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HOPE IN ABERGAVENNY

ABERGAVENNY is one of the chief market towns of Monmouthshire. In the future it will be one of the ringing centres for the Llandaff and Monmouth Diocesan Association, for on August 9th a fine ring of ten bells was rededicated by the Lord Bishop of Monmouth. The town lies surrounded by magnificent mountains, and is very well disposed for travel access. It is indeed fitting that it should possess what must now be one of the finest rings of ten in the country.

The Priory Church of St. Mary is an old Benedictine Church. The tower is a central one, and the present ringing chamber was once part of the old lantern tower. The former ring of eight bells was badly in need of attention, and recently Abergavenny and district responded magnificently to the appeal made, and over £300 has been raised for rehangng the bells and restoring the tower. The old seventh has been preserved, but the other bells were recast and three new ones added to give a ring of ten with tenor nearly 26 cwt. John Taylor and Co. have again excelled themselves. The old louvres will be completely blocked, and a special structure in the tower roof has been built to allow exit for the sound.

It will be some time before Abergavenny will be able to sport a Caters band, but the enthusiasm is there. The whole Exercise will wish them every success, and will hope that their ring will be a centre for the Exercise in the neighbourhood.

After the imposing service of rededication, during which the local band rang rounds on the bells for the first time, visiting ringers sampled the new ring, and everyone present had at least rounds. Courses of Grandsire Caters were brought round, and everyone was very impressed by the mellow grandeur of this new addition to our Art.

After a lengthy stand off under doctor's orders, Sidney O. Cheney, Leicester Cathedral band, makes a welcome reappearance in the peal columns, with the peal of Yorkshire Surprise Royal at Loughborough.

It is something new to ring a peal of Doubles at Manchester Town Hall. The team consisted of five members of Manchester City Police and P.C. Hardisty, of Salford City Police. The fact that there were five first peals speaks well for the Police Guild's instructors. The peal was rung on Aug. 21st.

In place of the false peal rung on July 17th, 1948, at Christ Church, Macclesfield, in honour of the silver wedding of the Rev. and Mrs. A. Clarke, a true peal was rung on August 14th. The band wish to associate Messrs. W. Gayes and J. Fernley with this peal, as they stood in the false peal.

BELFRY GOSSIP

A query has been placed against the claim of the Oxford ringers at Trowbridge to have rung the first course of Cambridge Maximus at Trowbridge. The suggestion is that the late William Pye called a peal of Cambridge Maximus at Trowbridge very soon after they were augmented to 12.

Mr. T. C. Belton, a Leicestershire ringer, has named his two spaniel puppies 'Major' and 'Minor.' He is in the centre of the hunting country.

Attendance at the meeting of the Mid-Devon Branch of the Devon Guild at Newton Abbot last week included ringers from Rochdale, Lancashire.

Barwell, Leics., have elected three new members to their band, bringing the strength of the company to 17. Eight are subscribers to 'The Ringing World.' The band are now practising Double Norwich.

At a meeting of the Newbury Branch of the Oxford Diocesan Guild held recently at Beedon, members stood in silence in memory of Albert Smith, of Thatcham, who had been a ringer for 60 years, foreman of Thatcham tower for 20 years and a branch representative for several years; also for William Smith, a member of Newbury tower.

IN THE GARDEN OF ENGLAND

AN AMBITIOUS KENT TOUR

One of the most ambitious ringing tours, combining not only peal attempts, but organised 'tower grabbing,' was held with Folkestone as headquarters from August 7th to 14th.

Those of us who have travelled on previous 'Knight's Tours' will acknowledge this to be the most successful yet, and months of preparation and the writing of more than two hundred and fifty letters by the organiser, Frank C. W. Knight, were amply rewarded by the success of the venture and the quality of the ringing.

The party numbered 32, including the coach driver, who after his third ringing week is now a recognised member of the party. It was regretted that owing to indisposition Mr. Cecil Ebberson was this year unable to be present, and the familiar figure of the Shepherd with his rule was also missed. We were pleased to have with us that veteran peal ringer, Mr. George Newton, as well as Leslie Wightman and the talented Pipe family.

By the time the writer had caught up with the party at Birehington on the Monday, already five out of six peal attempts had been scored, and the sixth—Double Norwich at Birehington—was in the safe hands of Arthur Tomlinson. Elham, which had defied three previous attempts by tourists, and the heavy going tenor at Lyminge—a tough job at any time—had fallen at the first onslaught, and only at Hythe had Cambridge Major been lost through a shift course half way.

