#### THE COUNCIL MEETING.

When the Central Council meet on Tuesday week they intend to honour the ringers who made the trip to Australia and New Zealand last autumn, and by the official reception which will be given will formally mark the recognition by the Exercise of a great and successful undertaking of outstanding historical interest. We feel quite sure that the gesture of the Council will meet with the approval of ringers generally, for nothing in connection with ringing has stirred the imagination so greatly as did this tour to the other side of the globe. It had a two-fold object-the fraternisation of ringers from the homeland with those of Australia in celebrating the centenary of Melbourne and the State of Victoria, and the revival of interest in bells and bellringing in the Commonwealth. In both these things the visit proved a highly successful venture, and, just as the expedition set off with the good wishes of the Council, so the welcome to be extended at its conclusion is a fitting culmination to a remarkable tour.

Apart from this special event in connection with the proceedings, the meeting at Shrewsbury promises to be not only interesting to the members of the Council, but of importance to ringers generally and, judging by the agenda, the debates are not likely to be without liveliness. There is, at any rate, material for animated discussion, and the subject of separating the categories of spliced peals is not unlikely to show up a sharp division of opinion. There is unquestionably, among those who have had anything to do with the ringing of peals with constant changes of method, a decided opinion that these compositions should be provided with a distinctive term to define them. There certainly can be no two views that these peals are in a totally different class to those in which just two or three methods are joined up in long lengths, and to such extreme and inelegant examples as joining half a peal of Grandsire Caters and half a peal of Bob Royal. The difficulty in this matter is, however, where shall the dividing line be drawn? In any case, it has got to be an arbitrary line, and it will be for the Council to settle where this division of the classes shall

There is one other point about the forthcoming Council meeting that is worth noting. It will be the last under the old constitution. The new rules adopted two years ago come into full force and effect after the Shrewsbury meeting, and the various associations and guilds will henceforth stand on a different footing in relation to the Council. The tie between the Council will be made definite by an act of affiliation, and the Council will be-

come an organisation of which the associations are themselves an integral part. For the first time the actual basis of calculating the representation will be laid down for territorial organisations, and all affiliated societies will be required to subscribe an affiliation fee for the full number of members they are entitled to elect, as well as to undertake loyally to abide by the rules and decisions of the Council. After Shrewsbury the Council will no longer represent a body of individual opinion but will be officially the voice of organised ringing throughout the British Isles.

#### SUSSEX COUNTY ASSOCIATION'S JUBILEE.

FIFTY YEARS OF USEFUL WORK. Celebration at Brighton.

Last Saturday, the Sussex County Association celebrated its jubilec with a gathering at Brighton, where, m January, 1885, it was founded. The auspicious event brought together a large and representative company, and included young and old. There were present at least four out of the dozen or so surviving foundation members. One was Mr. F. B. Tompkins, of Chichester, whose father was the first treasurer of the association and who succeeded him in that office, later to become of the association and who succeeded him in that office, later to become Master of the association, a position he held for many years. Another was Mr. Charles Tyler, of Henfield, who was also in the first peal rung by the association, and, years after, conducted the only peal of Stedman Ginques ever rung in the county and by the association. This was on handbells, for there is yet no ring of twelve hells in Sussex. Despite his advancing years, Mr. Tyler is training a company of boys at Henfield, and three of them, scarcely in their teens, were present with him on Saturday and took part in some round ringing. The live other foundation members present were Mr. B. Hobbs, who The two other foundation members present were Mr. B. Hobbs, who, elected with the Waldron band, has been at Eastbourne now for many years, and Mr. W. E. Mitchell, of Cuckfield, who began as a ringer, but is now an honorary member.

There were many present whose connection with the association had extended over 40 years, and who have served it faithfully and well in a variety of ways. The reunion of these old friends, several of whom came from outside the county, was not the least happy part of the successful proceedings. Ringing took place in the afternoon at three churches, St. Peter's (10), St. Nicholas' (10) and the Good Stepshard (2) Sliepherd (8).

The annual meeting was held in St. Peter's Parish Room, a large attendance of members being presided over by the Lord Bishop of Chichester, who is president of the association, supported by the principal officers, Mr. J. T. Rickman (Master), Mr. H. R. Butcher (hon, treasurer), Mr. A. D. Stone (hon, secretary) and Mr. S. E. Armstrong (Southern Divisional secretary).

