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# GILLETT AND JOHNSTON 

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## METHOD EXTENSION.

The informative article by Mr. J. A. Trollope, which appeared in our last issue and which is followed up by another this week, is a useful contribution to the vexed problem of method extension. Whether our teaders will be in full agreement or not with all that Mr. Trollope has to say on the subject does not at the moment matter, at any rate from our own point of view. Hitherto the question has been so much obscured by controversy over individual method extensions that the general principles involved have been lost-even if there has ever been an attempt to expornd them-to the general body of the Exercise. What we have from time to time sought to impress upon the experts has been the need for arriving at the principles which can be recognised as governing method extension. Mr. Trollope, in his two articles, has set forth some of the difficulties which would have to be faced by any body of men who tried to get down to the task. There may be those who will say that the diffculties are to some extent mythical, and that there are already formulx upon which all methods can be extended. Be that as it may, if it is possible to get those who take these divergent views to set down their rival opinions and to discuss their respective merits witha others who could give a sound judgment, we might go a long way to reducing order out of what is, to the ordinaty ringer, apparent chaos.
We readily admit that whoever enter upon this task, if they are to produce something of real value to the Exercise, have to face a thorny problem, and it may be that many of the points at issue will take long to settle. Mr. Trollope bas already pointed out that the construction of methods was not settled by the Methods Committee's report, but settled, as far as it has been settled, by the controversies and discussions which grew out of the report. If method extension can be settled in the same way, a great gain will be achieved, and it is because we believe that a solution of the problem can be found if the matter is approached in the right way that we have so constantly urged that it should be taken in hand. If those who at present advance definite views on the subject have the courage of their convictions, they ought not to object to submitting them to an impartial body wher could weigh the material before them and come to some conclusion that would give a definite leat to the Exercise at large.

If the discussion which has now reopened in our columns takes the matter nearer to settlement it will have served a useful purpose. We realise that a debate on abstruse points, with masses of technicalities, cannot be (Continued or page 770.)


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[^0]foilowed by the majority of our readers, and this should be reserved for a committee, who should be asked to consider the problen. But broad principles can well be understood and some of the difficulties which confront the Exercise can be appreciated by all, from articles such as Mr. Trollope has written. All sides have got to be heard if an acceptable decision is to be arrived at, and while the figures of proof must be left for the consideration of those competent to deal with them, the Exercise will profit by simply stated facts.

## A CHESHIRE TOUR.

## MOTORING ON A TYPICAL "SUMMER" DAY.

On a typical English summer day-like most al those wo have enjoyed (?) this year-a day when the makers of umbrellas and "macks 1 ub their hands with sstisfaction-six members of the Ghester Diocesan Guild (Chester Branch), Messis, H. W. Wilde, J. Morgan, G. Janes, W. Thomas, A. E. Richards, and J. W. Clarke, set off early in the morning to endeavour to raise a few blisters. They met in the ancient city of Chester, complete with Austin cer and Rudge motor-gycle-bwo trusty vehicles which have had previous ' honourable mentions' in these columns.

Mr. Richards set a noble example of eerly morning energy by tirning in the 23 cwt. tenor. After 120 Stedman Doubles, the "swim" was again coatiaued as far as Mobberlay. The exquisite carving in this ancient ohurch is worthy of mention, and the beauty of the building was enhanced by harvest decorations. The ringing chamber, evidently once a west gallery, could ecarcely be called iden. The floor is in two tiers, one about a yard above the other, three ropes falling on the upper floor and three on the lower. Although this is somewhat out of the ordinary, ringers on holiday don't worry mumh, and a 720 of Double Oxford was completed before the bells were lowered. A move was then made towards lunch, and a cosy restaurant was chosen in Alderley Edge. The water had somewhat subsided in the aftermon, and travelling was a litile more pleasant. Rubber tyres, however, did not quite like the cobbled lane leading to the quaint old ohuroh at Alderley, which was reached about 2.30 p.m. An extent of Kent Minor was accomplished on the pleasing ring of sia before the jonrney was continued in the little brick church at Chelford. Chelforl bells are a light sis, and ringers are tempted to run them along at a speed which sometimes spells disaster. The mishap came when nearly half-way through a 720 of Double Bob, but, fortumately, time allowed of an extent being ohtained before leaving for Folmes Chapel.
T'ea was now the order of the day, and, as no cafe was visible, the party walked into a hostelry conreniontij situated near the church. There was ma awkward moment just after they eatered-a maid dropped a laden tray with a terriblo crash. It appears that she
imagiaed berself to be dreaming on hearing riagers asking for 'taa'! The bells of Holmes Chapel, although of cousiderable age, have beer rehung durirg recent years, and 'ro' excellently. The daj's sirgging was concluded here with sn enjoyable 720 of Cambridge Surprise Minor, after which whesls revolved towards Chester again. After safely negotiating the narrow streets of Middlewich and the markat crowds of Winsford, Chester was safely reached. Mr. Richards and Mr. Thomag were put down to look for their bus; the other four, at any rate, arrived home at tike highly respectable bour of 9.30 .