CAMBRIDGE THE FAVOURITE.

Cambridge—the favourite method of the week—was knocked off in fine style on one of the best eights in the county on Monday morning, a good start for the week. A true story was told the writer some years ago concerning this grand octave. The late Canon Helmores, who was prejudiced against iron bell frames on the grounds that they adversely affected the tone of the bells, was listening to this fine ring and remarked to the then captain, Mr. Arthur Saxby, they wouldn't have sounded half so good in an iron frame. The late captain had not the heart to enlighten the Canon, and since he was physically unable to ascend the vertical ladder to the bells, he was spared the shock of learning that the bells are hung in an iron frame.

Cambridge was also selected for the two 'left-handed' rings at New Romney and Tenterden, the latter being the heaviest octave in the county. Opinions on these bells are diverse—one veteran of the party considered them the best bells visited during the week—another applied for inclusion in the High Halden peal purposely to get away from the sound of them. A non-ringer was heard enquiring for the iron foundry as he had heard a lot of anvils, and the opinion of mine host of the nearby hostelry, who threatened to fetch his gun, left no room for doubt. At Tenterden the party were joined by Mr. Fred Macey, a well-known figure in Kent ringing circles, who had come specially to meet Mr. George Newton after 30 years.

THE FAILURES.

Failures were few, and of these, St. Peter's in Thanet (Broadstairs), on the Thursday morning, was the most disappointing—especially for youthful George Pipe ringing the second faultlessly, and for the conductor, Mark Lancefield, attempting his first peal of Cambridge as conductor. As Middleton's peal had already been rung several times on the tour, the conductor decided at the last moment to call a 5.156, and when only three leads from home down came the second rope. Had the conductor called Middleton's or even had the 'tower grabbers' ringing prior to the peal been curtailed, the probability is that the rope would have held out until the peal had been scored. However, an extra attempt was ar-

ranged for the Saturday at Chilham with the same band apart from the treble 'man' and successfully brought round on bells which are more pleasing to ring and to listen to, for whereas St. Peter's bells are irritatingly quiet, Chilham's are comfortably loud and lend themselves both to speeding and to 'tapping.'

While the peal attempt at St. Peter's was in progress, four of the party attempted a peal 'in hand' in the vestry, but owing to excessive 'speeding' this came to grief about half way. According to an authority in the party, had the peals been successful it would have been the first time that two peals had been rung simultaneously in the one church, but as neither was successful presumably it may have been the first time two peals have been lost simultaneously in one church.

It was also a disappointment that after three hours' good ringing Kent Treble Bob was lost at Lydd through one of those unaccountable occurrences in peal ringing—be it a premature call through over anxiety on the part of the conductor or the usual fatigue after three hours' ringing when the band may not be so alert. The most surprised and chagrined were the various conductors outside the tower, hearing the peal 'going to pieces,' yet impotent to prevent it.

Since the tourists visited Lydd two years ago the church has been re-roofed after its direct hit, which happily missed the tower—a landmark for miles on Romney Marsh—and left its excellent octave unimpaired, but as a gesture and an appreciation of the privilege of ringing there, at the suggestion of Jim Pipe a collection was made towards the restoration fund, and the sum of £2 15s. handed to the church authorities.

BROOKLANDS' NOISY FIVE.

While the Lydd attempt was in progress the remainder of the party had visited the unique belfry at Brooklands with its noisy ring of five in the minor scale. This tower is, in fact, a wooden spire built on the ground independently of the church, and there is only one very inadequate floor between the ringers and the

bells, and the only opening for light is the one doorway. An attempted quarter-peal came adrift through a rope slipping its wheel, and those not taking part derived entertainment listening to the bobs being yelled by Pat Cannon—it was possible to take down the calling from across the road, not by listening to the bells, but by listening to the conductor from outside the tower. During the ringing two motor-coaches of visitors called at the church, and as the occupants all took it in turn to stand in the doorway, thus completely shutting out the light, it was not surprising that the conductor threatened to commit murder before the day was out.

The visitors would like to express their appreciation of the many privileges afforded them during a memorable week, notably among these the opportunity to ring at Quex Park, the privileges of mid-week peals at Dover and at Ashford, the lavish hospitality shown by the captain of the Dover ringers, Mr. Charles Turner, and sincere thanks are due to all the various incumbents and towerkeepers for permission to ring and in many cases for meeting the visitors.

