'The Church Bell Nuisance ' is not infrequently in the public eye in these days, through complaints ventilated in the press, and a handful of vocal objectors can give a seeming importance to a view which, in reality, is held by a very small minority of people. The 'other side,' the people who find no annoyance, or who like to hear the bells rung, are seldom heard, unless it is to correct gross misrepresentation, which protesters seem curiously inclined to make when writing about these things. It is distinctly refreshing, therefore, to find a spirited protest against the banning of church bells being made, not in the press this time, but in the public arena of the council chamber. Salisbury Town Council decided to sell to the Bishop of Salisbury, for the purposes of a church, a site on one of their building estates, and a few of the members endeavoured to insert a condition that there should be no bell ringing in connection with the church. The opposition developed mainly against the use of a single bell, one of the objectors remarking that he would not mind if the church had a peal of bells. Other speakers, however, ridiculed the suggested restriction, and Alderman Wort delivered a slashing attack upon the imposition of any condition with regard to bells. 'Considering the way some people now spent Sunday,' he said, 'they would not know it was Sunday at all but for the bells. It would be a bad day, not only for Salisbury, but for the world if they did away with bells.' The motion, even to debar the use of a single bell, was lost.

To those who are lovers of bells and who have an interest in the art of ringing, this debate and decision of Salisbury Town Council has a wider significance than the mere attempt to prevent the use of a bell in a church on a Salisbury building estate. It is an inciication of the spirit in which the people of this land regard their church bells. A few objectors may complain of their use and cynics may sneer, but the vast majority of English men and women would not lightly permit the bells of this country to be silenced, gad, as at Salisbury, would be quick and emphatic in quashing any such proposal if the question were raised in a way which gave them the opportunity of expressing an opinion. The real danger to the ringing of bells lies in the 'back door' methods which might at any time be opened for their suppression, through, for instance, a general and innocuous looking clause of an Act of Parliament, which gave power to some departmental chief to make any addition to a schedule of prohibited acts, by which bell ringing might be included (at the instigation of some crank or other), and become debarred by law before its inclusion

was realised and there was time for legal objection to be made. The Central Council is fully alive to this risk and its Legal Committee has been kept in being largely to watch this matter. There is no risk of any law-made interference with bell ringing if it is left to the decision of the public, who, at heart, love to hear bells properly rung; but under the present system, by which a great deal of legislation is carried out by delegated authority, the views of an active minority can very easily become the law of the land, unless there is unceasing vigilance.

## NORWICH DIOCESAN ASSOCIATION

AMENDMENT OF RULE REGAIRDING PEALS
The annuml general mealing of ine Norwich Diocesan Association was held at Norwich of Easter Monday. The members began the day by ringing touches in various standard methods at the churehes of St. Peter Mancroft (12), St. John de Sepulchre (8), St. Michael at Coslany (8) and All Saints" (5). The exceutive committee held a moeting in the choir vestry of Sl. Peter Mancroft at 11.30 a.m. to consider an amendment to association Thule 10, to present to the members at the general meoling in the afternoon. This rule provides that peals shall only be recorded in the annual report at the cost, of the association if every ringer taking part in it lias pairl lits or her subscription either for the current year or for the prepious yem.
Divine serfice was beld in tho Church of St. Peter Mancruft at 12.30 p.m., conducted by the Rev. Hugh McMulian, M.A. (Viqnr). The address was given by the Ref. B. H. Tyrwhitt-Drake, M[A. Rector of Watington, Norfolk, who said that the fascinatian of ringing was tlic perfeet combination of body, mind and soul-body, becanse you had got to train your museles and everything to l'espond to the need of the belfry; mind, because you bad gol to work with the team, and had to keep your attention the whole time; and soul, because it was done for a religions purpose, to call people to ginurdi.
The luncheon was served at the Bell Hotel, Orford Hill. The president, the Archeleacon of Narwich, was ir the chair, and among others present were the Rev. H. MeMallan, the Rev. B. H. TyrwhittDrake, Mr. P. E. Scwell, Mr. C. E. Borrott (vice-president), Mr. A. L. Coleman (general secretary end treasurer), Mr. G. P. Barton (hon, auditor), Mr. Denisoc Hayward (chairman, East Norfolk Rranch), Messrs. W. B. Duncan, W. J. Iee, F. Nolan Golden, muä̀ W. J. Eldred (branch seeretaries), and Messrs. J. F. Duffeld, W. L. Duffeld, W. C. Duffield, R. W. Gooke, W. Clover, J, Taylor, H. R. Heyhoe, C. J. More, C. T. Goodman (memberg of the committees), besides representatives from all parts of the Diocese of Norwich and from Sulfolk, making a total of 57.
The only toast was that of 'The Kinga' which was proposed by the president and duly honotured.
Then followed the business meeting.
The annunl report and balance sheot for the year endiug Decomber 31st, 1929, were adopted on the motion of the Vicar of St. Peter Mancroft, seconded by Mr. W. B. Duncan.

