always "IN," and the fifth's-place bell always 'OUT.' The tenor, i' course, is " f ,' and the third's-place bell is ulways at ' W .
The third bob (the second at "W ') is always "made' by the third'splace bell at the part-jead, the fourth's-place bell ' IN,' the fifth'splace bell ' OUT, the tenor at ' $W$,' and the sceond's-place bell at ' $R$.'
The part-heads are always the same, in all methads called the same why, and, therefore, the conductor may always know where his bells shout be at the bobs, if not elsewhere. These same characteristics apply to any method called W.R.W., and, once memorised, they can be applied whenever this calling is used.
Similarly with the other callings at I.I.4tr's, I.O.I., ete., the claraeseristics differing, according to which calling is used,

## PROOF.

Before proceeding with this subject, it is necessary to understand learly what is meant by certain terms, and what we are going to try
true' peal consists of a certain number of rows, of which no are identical. 'The object of "proving" a peal is to endeavour to find those lead-heads, which, although difering from all of the othere, will produce rows that will appear elsewhere in the peal.

In the first place, all of the lead-heads must differ; if any two are lentical, the whole leads will, of course, be identical.
Hows with the treble in तifferent places in each are not mentioned here, because there is no possibility of these repeating with each other. Rows ' mentioned hereafter, wili y'efer only to those rows which have the treble in the same place therein.

Corresponding rows.'-These are rows which appear in different leads at the same distance from their respective lead-heads, Row No. 3 in one lead is the corresponding row to No. 3 row of every lead, etc. These 'corresponding vows' are produced (in every lead) by changing EXACTLY the same pairs, and therefore cannol repeat with each other (alchough tha treble is in the same place in ench), because DIFFLRENT bella at the lead-jeads go to make the SAME PAERS which change.

Similar rows."-These are rows which have the treble in the amme place, but which are nof 'corresponding rows.' The changing pairs wirch produce them are NOT the same pairs in each case, and therefore there is possibility of repetition. That is to say, while row No. 5 of one lend cannot repeat with row No. 5 of another lead, yet ron No. 5 of the one might repeat with ROW No. 7 of another, althougli the lead-heads be different; and so on, with all of the 'similar rows, in tine leads. There are four such rows, for every place in which the troble appcars, in every lead of a Treble Bob method.
The following example is given mercly to show how' similar' rowa cm repent, while the lead-beads and the 'corresponding " rows differ Eimilar rowt (No. 7 and No. 28 ) are chosen from the Grst lead of Kent Treble Bob Major; the corcesponding rows jn the other leads have been arrived at by transposition, as we did when finding 'interal rows, liy covering 12345678 with the other lead-heads in tarn, and trunsferving the red cards first to 42163857, and then to 23154768 : -

$$ It will be seen that No. 7 in the first lead is repeated by No. 28 in the third, and that No. 28 in the first is repeated by No. 7 in the second lead given. Also that all of the No. 7 rows differ, as do all of those mambered 28.

Taking a pair of "similar" rows in the first lead, we can find the lead-heads that will produce each of them ugain, but hs the CORIRF-

SPONDING Jww of the other. For exarnple, wo can take the pair given atrove (No. 7 and No. 28), and tho questious ate: If 12345678 gipes 42163857 as the 7 th row, and 23154768 as the 28 th row, which leadFicad will give No, 7 aguin as its $28 t h$ row? Also, which lead-lead will give Na. 28 again as its 7th row?

## FINDING THE FALSE ROWS.

Tin'st deal wilh No. 7 (42163857), and find the lead-lead which will give 23154768 (No. 28) as tho corresponding row to No. 7. Use tha "transposition brack to Ead-heauls' ans before. Place the known" row and head sirle by side (42165857-18345678), and under tha row place the "unknown" row (23154768); druw lines between all of tha jiyures, and then till ia the emply spaces under 12345678 , with figurex which will make the same pairs READ DOWNWARDS, which you find in the two rows. The finished example will be:-

Then, if 42163857 is the 7 th row from 12345678 , the 7 the row from 13426587 will be 23154768 .

Now deal with the other row of the origimal pair by reversing the above procedure; find whicli lead-head will give No. 7 uguin as the cor'responking row to No. 88 :-

We lave bwo fulse leari-heads from this pair of 'similar' rows, which, if admisted to the peal, will give repetitious of these two rows which come from 12345678 (the first lead-head).

