

A BIG PUSH.

The resolution passed at the meeting of the Central Council, urging affiliated societies to use their best endeavours to increase the circulation of 'The Ringing World,' brings pointedly before the Exercise the very important fact that the support given to this paper is, in plain language, inadequate. For a long time past many of those most intimately in touch with ringing matters have known that the support given to this paper falls far short of what might reasonably be expected from a body whose numbers are as great as ringers are presumed to be. The importance of a journal, not only to the advancement of the art, but to its very existence, is recognised by all who give the subject a moment's thought, and the risk that lies behind an insufficient circulation is causing grave concern to those who most fully realise what the plight of the Exercise would be without its own special organ. Hence the resolution which came before the Central Council and which it is hoped the associations and guilds throughout the country will do their best to implement. This resolution, we may add, was placed on the agenda entirely unprompted by us and we appreciate it not least for that reason.

Circulation is, of course, the life-blood of a newspaper, and in cases where that paper's appeal, as in the case of 'The Ringing World,' is only to a limited section of the community, it is of vital importance that the whole of that section, if they would serve the best interests of the cause they profess to have at heart, should support their specialised journal. It is only by this means that they can get the best return for the contribution they make. It is no exaggeration to say that if the Exercise were suddenly left without a paper devoted to its interests, it would be dealt a staggering blow. Ringing stands where it does to-day largely by the service which has been rendered to it by successive journals, which have appeared—and, all but one, disappeared—in the last sixty years, and yet there has never been a time when those who have sought to serve the Exercise in this direction have been properly, one might even say remotely, compensated, for the thought and labour put into it and the responsibility which has been undertaken.

This state of things is hardly likely to go on indefinitely. There has been an increased activity among ringers in recent years which has made extraordinary demands on the space available in 'The Ringing World,' and we realise that often ringers have had to go unsatisfied in the publicity which they have sought for their doings. And yet with all this activity and the demands which it has made, there has been but a trivial increase

in the support given to the paper as measured by net sales. As was pointed out by the Editor, in the statement which he made at Plymouth, there is only one way to meet this growing requirement for more space, and that is a larger circulation, sufficient to cover the cost of a larger paper. We have sufficient faith in the Exercise to believe that, if it sets its mind to the task, the increase asked for, namely, 3,500 copies per week, can be obtained. Such an increase would enable 'The Ringing World' to be permanently enlarged by four pages; it would provide space for much matter which now is reluctantly omitted and, what is more, the introduction of fresh features, which at present could only be included by the sacrifice of even more of the news. A great push is to be made to raise the circulation of 'The Ringing World,' Will all our readers put their shoulder to the wheel and get some non-subscriber to place a three months' trial order with his newsagent? This would be the quickest and most effectual means of providing the Exercise with a larger and better journal and making its future secure in the interests of the art of ringing.

MEMORIAL TO THE LATE REV. MAITLAND KELLY.

DEDICATION BY CANON COLERIDGE

The completion of the scheme for improvements in the chancel of Kelly Church, Devon, as a memorial to the late Rev. Maitland Kelly, Kelly Church, Devon, as a memorial to the late Rev. Maitland Kelly, formerly president of the Devon Guild, was signified by the dedication by Canon Coloridge at a service in the church on Wednesday, May 18th. The memorial consists of dark oak panelling covering the walls around the altar, and a pair of chastoly designed riddell posts tlanking the altar table. The top panels at the sides are carved with designs of the Devon Guild's device and acorn scrolls alternately, and with bells and pemegranates at the back, decorated in crimson and gold. An inscription on the north side centre panel reads: 'To the ellery of God and in memory of Maitland Kelly, Priest, horn August

gold. An inscription on the north side centre panel reads: 'To the glory of God and in memory of Maitland Kelly, Priest, born August 21st. 1842, died June 15th, 1929, Rector of this parish, 1905 to 1912. This panelling was erected by relatives, purishioners, friends, and members of the Devonshire Guild of Ringers.'