GOOD WORK SINOE REORGANISATION.
Mr. A. L. Coleman (goneral seeratary) seid that he would like to refer to the spleadid work that had been done since the reorganisation of the association into four bramohes. The scheme had only come into force this year, and they wore fortunate in having gead sectetaries and enthueiastic chairnen. Already this year eadh brand had held two mectings wilh one exception. The atterdances of members had bern above the average, and so also was the ringing. Anather good result of these mectings liad been the election of twenty-six new members. Hr. Coleman said he felt sure the association would appreciate the good work the branch secretaries had afready done in so short a time.
The Presideat said he had been able to help them as editor of the ' Norwich Diocesars Gazette, and had got Mr. Coleman to write an article for it about bells and belfries. Atl the clergy were supposed to read it, and he hoped they had noticed what Mr. Coleman liad to say. The article was so imporlarat that he would be commenting on it in his charge to the Archdeaconry of Norwich. He did not know that they lad always done their duty as regards the bells. The secretary thought that those who went to inspect lhe claurches--they had inspected forty enurches this year-ought to climb up into the belfry. 'Who is going to insure us, asked the President, 'and what sort of insurance is it to be? Some of these belfries are terrible places' (laughter). 'I have elimbed up a good many,' added the President, ${ }^{\text {and }}$ anye eren got amangst the bells; but as I get older I don't feel inclined to elimb, (langhler).
The president was re-elected with enthusiasm, the Vicar of St, Pater Mancroft, in proposing the Archdeacon, remaring that he wis the only ane who could possibly fill the positiont (applause). The hon seeretary seconded.
The Presideat, in acknowledging his olection, said he regarded it a privilege and honour to hold this office, which he thorouglny en-joyed.-On the motion of Mr. B. S. Thompson, secoaded by Mr. A. L. Coleman, the vice-presidents were re-elected with the addition of the name of the Rev. Hugh McMullan, Vical of St. Peter Mancroft. On the motion of Mr. G. P. Burton, seconded by Mr. F. N. Golden, Mr. Arthur L. Coleman was re-elected general secretary aud treasurer, tributes being paid to his enthusiastic work.
Mr. G. P. Burton was re-elected hon, auditor, Mossus. Charles E. Borrett, Arthur L. Coleman and F. Nolan Golden were appointed representatives to the Central Council.
It was resnired that Miss Hejen W. Bill, Mr. H. I. Heyhoe and Mr. James Taylor be efected to fill the vacaucies on the Exchative Committee, the remaining four being re-elected.