Ordinarily, this procedure shand be applied to every pair of similur " rows in the first lead. There are four similar rows for every place (in the row) in which the treble appears; that is, four rows 10400000 , four of 01000000 , Cour of 00100000 , etc. We can make Eunt rlifierent pairs with foul geparate rows. So that, in Major, we have eight 'plnees' of four paire each- 32 difforent pairs in all. In Minor, we have six places of four pairs each, being 24 pairs in all; and so mo. So then, in Major, 32 pairs ougint to bo compared, but onr law that odd and even rows cannot repeat helps us here. Our basis at ench lead-head is always 'even' in Treble Bob methods, so that 'sorresponding' rows in the leads are always of the same uature; if No. 7 row in one lead is "epen," then all of the No. 7 rows will be "even," and never an 'odd'; vice versa with the odd row's. This is alwaya the case, tuless the nature of the lead-head bo altered by singles, which we do not use in lreble Bub.

Therefore, in comparing similar rows, if No, 7 is odd, and No. 28 is even (in the first lead) wn can know that No. 28 (being even) wit not appear elsewhere $\Delta S$ A No. 7 ROW, because all of the No. 7 rows will be odd, and vige versa. We only have to comparo similas rows when both are "odd, or both are "oven."

When we have taken all of the paits of similar odi rows, ami ali pairs of sibilar even rows, in the lirst lead, and have compared them in the above manuer, we shall bave arrived at so many false leadheads (two heads for erery pair of rows compared). We can striku out all of the duplicates, and the remainder are placed in a column
 of the lead-heads that will proince idenfical rows which are also to be found in the FIRST LEAD (from 12345678). Therefore, if we ring this first lead, we must not ring a lead headed by any of the " Jalse heads shown in our colamn No. I.

## HENRY V. TRADITION

DID THE MONARCE BRING FRENGH BELLS TO MONMOITHP The recent visit to Waleg of what the "Western Mail' described as a band of National Ringera has elicited gome interesting history with regard to some old bells of Monmouth. Mr. R. G. Williams, of Peny-bont-ar-Ogwr, wrote to the "Western Mail 'as follows:-

The presence of the National Belthingers in Cardiff calls to mind a reference $I$ have recently reaỉ in a buak on old South Wales, relating to the bells in the tower of St. Mary's, Monmouth. This book statos that these bells ouce hung in the steeple of a church in Calais, France. When Henry. V. sailed from that port for England on a nertain memorable occasion, great was the joy of the French at sight of the liated Englishman's back; and to express their joy at the rifidance they set the bolls to finging a anerry peal as the invading army sailed toward the chalk elifs.

This left-hnuded compliment annoyed Honry, it seems, and when lie gat home he sent back to France and had the impertinont bella unhung and transported to his native town. There were ten, but two were left to consolo the Calaisois; the remainiug eight wero lung in this tower, aud hore they are still.
'As a boy in Monmonth I heard frequent reference to this tradition. Further, it was stated that the biggeat luell was so heayy, and the weather so rough, that it capsized the bosit and slid to the bottom of the sea.

The local sfory was that Harry of Monmouth put bsck to akk tho inhabitants of Calais the cause of their bellringing, and on Learning the reasou gave orders there amd then for the removal to Monmouth of the bells. I have Dever heard nor read of authentic corroboration of the above tradition. Surely, such an incident as the transfer of the hella of Calais to the Royal and ancient borough of Monmonth would be mentioned somewhere in the records of the days of "Harry of Monmouth " ! ## THE PROPOSED GUILDFORD DIOCESAN GUILD

## RELATIONS WITH SURREY ASSOCIATION.

The sccond of the series of district meetings in connection with the founding of the new Guildford Diocesan Guild was held at Jeatherhead on Selurday. This is a copmer of the uld wictespread diocese of Winchester in which the Winchesker Guild failen to make any headway, but the new spirit which the formation of the diocese of Guildford bas put into chureh work promises to be reflected in the uew diacesan Guild, and towers were bopresented an Saturday which bave been unattached, it any rate for it number of years, to any association. The peal of ten bells at the Parish Church were at the digposal of the wisitors, and were utilised both afternoon and evening, and the meltods included Bob Miner and Major, Grandsire and Stedman Triples and Gaters and Gambidge Surprise Royal.

