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## SOUTHOVER BELLS AND RINGERS

$T$ WO interesting documents are to hand this week. The first is a - letter from the Rev. D. G. Matthews, Rector, appealing for $£ 250$ to enable Southover bells, upon which the founder of this journal learned to ring, to be rehung. Donations, he states, will be gratefully received by Mr. A. Neal, Durlston, Rotten Row, 'Lewes. This restoration fund, we know, will be of special interest to our readers.

The second is the manuscript of a lecture by George P. Elphick on 'Southover Church: its bells and ringers.' Space will not permit of its reproduction, but it provides on insight into ringing in this Sussex village. The bells (the finest ring of 10 in Sussex) that require the attention of the bellhanger to-day were cast by Thomas Mears in 1839, with a new frame constructed by William Markwick, of Uckfield. The bells were opened on Monday, October 28th, 1839, by the local ringers at 11 a.m., and ringing continued for the rest of the morning. In the afternoon a quarter-peal of Grandsire Triples was rung by a band from Brighton, conducted by a Mr. Tester, followed by touches being rung by bands from Uckfield, Waldron and Chailey. This bears witness to the enthusiasm that ringers of a hundred years ago possessed for a bell opening to be held during working time.

One of the company present was Mr. Thomas Goldsmith, the Parish Clerk. He possessed a copy of Shipway's "Treatise on Ringing; which is now in the library of Guildford Diocesan Guild. By trade he was a wheelwright, having his workshop opposite the church, and was also the first licensee of the King's Head. His son, John Goldsmith, followed both his father's trade and also took over the inn.
One of the earliest peal boards remaining in the tower records a peal of Holt's Original rung by the Lewes Society of Change Ringers on December 6th, 1869. The band was T. Goldsmith 1, J. Brooks 2, C. Warner 3, J. Pryor 4, J. Goldsmith 5, J. Box 6, J. Acton 7, C. Wren 8. Thomas Goldsmith on the treble was one of the company in 1839 when the bells were opened. He was 65 years old and this is the only record of his having rung a peal. Thomas died when he reached his three score years and ten on April 12th, 1875, and was buried alongside of the tower of his beloved church, leaving his son, John, who rang the sixth in the 1869 peal, to carry on. On January 13th, 1878 , John was presented with a son by Emma, his second wife, who was a Devonshire woman. He was christened John Sparkes, his second Christian name being his mother's maiden name. Little did his parents dream of the vital part he would be called upon to play in the Exercise. Of him it may be said he lad ringing in his blood.

A revival of change ringing at Southover was mainly the work of three men, Robert James Dawe, Alfred John Turner and John Sparkes Goldsmith. Alfred Tumer, who was born in 1872 and had only one eye, taught Jack Goldsmith to handle a bell. He rang 387 peals and was a Royal Cumberland Youth. The first reference to Jack Goldsmith with regard to ringing was in 1887, when at the age of nine he was given permission to be released from Southover Day School for a quarter of an hour on saints' days to chime a bell for the 11 o'clock service. His mother was parish clerk, which office she took over on the death of his father when he was six, and consequently it was his mother who inspired and insisted that he should become a ringer. His first peal, Holt's ten-part, on which he took the treble, was rumg on April 8th, 1893. He was 16 when he called his first peal, and he called his first of Superlative on his 21st birthday at Southover, a few weeks after the ringing of his $100 t^{t h}$ peal at Arundel.
Of Robert John Dawe, Mr. Elphick writes he began his ringing career at Southover in 1889 and was a carpenter and joiner by trade. About that time the Rev. C. D. P. Davies was a curate at Ringmer, a village three miles from Lewes, and these youngsters used to tramp over to Ringmer each week. Bob never forgot the dressing down the Rev. Davies gave him for learning Grandsire Doubles br hoart. One of the latter's favourite tricks was to jump across the tower to an offender if he did not do as he was told in double quick time. Another of his peculiar habits was to take off his shirt for ringing. Bob Dawe rang in all 483 peals, over 160 being rung at Southover.

Service in All Saints' at $11 \mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m}$. was conducted by the clerical secretary (the Rev. H. Hartley), together with the Dean of Worcester (the Very Rev, Arthur Davies) and the Rector of All Saints' (Bishop Lasbrey). with the Rev. Newman spoke of this number of closed churches having rings of bells in the city, with special reference to the ring of eight at St. Helen's, and spoke of a case where he understood a single bell had already left the county. It was decided that the secretary should write to the two Archdeacons, with a copy to the Lord Bishop, asking that such bells be retained within the diocese, and go to churches requiring fresh rings.
During the afternoon and evening bells available for ringing were: Cathedral (12), All Saints' and Claines (10), St. John's and Hallow (8).

## SURPRISE METHOD NOMENCLATURE

Sir,-A method first rung in 1907 as 'Super lative Surprise, Rochester variation '-Superla, tive with the whole pull moved from seventh's to the lead--has recently been rung again and the point arises as to what the method should be called.

It is the accepted practice for a band to name a method that is rung for the first time. History also tells us that a split lead method acquires a new name Yorkshire and Belgrave, for example. It seems logical that this should be so, for the work of the parent method is somewhat drastically changed in its offspring. The obvious name for the method under discussion is Rochester, but this was appropriated in 1924 by the Leiston men when they were threatening to exhaust all the place-names in the country: Perhaps Southgate would be acceplable since the method was first rung there.

The Exercise mar possibly pardon those responsible if the 'Rochester variation of Superlative ' is renamed Southgate. 'To do this is setting no precedent, for the Central Council Methods Committee very rightly renamed a number of Minor methods of the comic variety, and at least one Royal method has taken on a territorial name in place of a purely personal one.
It is surely unfortunate in the first place that the name Superlative was chosen, but there followed Champion. Premier and Supreme-names which do not appear in their literal sense justified. And we still tolerate Primrose though, mercifully, few breathe the name and at least two methods were named after princesses. The reform of our Surprise method nomenclature certainly appears to be overdue.-Yours faithfullv.