After the election of three new members attached to Billingshurst tower, Mr. F. B. Tompkins (a former Master of the association) proposed the adoption of the report and balance sheet. The receipts in posed the adoption of the report and balance sheet. The receipts in the general account, including £60 16s. from ringing members and £1 15s. from honorary annual members, amounted to £66 8s. 9d., and the expenditure to £61 15s. 1d., which included £25 9s. 5d., the expenses of the divisional meetings. The balance at the end of the year was £140 8s. 9d., an increase of £4 13s. 8d. The association also has an invested reserve fund of £50, a balance of £79 12s. in the Benevolent Fund and £2 8s. 9d. in the Certificate Fund.

TOWERS AND MEMBERS CONTINUE TO INCREASE.

The report for the year 1934 was as follows: Founded in 1885 with the threefold object of promoting scientific change ringing, the due care and use of bells and belfries, and the recognition of ringers as church officials, the Sussex County Association of Change Ringers celebrates its Jubilee this year. During this first stage of its history it has amply justified its existence by its activities in each of these departments, taking a leading part in the development of Surprise Major ringing, which was an outstanding feature of the nineties, and later in the case of Surprise Royal, while the record of ringing in the standard methods has been one of continued progress. As regards the care and use of hells and helfries, the towers are there to speak the care and use of bells and belfries, the towers are there to speak for themselves; and for those who can trace the stages of the transformation that has been effected between 1885 and 1935, no comment is necessary. No less remarkable is the change that has taken place in the recognition of ringers as church officials, of which the interest in and goodwill shown towards them by the clergy are a striking proof. In spite of the numerous counter-attractions of the present day, the number of affiliated towers and members continues to increase, and we welcome those younger members who are coming forward as ringers, conductors and office bearers, and on whom the future of the association will depend.

Mr. Tompkins congratulated the officers on the healthy state of

the association's finances, and referred to the satisfactory balance in the Benevolent Fund. He however, asked the meaning of an item of 13s. photos for Australian albums. Mr. J. S. Goldsmith, who seconded, explained that the association, in common with the rest of the association. ciations and guilds throughout the country, contributed pictures to the albums which the English tourists to Australia took with them for presentation to Melbourne Cathedral and Hobart Societies. Sussex contributed pictures of Chichester Cathedral, St. Peter's,

Brighton, and Southover, Lewes.—The motion was adopted.
Mr. Tompkins, as one of the original members of the association, then proposed the re-election of the Bishop of Chichester as president, and, the motion having been carried, the Bishop said he was very grateful to the association for the honour they had done him. That was the first opportunity he had had of meeting the association face to face, and it was an especial pleasure on the occasion of their Jubilce. He had been connected as Dean with a famous Cathedral— Canterbury-with the bells of which was associated one who was well known by name to many of them, and to some of them in person. He referred to Minor Canon Helmore (applause). The Bishop added

that he hoped to become acquainted with the Sussex belfries before The vice-presidents were re-elected, with the addition of the Rev. Canon J. C. H. How, the new Vicar of St. Peter's, Brighton.

THE MASTER'S RESIGNATION.

The Master said those who were present at the annual meeting last year would remember that he foreshadowed a position which he was now compelled to arrive at, in deference to advice he could not ignore. He could not offer himself for re-election as Master. He was more He was more grateful than he could express for the kindness which the association had shown to him during the years he had held office, and he would always cherish that memory in his heart. Mr. H. R. Butcher had been approached by the committee and had kindly consented to fill the office, and he (Mr. Rickman) had pleasure in proposing him as Master.—Mr. A. C. Pankhurst seconded, and the motion was carried.

The President, in the name of the members, expressed gratitude to Mr. Rickman for his devoted services to the association, and Mr. F. B. Tompkins proposed that their appreciation should be recorded on the minutes and that Mr. Rickman be elected a vice-president of the association (applause).—Mr. Butcher seconded the motion, which was unanimously carried and briefly acknowledged by Mr. Rickman.