A short service was held, st whion the Vicar of Leatherbead (the Rev. (3. H. B. Coleridge) officiated, and gave an appropriate address, based upon the words, There are, it msy be, so mally voices in the world and none of them is without signification' (1 Cor, siv. 10),
A capital " knife and fork " tea was partaken of at the Institube, which is a centre of life and activity in this old and thriving Surrey town. At the business mesting which followed, the Rev. G. H. B. Coleridge presided, and among those present were the Rev. C. F. Carver (Vicar of Gapel), the Rev, IH. O. Martin (Pector of Ockley), and ringers from Leatberhead, Banstead, Capel, Cobham, Granleigh, Epsom, Guildford, Ockley, and Woking, and visitors from Streatham, Beddington, Edmonton, Woodford and Croydon.
The Vicar, in opening tho meeting, said he could not kelp feeling that the whole ceuse of ringing in that part of the diocese would be advarced by the furmation of the new Guild. It would got only stimulate interest in ringing among those who were already ringers, but he hoped it might help them in the difficulty which was being exgerienced in geting young ringers. There were many towers where the old bands were graduaily dying out, atad unless young ringers could lue brought in, the art of ringing is those towers was in danger ol extinction.

## THE SUGGESTED AMALGAMATION.

The Organising Committee's repart was presented by the hon. secre. tary pro tem. (Mr. 3. S. Goldsmith), who said that since this report was presented at Guildford on the preceding Saturday, the hon, secretary of the Snfcey Association had raised with him the accuracy of the interpretation which the committee had put upon the Surrey $A$ ssociation's proposils for amalgamation. Although the Guildford Diocesan Commitieo fuliy gained the impression that the Surrey Association's suggestion was one of absorption, they were now assured that this was not the case, but that what was intended was amalgamation on a fifty-fifty basis. As the outcome of an informal talk that afternoon between the members of the cammitites and those of the Surrey Association Executive who were present, it was now suggested that the Surrey Association, if they desired to do so, should put an amalyamation scheme on paper, which the Guildford Diocesan Guild, after its formation, could consider. At the moment, the Oyganising Committee was appointed to organiso a Guildford Diocesan Guild, and they could not go outside their terms of reference. Proceeding, Mr. Goldsmith said that the Organising Committee desired to make it as plain sha they possibly could that in comirg into that district they fid so with no desigos whatever upon the Surrey Association. They recognised the loyalby which many towers in that area had given to the county association, but as they were organising a diocesan Guild, and that area was within the diocese, they would be failing in their duty and they would bo unable to clam to be a truly diocesan body, unless they get up their organisation in that distriet as in the other parts of the diecese. Whatever might be the outcome of future negotiations, the earnest fesire of the Guildford commiltee was that the two associations, which had common interestg, should work amicably side by side.
The report was accepted, and a resolution approving of the forma lion of the Guildford Diocesan Guild, and pledging support, was carricd nem. con., on the motion of the chairman, seconded by the Rev. G. H. Carver.

The proposed rules were then cansidered in detail, and met with gencral approval, one or two slight alterations being suggested which qioll be hrought to the notice of the preliminary general meeting.
A motion in bupport of the reciprocal arrangement with the Winchester Guild as to present members becoming compounding members on payment of ls was carriet, but the meeling regtetted being unable to support a proposal of the Winchester Guild that life members of that Guild should become life merobers of the Guildford Diocesan Guild without further payment.
A number of suggestions for furthering the work of the Guild when formed were put forward for consideration by the committee, and the husiness concluded with a vote of thanks to the Rev, G. H. B. Coleridge for the serrice, the use of the bells and presiding at the meetiug, also to the lady organist, who bad assisted at the service.
Mr. R. Whittington voiced appreciation of the work which has been lane in organising the Gujld by the hon. secretary.
The towers which it is proposed shall form the Leatherhead District fre: Ashtead, Banstead, Capel, Cohharn, Dorking, Epsom (Christ Church and St. Martin's), Ewell, Leatherhaan, Newdigate, Ranmore and Ockley:

Further district meetings are to be held at Clertsey (to-morrw, nud Farnham (Octoher 22nd). The prcliminary general meeting of the Guild will be held at Guildford on November 19th.
