## HOW NEW RULES AFFECT ASSOCIATIONS

We referred last week to the proposed alteration in the rules of the Central Council by which it is hoped to bring the Council into closer relationship with the associations. This week the detailed proposals are published, and as the county and diocesan organisations are directly affected it is well that they should be studied by them. The three principal changes are set out in the report of the committee, and with the first, we think, few will be inclined to quarrel. Hitherto the Council has been a loosely woven fabric consisting of individuals; the intention of the new rules is to make it in fact the central and representative organisation of all the ringing associations.

The second of the important alterations lays down for the first time the basis upon which representatives shall be elected. Numerical strength has always governed the proportion of representation up to certain limits, but there has been no definition as to what is implied by ' membership' for this purpose. The result has been a certain amount of cjual representation, where non-resident members have been included for the purpose of counting heads. The rule as now proposed defines the members to be included for the purpose of representation, and while it does not entirely eliminate overlapping, because to do so is a practical impossibility, it goes a long way towards securing equal representation, within the limits of a four-member maximum.
It is on the thirck of the proposed changes that there may at first be some division of opinion, although we believe there will be found no association which, on serious thought, will offer opposition. This alteration has to do with the payment of affiliation fees. Up to the present associations have paid a fee for each representative elected. That is right white the Council is constituted of individuals, but the financial question will be on a different footing if the status of the Council is changed to a Council of aftiliated societies. We believe that the vast majority of ringers will agrec with the committee that the payment of fees should then be on the basis of the representation to which an association is entitled, even if, for any reason, the full number of representatives is not elected. As a matter of fact, there are very few instances indeed where this is not already done, and if it is made a rule it is but a trifing step towards ensuring that associations shail pay proportionately for the unquestioned advantages which the existence of a Central Council brings to the Exercise. After all, the cost of the affiliation fee to an association is only a halfpenny per member per annum, while to those societies whose membership is greatly in excess of (Continued on page 210.)

the number entitled to four representatives the amount is very much less. This is a small sum to pay for the advantages which the Council provides in return, and without which the associations would largely lose the services of many of the best brains of the Exercise, and would operate as so many isolated units with no organisation to co-ordinate incir work or voice with the authority of minied purpose, their oljects or their riyhts. There is, in lact, every reason why the proposals to make the Council a stronger and more integral pari of the ringing organisation shotikl receive the full support of all the associations.

## CENTRAL COUNCIL RULES

## THE SUB-COMMITTEE'S RECOMMENDATIONS

The report of the sub-commitee appointed to consider the Rules of the Council has been presented in the following terms:-

The sub-committee has again met during the course of the year to consider the re-drafted rules sumbitted to the Council at the last meeting and the suggested amendments thereto, and recommends the Council to adopt the rules as set out in the following schedute.

The sub-committee would specially call attention to the fact that the rules as re-draftex make (inter alia) the following aftcrations:
(1) The constitution is changed in principle from a Council of individuals to a Council of affilated societies;
(2) Representation of territorial and diocesan societies will be in future on a definite limited mumerical basis of membership; and
(3) Societies' affiliation fees will be based on membership and not upon the number of representatives slected to the Council.

## SCHEDITLE.

1. The Council shall be known as the 'Centrat Council of Clareh Bellringers.
2. Tlie Couneil shall consist
(2) Of Representative Mrambers elceted by nitiaatod societies.
(2) Of Honorary Mcombers, not excesding fifteen in mumber, elected by Lie Conneil.
Any recornised Socioly, Assnciation or Fuifl of Chuth Bellringers (heromafter reformod to winder the general levim 'Society'), number-

 akner boyaly itbide by he rums and decisions of the Council. following proportion
A Sociely the mumbel of whose members is 75 or over, but does not exceed 150, one Represeriaive: exceets 150 but does not exced 300 , two Represenitatives; exceeds 300 hut loes not exceed 450 , three Representalives; exeedds 450, four Roprescutatives.

Four Representatives slatll be the linit of representation allowed one Society
For the parpose of this tule the basis of the calculation of memership for territorial and diocesan societics shall be the number of atual subseribing honorary and linging merabers, aud resident life nembers.
No representative member shalt be eligible as an lionorary member. The voting powers of honarary members shall be equal with those $f$ representative memhers
(Note.-Here and elsewhere in these Rules the word ' nember' shall be taken as meaning 'mumber of the Council.'
3. The election of zepresentuive members shall take phace triennially, at last four weeks before the eommencement of each triennial session, and the names and addresses of those clected slayll forthwith be forwarded to the Scereinry of the Council. In the event of a yneancy the new member shall he elected only for the unexpired jeriod of the triemium.