PEAL RINGEKS' SUBSCRIPTIONS.
The General Sceretary moved the rafification of three belfry elections and the elections of four new members. The Secretary than
presented his amendment to Rule 10 , and said that it had been considered and passed by the Executive Committee at their meeting. After a debate, ju which geveral members took part, it was resolved to amend the rule as follows, after the word 'association': ' But no peal shall be admitied undess overy ringer taking part in it has paid his or her suluscription by January 7th of the year following the date on whicl the peal whs rung, conductors or organisers of peals to be held responsible for the due observance of this condition.
On the motion of 3ir. A. L. Coleman, seconded by Mr. G. P. Burton, it was resolved that standing orders be suspended in order that the amendment may become eftcotive from that day.
Mr. A. L. Coleman moved, and Mr. H. R. Heyhoe seconded, That the Branch Rules, as published in the Annual Report for 1929, on page 6, be confirmed. -The motion was carried.
On the motion of the Prosident, a vote of thanks was passed to the Vicar of St. Peter Mrncroft and to the incumbents of the churches of St. John de Sepulchre and St. Michael at Coslany and All Saints for allowing the use of their bells, and also to the Rev. B. H. Tyrwhitt-Drake for his address at the service. The Rev. Hugh Mediullan, in reply, said it had beon a great plensure for him to welcome them that day for the first time as the new Vicar, and he hoped it would not be the last, When they came to St. Peter Mancroft they would always receive the warm welcome they had always had. He hoped they would always look mpon it as the home of ringing in Norfolk. He had no technical knowledge of bellringing, but wancroft bells were to him a tremendous joy.
A surgestion by Mr. Ti. Nolan Golden, that the tablet recording that the first peal ruag by the association was in Redenhall Cburch should be renorated, was favourably received, and zeferred for further consideration. The peal recorded was 5,152 changes of Superlative Surprise Major rung on Tuesday, November 6th, 1877.
Mr. G. P. Burton moved a vote of thanks to the president, to which the Archdeacon of Norwich suitably responded, and then declared the meeting closed.
The members afterwards dispersed to the warious belfries for furlhor rimging uatil the evening.

## TOWN COUNCIL IN FAVOUR OF CHURCH BELLS.

## A POOR GETY AND A POOR WORED WTTHOUT THEM.

Salisbury Town Council last week decided to sell to the Bishop of Salisbury a site for a new church on Iand in Strationd Road. The Fand wha originally purchased from the Ecclesisstical Commissioners on favourable terms for a housing scheme. The price to be charged is $\mathbf{x} 2$ per foot frontage.

An attempt mas made to make it a condition of sale that there should be no bellringing in connection with the church. Mr. Lemon, who propesed this condition, said no one objectex to a chime of bells, but some stimulation should be made when the land was sold that there should be no bellringing until a proper ohime was pravided. If they would do this he had no objection, but that a singla clang slould be rung for half an hour or twenty minutes before a service was an obnoxious thing.
Mr. Eudson said that, heving lived near one of these bells, he wanted to have a word on the matticr. The valuo of their properfy Would depreciate through having a church with such a bell nesr. It was new a peaceable part of the eity, but if they wore going to have a boll rung like it was at St. Mark's, he was quite sure folks would not go to live there. -Mr . Moore also supported the mocion.
Alderman Baker said that during all the 27 years he had been on the Council he had never heard such a vidiculous resolution. One of the traditions of the Ghurch was that there should be a bell to call people together, and he did not see why there should not be one.
Mr. Moore: If they would undertake to have a peal of bells I would not mind.
Alderman Wort said that he had been nearly 21 years on the Council, and he had never heard a more ridiculous stipulation. It was a good thing for everyone that on the Sabbeth day they slould hear the bells ringing, becatse, considering the way some people now spent Sunday, they would not know it was Sunday at all but for the bells. It would be a bad day not oniy for Salisbury, but for the world, if they did away with bells. Mr. Hudson had said that the property would depreciate by laving the bells there; lie thought it would be a big advantage. Some people had some mad-brained ideas in their heads, but he had no use for agnosticism, and sooner or later they would find there was only one Pilot in this world. It was all very nieg fon people to talk, but if they debarred a church from being built on the site, and deprived the people of having the pleasure of hearing the bells, it would be a poov city and a poor world.
The motion to debar the ase of the single bell was lost.

Next Wednesday, May 7th, is the anaversary of the 10,170 of Keut Treble Bab Major rung at Foxearth, Essey, in 1888. Only two of the band naw survive, namely, Messms. John Lee, of London, nid Geo. Maxim, of Cheshunt, both natives of Foxeartl.
On Easter Mouday, in the year 1889, the Gloucester and Hristol Assachation ratg a peal of 15,227 Granesire Caters at Oheltenhas the conductor of which, Mr. W. 'T. Prtes, is still, after 41 rears, the active head of ringing affairs in Cheltenham tower. Most, if not all, of the others have passed away.
To-day is the 215th anniversary of the first peal of which there is any authentic record. It was a peal of Grandsire Boh Triples, rang at St. Peter Mancroft, Norwich, on May 2ad, 1715, anll the peal hoard is still preserved in the famous belfry.