The church was filled with a congregation that included parishioners, the local band of ringers, the president (Rev. E. S. Powell), general secretary (Mr. T. Laver), members of the South-West Branch of the Guild, and a party of twenty members of the Central Council who came by coach from Plymouth.

Previous to the service the visitors and local ringers were entertained to tea by Miss Kelly in Kelly House.

'The service opened with the hymn, 'We love the place, O God,' followed by the Lord's Prayer, the Creed and the lesson. Canon Coleridge then pronounced the dedicatory words: 'In the name of the Trinity we dedicate this panelling to the memory of Maitland Kelly, a faithful servant of God, whose example we all might follow.' The congregation then stood for a minute in silence.

Canon Coleridge prefaced his address with the sentence in the Book

low. The congregation then stood for a minute in silence.

Canon Coleridge prefaced his address with the sentence in the Book of Daniel, x. 11, 'A man greatly beloved,' which, he said, applied forcibly to Mr. Kelly, who was, and always will be, beloved by those who knew him. The preacher traced his career from his hirth at Kelly, education and interest in bellringing at Oxford, curacy at Abingdon, where his good work was still remembered, his faithful ministry at Plympton St. Maurice, Salcombe and Ottery St. Mary, and in later years back to Kelly in retirement, though never idle, the counsellor and friend of all brother-ringers, neighbours and parishioners alike. It had been the speaker's privilege to stay with Mr. Kelly every summer for many years, and at every visit some incident or other would compel admiration of his upright and worthy character. The memorial they had dedicated that day was, he thought, quite the most appropriate memento that could have been devised, and right indeed that it should signify the deceased's great love for ringing and his devotion to the Guild.

Messrs. John Taylor and Co., of Loughborough, have been entrusted with the restoration of the ring of eight hells of St. Mary's Parish Church, Woolwich. The work includes the recasting of the tenor bell, tuning the others and rehanging the peal on ball bearings. There are at least three places at which Cambridge Surprise Major, Royal and Maximus have been rung by members of one association, in addition to the performances at St. Martin's-in-the-Fields by the Royal Cumberland Youths, mentioned last week.

St. Martin's Guild has rung peals of Cambridge Major, Royal and Maximus at St. Martin's, Birningham. The Lancashire Association has accomplished a similar performance at St. Nicholas' Church, Liverpool, Major having been rung on both the front and the back eights. THREE HALESOWEN RINGERS.

A CHURCH MEMORIAL.

There was a large attendance of bellringers from different parts of Worcestershire at a service at Halesowen Parish Church on Saturday, May 21st, when a tablet which has been placed near to the belfry to the memory of three old bellringers of the Halesowen band, viz., Messrs. G. N. Cockin, E. White and M. Hachett, was unvoiled and dedicated. Mr. White had served as a ringer for 54 years and Mr. Cockin and Mr. Hachett for 53 years, and by a singular coincidence they all died within a period of twelve months of each other. The tablet bore the following inscription: 'This tablet is placed here by members of the church in grateful memory of George Newby Cockin, born April 18th, 1858, died August 28th, 1929, Sunday School teacher for 45 years, bellringer for 53 years; Elijah White, born May 7th, 1844, died February 2nd, 1930, chorister for 21 years, Sunday School teacher for 35 years, bellringer for 54 years; Matthew Hachett, born October 18th, 1855, died July 16th, 1930, bellringer for 53 years; who by their work and character served God and two generations of their fellow-men in this parish.'