Fonorary members shall be elected for three years and, on reiming, slanll he eligil:le for re-election pretiremont and election taking offect as from the end of the ammat meeting, provided that any fonormry member who during his lerm of offee may be eleoted a representalive member sliall, ipso fucto, vucate his honorary memhership. The Council anty fill a vacancy among the honorary members at any amnulameding of the Council.

All socielics relurning representalive members to the Council sitall contribute annually, in January, 5 s. on behalf of ench represeutative member to which they are entitled, to meet the expensos inf conducting the business of the Council, and no representative member slatll be conitical to sperk or vote at an anmual inecting of Iho Council until the sulaseription of the Society be represents be paid.
6. The Council slall meel once nmually, about Whitsuntide, in sume conveniont centre, as agreed mpon at the previous meeting, hut the Mecting following the Trionnal Election shall always be in LonWha, Any meetitg of the Cotanel may he exiended to aditional actinge on the same or the following day an a motion for ndjournment being put ancl carried. The President shali have power, in case of emergency, to call special mectings of the Councif, and he
slatl at any time summon such a special moeting on receipt of ar requisition signed by twelve numbers.
7. At thes Anmuat Moeting next aftel each Trionnial Election a President, an Honorary Secrelary, who shall alsu act an Tronsumer, and an Honorary Liburian slabli be clasen foom amoug tbe menbers to serve for threo years. Ia the event of the President, Honorary Sectary or Fonoray Liburnan vicating ollice before tho cxpiration of the flarec years, the ensuing meeting shall eloct anmoner to dill the wacnocy during the remainder of the period. The retiring President, Honornry Secretary and Flumorary Liburian slath be eligible for re-election at the expination of then tierm of othee. The Presichent shatl retite from tho ehair immadiaiely his successar in offico is elected, but the Honorny Seerotary slatl continue in oftice till the business of the mectimg is concluded. All nominations for these offices shall be sent to the Honorary Secretary, signod by two members of the Conncil, not less than fwo calendar nomblin provions to the meeting, and such hominations shall appear out the abyode paper. The next business aftev the dections of the Ptesideat und Honorary Secretary shall be the election of honotary membors.
8. The Council slanll Irimmally appoint at its Lomeon Meoting: Iwo Auditors who shall sudit the Antand Accoants of tle Cotued and report to eacli Aminal Mecting.
9. The Gouncil slatl appoint in Standing Camatitce and slatll have power to nppoint Committees for athy purpose for which sit my appear desirable; and also, if tho state of the funds permil, to fillow the necesexyy expenses of liolding fio Gommillec Mectings, Fach Committee sliall appoint a convener and shall report aumanty to the Comacil. AlT reports, except that wi lho Standing Committee, shall be made jn wrifing to the Honoriry seeretary at lentu 14 days. hefore the meeting. Such reports ats lave mot previously been published or circutated shatl be read ac the meeting.

All resolutions to be proposed shali bo sent to the Homomary Soctetary in writing, signed by two members of the Council, not less lhan tro cnlendar monthe provious to the neeting, and shall be placed by him an the agendin, fogetlier with the names of the proposer and seconder of the resolition. Rut it shall be competent, on a vote of the majority of tlice meeting, for the Council to diseusa a subject not upon the agenda paper, providing such subject dees not affect the Rules or Consitution of tha Council.
11. At the meetings of the Counci? the President slanll take the ehair, and iar the ayent of his absence the menbers present shan elect a Chaimani for that moeding. The Clanirman! shall hawe a casting vole. Twonty members shall form a ghayum. Every new menlier, whother repiesentitivg or honorary, shall, before taking lig seat, be introduced hy a meniber to the Puesident, or', in the altisence of the President, to the Clisiman of the mocting.

## 12. Each member slatl hawe one vole.

13. Full notice of the dale, arraurements, rud agenda for oachs. meoting shall be advertised in ihe ringing papers approximately sereu weeks previotus to such meeling; but it shall not be jneumbont on the Fomorsry Sceretary for stuti matioe to cach member. The names of the members present ant the busimess transucted at each moeting shall be enterist in the minute book and reported to the ringing papers. Copies at the resolutions phssed by the Council shalis be forwarfed to the affiatod societies as soon as is conveniont after the meeting.
14. At earla Ambanl Meeting fle Wonoray Secetary and Trensurer shall summit the andited statement of acmunds for the provious yent for adoption by tho moeling.
15. Alterations in the Rules of the Cotuncil slatl be mate anly at the Antun Mectings, ant, every notioe of al proposer allerationz shali be sent to the Honoray Secrobary, as laid down in Rula Id. Alk alteraliong in the Rules of the Council shatl lo passed by a majority of lwo-thirds of those present and roting.

