## NEXT TUESDAY'S BUSINESS.

The dearth of motions put down for discussion at the Central Council meeting next Tuesday revealed in the first publication of the agenda, and which was commented upon by the President in his article in our one thousandth number, has been remedied by the inclusion of items permitted by an elastic interpretation of the rules. It did not, however, follow, because there were no motions for debate, that the Council would have little business to transact. The first session of every new Council always provides an additional amotnt of routine business which cannot be lightly passed over and this year, at least, the retirement of the President, and the election of a new occupant of the office, is hardly likely to be a purely formal affair. Then, too, there are the reports of the Connmittees to claim attention. Although this year there is not in view at the moment any burning question, like the Peals of Minor disputation which was brought to a head twelve months ago in the Methods Committee's aeport, the Council have an important question to decide in regard to the publication of the 'Collection of Minor Methods.' The issue of the complete work will be a costly affair, for in the revision of the Collection the Committee's anxiety to make the volume as full as possible has led them to expand it to more than twice the size of the original, and the Council have got to decide how far they can go in its printing, not only in regard to initial outlay, but also in providing a volume at a price that will be within reach of all who desire to possess it.

Three of the five motions on the agenda are put down in indefinite terms, and it is unlikely that any of them will go through without discussion. The suggestion that the Council should form a collection of lantern slides to illustrate ringing in its various aspects will surely commend itself to the members. The question of opening the door to motions in the name of affifated societies is one which we hope will be supported, at least in principle, even if its application may need modification. Of the other motions, the most important-indeed, the most important of all-is that by which discussion will be initiated on the subject of alterations in the rules of the Council, as suggested in "The Ringing World' last October. These suggestions were put forward as a means of drawing tighter the bonds between the Council and the associations, and of enabling the societies to have a direct voice in the affairs of the Council. There is a difference between a Council formed of persons chosen by associations, which are under no obligation to observe the decisions, and a Counctl formed of affiliated societies, who are pledged the accept the Councit's rulings. 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is a principle here which may well divide the Council, as also, probably, will be suggested alterations of the term of a member's election from three years to one year. While, of course, it is desirable that the practice should be uniform, it is not absolutely essential, and a satisfactory compromise, if one is needed, might be found in permithing societies to decide for themselves the period for which they elect their representatives. This motion is going to provide the widest scope for debate next Tuesday as far as can be judged from the printed agenda.

The new peal of eight bells which is to be dedicated at Westhoughton Parish Church, Lancs, on Seturday next, June 7th, at 3 p.mi, was cast by Taylor and Co., of Loughborough, and Lancashire wilt ihus have yet another of those fine and melodiaus rings which are the product the Loughborongh Foundry.
"A Shant Fistory of Bells,' the firsl iustament of which appenred in the May number, is being wruten for 'The Accessory ' (a mouthly trade journal for the Radio and allied industries), by Mr. J. R. Nichols, of Stamford, author of 'Bells Through the Ages.' Mr. Nichols bas also in hand a short series, eutitiled 'Britain's Bell Foundries,' which is to appenr in "The Mctal Industry,"
To-day is the 38 L h anniversary of the 16,608 Oxford Treble Bob Major rung, in 10 hus. 32 mins., at Debenham, Suffolk.
That number-it has previously been rung in the Kent Variationwas the longest peal of Treble Job until June 8ch, 1906, wheu 16,880 was ruug at Mottram, Choshire. This longer length, hawever, was rung on lighter bells, and occupied the shorter titne of 9 hrs. 40 rains.

It is 80 years ago next Monday that the first peal was rung in America. It was a landmark in ringing bistory. Tha peal was Folt's ten-part aud was rung at Christ Church, Philadelphia, on Sunfay, June $9 \mathrm{th}, 1850$.

A party of ringers was in the Siutes on a haudbell music ringing tour, and fiading two or three other English ringers living in America they made up their band: I'. H. Lesage 1, C. Rahill 2, T. (1, Wade 3, H. W. Haley (conductor) 4, J. Hewett 5, W. Lobb G, E. Sawyer 7, R. Dodd and J. Davey 8. Dodrl, who was a one-legged man, rang the tenor for 2 hrs. 15 mins., when he handed it over to Davey.