## MEARS \&

## STAINBANK,

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A record which stood for 80 jears was made at Painswick on Decenahor 9th, 1833, when a peal of 10,224 Treble Bob Maximus wis mang in 6 hrs. 50 nins.

One bugdred and forty years ago to-morrow ' 5,040 Holth's Graudsim Trobles 'was rung at kingston-ou-Thames, 'call'd by Robort l'orter, age 17 years.' This must bave bsen d unique performance for so young a ringer at that time. Do any of our readers know what was the future career of this youthful conductor?

A peal of 'Real Double Caters' was composed and conducted by George Gross, and rung at St. Magnus', London Bridge, on Decemher 10th, 1770. The compesition is preserved, and is to be fuund in the 'Glavis."
On December $15 \mathrm{th}, 1735,8,008$ Grandsire Cinques was rung by the College Youths at Southwark. When ons remembers that it was enly a bare twenty years earlier that the frst peal of any kind had been rung, the progress which was made in those early days of peal rigeing must have been considerable, for there were not the means of intercommunication of ideas then that there are now.
The first peal of Kent Treble Bob Royal at St. Clement Danes was rung 80 years ago next Thursday.
December 15th is also the annivarsary of the first peal rung in South Africa-a peal of Grandsire Triples at Woodstock, in the year 1904.

It is proposed to attempt a peal of Stedman at Dartford on Saturday, Janasry 6th, 1928, at 2.30 p.m., by members of the Mauchestur Unity of Oddfellows. Any ringers belonging to the Unity who weuld liko to ring should write to Bro. R. A. Jenkins, Dartford Lodge, 84, Priory Road, Dartford. For the event a dinner and coneert are being arranged at the Co-operative Hall, it being the $89 t h$ anuiversary of the ladge in Dartford. The conductor of the peal will be Bro. J. H. ## SILVER BELLS.

## To the Edilor.

Dear Sir,-Referring to this subject brought up by your colycapondent in these columns a short time ago, I am sending this extract from an old hook, 'Popular Errors Explained,' by Jolin T'mbs, F.S.A. which may interest ringers fenerally :-

Silver in bells. A prejudice has long existed that the oirl chumh bells cantained a maller or larger portion of silper, and the large bell of Roum Cathedral was, from its beautiful sounds, called the filver bell. It was broken up, and melted into cannon, in the first I'rench Revolution; and M. Girardin has, by a carefal analysis, ascertained that this Rouen bell bad not a trace of silver in it. One tundied parts of it by weight contained: Copper 71, brass 26, zinc 1.80 , irou 1.20. Modern French bells differ little from the above, being composed of: Copper 78, brass 22.
Mr. E. Beckett Denison, "in his account of the great bell of Westminster, says that silver is "a purely poetical and not a chemical indredient of any known bell metal; and that there is no foumdation whatever for the vulgar notion that it was used in ald bells, wor the least reason to bolieve that it would do any gand. I happened to hear, adds Mr. Denison, "of an instance where it had been tried lyg $\Omega$ gentleman who had put his own silver into the pot at the hell foundry some years age. I wrote to him to inquire about it, and he could not say that he remembered any particular effect. This seemed to me to be quite enough to settle that cinestion. You may easily see for yourselves that a silver cup makes a rather worse bell than a costron saucepan.

One thing, however, seems certain, and that is that charch belle made of solid silver would be very expensive. Y̌ours faithfuly,

## MORE ABOUT COURSING ORDER.

All legitimate Major nethads beirg compelled to produce Bob Major lead-beads, it follows that these coursing arder positions will apply to the lead-heads of may Major method. Notice the words 'lead-heads.' In other methods the coursing order may be broken WITHIN the leads, but it is put right again befors the end of the leads, being maintained in the lead-leeds until a 'call" intraduces a new courge, as will be shown; but, for the moment, we will only consider the fact that in our peal the calls do not disturb the plain coursing positions of our tenors-that thoy are not 'parted' from one another in the coursing order; and that, at every lead-head throughout the peal, they will occupy positions which correspond to one of the plain course leatheads, thus:--