The addition of two treble bells has made them into a fine ring of ten (the tenor is $21 \frac{1}{2}$ ewt.), which should serve f rery useful purpose, not only by adding to the dignity of the peal, but by enconraging the practice af change ringing on ten bells in this district, as there is no other peal of this mumber withitn a radius of about 20 miles. Before the restoration of four yents ago the eight bells were in a timber fyume which filled the helfry, and one bell lad to be curvied in a cage above the real. An iron frame was installed with the bells all on one lavel, and his frane las mow hern so rearranged thas, nol only are the new hells ' on the floos' ' willa the rest, but wa excellent circle lias heen obtained-and there is stall yomm for more. Such is one of the advantages of modern bell laturing. The mimirably tmed treblyes blent perfectly with the other telle, and Newhury lias a ring of ten to be prond of. The work has been carrien out by Meswr. Mears and Staiblank, with the charmeteristic efficioticr of the Whitechapel foundry.

The augmentation was made possible by a hegrest of the late Mrs. Peerless, who lefi the sum of $£ 100$ to the Newbury ringers to do what they liked with. They gencronciv resolved to utilise it [or the furo vision of the two bells and appealed to ringers in the Oxford Diocese and clacwliere to make up the tanance of the cost involvod, a locnl append for funds heing out of flee ghestim, in riew of the demand

The spirit of the clurch, the hembly of its equipment and its andolnments spoke of the love which the pople of Suwbury had had for several generations for their ullumeh, and an addition such as hud just hoen made strengthemod alill fard ber tho love and affeedian they lad lor ib. The Hislop wend on to puinl out that the lighest form of love was shown in service, and there wero many who mintstened in the whreh in addition to those who werg ordinined. Amang therk were the choir, the alerk, the sexton and the hollmingers. All ought to have a high ideal before llem; thoy were serpants of the sametmary, and were privileged to lake a special parie in tha worglip of the King of Kings. The dominating thonglit jan ennmection with church bells was joy and praise. They who liskened might well think at times low much they owed to those who added 10 tho joy of life in these days, when there was so much that was dult muk tray, so mucli that was grave and sax in life. They miglat be quite sure that the Will of Giad was that they strould be aldereful ath that their religion shonld ha a relision of praise and 1 humkgyiving, bringins them contorit and consolation and lir bing them wht of deprcssing surroundings. Abovo all, the note of the bells was voin. In tho carly days Teligion lade to be earmed on in secret, for fear of persecution, Bells could not be ring becatse it wos desirable to aroid publicing. The people were true to their faith, but they lield their services in seclusion, and they suftered that we minht enjoy [reedom. As they licard the bells, therefore, they might thank God What they had frecdom to worship according to their conscience. This did nas mean frexlom to do es they liked; it did not mean freedom rom offering proise and thankgiving but fuedon to do what was yight end freedom to offer praiso and thanksgiving to Almighby God. this bells were a perpetinal waming to be free indeed and mot to neglect fod"s eall to worship. Thas were ringers ministerg and sel-
vants. There were, proceded the Bishop, other things in ringing. It was ant interestine art which misht alia, to same extent, be regarded is a pleasant exeroise. Tha ringer had to be alert of eye and ear, and bo anghtalso to bo man of Glaistian character. When a bell was cast, if a flaw was foulud in ik, it was melted down abaim and put inlo a mew monld. When they fonnd a faw in their own chavacter it mas well that they shonld molt it down. A crucked bell spoilt the bine of the whole ring; a rinesc insinecre jn bis climistianty spoilt tlie barmony of the beltry. They nufght indeed be thandfuid that the ringers' guild in these days leeld such lifh iderls before flem. No longer were tho bells rung by caneless and indiferent ringers, lut bv those who were striving according to their ability and opportanity to contribute something to the worship of God and to help to add to the joy and prase of jife amd to stir up something of that omotion which hrings to anr minds thourbhes of tlie lioliest find.