In succession to Mr. Butcher, Mr. F. W. Stokes, of Eastbourne, was elected hon. treasurer, Mr. A. D. Stone was re-elected hon. secretary, and, at his request, Mr. S. E. Armstrong was elected assistant hon. secretary. Mr. F. I. Hairs was re-elected peals secretary and Messrs. N. Elliott and W. C. Hart hon. auditors. The trustness were also re-elected. trustees were also re-elected.

When it was proposed to re-elect Mr. Oliver Sippetts as the Central Council representative, Mr. Goldsmith pointed out that this was unnecessary, as under the rules of the Council a member was elected for the triennial period of the Council, or such portion of the period as remained after his election. The present triennial period did not expire until next year.—The President said that under these circumstances no election was necessary.

Brighton was selected for the next annual general meeting, receiving

Brighton was selected for the next annual general meeting, receiving 38 votes, against 30 given for Chichester.

The meeting concluded with a vote of thanks, proposed by Mr. Rickman, to the Bishop for presiding and for the address which he was later to give, the Bishop briefly replying.

A WORK OF NOBILITY AND MYSTERY.

At the service subsequently held in St. Peter's Church, the singing was led by the choir and organ, and the Bishop gave an interesting address based on the words, 'Thou shalt use them for the calling of the congregation.' He pointed out that from the earliest times musical instruments had been used for summoning the people to worship, and almost from the dawn of Christianity in England bells worship, and almost from the dawn of Christianity in England bells had been used for the purpose. For hundreds of years in Sussex the bells had rung from the church towers, and the jubilee which they were celebrating that day, while it marked an epoch in the history of their County Association, also formed a landmark in the much longer history of change ringing in the belfries of the Sussex churches in village and in town. It was a very happy thing that they, who represented so many belfries in the county, should assemble at that service on their jubilee day and give thanks to God, not only as individuals, but as a great society of those who rang the church bells throughout the county. He would like to think that there in that service all the belfries of Sussex were invisibly present, and that those not represented by their own ringers were with them in spirit, so that on that day that service was a service as the institute of the country. so that on that day that service was a common act of jubilee of praise and thanksgiving from the innumerable belfries of Sussex.

Having referred to the many public uses of bells, the Bishop went on to say that he knew from his experience at Canterbury how ringers regarded their work as possessing a nobility and a mystery ringers regarded their work as possessing a nobility and a mystery all its own. They looked upon ringing not only as a physical or athletic exercise, but as a mental experience, so to speak, which expressed semething which they found in their own hearts. The ringer of to-day had a sense of strong responsibility about him, and the true ringer, who had grown for many years accustomed to the beliry, who valued the mystery of his art, did feel there was something belfry, who valued the mystery of his art, did feel there was something sacred and something really religious about the work he did. No ringer, who remembered what he was doing and where he was, could fail to recollect the main purpose of his calling and that he, too, should play his part in the offering of worship to God. That day they thanked God for preserving the association through its 50 years. They would thank God, many of them, for calling them as individuals to the work of ringing, and they would go back from that service, from their meeting and from their social gathering that night with a new determination to be loyal to the great tradition of the change ringers of Sussex and with a new determination to nerform their work ringers of Sussex and with a new determination to perform their work as worshipping servants of Almighty God.

During the concluding hymn a collection was taken for the association's benevolent fund.

A dinner in colebration of the jubilee was held in the evening at the Old Ship Hotel, when Mr. J. T. Rickman presided over a company of nearly 120 and an interesting programme was carried out. A report of the speeches will appear in our next issue.

Hastings spoke from Ps. 150, vv. 3-5, and in the course of his address said churches and their ornaments were a sign of the of his address said churches and their ornaments were a sign of the state of religion in the land. Each generation must bring increased invention and art into God's service. During the last 50 years there had been a great advance; more reverence, better singing, organs improved, and church bells had received greater attention. That revival of church forces was in itself a bulwark, and had been making headway since the Oxford Movement in the '40's of the last century. It was a privilege to come to St. Mary's Parish Church, Kidderminster, to see the improvements recently completed. The need had been improvement in the last the work was a privilege from eight to twelve hells and the work peal had been increased from eight to twelve bells, and the work represented an enormous improvement. The tower and bells of a parish church like St. Mary's were a great institution. The old stone tower pointed upward telling them of that higher life for which this