Notice that the '87' coursing pair are adjacent only in the $2 / 3$ and $7 / 8$ places, and that it is ' 78 , Ehere; 1t will never be ' 87. ' That in the odd places ( $3 / 5$ and $5 / 7$ ) it is '708,' and that in the even places ( $2 / 4,4 / 6$ and $6 / 8$ ) it is ' 807.
Now let ANY OTHER COURSING PAIR replace tho g7 ' pair, say the ' 46 .' Then in the odld places we may expect to find ' 604,' and in the even places ' 406 ,' and 50 onl. It will never be ' $600^{\prime}$ ' etc., ele, because ' 63 ' are not a coursing pair. Similarly with any pair chosen from the courging order.
There are seven coursing pairs in the coursing order, and luring their progress through the seven leads of the plain courso each pair will, in turn, gocupy each position taken by 'g7' abave. In another way, when ' 87 ' do NO'1' occupy a certain pair of the piaces given, ar other coursing pair will do so.
When finding the lead-hads that wers false gainst the PLATN GOURSE, we had seven columns, each containiag futrteen false fleads, from whioh we abstracted those which had the tenors in flain coursing positions, and wo were left with only six that matitered. These siz could have beerz produced straight from column No. $1_{3}$, in the following manner.
Given our fourteen false hods that are ialse against lead-head 2345678, if eny of them lias a COURSING PAMR of Gells in a pair of the seven plain coursing pasitions, it followe that we can substitute (for 2345678) a PLAIN CODRSE LEAD-HEAD that will briug the 87 pair into those plain coursing positions, which are held by that other coursing pair in the false head, the false head being relative to 2345678.

No. 3 false lead in column No. 1 is 5238746 , and ' 53 ' are a coursing pair whick eccupg therein a pair of plain course positions ( 5030000 ). Now the false head (5) $2(3) 8746$ is false gatast $2(3) 4$ (5) 678 , wherein $53^{\prime}$ ' occupy the TFIRD AND EIFTH places in the row. Then: Fina a plain course fead-head which has the 87 pair (the tenors) in the THIRD and FIFTH places, and-
If lead-head $2(3) 4$ (5) 678 has on false hear (5)2(3)8746,
then lead-hend $0(7) 0(8) 000$ will have folse head (8)0(7)0000.
Tirst examine the It heads in column No. 1 that aro false against 2345678, anti note any caursing pair that oncupy EXACTLY the same positions as they do in ANY PLAIN COURSE LEAD-HEAD. The false head No. J is the first (57)83246, wherein the 75 pair correspond in positions to No. 2 lead-head (57)38264. (Note. This lead-head does mot enter inte the question, and may iomediately be forgotien. It is mevely the moans of enabling us easily to recognise a coursing pair in plain course positions.) Then look for the plain-course leai-head whimings the 87 pair TN THE $5 / 7$ PLACES. It is the lead-head at the top of your colnmu No. 5-352(7)4(8)6. Then, lead-head 3527486, transposed by the false head 5783246 , cives 7865324 . Which is a tenars together "false bead belonging to COLUMN NO. FIVE.
No. 2 false head is another- $657(2) 8(3) 4$, the 32 pair corresmonting in positions to lead-head No. 7-648(2)7(3)5. Here we want the 1matihead with the 87 pair in the $2!3$ places, the $2 / 3$ places cormesponding to the ' 23 ' bells. It is that lean-head which heads our' column No. 6 (78)56342. Them, lead-head 7856342, transposed by the false head 6572834, gives 3647285 . which is a 'tenors together' false head belonging to THAT COLUNN-Na. 6.

And go on, the terors laving to he in those PLACFS in the leadheads that correspond to the NUMBERS of the coursing pair picked out in the false hegd. the result of the transposition beloncing to the column whirh is hender by the leadhead that has the tenors in the pacessary places. The whole of them are given below:

