About elcen months ago 'The Ringing. World' set out to organise a national commetmoration of the tereentenary of liabian Stednan's birth. \&ast Saturday that work was completed, and we may, perlaps, be pardoned if we say that the success of our cellorts and the fulfilment of our aims is a matter of great gratification. No proposal ever put before the Exercise has captured the imagination of ringers as this schese has done. It has revealed a wonderful unity of purpose ; it has manifested too, the extraordinary place which Stedman retains, after a lapse of three centuries, in the appreciation of the Exercise. What Stedman did, he did purely for the love of the art; he coukl have anticipated nor reward except the satisfaction of knowing that he had done what in lim lay to preserve whatever knowledge of change ringing existed and to consoliclate its foutdations and extend its boundaries so that those who came after him might have a inore stable and more commodious structure in which to develop the science. There is a Iesson in this for all of us. Too many ringers in these days want their ringing provided for them; they are willing to take all there is to be got out of it, but are not so ready to put into it all of which they are capable. II everyone was imbued with the spirit of Stedman, and was anxious to leave the art a little better than he found it, in his tower, in his Guild, or in the Exercise as a whole, ringing would be all the better and ringers more efficient in the service of the Church.

There was a renarkable enthisiasm aloout last Saturday's gathering at Cambridge, and among all these present the day;, we feel sure, will remain an interesting memory. "Gratitude, thankoflering and thanksgiving'" were, as the Vicar of St. Benedict's Church remibeled the large congregation, the keynote of the service, and it las been in that spirit that the whole scheme has breat carried out. The commemoration proposals were: launclacd through 'The Ringing Workd,' but they coutd not have been carried to such a successfut issuc widyout the co-operation of the Exercise as a whole, and particularly of certain leading members of it, whot threw themseives wholeheartedly into the scheme, and have given unstintingly of their expert knowledge, time and labour, in order that nothing might be jeft undone which would ensure that the work of restoration should be as complete and effective as possible. In this connection 'The Ringing World' gratefully acknowtedges the assistance given by the president, the hon. secretary and the hon. librarian of the Central Council. Theeir work has been absolutely invaluable. Then, too, we have to acknowledge the enthusiasm, the courtesy and the help (Contimued on mage 790.)

of the venerable Vicar of St．Benedict＇s，the Rev．W． Greenwood，who has smoothed away difficulties，and， in fact，made the whole scherne possible．

From this time onward，as we say elsewhere，St． Benedict＇s will enshrine all our memories of F＇abian Stedman；it will be hallowed ground to ringers in the generations to come．The tower，already a national relic in the antiquarian sense，is now a national posses－ sion in the eyes of the Exercise．More than any other place in the kingdom will it be looked upon as the first home of change ringing，and，enfolded as it is in the bosom of the University，we hope that in the future it may be a training ground from which many young men may go out into the world to promote the art，as Sted－ man himself went out as a＇missionary＇＇more than two hundred and fifty years ago．If this end can be effected， the ringers＇national memorial to one of the art＇s greatest pioncers will be something more than an act of gratitucle shown in the restoration of an historical peal of bells；it will be a memorial in what we beileve to be the true Stedman spirit，namely，a means of difusing knowledge of the＇artes and mysteries＇of change ringing．

## THE CELEBRATION OF STEDMAN'S TERCENTENARY.

DEDICATION OF THE RESTORED TOWER AND BELLS AT ST. BENEDICT'S CHURCH. A MEMORABLE DAY AT CAMBRIDGE.
The tercentenary of the birth of Fabian Stedman was commemorated on Saturday. The centre ol interest was Canbridge, lut in many other parts of the country ringers joined in the celebration.

At St. Bencdict's Church, where the Saxon tower and the bells on wheh Stexman rang have been restored, a thanksgiving serviee was held and the work dedicated in the presence of a large grthering of ringers representative of the whole Exercise.

Ringers came from most of the counties in England and from South Wales; nearly every association and guild had one or more members present, and, having trod the hallowed spot which Stedman himselt had frequented, and joined in the inspiring service, those who were privileged to share directy in the commemoration will retain lifelong memories of the wonderful gathering which met to do honout to one ol the first and greatest pioners of the art of change ringing.

## THE COMMEMORATION SCHEME.

WHAT FLS BEEN DONE AT ST. BENEDICT'S CHURCH.
Nearly three bundred ringers from all parts of the country made a pilprimage an Saturday to the chareh which will for the future enshrine all aur memories of Fabiau Sfenman. In pioneer of the art and scienco of change ringing, in founder of the Exercise. Whe know lifta of Stedman himself, hut among the thdisputed facts of his life there is nothing more definite than that he was a ringer at St. Bencelict's Church. It was here that he practised the art in whieh he was destined to pluy so imporiant a part; it was liero that first was rung the incomparable principle which bears his varne, and it was these bells that enabled hin to slovelop the interent which eventurly prompted bin to write the first text books on the subject of bellringing.

