## PROBLEMS OF THE NEW YEAR.

Another year has gone, aud ringing associations will be counting up the gains and losses, and balancing the indications of progress against the set-backs. Such stocktaking is, of course, interesting, but it is unprofitable unless the lessons to which it points are taken to beart, and practically applied in the future. The credit items of success should lead to expansion of the same lines of advance; the losses on the debit side should lead to an examination of the causes, and determined effort to counteract them. There is probably no organisation of ringers that can survey the work of the past year and honestly say they are complerely satisfied with it. They can see failures as well as successes; links in the chain which have weakened as well as others which have been strengthened. True, perfection is hard to achieve, and disappointments are many, but in carrying on the work of the associations there is a fairly wide margin between present achievement and the complete fulfilment of the bighest ambitions of those who have the welfare of the Exercise and the art of ringing closest at heart.

The elevation of bell ringing to its rightful sphere in the service of the church; the promotion of a happier spirit and greater mutual recognition of each other's difficulties between clergy and ringers in many churches; the reawakening of interest in towers where the bells are now silent or seldom beard for want of men; the kindling of a greater enthusiasm in the art of change ringing among thousands of ringers who are at present content to mark time or even to drift backward and gradually to slip out of the Exercise. These are some of the things to which all those who take their ringing seriously constantly turn their attention and by which they as constantly find themselves bafled. Association officials who appreciate their responsibilities are doing their best, but the great stumbling block is the inertia of such great numbers of the rank and file, some of whom wait for their rigging to be provided for them, while the rest, worse still, do not even take advantage of it when it is offered to them.

It is to these ringers that we would at this time appeal. A little individual effort on the part of everyone would make all the difference to the success of the work of the men, who, year in and year out, devote their time and energies not only to promoting the art of ringing, but in endeavouring to widen the interest of the ringers and the scope of ringing in every tower. If, in this new year, everyone who puts his band to a rope would also put his shoulder to the wheel of his association's chariot, every organisation would have a vastly different tale to tell in twelve months' time, and the problems which we have enumerated above, and others which we could name, would be in a fair way of eventual solution.

The first peal on the twelve bells at Lincoln Cathedral was dumg on Saturday, and was a noteworthy performance. Under the conductorship of the Master of the Lincoln Diocesan Guild, a Lincolnshive band rang their first peal of Camhridge Surprise Maximus. in the one or two previous attempts that had been made, success elnded the band after it had appeared within grasp.
The peal of Bob Major at Tipton on Saturdry was rung as a mark of appreciation to Mr. Alfred Rowley, a prominent nuenber of the Stafford Society, who has completed thirty years' service as a pinger at the 'Pcpperbox,' and during the last few years has been Ringing Master and towerkeeper. Mr. Rowley, who is an employe oi the Birmingham Canal Company, las recently been trausferred from Tipton to Briceley Fill. His duties at the latter place campel him also to reside in that district. The hand who rang the peal extend their best wishes to Mr. Rowley in his new abode.
Ringiug couditions at Folkiuglam, Liucs, have beau greatly improved by the addition of an extra fleor.
Mr. John Cobbe Pitnan, son of Mr. W. E. Pitman, Mus.Bac., organist of St. Gregory's, Ciuterbary, and well knowis in Fent ringing circles, has been ordained deacon at Lichfield Cathedral, and becn licensed to the curacy of Heduesford, Staffordshire.
The first time that Bow tenor was turned-in to a peal of Treble Bob Royal was on January 3rd, 1803, when it was rung by James Malton.

On January tyl, 1784, a peal of 14,480 Bob Major was rung at St. Paul's, Oldham.
The first peal of Oxford Treble Bob Maximus on the bells al St. Martin's-in-ithe Fields was rung on January 6th, 1785 , by the Aacient Society of Colloge Youths.