On"May $5 t_{1}, 1817$, a peal of 12,312 Grandsire Caters was ring at Painswick. There must have beon more 'long' peals rung in this famous Qloucestershire tower than Rnywhere.
Obe hundred and fifty years age next Wedneadry the first peal ( 5,040 Boh Major) at Harrow was rung by the London Youths, who included John Reeves.

## THE TWELVE BELL RECORD.

UNVEILING OF PEAL TABLET AT ASHTON-UNDER-LYNE,
A permanent record of the 15,312 Gambridge Surprise Maximus, which was rung under the auspices of the Lagcashire Association by a mixed band at St. Michael's Church, Aghton-under-Eyne, on August Banf Holiday last, has been placed in the belfry at that church. The record is in the form of a handsome black marble tablet, framed in oak, with lettering in gold, the sime of the tablel being 42 juches Dy 24 inches.
The unveiling took place on Easter Sunday after evensong, when the mhole band were present, besides many members of the local society and an number of friends from the surrounding district. On behalf of the band, Mr. C. T. Coles requested the Rev. S. Lane to acospt the tablet, and the latter gentleman, in the unavoidable absence of the Vicar (Canon A. W. Thompson), then dedicated and umviled the record of the peal. Mr. E. P. Duflield thanked the Rev. S. Tane for taking the scrvice, and once mora expressed the gratitude of the band to the Vicar and churchwardens for allowing the peal to be rung.

The ringers were met at the former place by Mr. J. Mallalieu (churchwarden), who wished them success on behalf of the Vicar and his fellow-warden. The bells, which were recast and rehang in hall bearings by Taylors in 1923, are a very fine peal with a tenor of 35 owt., but a movement in the tower cioes not lielp to make ringing an easy bask, especially for the two 'heavy-enders.' However, Mesiers. E. P. Duffield and W. Pye Fept their bells well in hand, and after four hours' good ringing the bells ian into rounds shortly after moon. Hearty congratulations wore received from a large number of friends, and Mr. William Perkins, J.P. (who was treasurer of the restoration fund in 1923), kindly provided very welcome refreshment. Before leaving Oldham, a photograph of the band was taken, and is reproduced on this page.
Macclegficld was reached at 3 p.m., where Mr. W. Walmsley recelved the band. Here there is one of Taylor's best peals, tenor
at Easter at the scene of their great achievement, and to be photographed. One of the remarkable featutes nboul the performance was the fact that it was not the zehiewement of youtl-as records usually are. Only one of the twelve is under 3n, ath only three others under 40 . One was oyev 60 and three others ovur 50 , the average age being 44.

George R. Pye (Chadwell Heath), Jrd, age 57, peals rung 1,229 conducted 205; rang in the 15,072 Donthe Norwich Major at Frith, the 14,112 London Surprise Msjor at Kingrs Norton, the 11,111 Stedman Cinques at Birmingham, the 18,027 家tefman Caters at Loughborough, the 15,204 Bristol Susprise Major at Hormehurch, the 7,392 Cambridge Surprise Maximus at Bow, and the 70,440 caunbtidge Surprise Royal at Walthamstow; also has taken part in peals of 4 5, 6 end 10 Splieed Surprise Major nethode.

We understand that Mr. Fdwin H. Lewis, who is now living at Brasted, Kent, has been nominated as Canon Coleridges succesaor.

Mr. Hollier then proposed the election, as president, of the Rev, W. P. Cole Sheane, Vical of Twiekenham, Rutal Dean of Hampton, and a ringer, who had promised to take oflice for a year.

The concentration of mental energy necessary to bring this peal to a successful jsstur was onormous, and it was not arcomplished until several attempts had been made. This peal had been preceded on March 19tin by one in six Surprise Methofis, both being tonducterl fy Mr. W. Pye, and the association can proudry point to having rung peals in four, five, six and ten Surprise meath in farious sumsing anything ctone by any othez society. ## BELL RESTORATION.