was a preparation. The bells were the outward voice of the church, appealing to the car, as the tower appealed to the eye. Church towers and bells preached a sermon which reached all—of warning,

appealing to the ear, as the tower appealed to the eye. Church towers and bells preached a sermon which reached all—of warning, thanksgiving, Christmas, Easter and messages of national rejoicings. Having briefly traced the development and use of church bells, the preacher proceeded: 'Change ringing is an art of great fascination: it requires the accurate use of eye, ear, mind and muscle. It requires arms, muscles and intellect,' said the preacher. 'A ringer must exercise most of the Christian virtues if he is to be a useful member of the helfry. He must have perseverance, self-denial, charity and loving kindness.' He learnt to become a ringer at Areley Kings, Stourport, when nine years old, and, speaking for himself, he knew of nothing that was bound to teach those moral qualities better than belonging to a band of ringers, for they had to practise those things which could only be learnt by practice. It required team work just the same as in the rowing crews of Oxford and Cambridge, which is regarded as the most strenuous form of team work, and be even more mechanical. But the reward was great. There could be no greater pleasure than taking part in good ringing—in exercising all the faculties at the same time, swinging a mass of metal rhythmically and making music with others, music that was perhaps peculiar, but a most satisfying form of musical melody.

Speaking from an experience of nearly 60 years, Mr. Hastings said he strongly recommended any young man who was willing to learn to join a band of ringers, and if he persevered he would not only be helping tho church, but would provide himself with an engrossing pastime and art that he could follow to extreme old age.

The preacher paid tribute to the recent work of completing a peal of 12 in St. Mary's Church tower, and said 'it is perfectly splendid.' He remembered what Tom Salter used to tell him about having a

of 12 in St. Mary's Church tower, and said 'it is perfectly splendid.' He remembered what Tom Salter used to tell him about liaving a peal of 12 at Kidderminster. Tom Salter would have loved to have been present to see what had been done in that tower. Those who came to take part in that ceremony were also honouring the memory

came to take part in that ceremony were also honouring the memory of their departed friend, Tom Salter, who loved that work.

Mr. Hastings passed on to speak of the additions made from time to time, from two or three bells until he believed that in 1754 they had a peal of eight bells. Change ringing had now spread to other countries. He rejoiced that at St. Mary's they now had 12 instead of the old octave of eight bells. The work was finished in the tower, and, so far as the bells were concerned, he thought it would last for generations. He trusted the bells would be rung as they had been for a thousand years, calling people to church, reminding them of the Christian wittues of perseverance self-denial and chanity which should Christian virtues of perseverance, self-denial and charity which should be the fruits and test of their Christian calling.

The service closed with the hymn, 'Praise my soul,' and the blessing.

The company afterwards had tea with Canon Sladen in St. Mary's

Parish Hall.

Mr. C. H. Woodberry expressed thanks to the Vicar for his hospitality, which was seconded by Mr. Keith Salter, son of the late Mr. J. T. Salter. Mr. Salter gave a statement on the response to St. Mary's own ringers' appeal for £100 to complete the work, which included improvements at their own request. So far they had raised

Mary's own ringers' appeal for Exou to complete the work, which included improvements at their own request. So far they had raised £58, and were pressing the matter.

Canon L. B. Sladen, replying, said he was glad to see such a representative gathering, and to hear the reassuring statement by the Rev. J. F. Hastings that everything was now quite satisfactory. Even the new electric clock had taken part in an unrehearsed incident during the night in anticipation, as it were, of such a gathering. The old chimes, which had proved a failure, were now removed and in their place they had four additional bells to make a peal of twelve, and thus give Kidderminster the distinction of being the only Parish Church in Worcestershire with such a peal. Canon Sladen said the striking apparatus went off 'on its own account' and kept on striking for 1½ hours without stopping during the night. It must have felt it would not be outdone by anything which might transpire at their meeting that day. Things were now in proper working order. The firm of Messrs. Gillett and Johnston had done good work and they were well satisfied with it. The Vicar announced for the information of distant associations of change ringers who wished to have the use of St. Mary's bells that they should make application direct to him or to Mr. Keith Salter, and for the first Saturday in any mouth. Applications would be passed on to the local ringers for recommendation, but, generally speaking, he would be pleased to put the belfry but, generally speaking, he would be pleased to put the beifry

at their disposal.

