Our first privilege and pleasure at the opening of the New Year is to wish all our readers health, happiness and prosperity throughout 193I. In the depression and gloom which spread over the year that has just closed many ringers, unfortunately, shared, and the prevailing: industrial conditions have hit them severely. We hope that for all the members of the Exercise who have thus suffered and for their families the coming year will bring a speedy return to better fortune and a brighter future.

Broadly surveyed, the year 1930 was no less progressive from a ringing point of view than its predecessor, although in some respects the general condition of affairs throughout the country and the financial straits of many ringers have restricted their participation in the art in various directions. We hope, however, that the 'turning course ' has been reached and that with returning prosperity they will soon be able to participate as fully in ringing as their hearts desire.

Except for the lessons that may be learned from it, there is little to be gained from a contemplation of the past. It will serve a better purpose if we look to the future and plan for the days to come. Ringers, individualls, and as bands and associations, can do this, and there is useful work at band in all directions. The determination to progress and to make, and not to wait for, the opportunities to advance; the filling of gaps where companies are not up to full strength; the widening of the scope of methods practised; more efficient service ringing; more regular practice; more loyalty to one's association or guild. These are some of the ways in which ringers can help. There is room for improvement everywhere; let 193 see a determination made and acted on to effect it.

And while all this is being done, what about the social side? Sometimes we wonder whether ringers make enough of this phase of their association one with another. It is usually in those districts where ringers enjoy fraternal intercourse outside as well as inside the tower that the relations are happiest and the wheels of progress turn fastest. Those who know nothing of the social side of ringing, have missed half the pleasure which the art can provide. The man whose only connection with the Exercise is to rush into the belfry, ring and rush off again, may find a satisfaction in his achievement at the ropeend, but he does not enter fully into the pleasures which ringing can give, and which are got from the more intimate association with kindred spirits by a half-hour spent, after ringing, over a cup of coffee or a glass of something more potent, or by rubbing shoulders with (Continued on page 2.)

Henry Johnson, the famous old Birminglim ringer and composer, died on Jonuary 7th, 1890, at the age of 80 years.

The first peal of Grandsire Cinques at Cirencester, where the second peal of twelve bells in ribe country-Fork beitg tho first-was installed, was rung on January 7th, 1767.

he felt ha must come personally and congratulate the local ringers on their ene achievement, and heartily shook handi with Mr. E. Payne, the leader, on behalf of the band. He also shook haxds with 'Mary, on belalf of the ladies, and wished them all God-speed, a happy Christmas and a tlad New Ycar.
Ringing over, the party adjourned to try another "bell," according to the sign over the door, a 'blue' one, owned by one of the local celcbritics, Mr. A. Mansfeld. A certain well-known tenor man was overheard to remark, "This is the sort of peal I like. Where's the beil?' The Croftonian had brought his liandbelle, which were soon in requisition, and selections by Messrs. O. H. Webb, H. J. Poole and E. Morris wera boisticrously encored. 'J. O.,' by specin request, then joined in and gave his famous 'Graudsire quick Triples, ${ }^{\prime}$ and also a course of Rugby Triples Major!

Everyone was delighted with the restoration of Syston bells, and it was suggested that in the ncar fature an open ringing meeting should be held, which will be dity adertised in these coltums.

The exceptions are peals that come home at hand stroke (these are almost invariably in Triples, Caters, or Cinques), and a few peals in such methods as Stedman and Duflield, where the bells come home at a change in the division or six different to that in which they cone home in the plain course. [Where I speak of a peal, any touch of any length must also be understood.]

If you start at any other point, sily, at 16423578, and follow the tivuni round till you come back to 16423578, you will equally linve five thousand true changes (for it is only difference is that, as we surated nt a Inter point, wo shall get thoso chrnges and bobs now at the end, which before we got at the hegiuning.
But we must realise that the figures 12345678 nre symbols. We call the treble 1 nad the second bell 2 because it is convenient. For no other renson. We could call them suything we pleasedi-A.B.C., cle., for instance. Now stupuase we call rounds 184235 instead of 123456, why then we could start our peal where 104235 conies on the drum, and go on till 164235 comes up agniun and lave a true peal. It mast the true, because it is the same peal we wrote on the drum, and that, wo frow at the start, is thac. What we have cione is not to yary the peal, but to wary the musical notes we give to the syrubols It is .
It is but a slep further to alter fine symbels themselves. We can wall 2 in the original $6 ; 4,3 ; 2,4 ; 3,5$; and 5 we cas call 6 . Making Hesge allerations we can write our peal out afresls. It is still the satme peal, but we are now protucing difecrent rows.
Up to now we thave followed the different rows writion on our dram in one direction, hat it is obvious hint if you start from rounds and follow them the othor why fous, will equally reath rounds again and have all the ofve thausand true changea. It would be exacty the shme pent, hut hnckwards. It is counlly clear that if you writo 12345678 in place of the handsirate wow that comes before it (whetime it lwe 12436587 or 12346587 or 13246587 ) nand follow the peal bankwards, vola will have a true peal. This is the reverse rarintion, the same peal, but again nroducing different rows. It is also clear' that if we sfart from 86745231 aud go back wayda we slanll still have a true peal. This is another form of reversal, nind by it we can raverse the hohs al the Wrougs and Homes. Thus:-

## To the Efitor

Derw Sir,-I was interested to see the letter of my old friend, Mr George Baker, criticising the use of whs Before in Tutland Surprise and other methods.
Fir the sake of those ringers and conductors who are interested it this method, I should like to point out that there is considerable adrantage to be got in this class of composition.
The hob Before shartens the course by ane lead, cating out some of the work of the tenors on the frout; ju elso cuts out all the falsenese in Ruiland Surprise, making it possible to use courses having the bells in 5-6 reversed; therefore, you may hare a composilion having all the combinations of 4.5 .6 in 5.6 at the course ends (a rave fature in Suprise methods), and the Rnd end 3nd never behind with the tenor:
When this class of composition is uged for Double Oxford Major, or St. Clement's College Bob Mrjor, the lnad cut out by the bob at Before is the one when the tenor and 7 th would be making a five pull dodge on the front.
Of course, Mr. Baker is quite entitled to ilie opinion expressed in Inis letter, but, personally, I camat see why the bob Before should not be used, even if it does upset the symmetry of the work of tho tnesors, and I should like to remind bim that bols at "In" and -Fiftlis ' are rery much used in Lombun Surprise Major, also that Hhere are a large mumber of methods, ineluding Trehle Bob and Bristol Surprise, in which you cansot have any bobs at Middle, Wrong and Home without upsething tine synmetry of the courses.