Fenry Johnson, the farmous old Birmingham composer and ringer, dibd at Aston on Jauuary 7th, 1850. January 5th is the amiversary of the death of another notable Birmingham ringer, Tom Roynolds, who died in the year 1912.
Alf Grimes, of London, who made a personal recard in peal riaging, by scoring exactly 250 in two years, died on January 5th, 1917.
The first peal on the bells at Cirencester, which, as mentioned last week, have the longest unbroken history as a ring of lwelvo in the provinces, was rung by the Coflege Youths on Jaunary 7th, 1767. This was a peal of Grandsire Cingues.

## A DEVON RESTORATION.

## WHIMPLE BELIS REDEDICATED.

The recledication of the ring of six hells at Whimple, Devon, took place on Saturday week, and great interest was displayed in the event, both by parishibners and by members of the Devon Guild of Ringers. It was the consummation of several years of earnest effort, particularly on the part of Miss E. Lamas, who is hon. secretary of the Exeter Branch of the Devon Guild, and who las acted as hon. secretary of the Bells Restoration Committec. The bells had not been rung for several years hefore 1924, but in that year Miss Lumas started a ladies liand of ringers in the village. But their efforts were handicapped by the fact that the bells were badly in need of repair. Instruetors of the Devon Guild, who went to the help of the ladies, urged the necessity of a rehanging scheme. Miss Lowas approached the Church Cotneil on the matiter, and obtained its consent to getting estimates for the work. A committee of three members of the Chureh Council was then formed; of this Miss Lomas is now the only representative, one member being deceased, and another having removed from the parisl. The amount of the estimates causeri a good deal of scepticism on the part of the Church Council, and, indeed, the whole parish, concerving the possibility of raising enotgh money. However, a fund was started with moneys from jurble sales organised by Miss Lomas and her family, assisted by friends. Early in 1928 the Church Council definitely undertook responsibility for the scheme. A committee, comprising 30 members, sas formed, and the money required was eventably raised, from subscriptions, sales of work, fetes, etc., while members of the Devon Guild contrilsuled eqze. The total cost of the work has been £306, and it has been carried ont by Messis. Taylor and Co. with their customary efficieney. An cutirely new steel frame, carried on firters

Has been provicled, the old fourth, which was badly out of tune, has been recast, and the others taned. The ring has been rehurg in now fittings, and Whimple has now a greatly improved peal of bells. Of the original six bells, the back four were mediaval, although their actual date was unknow but eventually it had to be reatst on aconmt of the additional expense which would have been involved by the provision of a new hell, The trobles wero east in 1886.
Sit Hemy Imbert-Ferry, who has associations with the parish, put forward a proposal whereby whimple might have acquired eight bells that were given by members of his family to a London chureli that has been seheduled for demolition, but the difficulties and delays were regarded as almost insuperable.
There was a large attendamee at the special service of dedicntion which was eonducted by the Rector (the Rev. E. A. Jullyan). The other elergy present were the Dean of Exeter (Dr. Gamble) the Rev. E. S. Powell (president of the Devon Guild), the Revs. E. Y Cox (chairman of the Eyeter District of the Guild), T. Caldwell (Rockheare), and z. F. Prowse (Luppitt). The processional hymn, 'Angel voices ever singing, was follower by the 84th Psalm. The lessons were read by the Revs. E. V. Coy and E. S. Powell. The Dean, clergy, and choir proceeded to the ringing chamber, where the Dean, at the invitation of the churchwardens (Messrs. F. W. Dyer and G. M. Steuart), redericated the bells, and some rounds were rumg by local ringers-Misses R. Manley and E. Lomas, Messre. S. Please, F. Coleman, G. Hamilton, and J. Coleman. A relative of Mr. Stowel] acted in the capacity of subsintute for the Christmas Day ringinf at Brislington, and the rope of the bull which he rang broke at alowost the first pull. This is, fo say the least of it, a very tragic coincidence.