Mr. S. R. Roper, of Messrs. Gillett and Johnston, Ltd., thanked the Mr. S. R. Roper, of Messrs. Gillett and Johnston, Ltd., thanked the Vicar and the people of Kidderminster for the way in which he and his firm had been treated. He had handled the job personally from start to finish and kept touch with Messrs. Woodberry and Salter, who had been most helpful. The bells in St. Mary's tower were cast by three different founders. In the course of the present scheme Messrs. Gillett and Johnston used two 'dead' bells in the tower and recast them into three treble bells. On other 'dead' bell, the present No. 4, was retained in the new peal of twelve. All had been retuned and restored before rehanging. Mr. Roper, thanking speakers for their appreciations, said he was glad to see Mrs. J. T. Salter there. It was 15 or 16 years since he last came to Kidderminster and met It was 15 or 16 years since he last came to Kidderminster and met the late Mr. Tom Saiter, who told him how much he would like to see a peal of twelve bells at St. Mary's.

#### FOR BEGINNERS.

IN AND OUT OF COURSE.

A recent argument with regard to bringing Stedman Triples into

rounds is a reminder of one of the principles of change ringing. It has to do with certain mathematical laws as applied to the construction of methods, and we will try to put it into simple language

construction of methods, and we will try to put it into simple language for the beginner.

There are, in ringing, two kinds of changes—changes which keep the bells 'in course' and changes which put the bells 'out-of-course.'

The bells are 'in-course' when the given 'change' has been produced by the changing of an even number of pairs of bells—as, in Doubles, changing 1 and 2; and 3 and 4, producing 21435; and changing 1 and 4, and 3 and 5, producing 24153.

The bells are 'out-of-course' when the given change has been produced by changing an odd number of pairs of bells—as, in Triples, changing 1 and 2, 3 and 4, and 5 and 6, producing 214365.

But while in Doubles (or Caters) every row of figures thus set down is 'in-course,' until a Single is made, in Triples the rows of figures are alternately one 'out-of-course' and one 'in-course.'

The reason is that all Doubles changes are even changes, and all

The reason is that all Doubles changes are even changes, and all Triples changes are odd changes, and two even numbers, as we know, produce an even number, and two odd numbers also produce an

Thus, in pure Triples, ALL handstrokes are out-of-course and ALL

Thus, in pure Triples, ALL handstrokes are ont-or-course and ALL backstrokes are in-course.

A 'Single,' which in Triples is generally the change of two pairs of bells only, changes the nature of the rows, and all handstrokes become 'in-course' and all backstrokes 'out-of-course.'

Rounds is an 'in-course or 'even' row, and can only be produced when the bells are in-course.

These a single has been made, therefore, rounds expect occur at

Unless a single has been made, therefore, rounds cannot occur at a handstroke, or 'odd' row.

Further, if a single has been made, the bells cannot be got round at backstroke by any combination of bobs.

#### DO YOU KNOW

- (1) The difference between a plain hunt and a Treble Bob hunt?

#### IF YOU DON'T, THEN-

(1) The plain hunt (already described in these beginner's queries) is the passage of a beil, one step at a time, straight from front to back and from back to front. A Treble Bob hunt causes the bell to dodge in each pair of places, as 1.2, 3.4, 5.6, etc., both from front to back and back to front, with a whole pull between the dodges belind and a whole pull at lead between the dodges in front. The process is like taking three steps forward and one back, instead of, as in plain hunting, walking steadily in one direction.

(3) Benjamin Annable lived in the first half of the 16th century. He was a baker by trade. He joined the College Youths in 1721, was Master in 1746 and died in 1756. Of him it was said, 'Till his time ringing was only called an Art, but from the strength of his great Genius he married it to the Mathematics, and 'tis now a Science. This man of Figures and Ringing was like a Newton in Philosophy, a Ratcliffe in Physic, a Hardwick in Wisdom and Law, a Handel in Music, a Shakespeare in Writing, a Garrick in Acting. O rare Ben.' Needless to say, a man of such reputation was a great leader in ringing thought in those early days. In fact, like other great pioneers in science, he was in advance of his times.