The tablet was unveiled by Mrs. Cockin, the widow of one of the three men, and it was dedicated by the Roctor (Canon H. C. A. Colvile), who was assisted in the service by the curate (the Rev. P. J. Martin). In the course of an address, Canon Colvile paid a tribute to the work of the three men, and said it was a singular thing that they should be such friends and associated in the belfry for so long a period, and then, within a few months, should pass on together. It was no common honour to have one's name on the church walls. The Church had been very jealous about allowing memorials

The Church had been very jealous about allowing memorials to be put on its buildings, but he did not think there could be a more worthy recognition of the work of those men, who had served with diligence and skill for over 50 years the town in which they lived and God. He had calculated that these men, in the course of their work as bellringers, must have spent at least 10,000 hours in the belfry, which was quite an appreciable slice of the working hours of a man. Quite a considerable portion of their life had been given to the service of God and their fellow-men.

RECORD SALES OF PUBLICATIONS.

The Hon. Librarian, in his report, said: There has not been much demand upon the contents of the library this last year, but the following works have been presented: A copy of Mr. J. A. Trollope's research work in connection with the history of the College Youths between 1755 and 1788; this has been typed by Mr. W. G. Wilson and is presented by the author. A copy of the History and Rule Book and the Service Book of the Ancient Society of College Youths, presented by the society. Twelve copies of the book, 'Bell Towers and Bell Hanging,' by Sir Arthur Heywood and others, and a copy of the 'First Five Hundred Peals of the Oxford Guild,' presented by Mr. E. A. Young. By special request I have sold one of these copies, but I should like the Council to advise me what to do with the remainder. mainder.

This has been a wonderful year for the sale of publications; indeed, there has been nothing like it since I have been librarian. For many years, as the Council will recollect, we have not covered the cost of advertising. Last year, however, I did manage to show a many years, as the Council will recollect, we have not covered the cost of advertising. Last year, however, I did manage to show a balance to the good of £2 3s. Id., but this year there is a balance of £42 9s. 5d., and that after paying the ordinary advertisement account of £9 2s., plus £3 for the special advertising of the Minor Methods. This, of course, is the result of placing a high-priced book on the market for which there was a great demand. I refer to the 'Collection of Doubles and Minor Methods,' and as I have remarked before, one quick-selling book livens up the sales of others. Coming to the other publications, I think the result tends to show that the money spent by the Council in recent years has been well expended. I have not yet received all the returns from the 'on sale or return' agents, but so far the result is good, and their sales account for £10 18s. Ild., out of the £58 17s. THE FATE OF OLD BOOKS.

Mr. J. A. Trollope asked if there was any machinery by which an eye could be kept on any old or valuable books relating to ringing which might perhaps eventually be secured for the Council's library. He had specially in mind what might ultimately become of the books which the Rev. W. Pearson had got. He possessed one or two books which were absolutely unique. No doubt Mr. Pearson had some intention as to how these books were to be disposed of eventually, but it was of great importance that these books should not be dispersed it was of great importance that these books should not be dispersed and lost. He wondered if it was possible to find out what was to beand lost. He vome of them.

Mr. Young said he had spoken to Mr. Pearson on this matter in a tentative sort of way, and he thought Mr. Pearson had made up his mind that the books should eventually go to the University of Cambridge. It was possible, if that Council expressed an earnest hope that the books might come to their library, that it might have the desired consummation.

desired consummation.

The President, replying to the first parl of Mr. Trollope's question, said he did not think there was any machinery for the purpose, but he thought a good deal could be done by talking to individual ringers. He felt quite sure Mr. Pearson would make some arrangements by which his books would not be lost. They might not come to that Council, but they would go somewhere where they would be safe. He thought, also, that quite a lot could be done if members would keep a watch on booksellers' catalogues of old books. It was sometimes possible to pick up volumes in this way. With regard to what should be done with the few copies remaining of the book on "Bell Towers and Bell Hanging," the Standing Committee recommended that the librarian be allowed to dispose of some of them, leaving three at least in the library, but that the books be sold only to accredited representatives of affiliated societies. These books were getting scarce, and they would be very costly to reprint at the present time, and it was important that they should get into places where they would be made use of. The committee proposed that the conies he sold at five shillings each.

