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MINOR METHODS TABLE

I NSTRUCTORS and progressive ringers will find the Central Council's latest production, 'Four Way Table of Minor Methods,' by J. Segar, jun., an invaluable aid in the grouping of methods both for ease of learning and in the preparation of many method peals.

The table measures 18in. by 12in., and is printed on one side only. There are 16 columns and 36 lines, making 576 spaces in all. Of these, 147 are filled in with the numbers and names of Treble Bob, Delight and Surprise methods. Plain methods are not included.

It is accepted without question that the easiest way to learn a number of methods with the least practice is to ring those of the same group. To jump from Cambridge Surprise to London Surprise is not easy as they have nothing in common. To pass from Cambridge to other methods which have Cambridge work either above or below the treble is easier. These principles of similarity of grouping have not been observed in the Central Council Collection. Some day, perhaps, the collection may be published in accordance with a 'Four Way Table'-not necessarily Mr. Segar's. Until then, Mr. Segar's table will perform a useful function.

Incorporated into the table are all the 147 methods. It is possible to start at any particular point. For example, Cambridge will be found in a column with 10 other methods having the same work above the treble (Ipswich, Bourne, Surfleet, York, Durham, Beverley, Elston, Burnaby, Kirkstall and Burslem). Also Cambridge is in line with four other methods which have the same work below the treble. This makes a total of 14 other methods which are half learned before referring to the figures in the collection.

In the production of this table, Mr. Segar desires to associate the Ordsall (Retford) ringers. It was their request for guidance that caused him to plan the table, and what has been of benefit to Ordsall should be of value in other parts of the country. Tenors and Slow Time Ringing

Dear Sir,—After writing my last letter, I saw Mr. Hibbert's letter in your issue of Oct. 22nd and should like to reply to it, as I may be one of the 'people who are continually ring-ing tenors, and always in slow time,' to whom he refers. So far as Mr. Hibbert's remarks apply to the Somerset tour, I would refer him to the above explanation of our peal times; and if he or anyone else is unconvinced, let him repeat our programme and improve on our times and striking, and I shall be the first to offer my congratulations.

Frankly, I think this is an extra-ordinary impression. Surely if 'the bell is ringing the ringer it means that the ringer has not got the bell under full control, and with a heavy bell this state of affairs is produced by ringing it so much below the balance point (i.e., so fast) that the ringer is unable to place the bell properly. Some years ago I rang a tenor (30 cwt., and slow at back-stroke) in a peal of Cambridge Major. One or two of the band wanted to ring fast, and in my of the band wanted to ring tast, and in my youthful inexperience and zeal I tried to fall in with their wishes. The result was a poor peal in 3.10. I should hate to claim that I rang that bell in the sense of placing it accurately—on the contrary, it definitely rang me, as I spent the last hour jumping a foot into the air at every cutting backstroke! Another example of the same thing is a peal of Treble Reb on a beaux eight where the tower Treble Bob on a heavy eight where the tenor man let his bell 'float' instead of placing it. man let his bell 'float' instead of placing it.
This caused the speed to increase, the 'floating' also increased, and the result was that we rang 'Treble Bob plus' in order to ring round him, and he rang more or less Albion Treble Bob, all in very fast time.

It is simply a question of human mechanics. No man can apply more than his own weight (unless he has the help of a foot-strap): and, of course, in ringing as in everything else, 'a good big' un is better than a good little 'un.'
(Here Mr. Hilbert has unquestionably the

good big 'un is better than a good little 'un.'
(Here Mr. Hibbert has unquestionably the advantage of me; I weigh just 10 stone, and advantage of the; I weigh just to stone, and the must be 14 stone or so — unless he has changed since I last had the pleasure of ringing with him!) But fortunately for us lightweights, it is foot-pounds that count and not weights, it is foot-pounds that count in pounds only, so we get there in the end by applying a smaller force through a longer dispersion and therefore a longer time. Mr. Hibbert applying a smaller force through a longer distance and therefore a longer time. Mr. Hibbert is absolutely right, of course, in his implication that A, by ringing a heavy bell in, say, 3½ hours, has worked at a higher rate than B who takes 4 hours; but I was taught that the art of heavy-bell ringing was to place the bell applications of the right art of heavy-be. Finging was to place the bell accurately with the expenditure of the right amount of energy and no more! However, if I ring a bell by using x foot-pounds per minute, and somebody else does it by using x plus y foot-pounds, I shall not dispute it if his is considered the better performance.

Incidentally, two of the finest tenor ringers

I have met are both small men in the lightweight class, and they never sarrifice control for the sake of beating somebody else's time. So I hope Mr. Hibbert will not begrudge us little 'uns the extra minutes we use in endeavouring to employ our limited poundage as efficiently as possible. Now and then the results are passable. Yesterday, for instance, we rang Cambridge (like most peals, it could have been better, but was very fair on the whole) at Leeds in 4.12. The late W. Pye's hand rang it in 4.11. Would Mr. Hibbert say that the bells rang the ringers in either case?

The Speed of a Peal SOME GOVERNING FACTORS.

Dear Sir,—I, too, was interested in Mr. Clift's letter re the Cambridge Royal at Wells Cathedral and also the weight of tenors in the West. Mr. Hibbert's remarks arising therefrom are also to the point and contain a great deal of

When the details of the recent tour in Somerset appeared in your columns I was somewhat surprised at the very long time occupied over many of the peals—3 hours 57 minutes for a 31 cwt. tenor, for instance, and 3 hours 51 minutes for 28½ cwt.; I was even more surprised to gather from the account of that tour

that subsequently appeared that the average time taken, 3 hours 41 minutes, was apparently

regarded as a matter for compliment.

As Mr. Hibbert says, there is no disgrace in ringing peals in slow time; neither, in my opinion, is there anything of which to be proud. except in exceptional circumstances. It is obvious that if a heavy bell 'goes' normally and is allowed to swing right up to the balance at every stroke, then it can be rung with comparatively little effort. But if the tenor is thus rung, then all the other bells have to be rung 'round' it, held on the balance for an uncomfortably long time, with the result that it is much more difficult to obtain perfect striking. One of the secrets of good striking, even on light rings, is work on the part of the ringers, especially by the back-enders; if the tenors are allowed to dawdle along at their own pace the ringing is almost bound to become slipshod and irregular. If, for instance, you wish to obtain real rhythm in Stedman Cinques it is essential that the big bells be 'pushed along,' especially at hand-stroke, and at lead. Within reasonable limits I have no hesitation in saying 'the quicker the ringing the better the striking is likely to be, and the more pleasant the bells will sound.'

Exceptional circumstances that justify slow ringing are: (a) Really unusual weight, as at Exeter and Wells; (b) unusual musical qualities in the bells (a few. do sound better rung more slowly); (c) difficulties caused by faulty ing, tower sway, loose frames, etc. But why attempt in such cases to turn in the tenor? If a peal must be attempted, and nowadays that is naturally the case, why not be content with an odd-bell method?

Very often, however, the cause of an unduly slow peal is to be found not in any of these circumstances, but in the presence in the band of one or two either not really familiar with the method or not entirely masters of their instrument. i.e., not fully in control of their bells. Sometimes this could be corrected by proper placing of the band; all too frequently first peals are prematurely encouraged. The forst peals are prematurely encouraged. The slower the ringing the easier it is for the conductor to put the bells right!—Yours faithfully,

Four of them were distributed to four city churches. One was sold to an old Dublin bellfounder and the remaining one retained by the parish.