## NEW EDITIOS DF A LSTIFLL PUBLICATLON.

The second edifion of the 'Directory of Chureh Bellringers ' has brat isturd by the Briatol thiterl Ringing (anilas. It is nearly treble 1.he size of the lirst edition, and it is certuinly more thatu three times :ts iseful.
The alplanbetical list of rimger's lias expanded to twise its previous lenglu-a practical testimony to the value which ringers place unon this work. The classifeation under nussoviations, which is by no aterns a simple task its the existing conditions of overlapping among many ringing organisations, has been revised, and in its present arrangement is a considerable improvement upan the former publication, in whels the names were atrouged under geographical divisions. In in ${ }^{4}$ great, many cases the unaher of hells, the weight of the tenor nut the name of the tower senreaty is given, thus providing a most usurul means of referenee tor a ringer desirous of visiting any place ontside fis own area. The untues of nssociation officials are also given, ame in many eases those of the district officials as woll, so thun the Disectery is growing inta the conplete work of veference which the promaters fiesire lo make it.
A new seethon gives the numbers of rings of bells in the areas of the varion associations, so fir as it has heen possible to compile then from afficial roturns available. Those retums bre not quite wanplete, bul so far as they have been compiled it is interesing to learn that there are nearty 3,500 rings of bells, from 5 to 12 , coming wilhin the influence of the recogniser associations. Aecurate statis lies of this kind are wery difievitt to obltain, but with the assishance
associntion officials donbleas chis interesting table will eventually orvite us with reliable information.
III the carly stages of a ventire such as this, zhany difficulties have in he faced, and whilos it thay he ensy to suggest further improvements, it ruse be recognised that the compilers have placed ringers namber a deht of gratitude fur the way they lave placed the Directory before the Exercise. They are most ansious that ihe pultication shiculd be ant only reliable ittul ust tomprellensive as possible, and ringers himaclves can make it so ligt giving the ventare the support which it rleserves.
The Bristol United Guilits Committec, in their preface, ask subsetibers to visualise the vaat anmunt of work and time given by six Hemalners of the Chited Guadds to rompile the work, and the untiring cforms of the whale ebmater to hring oul a hook ihat must of nstessily be axtreacly useful. We doulh, howerer', if anyone except Hose who have appliof themselveq to the task, wifl fully realise at1 that the publicatiou has meant to those who have carried out the lask. When the sthene for a Directury was initiated, it was started with $\pi$ feeling of optimisur. and that optimism, we are sure, was not mi-placed. The Directory fultils a monst useful purpose, and with ench sutceeding edition, will grow more and more indispensable.

## To the Edifor

Duas Sir, -I am much obliged both to you for your leading article an 'Condlitions for peals," and to Mr. Trollope for his "Notes by the Way, dealing with my inquiry as to ringing both Rob Minar and Grandsire Douhtes in one peal, but no one has yet roplied to mus other question as to what actually constitutes seven different 720 s. May I repeat the inquiry? Does it meall that there must be soven differeal campositions, or conld the same composition be nsed, making a diffecent bell the observation, which wouth tbus prodtre The 720 clanges its afferent order?
I have discussed the question with two ringers who are looked upon as leading mos its our district, and they have given me different nuswers. One said, 'Seven different 720's" means 'sewen difterent compasitions'; the other pointed out, logienlly I think, that if the ehanges come up in a different order they nust be different 720 , so far as it is possible for one 720 to diffeu from another. He further argued that if it 720 of Bob Minor ealled W.R.W. with 4 th the whservation was the anne as a 720 with the 6th called W.R.W., then it was not possible to say that 720 of Bob Minou and 720 of Oxford Bob, buth calked W.R.W., were different 720's.

If $I$ may vencum to put forward my own very bumble opinion, $720^{\circ}$ s in which the sume calling is used, but from different observation bolls, ane as much entitled to bo called different as are peals of Doubles to the deseription of having heen rugg will 'ten different six-scoves, when actarally there arc only two sets of calling, begun dither an a different place or with a different bell as the observation.
It soma obvious, howerer, that there is a clivergence of opinion on the matticy, and our baud would like to see it cleared up. it may lie that all that is mecossiny is that those who record peals of Mitor should distinguish hetween 'Seven different 720's" and 'Seven diferent compositions. - Fours fathfully,