## RINGING PAPERS FOR MORE THAN 60 YEARS.

Mr. 'I. E. Slater, of Glemsford, in congratulating 'The Ringing World ' upan reaching its one thousandth number, informs us tindie has in his possession a thousand numbers each of 'Clurch BeIls,' the Eirst issue of which is dated New Year's Eve, 1871, zad 'Bell News.'

Before 'Church Bells' appeared, his father, Samuel Slater, used to take 'Bell's Life,' cut out the portions relating to riuging and paste them into a pocket book.

## THE BELLS OF ARKLOW.

Next Monday the Irish Association will visit Arklow for their annual meeting. The first occasion on which the association went there for its annual gathering was in 1901, when the late Earl, the honor of the bells, was himself present and presider over the gathering, which was atteuded by the late Mr. R. R. Cherry, K.C., who afterwards hecame Tand Chief Justice of Ireland, and several English ringers, who ut litat time were touring in Ireland.

GLOUCESTER AND BRISTOL DIOCESAN ASSOCIATION
THE QUESTION OF REAFFILIATION WITH CENYMRAL OOUNOIL.
The anmual general meeting of the Glotacester and Bristol biaeosan Association took place at Lydiney, Glos, on Satnday, May 31 st. There was an attendauce of about 75. The hon. secrefary and tumn treasurer gave reports of an excellent year's work.
The following resolution was unanimously adopted on the motivn of Mr. Dyson (Tewleeshury), seconded by Mr. Thomas (Forest): 'That this meeting strongly supporis the resolution cireulated by tine executive committee to all branchos and accepted by them with it very large majority, and in addition proposes that a small sub-committeo bo formed to approach the Central Council in due course for reaffiliation in accordance with tho resatution. Furthermore, the subconmittee be asked to prepare recommendations and report to executive, namagement and general moelings for discussion and decision.
This means that the association will reaffiliate to the Central Council as soon as the recommendations printed in "The Ringing World, October 18th, 1929 (No. 969 , page 665), are placed npon the official ageuda of the Central Council in striet accordance with the rules of the Conteal Council. It was accephed that, although an item appears in a belated agenda, it wauld not bo dischased by the Central Conneil according to their rules, nat even under fule 9 , as this quessinn is one afferting the rules.

A committoe was formed to draw up regulations for futuru alyitit tion, and to decide how far the association should go in guestions of finance and acecpting rules aud fecisions of the Council in future.

The following alteration to Rule 5 was carried unanimously, on the motion of Mr. A. Wright (Stroud), seconded by Mr. "1. Baldwyn (Gloucester)
*Rule 5.-That buaches of the association slaall be estathished in suilable areas and shall consist of one or moro raral deancries, mombors of which shatl elect their uwn chairman and secretary, unn bu conducterd in accordance with the rules get out under "Rules for Local Branches." The executive commatee may decide to twanfer a tower from one bruach to anollact, but their action must bo approved at the following geperal meeting

The following resolution to alter Rule 15 was then discussed:-
That any atcrations in, or additions to, the above rides shall only be made at an anmual or special meeting. Nat less than two monthas notice must be given of any proposed alteration, addition ar defelian to any of the above rales, or part thercot. A suggested amendment whs made following a letier reat from Rev. C. D. P. Davies, that if less than 150 mamber's atterded the general mesting then all business carvied out by them should be ratifed by the bremelies. It was annoumed that 75 per ceat. of the associacions adoped the rule as il shood at present, and it was telli Hagt this was sufficient guidance, and the resolution was fhorefore rejected by utanmous vole, conseçuently Rule 15 stands as hetone.

Mr. Boxell had been a member of the Wycambe belfy for many years, and hat had rung a good number of peals.

