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## PEALS ON FIVE AND SIX BELLS.

The article which we published a fortnight ago on the subject of peals of Doubles and Minor has stirred up a new interest in this matter, and it may be well if certain of the facts were briefly reviewed. Up to the time when the Central Council met last Whitsurntide, no definition had ever been laid down to cover what should constitute al peal on five bells; white the definition whicin, since the years 1girigin, had governed the requirements for a peal of Minor, failed to meet a modern advance in Minor ringing which enabled a $7^{20}$ to end with a row other than rounds, the old rules laying down that peals of Minor should ' consist of at least seven true and complete 720 's, the bells striking round only once at the end of each and immediately going into the next.

Obviously, to bring the rules of the Council up to date some amendment to the conditions for peals of Minor was required, and a definition for peals of Doubles was also necessary. Three months' notice of the new proposals was given. During that time the suggested conditions were brought to the notice of ringers at many meetings throughout the country, and were discussed at the Council meeting. There was ample opportunity for considering lheir effect on future peals, and it was open to any member of the Council to move any alteration in the wording that he thought fit. But the motion, which was introduced solely to bring the Council's rules into line with modern practice and to maintain the standard which should be required for peal performances, went through unaltered. Now, however, six months afterwards, we are being informed that instead of the new conditions doing anything to raise the standard of jeals they have 'the unintended effect of crabbing any device that will do so, according to Mr. Powell's letter last week, and "squashing" those in a humble sphere who attempt to introduce variation, accorting to Mr . Emest Morris' letter in this issue.

With regard to the latter point, we fail to sec that enterprise in ringing is in any way restricted by tile conditions adopted by the Council. There is nothing to prevent a conductor calling false six-scores of Doubles as often as he likes, but we venture to think that the Council is right in demanding, where recognition of as peal is claimed, that the six-scores which go to make up the peal shall each be true. Indeed, the whole question, it seems to us, turns on whether these extents of Doubles and Minor shall be true or not. The whole trend of the Council's decisions in the past has been for ' truth ' in peals. It was with this end in view that such performances as fourteen 360 's rung irrespective of the repetition (Continued on prge TTO.

of changes, was ruled out, and provision made that in spliced methods on any number of bells, the peal should consist of true thanges. It would be going back on this old and desirable principle to admit, in peals, six-scores or 720 's which do not conform to the requirements latid down for other numbers.

Other points are raised in this discussion to which we will refer later, but lest there are any of our readers who think that the issue is a small one, we should like to stress the view that the matter is of considerable importance to the Exercise, inasmuch as it vitally affects what is to be admitted, in future, as a peal.

Nulurally, if rounds is the first change it cannot be the lats, and therefore, the peal does not end with roands, but with 124365 or 132465. 'Flais does not comply with the condition laid down by the Central Council on page 15 of its recent publication, 'Rules and Decisions of the Council." where it fistinctly states that, "On all numbers of bells a true peal ghall in all cases flart from and end with rounds.'

To put our houge in order, we must either alter the last stipulafion or decline to recognige the Rev. E. Bankes James arrangement for Cambridge as a true peal.-Yours faithfully,

## TRUE AND COMPLETE.

Sir, The question of the meaning of the resolution coneerning peals of Minol and Doubles passed at Herctord turns upon the question of what we mean by a 780 or a six-scorc.
It has been the custom of the Exercise to talk about a true 720 or a. liue peal. Does this mean that wa lave actually made 720 different changes, or does it mean that the bolls have sounded in 720 difierent orders? The word ehanges suggests the former, but a little consideration will show that that is impossible. It is commanly said lant we tala ring six changes on three bells. Let us examine ilnem: 123; change 1 and 2,213 ; change 1 und 3,231 ; change 2 and $3,321$. We have now made three difierent changes, and the bells have struck in our different orrlers, but the bells can strike in two more orders, 312 and 132 , and reither of these can he produced unless we repeat the change of 1 and 2 , while 3 lies still; and the change of 1 aud 3 , while 2 lies still. From this it follows that is six on three bells means the six different orders ist which the bells strike: moreover, in all the old ringity books we find 720 of Bob Minor having 14 bobs nad two singles. The two singles go thus:

If this 720 is ture and complete, then my hrotuer's arrangements of Cambridge Minol are truc and complete, Mr. Maryis' mrangement of Doubles is Lrue and complefe, and the so-called incomplete peal of Graudsire Triples, given on page 143 in Grandsire, is really true and complete, as the two misaing wows come at the berinning.
Finatly, the definition rules ond any such absurdity as ringing euch lead af a six-score of Bob Soubles forty-two times consecutively, and then going on to tho next lead, for cach of the forty-ane arepeats would be only the plain course of Original Doubles and not a six scove- Yours truly,

It is by my friend and namesake, 'Lesie,' aud without enkering into any merit or otherwise, 1 simply say it does conform to the method throughout, and is a wet come change from the old ten 120's.
Evidently you fail to realise the great diffeulty nany of our isolated 5 and 6 -bel! towers have to keep a hand together, oven to ring the 'original' six-score, and who are nol like the majority of tas hetter favoured ones, who can, when going for a peal, pick out the best from two or three lawers. There ane ofter one or two struggling along coutinually toaching fresh hands, and never geting it possible chance of admuciag, unless going porhaps many miles and ta some ineonvenience ank expenge to visit other towers bebter situited. Therefore, we should welcome any attempt at veriation, even if in this lumble sptere, and give encauragement where we can-anot simply squash them.

## DEATH OF MR. F. KNIGHTS.

A LJNK WITH OLD NORWICH RINGERS.
An outstandiag personality in tho Exercise, Mr. Frederick Kuights, passed rway at his residence, Heigham Street, Norwich, an Norember 27th.

Boru at Catfield, Fiorfolk, Decemter 12th, 1851, le was employed, at the carly age of five, in scaring crows, being rewarded for ulis at the rate of 1 s . per week. At a still carly age lie found mployment in a hakelonso al Diss, nuri it was hare lag learmed to yitug, the writer having heard him say that le could ring when he was twelve jears of age.
In 1866 be came to Norwich, and rery som made the nequaith.ance of the old company, ihen practising at. St. Poter Mancroit, the Iate Mr. James Trucnan leing liead man and couduetor, and lie was asked to take parl in the ringing Ior a visit to Norwich of the Primbe of Wales (latet Edward VП.) during that year.

He contintied gractising with tice Mracroft compnisy intil 1873 , When he transferret his activities to what were knowit as the Stage, Lhe rival carpmay to the Norwich Scholars (Mancrof company).
[॥ 1876, a vacancy haviug occurter in lhe Maneroft company by the death of Pobert Jurrell, and Mr. Kuights being the only ringer in Norwich at the time with the necesgary qualiftearions, he wrs asked to fill the racancy, which le did.
In $18 a 2$, when the late ML. James Youngs, who hat suceceded Mr. James l'rumats an hetul man, becathe incapratated, Mr. Kisiglas took over the leaderslip and rontinuct to fulfi the dutios wati] tha oid conpaly ceased their comection with St. Peter Maneraft.
Mr. Kuights wha ats original member of the Norwich Diocesan Association, and also a member of the Abcient Society of College Youths. Besides this, lee was the last link with the old Nurwich company, having known Thos. Hury, James Trueman and Charles Middletou. But, most of all, Mr. Kniglats will bo remembered fur his clarming personality. Mceting him for the first timg oum woulu instinctively call tima a gentleman; as a ringer he was a supertb striker at either end, and zasintained lo the fall the Norwich trodjtion of easy nud correct manipulation of a bell.
Perlaps his outstanding performance was the ringing of the tenor to the buck eiglit at Mancroft to Oxford Treble Boty Major, an Novemher 20th, 1890 , which he also eondneted.
Mr. Knights buill up a prosperous business as at baker and confectioner, and bronglit up a large fautily, only one of whom is a ringer, the eldesit som, Mr. F. IF. Kuights
Very musicully imulimer, Mr. Fuights took in land the teachang and training of the Ahbert Streat lambeell riugers, whose services Were in great demand dutimg the last twaty yosre of the last echtury. Worwich boing a city wilk a repulation for music, the success of these handbell terformances was something to be proud of ; in fact tiae whole ot his fanily are very expert iune ribuers.
His peal total was 129 on Lower lyels, on all numbers from six lo fwelve, and three liaudbell peals. He rondtreted matuy of these, and

We Lase elected the Council to do such work ns this, but if it continues to Jefure to do their job, it will have to be clone in somn other way. It is not likely that ringers will continue much longer to be under the thamb of three experts Wher can only repent ' now possumus.