Special mention should be made of two of Frank C. W. Knight's pupils from the Church of the Annunciation, Chislehurst, J. L. Morris, age 12, and J. H. Arlet, age 13, who scored creditable peals during the week. Both 'started from scratch' only last September, while congratulations are due to D. J. Charney, of Isleworth, who at his first attempt at conducting called his own original composition of Bob Major.

On the Saturday, when the company assembled for the last time, Mr. George Newton, before leaving to return to his duties at Liverpool Cathedral, expressed on behalf of the company the grateful thanks and appreciation of the organiser's efforts and congratulated him on the success of his work and presented him with a tobacco pouch, pipe, lighter and cigarette case.

Departure time came all too soon, but at least one member of the party has applied for inclusion in the next tour.

Dedication

ABERGAVERN HAS NOW TEN.

After a silence of over two years, the bells of St. Mary's, Abergavenny, were rung on August 9th at the dedication of the ring of ten by the Bishop of Monmouth. The scheme has cost £4,125 and includes recasting seven of the old bells and casting three additional bells. Alterations have also been made to the tower to enable the sound of the bells to be carried over the countryside.

The church was crowded to capacity for the service, which was conducted by the Vicar (Canon M. E. Davies). In the course of his address the Bishop said:—

'I am glad to say that in this diocese, as well as I suppose, every diocese throughout the land, there is a noticeable increase in the interest which people take in the English art of bellringing.'

'A number of rings have already been recast, additions made to some of them and new bells provided. I am told that young people—even young girls—are taking with special enthusiasm to the practice of this remarkable art, and that the older ones have come back to it with increased enthusiasm because of the enforced rest from their activity during the war.'

'I rather think I saw in the congregation someone who has quite a special record of bellringing in this diocese, and except for those years of enforced inactivity during the war, has been ringing church bells here for more than 50 years, and in his ripe old age is pass-

ing on his knowledge, skill and enthusiasm to the younger folk, who will go on ringing church bells when God has called him to rest.'

Referring to the prayer for 'those who shall ring these bells that they may be filled with reverence and godly fear,' the Bishop remarked that in times past this very much needed to be said. 'It is a rather peculiar thing,' he continued, 'that those who rang church bells very frequently, having finished their ringing to summon the people to God's house, walked away and took no further interest in the public worship that was being offered. It always seems a strange fact that they should gladly give of their time and energy to summon people to church and not feel any desire themselves to join with the people they have summoned in the worship of Almighty God.'

SALISBURY DIOCESAN GUILD

A ringers' service, with special psalms, hymns and prayers, was held at All Saints', Kingston Magna, on August 13th, to commemorate the tercentenary of the fourth of the five bells, which was cast in the year 1648. Grandshire and Stedman Doubles were rung.

Psalm 150 was sung to the accompaniment of organ, violin and handbells, all played by the local ringers, one of whom played the opening voluntary and read the second lesson. The hymns were accompanied on handbells by visiting ringers from Childre Oxford, who also rang changes in standard methods after the Magnificat and at the close of the sermon. The sermon was preached by the Rev. F. L. Edwards, Rector and general sec. of the Guild.

Leicestershire Tour

The suggestion that a body of ringers should make a tour of a few of the towers in Leicestershire during August Bank Holiday Week very quickly gained favour. Much ground had to be covered in the ten remaining days previous to Saturday, July 31st—towers contacted in addition to ringers.

Finally, however, a programme was drawn up and it was on Saturday, July 31st, an attempt was made for Stedman Caters on the lovely ring at St. Margaret's, Leicester. Some really good ringing was evident from the word 'go,' and the standard set was maintained for three hours and ten minutes, then, alas! the tenor rope, after shedding 'much of its coat,' was in two parts with the gallant Allan Cattell clutching the short end.

Indeed, such luck could not remain. Some of the band that were scheduled for Melton Mowbray, after taking a quick lunch, found themselves at the wrong end of a long string of people endeavouring to get to Melton Mowbray. It was not until 3 o'clock that the party were able to get mobile; such delay consequently had tragic reverses upon their arrival, as Mr. Burley P. Morris and Mr. Ernest Whitmore were reluctantly compelled to withdraw from the attempt owing to the time of departure from Leicester of their last train to Kettering. Making the most of the next three hours and twenty-two minutes, the remaining eight were successful in scoring Cambridge Major. A word of praise is due to Mr. J. J. Morris for the manner in which he rang the tenor, and who, although severely 'blistered,' stuck to his guns or at least the 25 cwt. above him.