## FOUNDATIONS OF THE OXFORD GUILD <br> JUBILEE OF SONNIEG DEANERY. BRANCE. <br> ENTHUSIASTTC GATHERTNG AT WOKINGHAK

From 1880 to 1930 is a far cry, butt both these dates were happily linked logether all the jubilee celebration of the Soming Deanery Bytunch of the Oxford Diocesan Guild in St. Paul's Parish Chureh, Wakiaghan, on Empire Day, Saturday, May 241h, when veterans of the first commitfee, with their successors thvough the years down to the juniars of the present time, united in union and reubion. The event follows closely on the jubilee of the East Berks and South Bucks Branch.
T'lle Sonning Deanery Society was founded in 1880 with Mr: J. Walter, M.P. (of "The Timén') as president, Rev. R. F. Hart 1)uvis, who afterwards for so many jeurs did magnificent work for the Oxford Guild in various offices, as treasurer, and the Rey. J. F. Llewellyn, hon. secretary. The first towers to join were Arborield, Souning, Wargrave and All Saints ${ }^{1}$ and St. Paul's, Wokingham. In 1881 the society beratne affiliated to the Oxford Diocesan Guild, which was founded in that year and became known as the Sonning Douncry Branch. For ten years the clairman was the Rer. Dolben Paul. From 1901 to 1924 the Rev. R. H. Hart Devis lilled the office except from 1908-10, whell the Rev. F. E. Robinson was chaiman and Mr. Harl Davis vice-chairman. Canon Coleridge succeded Mr. Davis in 1924, so that trom 1881 the branch tas had only four chairmen. It has been equally fortunate in its secretaries, of which it has had only Jive, imollg them the Rev. E. E. Broome, who filled the office fimm 1892 to 1918.
The teature of the jubilee celebration was a thanksgiving service in St. Paul's l'arish Chureh, conducted by the Rector, the Rev. H. M. Walter (a son of the first president), and was well attended. Mr. A. H. Lusty, A.R.C.O., A.T.C.L., the organist, played suitable voluitaries aud led the singing with the olvan. Tho National Antherm was sung, it being Enpire Day, then the hymn, "Bright the vision that nelighted,' the massed voices combining with fine offect, as they did in ibe Creed which followed. Psalm 150 was then clanted, after which the Rev. A. F. Sheflield read the lesson from Hebrews xiii. 7-21. After, several prayers, the ringers' hymn, 'Unchanging God Who livest,' was rendered with spirit and forvour.
The Ven. Archdeacon of Berkshire, the Rev. R. Wiekham Legg, gave a very fine address from the pulpit. Dispensiug with, a formal text, les said thr first thing they wanted was to 'strike' the note of
thanksciving for all those engaved in the lite and work of their own thankgiwing for all those engaged in the lite and work of their own
Guild from the lieginning, Qor those gone to their resti who land done sol much for them, aiso thanksgiving that they were able to kcep their jubilee. I'liey could congratulate themselves upou thu fact that the Souning Deasery Society preceded the larger body, the Diocesan Gitid. Usually the procedure was the reverse, the smaller body growing out of the larger. They were further to be corly patulated that the jubilee was being kept al SL. 1'aul's, Wokingham, the same parish where their society started. Also, they were glad to see annongst them their bekaved chtsirman, Canon Coleridge, and they thanked God for his wonderfut recovery from very serious and dangerous illness.

## a training Place.

The Areldencon proceeded to say that the belfry was first of all a traiuing place. Many people imagined on seeing the ringers at work, so natural, simple aud spontaneous their efforts scemed, that all was fone quite ensily and readily. But skill in bellringing depended upon several things-upon being thorough and punctual, ind upon porsoverance atd practice-even drudgery, withotit which no good work Whes really tone, as in the ense of tho artist's picture and the sermons il the clergy. So wilh ringing skill depended on that wonderful rasential quality of the Clrisilian life-steady perseverance.
A remarkable thing about hellringers was the delightful and wonderful and oxtraordinary fellowship, camaraderie, existing among filum not only from befry to helfy, but the wotld over; aud, further, that same and ewcr-growing sense of fellowship between the
bedringer and the church, Especally shown when by the Enabling Act ringers might choose as 10 whether they came under the rule of the incumbent or of the Parochial Council, ther manimously decided or the parson, which slowed the increasing sympathy, fellowship and understanding between bellringers and clergy. Another very touching xhibition of brotherhood was the way in whict older members of the helfry looked after the younger members they were training, not ony in ringing hut in character and self-control ant self-discipline in fler to make life worlh living.
The Archdeaoon reforred to the bratherthood of the British Empire -is great responsibitity-anid added that they were members also of another brotherhood, greater than that of the British Empire-the Christian Church, spread all over the world with iucreasing power and tlominion, in spicit and corporate worship with ofher Christian men mad womint, as well an in their own homes. Bellringers liad olten wher duties on Sunday, and could not always aitend the churcla servine. Ringing meant oftcu a severe amount of physical and bodily strain, but the ideal of the bellringer was nol only to call others to worship God in His church, but to join in that worship with them.