[^2]It. sa happens thaf Superlative Surprise Majar Las given false heads which contain only one pair of coursing bells in the plain course positions, buti it is possible for more than two bells to be in piain course placm in in falso head. These must be carefully someched for, if tijes shart cut is roing to bo used.
For instance, a liead that is falso against 2345678 might be 4327586. Fiere we liave two combinations- $432(7) 5(8) 6$, wherein tho positious of the 87 pair correspond to lead-head No, 5; AND ALSO the75 (86), wherein the 68 pair corvespond also to lead-liead No. 5. In this instamce it is necessary to transpose TWO plain course lead-heads with the tenors in correspronding plaees, by the ONE falsa liead; that is, BOTE 23456(78) and $4263(8) 5(7)$ will be transposed by the false liead 4327586 , giving 4327586 and 6245378 zespectively.
Again, the falge-head might be $26(7) 8(5) 4(3)$, wherein " 75 ' and ( 53 ' arc coursing pairs in plain carse positions. Here it is necessn'y to transposis the two lead-heads $352(7) 4(8) 6$ and $5(7) 3(8) 264$ by this 010 false head, giving 3486725 and 5264837 as the respective talse heuds with the "tenors together", And so on, baking care to pick oul, in the false head, EVFRY COMBINATION of caursiag hells in plain course positions, and applying each combination to the piain comser lead-head, with the tenors in the pecessary places
We have found that if we cause secoud's or giglat's places to be marfe at the lead-ends, our caursiug arlee remains unaltered; but, if a 'placo' other than these is made, a different case will arige.
In Major methods, bobs are made in two ways- either by fourth"s place or by sixth's place being made ath the lead-ands, instead of the usual second's or eighth's places, as the case may be. We can distoves* how coursing ordor will be alfected by both ai these bobs by Lurniag our 'plain hunting leak' into a bobbed lead, first by causing fourth" place to be made (hy the ' 5 ') and then by causing sixth's place to be made (by the ' $7^{\text {f }}$ ):

The EIXPH'S-PLACE BOB caldes the bell which makes the bob wace (the ' 7 ' here) to take two sleps FORWARDS in lhe coursing order.
Different bells will, of course, packe the bob placea at other latadlteads, and those bells will then be the ones to taige the steps forwards or backwards in the coursing order then provailing, but the EFTECR will always be the same.
Wher bobs are ased, only the one place is mado in the rows, as iu the Miner, but when singles are introduced in Major, TWO 1PLACES are made IN ADDITLON to the usual second's or eighth's planeagain as in the Miner. A single in a second's-place mothod canses THIRD'S AND FOURTH'S places to be made IN ADDITION, and in nn eighth's-place method SIXTH'S AND SEVFNTE'S piaces are made in addition to the eighth's place. We shall find that the single, applied in either way will have the same effect upon coursing ordor.
Tura tho plain lead into a siegled lead, first Jy making second's, third's nud fotriln's places, and then by makiug sixth's, serontr's, and eighth's places, thus

and we find that the coursing order is 354987235 , ptc., and 34766324 , ate., trspectively, and, when compared with the ariginal, we see that the TWQ BELLS which make the EXTIRA PHAGES change positions with EACH O'PHER in the canrsing ouder, the 25 in the first and the 76 in the second case.
In this connection it may be noted that a single in a Major method coes not monan in single change,' as in the minor; in fact, it is a mismomer here, TWO pairs ctianging in the row, instead of the three pairs as ai the plain lead. Similarly with the higher numbers.
Fach call will alter the provaling woursing order in the manaer slown above, and the conductor is conbled to carry the coursing order of the bells in mind by transposing them ns each call is made. He is immediately in a position to know it his bells aro not in thoir moper places.

This is the seventernth of the series of articles whioh hava been apoclally written for beginners by 'Minormania,' to explain to them the thoory of change ringing. These articies are not merely for perusal. If thay ars to serue the purpose for which they are intended they must be studiad.

## THE EXTENSION OF METHODS.

## PLAIN BOB.

To maderstand the extension of Plaiu Bob we must first understand the structure of the nuthod. There are six changes on three luells. Let 113 wing them with a covering tonol', and divide them into thyee sections of two rows each. Now hunt the tenor down to lead, let her lead a whole pull, and hunt her up behind again between each section, and wa get Reverse Bob Minimus. (Write it out in full.) Add a bell to the working bells thus, and do the sarne, and we get Bob Doubles. Acld amother Lhus, and do the same, and we get the Bob Minor. I have given the reverse variation in each case as this best shows the nature of the method. Jt consists of a plain honting course with B tenor thehind, but the tenor is turned in at every crass section, hunted down to lead, and

123456 con in agailk, amb when she is behind the working bells continue their independent hunting course just is if the tenor had not been turned in. The row ahove the line becomes the lead-end, and the row helow the line the leadhend of the method. In practice, we discard Bob Doubles, 'Priples, ets, not becanse they are not a trise exteasion, but hecause they cause a bell to strike four consecative rows behind.