## GLOUCESTER RINGERS AT DINNER.

CITY'S GONNECTION WITE BELL FOUNDING
The fiftla anmal dinner of the Glaneester Branch of the Gloncester and Bristol Discesnan Association was hele at tho Spread Eagle Hotel, Giloucoster, on Salurday week, when a company of about sixty was. presided orer by the Mayor of Gloucester (Mr. W. L. Edwards). He Wat suppnyted by the Rev. E. C. Priclard (Rector of SL. Stephen's and Hayur's chaphin), the Rop. E. D.S. Camus (Rector of St. Mary-de-Crypt), the Rev. F. E. Walters (Roctor of Mistiterworth), Councillor W. R. Eggletm, Mr. Edgar Guiso (han, secretary of the Gloucester und Bristol Assceiation), Mr. S. Romans (chairman of the Gloucester Brancl) aud Mr. W. H. Harris (brauch secrotary). Ringing visitors were present itha Croydon, Swindon, Newport, DBedwellty, Mungotsfield, Bristol, Ross and Newent.
Aiter the loyal toust hat been honomred, the Mayor submitled 'The Charch and State,' and said that all through the ages Gloncester lind been clasely associated with bellringing. "The city had been. definitely connectecl with bell-making, and line litwo of Rudhall in tho 171h century was quile a fanous one. When the firm ceased, books were found containmg entries for 4,521 bells which had been made. A bellringing society which was named the Ancient Society of CryptYouths was founded in Gloucester in 1710. There were 31 mombers, and in 1749 they subscribed for two new theble bells for St, Mury-deCrypt Chareh, making eight in all. Churches that lad been huit in revent years, medded the Mayor, lacked a peal of bells, and le, for his part, thonglit they were no better for it. In the olden days clurcines were never ennrilete withand thio peal, and he knew nothing better than to licar them.
Tho Mayor also emphsised the importance of the State heints litaked closoly with the Clurch. T'liere was a tine, he said, when there was. some disturbance in this country between the state and the Church, and there were many poople who thonght it would be better if there were a separation botweons the two. That, lo was pleased to say, Jad now 'blown over,' ame creryano realised that the Churcli plared a very imporiant and very meessary part in the life of the State (applatse).
Thlae Rev. F. C. Prichard, in resjonse, said it would be a pery sad occurrence it the Church slouk be clisestablished. Of course, tho Chureds would be free to slo as it liked, but to the State lie thoughte would come vary consideruthe harm. It would no longor be definitely connceled with religion, and that wonld be disastrous, as nothing in life could go kin successfully without the help of God. That movementhad fortunately died dowi now, and lie wishod to stress the fact that the link between the Churel and State should never be lost (applanso).
The Rev. F. E. Walters also responded.
Councillur liggleton, in proposing the toast of 'The Chairman,' paid a warm tribute to the work that the Mayor was aning for the woflare of the city. He referred specially to thre dhings: his Worship's. efforts for the unemployed, the war memorial, mend, lasily, to his suecese in obtuining from the National Gallery the lom of a priceless. collection of pietures, whichit would stortly be luaught to the city.
An appeal to young people to take up tho art of ringing was made by Mr. John Austin in proposing the toast of "The Gloucester and 13 ristol Association. ${ }^{2}$ He said inath there were many peals of bells in the country, but frequently they were unahle to get anybody to ring them. Young poople were very badly needed, as the present ringers. could not carry on for ever.
Mr. E. Guise vespondect, and said that Gloucester was one af the mainstays of the association.
A hearly welcome to the visitors, which inclueled friends frow many parts of the combty and from Newport and Monmonth, was made. hy the Rev. E. D. S. Camus, and Mr. J. Jefferies (chairman of the Brislol Branchi respanded.

The toast of 'The Ringing World ' was enfrusted to Mr. J. Williams, and a vote of thanks to the chairman, seeretary, coamitte and arlistes was proposed by Mr. Camus.-Mr. S. Romans replied. Musical items were giver by the Tuffley Revelers, Mr. J. Clark, Mrs. Cohb Mr. H. Nowman, Wiss Maldwy, Miss Merriman, Mr. Cobb; Mr. J. Gillett, Miss D. Harris and Mr. Hayward.

At, 4.30 there is to be a ringers sorvice in the choin of tho Cathedral, where the Vicar of St. Sceplun'я, St. Abras, will be the prencher. Imnediately following this serviee, tea will be served and the business meeting wild follow. All ringers are welemed to this gatheviag, provided they have previansy motified their inteation to bo prowent. I'hose ringers who would fike to diversify Llein holidey will find modeh to interest them in the anitiquities of the abcient city.
St. Allans has been much in lie pablic notice recently, throngla the distoveries of the Verulamiun Lxenvalion Conanitec. Feralambum was the nncient foman mante for St. Abatis. Unlike other cities, notably lork tad Colcliester, the gite of tha Roman cily has not heen buill oret; ib lies ahout a guater of a mile away from the Cathedral, on the olfer side of the River Ver, THe Exavation Com mittee is entering the third year of its activities, and much ai general and scientific interest has lieen aliscovered. Last year three magnifient mosait patements, some of the banct of the kind ever found, and casily the finest in Eugland, were lated bare. Two of bese have hem lifted intact, and may be seen in the musenm on the site, together with many other fleeply inferestiug abjects.