Mny Gosl bless you in your work; may you realise more and more the dignity of it, that it is a real yocaliun and a veal privilege to whieh you are enlled; that the service you can "ender to the glory
of God and to Fis Church, and that by the ringing of the hells and your varied character and conducl in life you may be able to set forth the mystery of the love of Gord through Jesus Christ our Lard."
The address made a deep impression upon the large congregation, and sitowed a remarkable insight and symathy on the part of the speaker, who confessed lrimseli as 'not laving the pleasure and privilege ' of being himself a ringer
'Praise, my soul, the King of 'Feaven,' sung to the fine setting by Goss, was the concluding hymn, sung while an offertory was takea (realising £1 16s. Jl.) for the Branch Restoration Fund. The Blessigg was then pronounced by the Rector, the Rev. H. M. Welter, who had conducted the service. The Rev. C. W. O. Jenkyn, Master of the Oxford Guild, was also present and robed.

A move was next made to St. Paul's Parish Room (in lieu of the Rectory garden as swranged). All enjoyed tea, by the kind invitatiout of the Rev, F. M. Walter and Mrs. Walter. Mrs. Houlton was in clarge of the arrangements, and was assisted by the clurchwardens and Mesdames Newberry, Hyle, Parkey, Harwood and Miss Welb. Among the party which tightly filled the rom were Canon f. F. Coleridgo (elairman, Sonning Deanery Branch), the Rev. C. W. 0. Ienkyn (Master of the Guile), the Rev. H. M. Walter, the Rev. Lang (Rural Dean), the Rews. J. A. Anderson, W. T. Stubbs, A Manday, A. F. Sleffeld, L. R. Majendie, Mr. W. J. Paice (hon. sec., Sonning Deanery Branch), also Mr. A. J. Wright (treasurer) and Mr. R. T' Hibbert (secretary of the Guild), Mrs. Broome zurf Miss Roe, and Mr. A. Hill, of Wokingham, and Mr. T. Attwell, of Chiddingeold, late of Arborfield, the last-named the two survivors of the original committee, Mr. J'. Fuller (Wargrave) and olber old members, Mr. W. Houlton, aud Dr. Joyce (Reading)

The Rector welcomed the company nnd regreited that the weather prevented itre garden meeting as intended.
Canow Coleridge, after tea, presided at a vory pleasant gatheringMr. W. I. Paice (hon. secretary) nmounced apologics from Mr. Bohn Walter, who said it would have beon a wery great pleastire to have attended, and who congratulated the branch upon its well-maintaineas tradition since it started under the presidency of his late father, and he wished the society every prosperity. Mr. Walter also sent a telegram of best wishes. Other apolngies were from the Vicar of WarWedderbarn, Mr. A. Riddell, etc.
The Chairman referred to lis 25 years' comection with the deanery. He lad, he said, recently attended four ringing jubilees; He welcomed the two members present who were on fle original
 not know them.
Both gentlemen then rose, anid great enthwsinsth, and brieny pressed pleasure and thnuks. Mr. Hill said he was pleased to be present and to seo so many of the old faces of past years. He was pleased to see the yonnger generation frowing up to fill their places (hear, hearl, and to see the Guild advanced.
The Chaicman proceeded to thank the Rev. H. M. Walter tor the service in his chureh and for the tea. He referted to the presence of Mra. Bruome (whose hushand, the late Rev. E. E. Broome, was for so many ycars the brameh secretary), and Miss Roe, who had journeyed from Bath to be present (applause).
The Rey. H. M. Walter said it was a special pleasure to him to do what he had for the Guild, as he was so connected with their tradition. He remenlured the late Rev. Dolben Paul, the Rector of Bearwood, aud the two bellg of that church. The infaence of chmelh bells was peculiarly touching-their very sound revived so many memories. This was undoubtedly a poignant source of grief to many in the unhappy country of Russia. He thanked them for their appreciation, and regretted that Mrs. Walter was unable to be present.
The Master of the Guild then thanked the Acheteacon for his address; the two Wokingham incumbents for the use of their bells that day; also the organist and the organ blower of St. Paul's for their gervices. They were fortunate as a branch to lawe two rings of eight bells and two Rectors who so cordially welcomed bellringers (hear, hear). The Master referred to a paper read by Rev, H. C. Sturges at the Ruri-decanal Chapter, which was productive of something
really good and great. The Rev. R. H. Hart Davis took it up with a letter to the 'Reading Meroury,' and the result was the Soming Deanery Society, followed by the Oxford Guild.

