## TWO SIDES OF A QUESTION.

The rapid growt ${ }^{\text {th }}$ of rings of twelve bells is welcome evidence of the general lendency to improve the church bells in this country. Restorations, recastings and augmentations are going on apace, and, as we recently mentioned, bell founders have never had a busier time, even without the additional work which is coming their way for carillons. Half a dozen peals of twelve are now in the hands of our founders, typical of the general desire that efficiency and beauty shall he manifested in the bells as well as in other portions of our church services. The progress made in the last quarter of a century in the manufacture of bells has led to such vast improvement in the tones which can be obtained that bells, which were looked upon at the begioning of this century as the best product of the founders' art, are now finding their way to the melting pot, because they canmot stand the test of comparison with the castings which to-day the leading founders are turning out, not, as was the case with the finer bells of the old days, just by vecasional good fortune, but as a regular and unfailing product of their business.

The one thing that grieves the enthusiastic ringer is the number of places where full use is not made of the complete ring of bells. It is, of course, the old story of lack of interest on the part of local authorities and ringers and the absence of recruits. But it is none the less regrettable to find towers, where there are rings of six, eight or ten, perhaps in quite good going order, left without a full band of ringers, and, maybe, only two or three bells chimed for a few minutes before service. 'This state of things prevails in quite a considerable proportion of parishes, and it is the greatest source of disquiet and regret that one sees in the bell world to-day. One unfortunate consequence of the indifference is the tendency not only to neglect the ringing, but also to neglect the bells, which are valuable instruments that with proper care can, with small expenditure, be maintained in an efficient state for many jears. Unguestionably where bells are not regularly rung the apathy in the ringing chamber leads to neglect among the bells.

Despite, however, the unsatislactory conditions which can be found in many quarters, there are other signs which show that church aluthorities, when the matter is brouglat to their attention, are ready to put their bells in order. The twelve-belf restorations referred to are cases in point. We have always urged that the authorities have a responsibility with regard to their bells and belfrics; we would emphasise that ringers individually and associations collectively have also a duty and a tesponsi-

This must be something of it record in the way of a "double."
Mr. 3. Andrews, one of the Trowbridge ringers, we are informed, took first prize in the 'Beauly Competition' at the zecent Stadley Garuival.
I'le Irowbridge band are proud of the sportsmen among them. Mr. C. Andrews, son of Mr. J. Andrews, has won many prizes in walking races. Another member is a keen fishermen, and, according to our correspondent, the other day nearly caught a trout, which, from its appearance in the water, weighed quite seven pounds.
The joint meeting of the Liverpool and Wirral Branclas of the Laneashire Association at Port Sualight has been postpoued, at the request of Lord Leverhulme, from September 1Sth to September 22ind.
On September 10th, 1741, a compleat peal of five thousand and forty of Gathrine's Trriples, being the firs true peal that ever was pricked with two doubles only,' was rung by the Crowfield Society at Codrenlan, Sufolk. It is believed that Garthon's peal of Graudsire Triples is meant, Garthon's peal being the one rung at Norwioh in 1718.
The treble in the peal at Codenham wes mung by Theodore Ecelestone, who had given the aight bells to Codonham. He resided at Crowfiefd, and it was he who also gave the ring of ten to Stombana Aspall.
Bertram Piewett, of whose death in the wav we were reminded last week, called the first peal of Superlative Surprise in Wales at Liangollen on September 13th, 1907.

A peal of 5,040 Imperial Place Major ('the first ever performed in the methorl ') was rung at St. Marys, Ishington, on September 13 the 1802, composed and conducted by Willian Shipway.
The meeting of the Hinckiey District of the Midland Coneties Association to-morrow will be held at Thurlastou, instead of Desford.
The first 720 in the peal of Cambridge Surprise Minor at Cottenham an August 25th, and recurced last week, was Mr. Frank Warrington's one hundredth 720 this year. The last 720 in the peal was his 40 th of Cambridge Surprise during 1928.
A report of a peal rung at Bodelwyddn, Flintshite, has been senf without the date.
A correspondent addresses the following: "To whom it may coycern.' On Saturday, September 1st, a visilor during the evening paiu a visif to the tower of St. John's Church, Margate, rained the second bell, broke tlie stay, and, of course, turned the bell over. This was not discovered until Sunday morning, and consequently the bell could not be rung. If this should catch the eye of the gentieman who, by the way, does not live many miles from Margate, and lie cares to write to the secretary, he will be pleased to sead him the accound for the repairs.

But the history of the matter is the reverse of this. Shipway produced Superlative Royal, and my brother extended it in the same may to Maximus long before the other extension appeared, therefore the other extension is a variation, and ghoula hawc some name attachot to it to indicate that fact.

A Plain Ringer' is mistalien in his idea that Shioway lan a theory of cxiension. His book eontains a variety of extonsions which cannot he expressed as one theory. The new fact which has come to light is that there are two ways of extending the Major to Maximus, and Lhere may bo more. We have Double Norwich Major, Royal and Maximus. This Maximus has places in $3-4$ and $9-10$, but there is another Maximus weaver the Majov, with places in $5-6$ and $7-8$, bul we cannot eall it Jouble Norwich unless we qualify it as some variation.