But if to-day we know lihlle of the man himself-we caunot be cerfain evers of the place or date of either his hirth or death-we are happily in possession of material things with which he whs associated. There are still one or two cupies of the ariginal erlitions of his hooks; in St. Benedict's tower are five of the six holls upon whirh he rang, and they hang in the same frame in which they swurg when Fabian Stednall was a ringer in Canthridge. The tower itself, which was anciont even in htumun's days, stitl slande ns witness to the efficient eraftsmanslip of our Sinam forefalhers. Age, however, lati hegun to take its tall cracks lied doveloped fir its walls. The bells anal the bell frame thongh years of neulect hat also sumb into decrequitude. Fo longer was it considerad safe to ring the bellas -ancept for short periods wery occasionally, wheal it was desired that some signal laotomp shonk be shown in commerion with a parochinl or national event, they had remaineal silent, and only the teugy was chimed for service by 'clocking.'

## A NATIONAL RESTONEE.

Then came the year marking the 300th anniversary of that whint tradition has always associated wilh Stalman's birth; how better conlel the event he eommemorated than by restaring the bells? i, was a unique opportunity for the Excreisce, rut the suggestion put forward in the colnmans of "the Ringing Wornd ' hy the editor was seized by the ringers of the land and responted to with alaceity, Nover was any appeal to the Exercise so pupular. Assmciutions ruid Guilds, companies and individuals taok up the proposal in a way thation ant maie its success assured as a nationnl smeme. Carefully the ground was prepared. The sympathy of the ghures authoritios was fuvoked and readily given, and hare it should be mentiened that the Vicar, the ? ${ }^{2}$ ev. W. Greenwood, mot, only entered wholeheartesly inta the project, but gave invaluable assistanme in all the many deluils into which local considerations entered. In such a selname, however, there were othor bodies to be consulted, athd prejudices, if ans, allayed. The tower is not merely a parochial possession: it is a mational relic. Before any interference with such a haidding coald be made, the agrement of antiquarian authorities was almost imparative if tho assent of the Ecclesiastical Court was to lar fortheoning. The plans had, therefore, to he very carefully gone into, and it was this phase of the scheme whinh was kindly underfaken by Mr. Edwin 1t. Lemis, president of the Contral Comacil, one of line greatest living authorities on the ecry involved subject of the strains and stresses set up by moving hells upon the structure of chmelh towers. The result of Mr. Lewis' investigations was a seheme lo lower the brils 12ft, hencath their ald position, and to carry the frame on a reinfored concrate corhol courge sunning completely round the fonr walls of the building, thus bonding the tawer lingether and spremding the stresics mort evenly aver the whole structise. In addition, the frame was turned sa that the grebter strains were taken by the stronger walls, which was zot the case before the restoration. Whin tho work whas in progress the cracles in the walls were grouted witla eement, and the tower is stronger now than it has boen, probubly, for hundrods of jears.

