## EXTENDING THE MINOR REPERTORY

While the pundits-and others-argue about what shall constitute a peal of Minor, the peal at Hayfield, Derbyshire, in which twenty-one methods were spliced into seven true extents, should give many people cause for thought. Twenty-one methods is by no means the limit of what can be done on these lines, and as long ago as 1923 no fewer than thirty-five methods were introduced into a 5040 ; but these occasional performances which include such a number of methods should remind six-bell ringers of the vast field of variety and interest that lies before them and make them wonder whether any of the compositions which fll the appendix of the Central Council's Collection of Minor Methods, and others about which there has been so much discussion, are really worth bothering about. All the while ringers want to ring peals of Minor in only one or two methods it may be argued that such compositions should be open to then, although up to the present they seem to have been treated rather sceptically by conductors. Apart from the Bankes James' Cambridge composition, and the two arrangements of Doubles, which were in use belore the Collection appeared, we believe that only once has any composition from the appendix been rung, while the discussion which has taken place has, as far as we can judge, considerably curtailed the use of the Pitman and Morris arrangement of Doubles.

This article, however, is not intended to discuss the propriety or otherwise of ringing such compositions in peals, but to suggest that from the ringers' point of view, as distinct from the conductor's, there ought to be very little use for them. No ringer ought to be satisfied with being able to ring only one method-whether of Doubles or Waximus. Where, however, there are only five or six bells, it should especially be the aim of every ringer to master a variety of methods and at least to maintain the standard aimed at fifty years ago of ringing not less than seven methods in a peal of Minor. There is comparatively little credit to the ringer or band who, from one year's end to the other, makes no attempt to progress beyond one method, for with the scores of good methods that are now provided for them, ringers have not only a wikle field open before them, but every encouragement to pass on to higher attaimments. A peal in seven methools, if only plain methods, is an end worth striving for and except to complete some personal ambition, such as ringing a peal of Minor, Major, Royal and Maximus in one method, like Cambridge, for instance, peals in just one method of Minor ought to be only stepping-stones to at least scven extents, and not. as sometimes seem the casc, a permanent resting place.

## HISTORY TOLD IN THEIR INSCRIPTIONS.

Yeovil bells, upon which a peal of Stedman Caters was rung on Boxing Day, are one of the heaviest rings of ten in the country, the tenor being nearly 41 cwt., while since their restoration and retuning carried out at the Whitechapel Foundry in 193I, there are, despite the fact that they are a 'mixed ' lot, lew, if any, peals of ten superior to them in tonal quality. By recasting the two trebles and tuning the remainder Messrs. Mears and Stainbank worked a marvellous transformation.

At some time prior to 5 56 there were six bells in the massive western fower, and these remained until 760 , at which time it is said that iwenty-two to twenty-five men were required to ring them. The original tenors were the gitt of Stephen Hooper and his wife, Joan, who, with

others, were the founders of the Chantry of the Holy Cross in $\mathbf{1 4 3 2}^{2}$. The tenor was recast by the vounger Bilbie of Chewstoke in 1728 , the fifth, fourth and second of that early period having been recast in t 525 by Thomas Pennington, of Excter. The treble was recast lyy Thomas Purdue, of Closworth, in 1662, and the third by Bilbie at the same time as the tenor. In 1760 the six bells were rclung in the then modern method, so that, instead of more than a score of men being required to ring them, they could be rung by, seven men only. Bilbie cast wo additional bells at the expense of the townspeople in 1768 , and two further trebles were added by Warner in r89r, when the rehanging of the other eight was carried out.

The building of the present church was begun about 1380 , and is an imposing structure in local limestone. The tower rises in four stages to a height of ninely fect, and is surmounted by a rather uncommon parapet of narrow perforated panels with cusped heads.

The peal books in pwssession of the Giuild recorcl all picals rung from the yenr 1755 to 1931 . 1932 peals will be entered in due course.) The puals rung 1755 to le88 are St. Mavtin's Society, those rung from 1889 to 1905 are St. Marlin's Guild, and thoge rung from 1906 to the present date are St. Martin's Guilit for the diocese of Bimniagham.
The very fact that St. Martin's Sociely exionded its activities in 1889. also again in 1906, does not. alter the fact that St. Martin's peal rocords date from the year 1755, aud litat we have g continuous existence to the present day, theyefore the total rumber of peats rung dale from the first peal of Bob Major in 1755, followed by matns" historic record peals rung at Si. Martin's and elsewhere.

＂Mel the same thing las been happening every weel since Octo－ ber．We liate borne the clin its silonce for a loug time，hat，after ald，we are only human，and we fell that it was time some protesi was made．
＇We have complained to the Rector＇，and my husband has now written to the Bishap of Bristol．

I think if poople want lo ring the New Yoar in，live minutes is long enollgh．
Whether of not the emplatut about fise bells is well founded－ visually these things are grossly exaggerated－we do not know，but the nuellog of protest adopted，by disturbing at congregation at wor－ shif，is singulary disgracoful．Tluere is a clatse in a recent Act of $1^{\text {rarliament which make the unnecessay fowing of motor horns }}$ nu offonce，oven if there is no other Act wheln prolibits the disturth－ ance of a church service
The Vicar，in an interviow，sald：${ }^{2}$ We have a right to jing our tells．There are live of them，seventemth conlury lells，and they laro i．te most mellow tone in this par of the country．Mrjor Atkid－ soy look this louse sich monthas ago，well knowitg it was ndjacent to the churcla．He made a jurotest some time ago about rfiging them， and I cut down the practice hours，but it is a centuries old enstom to riug out the old and ring in the now year here，full［ cannot stop That．I havo becn Vicar af this parish for thirevone years，anal it is the first complaint that has come from that louse．I clo not wish anrone to be disturhed，hul charch bells in Engiand lane statutory rights，and I shall maintain thern wifhin reason．＇