The band were indeed sorry to learn that Mr. Ted Whitehead, with his daughter Mavis as pillion passenger, had met with an accident on the outskirts of Melton Mowbray, which was to result in Mavis (who stood in the Caters) spending the night in the War Memorial Hospital with a very badly cut knee.

On Sunday, the very nice ring of eight at Gilmorton provided the second victory with another peal of Cambridge and in which two members scored 'firsts.'

The grand ring of eight at Sileby was visited on the following morning, but unfortunately the attempt for another peal of Cambridge was brought to a conclusion after one hour and eighteen minutes.

With Mount Sorrel programmed for the afternoon, the whole band, after 'some' had taken refreshments, set out on foot and arrived in time for a 3.30 p.m. start. This light ring was perfectly struck for two hours and fifteen minutes, and then a second—alas! not the rope this time, but the gallant Cattell himself was compelled to give in through feeling unwell.

On Tuesday morning Enderby provided the next tower, and a really well-struck peal of Double Norwich was brought round after two hours and a thirty-two minutes, the quickest peal of Major yet rung on these bells.

The afternoon of Tuesday saw some of the Enderby band en route for Earl Shilton, where Cambridge Major was again successful.

Wednesday was a comparatively easy day, for it was not until 6 o'clock that St. Andrew's, Countesthorpe, with its grand ring of six, was to be visited. The band was again successful with Cambridge; the peal enabled Mr. W. A. Riddington to complete the circle. Thursday was to be a holiday, but not according to programme; the 'few' were compelled to take the day off as the number could not be made up to visit Barwell.

Loughborough Parish Church was visited on the following day, but the attempt for Cambridge Royal was unsuccessful after an hour's ringing.

To complete and really crown all endeavours a long handbell peal was attempted on the Saturday in St. Margaret's belfry, and the success of this provided a record for the Leicester Guild.

Ringing Week in W. Cornwall

West Cornwall was again the target area for eleven enthusiasts on their ringing holiday during the first week in August. A peal a day plus at least one tower 'snatch' was the aim and in spite of the travel difficulties in this rather scattered area the week was most successful.

The last member of the party arrived at H.Q. at Carbis Bay in the late afternoon of Saturday, July 31st, and within the hour the bells went off into the first peal. Discouragement from the powers-that-be was ignored, for the method chosen was Plain Bob Triples and everyone agreed that the music produced was quite pleasant.

For Sunday service ringing the visitors assisted at Carbis Bay, and in the afternoon they travelled into the heart of the pixie country for a peal of Canterbury Pleasure Major at Towedack. The inside of this tower is very small for a belfry and strange things happened during the peal. One well-known ringer suddenly tried to ring the lamp hanging in the middle of the circle and another's rope twice became 'pisky-laden' and she had to dance around the belfry in pursuit! Nevertheless, a good peal was rung in memory of the late Mr. Hugh Dunstan, former treasurer of the Truro Diocesan Guild, by whose generosity the bells were rehung and augmented last November.

On Monday morning an early start was to be made for Kent at Gulval, but at least a quarter of an hour was spent in discovering that the needle of the carburettor in the 'chariot' had to be pulled instead of pushed. The party eventually arrived at Gulval, where they were welcomed by Mr. William Wood, and a good peal of Kent was rung. After lunch St. Mary's, Penzance (8), and Ludgvan (6) were sampled.

The early peal successes were not to last, for Stedman Triples failed at St. Keverne on Tuesday after an hour and a quarter's excellent ringing. The hero of this day was young Jim, who cycled well over 50 miles and seemed to arrive at the towers almost as soon as the cars. After lunch at the charming village of Coverack, the party sped on to Landewednack (6), the most southerly church in England, and to Mullion (6), churches in such beautiful surroundings that for the first and only time during the week sightseeing took precedence over ringing for one or two members of the party.

Confidence was restored on Wednesday when the first peal of New Cambridge in the county was rung at Helston, of Furry Dance fame. Apparently the few flew at the local Council offices, for a message was sent requesting the cessation of ringing as the staff could not think, read or write! Unfortunately for the staff this message never reached the ringers! In the afternoon Wendron (6) was visited and a few members went on to Redruth to join the local ringers at their practice in the evening.

