'I'here were other inscriptions ort the other bells, but that on the 8 th appealed to him as a narbitular message for them iliat mornimg. What laglaer standard coulel anyone desire in this particalar luranch of thoir life's work than to have that highest of all desires-to ring to the glory of God? 'lhat bell land bren lanying in St. Poter's lower far just on 200 years-in September nexl jear-sud just think of the diferent men and women who lind mulled di during thase 200 years, ringing to the glory of Gorl. Tho Revfor pmphasised that first of all they had to ring lytue; a man land to the tran to himself and to his fellowemen. Ilhey had to weep up the pileh of truath to lhe laghest-no equirocation, tho double deabing. Then they had to ring ragnarly and be dopended upon, beanuse tean work was most imporlant, Then they liad to bo punclual in their finging ; it was no good to turu up lato. Punctuality was a great virtue, and the valuable time that had been lost by unpunctuatity woula areomplish a colossal amount of prork if it was gathered together. Might their ringing every time they joined together he $\pi$ team be in aceord with the inseription on the 8 th bell of St. Peter's, Dorelsester- "Rine to the glary of ftarl.'