The report was adopted, and the committee's suggestions agreed to.

THE BALANCE SHEET.

The accounts of the Council were presented by the hon, secretary and treasurer (Mr. G. W. Fletcher). The balance from the last account was £47 14s. 9d., interest on investments £5, affiliation fees £28 5s., subscriptions from hon, members £2 7s. 6d., sale of publications (less expenses) £42 9s. 5d., total £125 16s. 8d. The expenditure included £35 15s. 2d. on the printing of publications, £10 10s. donation to the Stedman Tercentenary Fund, gifts of books to Messrs. Fardon and Sharman (demonstrators of the Carter ringing machine) £2 6s., other expenses £15 13s. 7d.; balance carried forward £61 11s.

Replying to the Rev. E. S. Powell, the Hon. Treasurer said it was not necessary to sell out any stock to pay for the printing of the 'Doubles and Minor Collection.'—The accounts were adopted.

THE CARTER RINGING MACHINE.

Mr. E. A. Young presented the report of the trustees of the Carter ringing machine as follows: On Saturday, February 20th last, Mr. E. A. Young and Mr. A. A. Hughes (trustees) attended the Victoria and Albert Science Museum, there being present also the two demonstrators, Messrs. Fardon and Sharman, and also an officer of the Museum. They found the machine and its appurtenances as previously reported to the Council. It was set to ring two or three plain courses, which, despite a few failures, it successfully brought round. We are of opinion, however, that the time cannot be far distant when the machine will require overhaul and repair, as it showed signs in different parts of a little wear. On May 2nd last, following an official request, the machine was demonstrated to an officer of H.M.O.W. by Mr. Fardon and Mr. Young. The visitor and his two friends inspected the machine and heard a course of Grandsire

Cinques. The treasurer was asked to arrange payment of the demonstrators' fee for the annual inspection.

Mr. Hughes seconded the adoption of the report.

Mr. C. T. Coles asked if there was any particular time when this machine was demonstrated. He was sure there were members who would like to see the machine. Having paid a recent visit to South Kensington Museum to see the machine he was disappointed in not being able to see it at work. It would be a good idea if a periodical demonstration could be arranged, say, on the occasion of some big ringers' gathering in London, like the College Youths' Dinner or some occasion like that.

The President thought they might leave Mr. Coles' suggestion to the trustees. He thought they would be willing to arrange a demonstration either on the afternoon before the College Youths' dinner, or every third year in connection with the Central Council meeting. If they advertised the demonstration, he thought a good many ringers would be prepared to avail themselves of the oppor-

tunity of seeing it.

Mr. Young said he thought it would be quite a good thing if a demonstration could be arranged in connection with the Council meeting in London.

The report was adopted.

CONSTITUTION OF COMMITTEES.

The Standing Committee's formal report said the various recommendations of the committee would come up on the respective items

Rev. E. S. Powell asked the Standing Committee to deal with the constitution of the committees generally before the new Council met, and to make a report on the matter. He said his reason for doing so was that on various occasions it had seemed as if the constitution of the committees was rather haphazard. Some years ago, for instance, he did a hit of work for the Peals Collection Committee. Afterwards, at a meeting of the Council at which he was not present, he was elected a member of that committee. Since that time he had he was elected a member of that committee. Since that time he had had no communication of any kind from the committee. He believed the president was a member of the Methods Committee, but he was afraid that since he (Mr. Powell) had been a member of that committee they had had little or no communication with regard to the business of that committee. He thought it would be a good thing if the constitution of the committees could be cleared up. Next year a new Council was to meet and new committees formed. They had a new secretary, and he would be a new broom and very anxious to sweep clean. He thought, therefore, it was a good emportunity for a new secretary, and he would be a new broom and very anxious to sweep clean. He thought, therefore, it was a good opportunity for the Standing Committee to look into their own constitution and that of the other committees and see whether they were as representative of the Council as they might possibly be. He proposed, as a recommendation to the Standing Committee, that this be done so that things generally might be tidied up (applause).