Imilt by Wulain, Abbot of St. Albans, in the 10ih century ; it was aliored und enlarged in fle 15 th century, and the earliest remaining parts, tho areades of thaf nuwe and tho souith aisle, are of that date. tho central tower was built 1801-3. ist. Peter's is interesting as heing the burial place of many gendlemen slain in the battes of the Wars of tlie Roses.
St. Michael's, just across the ancient ford on the River Ver to the west, is noteworthy for its momment to Sir Francis Bacon, Lord Yemfam, tha celebated Claneellor and national plilosoplier of King James' reign. The original charen, like St, Peter's and St. Steplan's, whs founded by Wulsin, in the middle of the IOth centurt. The chancel and nave bollı contain detail which is evidently of pre Conquest date. The norith and south aislos were added towards the end of the 12 th century, mud the south chapel and nave clear-story early in the 13thtentury. The whole buildiar is of intense interest, and the tomer contains a peal of six, recently put into ball borrings by Jahu 'Trejor \& Co.
SL. Siephen's, to fhe sonth, on tha ancient Vhabling Street, is a quaint old chureh. ?ts early listory is in triny respectis the same as that of \$t. Michael's Churel, but the inuilding las been less restared. Anong the fitings, the $15 \mathrm{l}_{1}$ contiry font and the $16 i \mathrm{~h}$ century lectern are especially moticeatile. The lectem las been the subject of much controversy between Jisglishand Seots. It was part of the loot from Melrose Abbey broughi back lyy al lecal magnate affer Flodden Field. The tower condains in excellent poal of six.
Wible the exceplith of the Abley Clumch, the clock inwer is the most preminent arehitectural redic of antiquity in St. Albans. His-

Eesitrs the remaibs, many olfice antiguities await the observant visitor. The town wall, alating A,D. 102, lins been eleared of debris, and the removal of sone 30,000 tons of soil irom the south corner
 which, in detail, it is difficulb to pitrallel. At, this sauth corner will he seen the remains of a tower with solid ronnded front and at square internal chamber. After the Fionans left England in 410 A.D., the rity languished muldi] wilt the foumtation of the great Ableg of st. Ablans out the hill oprosite Verulomiums it grew syans in importance.
St. Albaus was one of ilie rehest and most powerfal ecclesiastical fondations. Its abbots vied wibh those of Westminster in their mag. nifienere, Affer the dissalution of the monasterics in 1539, the nonistic buildings (unfortuately for the antiguary) were demolished and tho: materiats hejped to build mantit ol the citizems' private houses. There is a sout o[ poetie justice in fis since the Abley ilself was langely built witli ransneked Roman bricks from Fermlamium.
The Calhedral las smevived a jestornion by ble late Lord (ituthorpe in the gise of last century, and rematis one of the most interesting edifices in the conntry. fi lass na inmense zave, the longest in England, and a magnificent massive replasal tower. Inside Ihe sturleat of architcelare will find examples of all the periods of nsedimal architecture, from Saxen to Tador. There are fwo celelumted Chantry lombs of Commer abbots. They ate unanlly eonsidered Whe finest examples of their kind.
Thlie Chantay of Abhot Rawrye, 3 blh century, malls for special ment lien. In the sonth aisle of preshytery will he aecu the 13 th eentury irous
 Clamber of the Fometrar. isth eculary, a wooden simelure of two shiges. conlains the wathing clamber, nat is also of considerable interest.
There are also three of her ancient churches in the citv. Si. Peters, ou the cast side of St. Peter's Street. No traces remain of the church
tortans and anticuaries have bean putzaled, not only as to the actary deto of the elock tower, but also the object of its erection, but it is generally considered to be late 13 tlo or carly $14 \frac{1}{2}$ cendury. The first Paltle of the Wars of the Reses was fought at St. Aluairs on 22 ud Mas, 1455 , and the alamm fot it was rung from the clock tower there, which, with fis ariginal bed, siill exishs. But come and see the building.

## BELL RESTORATION AT THORNABY-ON-SEA

For some consideralyle lime the pert of eight bells at Thornaby-ant Tees have heen almost unringable. The lyenings wore completely worn out and somo of the Eudgeons brokex. Tho Vicar, with the assistance of the ringers and the Chureh Council, set to work tomise sufficient funds for the rehatiging of the whole peal, nad, in spite uf the serious trade depressions, which has hit thomaby yery hatud, energetic action to raise the manus necessary to camry out the work soon hat the desired result.