## THE RESTORATION.

If we are to stek for the grounds of such a well-deserved propularity, we shall probulily be right in ascribing if cliciefy to the varied natare of its work, while at the same time its music bas a peculiat, sincolh and mellow cadonce.
We know the method, we love to ring it, but do we know the man whin proxuced it? We know something, but not much. "A printer in Canbrikige '-bat was his profession-but we do not know where he was actanlly from: there is 13 montion of his name in ang register in Cambridge: we do not know for certain whetler he was thatised, or whether lis mane was necirlentally omitied. Registers in those days weve only written up for the most part amually. [t may be that lis molher gave him birth in some outlying village with belter air and mare heallhy sutroundings, for, ahout the time of his birth the 1 'lague was anging in the town itself. We da not know. If we did, if only we knew the actual date and place of his birth or baptism, much that is obscure might be easily cleared up. Learthed men have dome their best, thej have searched the records and registers and rolls of Cambridge withant result. All we aro certain about is that he was ' $a$ printer al Cambridge, of necessity several years after his birkla. Of his earliest years we know nothing;
of inis latter mod we are no hetter informed. True, some 30 Jears ayo a will was promuced, sighed ly one labian Stedman, but on caveful commination aud aualyss we must come to the conclusion that in al! probability it was the will bf same other man. Our man whs ' printer io Cambridge': this man was connected with the Excise and lived in Loydon. 1 should like nysself to think that they were ona and the same. [ should like to think lhat Frbian Stedman, the printer ab Carnbridge, cume to London and was appointed head of the printing office in the Liscise and Customs Departement; that he hed a luerative post thader Government, and 'died in a good old age, full of tideles and honour" lutu tho evidenco is too dimsy to adiult of such a supposition. The will, however, is fill of interest. The tontator leaves numerous legacies to his bisters, pephews, nieces and great-nephew and aieces and to cousins; notling to wife or ctildrea, from which we may gather that he lised and died a bachelor -an isncle evidently mindrint of lis nearest refatives. He leaves smuller legacies to thoge with whom lie came juto daily contret-' to the maid who clears my ofice, to "the four watchmen of the pard," and, what is of most interest to us, to the poor of the parish where [ was born, $\mathbf{8 1 0}$, and to the poor of the parisll where I shall die, f5.' This $\mathrm{E}_{5}$ was duly paid by his executors to the parish of St. Andrew Undershaft in tho city of Lomdon. It appears in tho cliurchwardens' accounts. Thai he died and was buried there is certain. His eane is entered in tho registers, November 164, 1713, though no memoria] in stone or marble can lut traced. But, "the parist where I was hons," that is the point in question. If only we conld discovel that, we cuuld supply many after deluils. We could, moreover, say with absolute certainty whether the Fabian Stedman who was a printer at Camburdge' was one aud the same Fabian Stedman who was in the Excise in London and left a notable will, whose place of burial we know withoul guy manner of doubt. As it is, the evidence is not sufficient for adeguate proof. 'Ithere is a lesson atuaching to this will which ougirt to be learmt by all of us life lesson to be perfectly accurato and explicit in the suallest detail when making our last will and testament. We all ought to make our wills, eyen though the prossessions we wish to leave nre but of small jutrinsic vilun. 'The place of my birth, far example, is not sufficient. Wo slonal give the name of the parish, the mame and situation of the hanse on namber of the street. to be on the safe side. Athe if, for fostance, we should wisht to leave a small legaey in appreciation, say, of a valted serwant, who hat served fathfully lor perhaps the best patt of a lifetime, we should take care that the name is given in full, that the intended vecipient is mot deserihed as 'my gardener,' or' "my hentekeoper, ${ }^{\text {a }}$ alderwise long aud fuithful sorviee might be passed over, the exernturs paying the leyexy, as in duty bound, to him co her who held those positions on the way of the death of the lestatior, passibly having field them but a few weeks. The will would talie effect to theit funefit to the entire exclusion of those whose bencfit the Lustator 「antly, lout vinulz, imagincd he had sectured. But this is only advice given for what it is worth by and execator who more than wnes has been piszled to know and 'do the thing which is fight' in thes has been puzared to diredions.
With this cligressiou let us look at Fabian Stedman as the authou of his book, "Tintinnalogia, or the artes, mysterjes and famele of difusing of sweet musick. ' There is a delightul account given ins in Nr. Ennest Morris' beok, 'The Hishory and Att of Clange Ringing,' a hook which onglit to be in the possession of every ringer througiunt the length and hreaclif of the land-ar at least a copy for reforence should be deposited in every tower. Bxperience lian tauglit me that Prarochial Churela Conncils ure as reuty to supply vinging fooms for tho helfy as they sre to pravidic hym hooks and peaters for thes choin. Here in this hoak we ban yead a most instrudivo accomb of a visit paill ly Stedman to Leciecster in 1669, whern not only was our Jiero lomeurest ty the ringing of the bells, which during his visit - disconsed swent musick nightlie." lut was also entertainod "smpptuobslie, a lavge suw, as monoy wont in those days, being expended nis "meates, wines, beere, tobacen and pipes,' After attending mornitg service nt sit. Search, as I have gaid, has lmen diljgentls made in the registers of Cambridge with mo
result. Wauld it be too muth to ask the elergy of parish clerks of villages, say withun a 15 mile radius of Cambridge, to search their registers for the magic name "Tabiaus Stedman about tho years 1631 to 1713 for his baptism or burial, kud also the cluwchwandens' books for an entry made in 1713 as to the receipt of 810 for the poor of the parish? If only such entries could be found, much that is olsecure would at once come to light; incidentally tho gratifude of the whole Exereise would be tentered to hin who makes the dis. ecvery; richly rowarded would be to whu fuds them, he would ever bo assured of a warm plate in the hearts of all to whom the nante of Stedmani is dear. I can only say tilat it I lappencd to bo an incuribent anywhere in this notyhbourhood I should at once sot to work oul an investiogation of my church rogisters and parish books. I am fully persuaded that not a few of my clerical brethrers would do the same; slould they heas of wiat is manter they wound at oney respand, in the good old words of the Church Catechism, 'Fes, verily,
by God's halp so I will! May their searcl tio crowned with sucess!