Mr. J. Hunt seconded, remarking that it was nearly time some of

Rev. F. Li. Edwards said it would be a real advantage if the Council would themselves appoint the conveners of the committees and not leave the members to appoint their own. From his own experience he had known a committee to go through a whole year with-

out receiving any communication from the convener.

The President said he believed he was responsible for the motion some years ago that the committees should themselves elect a convener, and that the convener should present a report to the Coun-

At that time there was no organisation among the committees at all. If that scheme had not succeeded it was due partly to the conveners, who, having been appointed conveners, had not convened conveners, who, having been appointed conveners, had not convened (laughter), and partly to the committees themselves, who, if they found a convener did not convene, should chuck him out and elect another (laughter). The scheme was workable if the committees worked it, but in view of the fact that it had not been working he was sure the Standing Committee would be prepared to look into the whole question, and they would accept the recommendation. With regard to the personal point of the Methods Committee, some years ago, soon after the Major Methods were published, he resigned from the committee because he found he had not time to do any more work for it. At the same time he resigned the convenership of the Towers and Belfries Committee, while remaining a member of the committee, but the letter with his resignation from the Methods Committee seemed to have gone missing.

The Standing Committee's report was adopted, together with the Rev. E. S. Powell's recommendation.

REV. H. LAW JAMES' LIFE WORK.

The next report considered by the Council was that of the Methods Committee, which was published in 'The Ringing World' on April 29th. Mr. Trollope said the most important thing that had happened during the past year was the loss they had sustained by the death of the Rev. Henry Law James. Canon Coleridge had already expressed what they all felt with regard to his death. He could not speak for the Methods Committee, and in his place, without making some reference to the work he did. He (Mr. Trollope) supposed the work on the Methods Committee was really the chief thing that Mr. James did for the Exercise, apart from his local work in the Lincoln Diocese. It was quite true to say that this work he did through the Methods Committee and for the Exercise, with regard to method to method. Diocese. It was quite true to say that this work he did through the Methods Committee and for the Exercise, with regard to method con-Methods Committee and for the Exercise, with regard to method construction, was practically finished. He had a certain message to deliver, and he had delivered it. It was not a final message, although perhaps he thought it was, but the position we were now in as an Exercise with regard to method ringing and the understanding of methods, compared with what it was 30 years ago, was due largely to Mr. Law James, and if they were to take the opinion of modern young men, who understood something about it, and compare it with that of the authorities at that time—Bulwer, Heywood and others—they could not help being struck with the enormous advance there that of the authorities at that time—barwer, he, not they could not help being struck with the enormous advance there had been right through the Exercise in the understanding of those mathematical laws which were the basis of their art. That the Exermathematical laws which were the basis of their art. That the Exercise had taken such a large interest in them was due very largely to Mr. Law James

cise had taken such a large interest in them was due very largely to Mr. Law James.

Continuing, Mr. Trollope said the question of filling up the vacancy was the business of the Council, but the Council had always taken into consideration the wishes of the committee. What they suggested was that, as the committee expired at the end of this year, they should leave the question of filling the vacancy open until the London meeting, and meanwhile look out for a snitable man to take Mr. Law James' place. With the particular work they had in hand at the moment, he did not think they needed any further assistance this year. There were, added Mr. Trollope, two things the Council entrusted the committee with. One was the getting on with the publication of the hook on methods of Triples, and the other the matter that arose out of the Rules and Decisions definitions, which was brought up at Lambeth and was referred to again last year. He asked to be allowed to deal with the first matter and to leave the second, which was dealt with in their report, to Mr. Powell. When he (Mr. Trollope) left Mr. Law James after the Liverpool meeting, it was arranged that Mr. James should get on with the methods and get out a draft. He sent Mr. James all the papers he had, and he heard nothing from him up to the time of his death. He then wrote to Mr. James' brother to ask how far Mr. Law James had proceeded with the work, and ultimately received the papers from Surfleet, but they were only the papers he had previously sent. He was afraid that Mr. James had been able to do nothing towards the work. He (Mr. Trollope) set to work to prepare the draft on the basis of what he had discussed with Mr. James and he had nearly finished it. They were prepared to submit a proposal to the Council for the publication of this book. They proposed to take Stedman and Erin as the only two methods worth ringing without a treble hunt, and ten or eleven methods which had a treble and six working hells, like New Bob. THE WITCH'S CAULDRON.