We have now seen that Bobl Minimus can be extondec to five bells in twn diferent ways-by adding a boll in the hunt, which gives us Girandsire Doubles, the other by adding a bell in the work, which gives us Bols Doubles.

## WHAT IS A METHOD?

## BY J. ARMIGER TROLLOPE.

The first thing to do is to eettle clearly and definitely exactls what it is you are going to extend. That sounds like a truism, but it is not. A very large part of the dificulty in these matters arises from the fach that men take foundations and fundamentals too much for granted. You will prohably aty, "Melthods are what we want to extend, and every ringer knows what a mellod is." Yas; every ringer does know what a methoal is up to a certain point, and to a point which meludes everything which cidinarily concerns him. But we are denling with a much disputert part of the science of ringing, and we want a mich clearer and mone definite iden and definition of a method than will 3uflice for all ordinary purposes. Here is a test. Take a piece of paper nnt write down exactly what you understand by the term method means you vat Ehink of. See that it satisfies, not on] your own stiong critirism, bul also any fair eriticism others can bring againat it. In a word, starl your arguments on clear, definite jdeas. Bhen you have Bone this, yon can go on tis ask jourself the next important aluestion, What oxactly do we mean by extension?
What is a method? At the antset let us thoroughly realise what it is noll. ll is not a callection of figures. There is no wore subtle trap that a man can falt into in this matier than to think that a lead uf, say, Superlative Major is a collection of fgures, and to extend the method to Superlative Royal is to make as near a vopy as passilule with ten tigures of the orifinal eight. The frures we use are a mose ar less imperfect means of wepresenting the method, but they are mot the mothod. If you treat them as if they were the inethod (and the tempintion is exceedingly shrong), you ate bound to fall into many tullacies amd mistakes. A man may know (and many men do knowl a vasi deal nbutt methods who never bothers limself about figures at all. If yom want to know what a methad really is, put jucur figures on one side and go into the tower and ring.

Now when we attempt a peal of Bob Major or London Surpuise, er anpthirn else, we do not start with the intention of ringing so rathy particular rows. Not one of the band, not even the conductor or the nampuser, conkl tell you what rows you achually have rang anless he makes claturate ealealations. What we do attempt to do, and we do Lnow, everyoue of us, whether we have done or not, is so much hutiug, 80 much dowling, and so much place making. Everything, in fact, that we call "work, ${ }^{\text {, }}$ lut all this work is only so mueh movement. It is this movement of the bells nmong eaeh olher which is the essentind thing in ringing, which, indeed, is ringing itself. I hope no une will think I am writing platitudes or what everybody knows; for 1 nm quite certain that wutil you realise that ringing is neither a collection of figutes nor a stuccession of rowz, nor even a succession of changes, but an amonnt of movemotht, you will never realise what an extension realls is. $A$ method is so much movement.
This is a fact, the proofs of which are abondant directly yau erter the tower, but whinh you are extremely likely to overlonk when you sit down at horise will pencil and paper to work out theoretic problems in ringing. It whs the iclea of movement which first started ringing more than three bundred years ago, and which sharply conditions and controls what ringing is. Notice how almost every term we use inplies movement and practically nothing else-hunting, dodging, piace making, bob, course, lead aral the rest-they all bear witness to the fint that wo are concemed primarily with movement, and that all ather 1 hings are subordinte.

Fabian Stedman knew and realised this. He does not give you fignres and then leave you to find out what to do from them. He first of ull deacribes how the bells are to move, which ones you have to hunt up of down ; and afterwards, as an illustrabion, be gives you tigures, But it is always as an illustrution. It would bo a good thing if we could work oui this problem of extension without the aid of figuros at all. That, pertaga, is not possible. But it is possible to free aurselver. from the tyranuy of the figures and treat the method as it really is-a thing which belongs to practical ringing and to the tower.
That brings us to an important general truth. No extonsion is a true and valid exteusion unless it can be rung by the same rules as the original. This is the only sure teat in the matter, and all argunantsi and all proofs which you can produce are only of use so far as they recognise this. Of course, like atl general statements, this is atest which has to be applied with care and knowledge. It does not ntear that every mule by which you ring Doublo Norwich Major must apply to any aethod calling itself Double Norwich Royal. It might even be that no rule by which you persomally ring the Major will apply to the Royal. It, does mean that there must be a set of rules which, applied to eight bells, will enable your to ring Double Norwich Major, and, applied to ten bells, will enable you to ring Double Norwich Rayal.

Here, then, is our problem broadly atated. A methad is so much movement with certain definita rules. How can we extend that move. ment, using exactly the same rules?