## CANON COLERIDGE'S RECOVERY

In 1876, those ringers went to Bristiol, and the "Bristol Mercury" accorded them high praise. Their Guild had done something to promote change ringing gince the carly days.

The Rural Dean proposed thanks to the ladies and helpers at the tea.
'i'he Mayor of Wokingham, Alderman A. T. Priest, who was enthusiastically received, responding, asked to be allowed to speak not as Mayor but as one wha, baptised, confirmed, amd married at St. Paul's, Wokinglam, was very much atached to that church and parish, and was also a churchwarden and socretary of the Perochial Councll, etc. Ib was a reat, decp pleasure to feel that, ffty years ago, such a society of bellringers was formed in the parish. He did not know much about bellringing, but one could serve their church En other ways. For thirty-nine Fears, from a boy, he had heen conneeted with St. Panl's. He knew Mr. Fill and Mr. W. Houlton and many athers. He had leant from the Archdeacon's excellent address that, fortunately for the Parochial Council, it was not converned with the bellringers; that was the Rector's duty (laughter). Fe wished the branci and the Guild the very best success (applanse).
F. T. Hibbert, iu a racy speech, said lie hoped in a few years to become a 50 years member of the Guild, and teferred to the fact that this brancli had been as well gerved by its officers as any branch in this or any other Guild, motably by their suceession of seretaries-the Rev. E. E. Broome, Mr. F. Dentry and now by Ma. W. J. Paice (applase). He wished the branch success-it had not
math to foar, Might they wipe out the marks of their predeessors in euergy and campanology, in good living and charchnanship. 'I lope I will come to the centenary of this branch' (laughter and applause)

Mr. A. J. Wright also expressed his pleasure. The Sonning Branch wers one of the most progressive in the whale Guild, spending its money, well and wisely, He hoped that gablsering would prove a great incentive to the young faces ${ }^{\text {g }}$ present. He hoped they would see the next jubilee, more prosperous even than they wero to-day (applause).
Wine Secmetary then said the collection would give an impetus to Lheir Restoration Fuad now considerably depleted. He had tried His hardest to get many old mombers present. Those and the poanger members together were tremondously inspiring, causing than to 'thank God and take fresh courage' (applause).