QUAINT POSSESSION IN A SURREY TOWER.
Frensham, a little Surrey village, four miles from any railway station, attracted nearly lifty ringers on Saturday, when a meeting of the Farnham District of the Guildford Diocesan Guild was held. The square and rather squat fifteenth-century lower of the church contains a ring of six bells, some of which came from the Reading Foundry. Three of them were cast by Ellis Knight in 1627, when they were a ring of five, and they bear the remains of the doggered

they were a ring of five, and they bear the remains of the doggerel verse which was in those days sometimes spread over a peal of hells: 'I as second will ring'; 'I as third will sing'; 'I as tenor hymall round.' The intervening bell (at that time the fourth) was evidently recast in 1658, and its only inscription is the date. The old treble was recast in 1745 by Robert Catlin, and the present treble was added in 1897, when the bells were rehung in a new frame.

The bells are rung from the ground floor, and the tower centains one great object of interest to all visitors. It is the 'Witch's cauldron' of beaten copper, measuring 8ft. 8in. in circumference and 14in. in depth. It is traditionally said to have been the property of Mother Ludlam, who was reputed a witch, and lived in a cave in the sandstone in Moor Park, near by. The cauldron was loaned to a woman who failed to return it at the appointed time, and was refused by Mother Ludlam. Thereupon the cauldron pursued the borrower, and she took sanctuary in the church, the cauldron getting no further than the tower, where it still rests. More possibly the cauldron once belonged to Waverley Abbey, and was used by the Cistercian monks for cooking on the occasion of the village feasts.

SHALFORD BELLS NEED A 'CLEAN SWEEP.'

The lesson was read by the leader of the local ringers, Mr. L. C. Hunter. The Vicar presided at the subsequent tea and meeting, and was supported by Mr. H. L. Baldock, secretary of the Church Council, Mr. McKay Martin (organist), Major J. H. B. Hesse (Master of the Guild), Admiral T. P. Walker (hon. treasurer), Mr. J. S. Goldsmith (hon. secretary), Mr. G. L. Grover (district secretary), Mr. W. Melville (District Ringing Master), and Mr. A. A. Hughes (London). At the request of the Vicar, Major Hesse had examined the condition of the hells and frame, and he reported that the tower was solid masonry, and its strongest way was east and west. The top frame, which carried the treble and fifth, was mounted very high and was practically on the top of the tower. It was carried on the hottom frame, which was built up on two timber beams which run north and south, and round the ends of which the masonry looked to be loose. It was quite time that something was done with regard to the frame. The bells also were frightfully out of tune, and his view was that they should clear out the whole lot, recast the hells and rehang them in a steel frame, constructed to take eventually two trebles. He strongly urged the authorities not to patch up the old frame.

The Vicar thanked Major Hesse for his report, and said he hoped that al seme time they would be able to have the work done, although at present they had some other rather costly schemes in front of them which would have first to be undertaken.

Mr. G. L. Grover presented a report on the Central Council meeting, in which he emphasised the importance to the Exercise of 'The Ringing World,' and the necessity of increasing its circulation. The (Continued in next column.)

SAFFRON WALDEN RINGER'S DEATH.