As far as bell restoration work is concerned, Messrs. Gilleth and Johnston have recast the eight bolls at St. James', Clerkenwell, and have relung them in new fitings witll streugthened framowork. Clapper controls have been added to the treble, second, and tenor bells. The samo lirm have recently rehung the whole peal at St. Botolph's, Bishopsgate, and have rebuilt the iron fiame on now steel foundations. Messrs. Jolin Taylor and Co. liave rehung tho peal of eight at St. Mary Magdalene, Holloway, with new fittings. Mossis. Mears and Stainbank lidea rafited the eight bells at Heston in ball bearings, and have also added two trebles to the existing six at St. Olave's, Hart Street, the old bells being relung witin completely new fitings. This firm also have in hand the rehangine or the bells at St. Lawrenco Jewry, E.C., and St. Dunstan's, Stepney. The fund which is meing raised for the augmentation of the isleworth bells now stands at a total of £140, and further subseriptions are earnestly solicited.

Congratulations were extenderl to the Rov. A. H. F. Boughay, an esteemed viee-president, on abtaining his jubilee in the presiderey of the Cambridge University Guild; to Mr, H. A. Barneti, of Totenham, on reaching his 50th year as a ringer at thot church; and to Mr. W. Webl, of Fiachley, who in 54 years has not missed ringing in the New Year in his own tower. The failing bealth of Mr. T. Beadle is still a matter of concern. A practical method of showing sympathy for him in his long illness resulted in a sum of just over f20 being forwarded to him from his many friends, throngh the hou. secretary of the Soullw and WTest District.
'Sincero thanks were tendered to the many members who lava acted as instructors during the past year. This work is of the utmost importance, and members able ta assist the assoeiation's officers in this respect should get in toucl! with the hon. secretaries, who would be glad to find them something to do to help forward the progress of the nssoctation. The invaluable services rendered to the association by the joint hon. searetaries were also neknowledged. A great deal of their work was done silently and unseen. The members could best show their appreciation of their efforts ly supporting them at association meetings and by prompt payment of sulbscriptions.
In moving the adoption of the report, Mr. Coles called attention to the excellent way in whiclı it had been printed by 'The Ringing World." He had been able to find only one error in the whole of the 58 pages, and thet was a coman in the wrong place (langhter and applause). He aiso called attiention to the reprint of the report of tho Central Council's Committee on the Iaw relating to clurch bells, ringing and ringers. It was $n$ most valuable report, and was drawn up by three legal gendemen-theis late presidont, the Recorder of Lincoln, and Mr. D. W. Irwell.

## THE LATE MR. J. F. C. BAYLEY.

The death of Kr. James O. F. Beyley, briefly recorded in our last issue, removes a well-known figure from London ringing circles. Mr. Bayley, who was a member of the Ancient Society of College Youths, was for many years steeplekeeper at St. Giles, Cripplegate, where, when the bells were nat rung, he regularly chimed for the services. He was a born musician, and lad a collection of over 400 hymen tunes, which he played on the twelve bells. The music of these tunes he had written out by hand, and be played them strictly in accordance with the seasons and special days of the Church. His last performance was on Passion Sunday.
Mr. Bayley was formerly a partner in the firm of Smith and Bayley, printers, of Kennington, but retired some years ago. He was a Freeman of the City, a life member of the Guild of Fret men, and a great lover of old buildings.
He was a regular altar server on week days at the Church of St. Magnus-the-Martyr, London Bridge, and made an imposing figure in his robes.
Ho died, after only a few days' illness, aud was buried in tho Roman Catholic portion of Streatham Park Cemetery on Maundy Thursday. The Rector of St. Magus (Rev. Fines Clinton) officiaterl, attended by the crossbcarer, Mr. Greenwood, a grandson of Mr Samuel Greenwood, of Streatham ringing fame. The last rites were carried out with impressive ritual, and at the close of the service a party of ringers rang three whole pulls of rounds three times, and followed with a course of Stedmaz Triples un harebells.
On May Fth, Vespers of the Dead will be said at St, Magus Church, and at noon on the following day there will be a Requiem Mass at the same church, which will be attended by Wee family.