On Thursday a peal of Bob Major was scored at Budock, recently rehung and augmented to eight. After the peal the Vicar (the Rev. R. A. Williams) and Mrs. Williams very kindly provided cups of tea and the party moved on to Mabe (6), where the Vicar and a number of the local ringers were waiting to welcome them. After ringing the visitors were the guests of the local ringers at tea.

Friday was the highlight of the week with a peal at Truro Cathedral. Kenwyn (8) and Kea (8) were visited during the morning and early afternoon, the party reassembling at the Cathedral for a start immediately after evening. 'Young Tom o' Devon' and Bill Birmingham, of Slough, joined the party for this peal, and Oxford Royal came home in 3 hours 44 minutes. This was the first peal of Oxford in the county.

The last attempt of the week was made at St. Anthony-in-Meneage, delightfully situated on the banks of a creek of the Helford River. Unfortunately, one car got lost on the journey and consequently there was a late start.

OBITUARY

MR. MAURICE SMITHER.

As briefly announced last week, Mr. Maurice Smither, of Chiddingfold, Surrey, died suddenly on August 20th. He was cycling to work when he was taken ill. His bicycle was 'discovered' resting on the kerb and Mr. Smither was found in sitting position dead. He was 67 years of age.

Mr. Smither came to Guildford from Maidenhead in 1907, and from then until he moved to Chiddingfold was a member of the Holy Trinity band. He took part in all the first Surprise peals rung by the band and in hundreds of handbell peals. He rang in 10,025 Stedman Caters on tower bells at Haslemere in 1931 and also 7,023 and 7,777 Stedman Caters 'in hand.' On another occasion he rang a peal 'in hand' on six weekdays in succession at a different place, on different bells and a different length. He was a first-class striker and a good steady ringer.

An 'in memoriam' peal of Stedman Triples was rung at St. Mary's Church, Chiddingfold, on August 28th, conducted by A. H. Pulling.

WILLIAM P. GARRETT.

AN APPRECIATION.

Ipswich has produced many notable ringers, amongst them being William P. Garrett, whose death, under tragic circumstances, was reported last week. He was of very gentle and kindly disposition, never boastful, but genuinely proud of the traditions of the St. Mary-le-Tower company.

Contemporary with Motts, Pemberton, Catchpole, Brundle, Tillet and later Symonds and Sedgley, he helped to build up a very strong and versatile company at Ipswich, and their performances in various Maximus methods about 20 years ago were very noteworthy. 'Bill' Garrett was entitled to be a proud man, for he was the first to ring 100 peals of Maximus, including the first ever of eight or nine Surprise methods.

He would never spare any trouble to ensure the success of any enterprise embarked upon for the good of ringing, was tidy and methodical in his habits and thinking, and his very last act was typical of the man, for he set his bell and then sat down and passed away. We have lost a very dear friend and we shall miss his cheery smiling greeting.

The sympathy of the whole Exercise will go out to his relatives, and particularly to the St. Mary-le-Tower Society. It is certain that the good work put in by Bill Garrett will live after him. J.F.S.

Continuing, a call was made at St. Mary's, Barnard Castle (8, tenor 17 cwt.), where the Association's influence has not been felt for many years. These bells have little to recommend them either for tone or 'go,' but a really good course of Kent Treble Bob Major was rung with Dick Gofton putting the tenor in its place. It is interesting to record that the one and only peal on these bells was rung during a visit of the Rev. F. E. Robinson on February 10th, 1906, when 'the variation' was brought round in 3 hours 11 minutes.

Crossing the River Tees, a 'raid' was made into the North Riding with a call at Richmond, where we had a first-class tea and a pleasant hour on the bells of St. Mary's (8, tenor 11 cwt.). Turning north, we commenced the homeward stretch and made our last call at St. Cuthbert's, Darlington, where we were able to join in with the local ringers in their practice. A feature of the ringing here was a course of Grandsire Triples by seven ladies with our president doing the honours 'behind.'

And so another busman's holiday came to an end. Its success can best be judged by the numerous requests of 'where are we going next year?' Credit for all the arrangements must be given to Mr. W. E. Robinson, our hon. secretary, who unfortunately could not be present to see the results of his work.

BURFORD RINGERS IN SOMERSET.

Afterwards they tried their skill on handbells, which they were specially interested in, as their school possesses a full ring of handbells.

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