## ESSEX RINGERS IN HERTS AND BEDFORDSHIRE.

[NTERESTJNG HYATURES OF SOME OF THE OHURCHES
The Longhton and Woodford ringers had their anmeal outing on Saturday, August 25 h . Invitations to join tho party were extended to the Wanstead ringers and friends of the local bands. An early start was made from the Wilfred Lawson Hotel, Woodford, an routo for' Hitchiu. The couttryside, fresh from the showers of the pre vious day, and bathed in August sunshine, awakened the interesi of all as the charabanc sped mervily along. Space will only allow mention to be made of the picturesque thees and mendows that cauglit the eyo in tho oeighbourhood of Hatfteld. The sight of St. Mary's Clsurch, Hitchin, guickly aroused those feelings of delight that are only known to ringers. Mr. Scott, of the local band, walcomed the party, and led the way to a spacions belfry foor which upened out, stage-like, into the interior of the buitding. Short touchacs were rang of Grandsire and Stedman Triples, num the musical qualities of the bells evoked the admiration of , all. The stay was limited owing ta local wedding. The 'ring in' must have been is pleasunt surprise for the hetrothed pair. The building shows work of the 12th, 23th, Iftly aud 15 th centuries, the outstanding features being the wellbuttressed tower, the lengthy chancel, the well-designed south porch, and the sundian, dated 1660, fixed on the south side.
Bedfurd was the second calling place, and the fown was astir with the usual market activiwes, Soveral tauches of Kent, Gratulsiro, aud Plan Hob were rung on the bells of St. Peter's Church, an easygoing and tuneful peal of six. There were evidences that eampanology had reached a high leval in that belfry. The Norman tower, wilh pseuda-Forman battlements and haluster windows placed there ahout 100 years ago, is situaled over the chancel. It is interesting to note that a Sason doorway of Hiberno-Saxou stone was discovered in the east belfry wall when the ohd roof was removed in 1890. Rector's date back to 1219. A the Nomman loorway, temoved from the Chureh of St. l'eter de Dunstable, after its demoltion in 15\$5, is a striking feature on the soutls side. Its beauty, however, is uartly disclosed by a porch added many vears afterwards. Jobn Bunyan's statue stands a short distance away from the church, and both the inscriptions and scenes depicted on the sides are irateresting to passers-by
Dinner wes served at the Silver Grill, and fhe party's thanks were given to Mr. Stapleton, of St. Peter's Chutch, tor choosing such a congenial rendezraus
Then followed a visit to St. Marys, Jaton, where Mr. King and members of the local band joinen the visitors iu ringing touches of Stedman, Grandsire, and Kent Troble lBob Major. All testified to the ensy rumning and pleasant sounding of the bells, which pealed forth from a 95 ft . tower built chindy of Tottemhoe and ancaster stone. Attention was drawn to the Fiarly English stome haptistry, the only one af its kind in England. It was placed there by Queen Philippa, of Fainault, wife of Fdward IIf. The fun and large tin pitcher alate tirsto to 1209 . The dowzle stone seveen that sephrates the chaneel from the adjacent chapel is considered the hesli of jis kind in Norilsern Eurone. An amusing epitaph is wriften on one of the elapel stone slabs. A certain celcbrity Just his Parliamentary vake in 1756 hy aigning coppright dreds for frechold-a cuaning wangle, and his racentment is shown as follows:-

Hure lieth the body of Daniel Kaiglat.
Who in all my lifetime lived in spite.
Base fistterers souglat me to undo
And mave me sigt what was not true.
Reader, take care, where'er you venture,
'lo rust a canting figlse Disentev.
Other features of this line Parish: Church, ate the south porch door, six hundred years old, the groined vestry, the pretty chantry, mut the 14 hh century rood sereen.
The final Jalt was made at Filanstead, an interesting village in Fertfordshive, about six miles from Lutan. 'fea was served at the Blackbirds, and the homely aetting was rppreciated. On the completion of a tasty meal a hearty vole of thanks was proposed by Mr. J. Challs (Wantcad) to the orghnisers of the outing, Mr. C. Moss (Woolford), and Mr, J. Ram (Luughton!, both of whom suitably replied.
The Clureh of St. Leomard was viaited, and the Ficar, Line Rev F. C. Clare, expressed Jis great telight at spenge so many visitors. There were many evidemes that the Vienr is a live wire in hiparisfi. A lard-going peal of six has bean recently put into aplendias ringing order, and retuned. ## RECIPROCAL PROOF : WHAT IT IS. BY GEORGE BAEER.

Methouls with PLAIN Junts, io which the place-making is symmetrical within the lead, have no need of proof; the only false row will be the lead-ead.
For finding tie false rows of symmetrical PLALN methods, I make Hse of what I term 'Reciprocal Proof,' and this article deals exclusively with that kind of proof.
Reciprocal Proof is proving row egainst row by the path of the treble rrespostive of the alature of the roms, whether ond or eren, and as it is well to begin at tire boitom, the examples that I shall give in this article will be the Plain and Bob lends of Graudsire Singles.


The proof shows there are three false rows to each lead. Ihis is a febture of the PLAIN leads of the Single Grandsire Method on all uumbers, odll ind oven, to infinity, and it would be impossible to obtain tho extent of the changes in Singles, Donbles or Minor, were it not for ha fact that the Bob, or Single, leads in each instance cuts out two alse rows.


The proof af the Bob lead shows one false row only, i.e., the leadend 1432 , and it is therefore possible by cailing three bobs or threc mingles to jing the extent of Grandsire Singles, which otherwise would consist of gixteen changes iastead of tweuty-four.

Renders will perhaps ask how fre the proving transposition rows obtaiced? On the left-hand side of cach lead I have numbered the rows in their consecutive order, and ons the right-band side I have giver tho altered position from rounds in reverse order: this indicates that row 1 must be transposed by the altered position from rounds of row 8 , und similarly throughout the lead.
Perbans I can make tho watter clearer by giviag the Plain lead again, showing the dituerence of what I call the face value and the ploving value:-

## BOCKING YOUNG RINGERS

Although urabble to ring their own church bells, as reported in The Ringing World, recently, tha young ringers of St. Mary's, Bocking, Essex, are stil] learning.