## DOUBLES AND MINOR

I imagine that those people wha aro asking for a now rulo for penls on five and six bells think that it is guite an easy thing to draw one up. I have sean several atempts; I have yet io see one worth anything. Men know quite definitely dertain tinngs which they want to allaw, ol (and move usitally) certain things which they want to disallow. But whan they come to got their rule down in words it is tea to one that il will say something quito diferent from what fhey mean, and forbid what they want to allow, or allow what they wast to forbid.
The new rule of the Midland Counties Association is interesting. The truth seems to bo that there are certain influential nembers of that body who want to forbid the ringing of tho Morris und Pitman brangements of Ginadsire Dubles and the Bankes James artangement of Cambridge Minor. Iustead of saying so straight out, they have produced this new ruka. If that is the besi that can be done, the Central Council nueds no justification for leaving the question for the present an apen one.
Were I an ordinary nomber of tho association I should enter ans objection to Mr. Willsotis last peal of Trebte Ten on the grounds that it does not corply with the new rute As I am only a tife member, I may be told that this is mone of my busitess and be invited to keep my paws out of their platter. I must sun the rish. The M.C.A. is one of our leading associations, mat what they tho cannot but affect us others, Besides, l rather enjoy giving Mr. Willson good advice. It costs me nothing, and makes to feel good, like whan one gives a penny to a beggar in the street.
The rulo says bilat on seven holls a peal must consist of not tess than 5,040 true and complete clanges.' Whan the old ringers talked ahout ringing a true and complete poal, they Isnew what they mant and said what they meant, and wo know what they meani. Rut What, in the name of common senge, is a true and complete change? The statement is monsense. The rule also allows you to atid one shorter' touch fulfilling the above conditions'; one of which (there are only (wo) is that it must not be less than 5,040 cbantoos.
Then the splicing of old and even bell changes is forbidden. You may mot splice Doubles and Minor, or Triples and Major or Caters and Royal. And pray, why not? Because, I presume, these gentlemen do not like it. I do not know that I, personally, lave nuely usg for this kind of splicing; but other people liave rung jt, and 1 ennmet see why, if once you concede the principle of splicing you lanve any right to forbid a bend to ring, say, spliced Grandsire Catars and Bol Royal.
It is proverbially unsefo to prophesy, but I thisk the tendency in tho fatuve will be vather to loosed the rigid rules which for a long time have cantrolled medhod ringing. Time was, nud not so long ago, when you had a Plain Gourse built up in rigid fashion with a definite number of leads all alike, and you were allowed one sort of bob and one only. No doviation from thes was permissilile. Ehere were reasons for this, and those reasons can never be sel aside, but: they may be applied to different circumstances. Splieing has giver us a Plain Course quite different from the old sort of Plain Courses, and thers geems no reason why further development should not Lake place on thoso lines. A method has been rung (at least in touchos) where tho tenor is altematively a working bell and a cover. Why should such be forbidden $P$ Or aguin, it is guite good practice to ring Bob Minov and cyery time 5.6 dodge at home to interpolato a six-score of Grandsire Deubles. No one would say that these things are likely to bo very common, but they are very inleresting is a variation of ordinary vinging. And if a band chnose to ring hitent, varialion on cartli should they not?
Of course, it is against the Grandsire Doubles and the Cambridge Minor compositions that the pule is really directed. I have alreads said a lot about them and need ngt repeat. But this I will sily tor the five and six bell ringers: "If yau find these compasilions useful and want to ring them; if you would rather not be tied down to the monotony of the ald restricted callings, or if you wama rather ring Cambridge Minor with $5-6$ the right way and nat with a multitude of $6-5^{3} \mathrm{~s}-w{ }^{2} y$, then, ring them? Don't let a lot of eight and ten bell ringers, who do not understand your needs, dictate to you and roh you of your fights. It is youthat can setitle this matiter, not they.

Bd., and E4 5s. 11d. in the tweasurer's hands, the gain on the year's working being 5718 s .2 d . This is a record, and the committee wish to thank everyone who has helped to secure this excellent result.

BELLS THAT ARE NOT RINGING.
The secretary's report for 1929 stated that the membership increased by 29 , and all meetings were well attended, but the association needed more young blood to fill the positions in years to come held by the older members of to-day. In the matter of bell restorntion, not much progress was made during the year, but Shireoaks and North Collingham had since made improvements. Mr. A. Johnson proposed a vote of thanks to all the officials for carrying out their duties so well during the past year. It was also resolved that a vote of thanks be accorded to "The Ringing World, "The Newark Advertiser, 'The Retford Times,' and 'The Worksop Guardian" for publishing the reports of the meetings of the year, and 'The Ringing World' was congratulated upon reaching its one thousandth number.
A vote of thanks was accorded to the incumbents and wardens of East Retford, West Retford and Ordsall, to Rev. V. Dodd, the Rey. A. Parkinson, Mr. H. Blagg, to the eaterers and evergone who had made the day so enjoyable to all.

For many years the six bells in Great Bromley Church tower, Esser, lave been in a bad state although ringable: in fact, it could hardly have been expected that learners would stay long. Early lardt year tho churebwardens were appromeled, and one of them, the Iate Mr. Percy Crossman, of Great Bramley Hall, who liad already done mach in the church and rillage, agreed to bear the expensa of the complete relianging. Enfortunately, lie was taken ill and passed away before the work could be started, but it was his wish that the work should go on, and as the tenor was cracked it was decided to recast it. However, a faeulty could not be obtained for this without considerable restrictions, so the widow decided to havo a new tenor cast and hang the old one for tolling only.
On Wednesday, May 28 hh , a service was held to rededicate the bells, which hare been rehung on steel and iron frames with modern littings and plain bearings. The new tenor, which weighs 15 cwt., and is in the key of $E$, bears ihe inscription: 'Alfred Bowell, Founder, Ipswich, The gift of Percy Crossman of this parish, 1929. God bless all whom we call.'
Owing to the very inconvenient hour of the service ( 3.30 p.m.), not many ringers could be present, but after tea several came from surrounding districts.