Saffron Walden has lost an old member of the company by the death of Mr. Arthur Francis James, who passed away at the age of 64 years, in the Freemasons' Nursing Home, Chelsea, after an illness of six months' duration. Deceased entered the nursing home a few weeks ago, and underwent an operation from which he apparently was making a good recovery, but he passed away in his sleep on Saturday week.

Born at Farnham, Surrey, Mr. James was the son of Mr. John James who sot up a business as watchmaker and jeweller in Saffron Walden, to which the deceased eventually succeeded. He was educated at Saffron Walden School, and afterwards took a prominent part in local activities. He joined the Saffron Walden Ringing part in local activities. He joined the Saffron Walden Ringing Society in 1888, and was a member up to the time of his death. He always took a great interest in the society, and altogether he rang 65 peals, one of which was the then record length of Superlative Surprise Major, the 8,800 rung at Loughborough in May, 1894, composed and conducted by a famous Saffron Walden man, Nathan J. Pitstow. Mr. James also rang in a 6,016 in the same method, and an 8,064 of Kent Treble Bob Major. His peals consisted of Kent Treble Bob Major His peals consisted of Kent Treble Bob Major 6, Royal 2, Grandsire Triples 1, Caters 3, Stedman Triples 12, Caters 4, Bob Major 1, Royal 1, Double Norwich Major 9 (conductor 1), Superlative Surprise Major 9, Cambridge Surprise Major 10 (conducted 1), New Cambridge Surprise Major 5, and London Surprise Major 2. don Surprise Major 2.

In his early days he joined the old 3rd V.B. (Cambs) Suffolk Regiment, and received rapid promotion. On reaching the rank of colour-sergeant he was one of the youngest volunteers of that rank. He was afterwards awarded the Loug Service Medal. On the forma-He was afterwards awarded the Long Service Medal. On the formation of the Territorial Army Mr. James transferred to the lst/8th Essex Regiment and mobilised with that unit at the outbreak of the war. He was afterwards transferred to the 2nd/8th Essex Regiment, and promoted to R.Q.M.S. He continued to serve until he was discharged in 1916 on reaching the age limit. However, he was soon called upon to give his services. He was specially commissioned with the rank of captain and helped to raise and afterwards commanded 'B' Co., 2nd/3rd V.B. Essex Regiment until the end of hostilities.

Mr. James was also an accomplished musician, and was a member of the Orpheus Orchestra and a keep supporter of the Saffron Wal-

of the Orpheus Orchestra and a keen supporter of the Saffron Walden Amateur Operatic Society. He was also a Freemason, being Master of the Walden Lodge, 1280, in 1927, and had he lived he would have received still further honours in the craft. He was also

would have received still further honous in the craft. He was also a member of the Saffron Walden Chapter of Royal Arch Masons.

Mr. James was active in many other spheres. He was one of the oldest members of the Literary and Scientific Institution, and in his early days actively supported both cricket and football in the town,

early days actively supported both cricket and football in the town, but later bowls claimed his attention.

The funeral at Saffron Walden on Wednesday of last week was attended by members of all the organisations with which Mr. James had been connected in his lifetime. The service at the cemetery church was conducted by the Rev. W.Bro. A. J. Gillson, assisted by the Rev. W.Bro. W. Rutherford. The lessons were read by W.Bro. F. J. Pitstow and W.Bro. L. S. Thorning. The committal rites were performed by the Rev. W.Bro. A. J. Gillson, and the brethren of the craft filed past the grave and placed on the coffin sprigs of acacia, in accordance with the Froemasons' custom.

The immediate mourners were Mr. H. James (brother), Messrs. E. A. and H. E. Pitstow (brothers-in-law), Messrs. A. E., F. J., H. and L. Pitstow (nephews).

Mrs. A. James, the widow, was unable to be present.

There were a large number of floral tributes, including one from the Saffron Walden Society of Change Ringers, who in the evening rang a muffled peal of Grandsire Triples in memory of the deceased.
